HAWTHORNTHWAITE ABJURES BOLSHEVIK MOVEMENT AS OPPOSED TO SOCIALISM

MEMBER FOR NEWCASTLE IS DISILLUSIONED AS RESULT
OF INTERVIEW WITH CATHERINE BRESHKOV-
SKAYA, THE "GRANDMOTHER OF THE
REVOLUTION" IN RUSSIA

Victoria, January 28.—"Traitor" and "Judas" were the epithets hurled at J. H. Hawthornthwaite, Socialist member for Newcastle, who, as the chief speaker at Sunday night's meeting at the Columbia Theatre, held under the auspices of the B. C. Federation of Labor, caused a riot in the local Socialist ranks. He, apparently, forsook his former stand in respect of the Bolshevik movement in Russia, and, on the authority of statements stated had been made to him when he on Saturday last interviewed Madam Catherine Breshkovskaya, the world-

amous "Grandmother of the Russian Revolution," who arrived in Victoria en route to New York, arrayed herself against the regime of Lenin and Trotsky, whom he branded "communistic anarchists" and a menace to the propagation of the real Socialistic doctrines, which, he averred, he subscribed.

The member for Newcastle's statements created considerable uproar from that element of the Socialistically inclined who have hitherto been pleased to believe that the Bolshevik movement in Russia has been a true Socialist movement, concerning which the "bourgeois" in other countries have permitted only such information to reach the outside world as would create an unfavorable impression to the end of control of the "wage slaves" may be maintained by the "capitalistic classes." The censoriousness of this element claims, has prevented the peoples of the world from judging events in Russia at their true value, and since Mr. Hawthornthwaite's quotation of Madam Breshkovskaya's statement found a considerable portion of his Sunday night audience disposed to doubt his word. In fact, some of the more heated members plainly told him they did not believe his statements. It appears, however, that Newcastle's member had the majority of the meeting with him.

Mixed Reception.

"I don't care if you believe me or not," declared Mr. Hawthornthwaite. "But I give you Madam's statement to me." He referred to his long record as a revolutionary Socialist, to her many years' imprisonment in Siberia because of her beliefs, and asserted, "When a woman like that tells me such things I will believe her until I have shown her statements are false. I was prepared to support the Bolshevik regime in Russia until I was shown it was wrong. I believe I was mistaken. Government in that country today is simply anarchy, communistic anarchy. The country is reeking with blood. If that is so, we Socialists cannot support such a movement."

Madam's statement to Mr. Hawthornthwaite, as he reported it to the meeting, was as follows:

The Statement.

"Russia must have adequate representation at the Peace Conference. The whole world must know of the terrible conditions which prevail in that great country. Help is needed; it is needed at this moment. The people are without food and without clothing. What necessities of life are left in the country are in the absolute possession of Lenin and his crowd. Lenin and his gang care not who suffers so long as they are provided for. Anybody who possesses anything, whether bourgeois or peasant, is mercilessly stripped of it by the criminal band which encompasses the government. The large majority of the peasantry are absolutely illiterate and with very few exceptions have never seen a map of their own country. If they did see it, scarcely one of them would know what it meant. They have no idea of their strength or their numbers. Just helpless in the hands of the present bureaucracy is their horrible plight. If they could only get a leader, a good leader, with one hundred thousand determined men, they could sweep the bloodstained Bolshevik oligarchy out of the country and establish a Socialist republic that could take its place among the civilized nations of the world."

Has Opposition.

When the member for Newcastle completed his address he was the target at which was hurled a volley of questions, denials and accusations. He declared Madam had told him when Lenin and Trotsky came into Russia the country was flooded with German gold and German propaganda.

"I believe Lenin is an insane man today," declared Mr. Hawthornthwaite, amid laughter, applause and general disturbance. "The Lenin-Trotsky forces are supported and aided by the gendarmes of the old regime, not by the working classes. A reaction is bound to occur and the old regime is hoping for it."

LEGISLATURE WILL OPEN ON THURSDAY

No Ceremonial This Year Because of the Death of Prince John; Members are Arriving.

Victoria, B. C., Jan. 28.—Preparations are well under way for the opening of the Legislature on Thursday afternoon. Owing to the death of Prince John there will be no ceremonial, the Governor entering the Legislative hall without any military or naval escort as is usual on such occasions. As soon as the Governor has read the speech and the house has been declared open the regular business will be proceeded with.

