Will Leave Russians Alone

ALLIES DECIDE AGAINST FURTHER INTERVENTION IN AFFAIRS OF RUSSIANS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, December 26.—The Allied governments have decided against further intervention in Russia, at least for the present, according to indications from official sources. Great Britain and the United States, it is reported, while recognizing that Russia should be assisted in every way to permit her getting back to normal conditions, point out that military intervention on a large scale would involve difficulties and dangers of all kinds. Stephen Pichon, the French Foreign Minister, explaining the situation at length to the Committee on Foreign Relations said the solution at present was to guarantee moral support to governments which have sprung up at various points on Russian and Siberian territory.

RUSSIAN PRISONERS FROM GERMANY JOIN BOLSHEVIKS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Warsaw, December 26.—Flocks of released Russian prisoners who are making their way homeward through Poland, all of whom appear to be tainted with Bolshevism, and are recognized as a danger in this respect by the Polish authorities. They are in fact already causing much trouble by their lawlessness in their search for food. The Bolsheviki are taking advantage of the penniless plight of these first thousands of released prisoners and have picked up several thousand of them for their army by offering to the men clothes, food and money, which there is in plenty since the Bolsheviki control the printing presses for the purpose of making rubles.

The Poles are rapidly organizing their own army around the nucleus of General Pilsudski's Phalanxes. The old Polish legions of home-weary troops which are coming home have no Russian or German sympathies and are merely desiring to be left alone.

SALVATION ARMY IS DRIVEN FROM RUSSIA BY THE BOLSHEVIKI

Pioneer Workers of the Salvation Army leave Unsettled Land After Tooth and Nail Struggle.

BOLSHEVIKI ARREST UNITED STATES CONSUL

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Toronto, Dec. 26.—The Russian Bolsheviki and the Salvation Army working in Russia have had a tooth and nail struggle, and though no loss of life is reported, it was probably with some bloodshed that the pioneer workers of the Salvation Army have at last been driven from the country by the Bolsheviki Red Guards.

Odessa, Dec. 26.—Bolsheviki have arrested American Consul Treadwell at Tashkna in Russian Turkestan, according to a wireless message received here.

MISTOOK INDIANS FOR JAPS AT BAR

Served Two Indians With Near Beer, Thinking They Were Japanese—Even Near Beer Forbidden Indians.

Evidence was taken this morning in the police court for the prosecution in the case of supplying to Indians by the bartender at the Empress Hotel. Constables Watkinson and Bailey had arrested the Indians in the Empress Hotel at the time of taking a glass of near beer, after orders had been issued by the department disallowing this. The main defence consisted that it was hard to distinguish between a Jap and an Indian and that the bartender sold them the beer under the impression that they were Japs.

H. E. Ross, the proprietor of the Empress, was there to testify of the enforcement of the law in connection with the giving of two per cent. to Indians. H. T. Cross of the customs department, who performed the test on the two glasses of liquor seized, stated the alcoholic strength as being 2.9. The case was adjourned until Monday in order to give the defense time to get Arthur Morrison, who was one of the Indians arrested.

