Old Country in Grip of Strikers

RIOT ACT IS READ IN GLASGOW AND THIRTY THOUSAND ULSTER POLICE ON DUTY IN IRELAND

Strikes are spreading throughout the country and military forces march into Glasgow; Effort to extend movement throughout Ireland; Government takes no action.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, Feb. 1.—There are a number of strikes in different parts of the country but especially serious are they in Scotland and Ireland. Troops have arrived in Glasgow and the city is practically in the hands of the military.
Glasgow, Feb. 1.—Serious conflicts between the police and strikers developed yesterday in which at least forty persons were more or less badly injured, among them Sheriff Mackenzie, Chief Constable Stevenson, Deputy Constable Rennie and a number of policemen. These were all injured by bottles thrown by strikers when the police were clearing the streets in baton charges.
Two of the strike leaders, William Gallagher and David Kirkwood, were arrested and later charged with inciting to riot. Both are still in custody.
During the height of the disorders the Riot Act was read and it was contemplated to invite the militia, but the order was cancelled when Gallagher and Kirkwood were permitted by the authorities to address the strikers and exhort them to march off in orderly procession.

In Ireland.
Belfast, Feb. 1.—The employers have issued an ultimatum to the strikers here, declaring they must return to work at once. The alternative is six weeks' lockout.
Thirty thousand Ulster volunteers and special constables are being held in reserve to preserve order.
Extend Activities.
Belfast, Feb. 1.—The strike committee has announced that it contemplates trying to extend the strike to the whole of Ireland.

Government's Position.
Replying to an appeal from Joseph Devlin, member of Parliament, that he intervene in the strike, David Lloyd George, British Premier, replied that the British Government did not control the hours of labour and that he was in complete agreement with the reply of Andrew Bonar Law, Lord Privy Seal, to the Provost of Glasgow, declining to intervene in the strike there.
The Premier added that this reply applied with equal force in Belfast.

**ADKINS ARRESTED
FOR FALSE PRETENSES**
Sum of \$10,000 Said to be Involved in Case of Calgary Mine Official.

Calgary, Feb. 1.—Information laid before the Calgary police and sworn to by W. E. M. Connaught, secretary-treasurer of the Bouvierap Mining Co., Ltd., led to the arrest of Wm. Adkins in Vancouver. The sum of \$10,000 is involved in the case. It is alleged that Adkins by false pretences obtained money from a number of prominent Calgary business men.

**LORD GREY FAST
BECOMING BLIND**
New York, Feb. 1.—Viscount Grey, former British Foreign Secretary, is fast becoming blind and has enrolled as a student at St. Dunstan's Hostel for the blind, where he is learning typewriting.
The Rev. A. Barger went east as far as Hazelton on this morning's train. He expects to touch other eastern points also.

WAR VETERANS HAVE TROUBLE WITH THOSE WHO WORRY EMPLOYERS

Calgary, Alta., Feb. 1.—The Calgary Great War Veterans' Association has issued a formal notice denouncing returned men who, without authority, call on employers in respect to the men they employ. The association protests against the employment of aliens, but says that it proposes to handle the matter in a lawful way.

SIGNIFICANT INCIDENT AT OPENING OF LEGISLATURE EXCITES MUCH COMMENT

TWO SOLDIER MEMBERS ARE INTRODUCED BY PREMIER
AND A SOLDIER AND MAY MEAN FORMATION
OF A SOLDIER PARTY IN THE
PROVINCE

(Special to The News via Government Telegraph.)
Victoria, B. C., January 31.—(p. m.) With the business of the legislative session suspended until Monday afternoon, members of the Government have been busy with numerous matters in caucus.
While His Honor's speech foreshadowed more important measures to be brought down, one significant proposal absent from the official forecast was that dealing with the initiative and referendum. A somewhat exhaustive discussion in caucus will take place before its presentation.

One feature of Thursday's ceremonial in connection with the introduction of Major Borde and Frank Gielma, two of the newly elected members, to Mr. Speaker, differed from the ordinary in that Hon. John Oliver and Major J. W. McIntosh conducted the formal introduction. W. J. Bowser, leader of the opposition, remained an interested spectator. The possibility of a soldier party is mooted with Dr. McIntosh as its titular head. What may be the attitude of Lieut. McKenzie of Delta who is on his way back to B. C. is not known nor can it be said whether or not Pte. Duncan, the member elect for Cowichan, would join it. When these two last mentioned arrive the soldiers will be almost as strong in the House as the Conservatives and five times as strong as the Socialists.

