LLOYD GEORGE CABINET SPRINGS SEVERAL SURPRISES ESPECIALLY IN CONSERVATIVE DOMINATION

Representatives of Land-Ownning Interests are Chief Figures in New Government among them being Balfour, Milner, Curzon and Bonar Law; Barnes and Geddes are without Portfolio with Special Duties.

London, January 11.—The new cabinet of Premier Lloyd George has been announced. It presents few surprises. The question British newspapers are asking is whether Lloyd George will rule his cabinet or whether his Conservative advisers will dominate him. The majority of members of the cabinet in high places are Conservatives, notably Andrew Bonar Law, Earl Curzon, Arthur J. Balfour and Viscount Milner. Only four years ago their party regarded Lloyd George as Conservatives today regard the Bolsheviks.

The Premier is pledged by his campaign speeches to a number of sweeping reforms, such as the giving of land and houses to workmen and discharged soldiers. His principal advisers are regarded as representatives of land owning interests, who, following tradition, would place barriers in the way of such a reform.

Ministers without portfolios, George Nicholl Barnes and Sir Eric Geddes, have important duties for which there are no cabinet places. Barnes will represent labor at the Paris Peace Conference, while Sir Eric has undertaken the management of demobilization.

One innovation is the selection for the first time of an Indian as a member of the Government, Sir S. H. Sinha, having the place of Under Secretary for India. Another is the appointment of Cecil Bishop Harmsworth, brother of Lord Northcliffe, to succeed Lord Robert Cecil as Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs.

The cabinet includes Lord Privy Seal and Leader in the House of Commons, Andrew Bonar Law, President of the Council and leader in the House of Lords, Earl Curzon; Ministers without Portfolios, George Nicholl Barnes and Sir Eric Geddes; Lord Chancellor, Sir Frederick Smith; Home Secretary, Edward Shortt; Under Secretary, Hamer Greenwood; Foreign Secretary, Arthur J. Balfour; Under Secretary, Cecil Bishop Harmsworth; Secretary for the Colonies, Viscount Milner; Secretary of War and of Air Ministry (which have been combined) Winston Spencer Churchill; Under Secretary, Viscount Peele; Secretary for India, Edwin S. Montague; Under Secretary, Sir D. H. Sinha; First Lord of the Admiralty, Walter Hume Long; Parliamentary Secretary, Thomas J. McNamara; President of Board of Trade, Sir Albert Stanley; Under Secretary, W. E. Bridgman; Department of Overseas Development, and Intelligence, Sir Arthur Steel Dayton, who also is appointed an additional Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs and an additional Parliamentary Secretary to the Board of Trade; Secretary of the Ministry of Munitions which is to become eventually the Ministry of Supplies, Andrew Weir; Food Controller, George H. Roberts; Minister of Shipping, Sir J. P. MacLay; Minister of Labor, Sir Robert Stevenson; Attorney General, Sir Gordon Hewart; Solicitor General, Sir Ernest Pollock; Postmaster General, Albert Bolden Illingworth; Paymaster General, Sir Joseph Compton Rickett; Chancellor of the Exchequer, Austen Chamberlain; Lord, Lieutenant of Ireland, General Viscount French; Chief Secretary for Ireland, Sir James Ian MacPherson; Secretary for Scotland, Robert Munro. Both Mr. Prothero and Andrew Weir were raised to the peerage on accepting their new office.

WANT LUXEMBOURG TO BE A REPUBLIC

Crowd Parade Before Palace Requesting Abdication of Grand Duchess—Quiet Maintained.

FINANCES OF CITY ARE IN VERY HEALTHY CONDITION; PERMANENT WORK PROPOSED

MAYOR'S REPORT ON CIVIC AFFAIRS SUMMARIZING THE ACTIVITIES OF YEAR MAKES INTERESTING READING—SUGGESTION THAT RECONSTRUCTION BE ON PERMANENT BASIS

The debt of the City of Prince Rupert has been reduced to a little over a million and a half dollars with all obligations clear, the finances are in a satisfactory condition, sinking funds complete and this in spite of the fact that the Dominion Government Custodian took over more than twenty thousand dollars' worth of property arrears and Provincial Government lands have not paid taxes. This is shown in the report to the City Council made by Mayor McClymont at the last meeting.

