LIQUOR PROBE HELD UP BY THE COURTS

Right to Investigate Liquor Charges Being Discussed Before Chief Justice Hunter

Judge of opinion that there is no right to investigate workings of the Dominion Order in Council; Argued that witness can not be compelled to incriminate himself; If Commission fails, court proceedings will be started.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, January 7.—Progress was made yesterday before Chief Justice Hunter in discussing the legal status of the commission which set out to investigate the illicit traffic in liquor in British Columbia, and the argument continued today. The legality of the commission was questioned by Charles Wilson, K. C., for A. L. Gartshore, who was subpoenaed to give evidence. Mr. Wilson argued that a writ of prohibition to stop the inquiry should be issued because it was an inquiry into acts which were criminal offences and violated, he said, the principle of national justice, in that no suspected person was to be haled before the tribunal and there questioned by being placed on trial. The commission was illegal on its face, he declared, because the importation of liquor was a matter of Federal jurisdiction. While the commission had been appointed by the Provincial Government "I am disposed to agree," commented Chief Justice Hunter, "that the province may investigate the workings of any of its own laws, but I am not prepared to assent to the proposition that the government has the right to investigate the working of a Dominion Order-in-Council."

A technical objection was urged by Mr. Wilson, former attorney-general and counsel for his own son-in-law, A. L. Gartshore, who was manager for the Maple Leaf Liquor Co., one of the numerous Tulk concerns operated before prohibition came into force. Yesterday he was charged with selling three gallons of rye whiskey on November 10 last. The case was remanded for a week and will probably go over until the question of the higher court is disposed of.

Gartshore is now out on \$5,000 bail. It is intimated by counsel in connection with the inquiry before Judge Clement that if the Chief Justice puts that investigation out of business, a shoal of charges will be laid in the city police court, and considerable information now on hand at the inquiry will simply be transferred to the police court prosecutor.

It is understood that in connection with some of the prosecutions now pending, the authorities have obtained possession of price lists boldly printed, though for private distribution, showing what cased and barrel goods can be bought for in a dry province. G. & W. rye ran about \$60 a case, according to this list, Scotch was a little higher and other liquors accordingly.

SECRET TREATY WITH FRANCE REGARDING MESOPOTAMIA

Paris, Jan. 7.—Supervision of the affairs of Mesopotamia after the conclusion of peace was assigned to Great Britain by a treaty concluded between France and England, concerning the future of Asia Minor early in the war. The existence of this treaty only recently has become known publicly, and no previous mention been made of the important country of Mesopotamia. It was settled that the largest possible autonomy would be assured to races and peoples in these countries, and an economical administration and equality of rights was also agreed to. What disposition the peace conference will make of this and other secret treaties is a much discussed question in Paris.

OBSTRUCTED THE POLICE OFFICER

Two Fishermen and Constable Gave a Midnight Exhibition of Catch-as-catch-can.

Two fishermen looking rather the worse for wear, appeared before Magistrate Carss this morning in the Police Court. One, named J. Petesson, was fined \$10 for being drunk, and the other, Ingvald Iverson, was fined \$20 for assault, and also has to pay the costs of certain damage done to the constable's coat, which was torn in the scuffle.

Just about midnight, last evening, Constable McGlinchy, when going his rounds, met the two men, one of whom showed distinct signs of having too much aboard. The constable told them he was going to search them for liquor, and proceeded to do so. The result was a pretty scrap which lasted about half an hour. Both of the men tackled the constable, but after a while, one of them broke away, and the other was taken to the police office. Constable McGlinchy, after safely housing his first man, went down to the wharf and secured the other on board his boat. The constable got his coat torn, his finger bitten, and his shins kicked.

CITY COUNCIL TAKES A FLIER INTO BUSINESS

Passes Report on How to Sell and Buy Coal and Decides to Enforce Bylaw.

WILL ASK LEGISLATURE FOR INCREASED POWERS

At the meeting of the City Council last night certain recommendations were made to the coal dealers of the city as to how they should run their business, the consumers were advised as to how they should buy, and the Council decided to apply to the Provincial Government to grant them the right to operate a coal yard in case they should desire to do so. It was further decided that the present bylaw making it compulsory for dealers to carry scales or to have the load weighed at the city scales, be lived up to.