The Government has not as yet given out a forecast as to what its legislative program will be. It is understood, however, that there will be further measures dealing with provision for returned soldiers and unemployment. It is not expected that there will be very much legislative work but it is said that W. J. Bowser will have a good deal to say about the P. G. E. with a view to campaign material.

A number of the members are arriving in readiness for the session. John Keen, the Speaker of the Legislature, is on the ground and those wishing private legislation are busy seeking support from the members as they arrive. Among the latter is L. W. Patmore of Prince Rupert who is seeking a renewal of the charter for the Dolly Varden Railway at Alice Arm and is offering to pay the workmen and all bills for supplies if the charter is renewed. If there is no charter there will be no payment. It seems likely that some arrangement will be made.

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WHEAT IS SHIPPED FROM BULKLEY VALLEY TO VANCOUVER MILL

A carload of wheat was shipped from here this week to Vancouver to the flour mills, says the Omimera Miner. This was the first shipment of wheat from the North to a flour mill and it is an important event in the agricultural history of the Bulkley Valley. A few years ago there were plenty who ridiculed the idea of growing wheat that would make flour and most were sceptical as to the ability of the Valley to compete with the prairie grain. There were some faithful enthusiasts and they are proving their convictions.

There were several farmers contributed to the shipment but their grain all graded the same. F. M. Dockrill, who was the leading spirit in the undertaking, had previously sent a sample of his own grain to the Vancouver mills and it was graded No. 1 hard. The price set was also satisfactory and little time was lost in getting the different lots of grain ready.

Much interest has been displayed in this shipment and the result will determine the proportion of land to be put in wheat next spring.

There have also been rumors that a flour mill would be one of the enterprises started locally in the not distant future as an aid to the farmers and with a view to supplying local consumption with all mill products.

BAD WEATHER FOR FISHING

Two American Boats Come in With Small Catches; Tramps is Leaving.

Two American fishing boats, the Edsvold and the Alvild arrived in port late last night, from their fishing grounds on the west coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands. The Edsvold brought in 24,000 lbs. and the Alvild 18,000 lbs. of halibut. It was reported that there was good fishing where they were, but the severe weather prevented them getting big catches. It was the first trip of the season.

The steam trawler, Carruthers, of the Cold Storage Co., went to her fishing grounds about 9.30 this morning. On account of the rough weather she was forced to take the channel running by Metlakatla on her way out.

The fishing boat, "Tramp," of Prince Rupert was also preparing to go out some time today.

CITY COUNCIL AND TAXATION QUESTION

Scheme to Finance a Permanent Road to Seal Cove Being Worked Out By Engineer.

The question of taxation for permanent public works is engaging the attention of the City Council just now. Last night the matter was brought up by the mayor, who said it would take about five weeks before the new plan of making one local improvement district of the whole city was complete. The engineer was now working on it with a view to arranging for the building of a road to Seal Cove. The assessment values and charges against each property was being worked out.

Alderman Casey said that so far as he could gather, the people in the outlying districts were opposed to the scheme as they felt that most of the improvements would be made in Sections 1 and 6 and that this was a scheme to shift the burden.

The mayor said there was also strong opposition to the scheme developing in Section 1. That was why he was hopeful that some settlement would be found. If the sections were both opposed to it now, there was hope that the problem might be solved. They could get a report on the scheme and also on the grouping of outside sections and discuss both on their merits.

H. C. Nunan, manager for the Atlin Fisheries at this port, has been promoted to the position of manager of the New England Fisheries at Ketchikan where there is a cold storage plant. Both concerns are branches of the New England Fish Co.

Mr. Nunan had been here for a number of years and was well known and respected, not only by the fishermen but by the citizens generally. He had been on a visit to the head office and returned yesterday, going right on to Ketchikan to take charge of the new work.

Mr. Nunan's successor is James Lee who has been connected with the company here for a number of years. He also is well and favorably known and his friends will be glad to hear that he has received the well earned promotion.

The Atlin Fisheries have a warehouse here where they buy halibut, pack it in ice and ship it fresh to the eastern markets. They have been established for a number of years and do a large business.

Good Times Coming For the West.

