## Inter-Allied Conference Delayed

### INTER-ALLIED CONFERENCE HAS BEEN POSTPONED A WEEK THRO' ITALY'S CABINET CRISIS

**EXPECTED THAT PEACE TERMS WILL BE LAID DOWN ON  
BROAD GENERAL LINES, WHICH WILL FORM  
BASIS OF PEACE TREATY—NEED  
FOR URGENCY**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Jan. 3.—J. W. Dufour cabling from London says, the conference of representatives of the Allied Nations, which was to have begun in Paris on January 6, has been postponed for one week owing to the development of a cabinet crisis in Italy. It is now expected to meet on January 13, and arrangements to that end are now being completed. The character and scope of this conference is not likely to be defined until it actually meets. There is a view that it should be a formal gathering with a definite agenda to be considered, and offering to the public a report of the conclusions to be reached.

An alternative proposal is that this conference should be completely informal and given up to the freest possible consideration of all questions as they affect the attitude which the Allied nations will take at the peace conference.

Economic and political conditions in all of the belligerent countries forbid that war conditions should prevail for so long a period of time. The need for an early termination of the state of war in the Allied countries in order that the readjustment of peace should begin, is very great. Therefore, it is freely conjectured that the conference will lay down terms of peace on broad, general lines embodying these in a document which will operate as a peace treaty and will then proceed to create continuing agencies which will undertake to work out these principles and apply them as required.

This would necessitate re-opening the Peace Congress at a later date or the calling of a new International Conference to review and validate the actions of these bodies. But this is not regarded as a disqualification of the plan, as, under the New World order, which it is supposed will date from the Peace Conference. There will have to be periodic gatherings of this nature.

### CANUCKS READY TO BOMB BERLIN

**Special Bombing Squadron Ready  
for Action Just Before  
Armistice Signed.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Jan. 3.—General Trenchard, in his report on the work of the Independent Air Forces, makes an interesting revelation of how Berlin narrowly escaped being bombed by a squadron under the famous Canadian airman, Commander R. M. Mullock, of Winnipeg. "The 27th Group was established in England," says Gen. Trenchard, "under command of Commander Mullock for the purpose of bombing Berlin and other centres. This group only received machines capable of carrying out this work at the end of October, and though all ranks worked night and day to get the machines ready for attacking Berlin, they only completed the work three days before the signing of the armistice."

### EMPRESS OF ASIA SAILS FOR B.C. VIA PANAMA

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, Jan. 3.—The C. P. R. SS. Empress of Asia sailed from Liverpool today with a full list of returned soldiers, their wives and families, via Panama Canal for Vancouver.

### CARDINAL MERCIER WANTED AS DELEGATE

Paris, Jan. 2.—The suggestion that Cardinal Mercier, the Primate of Belgium, attend the peace conference is being discussed among diplomats here.

The Belgium delegates have been named, but it is understood that before their appointment, Cardinal Mercier was favored even outside the Catholic party. Baron Van den Heuvel, Belgian Minister to the Vatican, however, finally was selected as the clerical member of the delegation. Those making the suggestion that Cardinal Mercier attend, point out that he has a wide knowledge of Belgium in war time, and that the part he played determined the attitude against the Germans, making him a valuable participant in the conference.

#### MOVE HEADQUARTERS

London, Jan. 2.—The Lithuanian Government, because of the Bolshevik successes in Western Russia, have been removed from Vilna to Kovno.

### MILK FAMINE IN NEW YORK

**Dairymen on Strike to Enforce  
Prices—All Families are Im-  
perilled by This Menace  
to Health.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

New York, Jan. 3.—The milk famine, which began yesterday as a result of the Dairymen's League Strike to enforce the price of \$4 per 100 pounds is a serious menace to the public health and if it continues, will imperil every family in the city. Health Commissioner Copeland declared in testimony today at an inquiry into the situation. He threatens to commandeer the entire supply.

