

ARE CONSIDERING FATE OF MANY PEOPLES

GREATEST PEACE CONFERENCE OF WORLD IN OPENING SESSION SATURDAY AFTERNOON AT PARIS

Memoranda on the Responsibility of the Authors of the War and on Responsibility for the Crimes Committed During the War Were Submitted.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, January 20.—The greatest peace conference in the history of the world is now an accomplished fact, the inaugural session being held Saturday afternoon, the sitting opening at 3:45 in the beautiful hall Dela Peix.

The opening was a ceremonious function, delegates of twenty-two countries exchanging salutations. Premier Clemenceau was made chairman, the nominee of President Wilson. Premier Lloyd George and Italian Foreign Minister Sonnino seconded the motion. Vice presidents were then elected representing each of the four great powers. Each power nominated members of the committee on drafting credentials.

Powers with limited interests were asked to send memoranda on questions on territory, finance, economics, etc., particularly interesting each. There were no demonstrations.

The business was, first: Submission of a memorandum by all powers on the responsibility of the authors of the war; second, memoranda on the responsibility for crimes committed during the war; third, legislation regarding international labor.

Wilson's Plan.

Paris, January 20.—With the American plan for a league of nations completed President Wilson was rounding out his program for international labor legislation today. The President's position is said to be that no peace is possible until the threat of economic competition which might destroy the safeguards of labor is ended.

ATIONS FREE AND ONLY TIED BY SENTIMENT

Premier Hughes of Australia Says Recognition of Dominions Dawn of New Era.

Paris, Jan. 19.—Australia, as a free and independent nation, has its own peace demands for consideration at the conferences. Premier Hughes declared today in an interview. Recognition of the British Dominions by the Peace Congress marks the dawn of a new era, the Premier believes. It is taken to mean that the world recognizes Australia, Canada, South Africa, New Zealand and India as autonomous nations, tied only by sentiment to the motherland. Although he is only about to complete his sixtieth year, his birthday coming at the end of the present month, his appearance suggests a man of seventy.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTION FOR GERMANY IS VERY BROAD

NEW STATES MAY JOIN WITH CONSENT OF THE GERMAN PEOPLE—PRESIDENT TO BE ELECTED BY ABSOLUTE MAJORITY OF ALL VOTERS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, January 20.—Details of the proposed new constitution for Germany drawn up recently at a conference of widely known authorities on constitutional law, including Hugo Preuss, State Secretary of the Interior in the Ebert Government, are given in an official wireless despatch sent out from Berlin and picked up here.

It states that the Empire is to consist of its former component states besides any territories which by virtue of right of self determination desires to be received into the Empire.

The dispatch declares that the people have the right, regardless of former frontiers, to erect new German free states within the Empire, provided any such free state has a population of two million.

If the people of the border country wish to join the German Empire the assent of the German people shall be required.

The Imperial president, who is to be elected by the people, must be 35 years of age and a citizen of Germany ten years before election. He will be elected by an absolute majority of all the votes of the Empire.



PLOTTED AGAINST STATESMEN'S LIVES

Geneva, Jan. 20.—Several German and Russian Bolsheviks were arrested by the Lausanne police. The men in custody were bearing false passports and on the way to Paris, the Gazette of Lausanne says. "The Bolsheviks under arrest plotted against the lives of Premier Clemenceau, President Wilson and Premier Lloyd George. The plot is backed by German gold."

AUSTRIAN'S PROPERTY TO BE SOLD IN ORDER TO PAY CITY TAXES

Custodian of Alien Enemy Property Now Has Control of Alonzo Thorsch.

The first case to come up before Mr. Justice Murphy this morning at the civil sittings of the Supreme Court was an application from the Custodian of Alien enemy Property, represented by Fred Peters, K.C., for an order vesting in him (the Custodian) the property in Prince Rupert belonging and owned by Alfonso Thorsch, an Austrian subject, last known to be resident in Vienna. The petition presented by Mr. Peters to the court set out that the property was assessed in the city at \$347,460, all of which lots except two were unimproved. The total taxation at December 31, 1915, unpaid amounted to \$20,690.07. The petitioner asked for power to sell from time to time or lease any part, and for the management of the property, in order to pay all arrears of taxes.

