NOT MUCH EXCITEMENT OVER CIVIC NOMINATIONS WHICH TOOK PLACE THIS AFTERNOON

THREE CANDIDATES FOR MAYOR, TWO FOR POLICE COMMISSIONER AND ELEVEN FOR ALDERMEN—SCHOOL TRUSTEES ARE ELECTED BY ACCLAMATION

Without much excitement at the city hall or elsewhere, nominations were received by the returning officer, Fred C. Peters, K. C., this morning for the candidates for the mayoralty, aldermen, police commissioners, and school trustees. Nominations were closed at 2 p. m. and well before that time most of the names were placed on file.

For the mayoralty for 1919 there were no surprises, although there were one or two new names given in for aldermen. The retiring member of the police commission, who is a candidate for re-election, is having opposition.

LIEBKNICHT IS REPORTED DEAD

Said to Have Been Killed in Street Fighting; Government Gaining Ground.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Berlin, Jan. 12.—The position of the Ebert-Scheidemann government is growing stronger every hour while the number of insurgent demonstrators is rapidly diminishing, it is officially announced today. Fighting between Government and Spartacan forces continued for possession of the newspaper offices, railway stations and other important buildings. Government troops recaptured the Imperial Printing works, the government stated. The Spartacans still had a majority of the newspaper plants.

It is reported that Dr. Karl Liebknight was killed in street fighting.

SURVIVORS ARRIVE.

Honolulu, Jan. 13.—Eleven survivors of the steamer Dumaru destroyed by lightning and fire off Guama, October 16, arrived here from the Philippines, where they landed in a lifeboat. Three others remain at Manila.

BADEN GIVEN TO ALLIES IN PLACE OF THE MACKENZEN

London, Jan. 13.—The German superdreadnought Baden has arrived in Scapa Flo and been interned with other vessels of the German fleet. Surrender of this ship was demanded in exchange for the Mackenzien which was not able to leave Germany. The Baden is a vessel of about 27,000 tons similar to the Queen Elizabeth class, mounting eight 15 inch guns and steaming 23 knots. Another flotilla of German submarines numbering 16 is to leave Germany tomorrow for surrender to the Allies.

REPORT THAT TARIFF WILL BE REDUCED

War Duties to be Removed and Agricultural Machinery to Be Reduced.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Jan. 13.—That important tariff revisions will feature in the budget at the coming session of Parliament is freely rumored in more or less authoritative circles at the capital. It is stated that tractors of the class on which duty is now rebated will be placed on the free list, that the war tariff increase of 7 1/2 per cent and 5 preferential, put into force during the early days of the war, will be removed, and that the duty on agricultural implements generally will be reduced to 12 1/2 per cent. This to meet the demands of farmers especially in the west. New means of raising revenue are being considered. After making high profits during the war it is thought that the manufacturers can now look after themselves.

FINDLAY HOPES TO GET HIS RELEASE IF COMMISSION IS DECLARED ILLEGAL

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, January 13.—W. C. Findlay, former prohibition commissioner, has been obliged to make a choice between H. S. Taylor and Alex Henderson as his counsel, because of divergent advice they were giving him, and he has cast his lot with Mr. Henderson. The hopes to which prohibitionists were clinging that Findlay would appear before Mr. Justice Clement today must be abandoned because Henderson's advice to him has been that he should await the decision of Chief Justice Hunter on the legality of the commission. Both counsel saw Findlay at Okalla on Saturday.

It is held that if the Chief Justice's decision is that the commission is illegal, Findlay's contempt of court, for which he is now in prison, will be automatically purged and he will secure his release on that charge.

ARMY AND NAVY VETERANS ARE ORGANIZING

Application for Charter Has Gone Forward—Major McMullin Presides at Meeting

There was an enthusiastic gathering yesterday afternoon in the Court House, at the organization meeting of the Northern British Columbia unit of the Army and Navy Veterans. There was a good attendance of veterans, and the Court House was comfortably filled. Major J. H. McMullin was called to the chair, and more than sufficient members were enrolled to meet the requirements of the Dominion Incorporation. The application for a Charter for the local branch will go forward immediately to headquarters.