The report of a special committee embodying the recommendations was adopted with the exception of a clause recommending that the City provide lumber with which the citizens might build coal bunkers at their homes. That clause was deleted. The report of the committee is as follows:

The Report.
"We, your committee appointed to investigate and report on the fuel situation, after taking into consideration statements received from local fuel dealers, also information contained in the letters of Mayor Gale of Vancouver and Mr. Nichol Thompson, Provincial Fuel Controller, beg leave to report as follows:

"We believe that the fuel situation can be greatly improved by the development of coal yards on the following basis:

1. The establishment of closed coal bunkers operating on a gravity system, which would eliminate a large amount of labor now embodied in distribution.
2. That coal be offered for sale in four grades, namely lump, nut, mine run, and screenings.
3. That coal be purchased in bulk as far as possible, as the present method of delivering in sacks points to anything but economy, as it costs about fifty cents per ton to sack the coal, and again storing it in the consumer's coal bin. The consumer is charged with the service of a man and team, whereas the team performs no useful function whatever. We therefore recommend that the consumers be prevailed upon to erect coal bins, the city furnishing old lumber for the same, adjacent to drive ways where coal can be delivered in bulk and removed either by the resident, consumer, or by persons who would make a business of that class of work.

Fuel Commissioner.
4. We would further recommend that the incoming Council appoint a Board of Fuel Commissioners to act in conjunction with the Provincial Fuel Controller and would further recommend that the present Council apply to the Provincial Government for an amendment to the Municipal Clauses Act enabling municipalities to operate coal yards if they so desire, and the bylaw now in force be lived up to.

CIVIL WAR BREAKS OUT IN BERLIN AND FIGHTING GOES ON IN CITY STREETS

BANKS ARE BARRICADED AND THOUSANDS ARE FIGHTING; RATTLE OF MACHINE GUNS HEARD EVERYWHERE; INDEPENDENT SOCIALISTS JOIN SPARTACUSIANS FOR REVOLUTION

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, January 7.—Civil war has broken out in Berlin between Spartacus and Government forces, according to despatches received here today. All banks are barricaded and a great number of public buildings are in the hands of Spartacan or extreme radical groups. Thousands of workers are fighting in the streets. The rattle of machine guns can be heard throughout the city. Spartacusians have barricaded themselves in many of the public buildings and are reported to hold all banks.

Copenhagen, January 7.—Independent Socialists have joined the Spartacusians in the civil war now raging in Berlin. The independent Socialists and Spartacusians are reported to have issued the following joint proclamation: "Today the final fight for the revolution will be fought."

were out of date in their methods.

Alderman McRae thought that relief should be sought through the appointment of Fuel Commissioners.

The Mayor told of visiting Vancouver and Victoria and finding the same method of handling in vogue there that was used here. The report was then considered clause by clause and with the exception of the one item was adopted.

MUNITIONS BOARD IS TRYING TO SAVE LOGS FROM TEREDO

Looking for Place to Store 30,000,000 Feet in Fresh Water; 100,000,000 Feet in All.

The Munitions Board has been looking for a place to store 30,000,000 feet of logs in this neighborhood in fresh water. These logs are already in the water and at this time of year the teredos are particularly active and very soon spoil the timber. For that reason quick action is necessary. Most of these logs are at the Queen Charlotte Islands, but there are also some here and at other points.

Since the British Government is to take a quantity of lumber for reconstruction work in Europe it is expected that an early start will be made in cutting the logs, but as there are something like 100,000,000 feet either in the water or in the woods in this neighborhood including the islands, there will have to be more orders than are at present in sight if the logs are to be all saved. Right here there are five large Davis rafts in the water.

London, Jan. 7.—The German Government has instructed its Armistice Commission at Spa to request the Allies to release all interned Germans.

PROTEST AGAINST INTERVENTION IN RUSSIAN AFFAIRS

Federated Labor Party Passes Resolution on Subject; Salmon Fishermen Join Deep Sea Union.

At a meeting of the Federated Labor Party in Carpenter's Hall, Sunday evening, George Casey presiding, a resolution was passed protesting against Allied intervention in Russia and stating that they still upheld the Allied war slogan, "That all nations great or small be allowed to work out their own destiny." The resolution was carried unanimously and a copy is being sent forward to Sir Robert Borden.

F. Shaw reported on a trip to Vancouver and Victoria and W. E. Thompson suggested regular meetings and offered to give an address on "Nationalization of Railways and Basic Industries," which offer was accepted. The matter of a library and the formation of a brass band was discussed.