Affidavits were read from Montague Aldous, agent for the owner, and from Treasurer Johnson. After hearing counsel's argument the court granted the order.

SPECIAL SHIPS FOR SOLDIERS' DEPENDENTS

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—The Department of Immigration and Colonization has arranged for special ships to bring soldiers' dependents who are overseas, back to Canada. The special ships will carry no troops except soldier husbands and soldier fathers, as the case may be. The government will pay all transportation expenses to their destination. Those already home will have money refunded.

ALFRED COLE IS PRESUMED DEAD

In re the Cole estate, an application for an order presuming the death of Alfred Cole was made at the civil sittings of the Supreme Court this morning before Mr. Justice Murphy. W. O. Fulton was counsel for the estate. Affidavits were read which showed that the deceased Alfred Cole had set out from his camp at Qualla Bay for Ocean Falls in his gas boat on November 19, 1917, and nothing more had been heard of him.

More than a year later a green painted canoe which the gasboat had carried, also an oil tank belonging to the boat had been picked up. The deceased had \$508 in a bank in Vancouver. The application was granted.

**New Revelation
 Excites Interest.**

So many people were interested in the article which appeared in The News some little time ago on "The New Revelation," Conan Doyle's new book, and so many have thought the quotations therein were incomplete that in direct answer to a direct query as to what the writer meant when he said "Christianity must change or perish" we quote the following further:

"People are alienated (from Christianity) because they frankly do not believe the facts as presented to them to be true. Their reason and their sense of justice are equally offended. One can see no justice in a vicarious sacrifice, nor in the God who could be placated by such means. Above all, many cannot understand such expressions as 'the redemption from sin,' 'cleansed by the blood of the Lamb' and so forth. So long as there was any question of the fall of man there was at least some sort of explanation of such phrases, but when it became certain that man had never fallen—when with ever fuller knowledge we could trace our ancestral course down through the cave man and the drift man back to that shadowy and far off time when the man-like ape slowly evolved into the ape-like man—looking back on all this vast succession of life, we knew that it had always been rising from step to step. Never was there any evidence of a fall.

**Quite Divorced
 From the Facts.**

"But if there were no fall then what became of the atonement, of original sin, of a large part of Christian mystical philosophy? Even if it were as reasonable in itself as it is actually unreasonable, it would still be quite divorced from the facts.

"Again too much seemed to be made of Christ's death. It is no uncommon thing to die for an idea. Every religion has equally had its martyrs. Men die continually for their convictions. Thousands of our lads are doing it at this instant in France. Therefore the death of Christ, beautiful as it is in the Gospel narrative, has seemed to assume an undue importance, as though it were an isolated phenomenon for a man to die in pursuit of a reform.

**Too Much Stress
 Laid on Death.**

"In my opinion far too much stress has been laid upon Christ's death, and far too little upon his life. That was where the true grandeur and the true lesson lay. It was a life which in those limited records shows us no trait which is not beautiful—a life full of easy tolerance for others, of kindly charity, of broad-minded moderation, of gentle courage, always progressive and open to new ideas, and yet never bitter to those ideas which he was really supplanting, though he did occasionally lose his temper with their more bigoted and narrow supporters. Especially one loves his readiness to get at the spirit of religion, sweeping aside the texts and the forms. Never had anyone such a robust common sense or such a sympathy for weakness. It was this most wonderful and uncommon life, and not his death, which is the true centre of the Christian religion."

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REPORTS ON IRON SMELTING IN PROVINCE

Dr. Stansfield of McGill Investigates Conditions and Makes Suggestions — Points Out Difficulties.

Dr. Alfred Stansfield of McGill University who some little time ago investigated the smelting conditions for iron ore in this province has handed in his report to the Provincial Government, which summarized is as follows:

1. The three most essential requirements are: Iron ore, electric power and charcoal or similar material. In the coast districts of British Columbia there is a sufficient quantity of suitable iron ore conveniently located, water powers available for the development of electrical energy, and waste wood for sawmills for the production of charcoal.

