

PEACE CONFERENCE HAS BEEN POSTPONED; WILSON VISITS ENGLAND THURSDAY

LLOYD GEORGE WILL BE BUSY FORMING CABINET SOON AS RESULT OF ELECTION IS ANNOUNCED; PRELIMINARY EXCHANGES DEFERRED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, December 21.—The preliminary peace conference at Versailles has been postponed until the beginning of February at the earliest, says Marcel Hutin, editor of Echo De Paris. The postponement is due, he says, to changes in plans because of President Wilson's visit to England and the reconstruction of the British Cabinet, which will occupy Premier Lloyd George as soon as the result of the elections is announced on December 28. The preliminary exchanges which were to begin in Paris today, according to the original plans, have also been deferred.

London, Dec. 21.—It is definitely announced that President Wilson and Mrs. Wilson will arrive in London on Thursday of next week, December 26. They will be guests of King George at Buckingham Palace.

INFLUENZA IS AGAIN RAMPANT IN THE NORTH

Orders Issued at Juneau That Masks Must Again Be Worn As Preventive.

SOPHIA'S MAST STILL SHOWS ABOVE WATER

Influenza has again broken out in Juneau, according to word brought by the Princess Mary yesterday morning. Seventy-five cases were reported the day the vessel touched there, and orders had been issued the night before that flu masks must again be worn. The passengers and crew were not allowed ashore there.

At Skagway all passengers landing from the Mary were quarantined six days. There are no cases reported in Skagway or in other towns. The crew was not allowed to land at the northern port.

When the Mary arrived here about eight-thirty this morning, no one was allowed on or off until nearly ten o'clock, every passenger on board being examined by a doctor before the vessel was granted her pratique. The Mary sailed for the south about 10:20 after taking on thirty-five passengers here. Many of these were spruce men from the Islands. They report everybody pretty well cleaned out of the camps.

The Mary had a smooth sea all the way down.

The officers report that the mast of the Princess Sophia is still sticking above the water in Lynn Canal, showing that a portion of the hull is still lying on top of the seven hundred foot submarine mountain upon which the Sophia settled. It is said by the salvage men that half the vessel broke off and slid some distance down the mountain side.

TRAWLER GOES OUT ON XMAS FISHING TRIP

"G. E. Foster" Leaves Tonight in Command of Capt. Sanderson For Catch of Ground Fish.

This evening the G. E. Foster, belonging to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company, will put to sea to go trawling for flatfish on her first trip as a real trawler out of Prince Rupert. The demand for sole, plaice and flounders in Western Canada has become so great that the company have been obliged to place this second vessel in commission as well as keeping the "Carruthers" busy too. The skipper of the "Foster" is Captain Ed. Sanderson, who made his first trip trawling out of the port of Hull, England, in the smack "Flower o' the Forest," which belonged to the father of T. H. Johnson, manager of the Cold Storage Company here.

Captain Sanderson has been trawling practically ever since, in the North Sea and as far north as Iceland and the Faroe Islands out of Hull, and in the Bay of Biscay and the western Atlantic out of Dublin. He brought out a trawler to South America, and for two years fished out of Valparaiso, before coming north to Canada in 1914. Captain Sanderson has been on the "Carruthers" for some time past, although not as skipper, which position he holds on the "Foster." Anything in connection with trawling, Ted Sanderson knows, and with these two vessels operating now, the quantities of fish landed from now on will be very materially increased.

Under the new regulations, trawlers as well as other vessels have to be equipped with proper lifeboats, and the "Foster" puts out this evening fully equipped with new boats.

COMMERCIAL AVIATION SUGGESTED BY LORD WIER, MINISTER OF AIR, TO MAKE USE OF BRITISH WAR PLANES

London, December 21.—Lord Weir, Minister of Air, in a speech at Manchester, said they now have a substantial number of airplanes and seaplanes able to carry seven of crew and 30 passengers at a speed of 110 miles per hour. It is suggested that the big shipping and other transport organizations should actively interest themselves in the development of commercial aviation and when peace was concluded the state should sell its superfluous airplanes suitable for conversion to commercial uses to private firms cheaply.