J. H. Meagher announced that the Salmon Fishermen had decided to go over as a body to the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union.

AMERICAN CASUALTIES.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)
 Washington, Jan. 7. — An official report received from the American military attachee with Ambassador Francis in Russia, announced by General March shows total deaths from all causes in the American forces in the Archangel region up to November 25, to be eight-five. Of these nine were killed in action, seven died of wounds, three were drowned, two died as the result of accidents, and sixty-four from disease.

GRAZING LAW WILL BE PASSED THIS COMING SESSION

Provincial Government and Stock Men Confer and Frame Regulations—Local Associations to be Formed.

Vancouver, Jan. 7.—The Government will bring down new grazing legislation at the session opening this month. This has been determined after a conference with stock men at a meeting at Kamloops last week and obtaining the experience of Manitoba and Alberta in this connection. The province will be divided into grazing districts under the control of the Minister of Lands.

Stockmen in each district are to form an association and appoint a committee to co-operate with the department in framing regulations for that particular district.

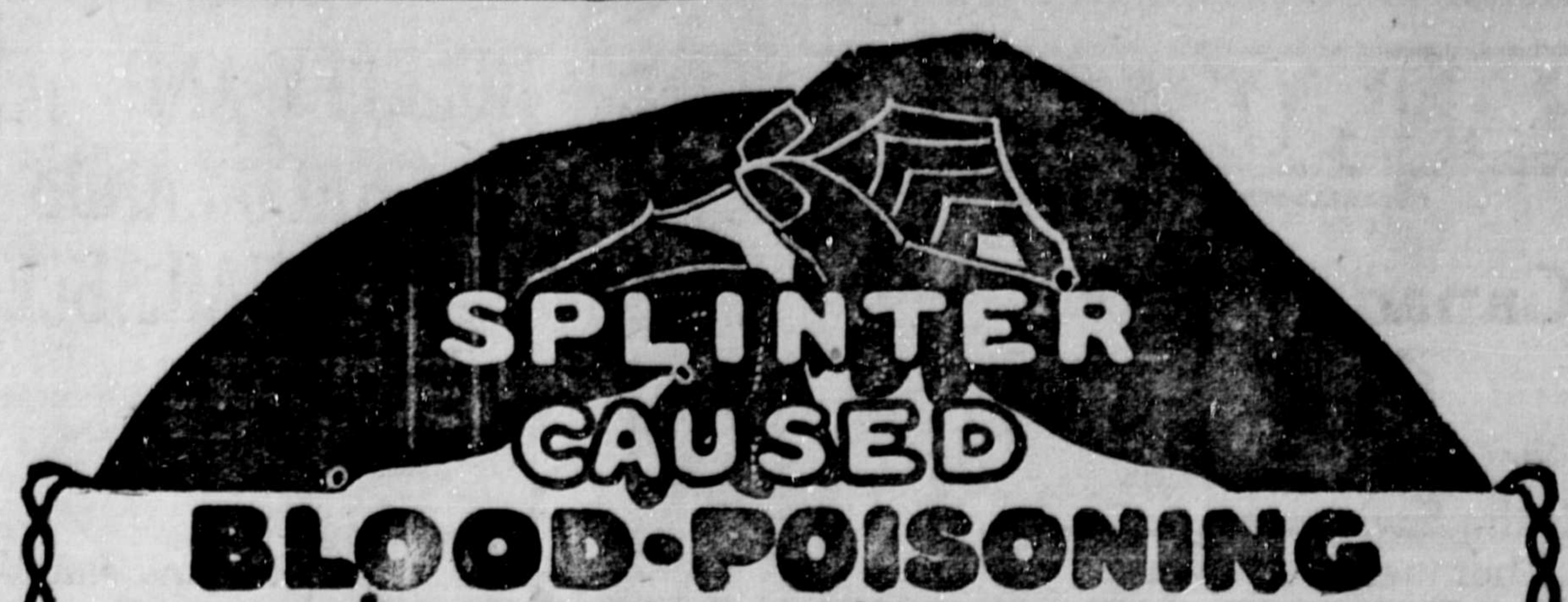
The regulations will have enforcement by orders-in-council dealing with such matters as allotment of range lands, prevention of trespass, fencing, salting, supplying water, trail cutting etc. Permits will be issued for a specified number of stock.

The present system of boards of district overseers is to be abolished.