2. Having regard to the present market for pig iron and the probable price for this material during the next few years, it appears that the iron ore, electric power and charcoal could be produced sufficiently cheaply for the commercial smelting of iron ores in electrical furnaces.

3. The development of a water power is, however, a long and costly operation and one which it would be highly inadvisable to undertake at the present time. For present operations, therefore, we are dependent on the purchase of electric power from the power companies.

4. It appears that one of these companies has a sufficient amount of unused electric power, but it is asking a higher price for this power than the industry can bear.

Power Development.

5. In view of the original cost of development, it would appear that the company would afford to offer the power at a decidedly lower price, but it should be remembered that the company just keeps a reserve of power for other purposes and that it cannot, at present, afford to maintain this reserve by undertaking fresh development.

6. A new process is now being investigated by means of which it may be possible to produce electric furnace pig iron commercially in spite of the high price charged for electric power.

Additional Products.

7. In view of the small demand for pig iron in British Columbia it would be almost essential, if a smelting plant is to be established on an economic basis, that additional products shall be turned out. Steel for castings and small rolled sections, and ferro alloys such as ferro manganese, ferro chrome and ferro silicon, could be made suitably in such a plant. These additional products would permit of more economical operation, would enable larger profits to be made, and would allow the plant to continue in profitable operation if at any time the price of pig iron were to fall below the cost of production.

Recommendations.

In view of the present situation it appears advisable:

- (a) To develop one or more of the best iron ore deposits and to make complete tests of the ore.
- (b) To reserve a suitable water power for future development.
- (c) To establish a plant for the economic production of charcoal from mill waste.
- (d) To investigate the new process for the production of electric pig iron, and if this is found satisfactory to begin immediately to produce pig iron; purchasing power for this purpose until the water power can be developed.

Summary.

Summing up his conclusions, Professor Stansfield says: "In view of the abnormal prices of products and supplies and the high cost and uncertainty of labor it is almost impossible at the present time to arrive at any reliable conclusions with regard to the commercial side of a new industry. The high prices obtainable for iron and steel make the present time appear suitable for undertaking the production of these materials, but the increased cost of supplies and of labor largely neutralize this advantage. If it seemed probable that war prices would return in the course of a year or two we might base our calculations on this assumption, but in view of the profound change that is taking place

In the position of labor, it seems unlikely that wages will ever return to their original level. One effect of this will be that the prices of supplies and products will all reach correspondingly higher figures.

New Process.

We may therefore expect, with the present methods of electric smelting, that the industry would be successful commercially, but that it would depend ultimately on the production of special qualities of iron and steel, and would be unable to compete with the blast furnaces in the production of ordinary grades of pig iron. If, however, the new process for the reduction of iron ores is found to be satisfactory it should produce a decided improvement in the commercial status of electric smelting."

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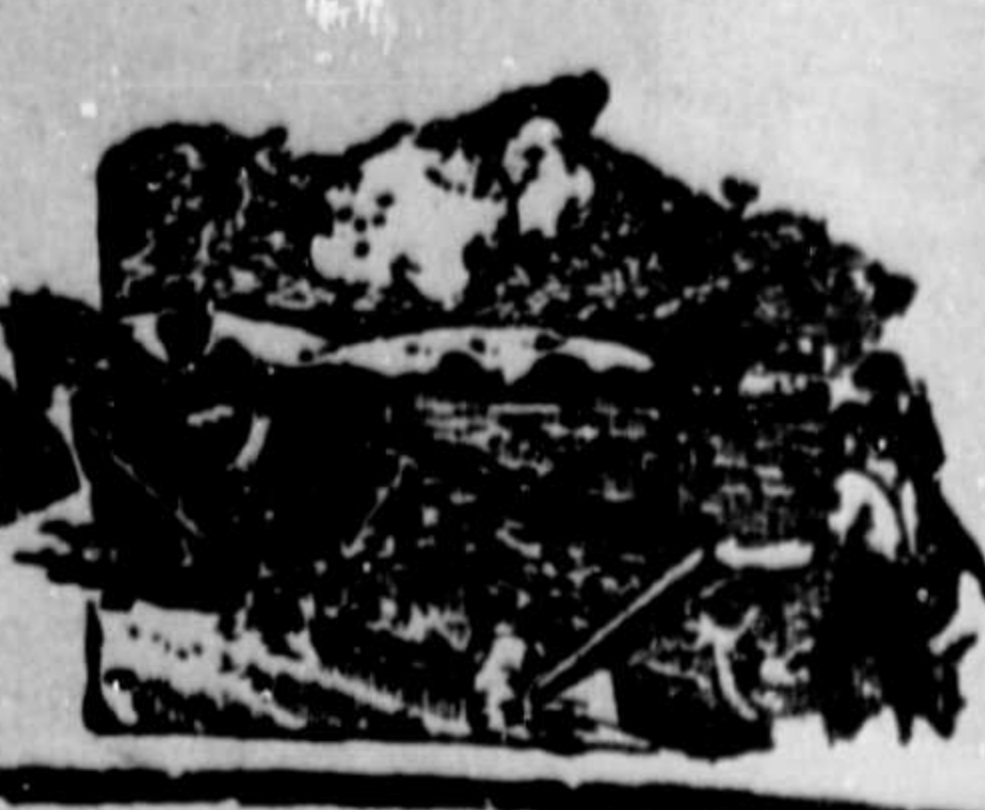

