## London Welcomes President

### PRESIDENT WILSON GETS UNPRECEDENTED WELCOME ON ARRIVAL IN LONDON

**WAS ONLY BLACK-COATED FIGURE IN GORGEOUS STATE PROCESSION THROUGH LONDON—GREAT CROWDS SURROUNDED BUCKINGHAM PALACE**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
London, Dec. 27.—The greatest moment of President Wilson's first day in England was when he stood with the King and Queen and Mrs. Wilson on the balcony of Buckingham Palace today, facing the multitude which stretched clear down the Mall to the Admiralty, half a mile distant and overflowed into St. James Park on one side and Green Park on the other. Only the corporals guard could hear the President's brief speech, but the people demanded that he show himself and gave him a greeting more clamorous than any other guest of nation has commanded within the memory of the oldest Londoners. The day's events constituted a tribute to the President. The official ceremonies included a reception by Dover Corporation and the Navy, the welcome at the station by the Royal family and the chief officials of the Empire. The state passage, through the heart of London were colored with touches of mediaeval pageantry, even to the crimson coated beef eaters from the Tower bearing Halberds which the British people cherish. That the central figure of the royal procession in quaint carriages attended by a military escort and the Royal Household officials should be a civilian wearing a black coat and silk hat gave a flavor of novelty to the scene. It is estimated that two million people crowded the two miles of streets through which the state procession passed. These were canopied with flags and bunting and amid the thudding of saluting cannon, the President of United States received a popular welcome almost unprecedented in history.

### EX-COMMISSIONER FINDLAY BACK IN VANCOUVER AND WILL LAY BARE THE WHOLE STORY

**RETURNED VOLUNTARILY TO VANCOUVER FROM PORTLAND AND WILL BE PRINCIPAL WITNESS ON PROMISE OF IMMUNITY FROM FURTHER ARREST**

Vancouver, December 27.—Walter C. Findlay, former commissioner under the Prohibition Act in B. C., is back in Vancouver and will be the principal witness at the inquiry before Justice Clement into the operations of the alleged whiskey ring today. Findlay, it is understood, has agreed to lay bare everything on the promise of immunity from further prosecution. He will tell the whole story. According to a report from Victoria, if Findlay had not voluntarily returned, he would probably have been arrested. Leaving Victoria nine days ago, he stayed several days in Seattle and then went to Portland, where it is said he used the name of "J. Z. White." He says he only imported one car of whiskey and that this is the first crooked act of his life. He claims to have no money.

A quiet and dainty ceremony was solemnized last evening at the home of Canon Rix, rector of the Anglican Church, when two of Prince Rupert's pioneer citizens Mr. Tom Silversides and Miss Millicent Thomas were united in wedlock. The affianced couple had intended to be wed at the Rectory, and slip away south on the steamer, but the Sons of England Society, and the Great War Veterans' Society, both of which the groom is a member, refused to have it so, and they turned up in force to the Rectory to see the knot securely tied.

After the ceremony, a dainty supper was served by Mrs. Rix after which Mr. and Mrs. Silversides returned to the home of the bride's mother on Borden street, to further celebrate and cut the wedding cake. On their way to the steamer, they had to run the gauntlet of a host of friends who were gathered on the wharf, and they got a great send off. They will spend their honeymoon in the south, and on their return to town, will take up their residence on Sixth Avenue West.

### TO SUPPLY TRAINED SCIENTISTS FOR INDUSTRIAL FIRMS

Ottawa, Dec. 27.—The Council for scientific and industrial research is planning to establish a central employment bureau or registry for technologists in Canada. The object in view is to furnish a ready medium for the distribution of a limited number of trained re-search workers and graduates of applied science faculties among industrial firms, etc., seeking their services.

