

GOVERNMENT IS AFTER ILLICIT DEALERS

INFORMATIONS ARE LAID AGAINST VIOLATORS OF PROHIBITION LAW

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 Vancouver, Jan. 31.—A series of informations alleging violation of the prohibition laws was laid in the city police court yesterday. Joseph G. Brooks was charged with unlawfully importing a carload of 700 cases of whiskey from Toronto on October 4 and also is charged with conspiracy with William Findlay to make the importation.
 Five informations were laid against the Western Canada Liquor Company alleging illegal importation of liquor and five other informations against the same company, alleging illegal sales.

COAL MINERS' SIX-HOUR DAY IS DEMANDED

Alberta Labor Federation Wants Legislative Action to Include 44-Hour Week.

 Edmonton, Jan. 31.—One day's rest in seven for every worker in Alberta, forty-four hour week, with a compulsory half holiday, six hours a day for coal miners and an eight-hour day for stationary engineers, the semi-monthly payment of wages to all workers except farm help and increase of the minimum wage under the Factory Act to \$12 per week are among the demands the Alberta Labor Federation makes of the legislature to be enacted into law.

SHIPBUILDING PARTY DELAYED IN WINNIPEG

FISHING BOATS ARE HAVING POOR LUCK

Libanon Only One With Catch Worth Mentioning; Wanderer Left for Fishing Grounds.

The fishing boat Libanon came in last night with 3,000 lbs. of halibut and the Saturn which came in yesterday, had 400 lbs. The fish has not been sold yet, however.

The Advance also came in last night with only three hundred pounds, selling at 13c. to 19c. It was reported that she had very bad luck this last trip, losing nearly all her gear through bad weather.

The fishing boat Wanderer sailed for her fishing grounds at noon today on her second trip this season, with the hope of having better luck than she had last time. She got only three fish on her first trip.

WIRELESS OPERATORS ARE OUT ON STRIKE

 Vancouver, Jan. 31.—Demanding an increase in wages, all wireless operators on the coastwise and deep sea vessels of Canadian registry plying out of British Columbia ports went on strike at noon yesterday and a general tie-up of coastwise shipping has been commenced.
 The strike does not extend to the Dominion Government wireless stations as the operators are all part of the naval service of Canada and are under naval discipline.

LABOR BUREAU

 Paris, Jan. 30.—British plans for an international labor bureau have been completed and forwarded to London for consideration by employers. As soon as it is returned here it will be laid before the Peace Conference, coming as the British view.

DIFFICULTIES OF THE EXPORT LUMBER TRADE

Canadians Must Adapt Methods to European Business if Business to Be Increased.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 Ottawa, Jan. 31.—The Canadian lumber trade will experience some difficulty in serving its share of orders for reconstruction work in Europe unless more attention is paid to the requirements of the overseas market, is the warning given by the Commission on Conservation to Canadian exporters of lumber. Lumber from Russia and Sweden, it is pointed out, conforms more to the size requirements of the British market and the chief difficulty Canadian dealers must overcome is one relating to the "scant size" of lumber shipments generally from this side of the Atlantic.

"As far as British Columbia is concerned," says the statement, "the bulk of the lumber heretofore imported by the United Kingdom has been in the form of large timbers of a grade known as merchantable for heavy structural work or for resawing into special size. If British Columbia is to enlarge her timber trade, then a range of all grades and sizes, including merchantable but not the lowest grades, must be dealt in."

CHARGE OF SELLING LIQUOR DISMISSED

In the police court this morning before Magistrate Carss, Milly Denda was charged with selling liquor to an Indian by the name of A. Collison, who was convicted for being drunk yesterday, and fined \$25.

Collison stated that he went into the Royal Pool Room on Monday last and had two or three glasses of grape cider, on which he got drunk. But the accused added that he was drunk before he took the drinks, and was making himself a general nuisance in the place.

Magistrate Carss dismissed the case.

NO INTERVENTION IN BRITISH STRIKES BY THE GOVERNMENT

Absence of Strike Pay Makes It Unlikely Troubles Will Continue Long.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 London, Jan. 31.—A cabinet meeting was held yesterday to discuss labor troubles. It is understood that the ministers decided against intervening at present in strikes, on the ground that they had not been authorized by trade unionists and therefore intervention would be unwise. It is the view of the ministers that men, in the absence of the usual strike pay, are not likely long to keep up the movement, and that the Government, therefore, should confine its action to preserving order.