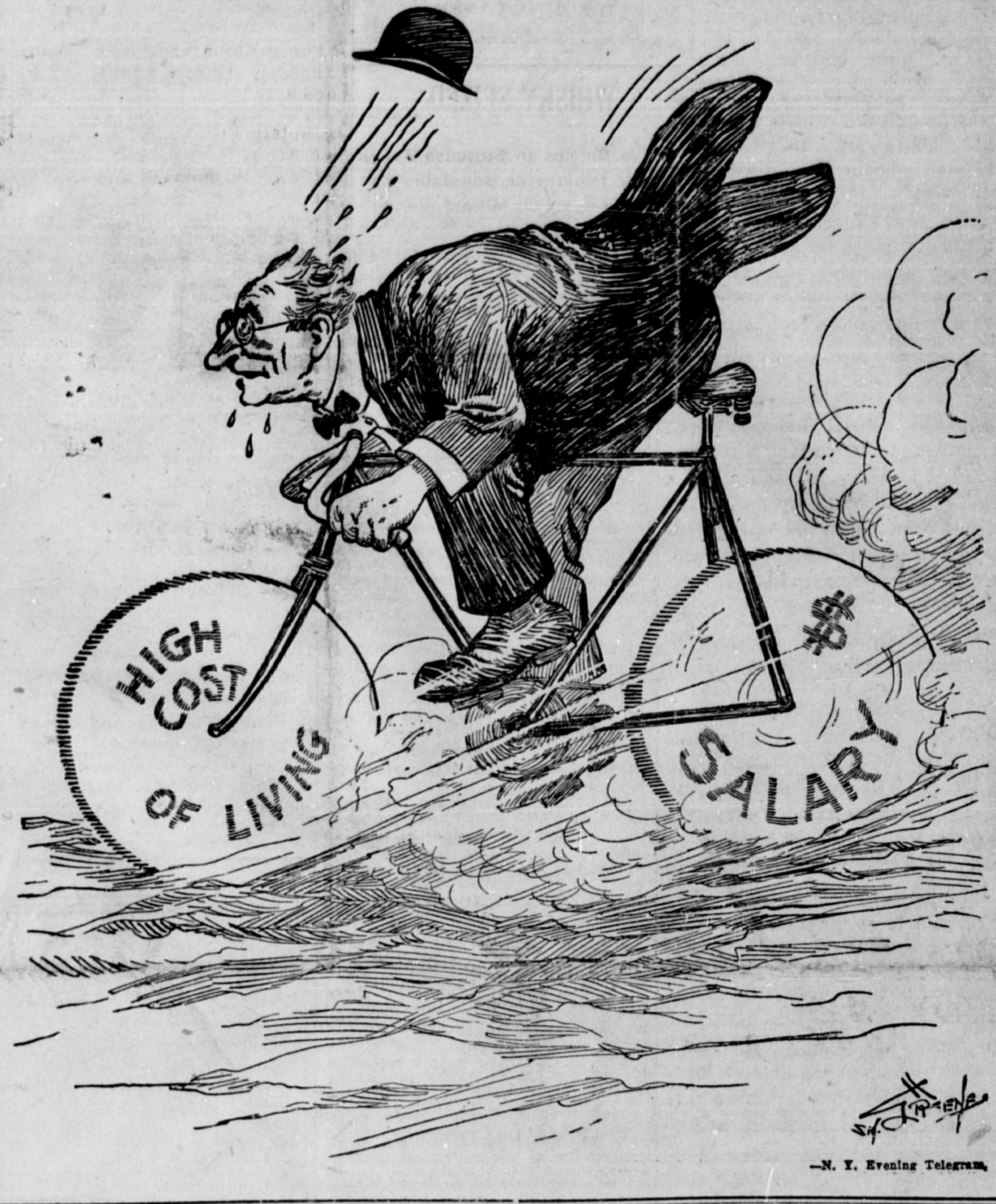
CARDINAL HAS HIGH OPINION OF WORKING PEOPLE IN THE STATES

PRESIDENT WILSON WELCOMED AT U.S. HEADQUARTERS CITY

Says All Nations Concerned Have Accepted the Peace Chart of the United States With One Purpose.

Chaumont, Dec. 26.—President Wilson received a most cordial welcome yesterday from the people of Chaumont town which has been closely associated with the history of the American Expeditionary Forces in France and is now the headquarters of the commander in chief.

In his address to the troops the President said that no difference of purpose exist among the great allied leaders and that all the nations concerned have accepted the chart for peace presented by the United States.

SUDDEN DEATH OF MATT BARR

Dies at Calgary on Christmas Eve of Influenza and Pneumonia After Short Illness While on Journey.

WAS MUCH INTERESTED IN SHIPBUILDING HERE

The many friends here of Matthew J. Barr of Vancouver will be shocked to hear of his sudden death in Calgary on Christmas Eve. He was on a journey, and was suddenly taken with influenza, with consequent pneumonia and died after a very short illness.