There were veterans from many campaigns present yesterday, including many who had seen service in India and in South Africa, as well as in France. Major McMullin, the chairman of the meeting, is an old member of the 3rd Hussars, and later of Strathcona's Horse, and was present in every general engagement with his regiment in the Boer War.

The territory to be served by this new unit of the Army and Navy Veterans extends from the 51st parallel to the Yukon boundary, and as far east as Prince George. There are many more men known to be eligible for membership in this association in the district, and a large roll is expected.

NEW YORK HARBOR STRIKE IS ENDED

New York, Jan. 13.—The harbor strike here ended yesterday, pending arbitration by the National War Labor Board, whose decision will be accepted by all parties.

BOLSHEVIKI ARE AT WORK IN SOUTH AMERICAN REPUBLICS

PLOT DISCOVERED IN WHICH PARTICIPANTS WERE TO OVERTHROW URUGUAYAN AND ARGENTINE GOVERNMENTS AND ESTABLISH SOVIETS IN THEIR PLACE

Montevideo, January 13.—The police have uncovered a plot on the part of Russians to instigate a Bolsheviki movement here and in Buenos Ayres. Four of the leaders in the movement are said to have confessed participation in a plan to overthrow the Uruguayan and Argentine governments and institute soviets in both countries.

Buenos Ayres, January 13.—Although the iron workers strike was settled Saturday and the general strike which had been declared by the Regional Federation was called off last night, there was only a slight decrease in the acts of anarchy during Saturday night and yesterday.

TWO SEIZURES OF INTOXICANTS BY THE POLICE

Chinese Find Novel Methods of Hiding Illicitly Held Liquor But Police Find It.

About 130 bottles of whisky, labelled House of Lords Scotch, and corked with corks marked “Oporto” were brought to the police office on Saturday, as the result of a short visit paid by Constables Adams and Slocum to the Wong Laundry on 9th Ave.

When the constables visited the premises there were three or four Celestials present. Constable Adams cast a hurried glance around the room and noticed that the newspaper covering the wall was slightly cracked at one place. On a further examination of this spot he pried off one of the wall boards and there was disclosed to his view the bottles, neatly stacked in the studding, behind the boards. Laundry baskets, boxes and any receptacles available were commandeered and transferred to the police office at once.

There was a big hound on the premises which bristled with suppressed rage when he saw the policemen, but this guard was insufficient.

Wong Yong, the laundry keeper, appeared in court this morning and was fined \$50.50 for having liquor in possession in a place other than that specified in the Act.

Mule Ku Liue.

Later in the day Chief Vickers and Constable Slocum paid a visit to the Kwong Sun grocery store on Third Avenue. Chief Vickers' experienced eye took in the stock on the shelves, most of which was in the original Chinese packages. “That seems to be a good brand of ginger you keep,” remarked the chief, idly fingering an open case. “I like this label. Are all the labels the same?” he asked innocently. “Him no good,” hurriedly interjected the storekeeper. “Here real good ginger,” offering another brand from elsewhere. Chief Vickers, however, stayed with the case he was at, and on removing the top layer of cans, found underneath some seventeen bottles of Mule Ku Liue, a favorite Chinese intoxicant. Kwong was also fined \$50.50 this morning in the police court.

REAR END COLLISION.

Batavia, N. Y., Jan. 13.—Twenty one persons were killed and several injured, three seriously, in a rear end collision on the New York Central Railroad near South Byron yesterday. Every person in the rear Pullman coach was killed.

PROHIBITED LITERATURE

Ottawa, Jan. 13.—It is expected that modifications will be made shortly to the Order-in-Council respecting prohibited literature. The cabinet has the matter under consideration.

JIMMIE GILCHRIST SUCCUMBS, RESULT OF SLEIGH ACCIDENT

The death occurred yesterday of Jimmie Gilchrist, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Gilchrist, of Fifth Avenue, West. The little fellow, who was about eleven years old, was out sleighing on New Year's Day and had the misfortune to be thrown off his bobsleigh. He did not appear to be very badly hurt at the time, but later spinal meningitis developed, which proved fatal.

The little one has been in bed since a day or two after his accident and every attention has proved unavailing. The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon at Fairview Cemetery and will be in charge of the B. C. Undertakers.

John Hill was fined this morning in the Police Court for being drunk.

