GERMANS MUST RETURN STOLEN GOODS

SUPREME COUNCIL OF THE PEACE CONFERENCE DECIDED ON TERMS FOR RENEWAL OF ARMISTICE

Japanese Representatives Were Present for First Time and Many Others Not Formerly Included; Arrangements for Return of Material and Machinery Stolen from France and Belgium.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, January 14.—The Supreme Council of the Peace Congress resumed its sessions yesterday afternoon at the French Foreign office with the distinguished gathering of yesterday augmented by the presence of Japan among the great powers represented and a notable gathering of military, naval, economic and financial representatives of various powers. Those present included Premier Lloyd George and Foreign Secretary Arthur J. Balfour, for Great Britain; President Wilson, Secretary of State Lansing, General Bliss and Herbert C. Hoover, for the United States; Premier Clemenceau, Foreign Minister Pichon, M. Klotz, M. Clementel, Marshal Foch, Major General Weygan and Admiral De Bon, for France; Foreign Minister Sonnino for Italy, and Viscount Chanda and Ambassador Matsu for Japan. All the members of the Versailles council also attended, including General Sir Henry Wilson.

An official communication issued after the adjournment says: "The meeting reached an agreement as to the terms on which the armistice is to be renewed on January 17. This included naval clauses, provincial clauses, conditions of supply, and provisions for the restitution of material and machinery stolen from France and Belgium by the Germans.

The meeting also continued its discussion of procedure. It was agreed to hold the next meeting of the Supreme War Council on Wednesday at 10:30 a. m. and that the first full session of the Peace Conference will take place on Saturday, January 18, at 2:30 p. m. at the Foreign Office.

RAIDS MADE ON SINN FEINERS

Pamphlets Addressed to American Soldiers Discovered in Rebel Headquarters by the Police.

Dublin, Jan. 13.—The headquarters of the Sinn Fein organization in Harcourt St. were raided yesterday by the police. Raiders found pamphlets addressed to American soldiers in Ireland which contained this question: "Did you win the war in order to knit Ireland's chains. We helped to win your independence, will you help us to win ours?"

Later the police raided the office of "Nationality," the chief organ of the Sinn Fein. Crowds assembled and sang Sinn Fein songs during the raid.

EXPERTS TO FLY ACROSS ATLANTIC

General Brancker Says Trip is Quite Feasible With Three or Four Types of Machines.

London, January 14.—General Brancker, who is giving up his post as Master General of Personnel in the Air Ministry to devote his time to commercial aviation, in an interview with the Daily Express, asserted that the flight across the Atlantic probably will be accomplished in May. He added that the trip was feasible at the present time, as there were three or four types of airplanes available which were quite capable of making the flights.

NAVAL FORCES WILL RECEIVE DECORATION

Ottawa, Jan. 14.—Provided the claims are approved by the British Admiralty, the 1914-1915 bronze star will be granted to all officers and men of the naval forces including Dominion naval forces and men of the Royal Naval Air Service who were mobilized and served at sea or on shore within the theatres of military operations or as trained pilots, observers or men of the R. N. A. S. in flying from naval stations on overseas patrols.

WAR BRIDES WILL COME TO CANADA AT PUBLIC EXPENSE

Ottawa, Jan. 14.—Fifty thousand women and children, dependents of soldiers now in the old country, are to be returned to Canada at the public expense, and those already returned will have their expenses refunded. The majority of the women are war brides.

FRANK ROWELL DIED SUDDENLY

The death occurred yesterday morning of Frank Rowell, conductor on the passenger train between Edson and Edmonton. There are no details except that death was sudden. He was well known here, where he formerly lived, and was conductor on the train running out of this town.

UNABLE TO RESCUE CREW OF CASTALIA

Halifax, January 13.—Efforts so far to rescue 44 members of the crew of the United States Shipping Board's steamer Castalia, which has been drifting in mountainous seas off the coast of Nova Scotia since Saturday morning have proven futile.

HEALTH EXPEDITION TO ALASKA RETURNS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Juneau, Jan. 14.—The public health service relief expedition, sent to Alaska, to assist in the Spanish influenza epidemic, particularly among the natives of the coast, has completed its work and left for Seattle. Reports to Governor Thomas Riggs office indicate that the epidemic is about stamped out and that the expedition's work has saved hundreds of lives of the natives.