AMERICANS WRONGLY BLAMED IN PARIS

Apaches in American Uniform Were Not Real Yanks; Much Exaggerated.

 Paris, Jan. 31.—The Apaches of all nations dressed in American uniforms were responsible for acts of violence which have caused broadcast publicity to be given to an alleged American crime wave in Paris, is shown by an investigation. It is further ascertained that assaults and hold-ups are infinitesimal in number as compared with the published figures of the crime wave existing nearly exclusively in the vivid imagination of sensational local newspapers.

B. C. PACKERS DECLARE QUARTERLY DIVIDEND

Two and Half per cent. to Be Paid Shareholders for Three Months.

 Montreal, Jan. 31.—Dividends have been declared on B. C. packers of 2½ per cent, and B. C. fishing and packing of 1¼ per cent, for the three months ending Feb. 20, payable Feb. 21, to stock on record February 8. W. H. Barker, Vancouver, is president and Aemilius Jarvis of Toronto, vice-president of both companies.

The dividends of the B. C. packers was 7 per cent. in 1916 and increased to 8 per cent. and later to 10 per cent.

AUSTRIAN BLOCKADE TO BE LIFTED MILITARY SUPERVISION OF TURKEY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 Paris, January 31.—The Supreme Council have reached satisfactory provisional arrangements dealing with German colonies and the occupied territories of Turkey in Asia. The Council decided that the military representatives of the Allied Powers at Versailles should meet and report on the most equitable distribution of the burden of supplying military forces for the purpose of maintaining order in Turkey, pending action by the Conference regarding the government of Turkish territory.

The Council considered the economic and financial questions and the subject of supplying raw materials. Sentiment was favorable to the relaxation of blockade, so far as it concerned southeastern Europe, inclusive of the Balkans and Austria-Hungary.

CANADA RETAINS ALL AIR EQUIPMENT THAT NEEDED FOR TRAINING

 Ottawa, Jan. 31.—Reports from New York, saying that a United States syndicate has purchased all aircraft plants in Canada, together with their equipment from the Imperial Munitions Board, is characterized in Government circles as misleading and incorrect. Canada has retained all that is necessary for her present needs for training men and developing the service. Canadians also are interested with the Americans in the purchase referred to, Flavelle says.

GEN. SAM STEELE DIES IN LONDON

Famous Head of Mounted Police Succumbs After Illness; Was Well Known in This Province.

London, Jan. 31.—General Sam Steele, the former famous head of the Northwest Mounted Police, died here after being ill for some time. He is one of the picturesque and well known figures of Western Canada.

General Steel was born in Ontario and had a long and honorable military career. He had charge of the Mounted Police during the construction of the C. P. R. through the Rocky Mountains and later in the White Pass and in the Yukon. He raised and commanded the Strathcona Horse which went to South Africa to fight in the Boer war and took active part in the fighting there and also in the reconstruction after the war.

He recently commanded the Tenth Military District in Canada.

GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC BONDS TAKEN IN DAY

Attractive Offering at 5½ per cent Has Reflex Influence on Victory Bond Prices.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 Montreal, Jan. 31.—The reactionary tone of 1937 Victory bonds which sold off to 102¼ yesterday was viewed in some quarters as the market response of the offering of Grand Trunk Pacific Railway bonds. While they lack the tax exemption feature of the Victory bonds, these Grand Trunk Pacific bonds, carrying a government guarantee and offering a return of 5½% for 42 years, as against about 5¼% for 18½ years in the longest term Victory bond, would be highly attractive to certain classes of investors.

The announcement from Toronto that the new bonds had all been placed within the day emphasized the attractive character of the offering.

YPRES PERMANENT WAR MEMORIAL

London, Jan. 30.—The Decision of the Belgian Government to maintain Ypres, the scene of several battles between the British and Germans, in the present condition as a permanent memorial, is endorsed heartily by the British press and public opinion.

Initiative and The Referendum.

The speech from the throne intimates that the Government is about to fulfill another of its promises to the electorate by bringing in a measure at the present session of the Legislature to provide for the referendum on important measures and the initiative for those who wish legislation which the Government is not prepared to submit.