The Daily News has been talking optimistically for some time and now other journals are getting the same idea and telling it. The latest number of the Winnipeg and Western Grocer has an article on the growth of the West which is worth reading, and in doing so it must be remembered that what applies to Vancouver is true in even greater measure of Prince Rupert, the capital of the north country. The article is as follows:

"There is very little doubt that as soon as immigration gets right into its stride, Western Canada is going to benefit to a far greater extent than the East. This is exemplified in many ways. The class of people who are destined to make up the new settlers in Canada are those who are attracted by a new country, a country from which the frontier life is not altogether absent and in which the spirit of adventure may have some little scope.

"In the big cities of Britain, the talk has been principally of Western Canada. Winnipeg looms large in the minds of Old Country people and the attractions of Vancouver, with its climate and environment, are held in no trifling esteem. The intervening territory also has its votaries and will, without a doubt, absorb a large share of the newcomers.

Population of West Will Exceed the East.

"When we discuss this subject, however, it always seems to lead even further than the immediate future. If within the next year or so Western Canada is so highly favored as we have reason to believe she will be, the natural conclusion at which any reasonable person will arrive is that, before very long, the population of the West will exceed that of the East. And this is exactly what many clear-sighted men believe.

"The records of the West have been so remarkable, the great things she has accomplished have been so wonderful, that it is small wonder the whole civilized world has had its eyes turned toward us, ever watching for some other sign of originality and development combined, and ever on the alert to step into the life of the West when opportunity seemed most favorable.

"The psychological or favorable moment has arrived. We have talked of the coming of this day for long enough and we have gone out of our respective ways to boost the West. But, were we really sincere? Did we really believe what we were saying? Are we still as enthusiastic as we were and are we prepared to continue the good work a little longer?

"In the first place, then, the bulk of the newcomers will come West. In the second place, with this desirable immigration, continuing for five years, a tremendous increase will be noticeable in our Western population. Add a few more years to that and it will surprise no one if the people settled West of the Great Lakes do not exceed those of the East.

"What a fruitful subject for discussion; what a magnificent prospect upon which to build a Western industrial edifice of unprecedented solidity.

Future Lies In Our Hands.

"We are the adventurous spirits, the pioneers of tomorrow. The future of the West lies as much in our hands as do our business affairs of today. Business organizations must develop if properly handled, and as they develop they will constantly reveal fresh possibilities to the spirit of enterprise.

"Western Canada will be just what we make it. We have the moulding of the future in our own hands. Let us all rise to our magnificent responsibilities and privileges and exercise a herculean effort to shake off that spirit of selfishness and self-aggrandisement which has been for far too long a characteristic of many Western people. Let us earnestly endeavor to eradicate those principles of graft and public dishonesty which have on so many occasions disgraced our public life and almost blighted our outlook.

"The future of the West, our West—your West—is one of the brightest in the whole history of the world. Never was there such a magnificent land in so well-prepared a state for incoming settlers and, we believe, never will such a magnificent land receive such a welcome from so desirable a class of settlers as those who, as we write these words, have their longing eyes turned Western Canada-wards."

Entertain the Prominent Visitors.

Now that the head of the new shipbuilding concern is on his way here it will be for the various public bodies to do their part in entertaining him. Newman Erb is expected within a few days and we shall have good notice of his arrival. There is now work for the Canadian Club, the Board of Trade, the Mayor and Council to do their part. The Labor organizations will also be interested in the matter. If there is a lunch or dinner arranged the presidents of the Trades and Labor Council and the Federation of Labor should be among the invited guests, and with prominent positions not far from the mayor of the city.