The report also proposes that more permanent work be done on the roads and shows that the amount spent in repairs would finance the interest and redemption payments on \$280,000 of debentures. It gives a good deal of valuable information in regard to civic affairs. It follows:
To the City of Prince Rupert,
Dear Sirs:—

I herewith beg to submit a retrospective report of the year's operations of the city; also a prospective view of what is ahead which I would earnestly recommend to your consideration.
The policy of the 1918 Council has been one of retrenchment, commensurate with efficiency and minimum of taxation, in an endeavor to conserve all our resources for the period of developments, which we all anticipate in the near future. While the city's financial position is in fine shape, having weathered the storm of war conditions without the aid of industries to any material effect, such as most centres have had, it has nevertheless been a year of continued anxiety, owing to these extraordinary conditions.

Taxation Difficulties.
The three great impediments to our collection of revenue has been: Government lots sold under agreement of sale in 1912, which in most cases have not paid taxes since war broke out, aggregating \$72,040.00 in arrears at December 31st. (The Government by their "Proportionate Allotment Act" anticipate clearing these taxes by May 31st, 1919); arrears on soldiers' property, who are on active service now amounting to \$17,000.00, and alien enemy property, which the Dominion Government Custodian has taken over, representing \$20,690.00 arrears at December 31st, making the total taxes tied up because of war conditions \$109,730.00, out of total arrears for both local improvements and general taxes of approximately \$213,049.00 at the close of the year, more than fifty per cent. (50%).

Expenditures Down.
The chief difficulty has, therefore, been to finance the city without penalizing those property holders who were paying promptly. The only way possible to do this was by keeping down all expenditures except those absolutely necessary, so that our reserve, (Continued on Page Three).

INQUIRY INTO SINKING OF THE SOPHIA

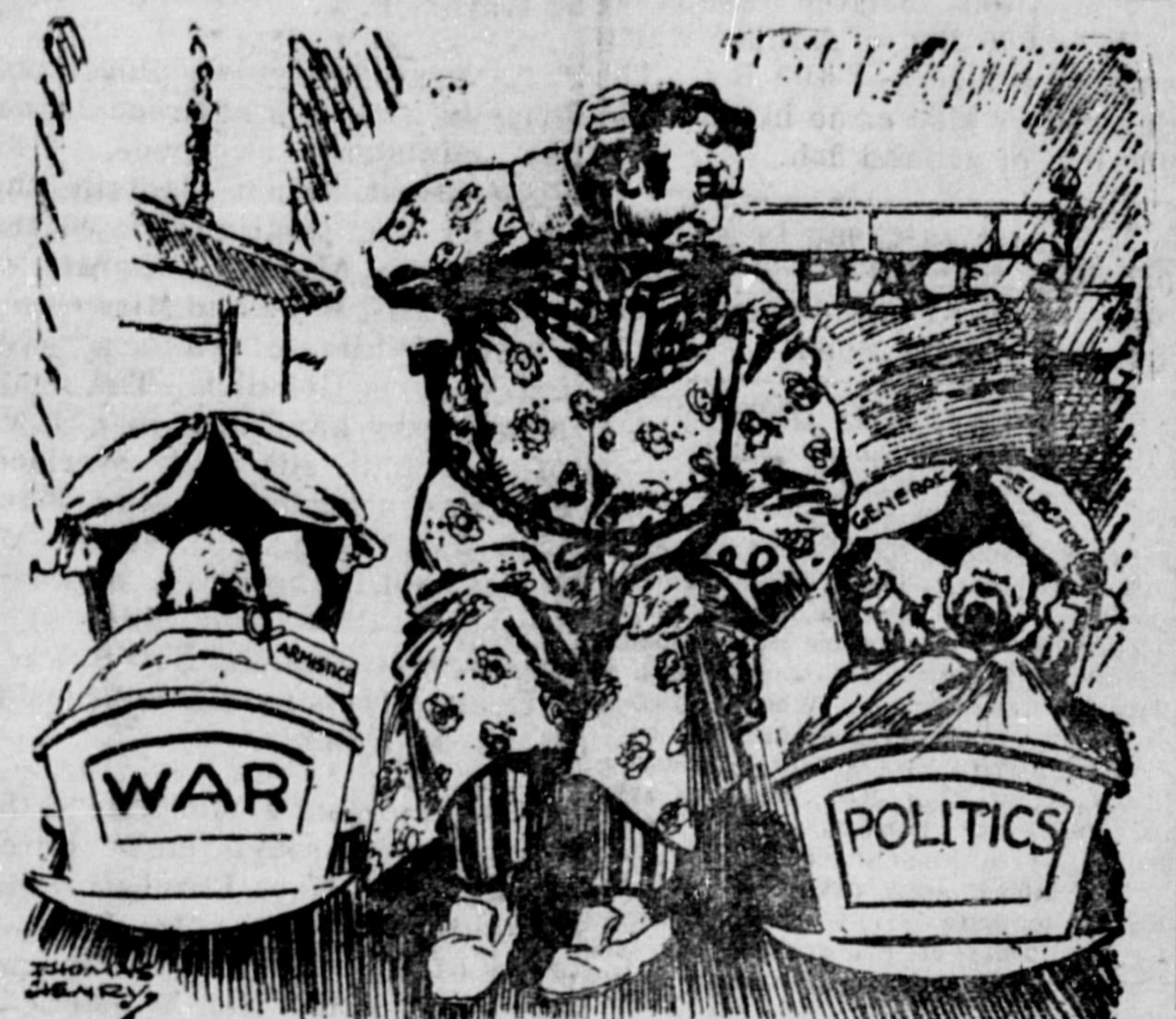
Captain Miller of the Fishing Boat King and Winge Gave Evidence in Victoria.