AND WHEREAS; the said Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert as an inducement to the said company to erect and operate the said shipbuilding plant and other enterprises, has agreed that the exemption hereinafter mentioned shall be made.

AND WHEREAS the said company requests that the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert propose that there be given to the said company exemption from General Taxes to be imposed by the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert during the term of ten (10) years but not exemption from special taxes imposed under debenture bylaws or local improvement bylaws.

NOW THEREFORE; the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert enact as follows:—

1. During the period of ten years from the first day of January, A. D. 1919, the said company, its successors and assigns shall be exempt from payment to the City of Prince Rupert of the following taxes, namely: Taxes and School Taxes, but shall be liable to pay taxes levied under general debenture and local improvement bylaws.

2. If the said company, its successors and assigns fails to begin operating the shipbuilding plant, upon the premises hereinafter mentioned within the space of one year from the first day of January, A. D. 1919, or if the said company, its successors and assigns at any time during the continuance of the ten (10) years mentioned in the bylaw, fails to operate the plant or to operate some other large industrial enterprise upon the said premises, then this bylaw shall cease to have effect and the exemption from taxes hereby given shall cease to exist.

3. Nothing herein contained shall in any way affect the agreement made between the City of Prince Rupert and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company Limited and the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Company Limited and the Municipality of the City of Prince Rupert, the King in his right to the Province of British Columbia and which agreement is set forth in Chapter 36 of the Statutes of the Province of British Columbia, 1912, the intention being that this bylaw is only to be binding between the City of Prince Rupert and the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Company Limited, its successors and assigns.

4. This bylaw shall come into force on the day of registration and shall be submitted to the vote of the rate-payers of the City of Prince Rupert.

Obligation to Soldier And Family.

Our grave obligation to the soldier and his family cannot be questioned. The modern state is happily more conscious of its responsibilities to the fighting man than was ever the case in the past, for this is "the first war since the world began which has seriously disturbed the conscience of mankind, and set it working on the duties of conscious remorse and active gratitude." The duties of restoration which, as a nation, we have been led to assume are not to be evaded.

Making Soldier Into Citizen.

The process of making a soldier into a civilian is no easier than that of turning civilians into soldiers. Every man, with a few exceptions, discharged from the army will be thrown into civil life with the loss of the precious quality of initiative, a loss serious in proportion to the length of his service. The private soldier lives a life in which his thinking is done for him. He is forbidden to rely on his own judgment, and he is forced to accept, even in regard to the trifling details of his existence, the orders of a superior. The soldier's discharge cannot alter this carefully developed habit of mind. When he originally became a recruit he remained a civilian for months after he put on the uniform, the reverse is equally true. After his discharge the soldier is still in effect a soldier until a forgotten attitude of mind has had an opportunity to re-assert itself. Through a critical period, just when he should be re-establishing himself in civilian life, the easy-going fatalistic habit of the old soldier is likely to cling. This we must keep in mind lest the ex-soldier be made a victim of his very patriotism. It is an irony of fate that the man who has served his country longest at the Front and who has been under the heaviest strain "in the line" will inevitably find the transition to peace the hardest to accomplish. And the relaxation from a rigid discipline and the dreary monotony of routine are perils which will confront every soldier wherever his work may have lain. The public will only need to be reminded of this to view his problem with an understanding mind. The returned soldier does not ask for sympathy or for favors, but he is entitled to receive as his right, both from his employer and from his fellows, an intelligent comprehension of his difficulties.

Solemn Debt Owed to Men.

Canadians owe a solemn debt, a debt beyond repayment, to the men of their Expeditionary Force, who, let us never forget, placed themselves between us and the German host. But if our obligation to them can never be discharged in full, our simple duty as their fellow citizens will not be accomplished until the last man to leave the army has been re-established in our national life. He must be given a chance to re-discover himself in a world that will be strangely new.

Teaching Blind to See With Hands.

Teaching the blind to see with their hands and to do useful work and thus mitigate to some extent the affliction which has fallen upon them is the work of the St. Dunstan's Hostel. It is especially for the care of those who have lost their sight in the war. The appeal for such a cause cannot go unheeded. That is the reason why the ladies of this city are interesting themselves in the cause by giving a benefit concert at the Westholme Theatre tomorrow night. The cause is the most appealing one that ever comes before the people of this city and the concert will be a splendid one. That should be double reason for patronage.