Matt Barr was one of the well known figures in athletic and business circles throughout this province. Years ago he was one of the strong players of the Vancouver Lacrosse team. He was one of the best centre fielders and one of the squarest of players. Senior partner of the firm of Barr & Anderson, he had worked his way up to a partnership from the bottom. His firm is now one of the biggest plumbing and general contractors' business houses in Vancouver. They specialize in steel fittings of all kinds. It was his business connection with the Mullen Steel Company which made him the connecting link between that firm and the Prince Rupert drydock, and he was one of the active ones in connection with the getting of the Mullen Company to interest themselves in shipbuilding in Prince Rupert. Matt Barr had many friends in Prince Rupert of very many years' standing. One of the finest and straightest of men, his loss will be much regretted by all who knew him.

"CORINTHIAN" A TOTAL LOSS

Wrecked C. P. R. Liner Expected to Disappear in Forecasted Westerly Gale. Part of Cargo is Saved.

CAPTAIN AND THE FIRST OFFICER SUSPENDED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Halifax, Dec. 26.—Wrecking steamers returning to Yarmouth report the "Corinthian" ashore in Brier Island, to be settling fast and predict that with the westerly gale now forecasted, she will go to pieces and disappear. Most of the cargo between decks has been salvaged, but that in the lower holds cannot be recovered. The commission enquiry investigating the causes of the accident have suspended for three months the certificate of Captain Tannock, who commanded the vessel when she was lost, and that of Chief Officer Simpson for six months.

The finding states that the loss of the Corinthian was due wholly to indifferent seamanship of the two officers penalized, and dismisses the argument that the Bay of Fundy is an unsafe channel for navigation.

The Corinthian, a C. P. R. liner, ran on a ledge off Brier Island on December 14 and has developed into a total loss.

SPAIN WORRYING TO GET BACK GIBRALTAR

Spanish Premier While in Paris Holds Consultations With Allied Statesmen Re Morocco and Gib.

Paris, Dec. 26.—During the recent visit here of Count Romanones, the Spanish Premier, extended consultations are reported to have been held by the Premier with French and American statesmen regarding the Moroccan question which was discussed in both its military and financial phases. The future status of Gibraltar is said also to have come up for consideration.

HUNDREDS OF PLANES DOWNED BY U.S. FLIERS

Washington, Dec. 24.—American aviators downed eight hundred and forty-five enemy planes during the war, of which four hundred and ninety-one were confirmed and three hundred and fifty-four were not.

A Green Christmas.

There were all the appurtenances of Christmas present yesterday in this district except the one thing which gives the outward semblance to the season. There was no snow, and yesterday morning it was hard to believe that the season was mid-winter, owing to the mildness of the air. Still, there was everything else to denote the fact that the real Christmas was here. The evidence of the visit of Santa Claus was to be seen in practically every household, and he came laden this year as if all customs' tariffs had been abolished, and imports were duty free. Santa is a good old fellow, and there were no places that he missed in his age-long rounds yesterday.

Good Resolutions.

It is about now that the preliminary survey of that way paved with good resolutions, begins to be taken. There are so many things that we all know of which might be accomplished by each of us that it is really a difficult matter not to make up our minds to do something different in the New Year. This incoming year there will be many new things cropping up and new resolves will continue to be made throughout the year. For Prince Rupert the prospect for the New Year is bright and big with yet to be developed events. With Peace and Preparedness the people here will doubtless master the events in due course.

The Kirkyard.

The old saying regarding the Green Christmas denotes this fact to mean that the Kirkyard will be full. Just how much truth there may be in this old saw does not matter. We have got into the habit of not believing these sayings without modern scientific authority to back them up. But whether the Christmastide be green or white, there is little need for dreading the absence of snow. In fact, on the coast here judging from the experience of the wet kind of snow we do get at intervals, most of us would prefer it to be green all winter round. Snow is all right when it is snow, but when it becomes slush practically at once, that is a different matter. There is much greater need to dread the recurrences of the "flu" epidemic than the absence of snow, and with proper precautions there is little reason to dread that either. We say advisedly, with proper precautions. It is the absence of these that is responsible for the high mortality. Already there are evidences in certain places that it is not too late for this scourge to return, and there is no good in spoiling this festive season through neglecting simple precautions against the danger.

Overseas.