Better Housing.
A Better Housing Bill was also introduced by Mr. Pattullo providing interlocking machinery to enable the Province to take part in the national housing plans.
Hon. T. D. Pattullo presented a report to the House in accordance with the provisions of the Aeroplane Spruce Cutting Act, permitting the number of permits compulsory or willingly consented and of entry on crown and other lands for spruce logging. The reports showed how necessary last year's bill was, and how amply justified was the course Mr. Pattullo took.

LONE BANDIT ROBS A TRAIN SECURES \$10

Went Through Coaches Bound For Vancouver and Made Passengers Hold Up Their Hands.

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 1.—Passengers on the Great Northern owl train leaving Seattle at 11:45 p. m. for Vancouver, were held up by a lone bandit a short distance outside of South Bellingham early yesterday morning. Boarding the train at Samish he went through the day coaches and forced every passenger to hold up his hands.
The bandit left the train as it slowed down at South Bellingham. He secured only \$10.

TEXTILE WORKERS ARE DEMANDING AN EIGHT-HOUR DAY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
New York, Feb. 1.—Orders directing 7,000,000 members of the United Textile Workers of America to establish an eight hour day on Monday regardless of objections of the employers have been issued by the Union's executive committee.
John Golden, general president of the Union said the order had been telegraphed to 380 locals throughout the country and that the responsibility for the next step was up to manufacturers. The latter say they will close down if the workers insist on shorter hours.

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LACK OF EVIDENCE IN CHARGE OF THEFT

Judge Young Dismisses Case Against Aleck Chyzewski of Anyox in County Court.

Aleck Chyzewski, who was charged with the theft of a two and a half dollar gold piece was brought up for speedy trial before Judge Young yesterday afternoon at 2:30. A. M. Manson appeared for the accused and W. E. Fisher represented the Crown. J. Wolfe's evidence was that on December 24 the accused walked into his store and looked over some jewelry which he did not purchase, and on the day after he noticed that this particular gold coin was missing.
The evidence of the accused was that Wolfe showed him the jewelry about a week before that when he purchased this particular coin, and straightway attached it to his watch chain.
On consideration of the fact that not enough evidence was procurable, Judge Young dismissed the case, after telling the prisoner that he would have to pay J. Wolfe any debts he had incurred with him.

PRINCESS SOPHIA CAN BE SALVAGED

Diver Jacobson Reports Vessel Still Intact and May be Raised.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Juneau, Alaska, Feb. 1.—Divers and salvage workers having the work of removal of bodies from the Princess Sophia which sank in Lynn Canal off the Alaskan coast, Oct. 26, with the loss of many lives, report through marine diver Jacobson, that the vessel is intact. It is said she can be salvaged. He denied the earlier reports that she had broken up.

Social Diseases Danger to Race.

One of the most serious menaces to human health and progress is venereal disease, often spoken of as social disease. At one time it was considered immodest and immoral to speak of this, but the prudens have had their day and now efforts are being made to educate all young men and women in regard to the dangers of the disease. It is the natural outcome of immorality and is the hell to which those go who sin in that way. In the report of the Convention of B. C. Municipalities which is just published in the Canadian Municipal Journal Dr. Young, Provincial Health Officer, is reported as saying in part:

"Someone once, asked the question: When should you begin the education of the child? The suggestive reply was: One hundred years before its birth. I quote this simply because if it is true of the education of the child, then it is doubly true of its health; it is true today as it was two thousand years ago, that 'the sins of the fathers are visited upon the children.' Therefore it is very necessary that a great deal of attention should be paid to health matters. Attention such as I am referring to might imply that prior to the marriage ceremony it should be required that the contracting parties should have a clean bill of health and that they should have a certificate to that effect. This procedure has been tried in various parts of the world but not with any degree of success; in fact it has not succeeded at all, so that it can be seen that it is absolutely necessary that a campaign of education should be carried on to overcome and rid the world of these social diseases that are such a great menace to the health of the Dominion, and to the natural increase of our population.

Causes Death of Many Infants.

"Social diseases are responsible for forty per cent. of the deaths of infants under one year. This means a very serious problem for our health departments, at a time when our province is crying for more population. Such a drain as that on our population is very serious for the government and people of a new and growing country, such as we have here. It is a question of very great importance, and one which the Government of every community of the world is beginning to consider seriously. In 1913 a commission was appointed in Great Britain to make an investigation into the matter and they gave their report to Parliament in 1916. Sir William Osler, the dean of the medical profession throughout the world, at an important medical meeting in Great Britain, said that he considered this question was important enough to make an investigation into it from a national as well as from a medical point of view.

Several Suggestions To Combat the Evil.