### U.S. TRANSPORT FAST ASHORE ON SAND BAR

**Coast Guards Effect Rescue of  
Soldiers and Nurses in  
Heavy Gale.**

New York, Jan. 3.—Batting all day against an angry sea which capsized three of the life-boats, coast guards from many stations aided by the crews from twenty naval craft, had by nightfall taken safely to shore, seventeen navy nurses and 237 of the 2480 homeward bound soldiers on the United States transport "Northern Pacific," which has been hard aground for two days on a sand bar near Fire Island Light.

### FEARED LOSS OF BIG STANDARD OIL TANKER

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

San Francisco, Jan. 3.—The Pacific ocean has been "zoned" for a distance of 50 miles out and from San Diego to Vancouver, B.C., by the owners of coastwise vessels in order that these vessels may seek the Standard Oil Company's tanker George W. Loomis, long overdue at Coos Bay.

The tanker left here on December 19th with a cargo of 5,500 barrels of gasoline and crude oil for Coos Bay, and was last sighted off the Oregon coast in a heavy gale. It is feared that she is lost with all her crew.

### GERMANS PERMITTING ANARCHY IN VILNA

**Are Making no Attempt to Restore  
Order or to Repel Bolshevik  
Invasion—Poles are  
Arming.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Warsaw, Jan. 3.—The fate of the province of Vilna is trembling in the balance. Bolshevik agents are spreading their propaganda throughout the province, the northeastern part of which is under Soviet rule. Bands of robbers and tramps, the advance guards of the Bolsheviks, regular troops and refugees are coming into Vilna. The Germans apparently are making no effort to restore order in the city although they have 5,000 troops there. The Poles are organizing the best possible for defence. The Germans say the country must be destroyed.

### SUCCESSFUL CONCERT BY PRESBYTERIAN L.A.

Last evening in the Presbyterian Church Hall a concert of very high excellence was given by the Ladies Aid of the Church. The program was a varied one and included numbers both vocal and instrumental. The opening number was "O Canada" sung by the children with the Canadian flag in the centre. Violin duets were given by Messrs. McMillan and Harvey, and among the artists contributing to the success of the evening were Miss Patmore, Miss Edmunds, Mrs. W. Millar, Mr. Paterson, Mr. Moore, and Mr. Clapperton. The accompanists were Miss Stephens, Miss Curtin and Miss Irwin. A short address of welcome was given by Mr. Fred Stork.

### PRINTERS STRIKE FOR INCREASED WAGES

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, Jan. 3.—Job Printers here are on strike for an increase in wages, from \$29.50 to \$34.50 per week. All union shops are affected.

### SAYS REPUBLICANS CONSPIRE TO PREVENT PRESIDENT FROM ACCOMPLISHING ANYTHING

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Washington, January 3.—Senator Lewis, Democrat, of Illinois, speaking in the Senate, charged the Republican leaders with conspiring, for political purposes, to discredit President Wilson abroad and to thwart his purposes by giving to the European negotiators the impression that the Senate is opposed to his plans and by deceiving the American public. Their object, he declared, is to "prevent the President from accomplishing anything."

His speech was in reply to the recent utterances of Senators Lodge and Knox, both Republicans, criticising certain of the President's fourteen points of peace, and urging that consideration of his League of Nations, the Freedom of the Seas, and other questions be deferred until after the peace conference.

### WHISKY PROBE IS SUSPENDED

**Validity and Authority of Com-  
mission Questioned by the  
Counsel for Witness.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, Jan. 3.—Further proceedings of the enquiry into the illegal sale of liquor in B.C. have been suspended until next Tuesday as a result of the action taken in the courts today on behalf of A. L. Gartshore, who is desired as a witness by Government counsel.

### MINESWEEPERS HAVE A HERCULEAN TASK

London, Jan. 3.—British minesweepers will have their hands full for some time in carrying out clause 24 of the armistice, which provides that the associated governments shall have the right to sweep up all minefields and obstructions laid by the Germans.

Throughout the war these mine sweepers have been doing silently and fearlessly a noble work. When the war began the British navy had only a small fleet of sweepers, but the minelaying operations of the enemy and the counter-mining of the Allies made imperative the employment of a much larger number of vessels. As far as possible, small craft of various kinds were put into the service. Around the British Isles alone about 700 vessels have been used.

