Prohibition Probe Is Checked

CHIEF JUSTICE HUNTER DECLARES ROYAL COMMISSION ON LIQUOR IRREGULARITIES IS ILLEGAL

Findlay Goes Free as Result of Finding ; Creation of Commission Violates the Fundamental Principle of Criminal Law and Procedure in British Jurisprudence.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, January 23.—Holding as a "fatal objection" that the commission was in violation of an Imperial statute passed in the reign of Charles I abolishing the Star Chamber and affirming that it was a violation of fundamental principles of criminal procedure, Chief Justice Hunter, in a judgment given late this afternoon, declared that the Royal Commission appointed by the Provincial Government to investigate the illegal trafficking in intoxicants in British Columbia, was "issued without lawful authority."

The status of the commission, over which Mr. Justice Clement presided, was raised on behalf of A. L. Gartshore, who refused to answer a subpoena to appear and give evidence.

One of its results will be the release from jail of W. C. Findlay, former prohibition commissioner for the province, who was committed into custody for contempt when he refused to testify before the commission.

The creation of the commission, the Chief Justice summed up, violated two of the fundamental principles of criminal law and procedure "which are the main safeguards of persons being proceeded against. These were, that no man was compelled to accuse himself, and that every man was assumed innocent until proven guilty."

ONE OF WHISKEY IS DISCOVERED BY CONSTABLE BAILEY

John Candow Fined \$75.50 After Pleading Guilty to Charge of Having Whiskey in His Possession.

John Candow had to appear in the Police Court this morning before Magistrate Carrs on a charge of storing whiskey in a public place. Thirty-three bottles of booze were found by Constable Bailey in the room of the accused at the Royal Hotel under floor. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$75.50.

Constable Bailey gave evidence of having gone to Room 14 yesterday afternoon. He noticed some loose boards in the floor, he removed them and was rewarded by finding the bottles snugly ensconced in the handy place ready for consumption. He seized the bottles and they have now been added to the considerable stock that is being stored at the police station.

ALASKA TRADE KEEPS UP WELL

Report for Month of December Shows Large Amount of Business.

Seattle, Jan. 23.—Nearly forty thousand seal skins were shipped during December from the Pribilof Islands, valued at something like a million dollars. Fox skins from the same islands to the value of nearly \$60,000 were sent south.

Fish meal is one of the new products of the northern canneries. During December this product was shipped, the value being set at about \$18,000.

The copper shipments for the month amounted to about four and a quarter million dollars, the mineral coming chiefly from the Kennecott and Latouche properties. Marble worth about \$14,000 was shipped from Tokeen and there was considerable gold bullion and gold and silver ore sent to Seattle and other points.

EMPRESS OF ASIA DUE ON SATURDAY

Many Canadians, Including Some From Prince Rupert, Expected on the Steamer.

Victoria, Jan. 23.—The C. P. R. steamship Empress of Asia is reported due here January 25. She is coming from Europe by way of the Panama Canal and has on board a large number of western Canadian troops.

WASHINGTON STRIKERS ASK ENDORSEMENT OF THEIR ACTIONS

Seattle, Jan. 23.—Delegates from the Metal Trades Council, more than 25,000 of whose members are on strike in Washington shipyards, are to appear before the Central Labor Council tonight to ask endorsement of the strike. Officers of the Metal Trades Council declined to say whether they would seek the calling of a general strike in sympathy. The metal trade strike is for a wage scale allowing \$8, \$7, and \$6 for mechanics, helpers and laborers respectively.

SOPHIA INQUIRY

Victoria, Jan. 23.—The inquiry into the Sophia disaster is to be continued on Thursday of next week when several American witnesses are supposed to give evidence.

IMMENSE SUM IS RAISED BY BOND ISSUE

Over Billion and a Half Pounds Subscribed to British Loan Before Close Saturday.

London, Jan. 23.—Subscriptions to the national war bonds reached and passed a total of £1,600,000,000 before the close on Saturday last. The Bank of England figures now available show that during the final week of the issue applications were made for £102,928,202, making a grand total for the Bank of England issue of applications of £1,549,605,915. To this has been added £50,986,240 subscribed through the postoffice. There is realized by national war bonds £1,600,592,055.

SINN FEIN PARLIAMENT IS ONLY ONE-DAY SENSATION; TIPPERARY IS PROCLAIMED

CRIMES ACT NOW ENFORCED IN TIPPERARY AND CLARE, AND STRICT CENSORSHIP ENFORCED—TWO POLICEMEN KILLED AND EXPLOSIVES ARE TAKEN

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Dublin, January 23.—The Sinn Fein parliament provided only a one-day sensation. Its members held a brief meeting at the Mansion House yesterday afternoon, but behind closed doors. Afterwards Count Plunkett told reporters that a statement of the business transacted would be furnished to the press later, thus following the precedent of the Paris conference.