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CANADIAN TROOPS ARE TO RETURN BY PANAMA CANAL; RATE OF 30,000 A MONTH

MANY WILL COME FROM FRANCE DIRECT IN ANOTHER MONTH—PROPORTION OF CANADIAN WAR MATERIAL TO BE RETURNED TO DOMINION

London, December 21.—Canadian Headquarters state that the British Columbia troops will go home via the Panama Canal. Several thousand soldiers will, therefore, reach home without rail travel across Canada.

Sir Edward Kemp, Overseas Minister of Militia, states that after February 1 the rate of return to Canada will reach approximately 30,000 a month. A large proportion of them will be from France.

A certain amount of Canadian material of war will be returned to Canada and the remainder will be sold here. The overseas Disposal Board which handles this matter comprises Brigadier-General Hogarth, Colonel C. Folger and D. R. McClelland.

PROVIDE FOR SOLDIERS WHO ARE RETURNING

Alex. Manson, M. P. P., Speaks on Reconstruction—Does Not Believe in Isolating Men on Farms.

"The realigning of the forces of the world, mental, moral and physical—that is reconstruction." That is the definition which A. M. Manson, M. P. P., gave of the subject on which he spoke before St. Andrew's Society last night.

The speaker likened the world to a musical instrument composed of many strings, the forces and influences of the world. If the set screw of a string is given a wrench and the string loosened, discord results, the whole arrangement being thrown out of order. When war was declared the set screws were all given a sudden twist, and the result—chaos. Things were getting into tune again, when the armistice was signed and the whole organization was out of tune once more.

"Will the same selfishness and brutality prevail as before the war?" queried the speaker. "Only if there is less inhumanity in the world will reconstruction be possible."

Handicaps.
"Men engaged in munition work are very little changed from what they were in the pre-war period. But what of the men who went overseas, who came from everywhere and every work, to go abroad to fight for what they thought was right. At home they were individuals; abroad they were little ions. They did not have to think for themselves; their wants were provided for. We sometimes forget that they have been but cogs in the wheels and that their initiative has been cultivated downwards."

Mr. Manson outlined a few of the other problems resulting from the change in the men who went over. They, through close contact with many men for several years, had had all their social instincts developed to the highest degree. This would mean that men would not go out on lonely farms as has been planned for them. They must continue to associate with their fellow men.

Mental and Physical.
That the men who had been overseas were mentally strengthened, was the opinion of the speaker. Many were also physically improved.

"These men are our kith and kin," continued Mr. Manson. "That relation puts us under the obligation to do what? What we must do is summed up in two words, 'Our Best.'"

Political Aspect.
"This question has a political aspect. So long as there are parties there will be men anxious to obtain political power who will sacrifice the best for what seems best. There are men in the po-

political life of Canada who are willing to promise returned men anything in order to gain political power."

The less parties we have, the speaker continued, the better for the state. He hoped that the returned men would not have a party holding the balance of power.

Places Gone.
The men with whom the state will have to deal are those men who come back and no places are open to them. In many cases women had taken their places. You could not say to these women "Step back. You have done your work well. You have aided us in times of need. We thank you. Step back."

In the opinion of Mr. Manson the solution of the problem lay in the great natural resources of Canada. We had been too conservative in our development in the past, too British. The Germans and the Americans had passed us.

Government Work.
Mr. Manson pointed out the trade opportunities with Orientals and Russians. There was not enough private capital in Canada to open up the resources. "I am not a government ownership man," he declared. "I agree with it in theory, but not in practice. I haven't got much faith in governments. But the government (Continued on Page Six.)

Reconstruction Theme of Address.

When the war broke out it dislocated business. Everything was upset, yet only a comparatively few men went away at that time and the rest were taken gradually throughout the four years during which the big fight continued. The change, therefore, was not very sudden. The coming of peace is a different thing. The vast armies that it took four years to accumulate will be dissolved in a few months. The men will return in large numbers and the general disturbance is consequently greater.