Victoria, Jan. 11.—To take the evidence of Captain Miller of the 140-ton fishing boat King and Winge which was in the vicinity when the S. S. Princess Sophia sank in Lynn Canal on October 25, the commission of inquiry into the disaster opened yesterday at noon. Miller's evidence contained nothing that has not already been published regarding his presence in the vicinity and his efforts to reach the Sophia and the assurance of the captain that nothing could be done in the bad weather prevailing.
Captain Miller arrived from the north on the "Princess Mary" a few days ago.

NO SPEEDING UP MEN RETURNING FROM OVERSEAS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, Jan. 11.—It is stated in militia circles here that the end of August next will see the return to Canada of the last units of the militia forces of Canada now serving overseas in Europe. For the present there will be no speeding up in the return of troops beyond the numbers already arranged for, 20,000 in January increasing to 30,000 in February, but in the spring and summer months the number returning will rise to 45,000 monthly.

FOUR PREMIERS MET IN PARIS FOR POUR PARLERS ON PEACE PROBLEMS; PREMIER BORDEN IS NOW IN PARIS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, January 11.—Representatives of the four great Allied powers have been in conference in Paris for the past two days, British interests being represented by Lord Robert Cecil and Arthur J. Balfour. President Wilson, as he was careful to state, acting as Prime Minister of the United States and not as head of the nation, took part directly in these conferences in which he met the Premiers of France and Italy.

To-day a party of British representatives left here for Paris which included the Prime Ministers of Great Britain, Canada, Australia and South Africa. On Monday conferences on a large scale will begin. Belgium, Greece, Serbia, Portugal, Roumania, China and Brazil will probably be given three representatives each, but these will sit only when they are called in by the Great Power delegation regarding a league of nations. Hereafter countries requiring supervision and control will come within the sphere of some designated great power. But the latter will act as mandatory of the League of Nations and will thus not be vested with plenary jurisdiction. By a wise application of this principle many of the difficulties which might arise over territorial jealousies will be removed. One consequence of the adoption of this policy will be that the United States will have to abandon its traditional policy of isolation and assume its share of "the white man's burden."

City May Soon Be Able to Borrow.

With the steadily improving financial conditions it should soon be possible to borrow money for civic work at a reasonable rate of interest. That would enable the permanent work to be done which is mentioned in the mayor's report to the City Council which is published in this paper today.