A group of a hundred young men gathered outside in secret session but no excitement of any kind was shown. The public

were far more interested in the murder of two policemen in Tipperary on Tuesday at the time parliament was meeting. This is taken to signify the beginning of a new period of terrorism, which the veteran Irish politicians will include in their assassinations and attempts to destroy the government buildings and public works. **Policeman Shot.**

Extremists are exceedingly anxious to get explosives. Two policemen were guarding a cartload of gelignite which was being taken to a mine when they were surrounded by masked men. The policemen were shot dead and the explosives carried off. The im-

mediate sequel was a proclamation placing Tipperary under the Crimes Act, which means a regime much like the occupied German cities are undergoing.

All meetings are prohibited and nobody can pass in or out of the district without permits. None of the residents may be out of doors after seven o'clock in the evening without a permit. No letter may pass in or out without censorship.

Enough troops were quickly sent into the district to enforce these regulations. Clare district was recently proclaimed under the "Crimes Act" and the measure was enforced with apparent success.

SUPREME COUNCIL UNITES TO BRING PEACE AMONG ALL FACTIONS IN RUSSIA

JOINT COMMISSION TO LAY DOWN FOUR CONDITIONS, PEACE, ELECTIONS, FREE TRADE AND PAYMENT OF DEBTS—MEETING SUGGESTED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, January 23.—The Supreme Council of Great Powers moved to unite the factions of distracted Russia and bring them into the Peace Congress, yesterday. They unanimously adopted a proposition brought forward by President Wilson, asking all Russian factions, including the Bolsheviks, to meet the allied and associated governments at Princess Islands, in the Sea of Mar- more on February 15, the contending factions meantime declaring a truce and suspending all military operations.

The joint Commission of Associated Governments will be announced as soon as the Russian factions accept the proposal, which was communicated to them by wireless tonight. The Russian commission will proceed to the meeting place, probably on a warship, by way of the Black Sea and Bosphorus.

Besides the definite proposal, as given in the communique, the Joint Commission of Associated Powers will lay down four conditions indispensable in bringing about adjustment: First, peace at all points; second, removal of all economic barriers which restrain free circulation or exchange of food and commodities between factional zones and the outside world; third, general elections on a representative basis, and fourth, some adequate arrangement for the payment of debts.

Prince Rupert's
Rainfall Not Big.

The rainfall of Prince Rupert last year was only 86 inches. That is official and should silence those who try to make out that it rains all the time here. The rainfall in Vancouver is not quite as much as that but it is very heavy. In Vancouver they have more fog and dull weather than we have here. In Victoria there is scarcely thirty inches of rain and in the summer months the place is often parched and the people wishing for a shower. It is impossible to get everything. The climate here compares very favorably with the forty degrees below zero that occurs so often in the winters on the prairies.

Shipbuilders
On Way Here.

The shipbuilding magnates are on their way to Prince Rupert. They are expected to arrive before the end of next week and to at once lay out the work for preparing the shipbuilding slips and other work in connection with the laying down of the million dollar plant for the shipbuilding operations here. That is what we have been looking for. It will now be for everyone to work together, not to get all the temporary gain possible but to build up the city and make it a good place in which to live.

Dominions Are
Independent Nations.

The Dominion of Canada is independent insofar as making her own laws is concerned, and in everything except in regard to treaty making with other nations, and even in that her wishes are always regarded. She is just as much a nation as Denmark or Belgium or Switzerland and perhaps a good deal more so than either. The proposal that she should have representation in a league of nations seems reasonable. The fact that we entertain and pay a salary to a prominent person from Great Britain to act as our social mentor should not debar us from our just rights when it comes to settling the political future of the world.

Great Preparations
For Fishing Here.

There are great preparations going forward for the opening of the fishing season. All along the waterfront there is the sound of hammer and saw as the launches are being licked into shape for the real work of the year. A number of people from the prairies have been looking for boats with the idea of engaging in the industry and all those who were fishing last year will be out again. There will be no idle boats.

Some of the fishermen have put in new engines in order to increase their speed and thus increase the catch. Others have bought larger boats and in some cases will operate more than one. Everything tends to the belief that the season will be the biggest that has yet been reached at this port.

Tariff Question
Still a Live One.