BIG APPROPRIATION FOR FAMINE RELIEF

Washington, Jan. 14.—Appropriation of \$110,000,000 for famine relief in Europe outside of Germany was approved tonight by the House of Representatives, which passed the administration measure after its enactment had been urged by President Wilson again as the only effective means of combating the westward spread of Bolshevism. The bill now goes to the Senate where its early passage is planned.

BOLSHEVIKI VIEWS ARE NOT IN FAVOR

Lethbridge, Jan. 14.—No Bolsheviki sentiments of any kind will be tolerated by the Great War Veterans' Association, according to the expression of delegates attending their second annual convention in session here now. Declarations to this effect were emphatically made at a luncheon tendered the visiting delegates by the mayor and city commissioners.

PARLIAMENT CALLED

Ottawa, Jan. 14.—Parliament has been called to meet on Thursday, February 20. This means that there is little hope of Premier Borden arriving home for some time to come. Sir, Thomas White will lead the Government during the absence of his chief.

TO HAVE SHIPYARD IS PROSPERITY NOT TO HAVE IT MEANS STAGNATION

A good deal of interest is being taken in the proposal to grant the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Co. remission of taxes on their shipbuilding plant and site in this city. Many businessmen and others who are anxious to have the shipbuilding start without any hitch have approached The News with the suggestion that attention be drawn to the desirability of voting for the bylaw and thus encouraging the company in the only possible way in their endeavor to establish a plant here.

It has been pointed out that any company operating here is under a severe handicap compared with those in the East, both on account of the cost of transporting steel and also because of the high wages prevailing here. This has been to some extent offset by the fact that there is a fine yard here all ready, and that it can be secured on favorable terms. If the city gives that small sum annually it will be losing nothing, as in case it is decided not to come there will be nothing to tax. It is worth a great deal more than the amount of the general tax to have the advertising that will come to the city from the fact that the shipyard is established here.

There are some people who always oppose a corporation. Often they are right, but just now it means almost life or death to Prince Rupert. To have the yards means prosperity to all; not to have it spells stagnation. That is the way it has been put by callers at this office, and it looks as if they were right.

PROVINCIAL BUREAU OF EMPLOYMENT IS OPENED AT VICTORIA

Prince Rupert to Have Office Later and All to Be Under one Central Head.

The Provincial Employment Bureau has been opened in Victoria as a central office to which there will be subsidiary bureaus in all the larger centres, one of which, it is expected, will be at Prince Rupert. Telling of this the Victoria Daily Times says:

In addition to the institution of the bureau here, it is proposed to open bureaus at other points throughout the province. One has been in operation at Vancouver for the past year and another one will be opened there immediately at the corner of Dunsmuir and Homer Streets, where quarters have been secured. Similar permanent offices will be opened at Nanaimo, New Westminster, Nelson, Cranbrook, Kamloops and Prince Rupert, and at a number of points where it is not deemed advisable at present to open permanent Government bureaus arrangements will be made whereby a species of agency will be provided, that is, some person now established in business of a nature to bring him into close touch with the public will be subsidized on a monthly basis to also look after the work that a permanent bureau would be called upon to do. Such agencies will probably be opened at Prince George, Revelstoke, Rossland, Trail, Fernie, Grand Forks, Kelowna, Penticton, Vernon and elsewhere when deemed advisable.

Men in Charge.

The opening of permanent bureaus here and at the other above points will call for the immediate appointment of some 44 individuals to take charge of the work. These appointments are now being considered by the Civil Service Commissioner to whom application has been made by Deputy Minister of Labor J. D. McNiven, who is inaugurating the bureau system.

In addition it is proposed to appoint a provincial supervisor, whose duty it will be to supervise the work of the bureaus and generally direct their work, and also an Island inspector, who will study labor conditions and keep in touch with developments in the labor world.

Co-operation in Undertaking.
This extension of the employment bureau system throughout

the Province is being made under the provisions of the legislation passed at the last session of the Provincial House. It is also in line with the decision arrived at at the recent Ottawa conference, at which arrangements were made whereby the provinces and Dominion will co-operate, the provincial systems to be utilized and the cost to be jointly contributed by Province and Dominion. While the bureaus will deal with all classes of labor and be open to everyone seeking employment or help, special attention will be paid to finding occupation for returned men, and in order that these may be assured of proper attention it is proposed that attached to each bureau shall be a representative of the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Board, a Federal body, the work of which is directed to placing the soldier back into civil life.