Only a few years ago even Liberals looked upon the referendum and the initiative as two visionary measures, pleasant to talk about but not within the realm of practical politics.

Government Will Be Absolutely Democratic. With the giving of the franchise to women and the submission of important measures to a vote of the people the Government of this province becomes absolutely democratic.

It will be interesting to find out just what the Government intends to do in connection with the changes in the Prohibition Act, but it is supposed to be about to make changes that will make the bone dry act rather dryer than it is at present.

Air Service Development.

Yesterday's news dispatches contained two interesting announcements in regard to developments of the air service. One of these was the purchase of ten million dollars' worth of equipment from the British Government by an American for commercial purposes, and the other the consideration of the feasibility of an air service between Victoria and Vancouver for carrying passengers and mail.

Million Men to Police Europe.

Nine hundred thousand British soldiers will be needed to police Germany and other enemy countries for some time to come. The other millions will return to their homes.

PRESERVE FISH IS SLOGAN OF J. P. BABCOCK

Interesting Address Given Before Board of Trade Yesterday Afternoon on Local Industry.

GOVERNMENT CONTINUES FREIGHT ARRANGEMENT

"Preserve the fish, give them a chance for life," was the burden of the address given yesterday afternoon to the members of the Board of Trade in their rooms on Second Ave. That the halibut will be depleted unless something is done to preserve them and that the salmon of the Skeena are also being ruthlessly destroyed is the opinion of the Commissioner. At the present rate the Skeena will very soon be as useless for fishing purposes as is the Fraser, where the pack last year fell to a minimum.

In regard to the future of the fishing industry Mr. Babcock expressed the opinion that Prince Rupert would have to depend very largely on the trawling business in a few years. There was almost no limit to that business. New banks would be discovered and could be restocked indefinitely.

At San Francisco.

The speaker told of what had been going on in San Francisco. Since 1901 trawlers had been working out of that port and there had been no depletion because the fish were taken at their feeding grounds and not at their breeding grounds. At present there were sixteen outfits operating from California. Some of these were going as far as the Aleutian Islands for their fish. As trawling could be conducted at a great depth there was hardly any limit to the operations. He thought the trawling would be the fishing method of the future.

Northwest Market.

The Canadian Food Board at his suggestion had agreed to continue the arrangement made last year in regard to paying two-thirds of the freight charges on the flat fish taken here. It was now shown that there was a market for the fish in the northwest if they could get the people accustomed to using the fish. At first it was hard to sell frozen halibut and for the first two years of its operations the New England Fish Company had lost money, but now the demand was enormous and the fish was selling for a big price as they all knew.

Splendid Fish.

What they were trying to do now was to create a permanent market here for the flat fish. There was no better fish in the world than the brill. The flounder taken from the deep seas was a very good fish, much better than when taken in the shallow waters of the harbors. These fish all have a definite flavor, while the halibut has none.

Mr. Babcock said his business here had been to discuss with the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union the matter of renewing the contracts and fishing on the same terms as last year. He explained the problem fully to the members of the union but the outcome had so far not been very satisfactory.

Gloucester of Pacific.

Prince Rupert, he said, should become the Gloucester of the Pacific northwest. Even today the fleet operating from California to the Aleutians was greater than from the states of Oregon and Washington combined. At present no Canadian boats went to those waters. He considered there would be excellent prospects of trawlers operating from here at the Aleutians.

At the close of the meeting Mr. Babcock was accorded a hearty vote of thanks by the members. President McCaffery was in the chair.

AUSTRALIANS WILL GET WAR SERVICE GRATUITY

 Melbourne, Jan. 30.—Hon. Mr. Pearce, Minister of Defence, states that discharged soldiers will receive a war service gratuity involving the sum of five millions Sterling. Acting Premier Watt announced that the Federal Government will assist states of the Commonwealth to the utmost to secure former British Service men as settlers.