Each month the minesweepers have combed forty-six thousand miles of water. To do this they steamed a total of 1,132,800 miles.

In 1916, twenty-one thousand mines were removed with a loss of fifty-one minesweepers. In 1917 forty-three thousand mines were swept up and 89 minesweepers were lost. In 1918 up to the end of September 1,400 mines were swept up and nineteen minesweepers were lost.

### FRENCH PRISONERS RETURN TO HOMES

Paris, Jan. 2.—Already 32,000 French prisoners have been repatriated from Germany, according to announcement made by Louis Deschamps, under secretary for demobilization, in the Chamber of Deputies today. It is expected that all prisoners will be repatriated within a month.

With respect to the possibility of using ports on the Rhine for revictualing the liberated regions and the armies, Foreign Minister Pichon declared that general headquarters had appointed a committee to formulate a plan of procedure.

### FOUND GUILTY OF HERESY

**Methodist Pastor Accused and  
Convicted By a Special  
Church Court of the  
Conference.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Petrolia, Jan. 3.—The Rev. Wm. Knowles, M.A.P.H.D., who has been pastor for over three years of the Petrolia, Ont., Methodist Church, was found guilty on heresy charges, according to the verdict of a special church court of the London Methodist Conference read last night by Rev. J.E. Holmes, President of the Conference, before a large meeting of the congregation.

### R.N.W.P. WILL RESUME THEIR FORMER STRENGTH

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Jan. 3.—The North-West Mounted Police are not to be recruited up to 2,400 as was reported, but to their former strength of 1,200. The Mounted Police will continue to perform the duties they have been performing during the past two years in connection with patrolling the international boundaries, looking after alien enemies, etc.

They will also assume additional duties which hitherto have been performed in western Canada by the Dominion Police, including the arrest of defaulters under the Military Service Act and are also available for service as a police force in any other part of Canada, if the government should so require. They have nothing to do with suppression of Bolshevism as currently stated.

## Then—And Now.

Once upon a time, and not so long ago either, a former mayor of Prince Rupert went east to buy money. And when he came back he didn't know how much it had cost him. Would you trust the same man to buy coal?

## Six and Half a Dozen.

The City of Vancouver, Mayor Gale wrote to our City Council, is not in the coal business. And when Vancouver does sell coal, the price they have to charge is the same as the local coal dealers charge. Query, How much better off are the Vancouver citizens when they purchase city coal? The answer seems to be that they are about as well off as Prince Rupert citizens would be in similar circumstances.

## The Housing Problem in Canada.

In considerations of conditions prevailing at present throughout Canada, the Dominion Government has decided to set aside \$25,000,000 towards the better housing of the population. This sum will be divided among the provinces, whose governments will handle their proportions. The Dominion Government is not by itself going to carry out any building scheme, but will work through the Provincial Governments, who in turn will reloan the money to the municipalities.

It is not to be expected that the total of \$25,000,000 is adequate to provide all the accommodation necessary throughout the Dominion. This sum, however, will make a start to finance the building of necessary new homes in many towns. In Ontario the Provincial government has put up \$2,000,000 extra for loans to municipalities, with the condition that each town borrowing puts up 25 per cent of the amount borrowed as well.

So far as can be judged at present, it is expected that the municipalities are to have the responsibility of meeting the housing problem, with this money provided by the Dominion government, with probable additions from the Provincial treasury and the municipal coffers as well. The actual handling of the scheme will be watched with much interest.

Whether the municipalities borrowing will build and rent their houses, or whether loans will be made to the taxpayers to enable them to build their own houses will depend largely upon local conditions. Possibly the latter course would be the safest for the municipality.

There is no doubt that in Prince Rupert there is a scarcity of modern houses, and before any industry, such as shipbuilding starts, preparation must of necessity be made to house properly the additional workers brought here. In the pioneer days, people here were content to live in shacks, because no better could be had, but these days are now past.

If this scheme will enable the worker to build and own his own home, by means of a loan on fair terms, spread over a reasonably long period, it would seem to be an opportunity to be grasped.