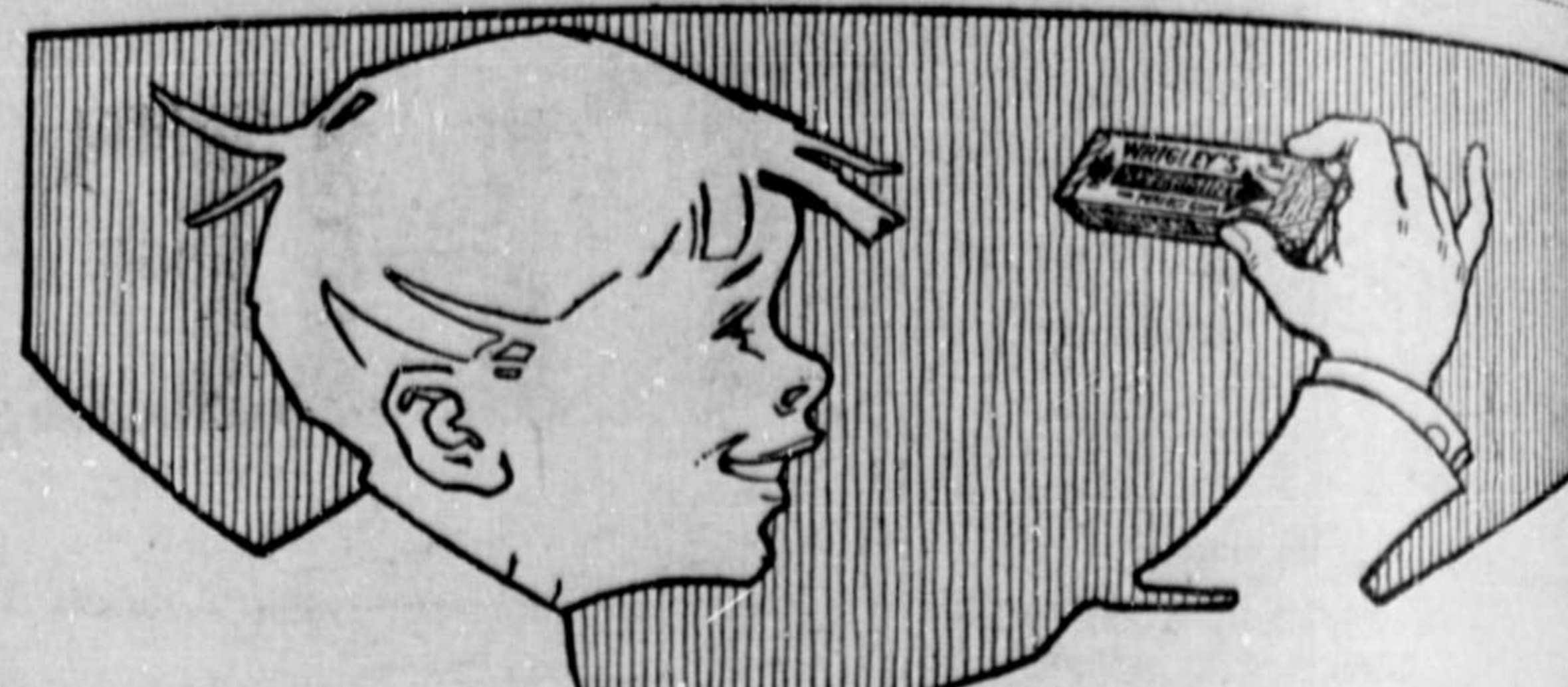

HEALTH CONDITION NOT SATISFACTORY

Chairman of Health Committee Makes Complaint and is Rebuked For Not Acting.

At the meeting of the City Council last night Alderman Casey drew attention to the fact that the sanitary inspector had not reported to the medical health officer and that there had been no milk testing done. He thought the inspector should meet the health officer once a week and discuss matters with him.

Alderman McRae inquired why it was that Alderman Casey, as chairman of the Health Committee, had not attended to the matter. It was the committee to look after health matters.

Alderman Casey said that the members of the committee had not turned up to hold a meeting and this was the first opportunity he had had of bringing it up.

Alderman Kirkpatrick suggested that the milk should be tested at least once a fortnight.

Alderman Perry thought it was a pity that the Health Committee did not meet and get busy. Many of the health conditions in the city were not satisfactory.

In the Letter Box

Appendicitis and Liquoritis.

To the Editor:—

Once upon a time the body became sick, and the pain was very severe. One after another its members said, "The cause is not in me." After careful examination the trouble was located in the appendix, and the surgeon said, "It must be removed." But the appendix raised a fearful howl, protesting that it was an outrage, and declaring its belief in "personal rights." If argued, "I am a member of this body, you have no right to deny my right to rot or do just as I please." The surgeon, however, was firm and replied, "The whole member is diseased. You are a menace to the other members. You are killing the whole body. There is only one course to pursue. You must be removed," and forthwith he proceeded to cut out tip and root the diseased and rotting member.

Objectors.