The report shows that the city is in a healthy state financially and that she will improve as soon as some of the taxes are paid which today are held back from causes brought about by the war. Improvements of a permanent character are needed and the Mayor, in the report which he brought down on Monday, recommends that this be done so far as possible. If money is to be secured, however, it is necessary that the city go very carefully in order that she may get money at the best rate of interest.

In Victoria the City Council has adopted the policy of offering small blocks of bonds over the counter and she has been enabled to carry out badly needed work by financing in that way. Residents of the city took up the bonds in small amounts and saved the city the expense of discounting and paying selling commissions. Possibly the plan might work out here.

Playgrounds Are Very Important.

There is at the King Edward school a good playground, graded and almost ready for use. It has been in that condition for many months. The city public works department has arranged to haul cinders to cover the ground and make it available for the pupils. Owing to various causes this has not yet been done. Possibly it is not considered to be important.

As a matter of fact organized play is just as important a part of education as is the work done in the school buildings. The educational authorities of the old countries have recognized that for many years, and in Canada there are many private schools that feature on football and similar sports, and parents send their sons there simply in order that they may be encouraged to play as well as to cram their heads with more or less useful facts.

Where there is no organized play there is apt to be rowdiness. The schools that do not train pupils to play are graduating boys for the street corners and the loafing resorts. Play is Nature's method of educating and every provision is made for it in all modern institutions of learning.

Popular Measures for Dominion Government.

There are two subjects for legislation that would be popular with the Canadian people if the Dominion Government could but be persuaded to take action. One of these is the total abolition of titles in Canada, and the other is the equalizing of pensions by bringing the pay of disabled privates up to that of lieutenants. These would be democratic measures for a democratic country. They would receive the approval of nine persons out of ten. They are not questions to argue about. People have already made up their minds that the present system tends to snobbishness and that the pensions discrimination is grossly unfair.

Board of Trade to Renew Activity.

Now that the Board of Trade has entered on a new year and committees have been formed for the various departments of activity, there is to be new life instilled into that institution, corresponding with the new interest in everything which is being taken by citizens generally. There is much work to do and the members of the Board of Trade are the ones to do it. Members of that board have been active in connection with the securing of shipbuilding contracts; now there is a publicity campaign to be thought of and many other lines of endeavor for the improvement of the city and the correction of abuses.

It may be interesting to know that since the inception of the Fund in Prince Rupert on the 22nd September, 1914, the sum of over \$30,500 has been paid to soldiers' dependents in Prince Rupert and district, and that the whole of this sum has been contributed locally.

Although the war is over there yet remains much to be done and the local committee feels confident that the splendid support so generously accorded during the past four and a half years of the war will be maintained and that the monthly subscriptions will be continued until the 31st of March, 1919. AND WHEREAS the said company has requested the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert to grant exemption from the payment of certain taxes upon the above described lands and real property and the improvements thereon and to be placed upon the aforementioned or upon the forested or water adjacent thereto, such exemption to run for a period of ten (10) years from the first day of January, A. D. 1919, subject to the terms and conditions that in this bylaw hereinafter set forth.

AND WHEREAS the said Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert as an inducement to the said company to erect and operate the said shipbuilding plant and other enterprises, has agreed to grant exemption hereinafter mentioned shall be made.

AND WHEREAS the said company requests and the said Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert proposes that there be given to the said company exemption from General Taxes to be imposed by the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert for a period of ten (10) years but not exemption from special taxes imposed under debenture bylaws or local improvement bylaws.

NOW THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert enact as follows:—1. During the period of ten years from the first day of January, A. D. 1919, the said company, its successors and assigns shall be exempt from payment to the City of Prince Rupert all General Taxes, Health Taxes and other taxes which shall be liable to pay taxes levied under general debenture and local improvement bylaws.

2. If the said Company, its successors and assigns fails to complete the shipbuilding plant upon the premises hereinafter mentioned within the space of one year from the first day of January, A. D. 1919, the said company, its successors and assigns at any time during the continuance of the ten (10) years mentioned in this bylaw, fail for the space of one year to erect and operate a shipbuilding plant or to operate some other industrial enterprise upon the said premises, then this bylaw shall cease to be effective and the exemption from taxes hereby given shall cease to exist.