### U.S. SHIPPING BOARD TO EXTEND ORGANIZATION THROUGHOUT THE WORLD

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Paris, December 27.—The United States Shipping Board has decided to create a permanent world organization for the purpose of handling the government's trade fleet with the greatest efficiency and effectiveness. "We will open at once offices in London, Paris and Rome," said E. N. Hurley, chairman of the board today. "From these centers," Mr. Hurley continued, "we will be directed ten or twelve other offices such as in Shanghai, Yokohama and Bombay in the east, Genoa in Italy, Buenos-Ayres, Valparaiso and Rio Janeiro in South America, and at Rotterdam and Antwerp. Take for example vessels bringing supplies to Belgium or France. It is of the greatest importance that we have a quick turn around. It may be of advantage to re-route the vessels on this side to India or South America.

### GREAT EXPENDITURE IS REQUIRED FOR THE GOVERNMENT LINES

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, Dec. 27.—A report has been made to the Canadian Government that before the Canadian National railway, which recently was acquired as government property can be put into adequate operation, an expenditure of \$35,000,000 must be made for tracks, bridges and road bed, it was announced here last night. An operating deficit of \$8,000,000 on Canadian Government railways during the last year would be announced soon, it was stated.

### THE BLANKET CASE

Accused to Appear for Trial Before Judge Young at 2 p. m. in County Court.

Yesterday afternoon Jack McInnes appeared before Judge Young on the charge of stealing seven pairs of blankets and a safety razor from the Empress Hotel. Evidence was given by Carl Johnson for the defence, who stated that he had seen the blankets previously in the accused's possession and that they belonged to the accused's father. He had seen them in the shack where McInnes lived and also at Anyox. The case was adjourned yesterday to permit of another witness being present. The charge against George McInnes will also be heard this afternoon. The accused in this instance is a brother to Jack McInnes and the charge is of the theft of a blanket from the steamship Prince Rupert.

**The Political Truce.**

Although the Allies are still at war with the Central Powers, one of the noticeable things throughout the press of the Dominion is the fact that matters political are once more receiving greater attention. Practically since the last election there has been an unwritten truce to controversial matters in the world of politics, at least up to November 11, the date of the signing of the armistice. The armistice was the first forward and visible emblem of victory, and with the cessation of fighting the war was as good as won. With the winning of the war accomplished, to all intents, and no longer absorbing all the public interest, criticism of the present Government is becoming more pronounced, and in the Unionist newspapers, too.

**Signs and Portents.**

Several reputable citizens witnessed the resurrection of many house flies in their homes the day before Christmas. Another day, within the week, the dogs in the street were seen lolling on the sidewalks, with their tongues hanging out, and panting, as they do in midsummer. And yesterday a citizen of undoubted veracity saw a caterpillar, in all its glorious greenness, gobbling up the vegetation. And all the time seventy miles up river there is two feet of fresh snowfall. The mildness of the Prince Rupert weather around this Christmas is undoubtedly unusual at practically any other point in the same latitude. One plausible explanation is that the recent earthquakes felt in the province have released many calories of internal heat in the interior of the earth, permitting it to penetrate nearer the surface.

**Real Enterprise.**

Should this assumption prove to be a scientific fact then it may be presumed that the municipality will take immediate advantage of it, when proven. Instead of talking for the simple sake of talking, with the hopes of influencing the votes of the ignorant, about the establishment of the civic coal yard, when everyone knows that even if it did have a coal yard the city would have no power to operate it, the city Public Works Department, might excavate down a little further through the earth's crust, nearer to this liberated heat. A small Vesuvius might be established on Mount Hays, and a hot water coil patent applied for, and of sufficient size, might supply heat to the whole city. This consummation would be of a triple advantage. It would first of all keep us warm; secondly, would economically abolish the Coal Barons, and thirdly and lastly, or at least let us hope so, would save us from a foolish and meaningless election parrot cry.

## DANCED IN MUD TO CELEBRATE VICTORY

Winnipeg Man Tells How Soldiers  
at Front Received News  
of Signing of Armistice.

"Monday was the greatest day in the history of the world, and France was the most glorious place in the world," writes R. A. Rigg, ex-M. L. A., for North Winnipeg, from France, on the evening of the day that the suspension of hostilities was declared. The letter is addressed to Edward McGrath, secretary of the provincial Labor bureau of Manitoba.

