Shipbuilding Is About to Start
ACTIVE OPERATIONS BY FEB. 1, SAYS NEWMAN ERB OF NEW YORK

DEFINITE WORD IS RECEIVED
BY SUPERINTENDENT PILLSBURY
THAT DETAILS NEARLY COMPLETE

Chairman of Board of Directors is Financial Magnate and He Will
Be Here Before End of Month to be Present at
Beginning of Operations.

The following telegram was received here yesterday:
"New York, January 14, 1919.
"Pillsbury, Superintendent Prince Rupert Drydock
& Engineering Co., Prince Rupert, B. C.
"We expect to have all details completed for beginning active
operations at Prince Rupert by February first. I intend leaving
here latter part of next week direct for Prince Rupert to be pres-
ent for the beginning of operations.

"NEWMAN ERB."
Newman Erb is the chairman of the Board of Directors of the
new company and the financial man who is backing the venture.
He has reorganized a number of the railroads and industrial con-
cerns in the east and has the reputation of being able to put
languishing concerns on their feet and making them pay. The
fact that he is the chief mover in the local company is sufficient
to stamp it as a business concern that is here to build up a per-
manent industry.

Other Contracts.
Just how many ships will be built here no one can say. It is
understood that besides the contracts for the government ships,
the company has orders for a number of contracts for ships for
foreign registry and that possibly as many as six will be laid down
here at one time. There is, however, nothing very definite in
this regard. The company has, however, asked that the land
right to Cow Bay be reserved for its shipbuilding yard.

The citizens of Prince Rupert will be glad to have this definite
word from Mr. Erb, setting a definite time for commencing. It
puts things on a new basis for it means that preparations must
be made to do the increased business which is bound to accrue
from the starting of such a large enterprise.

Wooden Ships.
Nothing has been said recently of the wooden ships which it
is proposed to build here. It is understood that the company may
build half a dozen wooden craft on the covered ways, but it will
not be anything more than a subsidiary industry to the main one
which is the building and repairing of steel ships.

It is understood that one of the main attractions to Mr. Erb
and his associates in coming here was the splendid drydock and
machine shops which have yet scarcely been used. With the
coming of the mechanics and material for building ships will
come also the ability to repair and overhaul large vessels on the
drydock here. That means increased business and when the
building of ships ceases, if it ever does cease at this point, the
repair and overhaul business of the drydock will continue. The
company is here first and naturally expects to build up a per-
manent business at a point which it is generally understood will
become one of the great centres of industry, trade and commerce
on the Pacific Coast.

TWO STATES DECLARE
FOR PROHIBITION

California and Washington make
Number Up to 24 in Favor of
National Measure.

passage of the resolutions ratify-
ing federal prohibition by the
Senate and House of Represent-
atives of the States of Washing-
ton and California brings the
States which have acted favor-
able on the proposal up to 24.
Thirteen more states must ratify
the amendment before it becomes
effective.

GERMAN PRISONERS
HAVE TO WORK IN
DEVASTATED DISTRICTS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, Jan. 15.—The cabinet
has decided that German war
prisoners henceforth be employed
in reconstruction work in the
liberated districts. The measures
adopted provide that a minimum
of 200,000 be working in devast-
ated districts by March 20.

DOMINIONS TO
BE EQUAL TO
SMALL NATIONS

Canada Will Have Two Delegates
At Peace Conference Same
As Greece.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, January 15.—The British
dominions overseas are to be rep-
resented at the Peace Conference
upon a basis in substantial agree-
ment with the proposition sub-
mitted on their behalf to the Im-
perial War Cabinet in London by
Sir Robert Borden.

The proposal was that the do-
minions should be given equal
status in conference with smaller
Allied nations, and in addition,
should have representatives upon
panel from which the British
delegation should be drawn. Rep-
resentation of the overseas do-
minions is thus to be on this basis
—Canada, Australia, South Africa
and India are to have two direct
representatives and New Zealand
one in the Allied conference, and
in the following peace congress.
They will have precisely the same
status in these bodies as the
smaller allied nations, which will
have representation on the same
basis, two delegates for Belgium,
Serbia and Greece, and one for
the smaller allies.

GERMAN SHIPS TO
BRING AMERICANS
BACK FROM FRANCE

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, Jan. 15.—Naval
demobilization plans are in abey-
ance and recruiting for perman-
ent service is being pressed now
so that the navy may be prepared
to man the big German merchant
ships which the Allied War Coun-
cil is considering allotting to aid

can army home from France.

TWO THOUSAND ARE
KILLED IN GALICIA

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Geneva, Jan. 15.—Two thou-
sand persons were killed at
Przemysl, Galicia, by Ukrainians,
according to despatches to the
Nieuw Eribe Presse of Vienna. The
Ukrainians have been bombard-
ing Przemysl for several days,
and conditions in the town are
described as terrible. The gas
and electric plants have been de-
stroyed and there is no light in
the town. Water and wood are
also lacking.

Warsaw, Jan. 15.—Bolshevist
forces converging on Warsaw
over three lines of railroads are
advancing from Vilna and have
passed Zudario and Orani.

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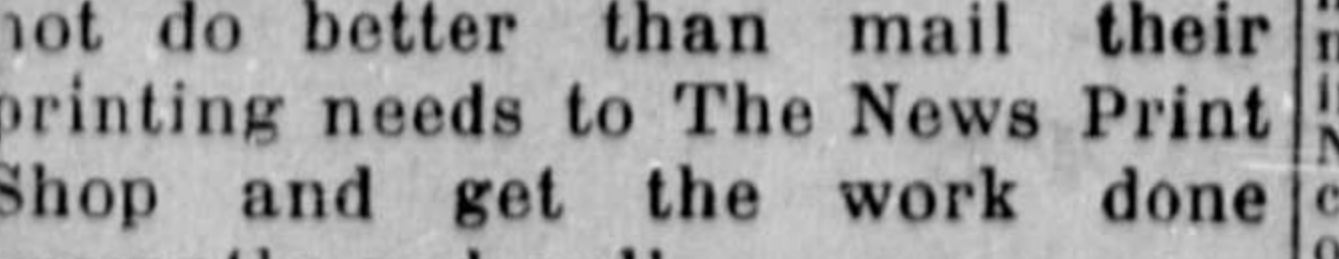