Much of the poverty, disease, trouble, insanity and crime in this country have been traced to liquor. For a long time the Canadian people suffered from "liquoritis." Mothers, business men, manufacturers, life insurance men, leaders in the army and navy, with one voice cried "cut it out." "Not so," says the liquor manufacturer. "I believe in personal rights." "Not so," says the liquor politician. "The liquor business furnishes me money for by campaigns, and helps to put me in office." "Not so," says the newspaper, grown wealthy on liquor advertisements, and fearful lest the feast be discontinued. "Don't dare to touch the liquor business." "Not so," says the liquor seller. "I am going to do better, I am going to reform. I believe in individual liberty. Don't touch me."

Longsuffering People.

And all this time the long-suffering body of the Canadian people, having endured the pain and loss and shame of this terrible evil, have cried out to Parliament, "Cut it out, and make a clean job of it." No institution has a right to exist that threatens the permanent welfare of the whole body. And the surgeon lifted his knife. A few months ago an order-in-council was passed that cut it out for the period of the war. It only remains for the people to see to it that by legislative enactment the job is made permanent.

THIRTY MILLIONS IN SOLDIERS' PENSIONS

Complete Organization to Handle Distribution in Order to Ensure Promptness.

One of the most important questions which has to be dealt with by the Government at Ottawa following the cessation of hostilities is that of pensions. Thirty million dollars will be distributed in pensions every year. In order that this money be distributed promptly, smoothly and fairly the Government has built up efficient machinery, and an organization headed by the Board of Pensions Commissioners, will put it in operation.

Not for Service.

Fifty thousand pensions already are being administered by the Board. Pensions, of course, are not gratuities. No pension is awarded for service only, but every soldier or sailor who has been disabled during service is entitled to and receives a pension. The amount of pension is determined by the percentage of disability—that is, the handicap of the soldier or sailor is determined by medical boards. The amount of money earned by a soldier or sailor before enlisting, or the money he may be able to earn upon his return to civil life, does not determine the amount of pension due him.

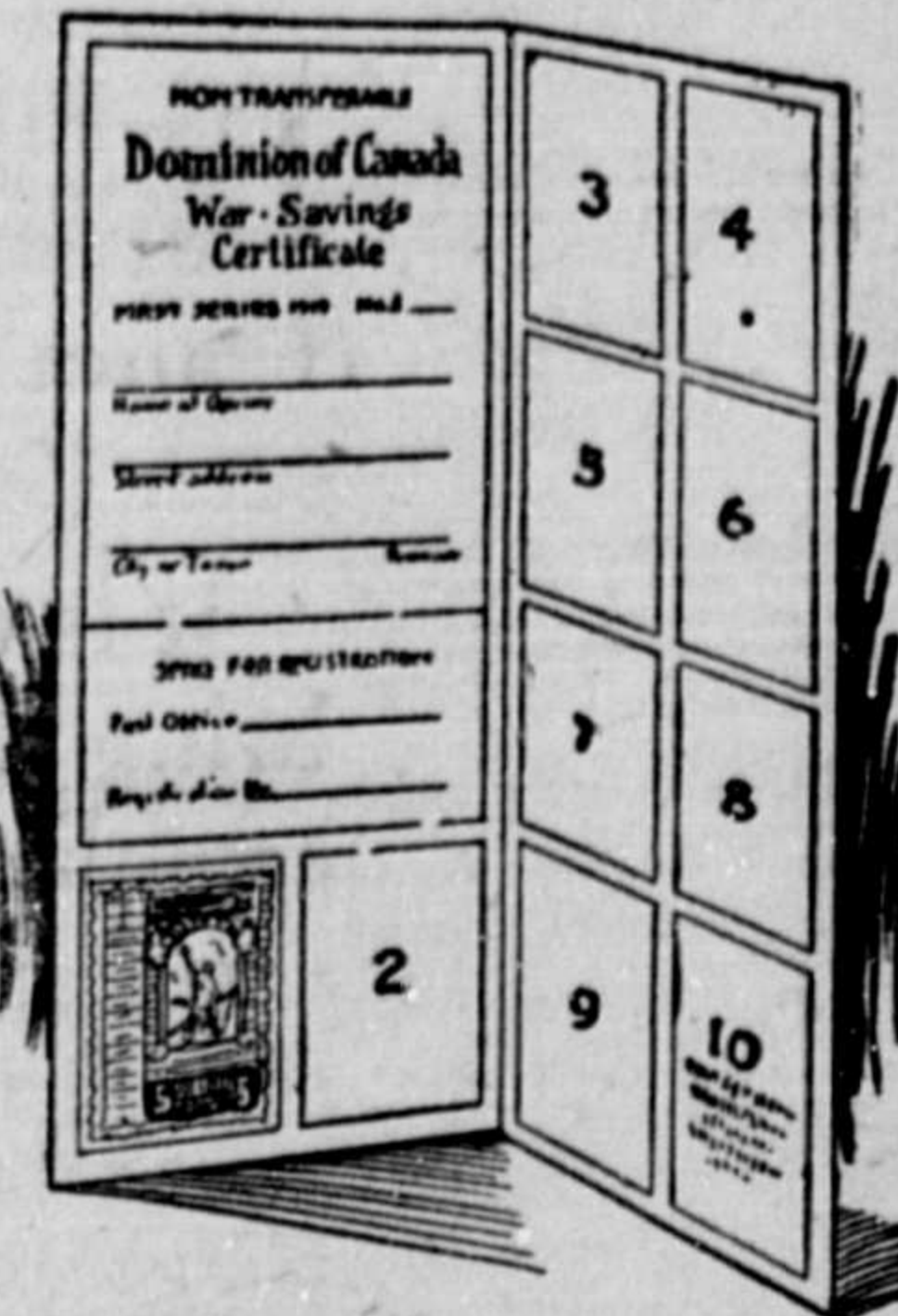
Information.