The dislocation of business on the outbreak of war was so great that many people were financially ruined. Gradually people adapted themselves to the changed conditions until war had become part of their life. This is suddenly changed and there is again dislocation of business as illustrated by the shutting down of the spruce camps here and the consequent change in the trend of local activities.

Gradual Adaptation Is Desirable.

To so adapt ourselves to these changes that there will be the least possible disturbance to business generally and no injustice to anyone, is the work of today. That was the subject on which Alex. Manson spoke to the St. Andrew's Society last night. He emphasized the necessity of getting the social instrument in tune once more as quickly as possible.

Mr. Manson is a student of affairs. He has a wide outlook and on this occasion he showed that he had grasped the situation. He spoke of the necessity of giving our best to the returned man. By that he did not mean necessarily what any one man thought was best. Men for the sake of political gain were willing to promise anything whether good for the returned men or not. The general idea to be gathered from the address was that the returned man should get everything which would help him to keep his place without handicap in the reconstructed world, and thus be able to preserve his self-respect.

Soldiers' Settlements Are Not Desirable.

Mr. Manson last night spoke of the undesirability of the establishment of soldiers' settlements. He did not think they could be a success. He advocated rather the settling of the soldiers who wished to farm in the more developed parts of the country where they would not have to endure so much of the hardship of pioneer life but would enjoy the advantages of civilization. There they also would be in a position to learn from their neighbors and adapt themselves to the requirements of the new life. He said he was not sure whether that was the policy of the Government or not, but it was the policy he advocated and any other he felt sure was doomed to failure.

The average soldier wishes to return to civil life, not grouped with other soldiers where everything would remind them of the terrible strains they have undergone, but mixed with the general civilian population where the tendency would be to forget and where the new duties and associations would be sufficiently engrossing to cover up and gradually eliminate from the mind the experiences of the great war.

Workingmen Have The Worst Prospect.

Those who have the worst prospect on their return from overseas are the workingmen. The great army of labor may find itself possibly without occupation and the man just returned, having lost touch with the situation here, is under a handicap. It is particularly for these that help is needed. They are the men for whom provision must be made. That does not mean that they must be changed from men who earn their own living into "remittance men." That is not the reconstruction idea. Conditions must be made such that they can easily find employment and mingle with their fellows as equals and thus forget the past.

Possibly the suggestion of forgetting the past may be mistaken. It simply means to have the vivid experiences of the battlefield so dimmed and mellowed that they no longer obtrude themselves on the life of the present to such an extent as to prove a handicap in the work and life.

GERMANS NOT WANTED FOR MANY YEARS

Straits Settlements, Malay States and Ceylon Opposed to Trading with Enemy Countries.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