## Bringing the Boys Home Again.

The present plans of the Government for the bringing back of Canada's army from overseas makes the rate at about 20,000 monthly. According to Major General A. D. McRae, however, the British government has offered transportation for 60,000 troops per month. This means that instead of nearly two years being occupied for this purpose, Canada's soldiers could all be returned to their homes and kin in a matter of less than eight months. It has also been brought out that there are still between 60,000 and 70,000 soldiers' dependents now in Great Britain who will have to be repatriated. The governments of the other self-governing dominions are providing free transportation for their soldiers' relatives. If Canada does not do this also, it will mean that in many cases the wives and families of many will remain in Great Britain for a while after the husband has returned to Canada.

That the people of Canada would prefer to have their boys back at the soonest is sure, and it is just possible that the number to be returned each month will be increased.

## POLISH ARMY NEARS BERLIN

German Government in Berlin is  
Alarmed at Progress of  
Poles in Prussia.ULTIMATUM IS SENT TO  
GERMANY FROM RUSSIA

Berlin, Jan. 2. — The Polish army, advancing along the railways toward Berlin, has captured six German cities, according to information received here today. The Polish mobilization and advance has alarmed the German Government. Counter measures are expected to be undertaken immediately.

## Near Berlin.

London, January 2. — Polish troops have entered Frankfurt-on-the-Oder, fifty miles east of Berlin, says a Berne despatch to the Express Telegraphs, which adds that the Poles have occupied Beuthen, in Russia Silesia and Bromberg in the Province of Posen, 69 miles northeast of Posen City.

## Ultimatum Sent.

Berlin, January 2. — The Poles in Posen have issued an ultimatum to Germany demanding the immediate surrender of the airman who bombarded the barracks at Reval.

## WILHELM FAILS AGAIN

Attempted Escape From Holland Does Not Succeed—No Details Available.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Wieringen, Holland, Jan. 2. — Friedrich Wilhelm Hohenzollern made an unsuccessful attempt to escape from his exile here, it is reported today. No details are available.

## Results in Cold.

Amsterdam, Jan. 2. — William Hohenzollern, the former emperor of Germany, is very ill, according to advices received here from Amerongen. He cannot leave his room and is suffering from a bad cold. It is said that he has a high fever.

ARAB PRINCE GETS  
DECORATION FROM KING

London, Jan. 3. — King George recently decorated, with the chain of the Royal Victorian Order, Prince Feisal, son of the Arab King of the Hedjaz, who distinguished himself in the Palestine campaign. The Prince, who looked very striking in the Arab head-dress, does not speak English, and during the ceremony the conversation was carried on by means of an interpreter.

## STRANDED SHIP SAFE.

New York, Jan. 2. — The 2500 wounded soldiers on board the stranded steamer, Northern Pacifics, on Fir Island, are in no danger, Captain reports.

## PRAISE FOR GENERAL FOCH FROM HARDEN

Paris, Jan. 2. — Maximilian Harden, the German editor, in an interview has declared to the correspondent of The Temps that Germany was beaten by the superior strategy of the French generals. Marshal Foch, he declared, was a military leader far above Ludendorff, who has never been victorious on the front. As for von Hindenburg, the editor characterized as little more than a figurehead. Harden expressed the fear that the loss of Alsace-Lorraine would be for Germany a wound like that suffered by France, but he hoped that the border would have no great importance in the future.

Concerning the present situation in Germany, Harden believed it very serious. In his opinion an industrial crisis was imminent, the revolution becoming more and more the agitation of delirium. He feared the extension of the Bolshevik movement in Germany, if that country were obliged to make too great sacrifices. But he was convinced that the Socialist revolution would have no influence on France, of which the national spirit was not prone to Marxism.

## SASKATCHEWAN ORE FOR TRAIL

Huge Copper Deposits in North-  
West Saskatchewan Being  
Successfully Mined.

ORE BROUGHT TO TRAIL  
SMELTER FOR TREATMENT

Some particulars of the mining  
activity in Saskatchewan were  
given recently in Edmonton by  
President Clifton Ross, of the  
Ross Navigation Company of Sas-  
katchewan regarding the develop-  
ment of the copper mining ac-  
tivity in Northwest Saskatchewan.