"The United States Government has also been considering the question of national morality; it seems to me, therefore, that before a body, such as we have here, of men representative of the best from our various municipalities, a matter of this kind should be brought to their attention so that when a propaganda is initiated, which we propose in the immediate future, they will have some comprehension of the importance of it, and as legislators in your own community that you will take an intelligent and sympathetic view of the movement.

"In this report to the British Parliament there were several important suggestions made.

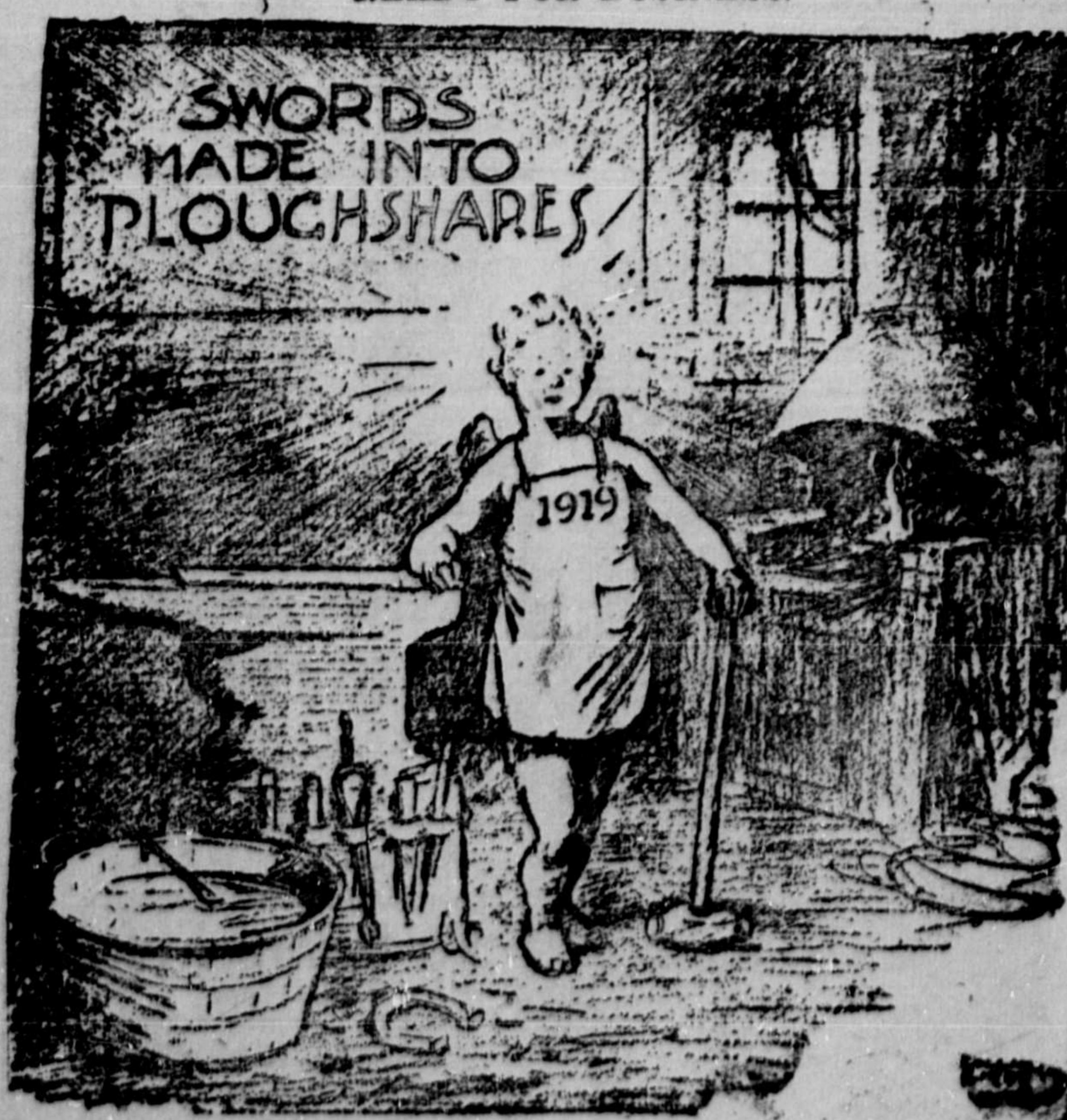
"First, that there should be free diagnosis of the disease;

"Second, a free medical treatment.

"Third, a campaign of education should be conducted pointing out the great drain on the natural increase of population from the presence of venereal disease.

"Fourth, they also suggested that these diseases should be made 'reportable'."

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SOME FACTS ABOUT HALIBUT AND SALMON

Commissioner of Fisheries Tells
Why Banks and River are
Being Depleted.