Meantime, the occupation of the Rhinelands of Germany still continues by the troops of the Allies, and the boys at the front have certainly spent a merrier Christmas this year than ever. In Great Britain, although the allowances of butter remains at only one ounce per head per week, and there has been a great scarcity of turkeys, owing to the lack of suitable feeding stuffs, yet notwithstanding, their Christmas is bound to have been as happy and merry as was ours here, even if the people there did not have the same variety of good things with which to celebrate the occasion. The spirit of Christmas is the great thing.

LANGUAGE OFTEN INTERFERED WITH WORK OF ARMIES

Incident Shows How This Was Overcome and How Useful Tanks Were in War.

In the sweeping assaults upon the German positions in front of the line of the Scheldt British armies have been working in conjunction with Belgians, French and American units. There had been unity of command, co-operation of all branches of the services and a general pooling of resources toward the common end of killing off the enemy.

In consequence of this mixture of Allies one finds cases where English gunners have covered French assaults, where English infantry have been working with Belgian gunners and cavalry, and where English tanks have operated with infantry and artillery of two nations. Sometimes there have been difficulties because of the language bar, for there could not be always an interpreter available in every emergency.

No Opposition.

In a recent operation one of the big British tanks rumbled along on its job of squashing machine gun nests found a company of French infantry hung up in front of a village. The tank commander opened his little trap door, got out and asked the French officer how he could assist him. Neither spoke the other's language and it was difficult to understand what was needed. At last the tank commander gathered that the village was held by the enemy, and would he please clear it out? Having grasped the situation he drove his tank into the village and was surprised that he met no opposition. Slowly the tank went right through the village and not a shot was fired nor a German seen. Still the French did not advance and he was more than a bit puzzled.

He returned in his tank to the French, who again tried to explain. At last a bright idea struck the Frenchman. He seized a stub of pencil and drew a picture of a house on the back of his map, putting German soldiers firing from the top windows of the house, and nothing happening on the ground floors. "Ah," said the tank commander, "upstairs are they? Bon, I will go along again."

Drove Rats Out.

Once more the tank entered the silent village and firing on the upper windows was fired upon in answer. The commander drove his tank straight at the corner of the house affected and drove in the bottom walls so that the top story fell down onto the tank and into the street with its German garrison and their guns. These having been crushed down under the tractors or shot as they fled, the tank commander treated three other houses similarly and enabled the French to occupy the village without any casualties.

It is estimated that some fifty or sixty Germans were shot down or crushed to death in that manner and the tank returned to its work with its super-structure still covered with the debris of houses and other remnants, having suffered no casualties to its crew.

NEW OFFICIALS FOR CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAY SYSTEM

Toronto, December 24.—Geo. Stephens, formerly freight traffic manager of the western lines of the Canadian Northern Railway, is to be freight traffic manager of the entire system of the Canadian National Railways from the Atlantic to the Pacific with offices in Toronto. George H. Shaw, formerly general traffic manager of the Canadian Northern, has resigned. D. A. Storey, formerly freight traffic manager of the Canadian Government Railways, has also retired; R. Creelman is to be assistant passenger traffic manager west of Port Arthur; Osborne Scott general passenger agent in the same jurisdiction.

Miss yesterday McDonald returned yesterday morning from Vancouver where she has been completing a teachers' course at the Provincial Normal School. Miss McDonald formerly taught at the Seal Cove school here and it is expected that she will again resume her work in the new year.

IS LOOKING TO PRINCE RUPERT AS AN OUTLET

The Financial Post Speaks of Opportunities of Trade by the Short Route.

BIG CORPORATION IS FORMED TO SELL GOODS

As an illustration of how people are looking to Prince Rupert as the outlet to the Orient and especially to Siberia is seen in a recent article published in "The Financial Post" of Toronto. This journal says that the connection with China and Siberia from Canada was shorter than from the United States and it was hoped that Prince Rupert as well as Vancouver would develop as a port for Eastern trade.