MUSICAL ASSOCIATION MEETS WITH SUCCESS

The Rehearsal Last Night Gives Promise of Great Things; Concert Early in February.

The rehearsals of the Prince Rupert Musical Society continue to be well attended by enthusiastic members, and when the results of their preparations are placed before the discerning public, they ought to be appreciated. There has been quite a break in the continuity of the practices caused first by the influenza epidemic and later by the Christmas festivities, but these distractions having passed, the first concert program is taking shape finely and promises well.

The first public appearance of the new association is fixed for February 3, when a concert of varied numbers will be given. Judging from the rehearsal which took place last evening there is something in store for the music lovers in the city. The choir consists of over seventy picked voices and under the instruction of John E. Davey have attained an ensemble and proficiency, generally, which will be well worth listening to. The part songs and choruses which have been chosen with care are excellent of their kind and run the gamut from martial to love-ly.

Judging by the rehearsals to date, the Prince Rupert Musical Association will certainly justify its existence.

"HELL BENT" IS A FINE, HARD RIDING DRAMA

It is understood that the company already has had a survey made of a route by which they can reach the coast, which it is thought will be more convenient than bringing the ore out by way of the Ecstall. No matter what the location of the smelter, it will be near enough to Prince Rupert for this town to profit considerably by it.

KEPT THE CITY OUT OF DEBT

Mayor McClymont Modestly Mentions Fact at Final Meeting of the Council Last Night.

NO PUBLIC MEETING FOR ELECTIONEERING

Alderman Dybhavn Retires After Seven Years of Service As Alderman of the City.

"Doubtless there are many things which we did not do during the past year, but we did not run the city into debt. If that is a good thing for an individual it is doubtless good for the city." That was the way in which Mayor McClymont summed up at the close of the meeting of the City Council last night. He said that he thought they had accomplished a good deal. They had not always seen alike as members of the council but he thanked the aldermen for their support.

Alderman Casey spoke of the faithful service of Alderman Dybhavn who was retiring from the council. As chairman of one of the departments he thought the public would be desirous of information in regard to those departments. Extensions to the lighting system were needed, lights had been out, and the public were interested in these things. The citizens were asking if there was to be a meeting to discuss civic affairs. The sewer system had broken down and something had to be done there. They had been charged with being a close corporation and not without reason.

Ask Public Meeting. Alderman Casey said that as the Council was now going out of business after being trustees of the people for a year the people would like some detailed information in regard to their work and he thought they ought to call a public meeting to give an account of their stewardship. He moved that the mayor and aldermen call a meeting for Wednesday night in St. Andrew's Hall. This was seconded by Alderman Kirkpatrick.

Alderman Dybhavn said that so far as he could ascertain the people knew as much about the work of the city as they did. He did not consider a meeting necessary. On a vote being taken it was decided not to call the meeting, the vote being two to four against. Lights Not Obtainable. In answer to the suggestion that the lights had been out a good deal Alderman Dybhavn said that during a storm over three hundred lights had been burned out and every effort had been made to replace them, but owing to present conditions it had been found impossible to get the globes. The department was doing its best to keep the city lighted.

Courtesies. Mrs. Kirkpatrick thanked the members of the Council for their courtesy to a woman, this being the first time there had been a woman on the council.