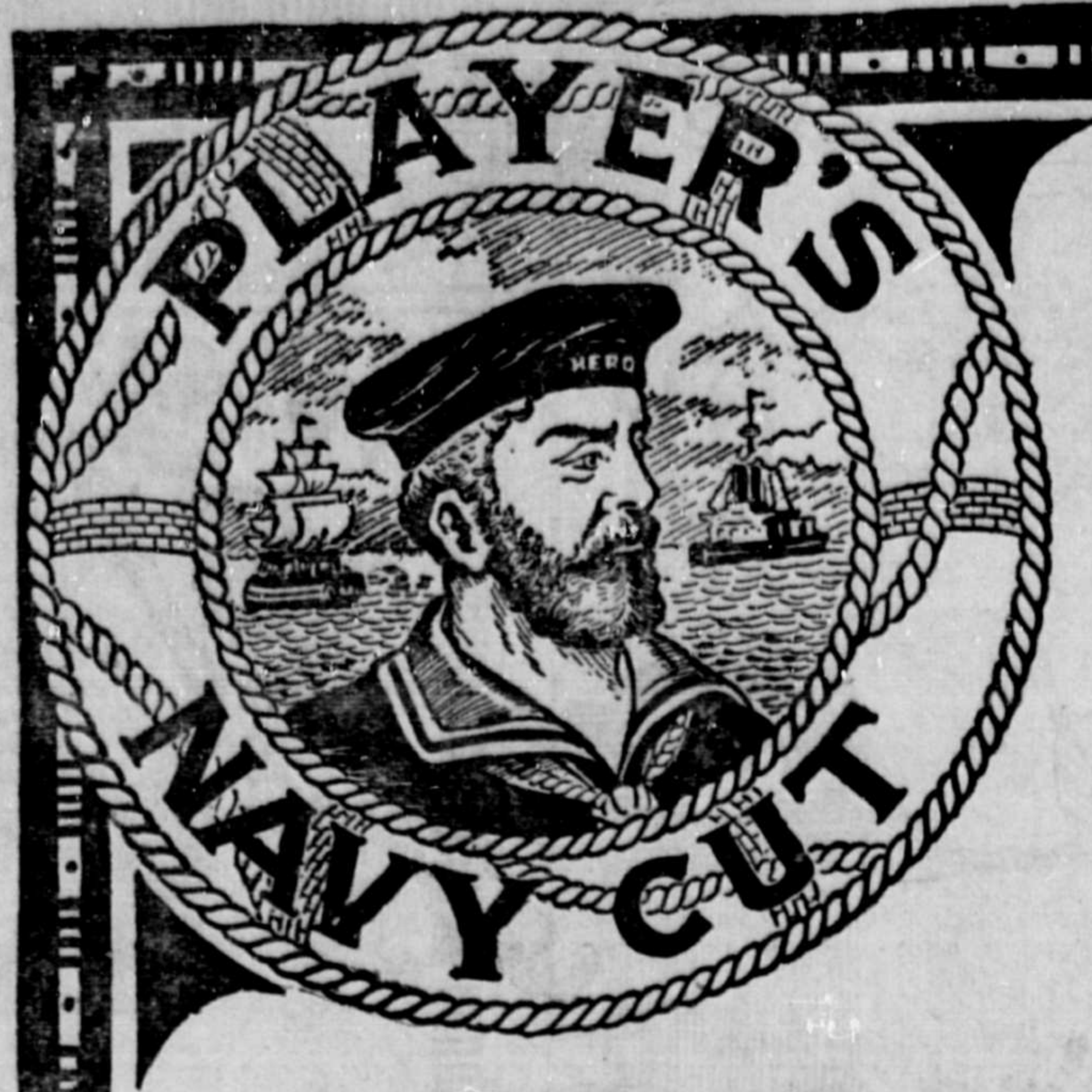
Singapore, Straits Settlements, Dec. 20.—At a great public meeting here of British subjects of all classes, it was unanimously resolved that representation be made to the government that no German subjects be allowed to land or reside in or trade with the Straits Settlements and Malay States for at least ten years after peace.

Colombo, Ceylon, Dec. 20.—Legislative council passed resolution that no German or Austrian be permitted to reside in Ceylon, at least for some years. The Ceylon Chamber of Commerce passed resolutions that no enemies, including enemies naturalized in neutral countries, be allowed to trade or own or lease property in Ceylon, and also that no imports and exports from and to enemy countries be permitted, except through allied subjects.

Salvation Army.

GERMANY IS RUINED FOR GENERATIONS

Manager of German General Electric Co. Says Greatest Calamity in 200 Years.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Dec. 20.—Germany is ruined for generations, politically, industrially and economically. Dr. Walter Rathenau, the president of the German General Electric Co., is quoted as declaring to a Berlin correspondent of the Daily Express. "It is the greatest calamity that has happened to any country in 200 years," added Dr. Rathenau, who is one of the largest employers of labor in Germany. "If the indemnity is high, we shall have nothing with which to expand our industries and there will be a great tide of emigration, probably to South America, the Far East and certainly to Russia. The result will be the Balkanization of Europe."

CONSPICUOUS WORK OF LIEUT. R. L. GALE

A few weeks ago mention was made in connection with the winning of the Military Cross by Lieut. R. L. Gale, and also of his subsequent wounding. Particulars have now been received and it is learned that he was gassed in the eyes, and suffered excruciating pain for the first day or so, but he was improving at the time of writing.

