& Engineering Co., Prince Rupert, B. C. "We expect to have all details completed for beginning active operations at Prince Rupert by February first. I intend leaving Order here latter part of next week direct for Prince Rupert to be present for the beginning of operations.

"NEWMAN ERB."

Newman Erb is the chairman of the Board of Directors of the new company and the financial man who is backing the venture. He has reorganized a number of the railroads and industrial concerns in the east and has the reputation of being able to put the calender, with possibly two languishing concerns on their feet and making them pay. The fact that he is the chief mover in the local company is sufficient to stamp it as a business concern that is here to build up a permanent industry. Other Contracts.

Definite Announcement Of Shipbuilding.

The announcement that work will actually commence on or look through the classified column before February 1 on the shipbuilding contracts is the best news on Page 5. that has been received yet. The company has made all arrangements and is now ready to proceed. That the voters of the city will give them that small amount of encouragement they ask is a foregone conclusion. There is no opposition, at anyrate no open opposition. The shipbuilding is necessary to our progress and we could afford to give much more than the proceeds of a small tax if it were necessary in order to get it.

Re Bylaws to be Voted Upon at the Coming Civic Election on Thursday, January 16 Next

TAX EXEMPTION BYLAW:

In order that the property holders voting on this bylaw at the coming election to better understand it, the following facts will, I hope, make clear its meaning:-

The bylaw gives exemption only for general taxes and schools. The drydock company will pay all special taxes for the City Debt, both general debentures and Local Improvements.

By this arrangement the City gets away from the Bonus System which bond houses look upon with so much disfavor, thereby impairing our credit. There is no doubt with prospective developments consequent upon the opening up of this shipbuilding industry, that considerable money will have to be spent to meet the requirements of increased population. The effect of this bylaw will, therefore, enable us to approach bond houses with the facts that our tax levies for money debt is in no way curtailed by industry exemptions, which will with our financial showing of the past three years convince the investing public that our securities are worthy of first class rating, thereby enhancing their market value.

The Great War Veterans' Grant of Land Bylaw, I think needs little explanation from me other than to say that it is a grant of land in fee simple for 100 feet by 230 on the hill going up Fulton Street between the City Hall and Fifth Avenue where the old water tank stood.

It is a small tribute to the cause for which these men offered their lives and I feel sure will receive the hearty support of every citizen.



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
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
