CHIEF JUSTICE RESERVES DECISION ON QUESTION OF LIQUOR PROBE LEGALITY

WILL DECIDE WHETHER ROYAL COMMISSION CAN INVESTIGATE REGARDING CRIMINAL ACTS—COUNSEL GIVE OPPOSING OPINIONS TO AID JUDGE IN DECISION

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, January 8.—“As this is a matter of public interest I think I will reserve judgment,” thus dealt Chief Justice Hunter with the question of the legality of the government inquiry into the illicit trafficking in liquor, after hearing lengthy argument from counsel.

W. Craig, government counsel, in closing submitted that when the province had the enforcement of law violations of the Dominion they become matters of provincial concern on the score of good government. The public inquiries Act is without the power of the Legislature. The legislation which is attacked is in the interests of good administration of justice. The proceedings are not criminal proceedings for no one is charged or can be charged and the inquiry is directed toward the resurda Wire & Cable Co., Montreal.

Charles W. ... dispute the right of the province to enact a prohibition law, but when penalties for its violation were invoked he contended the proceedings became part of the criminal proceedings of Canada. “I maintain, he said, that you have no right to conduct a police inquiry under the guise of a royal commission.”

CANADIANS ARE WITH IRISH IN THEIR DEMANDS

Three Prominent Liberals Express Sympathy With Cause of Self Government Across the Seas.

Montreal, Jan. 8.—Letters from Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. Roudolphe Lemieux and Hon. Charles Murphy expressing sympathy with the claims of Ireland for self-government and encouragement for a meeting of local Irishmen, to be held here for the discussion of the subject, have been received by the organizer, Sir Wilfrid states his sympathies have always been with the Irish people in their claims for liberty to govern themselves, which Canadians enjoy. Lemieux expresses similar sentiments.

UKRANIANS OPPOSED TO BOLSHEVIKI

Constitutional Convention at Kiev This Month to Declare Republic.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, January 8.—Of all the friendly republics that have sprung up on the territories of the former Russian Empire those of Poland and Ukraine are perhaps the most promising, and the Allies will doubtless spare no efforts to help them fight the Bolsheviki in their territories.

Early in December the forces of the National Ukrainian Union, comprising all the popular political parties, overthrew the Russian reactionaries, who had continued in power in Kiev under the German occupation, capturing a garrison of 8,000 Germans and established a Liberal, independent Government, pro-Allies in sentiment and ready to oppose Bolshevism with an irregular army of some 500,000 patriots.

This Government has offered to assume the obligation of one-third of Russia's old foreign department which the Bolsheviki refused to recognize. It has intimated in every way its earnest desire to win the respect and sympathy of the Allies. A constitutional convention will be held in Kiev this month which will formally declare the Ukrainian National Republic and select peace delegates.

LUMBER COMMISSIONER GETS IMPORTANT JOB

Winnipeg, Jan. 8.—L. S. Beale now in England as special lumber commissioner for British Columbia has been appointed British Trade Commissioner with headquarters at Winnipeg. He will have jurisdiction from here to the coast. He returns next month.

Mr. Beale was appointed recently by the Provincial Government and was largely instrumental in securing for Canada the order for a billion feet, announcement of which was made a few days ago. His appointment will be popular except for the fact that he will be lost to this province as a special representative.

KILLED BY TAXI

WHICH IS THE SPOKESMAN FOR RUSSIA!

LEAGUE OF NATIONS TO BE FORMED OF FIVE LEADING POWERS OF WORLD

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, January 8.—As far as it has been developed the general scheme for a league of nations agrees with the previous forecasts. It is learned that the United States, Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan will form the nucleus and will declare that the league will preserve the peace of the world and justice for all. An arbitration board will be created and it will be backed by the combined forces of all. All other nations will be taken in when they have demonstrated that they are capable of self government.

ROUMANIANS ARE STARVING

Hoover Says \$350,000,000 Worth of Foodstuffs Required in Southern Europe Until Harvest.

COMMISSION ON RELIEF INVESTIGATE CONDITIONS

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, Jan. 8.—At least 1,400,000 tons of foodstuffs, costing approximately \$350,000,000 delivered, is needed to carry through until next harvest the population of the districts thus far investigated by the American staff of the commission on European relief. This estimate is sent by Herbert Hoover to the Food Administration in a cablegram reviewing the conditions as found in Central Europe and the Balkan States. The Roumanians are said to be actually starving and in great distress otherwise.

Ottawa, Jan. 8.—Reports that the Dominion Government has decided to advance \$25,000,000 credit for Roumanian purchases in Canada are authoritatively stated to be without foundation. The question of establishing such a credit was discussed in London. It is understood a definite conclusion has not yet been reached.