The action that earned him the Military Cross is described in the Canadian Gazette as follows: "Lieut. R. L. Gale, Central Ontario regiment, rendered most valuable service as intelligence officer on the morning of a raid, the success of which was entirely due to his skilful and daring reconnaissance of the enemy positions. On the morning of the raid he guided parties to their different points of assembly, and then proceeded to take part in the attack, in which he displayed most conspicuous gallantry."

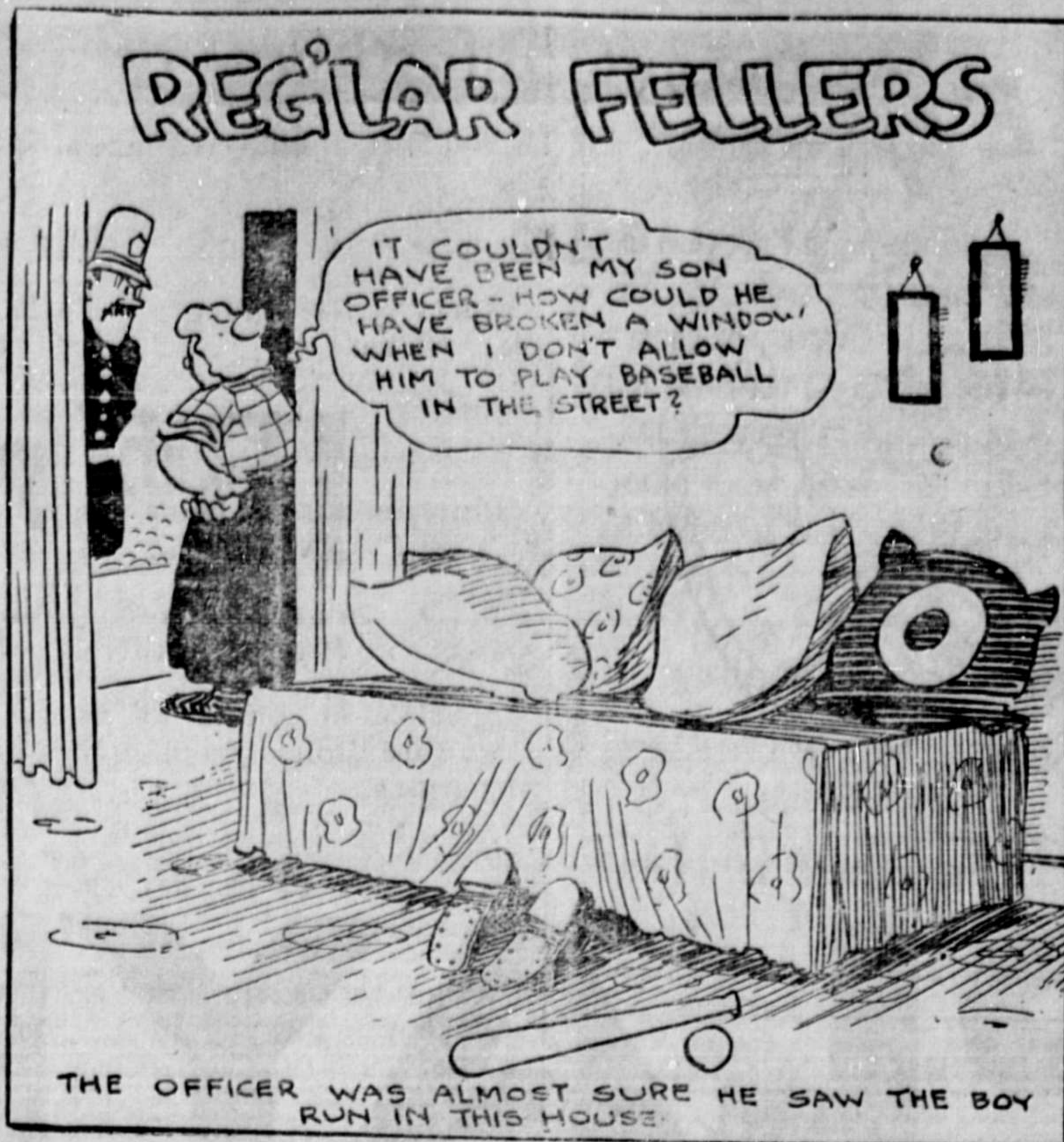
And by the way, speaking of lunar bodies, somebody says he doesn't know who writes this stuff, but at any rate he must be a lunatic.