War to Peace



Demobilizing Canada's Army

THE actual work of bringing back our soldiers to Canada and getting them out of khaki is in the hands of the Department of Militia and Defence. Complete plans have been made and machinery organized to handle the work. Every detail has been considered. The plan is harmonious and will work smoothly. It is described here. Notice how every contingency has been considered. How the soldier is cared for at every step. How everything is done for his comfort and to inform his waiting relatives and friends.

From France to England.

Peace is not yet signed. The victorious Canadian Corps is still a fighting unit. But as fast as the situation permits the Canadian Corps in France will be returned to Canada by units allotted, as far as possible, to the areas from which they came. These units will be reconstructed so as to include only men desirous of returning to the area to which the unit has been allotted.

The remainder of the Canadian forces overseas will be returned in drafts of 500 men for each area. Married men first, according to length of service. Then single men, according to length of service.

Preparing to Leave England.

Canada has been divided into 22 dispersal areas for demobilization, with a dispersal station for each.

1. The province of Prince Edward Island—Charlottetown.
2. The province of Nova Scotia—Halifax.
3. One half of New Brunswick—Moncton.
4. One half of New Brunswick—St. John.
5. The north country of Quebec down to Three Rivers—Quebec.
6. The remainder of Quebec—Montreal.
7. The Ottawa Valley and Ontario down to the Thousand Islands—Ottawa.
8. The Kingston district west to Oshawa and north to the Madawaska River—Kingston.
9. The Toronto district north to the French River and the north mining country—Toronto.
10. The Niagara Peninsula—Hamilton.
11. Southern Ontario—London.
12. From White River to the Lake of the Woods—Port Arthur.
13. All of Manitoba except the Brandon territory—Winnipeg.
14. The Brandon territory—Brandon.
15. Southern Saskatchewan—Regina.
16. Northern Saskatchewan—Saskatoon.
17. Southern Alberta—Medicine Hat.
18. From Calgary north to Nordegg—Calgary.
19. Northern Alberta—Edmonton.
20. All of British Columbia except 21 and 22—Vancouver.
21. Vancouver Island and the immediate mainland—Victoria.
22. Cariboo, Kootenay and Gale—Revelstoke.

Each soldier overseas chooses the dispersal area in Canada to which he wishes to go.

A report of the number of men for each dispersal area is cabled to Militia Headquarters.

As fast as they can be absorbed by the dispersal areas—a cable is sent to England for drafts.

Prior to sailing, a cable is sent from England stating how many men are coming and giving their occupations.

In this way arrangements are made to handle the men, to care for them, and to find employment for them.

Before a man leaves England he is medically examined, his discharge papers and other documents are made out. All delay in Canada over these details is avoided.

On the Ship.

The transport staff check the medical and pay documents. The Y.M.C.A. provides recreation and entertainment. Twenty-four hours before arrival in Canada a wireless is sent to the port giving details of any men who are sick and in need of hospital care, and general information that will ensure speedy transport from boat to train.