That some of the Canadian manufacturers are not satisfied with the limited Canadian market but are anxious to invade the United States is a new phase to the tariff question, which has not previously been a factor. Manufacturers here have outgrown their swaddling clothes and are anxious for a chance to compete in the markets of the world and especially in the nearest markets, which are those directly to the south. The question is asked why the manufacturers of Windsor, Ontario, should have to find a market two thousand miles away when there is one within a few miles if only the unnatural barrier were removed. As a matter of fact Canadians are getting a world vision far beyond the petty provincialism of former days.

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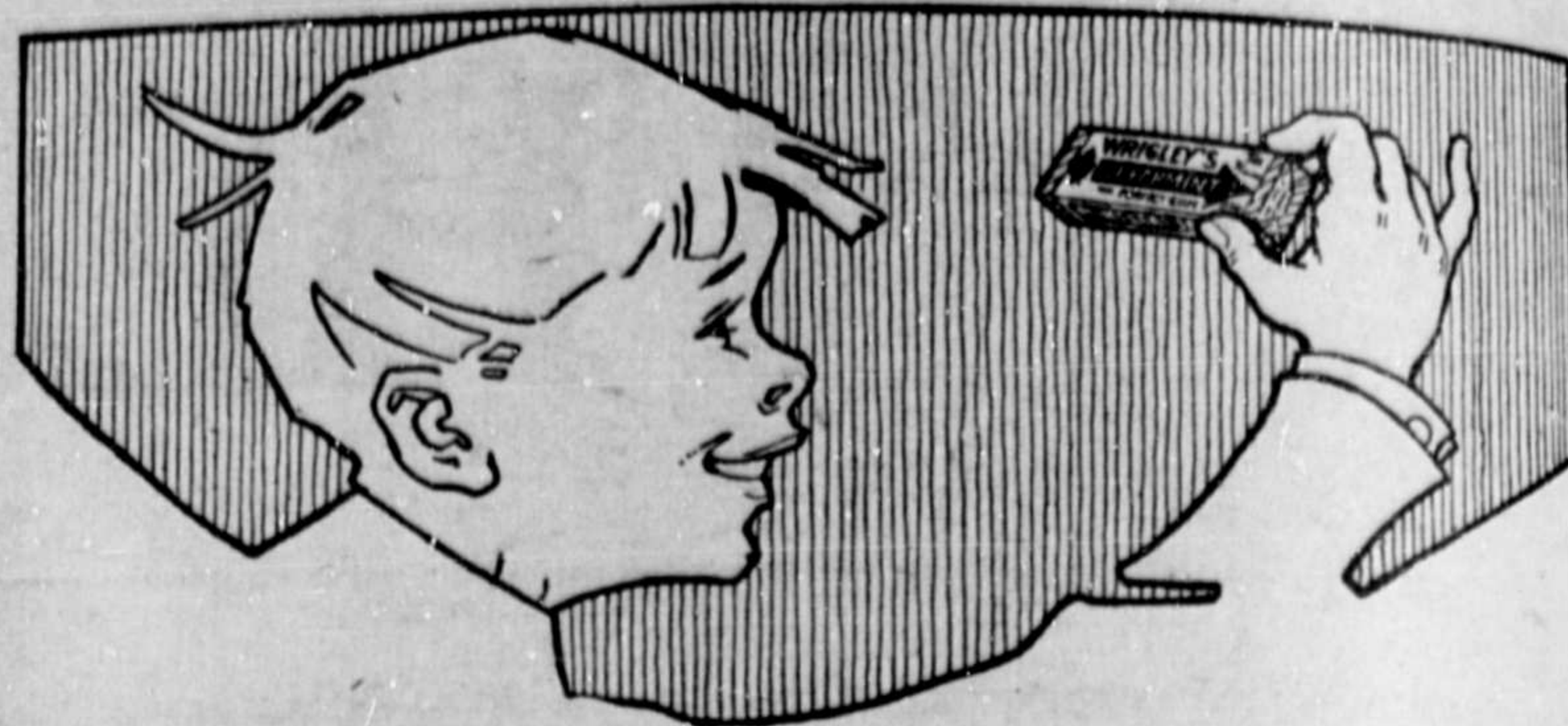
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REPATRIATION IS RECEIVING MUCH ATTENTION

Various Services Being Mobilized In Order to Serve Men Who Are Returning.

Ottawa, January 23.—The Repatriation Committee is the busiest committee in Ottawa. H. J. Daly, Director of Repatriation, is an outstanding figure in the business and industrial life of Canada and is bringing to the discharge of his duties efficient methods and a comprehensive grasp of the fact that the demobilization of our soldiers and the readjustment of industrial conditions is the most vital task that can engage the activities of the Government and the energies of individual citizens.