LEGISLATURE WAS OPENED INFORMALLY

Frank Gielma and Major Burde Introduced—Initiative and Referendum Mentioned in Speech.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Victoria, Jan. 31.—Shorn of all the usual time-honored ceremonial and lacking the presence of the numerous and distinguished visitors on the floor of the legislative chamber itself, the third session of the fourteenth parliament of British Columbia was formally opened by the Lieutenant Governor at three o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Out of respect for the memory of His Royal Highness Prince John and in deference to the Imperial court order for a period of national mourning yesterday's occasion was marked by the utmost simplicity and the opening formalities were disposed of with quiet promptitude.

Members Introduced. All invitations issued by the Hon. The Speaker were automatically cancelled on receipt of the royal decree while in view of the prevalent epidemic and the desire for an avoidance of anything approaching a crowd the public galleries were by no means typical of the animated scenes which have characterized the ceremony in former years.

Speech from Throne. The speech from the throne foreshadows legislation dealing with the public utilities commission, superannuation of civil servants, amendments to the Prohibition act, housing legislation, implementary legislation in connection with soldiers' settlement and an initiative and referendum bill will also be introduced.

Other matters mentioned in the speech are, the establishment of a public library and commission, further relief for returned soldiers in tax sales, better regulation of public schools in alien communities, to provide for development of land in South Okanagan district for returned soldiers, the voting of an emergency appropriation to provide employment during the year in carrying on development work of a productive nature, the disfranchisement of deserters and draft evaders.

Story of Eastern Canada Shown Tonight at Empress Theatre is Exhilarating.

War to Peace



Free Medical Treatment for Ex-Soldiers and Sailors

THOSE discharged soldiers or sailors who become ill or disabled again as a result of some disease or injury suffered during war service receive free medical and surgical treatment.

This service is provided by the Medical Branch of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment.

An ex-soldier or ex-sailor who has a recurrence of a war disability should, if he is not too ill, go at once to the local medical officer of this Department.

If he is too ill he should have that medical officer notified at once.

Should he be taken ill in a place where there is no representative of the Department, he should call in a local physician to give him the necessary immediate treatment and ask him to communicate immediately all details of the case to the nearest medical officer of the Department.

The name of the authorized medical representative of this Department for each locality is given alongside.

Treatment at the expense of this Department can only be secured through these representatives. The Department cannot pay any bills for treatment which have not been authorized by the Department.

If the medical officers recommend it, pay is given to patients, and allowances are granted to their dependents by the Department, during the period of treatment.

The established scale of pay and allowances that may be granted depends upon the extent to which the treatment recommended by the medical officer of the Department prevents the patient from doing his regular work.

Arrangements for special care of patients of the Department have been made with hospitals in all the larger towns and cities from coast to coast.

Sanatoria for treating tuberculosis under most favorable conditions are operated in every Province under the direct supervision of the Department.