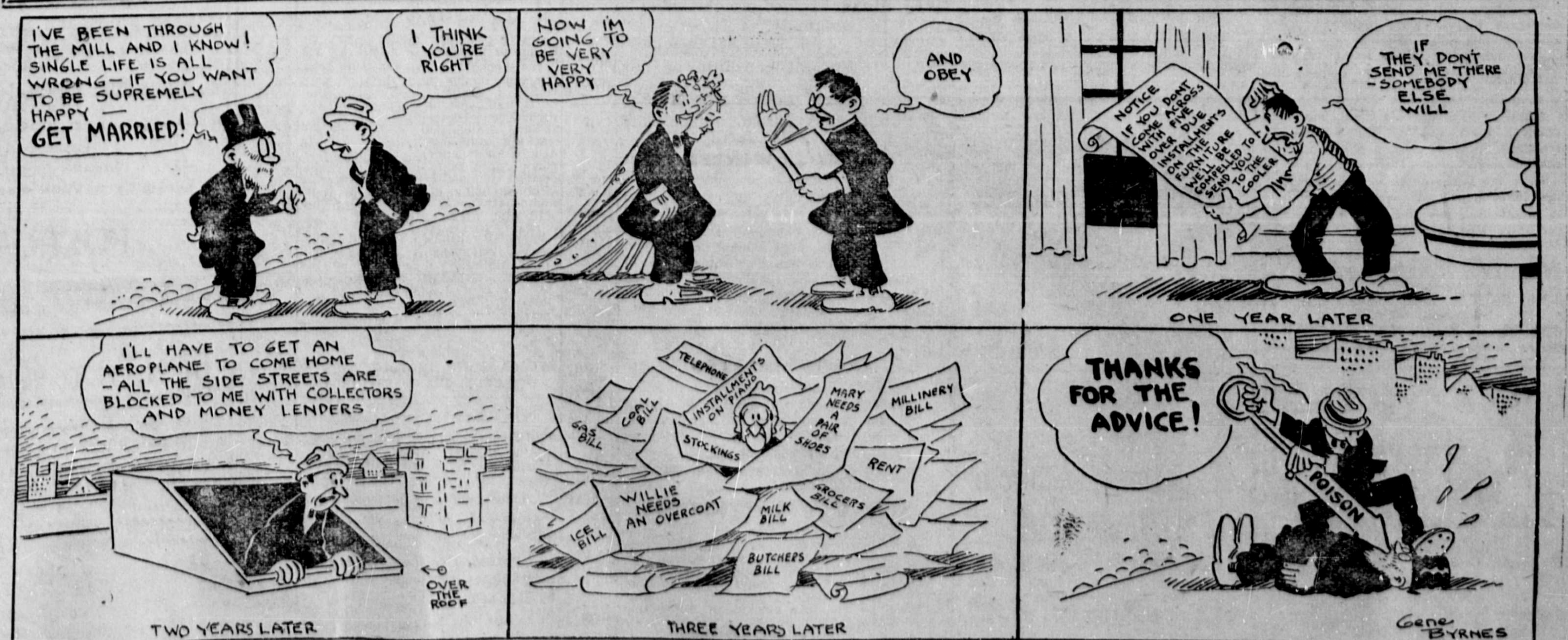

should open up the natural resources."

More industrial research was necessary. In this Germany had again beaten us.