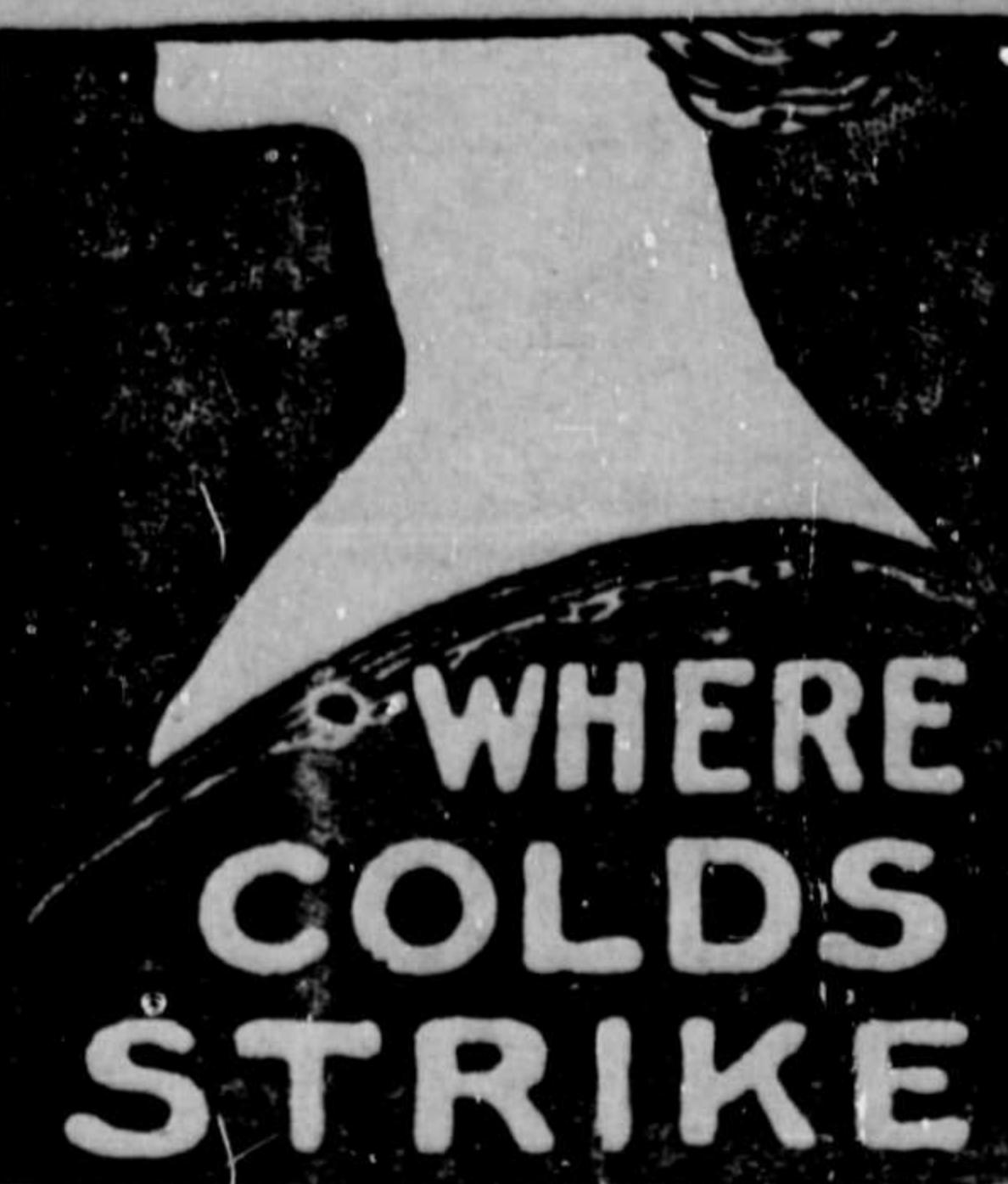

Famous Sessue Hayakawa Plays Part of English University Man on Coast of Africa.

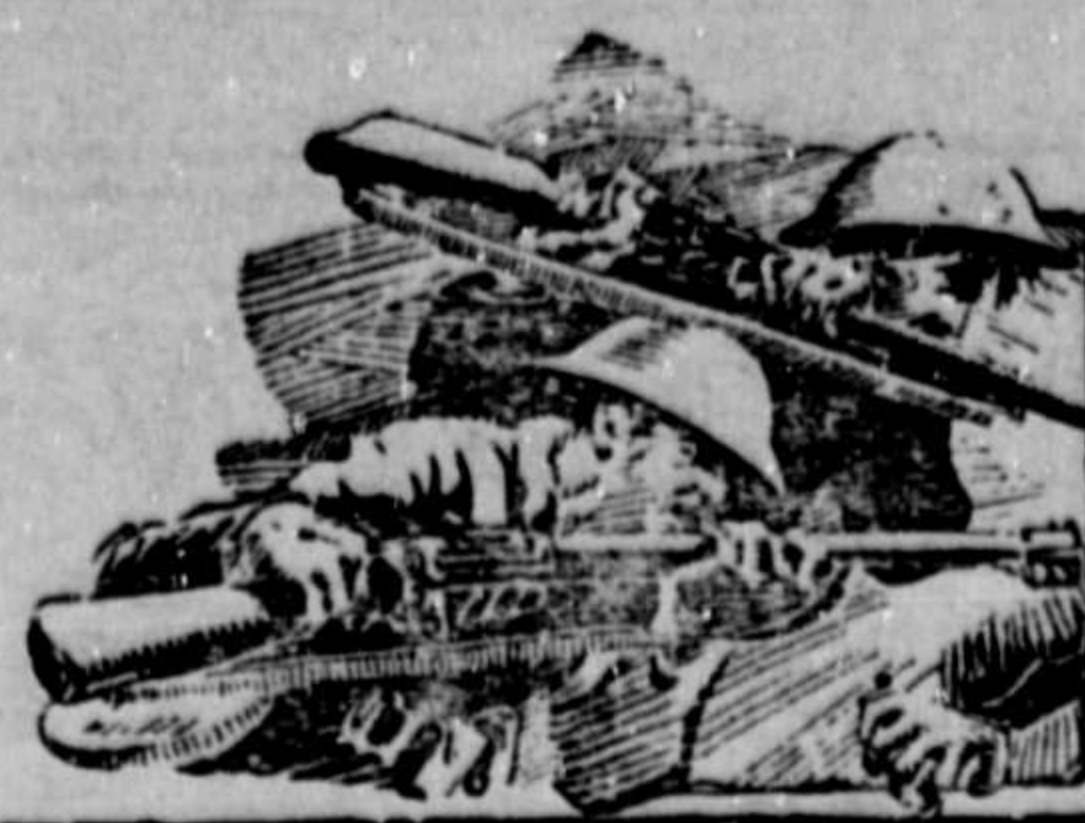

War to Peace



Bringing Our Soldiers' Dependents to Canada

IN England, there is a colony of Canadian women who went overseas in order to be near their husbands. There are also in England and France many women who married Canadian soldiers and have never seen Canada.

It is one of the duties that Canada has incurred through the war to bring back these dependents of our soldiers with all speed, and to help establish their home life.

Up till the time the Armistice was signed, some 22,000 women and children were returned. There still remain about 50,000 to be brought back.