BOLSHEVISM BRINGS ANARCHY TO GERMANY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Jan. 7.—The past week has witnessed a strong and general demand from the most influential British newspapers, regardless of politics, for a prompt meeting of the Peace Conference and prompt action to stem the tide of chaos which is threatening Germany because of the introduction of Bolshevism by way of the border states. There is a dawning recognition that if anarchy seizes central Europe the designs of the Peace Conference in drawing the boundary and levying indemnities can be enforced only through military control and by merely scraps of paper.

NINETEEN MONTHS AT THE BATTLEFRONT

Pte. McCreery, of Prince George, Fought With 102nd and Went Over the Top Nineteen Times.

Among the visitors to the city during the last day or two was Pte. J. L. McCreery, of Prince George, a returned soldier who is well known along the G. T. P. line.

Pte. McCreery left with the 102nd Battalion in June, 1915, trained at Comox and fought under Col. Warden for nineteen months, going over the top no less than nine times and not getting a scratch. He had a short experience with the Imperials before returning, having been transferred to the Royal Warwicks.

McCreery served for some time under Transportation Sergeant Tom Maitland of this city. He also reports that the McDougall brothers were safe when he left. WIL ASKS FOR \$100,000,000 TO FEED EUROPEANS

Washington, Jan. 7. — President Wilson has asked Congress through the State Department to appropriate one hundred million dollars for relief of famine sufferers in Europe. It is understood that the money is wanted chiefly to send food into a section of Western Russia, Poland and Austria-Hungary.

SIBERIAN FORCES CHASE BOLSHEVIKI

Omsk, Jan. 7.—After capturing Perm, Siberian forces under Gen. Geida have pursued retreating Bolsheviki troops towards Glazov. BULKLEY AND NECHACO LANDS ARE AVAILABLE

First Areas in Land Settlement Districts to Be Allocated After End of Month.

EIGHTY-FOUR FARMS AT VERY LOW PRICES

The first of the areas available under the Land Settlement policy of the Provincial Government will be allocated on February 10 next at Victoria. The areas are in the Bulkley and Nechaco valleys and consist of a good deal of rich land suitable for cultivation or grazing purposes.

The prices set by the Land Settlement Board range from \$3.50 to \$6.50 per acre with a few tracts running as high as \$11, one at \$13 and a quarter section at \$15.40. In some of these cases the title is as yet incomplete owing to various causes, but it is not anticipated that there will be any difficulty in securing the proper title to the lands, the legal process having advanced sufficiently far to allow of the lands being included in the available areas.

There are 84 areas in all, most of which are quarter sections or approximately 160 acres. There are a few smaller areas and one or two larger.

Applications in order to be considered must reach Victoria not later than the last day of January or bear a postmark of that date.

Returned soldiers will get first consideration in the allotment of the lands and in order that their claims may have precedence, a committee of four returned men will form a committee along with three members of the Land Settlement Board to consider the claims and apportion the lands. The returned men will be chosen one each from the Great War, Veterans, the Army and Navy Veterans, the Comrades of the Great War and the Provincial Returned Soldiers' Commission.

Returned soldiers receiving allotment will have the privilege of exchanging for other available lands up to April 1 in case they are dissatisfied, as there is now snow on the ground.

Owing to the low prices at which these lands are held it is expected that there will be a good demand for them. Other areas will be offered later, just as soon as the titles to them can be secured under the Land Settlement law.

WHEREAS the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Company Limited, a company incorporated in the Province of British Columbia, proposes to operate a shipbuilding plant and other industrial enterprises in the City of Prince Rupert, and the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Company Limited, its successors and assigns, is desirous of securing a lease of the following described lands and real property and improvements, situated in the City of Prince Rupert:—

NOW THEREFORE, the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert enacts as follows:—
1. During the period of ten years from the first day of January, A. D. 1919, the said Company, its successors and assigns shall be exempt from payment to the City of Prince Rupert all General Taxes, Health Taxes and School Taxes, but shall be liable to pay taxes levied under general debenture and local improvement bylaws, and assessors and assigns shall to begin operating the shipbuilding plant, upon the premises hereinafter mentioned within the space of one year from the first day of January, A. D. 1919, or if the said Company, its successors and assigns at any time during the continuance of the ten (10) years mentioned in this by-law, fail to be effective of one year to operate the said shipbuilding plant or to operate some other large industrial enterprise upon the said premises, then this by-law shall cease to be effective.