3. Nothing herein contained shall in any way affect the agreement made between the City of Prince Rupert and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company Limited and the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Company Limited and His Majesty the King in his right to the Province of British Columbia and which agreement is set forth in Chapter thirty (30) in the year 1912 of the Statutes of British Columbia, the intention being that this bylaw is only to be binding between the City of Prince Rupert and the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Company Limited, its successors and assigns.

2. The said site shall be granted to the said Association by deed to the Association or to trustees for the said Association to be nominated by them.

3. The Deed shall be signed by the Mayor and the City Clerk and shall be an ordinary quit claim deed without covenants.

4. The Land to be granted is—All and singular that certain parcel or tract of land, situate in the City of Prince Rupert, containing by admeasurement, Five Hundred and Twenty-three one thousandth Acres (523.1000) be the same more or less, and being composed of a part of parcel No. 22 referred to in the British Columbia Statutes for the year 1912, Chap. 30, Fol. 172, clause (1) of Schedule thereto and shown on plan No. 923, Section one and five, deposited in the Land Registry Office on the 22nd day of March, which tract may be more particularly described as follows, that is to say:—Commencing at the intersections of the northerly boundary of the Lane, Block 3, Section 5, with the westerly boundary of Agnew Place, thence westerly along said northerly boundary of lane two hundred and seventy-four and eighty-four one hundredth (274.84) feet, more or less, to its intersections with the easterly boundary of Fulton Street, thence northerly along the said easterly boundary of Fulton Street one hundred and thirty-nine and the tenth part of one hundred feet, thence easterly and parallel to the northerly boundary of said land one hundred and seventy-eight and twenty-five one hundredth (178.25) feet, more or less, to the westerly boundary of Agnew Place; thence southerly along the said westerly boundary of Agnew Place, one hundred (100) feet to point of commencement, shown in bold red on plan attached hereto. For the purpose of this description, Avenues are assumed to bear East and West and Streets, Northerly and Southerly.

5. This Bylaw shall come to force on the Registration thereof.

FINANCES OF CITY ARE IN VERY HEALTHY CONDITION; PERMANENT WORK PROPOSED

(Continued From Page One.)

established two years ago, would be sufficiently large to supplement current collections and tax sale proceeds, pending collection of these arrears. This has been done and all borrowings from the bank paid off.

The rate of taxation for 1918 was two and a half (2½) mills higher than the previous year, but the total raised in our estimates, namely, \$175,459.12, was \$7,316.13 less than that of 1917. The necessity of this increased rate was brought about by the falling of receipts from other sources, liquor and other licenses alone amounted to \$9,300.00, and \$13,000.00 tax sale lots deeded to the city; also \$2,400.00 less on sundry receipts.

Tax Arrears.

The city collected 66.77 per cent of its tax levy, receiving to date \$101,004.71 allowing \$6,589.91 which was rebated. Our arrears, therefore, at the end of the year, will be \$53,542.46 against \$45,732.41 in 1917. Against arrears of taxes there has been collected \$38,735.49, so that our total arrears on general taxes at the end of the year will be approximately \$130,924.78, against \$113,055.38 at the end of 1917.

It will, therefore, be readily seen how the aforesaid extraordinary circumstances affect our tax roll; also the consequent care to be exercised in making expenditures. It will be interesting to note that in normal times the best collection the city ever had was 67 per cent of its taxes, in 1913. While with these existing conditions, with the large amount of assessments tied up on Government properties, etc., our collections are less than one quarter (¼) of one per cent (1%) below the highest point, and all the city's transactions carried out without extended borrowing from the bank.

Debentures Redeemed.

During the year, the city has redeemed \$52,710.00 short term bonds, amounting to \$31,769.27, next April, so that our debt has been reduced this year \$83,979.27 bringing it down to a net total of \$1,640,694.00 with all obligations clear. We are now in the satisfactory position of having paid off all our short term debentures with nothing else maturing until 1923, when the Borden Street School's \$20,000.00 will become due.