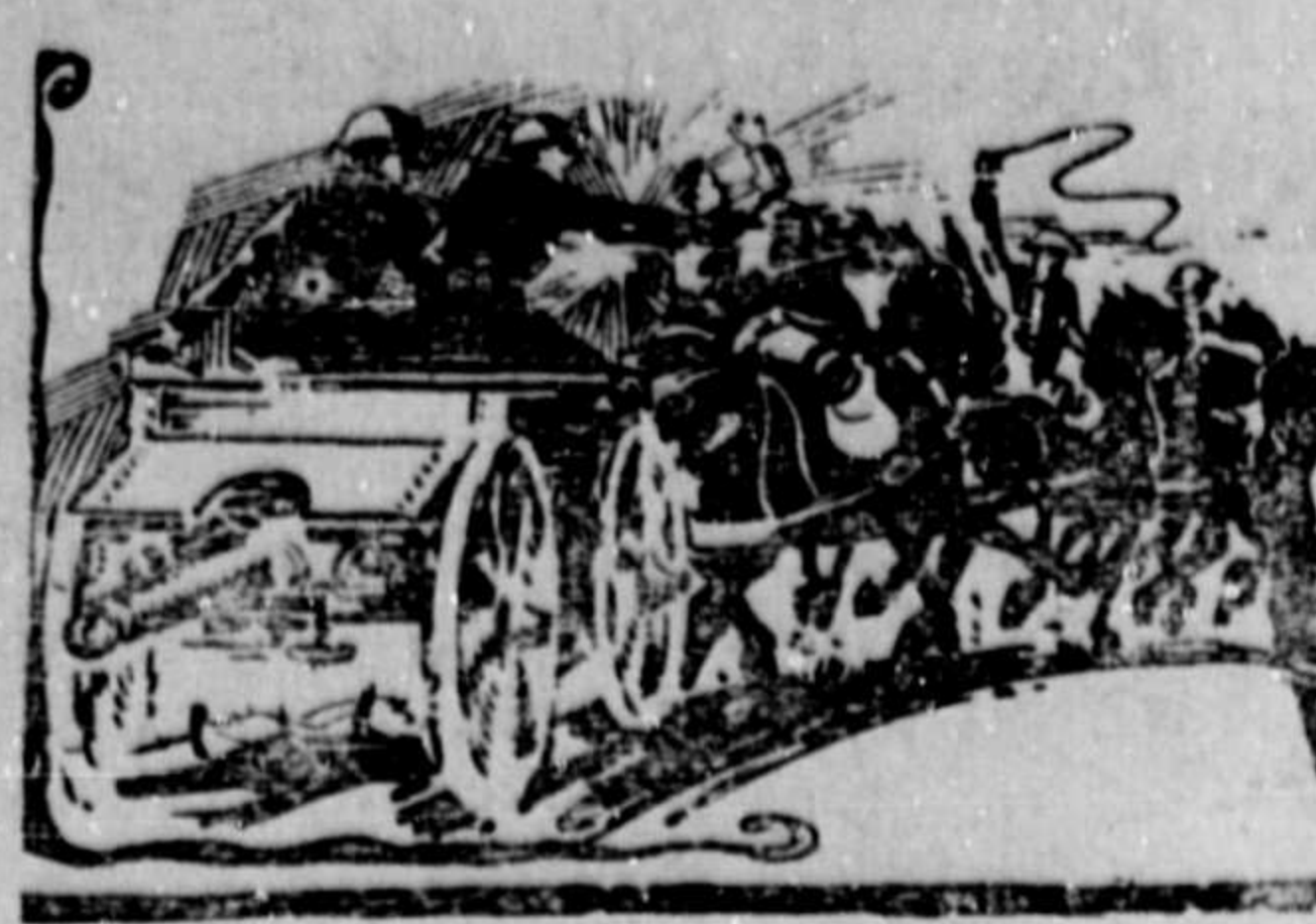
Alderman Dybhavn also thanked the aldermen and those other colleagues who had worked with him during the past seven years on the council. There had been some lively exchanges at times but he believed that those who had been elected had honestly done their best for the city as they had seen it. Re Bylaws to be Voted Upon at the Coming Civic Election on Thursday, January 16 Next

TAX EXEMPTION BYLAW:

In order that the property holders voting on this bylaw at the coming election to better understand it, the following facts will, I hope, make clear its meaning:—

The bylaw gives exemption only for general taxes and schools. The drydock company will pay all special taxes for the City Debt, both general debentures and Local Improvements.

By this arrangement the City gets away from the Bonus System which bond houses look upon with so much disfavor, thereby impairing our credit. There is no doubt with prospective developments consequent upon the opening up of this shipbuilding industry, that considerable money will have to be spent to meet the requirements of increased population. The effect of this bylaw will, therefore, enable us to approach bond houses with the facts that our tax levies for money debt is in no way curtailed by industry exemptions, which will with our financial showing of the past three years convince the investing public that our securities are worthy of first class rating, thereby enhancing their market value.

The Great War Veterans' Grant of Land Bylaw, I think needs little explanation from me other than to say that it is a grant of land in fee simple for 100 feet by 230 on the hill going up Fulton Street between the City Hall and Fifth Avenue where the old water tank stood.

It is a small tribute to the cause for which these men offered their lives and I feel sure will receive the hearty support of every citizen.