DENVER MEN INTERESTED IN PULP PROPOSAL

Party Now Up Skeena River Said To Be Contemplating the Erection of Mill

The party of Denver capitalists consisting of E. Thomas, E. E. Sachet and William Phillips, who are now up the Skeena examining their timber limits, are reported to be contemplating the erection of pulp mill on the Skeena. These men bought the limits which formerly belonged to Joseph Hunter and the late W. J. Sutton, both of Victoria. They had not seen the timber but took it on the report of the cruisers. Now they are looking it over with a view, it is said, to developing it in the near future.

The same group hold extensive limits on the Naas River which have never been cruised but which are said to be well wooded with spruce, hemlock, cedar and cottonwood. In order to handle timber from both limits it is suggested that the mill will probably be built near the mouth of the Skeena on tidewater. There is known to be power going to waste on the Estall River, which would be sufficient to run a mill and this power might also be utilized for other purposes as the country develops.

SALMON INDUSTRY IS BIG PROBLEM FOR WASHINGTON

One of the big problems of after-the-war reconstructionists in the State of Washington will be the rebuilding of the salmon industry, according to State Fish Commissioner L. H. Darwin.

Mr. Darwin pointed out the other day that the demands of war had constituted a serious drain upon the salmon supply of these waters, and that new fishing laws would be necessary to prevent less intensive fishing for a time. Among the laws he will propose to the State Legislature, he announced recently, was one forbidding aliens and alien corporations from holding fishing rights in Washington.

COST OF PRODUCING 100 LBS. OF MILK

Belleville, Ont., Jan. 11. — A survey of 450 dairy farms in Oxford County shows that the average cost of production of milk on these farms in the year ending March 1, was \$2.17 per 100 pounds. The average price received at the farm for milk was \$2.19 1/2.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 50 acres may be leased for one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSHIP PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such portion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.



ALASKA SALMON PRICES REMOVED

All regulations in regard to the price of salmon in Alaska are removed.

This removal of all salmon prices in Alaska does not affect the matter of licenses for canneries, fishermen, etc.—such regulations being still in force and effect.

Following the lifting of the United States Food Administration regulations concerning the prices of fresh salmon in Washington and Oregon, the Federal Food Administrator for Alaska recommended to the United States Food Administration that all restrictions and regulations as to prices for salmon in Alaska be removed.

SMALL SAVINGS DESIRED

The Dominion Government has launched a War Savings plan that is framed to promote saving among all classes of Canadians. 2. To fit those who have suffered overseas for useful employment.
3. To have ready for every soldier and war worker an opportunity for employment.
4. To assure for them proper living and working conditions.

Building Materials of Prince Rupert

By William Bruce, F.E.A.S.A., Architect.

During the transitive period which we are passing through at the present time, when improved methods of construction and conservation are eagerly sought for the writer of this brief descriptive of the building materials obtainable in the city of Prince Rupert desires to place before the interested citizens the following facts that may be of some value in promoting the growth and development of the city.

The rock on which the city is built is thoroughly fireproof, being of a micaceous nature and at the same time capable of carrying heavy loads, when the pressure is applied on the natural bed of the stone.

It should not be assumed that every piece of stone in the district is of good quality, as we find good and bad material in all deposits of rock.

When using the fireproof stone of Prince Rupert, it should always be laid in its natural bed and masons skilled in dressing and building this kind of stone can prepare it to make a high class of walling suitable for street fronts and any other kind of building, in course or square dressed rubble. The natural bed of the stone is very suitable for the building of rain and damp proof walls and the top bed of every stone can be laid with a slight tilt outwards and thoroughly prevent the rain from entering the walls.

The crushed stone when mixed with good Portland cement make a valuable fireproof concrete. The fireproof stone is not very hard and durable for road and street making, but it is suitable for the construction of fireproof building when mixed with good Portland cement and it has been proved by thorough testing that fire and water will not destroy it.

One of Prince Rupert's most esteemed and professional citizens granted permission to the writer to prepare and test a number of samples of concrete composed of crushed rock mixed with Portland cement and the reliable testing appliances has proved that a mixture of local crushed rock and Portland cement makes a high class fireproof concrete, suitable for the best class of buildings.