"What I came to maintain—the real essential issue of this far—has come with a vengeance—that is, the mind of the German people has been changed.

"What an experience it was, even for those of us who have had only a little more than two months over here. What it meant for those who have endured years of it, none but themselves will ever know!

"The thing that hurts is the thought of the splendid fellows who have fought and suffered and died, and for whom there is no ecstasy of joy. I tell you, boy, that in the midst of our delirium, the thought of the brave fellows who lie where the poppies grow in Flanders' fields and on all other battle-fields, lies very heavy at times on my heart. Don't you think I am a lucky devil to have arrived here just in time to see the grand climax to this frightful struggle—thrones toppling and democracies being born out of the travail of the world-pain.

"We knew what was going to happen six hours before the German envoys actually signed the armistice terms. Our 'central' caught a message going over the wires, 'All's well—Germany accepts.' He didn't know where it was from or where it was going, but he phoned his information first to our colonel and then to me. The colonel on receiving confirmation (I was with him at the time) said, 'Riggs, you can tell the boys.'

It was 10.45, and they were all in bed. I rushed off to our sector and woke them, and told the news. The scenes that followed! For some hours there was such intoxication of joy—any previous demonstration I have seen was comparatively tame! We fetched out the band, we lit bonfires, fired off flare lights; we sang; we danced—danced in the mud! And the rapture continued until nature put a stop to the revelries.

"It was two days after that we got our first newspaper confirmation—but, of course, we didn't need it when it came. But I shall have to postpone telling you more until I see you. And it will be some months. We are preparing for a big move eastward. You will notice that I am corporal again. My promotion is dated from November 1. This is a clear frosty night with a bright moon shining. It is the kind the boys used to curse—but now they exult about it. The ending of the war has not affected our work yet, and is not likely to for some time."