NO DISPLAY AT ROOSEVELT INTERMENT

Many Important Persons Present and Four Telegraph Operators Took Condolences

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Oyster Bay, Jan. 8.—The funeral of ex-President Roosevelt took place here this afternoon. The remains were interred in Young's Memorial Cemetery at Oyster Bay Cove, a spot selected by Mr. Roosevelt himself. There was no display, the Anglican Church burial rite being followed and everything being as simple as possible. Employees of the family were pall bearers. There was a congressional delegation present and many prominent persons from a distance. The family received condolences from all parts of the world, four telegraph operators being engaged in receiving them.

TO VISIT STATES.

LABOR MEN FORMULATE A CIVIC PLATFORM FOR THE CANDIDATES TO ENDORSE

FIVE PLANKS DISCUSSED AT LENGTH AT OPEN MEETING OF TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL LAST NIGHT AND FINALLY ADOPTED WITH-OUT AMENDMENT

LABOR'S MUNICIPAL PROGRAM.

1. Resurfacing of graded streets and grading to be done where economically possible.
2. The retaining of Cow Bay for the fishing industry and municipal ownership, also securing of waterfrontage in that district for the erection of wharves and other essential facilities for promoting the fishing industry.
3. Strict enforcement of all municipal laws regulating cabarets theatres and other places of amusement and licensing the dispensers of drink, male and female.
4. To have a thorough investigation into the conducting of municipally owned utilities with a view to ascertaining the cause for increased rates and insufficient street lighting.
5. The taking over of the Prince Rupert Hospital and the operating of same as a municipal institution.

At a well attended open meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last night in Carpenters' Hall, with W. E. Thompson presiding, a platform, presented by S. D. Macdonald on behalf of the Legislative Committee was adopted after a long discussion. This platform is the one to which Labor candidates are expected to subscribe and curiously enough several of its provisions were hotly contested by Alderman Casey, who is one of the candidates interested.

The discussion was temperate and the points well thought out and often clever, but some of the speakers naturally drifted away from the subject. There was, however, a spirit of easy toleration which allowed a great deal of latitude.

City Streets.
As a member of the present Council and Chairman of the Board of Works, Alderman Casey naturally took a good deal of part in the discussions. He explained some of the difficulties in regard to road construction and upkeep and said that he did not wish to shirk responsibility for the present condition.

One delegate told of the bad condition of Eighth Ave. where he had been almost upset from a car owing to a big hole in the road. He thought if Casey was one of the committee he should fill the holes up.

The alderman explained that it was not his fault but he did not wish to shirk responsibility.

Cow Bay Again.
In discussing the Cow Bay question Alderman Casey asked if the clause meant the holding of the bay as at present. He understood that the bay meant a good deal to the fishermen but he could not think its value so great as to make it necessary to interfere with the yard policy of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. The Company was able to look after itself but it was impossible to get away from the fact that the progress of the city depended on the railway company. It was not good business to jump out and interfere with its development. He said he thought Mr. Montgomery was the only one who persistently stood out for holding Cow Bay. He favored rather letting the company complete its yards and develop the trade and commerce of the place.

To Reach Sea.
The discussion then became general and there was a good deal of talk about corporate methods. Mr. Hanna thought there was no room outside for fishing boats where they could be safe and it was better to retain the inside. Walter Shaw spoke ironically of an imaginary condition under which all had to submit and thought it good to have a place to go out or come in like cattle. There was plenty of room for railway yards elsewhere, but there was no other place where the people could reach the sea.

Mr. Morse said the understanding was that they would not give up Cow Bay until they got something adequate in exchange. The

fishermen had been talking of making a centre at Port Edward. A discussion then ensued as to the views of fishermen, a number of delegates taking part, the clause of the report being finally adopted by a large majority vote.

Licensing Drink Dispensers.
In discussing the law enforcement and morality question the labor men showed themselves strongly favoring a clean town and improved conditions morally and socially, the question of how to bring this about being the chief question which caused difference of opinion. There was considerable opposition to the clause in the report in regard to licensing cabarets and the dispensers of drinks as doing so made the city a party to the evils which went with them. The report was finally adopted after an amendment had been voted down.

Other Matters.
The plank providing for a thorough investigation into the municipally owned utilities was carried without discussion and everyone seemed in favor of the city taking over the hospital until such time as a general policy of provincial or Dominion hospital control became effective. The platform was then adopted in its entirety and the meeting adjourned at 11:30.

**Canadian Lumber
 Going to Europe.**

The telegraph brought good news Monday when it ticked out the message telling of the decision of the British Timber Controller to purchase a billion feet of lumber in Canada, part of which will be supplied by British Columbia. Curiously enough the despatch was published on the same day as the delayed interview with Hon. T. D. Pattullo, who told of the efforts taken by his department to secure the orders.