The Ross Navigation Company  
operates steamers and barges  
which transport the copper ore  
mined in the region of Schist lake  
through a system of waterways  
175 miles long, including Stur-  
geon lake, and passing Cumber-  
land House, the Hudson's Bay  
Co. post to the railway at The Pas,  
Manitoba, on the New Hudson's  
Bay line.

20,000 Tons in 1919.

The mines are operated by the  
Mandy Company, which is the  
Canadian organization of a Tona-  
pah, Nevada, firm. During the  
past year they have mined about  
9,000 tons of high-grade copper  
ore. In the coming year they ex-  
pect to mine 20,000 tons, which  
constitutes an immense develop-  
ment of the business. The ore is  
transported by rail to Trail, B. C.,  
where the nearest available Cana-  
dian smelter is located. The price  
of copper is now 26 cents a pound.

At the outbreak of war it was 15  
cents. Mr. Ross says he expects  
to see a fall in copper prices now  
that hostilities are over, but, even  
at that, the proprietorship of a  
copper mine is something that is  
decidedly worth while.

Millions Marked Out.

In addition to the development  
indicated the Diamond drill com-  
pany, an eastern syndicate, has  
marked out over two million tons  
of low grade copper ore in this  
same region which they intend to  
develop this year.

It would not pay to ship out  
this ore but the company is plan-  
ning to erect a smelter and build  
a connecting railway.

## STEAMSHIP CAPTAIN SHOT AT HALIFAX, N.S.

Crew Tried to Rush the Ship's  
Stores on New Year's Day.  
Accidental Revolver  
Shot Hurts Skip-  
per.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Halifax, January 2. — Capt. E.  
Craddock of the steamer War  
Farus, was accidentally shot in  
the back yesterday while attempt-  
ing to quell a disturbance on  
board his ship. All the crew,  
numbering thirty, were taken to  
the police station for examina-  
tion. During the scuffle, a re-  
volver in the hands of the mate  
was discharged. The crew tried  
to rush the ship's stores.

## THE POPE'S NEW YEAR MESSAGE TO AMERICA

Rome, Jan. 2.—In a New Year's  
message to America, given to the  
Associated Press, Pope Benedict  
expressed the hope that the peace  
conference might result in a New  
World order with a League of  
Nations, the abolition of conscrip-  
tion and the establishment of  
tribunals to adjust international  
disputes.

## THINK DARDANELLES PROBLEM IS SOLVED

Sofia, Jan. 2.—Bulgarian polit-  
ical leaders profess to be gratified  
by the entrance of the Entente  
fleet into Constantinople and ex-  
press the belief that it assures an  
equitable and reasonable solution  
of the interminable question of  
who shall control the straits of the  
Dardanelles.

This problem has been the con-  
stant nightmare of most of the  
Balkan States, particularly of  
Bulgaria, Roumania and Greece.  
These countries always have con-  
sidered the possibility of Russian  
occupation of Constantinople to  
be a serious menace to their own  
national existence.

This fear was one of the causes  
which led Bulgaria to take sides  
with the Central Powers in the  
war. Later when Russia aban-  
doned her exclusive claim to Con-  
stantinople, Roumania's entrance  
into the war on the side of the

As it is expected that it will take at least another twelve months in which to bring all the men back from the front, the Dominion Government has decided after the 31st of March next to supply any deficit which may be required to carry on the work of the Canadian Patriotic Fund after that date. It is therefore earnestly hoped that all who have so generously supported the fund in the past will continue to do so until the 31st of March, after which no appeals will be made to the public for voluntary support.

It may be interesting to know that since the inception of the Fund in Prince Rupert on the 22nd September, 1914, the sum of over \$30,500 has been paid to soldiers' dependents in Prince Rupert and district, and that the whole of this sum has been contributed locally.

Although the war is over there yet remains much to be done and the local committee feels confident that the splendid support so generously accorded during the past four and a half years of

the war will be maintained and that the monthly subscriptions will be continued until the 31st of March, 1919.