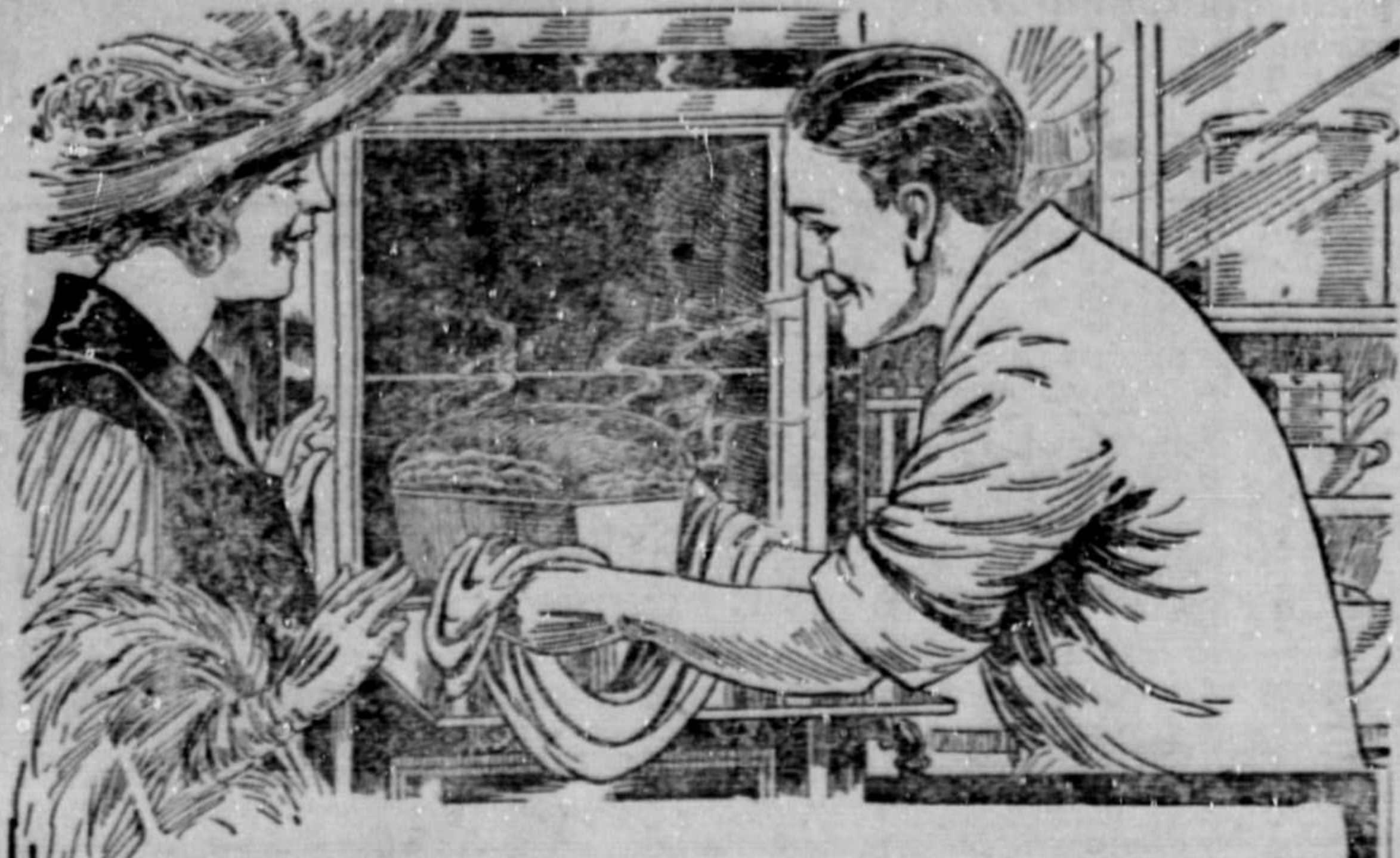

**RUSSIA IS NOW AT THE BEGINNING OF HER WOES**

So Says R. M. C. Story, American Y. M. C. A. Man, Arriving From that Country.

"Russia is at the beginning of her woes. I am of the opinion that many years will elapse before stable government is assured over there."

Such are the conclusions drawn by R. M. C. Story, a member of the American Y. M. C. A. corps, who arrived on the coast a few days ago after spending two years in revolutionary Russia. Mr. Story has traveled extensively in Russia and has had every opportunity of posting himself on the conditions as they exist today. He reports indescribable chaos in the territory controlled by the Bolsheviks and is very pessimistic as to the outcome of the present situation. The ignorance of the masses in Russia, he says, is appalling. In eastern and southern Russia the Bolsheviks are conducting a campaign of wholesale murder and a determined and calculated policy of extermination is being conducted against all those who do not agree with the principles of Bolshevism. He says that law and order is gradually being restored in Siberia, where the Allied troops, working in conjunction with the Siberian forces and Czecho-Slovaks are in almost complete control.

**SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT**

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 60 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, to one year after the date of the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

**TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.**

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction. For information apply to any Provincial Government Agent or to the Deputy Minister of Lands, Victoria, B. C.