Wounded Men.

Wounded men are brought

back on hospital ships in the care of Army Medical Corps. They are taken on hospital trains to the various military hospitals and are in charge of the military authorities until medical treatment is complete.

In Port.

Halifax and St. John, are the ports of disembarkation in winter. Quebec and Montreal will also be used in summer. Immediately upon arrival of troops, the officer commanding wires a list to the Soldiers' Aid Commission in each province who notify the men's relatives. He also wires the Dispersal Station to prepare to handle a certain number of men. A third wire is sent to the general officer commanding each military district, through whom the dispersal station is again notified. This gives the dispersal station a double check.

Various voluntary organizations and the citizens of Halifax, St. John, Quebec and Montreal all give soldiers every assistance. Canteens and club rooms are open. Coffee and cigarettes are provided. Telegrams are sent for the men.

A permanent transportation committee of railroad experts, representing the C.P.R., the G.T.R., and the Canadian National Railways, arrange for special trains to meet every transport.

On the Train.

Troop trains consist of colonist, tourist, commissariat, standard sleeping and dining cars. A Y.M.C.A. representative is on every train.

Should a stop-over or delay become unavoidable, the men are provided for. Barracks and an ample food supply are available at the following divisional points: Halifax, Amherst, St. John, Mount Joli, Levis, Megantic, Quebec, Montreal, Cochrane, North Bay, Port Arthur, Winnipeg, Brandon, Regina, Calgary, Edmonton, Revelstoke, Vancouver.

At the Dispersal Station.

The principal city in each area is the dispersal station. When the troop train pulls in, the relatives and friends of the men have been notified and are on hand. Voluntary organizations have motor cars at the station. Municipal reception committees are also on hand.

In each city the military have provided every accommodation for men staying overnight—barracks, rations. Out-of-town men who are given overnight leave and do not wish to remain in barracks can find the best of accommodation at hostels provided by voluntary organizations.

The Discharge.

Men taken sick en route are immediately received by the District Depot for medical treatment and receive pay as part of that unit.

All other men are paraded at the dispersal station. The offices here are so arranged that each man can pass quickly from one to the other and get away in the shortest time.

First comes the ordnance office. Here the men turn in their equipment, except steel helmets and clothing, which they are allowed to keep.

Next is the office of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment. Here each man is given advice and information on the many questions relating to his return to civil life—employment, housing, vocational training, medical treatment.

Men who are unfit for their former employment are taken on the strength of the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment for vocational training. They are paid during this period and their dependents receive separation allowance.

Third is the paymaster's office. Here the men receive their back pay, clothing allowance of \$35.00 and first month's War Service Gratuity.

Finally the officer commanding issues each man his discharge certificate, and in the same office is a railway ticket agent who gives each man a ticket to his home town. The man is now a civilian.

Here also is an information and complaint office. All complaints are dealt with and information given by an officer specially chosen for that purpose.

The dispersal station will supply quarters and meals for men until train time.

The Government's care for the soldier does not end when he passes through the dispersal station. The important work of other departments will be covered in reports immediately following this.

First of Prince Rupert Halibut Schooners Gets 25,000 lbs. Other Arrivals.

The Agnes B., first of the Canadian fleet which left Prince Rupert within the last two or three weeks, arrived here yesterday with 25,000 lbs. of halibut, which was sold to the Royal Fish Company at 18c. for No. 1's and 17 1/2 for No. 2's.

The Caygeon arrived in port last night with 500 lbs of halibut. She reported a very rough trip.

The Haysport No. 1 arrived in port from the Queen Charlotte Islands, where she was on the rocks for some time. She had to throw away about 10,000 pounds of fish.

The steam trawler G. E. Foster arrived in on Saturday with 50,000 lbs. of mixed ground fish and the James Carruthers brought in about 30,000 lbs. this morning.

DEMOBILIZATION.

Cape town, South Africa, Jan. 20.—The South African Government's demobilization scheme contains important provisions regarding unemployment. Discharged soldiers who cannot find employment may enlist in the South African Defence force, remaining there until employment is found for them.