When spread throughout Canada the billion feet will not give many millions to each district, but the order must be looked upon only as a starter. If it is filled satisfactorily there will doubtless be others to follow. In this neighborhood there are enough logs in the water and on the ground to fill one-tenth of the order, and it is hardly to be expected that as much as a tenth will be allotted here. No matter how many million feet are ordered it will be a decided improvement on the present condition. As the Imperial Munitions Board owns the logs in this district it is just possible that we may get preferred treatment.

**Great Man Died
 At Oyster Bay.**

The passing of Roosevelt is a world calamity. The ex-president was a great man. He was not always practical, he was not always sane, he was not always reasonable, but he was always courageous and honest and candid and when he spoke he was heard if not heeded. It was when he was least practical that we liked him the best. It was when he was mad that he towered above his fellows.

Roosevelt was one of the few vice-presidents who ever amounted to anything. Usually the sure road to shelve a politician was to make him vice-president of the United States. The people of the country seldom remember who the vice-president is. Fate, however, ordained that Roosevelt should not be smothered. McKinley was shot by an assassin and Roosevelt took up the presidential work and did it so well that at the next election he was returned. He was a man who brandished the big stick and was spectacular in his manner and method. There was, however, more than bluff and talk in his makeup. He was a manly type such as the ordinary Britisher loves. He was fond of the great outdoors, was keen on sport, as a soldier he was a great success and people always knew where to find him. His influence on the life of the Republic and on the world generally was far good.

**Ireland Still in
 The Limelight.**

Ireland is still in the limelight. She has been there for the past two generations and seems destined to continue for some time to occupy the stage. What will be the outcome no one seems in a position to say. It is certain that, if she will, she can have home rule, but whether Great Britain will grant her complete independence is another matter. It is largely a matter of sentiment. It would be economy for Britain to cast her off, for she has been a continuous bill of expense. She has not paid her share of taxation for many a year. That she should be allowed to work out her own salvation in her own way might be the best thing to do. Had she been granted home rule many years ago there would probably have been no trouble now.

MEN DEMAND IMPROVEMENTS IN ENGLAND

Unsatisfactory Demobilization Causes Much Dissatisfaction Among British Soldiers At Various Camps.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Jan. 7.—The alleged unsatisfactory manner in which demobilization is being carried out is creating ill feeling among troops in England. In addition to troubles at Folkestone, Dover and Osterly, men in other camps such as Shoreham, Shorland, Beckenham, Grove Park, and other places are making demands for the revision of the system of demobilization. Soldiers stationed at Osterly broke camp yesterday as a protest against their transfer from infantry to army service corps. They commandeered numerous transport lorries and drove to London, to White Hall, cheering all the way. They lined up outside the Ministry of Demobilization, while a deputation visited officials inside. A representative of the Ministry, at the request of the deputation, went to Osterly to investigate the grievances of the men, to whom a promise was given that those who had taken part in the demonstration would not be punished.

MANY PRISONERS ARE NOW RETURNING HOME

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Jan. 8.—The estimated number of British prisoners of war in Germany on December 29, according to information from Berlin was 24,990, of whom 5000 were in trains proceeding to Holland and 8000 were expected to reach Holland within the next few days. British prisoners to the number of 7000 were being repatriated by way of Baltic ports during the week beginning December 29. Since the date of the armistice 6,814 officers, 126,729 other ranks, and 4,483 civilians have been repatriated.

"JACK IN THE BEANSTALK" WONDERFUL PRODUCTION

The spectacular production of a film version of the old time fairy story "Jack in the Beanstalk" is to be shown tonight at the Westholme Theatre. This is a nine-reel film and on that account the show will start promptly at 6:45. In the production of this wonderful picture there were 1,300 children taking part, the average age of these youngsters being only five years. It was difficult to secure a suitable giant, but after much search J. M. Tarver was discovered, a man who stands 8 ft. 6 in. in his stocking feet and who is generally acknowledged to be the biggest man in the world, weighing 471 pounds.

GONE TO SIBERIA.

San Francisco, Jan. 7.—Three hundred French military aviators and mechanics sailed for Vladivostok yesterday on the transport Sherman. They carried with them airplanes, armored cars, rapid fire and other equipment. The second detachment of 200 officers and men leave here in February.



SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements in respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 2 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than six months, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted immediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will result in forfeiture. Claims cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of at least \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 2 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided that improvements and permanent residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

Land is for grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include persons holding and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase land in the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the price for the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments, intended to apply to the adjustment of the allotment, are made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to the conclusion of the Crown sold at public auction.