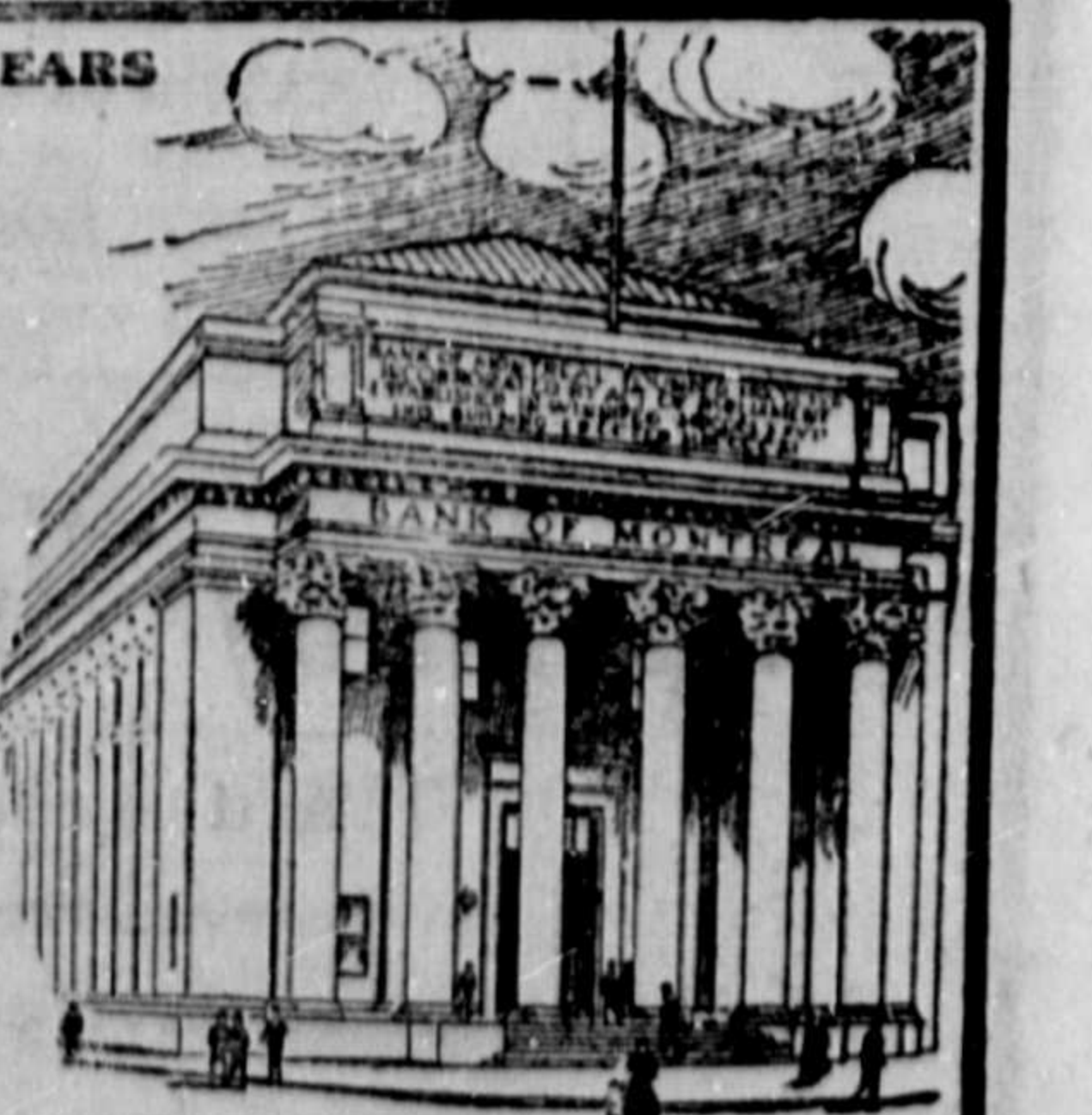

## SKEENA CITY MILL CLOSES FOR WINTER

Have Made Large Shipments of Spruce This Summer and Have Stock of Lumber on Hand Yet.

MILL HAS CAPACITY OF 60,000 FEET PER DAY

Yesterday F. S. Stevens, manager of the Skeena City mill, and H. I. Clegg, also of the mill staff, were in the city on their way south for Vancouver, where they will spend the winter. At Skeena City, although only 35 miles from Prince Rupert, there is at present some two feet of snow, which has interfered greatly with the operations. There has also been a large quantity of ice in the river, which has hampered the movement of the booms of logs. Owing to its proximity to the coast the fallen snow does not remain dry, and will not pack. Operating in two feet of wet slush is not profitable from any point of view.