The article in part is as follows:

"A strong Canadian organization has been placed in the field to develop trade between Canada and the Far East, more particularly China, Manchuria and Siberia. This is called the Sino-North American Company, headed by Sir Herbert Holt as president, with other directors, Sir Charles Gordon, president of the Dominion Textile Company; J. E. Aldred, president of the Shawinigan Water & Power Company, and connected with a number of other Canadian industrial concerns; W. A. Black, vice-president and general manager of Ogilvie Flour Mills Company; and G. M. Gest, who is managing director, and has had a wide experience in the East. The company is capitalized at \$1,000,000, and acts as selling agents for a number of Canadian manufacturers, and is arranging to perform a similar service for Eastern producers for whom it is hoped to secure a market in Canada.

Develop Market.

This would be the double function of the company, Mr. Gest told The Financial Post. Not only would every effort be made to develop a market for Canadian goods, but the interests of exchange, if nothing else, Mr. Gest said, would be a motive for the company looking after lines that could be sold in Canada. This description of trading corporation, Mr. Gest pointed out, was more familiar in the old country than in America. China and Siberia, he believed, held out bright hopes for Canadian trade. As to whether the company would ultimately own their own steamers he could not say; this would be some time in the future, if ever. In any case the connection with China and Siberia from Canada was shorter than via the United States, and it was hoped that Prince Rupert as well as Vancouver would develop as a port for Eastern trade.

Companies Represented.

Some of the Canadian companies which the Sino-North American Co. will represent are: Dominion Textile Co., Steel Company of Canada, Ogilvie Flour Mills Co., Dominion Bridge Co., Thomas Davidson Co., Brandram-Henderson Co., Warden, King & Co., Empire Typewriter Co., Canada Carbide Co., and others. Offices have been opened in Peking, Hong Kong and Shanghai, and a representative will shortly reach Vladivostok. It was planned in the future to cover India as well.

Looking to Russia.

The entrance of the Allied forces into Siberia and the effort to apply some economic laws to the chaos of Russia, would result in good business developing in each of these countries, Mr. Gest believed. Among the lines that Canada could import were coffee and spices. There was a favorable sentiment in the East toward Canadian goods.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with a joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant. Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same or furnishes evidence to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on the claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years. Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires the conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land. Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained on the usual residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 20 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive. TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction. For information apply to any Provincial Government Agent or to G. R. NADEAU, Deputy Minister of Lands, Victoria, B. C.

VANCOUVER PRINTERS MAKE LITTLE PROFIT

A Review of Printing Trade of Vancouver Showed Only Two Firms Made Any Profit During the Year.

The semi-annual conference of the United Typothetae of America was held at the Hotel Vancouver on Monday, the business of the meeting occupying the entire day and evening. At six o'clock a banquet was held in the Rose du Barry room, to which 65 sat down. After the dinner short addresses were given by Messrs. A. Howe, Tacoma; John D. Boyer, James Abbott, Ray Fennell, Portland; O. Sargent, H. W. Moulton, Seattle; F. J. Yurner, Spokane. The address of the evening was given by Mr. J. Anderson, special representative of the United Typothetae of America, who had been in the city for a week conducting a survey of the printing industry of Vancouver.

Mr. Anderson reviewed the situation and said that he had secured information from 23 firms in the city, which showed that the total investment was \$266,385 and the number of employees 209. These employees, with their families, represented about 1000 persons in the city, who were dependent upon these 23 printing establishments for a living. Only two firms were shown to have made a profit, and the total loss was said to be \$162,821. This was said to be due to the fact that undue competition, due to lack of organization, was responsible.

As a result of the meeting the job printers of the city and New Westminster agreed to sign a three-year contract working under the bylaws of the United Typothetae of America.

Mr. A. A. Brookhouse, president of the Vancouver Printers' Board of Trade, presided at the banquet, while Mr. E. B. Newman, president of the Seattle Typothetae, gave an address. Other speakers were Delegate Marsh, of Victoria, and Senator Taylor of New Westminster.

CANADIAN NATIONAL RAILWAYS IS NEW NAME

Toronto, Dec. 24. — An Order-in-Council has been signed to authorize the use of the name "Canadian National Railways" in order to include those in use formerly for the lines comprising the Canadian Northern System and the Canadian Government Railways, the Intercolonial and the National Transcontinental. The terms of the order in council protect the existing rights and liabilities of the various companies involved.