HOOD WILL BE LARGEST WAR VESSEL AFLOAT

Ship Now Nearing Completion is
894 Feet Long, Carries
Eight 15-inch Guns
and is Proof Against
Torpedoes and
Mines.

London, Jan. 8.—Although no official statement has been made, it is understood that the British warship Hood, now nearing completion, will be the largest fighting vessel in the world. She is 894 feet long and will carry eight 15-inch guns. The hull is fitted with an outer cushion against which torpedoes and mines will explode harmlessly. She is expected to attain a speed of at least 40 miles an hour. The Hood will cost three and three quarter million pounds sterling. It is stated that three other battle cruisers of the same type are being built.

PRINCE ALBERT IS A GOOD SOLDIER

Rome, Jan. 8.—Italy will demand forty million dollars of a war, indemnity from the Central Powers.

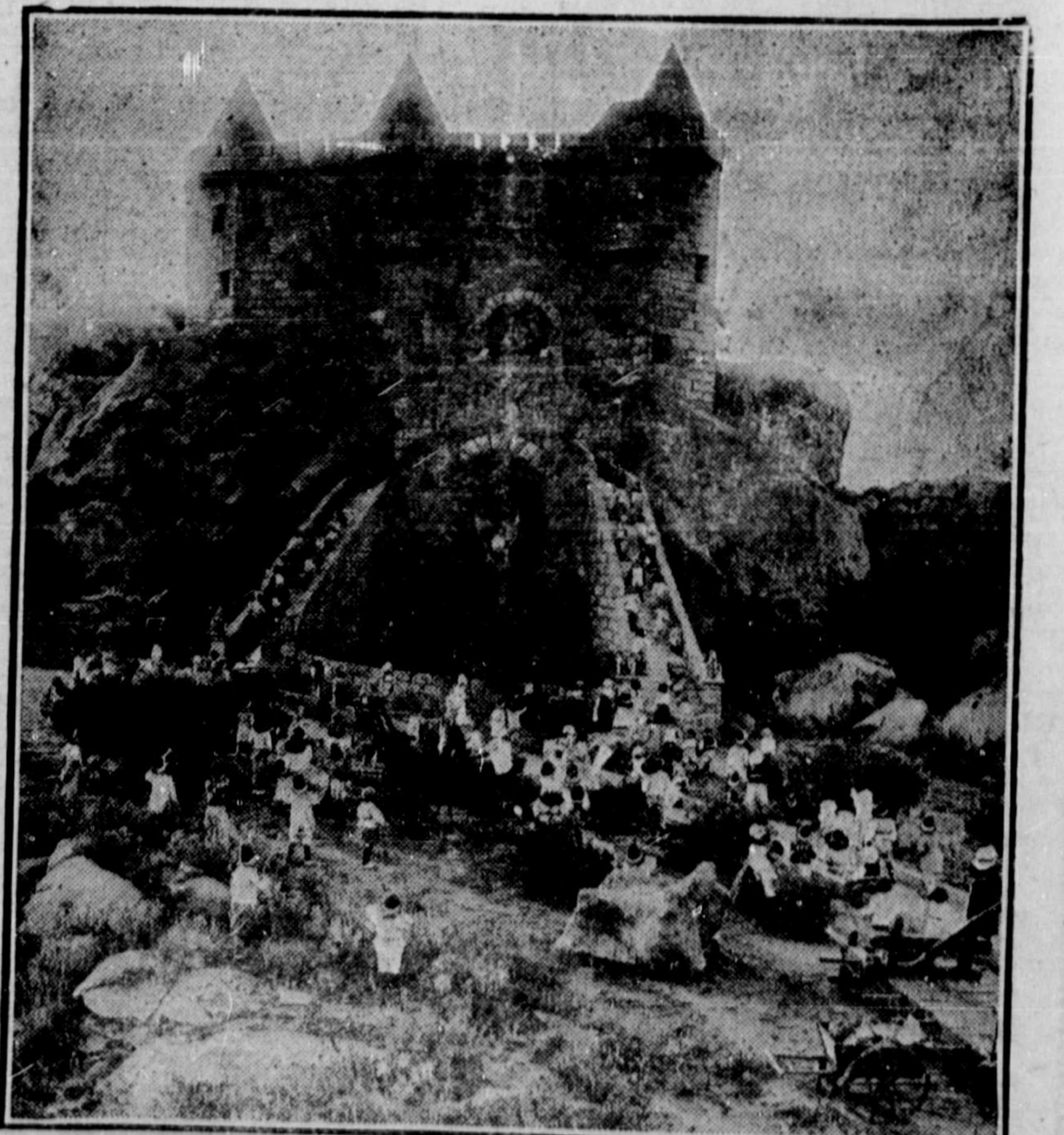