This mill belongs to the National Spruce Co., Ltd., with which F. L. Buckley is connected. It has been sawing logs brought across from the Queen Charlotte Islands. There is a booming ground at the mouth of the Skeena river, to which the rafts brought across the sound were taken and the booms were towed up the Skeena to the mill as required. With a 60,000 feet capacity the mill has been busily engaged all summer and has made large shipments of aeroplane spruce east. There is still a considerable stock of lumber on hand which will be ready for shipment east, when the milling operations are resumed next spring. While it is possible that there will still be a demand for spruce for aeroplane construction in the future, on reopening in a few months' time, chief attention will be paid to the manufacture of other kinds of merchantable lumber.

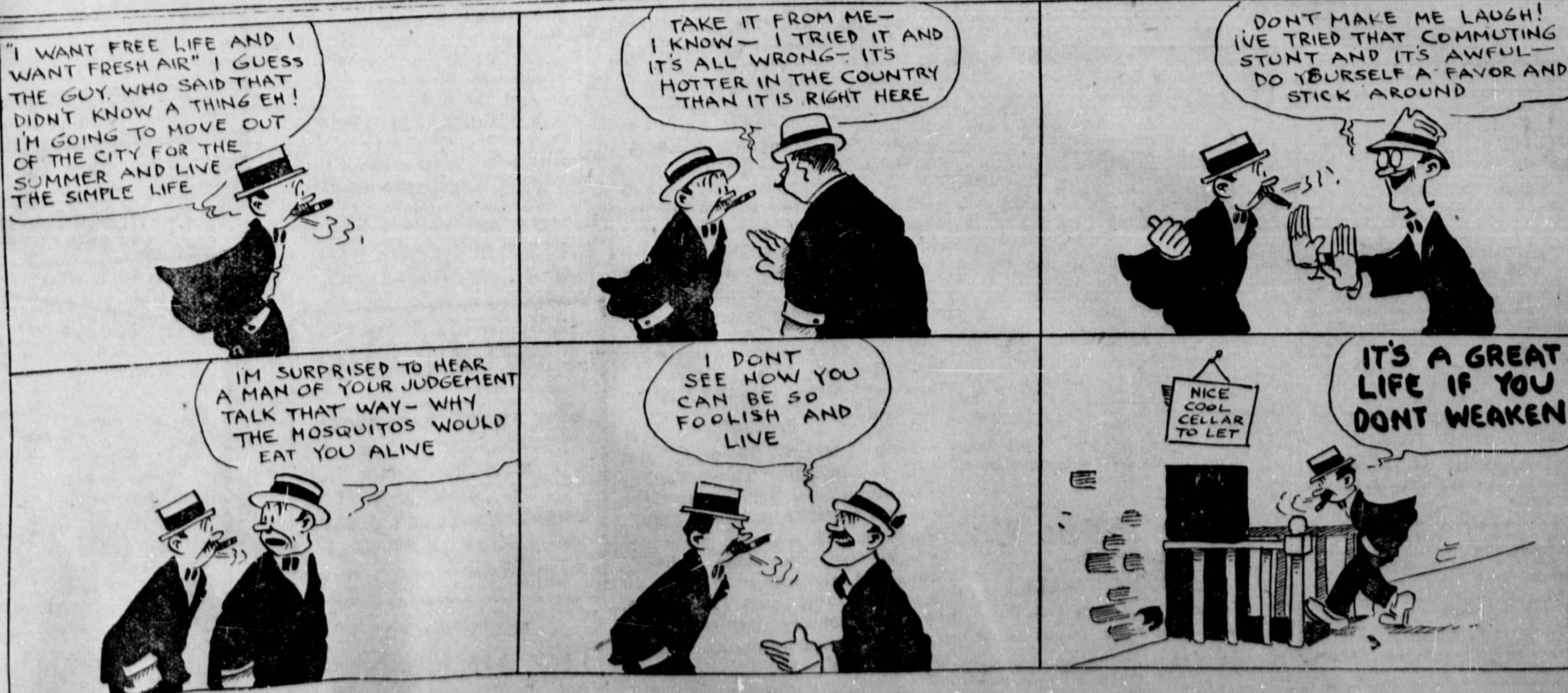