RESEARCH COUNCIL AND FISH PRESERVING

Ottawa, Dec. 24.—The Council of Scientific and Industrial Researches has taken prompt steps to co-operate with the New Guild for Research formed by the Maritime Provinces Fish Canning Association. The Research Council has made a grant of \$2,000 to the Committee on Fish Researches to be expended on the investigation of one of the fish preserving problems to be taken up by the Canners' Guild.

The Guild itself has arranged for the first appropriation of \$5,000 for research work. The Research Council is also arranging to publish in co-operation with the Department of Mines a concise and handy reference bulletin of Canadian building stones giving information as to the wearing and weathering qualities, competitive and economic value, sources of supply, etc.

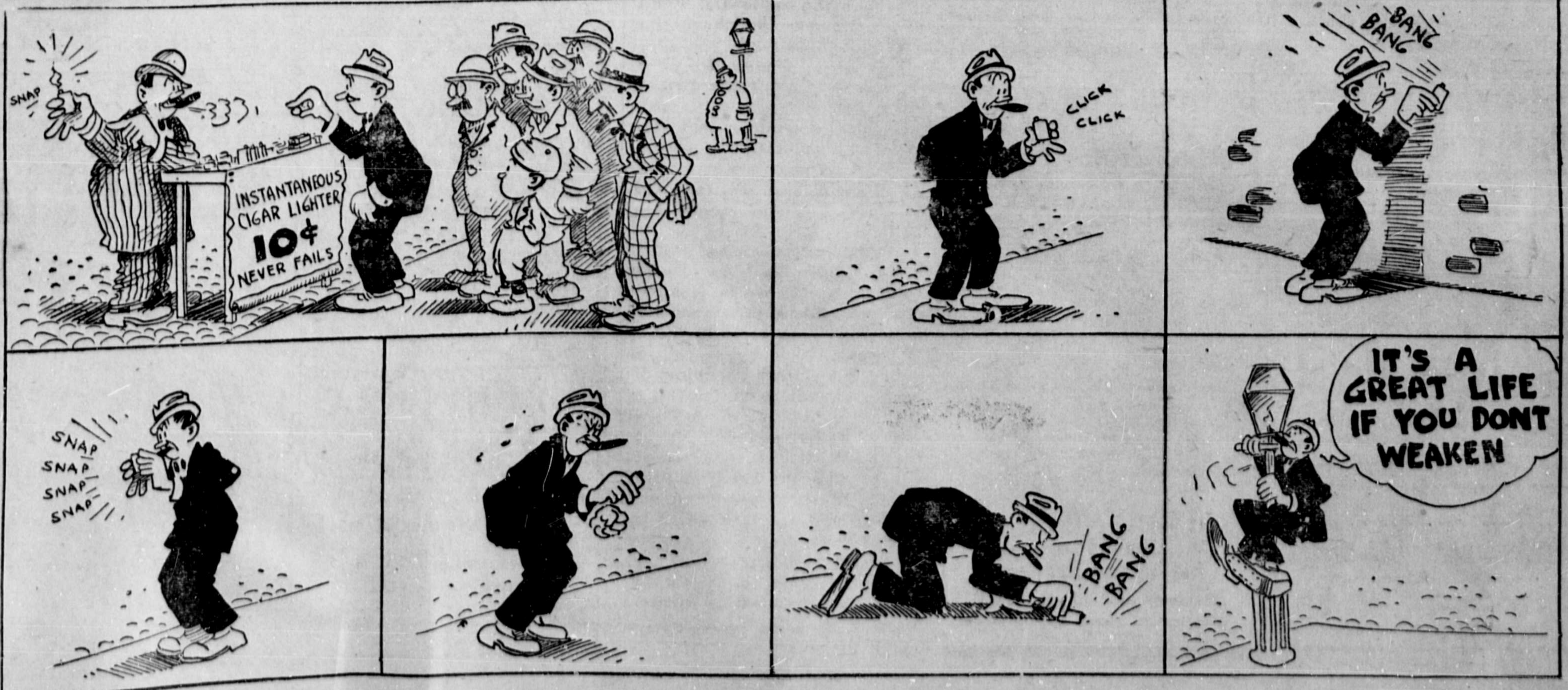