These 50,000 soldiers' dependents will be returned to Canada at the public expense. Those who have already arrived in Canada since November 11th, 1918, will have their ocean and railway fare refunded by the Government.

The facilities for transporting soldiers and their dependents are limited to about 30,000 monthly. Therefore, women and children will be returned to Canada at the rate of about 5,000 to 7,000 each month. Many of the women will be accompanied by their husbands. On every boat carrying 200 or more unaccompanied women there is a Y.W.C.A. secretary.

At the Ports.

To these 50,000 returning women and children every care is being given. Until they reach the shores of Canada they are in charge of the Overseas Militia Department.

At HALIFAX they are welcomed by the Women's Reception Committee, composed of women who have been engaged in war activities. This committee has been organized for nearly two years and has been doing splendid work.

At ST. JOHN there is also a committee representing all the organizations interested. This committee, although more recently formed, is giving excellent service. The National Y.W.C.A. has assigned two secretaries for work at this port.

On each of these Committees there is a trained nurse to give necessary attendance.

At the ports the organizations meet every boat. Locate the women's luggage. Take charge of the babies. Bring the women to a cosy rest room. Here cots and baths are provided for the children. Hot lunch can be secured. Overnight accommodation is arranged.

Women who are too sick to proceed on their journey are taken to the local hospitals. Women who are without

money receive assistance from the Patriotic Fund; are provided with lunch baskets and money to buy meals on the train.

These organizations also secure the railroad tickets for the women, get their money changed, give them such information as they need. The workers accompany the women to the train.

The Repatriation Committee have a nurse, trained in social work, lent by the Victorian Order of Nurses to act as the committee's representative at each port.

On the Train.

On each train carrying unaccompanied women and children there is a Red Cross nurse, experienced in social service who has been enrolled by the Canadian Association of Graduate Nurses. This nurse carries with her first aid supplies and an emergency fund of money furnished by the Red Cross Society.

Telegrams are sent ahead to the local branch of the Patriotic Fund and to the local Reception Committees giving the number who will arrive.

On Arrival.

The Rotary Clubs of Canada have undertaken to provide motor cars to take the women and children from the station to their homes.

The Patriotic Fund have undertaken to provide temporary accommodation and other necessary assistance at cities and towns en route and at points of destination.

The main function of this nation-wide organization is to care for soldiers' dependents. It is therefore fitting that they should be responsible for arrangements for all the returning women and children.

Many other well-known organizations have been doing admirable work—meeting trains, providing rest-rooms, canteens and hostels and generally caring for the women and children. It is important that these organizations continue this work and co-operate as closely as possible with the Patriotic Fund.

**CASSIAR CROWN MINE
IS TO BE DEVELOPED**

Company Already Employing a Few Men Running Tunnel 200 Feet Long.

It is reported that the Cassiar Crown Copper Company, owners of the Cassiar Crown mine on Grouse mountain, have decided upon an extensive program of work in connection with the development of that property, which will be commenced shortly and carried on continuously, and as the report comes from an unusually reliable source, there is good reason to expect considerable mining operations during the summer, and even encourages a hope approaching belief that the coming summer will see a general revival of activity in the mining industry, with the Cassiar Crown first in the field.

In fact it is deduced that the plans of the Cassiar Crown people are already being worked out on the hill in a small way as a starter, and this from the fact that a few men are now at work at the property. This crew is running a tunnel alongside the big fourteen-foot vein recently opened up, to prove continuity and extent of the ore body, and to block out the ore. It is their reported intention in this connection to drift two hundred feet along the showing and to cross-out the vein at that point, and then to continue the drift another two hundred feet.

It is also stated that as a result of the recent visit of Mg. Pohlmann, one of the officials of the company, the interests of Chas. Barrett, one of the original locators, have been taken over by the company for a consideration of about six thousand dollars.

Work in the nature of a tunnel is also being carried on at another portion of the Cassiar Crown property, as a part of the development plan.—Interior News.

A resolution was passed at the meeting of the City Council last night on the motion of Alderman McMeekin seconded by Alderman Casey asking the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Co. to make the statutory returns in regard to property held by them. Lieut.-Col. Selater, better known as Jim Selater, who has been appointed prohibition commissioner in succession to Findlay, has only just returned from service overseas. He is a winner of the Distinguished Service Order and was overseas for about four years.