"Our greatest resource is agriculture," declared the speaker, "and the greatest mistake that can be made would be to send returned men to secluded spots in B. C. There were few farmers among the men who went away. There will be only a percentage of these that wish to go back to farming. If the government sends men in to the Stuart country the scheme will fail."

Now that men had had their social instincts developed so highly, they must be put in settled agricultural communities. The Government must build roads, install telephones and electric lights, and have community land clearing machines. They must make every effort to remove the cloud of drudgery from the farm life.

In concluding, Mr. Manson said: "I have touched only the edges of the problem. But I may have started you thinking. Reconstruction means the physical, moral and spiritual development in every fibre of Canada, and that is the thing toward which we must be incessantly striving."

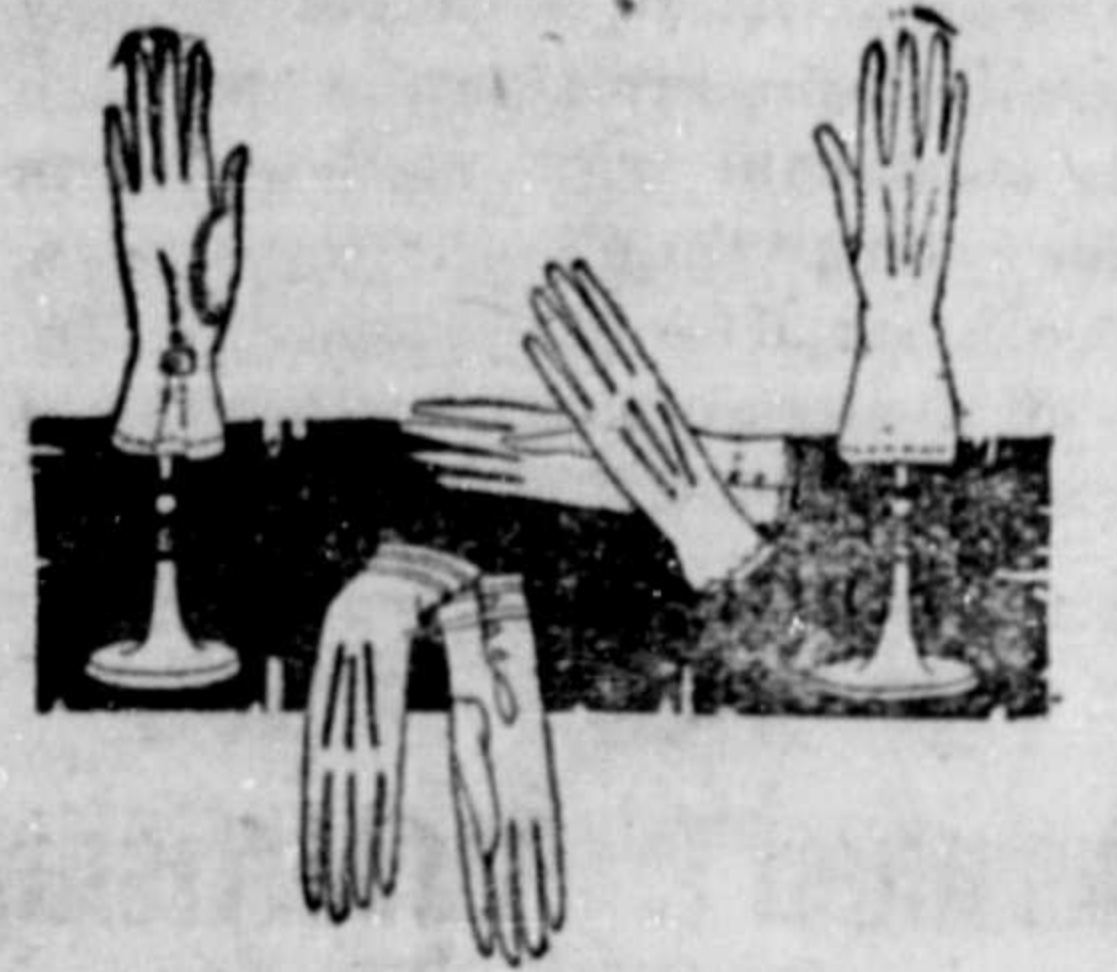
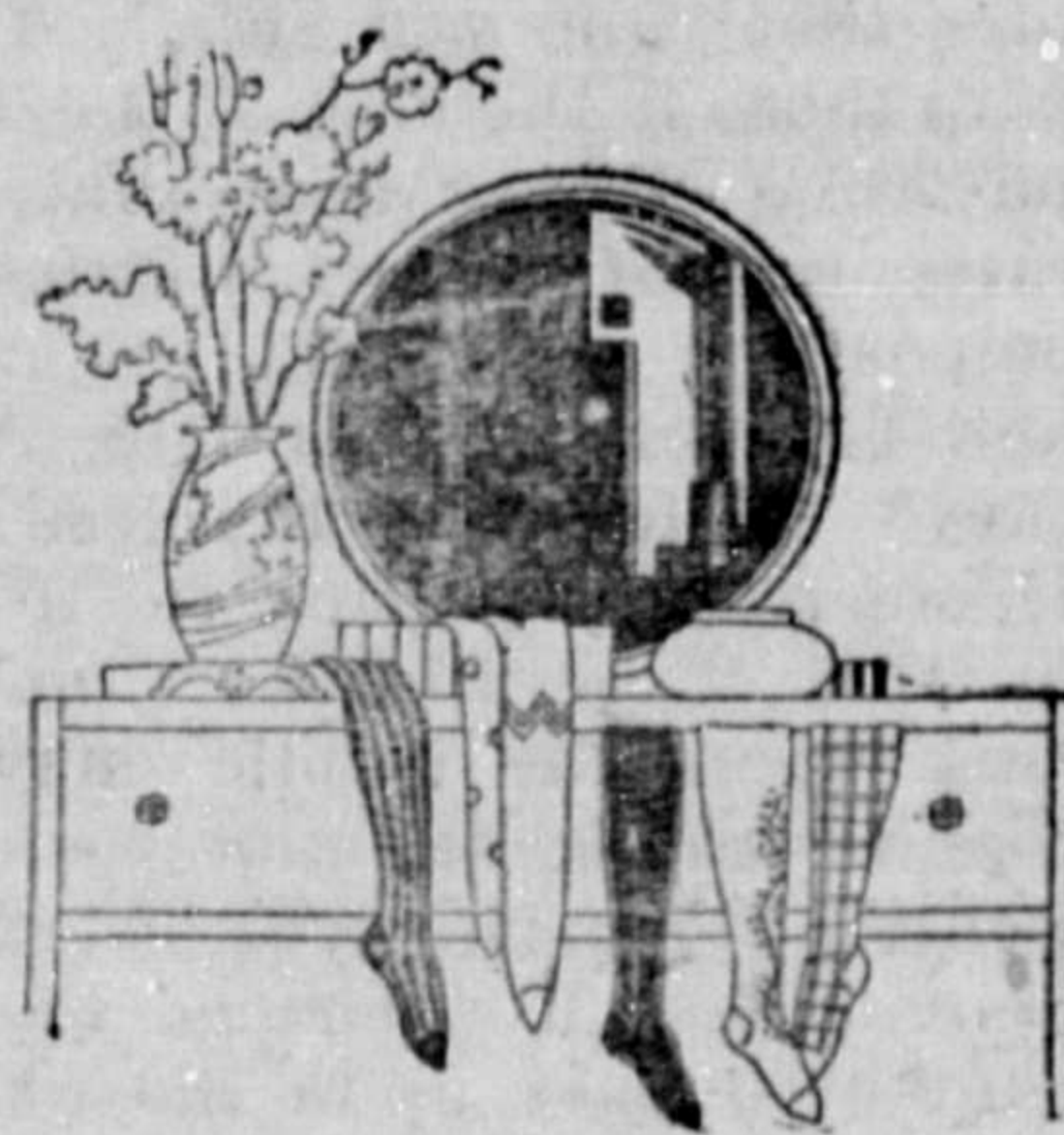