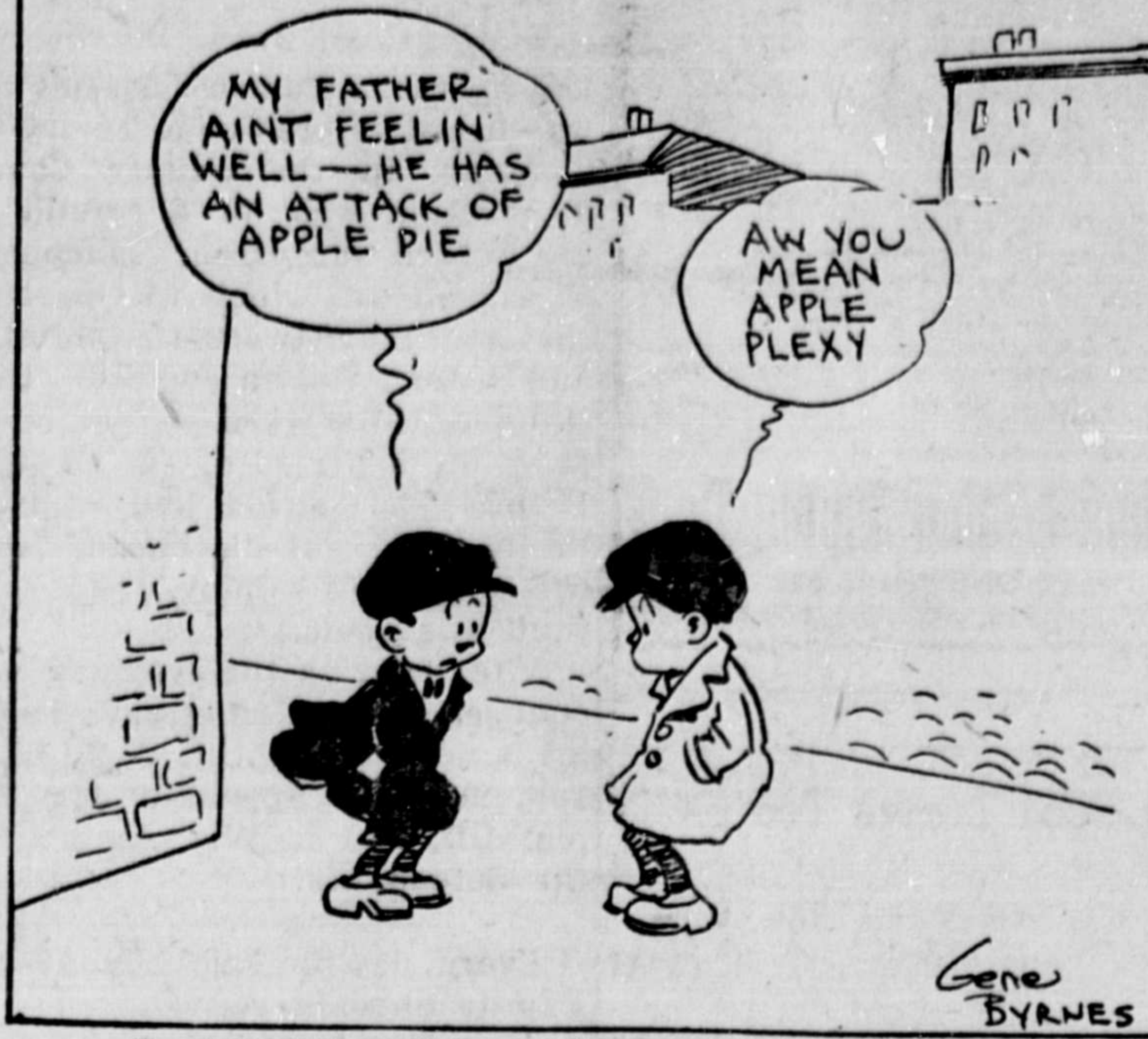
Another important point is that owing to the nature of the stone, it can be crushed or ground very fine, and colored light or dark red with oxide of iron finished with a marble surface or cast in moulds to obtain an ornamental surface to take the place of expensive cut stone work, both pleasing and effective in color.