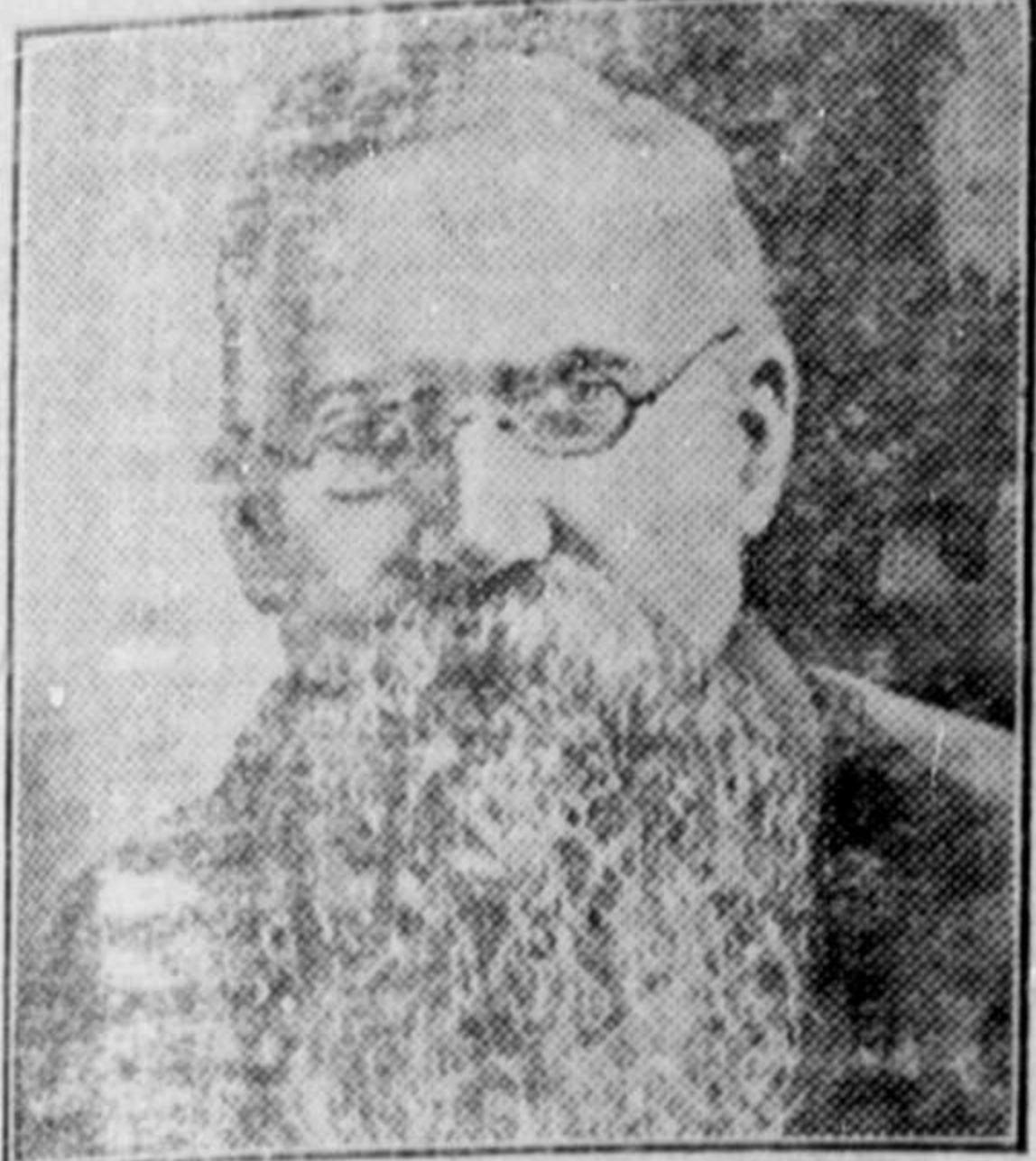

FOOD PRICES WILL TUMBLE BEFORE LONG

Cancellation of Contracts and Virtual Embargo on Export Will Cause Drop.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Jan. 30.—Rumors of an early tumble in food prices are finding their way into the Dominion from across the boundary. The cancellation of Allied contracts for various commodities and the practical cessation for the time being of shipping from Canada, which acts as a virtual embargo against exports, is leading to the expectation that the heavy stocks of foodstuffs at present in the Dominion are due for a drop in prices.