All our sinking funds are complete, in fact above par by \$648.20 on account of their investment in Victory Bonds, in life of which will cover the debenture term and eliminate two levies at maturity date by extra interest earned by such investment.

Within Estimates.

Our total expenditure this year will not exceed our estimates, but will be approximately \$173,000.00 including redemption payments and all extraordinary expenditures on account of the influenza epidemic.

The exchange on interest and redemption payments in New York cost us \$2,402.52, being much heavier than anticipated. The heavy capital expenditures in the early part of the year, necessitated borrowing from the bank, against current revenue. This, however, was all paid back out of first receipts of taxes, and our net interest payments will be less than \$300.00.

Surplus Earnings.

All our utilities will show a surplus earning. There has been a considerable increase in the number of consumers for phone, light and water which is a sure indication of increasing population. Light installations are running almost to capacity of plant, and a continued increase in demand for phones, light and power will mean further capital expenditure upon these utilities in the near future.

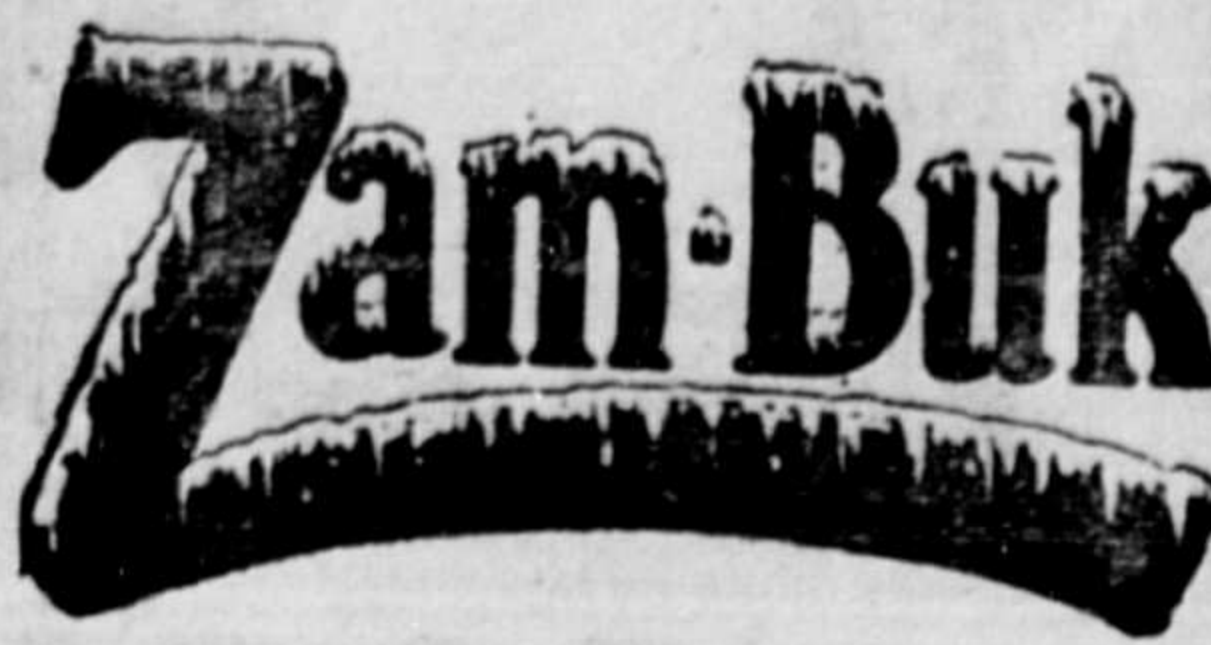
In the early part of the year \$21,050.00 was spent on capital for electric light, transformers, meters and transmission lines out of reserves, bringing up the total expenditure from this fund to the utility to \$38,072.00. Since war was declared, \$19,084.00 has also been spent on telephone capital out of these reserves for extensions and cable installations. Unless new districts have to be opened up, our distribution system, in the ordinary way, for both these utilities may be further extended out of those same reserves

without going to the market for money.

Road Upkeep.