If concrete ship building is once begun at Prince Rupert, the local stone will be very valuable for such work as the concrete will resist severe strains up to and over 30,000 lbs. per-square ft. and it can be made thoroughly waterproof in addition to its fireproof qualities.

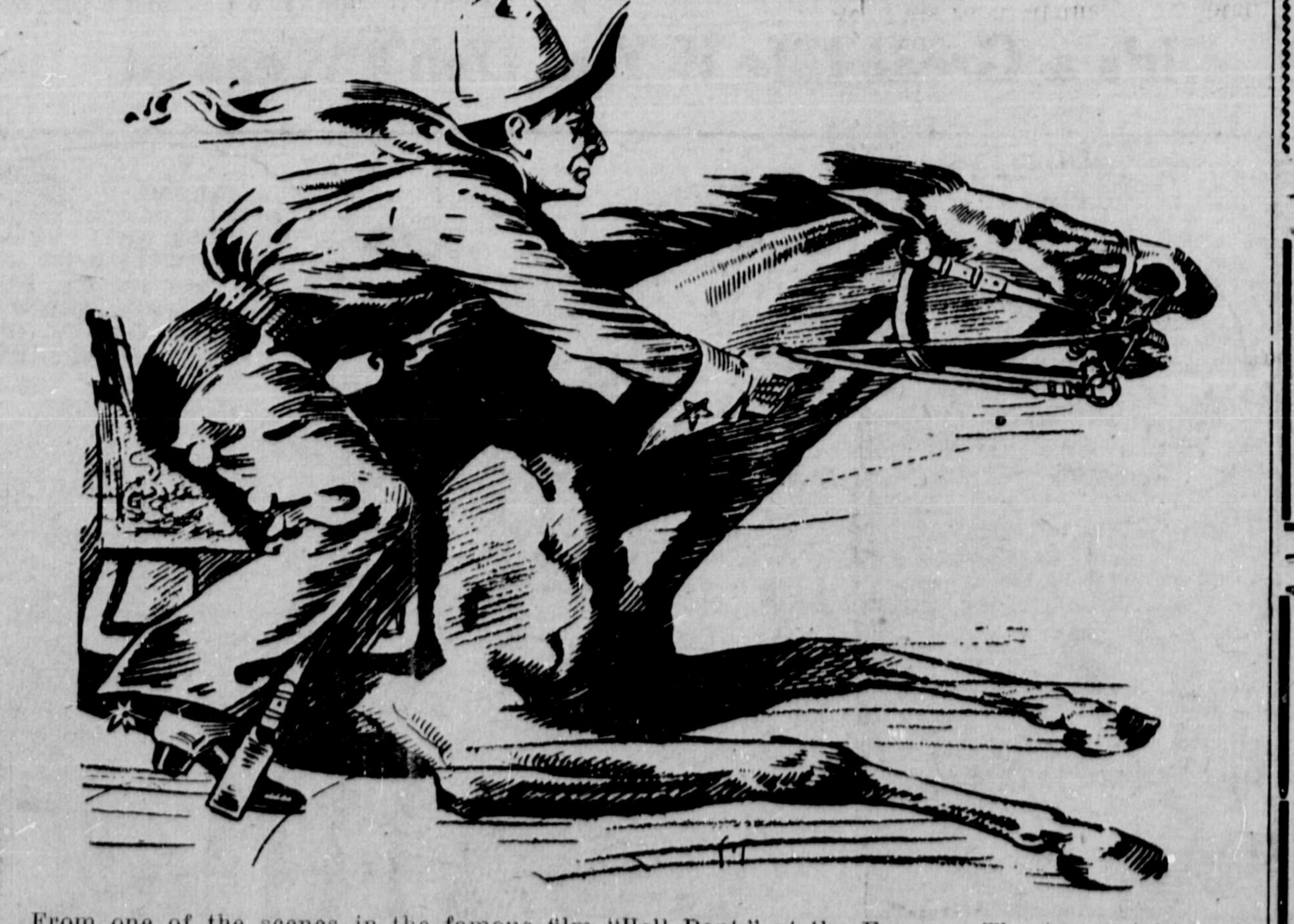