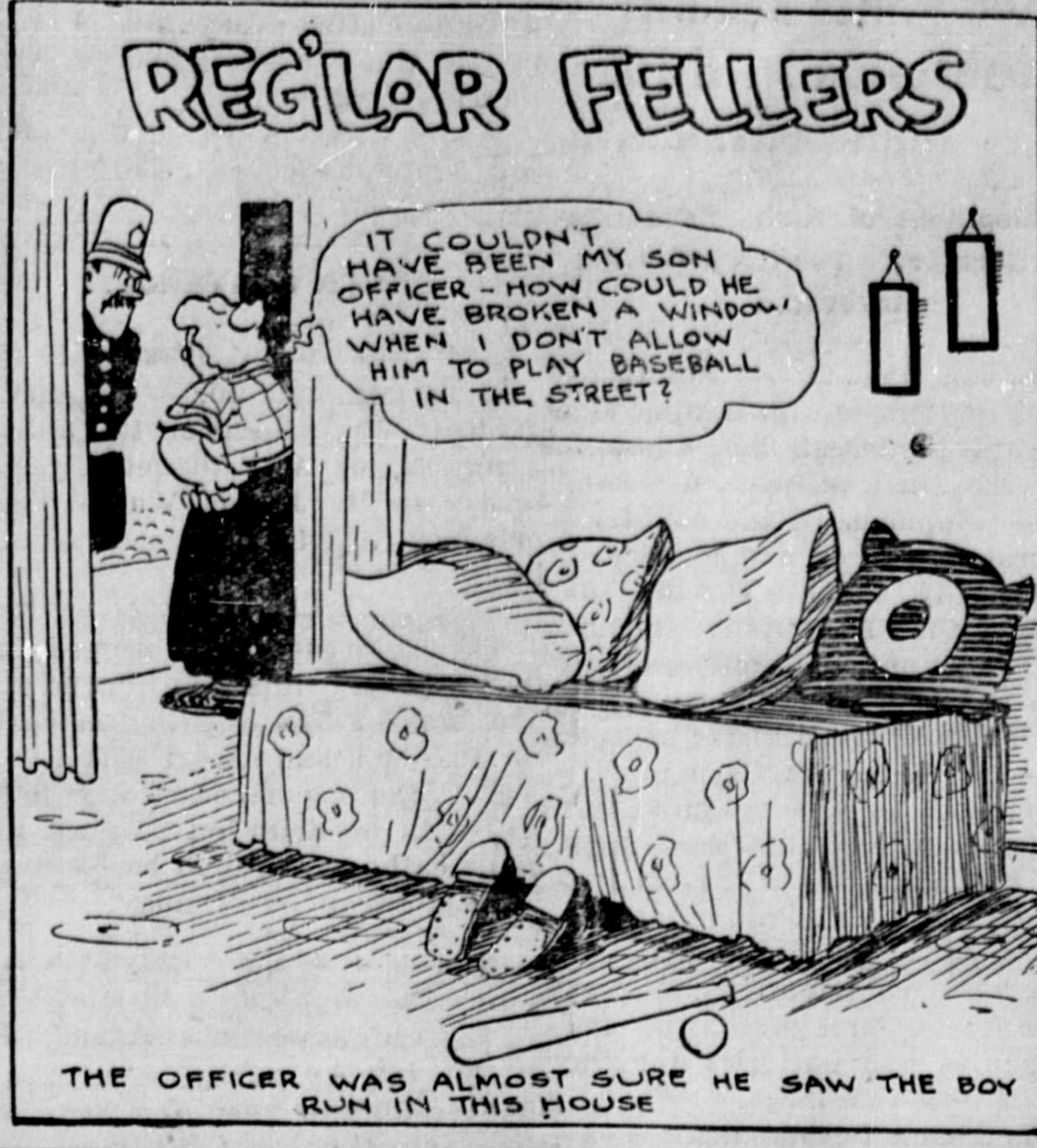

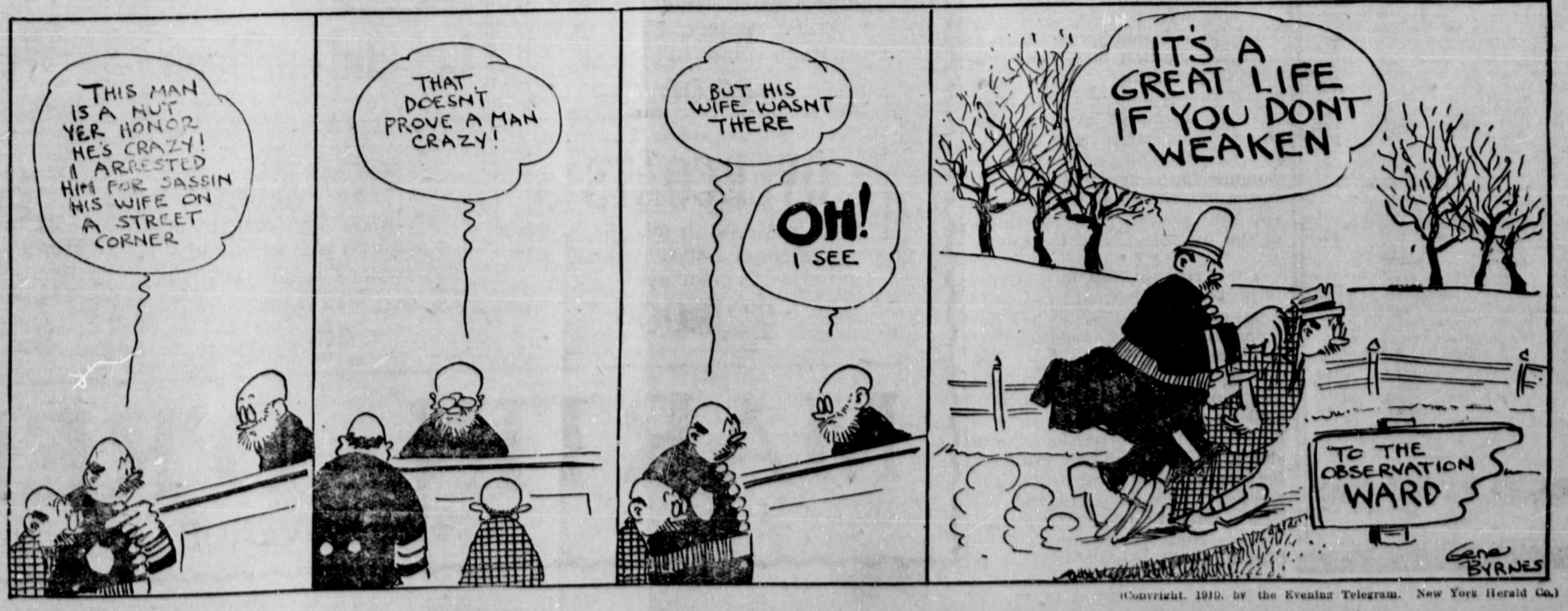

J. P. Babcock, commissioner of fisheries for the province, left for the capital last night after a short visit on behalf of the Canada Food Board to interview the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union in regard to work on the trawlers.

Mayor McClymont before leaving for Victoria last night appointed the members of the reading room committee for the current year as follows: Alderman W. G. Barrie, chairman, and Rev. W. W. Wright, R. J. T. Rose and John Dybhavn.

H. McEwan arrived last night to take the position of chief clerk in G. A. McNicholl's office. He comes here from Edmonton where he was soliciting freight agent for the company. He has been in the employ of the G. T. P. for many years and was here for a short time four or five years ago.

There was a meeting of the Fuel Commission presided over by S. M. Newton last evening at which preliminary steps were taken to regulate the coal business in this city. Among other things it was discovered that the Order-in-Council under which the Commission is appointed provides for the dismissal of the commission on a request from two-thirds of the fuel dealers of the city.

The Princess Ena has arrived in port with a full cargo of 1,000 tons of Ladysmith coal for the Prince Rupert Coal Company. It is expected to have all the cargo discharged by tomorrow and from now on, supplies of Ladysmith coal are expected to be more regular. With peace conditions, there should be more tonnage available for bringing coal north from Vancouver Island regularly and the Prince Rupert Coal Company hope to have supplies on hand all the time now.

YUKON WANTS RAILWAY CONNECTION WITH THE TRANSCONTINENTAL

Development of Rich Resources of Northern Territory Being Advocated.