The first work is to get the soldiers home. There are two methods of demobilization. The fighting corps will be brought back as units under their own officers. Some reorganization will occur to ensure that each unit shall as far as possible, be composed of men from the same locality. The remainder of the Canadian army will be demobilized in standard drafts of 500 men.

War Services Gratuity.

There is no post discharge pay now. What was known as post discharge pay is now called "war services gratuity."

The Department of Labor, in its scheme of a single employment agency from one end of Canada to the other, is setting up employment offices in the urban centres with a population of 10,000 or more, and in the smaller places where the need for one exists. The plan calls for 64 offices throughout Canada, of which twenty are already in existence.

This scheme provides for opportunities for employment, mobility of employment, and for expansion of employment on behalf of the returned man.

Each local employment office will be in charge of a superintendent with a staff of interviewers, record clerks, stenographers and others.

Salesmen.

In addition, there will be attached to each office a number of salesmen. This is a remarkable innovation in handling the question of labor. These men will be constantly out among the business men of the district, striving to sell them the services of the office, and encouraging them to use the employment office exclusively for their labor needs.

Advisory Council.

Another interesting feature, following British experience, is the Advisory Council of Employers and Employees, in connection with each local office.

Such a representative body, giving aid to the superintendent, will prove indispensable, especially when a strike or lock-out is declared, or is impending.

At the winter ports of disembarkation, governmental and voluntary organizations do everything possible to care for the returned men. Women and children dependents of the soldiers are specially cared for. At St. John there is a women's reception committee composed of representatives of fifteen local organizations which work in conjunction with two secretaries of the national Y.M.C.A. Halifax has a Creche Committee, consisting of eleven women who have been active in local war work. Every assistance is given returning men at both ports. Children are cared for, baggage is located, sandwiches, hot tea and coffee are provided.

There is a Red Cross nurse on each committee to give assistance to either women or children who require her assistance. First aid supplies and extra clothing for babies are always on hand.

Emergency Work.

There is an emergency hospital with accommodation for thirty women at each port, as well as a room where babies can be cared for during the wait between boat and train. Any woman requiring monetary assistance receives a gift of the amount necessary from the Canadian Patriotic Fund. In cases of sickness provision has been made with the local hospitals.

Each train carrying unaccompanied women and children has on board a graduate nurse, whose

salary and travelling expenses are paid by the Canadian Red Cross Society. This nurse has been selected and enrolled by the Canadian Graduate Nurses' Association.

Receptions.

Adequate arrangements are being made to receive women and children at their home stations, to extend to them such temporary hospitality as may be necessary, and to do everything possible to see that they are established in comfortable homes. Several organizations may desire to do parts of this work, but it was found advisable to name one Dominion-wide organization to become responsible for the efficient performance of these functions.

Arrangements have been made for the Canadian Patriotic Fund to accept this responsibility and to supervise the arrangements for the welfare of the returning dependents of the soldiers. In order to carry out this important duty in the best possible way, it is necessary that all other organizations should co-operate.

PRAIRIE VISITOR IS VERY PLEASED WITH THE WINTER HERE

Mr. and Mrs. Wilson of Clan William, 40 miles north of Brandon on the C.N.R. arrived in Prince Rupert from Edmonton last Sunday night on their way south. They have been taking a trip around the country this winter and are homeward bound now.

"This is the finest winter I have seen for a long, long time," says Mr. Wilson, "hardly any snow to speak of and very mild." The coldest spell, which was at New Years, was 36 degrees below zero, but was above zero the rest of the time, quite remarkable for the prairie provinces, as a rule it averages between 40 and 50 below zero most of the winter.

The harvest was splendid last year in his district, all except the hay crop, which was very scarce on account of a dry summer. Oats averaged 75 bushels per acre, barley 37 bushels per acre and wheat 35 bushels. He expects a good crop this coming year, as the ground was put into good shape last fall by heavy rainfalls and the snow immediately covering the soil.

Mr. Wilson has about 400 acres under cultivation, and quite close to the railroad. He was surprised to see the abundance of vegetable growth in Prince Rupert, and "if it was only drained," he says, "it would raise some very excellent vegetables."

War to Peace

As soon as a soldier is discharged from the army his first concern is to find a job. He may not find a job at once. During his period of unemployment he will however be in receipt of his War Service Gratuity.

Before the Armistice was signed "post discharge pay" was granted to discharged soldiers. Upon the signing of the Armistice it was felt necessary to make certain changes.