Our plank roadways have now become a momentous question; maintenance upon these roads to keep near a degree of safety is doubling upon itself each year. This year approximately \$16,000.00 has been provided for their upkeep, an amount sufficient to pay interest and redemption annually upon \$260,000.00 over a twenty-year term. Practically a like amount will have to be spent next year; substructures as well as decking have exceeded their normal life and in many cases will mean reconstruction to make them safe for traffic. This is, therefore, a problem for serious consideration.

Our macadam roads also have required a lot of work, and should be taken seriously in hand, by way of surfacing with proper material. This year the expenditure will be \$3,800.00 with not more than two miles of roads repaired, so that they cost \$1,600.00 per mile, with \$520.00 for new crossings.

The public works department have under consideration ways and means of surfacing that will be more economically carried out, at the same time give more satisfaction to travelling public.

Reconstruction.

In considering these expenditures upon roads the fact must be borne in mind that all plank roads have been paid for and that the above expenditures out of general revenue take the place of \$78,489.20 per annum raised by local improvement taxation during the years of 1912 to 1917 under the local improvement plan. Our annual taxation under this plan has been reduced from \$145,643.66 in 1914 to \$59,734.55 for the coming year 1919, so that our total taxation for general, health, schools, money debt and local improvements has been reduced from \$404,997.40 in 1914 to \$235,226.98 in 1918, thus showing that whereas capital expenditure of these undertakings, that is, roads, sidewalks and sewers, have been paid off, their life has run out and in the near future will require other expenditure instead. This, therefore, is a problem for serious consideration. While maintenance has not been neglected, expenditure under this heading cannot overcome obsolescence. It means, therefore, reconstruction. What this form shall take is the question, I would earnestly recommend to the incoming council's attention. One thing is certain, that in so far as water sewers and roads are concerned, it will mean a debenture issue to finance it, so the closer we get to permanent work the more economic for the city.

Health.

The health department have carried their increased labor charges without increasing their estimate of 1917, the labor done for public works with auto in addition to garbage removal, offsetting the additional cost.

M., and Sergeant Major Logan are both well known in town. Both were wounded severely in France, and both enjoy the confidence of their fellows.

In Prince Rupert there were many men who have served with His Majesty's forces at some time or other, and according to their service are eligible for either "active" or "associate" membership. Membership is not restricted to veterans of the last four years' fighting, but embraces all men of military and naval experience in the previous years.

It is anticipated that this new branch of the Army and Navy Veterans will start off with a good membership.

MOUNTED POLICE PROTECT WORKMEN

Buenos Ayres, Jan. 10.—Another battle between strikers here and government forces, began yesterday afternoon at Vasena iron foundry. Meanwhile the strike movement is spreading and more than fifty unions joined in the fight. At Vasena iron foundry 2,000 strikers surrounded the plant in an attempt to force the strike breakers to leave it. The government rushed up a squadron of national mounted police to escort the workers to safety.

GERMANY FALLING BEHIND IN BARGAIN

London, Jan. 10.—Germany has fallen behind in the last month in turning over the material required by the terms of the armistice. Checking to date shows a shortage of 695 heavy guns, 7,000 machine guns, 1,000 trench mortars, 600 airplanes, 4,736 engines, 5,000 motor lorries and 130,000 railroad cars.

BERNSTORFF'S NEPHEW IS JAILED FOR FRAUD

San Francisco, Jan. 10.—Baron Allerdt Muench, nephew of the former German ambassador, count von Bernstorff, was sentenced to three months in the county jail here for perpetrating a fraud upon the government by attempting to enter the country on a forged passport.

100 KILLED AT BUENOS AYRES YESTERDAY

Workmen's Federation Orders the Continuation of Strike and Resistance of Government Orders.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Buenos Ayres, Jan. 11.—Several persons were killed in clashes between strikers and government forces today and the government, in view of the increasing gravity of the situation, decided to adopt most severe measures to bring about normal conditions. The soldiers and police were instructed to shoot whenever necessary and to put down outbreaks and violence regardless of cost in blood. The Federation has ordered that the general strike be continued indefinitely and has instructed its members to oppose acts of aggression by government forces under the command of General Dellepiane who has about 4,000 men. Over 100 were killed in affrays last night.