Dawson, Jan. 28. — Practically all the substantial mining and mercantile interests here combined to-day in a project to foster the development of the country's natural resources and to secure incidentally, a share for the Yukon of the Dominion's reconstruction appropriations, as well as a share of the \$1,000,000,000 which the Prime Minister expects to secure from the German war indemnity. It was pointed out at the gathering that the Territory had not received a return of one dollar for shipbuilding or war orders, as the provinces had, although its contributions to patriotic funds, bond purchases and companies and batteries for the war had been so large.

The Yukon Development League will ask for ample sums for the immediate development of the rich mineral resources of silver, copper and gold, it being pointed out that this activity would have a beneficial result not only on the Yukon, but on British Columbia and Alberta.

Railway Project.

There also is a project on foot to secure the construction of a Government-owned railway, to be connected at the most feasible point with one of the transcontinental railroads, for the opening up of an immensely rich, farming, grazing and mining country. Canada and Alaska commercial organizations will be appealed to for support for this project, and it is contended that with the construction of a line the Territory, at present cut off, will be afforded military defence from the heart of the continent. A trans-Alaskan-Yukon Railway

also would supply the missing link connecting every railway system in the two hemispheres via Behring Straits.

Frank Lowe is president, and Gus Johnson vice-president of the new League.

DEATH SENTENCE.

Edmonton, Jan. 30. — Sentence of death was passed on the murderer, James A. Campbell, yesterday, by Mr. Justice Walsh. The prisoner took the sentence calmly.