A larger grant will now be made to all who have served at the front whether discharged before or after the Armistice. Those who were on active service on the date of the Armistice, but had not served at the front, will also receive a gratuity on a higher scale.

The War Service Gratuity is given over and above any "back pay," pension or clothing allowance to which a man may be entitled.

It is given in addition to all the care, attention and service which the Government will devote in order to restore our fighting men to civil life.

To Whom Awarded.

All soldiers discharged on or after November 11th, 1918, who have served with good conduct will receive War Service Gratuity according to their class.

Soldiers discharged before November 11th, 1918, will receive War Service Gratuity only if they served at the front in any actual theatre of war.

If a soldier discharged before November 11th, 1918, did not serve in an actual theatre of war he will be entitled only to post discharge pay—according to his class on the old scale.

The Amount of the Gratuity.

The gratuity consists of a continuation of a soldier's pay, field allowance and separation allowance for a period beyond his discharge.

This period is graded according to the length and character of service.

If his service has been in part overseas his gratuity is figured on a higher scale than that of the man who has served only in Canada.

The maximum gratuity for the man

who has served overseas is six months. This is given to the man whose total service amounts to three years or more.

Three months gratuity is the maximum for the man who has served in Canada only, and it is given for three years' service.

If the monthly pay and allowances for a man whose dependents have been receiving separation allowance should be less than \$100 he is given \$100 per month as gratuity. A part of the gratuity equal to separation allowance will be paid direct to the dependent entitled to it.

If the monthly pay and allowances for a man without such dependents should amount to less than \$70.00 he is to receive \$70.00 per month.

Further, every gratuity granted will amount to at least one month's pay, field allowance and separation allowance.

When Payable.

Men who have already been discharged will be given the gratuity to which they are entitled (less any "post discharge pay" they have received) after February 1st, 1919.

Application for an adjustment must be made to the paymaster of the district from which the soldier was discharged. The necessary forms to be filled out in support of each claim for adjustment may be obtained from the military headquarters of each district, from district and unit paymasters and from officers commanding militia units.

Men who are still in the service will receive their first month's gratuity immediately upon their discharge—unless they are "boarded" to receive treatment and full pay and allowances from the Department of Soldiers Civil Re-Establishment.

Men who are in the care of the Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment will get their gratuity as soon as they cease to receive full pay and allowances.

By this token Canada will record her appreciation of her soldiers and sailors—to a degree more generous than that shown by any other nation.

OFFER IS MADE TO LEASE DOCK FROM THE CITY

Wharf at Juneau Loses Money and Protective Association Wants it to Reduce Coal Prices.

Juneau (by mail). — An offer to lease the City Wharf was read to the City Council last evening in a communication presenting by Robert Kennedy, from the Consumers' Protective Association of which Judge H. B. LeFevre is the Secretary-Treasurer. The communication, which is as follows, was referred to the Wharf Committee, J. Connors, chairman, and a meeting is to be held at the City Hall next Tuesday evening between the committee and members of the Association:

"The Consumers' Protective Association, by authority of its entire membership, and through its Board of Directors, respectfully requests the Common Council of the City of Juneau, acting as a body, or through a committee appointed for the purpose, to enter into negotiations with the said Consumers' Protective Association, with a view to leasing to the said Association the City Dock of the City of Juneau.

"This proposal is prompted by the knowledge that the Consumers' Protective Association can by this means bring about a reduction in the exorbitant and unbearable price paid for coal and other commodities by the people of Juneau, and the main object of the proposal is to accomplish that result.

"The Association hopes to be able to arrive at a just charge for such a lease and, on its part, will agree, in addition to the payment of the rent to be stipulated, to the following:

"First—To keep the dock in good repair;

"Second—to keep the property insured in a proper sum, to be stipulated in the lease, and to be consistent with the value of the wharf and the present amount of insurance carried;

"Third—to operate the wharf in every respect as a public wharf the terms and conditions for the use of the wharf to be the same to all persons;

"Fourth—to maintain wharfage charges at the present figures or less; but such charges to be under no circumstances increased.

"The Association wishes to call attention to the fact that the mining companies in Juneau and vicinity take the position that the value of their ore bodies is such that there is a definite limit to the wages they can pay. In recent years and until the present time, wages paid elsewhere and in other industries have been greater than wages paid in Juneau. The only way to meet and equalize this condition is to adopt every consistent measure which will result in reducing the cost of living which would have the effect, of course, of increasing the value of the wages paid.

"If the dock is losing money, as has been reported, this will offer the city an opportunity to make interest on its investment."