According to Mr. Shaw this arrangement is an illustration of the unification of Canadian and United States interests and of the much closer financial relations to be expected in the future.

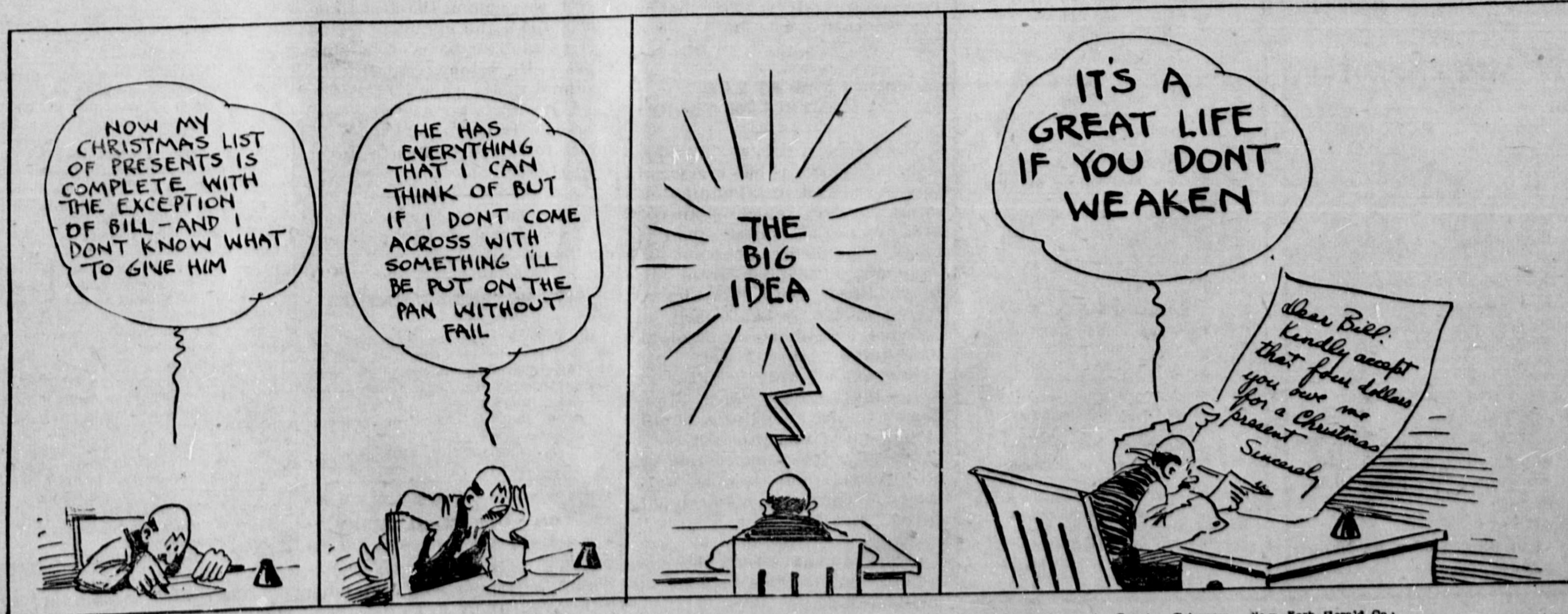

## WILL GIVE SITE TO THE G. W. V. A. FOR PURPOSE OF BUILDING MEMORIAL

Last evening at a special general meeting of the City Council, the final consideration of the proposed bylaw for the granting of a memorial site to the G. W. V. A. was given. In committee, the details of the bylaw were discussed, and it was considered that it would be better that no strings be attached to the gift from the municipality. This bylaw will, therefore be put before the electorate on January 16.

A bylaw was also introduced for the purpose of granting the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Company partial exemption from taxation over the period of ten years. It is proposed to grant to the new company exemption from general taxes, school and health rates, but no exemption will be granted for any local improvement taxes or money bylaws. There was considerable discussion on the various clauses of the bylaw, when the committee reported progress.