3. Nothing herein contained shall in any way affect the agreement made between the City of Prince Rupert and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company Limited and the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Corporation Limited, both of which companies are incorporated in the Province of British Columbia and which agreement is set forth in Chapter thirty (30) in the year 1912 of the Statutes of British Columbia, the intention being that this by-law is only to be binding between the City of Prince Rupert and the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Company Limited, its successors and assigns.

4. This by-law shall come into force on the day of registration thereof, but before the same shall be submitted to the Council of the City of Prince Rupert.

A BY-LAW TO AUTHORIZE THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT TO GRANT TO THE GREAT WAR VETERANS ASSOCIATION OF CANADA (PRINCE RUPERT BRANCH) A SITE FOR A MEMORIAL BUILDING IN THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT.

THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:—
1. It shall be lawful for the City of Prince Rupert to grant a free site to the Great War Veterans Association of Canada (Prince Rupert Branch) to be used by them for the purpose of erecting and using thereon a memorial building to be used for the benefit of the members of the said Association and their successors and for such other purposes as is from time to time determined.

2. The said site shall be granted to the said Association by deed to the Association or to trustees for the said Association to be nominated by them.

3. The deed shall be signed by the Mayor and the City Clerk and shall be an ordinary quit claim deed without covenants.

4. SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT
Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.
Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.
Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties to more than one may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.
Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.
Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than six years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.
Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$30 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same within the time specified, title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.
Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, providing statutory improvements on said residence maintained on Crown granted land.
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; titles to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.
For granting land for industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the death of the pre-emptor. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.
Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase land, of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made to the allottee. Any agreement upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the period of the present war. This provision made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to Crown lands and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

WE SELL COAL

HIGHER WAGES MEAN INCREASED PRODUCTION

"I never have increased wages without thereby increasing my own profits; and I have not yet reached the point, if there is one, at which this rule stops working."

These words were spoken recently by Mr. Henry Ford, the American multi-millionaire motor manufacturer and the biggest single employer of labor in the world.

They deserve to be pondered over by those old-fashioned employers whose one aim an object is to "cut down expenses," an adage still clinging to the belief that low wages and efficiency can be made to go together, says a recent writer, in a British periodical.

Mr. Ford practises what he preaches. Many years ago he decreed that no man in his employ was to be paid less than five dollars a day. This was the minimum, and applied to unskilled laborers only. Higher rates, naturally were paid to skilled men.

The result was that he secured the pick of the American labor market an established a record for working efficiency that was far in advance of anything known up to then. In the period immediately preceding the war the output per man per year in the Ford factories was, roughly, \$805. A sound British concern, well managed, as we understand the term, has usually an annual output per man employed varying from £250 to £450. Such figures as these speak for themselves. Signs are not wanting, however that we are waking up in this respect.

Lord Leverhulme, for example, has publicly stated his belief that high wages and short hours make for efficiency and he advocates a six-hour day. Another large employer of labor said recently that no skilled male adult worker should be in receipt—during normal times—of less than £3 a week.

How to roseate these views would appear to the old-time social reformers, whose ideal for the working classes was embodied in the famous quatrain:

Eight hours' work,
Eight hours' play,
Eight hours' sleep
And eight bob a day.

To-day the principle is being adopted by many progressive businesses and is acquiesced in almost everywhere by labor.

But output has got to be increased. This does not mean longer hours; for longer hours do not necessarily lead to increased output. But it does mean a fair day's work for a fair day's wages.

THE CANADIAN PATRIOTIC FUND

As it is expected that it will take at least another twelve months in which to bring all the men back from the front, the Dominion Government has decided after the 31st of March next to supply any deficit which may be required to carry on the work of the Canadian Patriotic Fund after that date. It is therefore earnestly hoped that all who have so gen-

erously supported the fund in the past will continue to do so until the 31st of March, after which no appeals will be made to the public for voluntary support.

It may be interesting to know that since the inception of the Fund in Prince Rupert on the 22nd September, 1914, the sum of over \$30,500 has been paid to soldiers' dependents in Prince Rupert and district, and that the whole of this sum has been contributed locally.

Although the war is over there yet remains much to be done and the local committee feels confident that the splendid support so generously accorded during the past four and a half years of the war will be maintained and that the monthly subscriptions will be continued until the 31st of March, 1919.
