

Straits Settlements, Malay States and Ceylon Opposed to Trading with Enemy Coun-

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Singapore, Straits Settlements, Dec. 20. - At a great public meeting here of British subjects of all classes, it was unanimously resolved that representation be made to the government that no German subjects be allowed to land or reside in or trade with the Straits Settlements and Malay States for at least ten years after peace.

Colombo, Ceylon, Dec. 20 .--Legislative council passed resolution that no German or Austrian be permitted to reside in Ceylon, at least for some years. The Ceylon Chamber of Commerce passed resolutions that no enemies, including enemies naturalized in neutral countries, be allowed to trade or own or lease property in Ceylon, and also that no imports and exports from and to enemy countries be permitted, except through allied subjects.