The Council will sit again this afternoon to continue looking into this bylaw. Mr. A. M. Manson, M.P.P., representing the company, was in attendance.

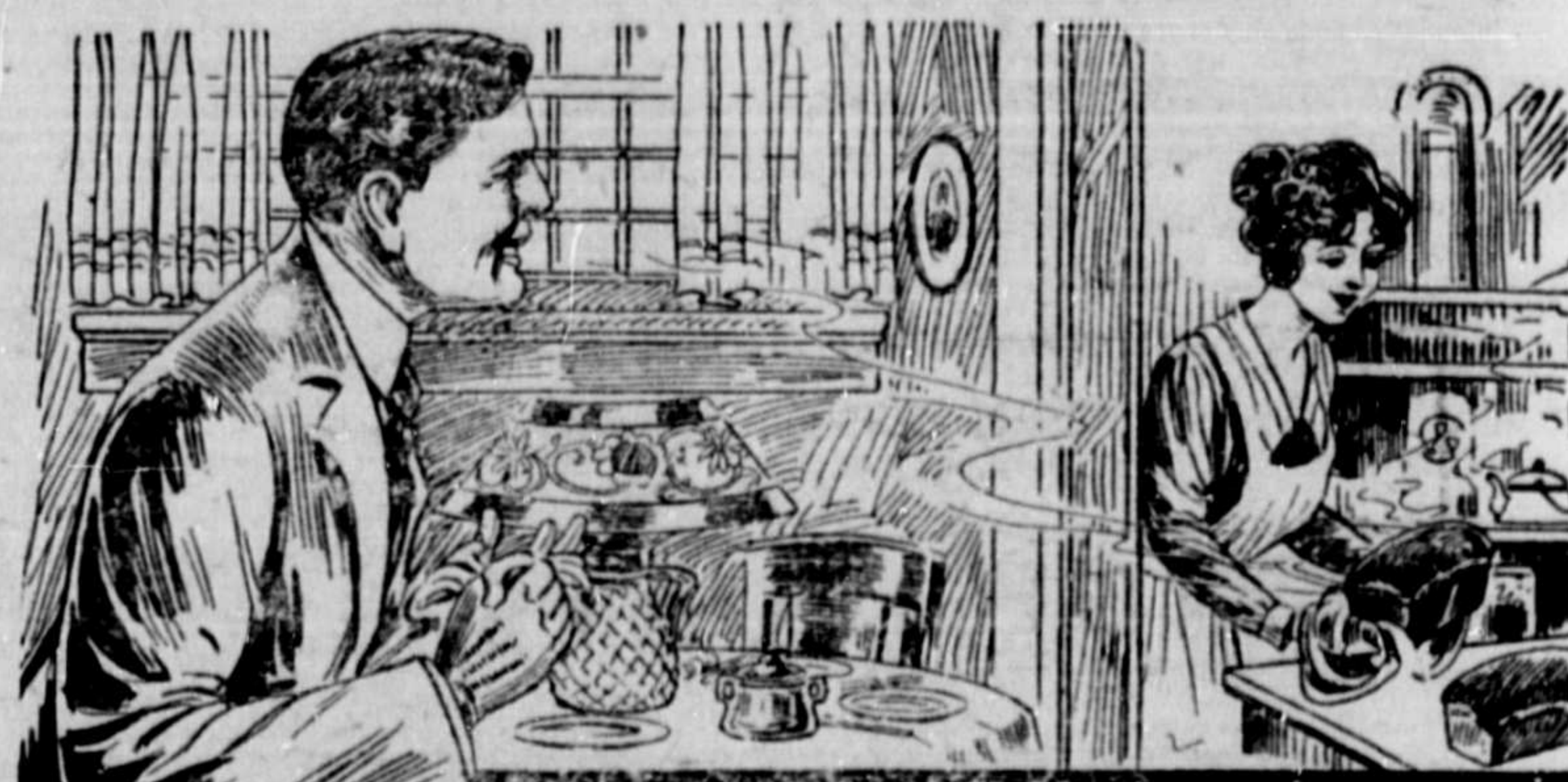