LOCAL VIEWPOINT CLEARLY EXPRESSED

That the halibut does not begin to propagate until it is eleven years of age was one of the interesting statements made by J. P. Babcock, commissioner of fisheries, at the Board of Trade meeting on Thursday afternoon. The age of the fish is indicated by its weight and length. As most of the halibut taken by the fishermen are younger than eleven years there is practically no propagation on most of the banks. It is also believed that there is little migration on the part of these fish from one bank to another, hence the impossibility of any increase and the certainty that the banks would eventually be denuded of fish.

Fleet Increased

The catch had increased, Mr. Babcock said, because of the increase of the fleet and the finding of new banks. Now there is evidence to show that the catch of each bank is declining.

International Action.

The steps to stop this depletion of the banks would have to be of an international nature. A committee which had investigated the matter had handed in its report which was said to be unanimous but so far no information had been given out as to the recommendations which had been made. In all probability the first news in regard to it would come from the United States Senate when a measure was introduced with a view to a treaty between the United States and Canada in which the State of Washington would have to concur.

Positions Reversed.

The State of Washington was in a different position to British Columbia, for whereas British Columbia had no control whatever over the fisheries within her borders, the State of Washington had absolute control of her own fisheries and no treaty could be made in regard to them without her consent.

Give Fish Chance.

In regard to the salmon fisheries Mr. Babcock said he was not concerned with the commercial aspect of the case. All he wanted was to give the fish a chance to propagate and hold their own. At present they did not get a chance. At the present rate the salmon would soon be only a curiosity. He was in full agreement with the findings of the report of the commission under Sandford Evans, but in spite of that report nothing had been done to conserve the fish, but matters had gone from bad to worse.

Larger Catch.

True, said Mr. Babcock, there had been a larger catch last year than ever before, but that was only because the canners were now using the pinks and the chums, both of which were excellent fish but which in former years they would not pack.

Many Eggs.

Mr. Babcock told that while a single salmon would lay perhaps six thousand eggs the eventual average production that survived was but two. There were so many dangers attending the young salmon that it was absolutely necessary that a large number of eggs be laid in order that there might be enough young to keep the species alive. Not only was man's toll large but that of birds and beasts and fishes must be added. In the natural state there were enough to keep the balance, but man's depredations had been added with fatal effect.

To Protect Fish.

The regulations which had been in force were recommended as good for five years only. The five years had expired and conditions had changed. The catch now was 75 per cent. greater than the stream would stand. While many felt bitterly in regard to boat rating, its object was to protect the fish.

Local Protests.

G. W. Nickerson, President McCaffery and others pointed out to Mr. Babcock that while the river was right at hand here and should be one of the natural resources

of the city and district, all the benefit from its nearness was lost because of the fact that the fishing interests had their headquarters in Victoria and Vancouver and they purchased all supplies in the south and carried away the fish at the end of the season. The result was that it was of no advantage to this city whatever.

Scientific Viewpoint.

Mr. Babcock replied that the political and industrial aspect of the case was one for the minister to decide. He had to do only with propagation and protection of the fish. He was interested only from the scientific point of view. It was his opinion that there was little money in the fishing for anybody.

Made \$50,000.

Mr. Nickerson spoke of one firm that had made \$50,000 on the pack last year. He contended that under existing conditions Prince Rupert was not getting a square deal. He recommended that while the fish should be protected they should be allowed to use motor boats, that seining should be abolished and that there should be no restrictions on the number of canneries. The present system was absolutely wrong.

This service is provided by the Medical Branch of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment.

An ex-soldier or ex-sailor who has a recurrence of a war disability should, if he is not too ill, go at once to the local medical officer of this Department.

If he is too ill he should have that medical officer notified at once.

Should he be taken ill in a place where there is no representative of the Department, he should call in a local physician to give him the necessary immediate treatment and ask him to communicate immediately all details of the case to the nearest medical officer of the Department.

The name of the authorized medical representative of this Department for each locality is given alongside.

Treatment at the expense of this Department can only be secured through these representatives. The Department cannot pay any bills for treatment which have not been authorized by the Department.

If the medical officers recommend it, pay is given to patients, and allowances are granted to their dependents by the Department, during the period of treatment.

The established scale of pay and allowances that may be granted depends upon the extent to which the treatment recommended by the medical officer of the Department prevents the patient from doing his regular work.

Arrangements for special care of patients of the Department have been made with hospitals in all the larger towns and cities from coast to coast.

Sanatoria for treating tuberculosis under most favorable conditions are operated in every Province under the direct supervision of the Department.

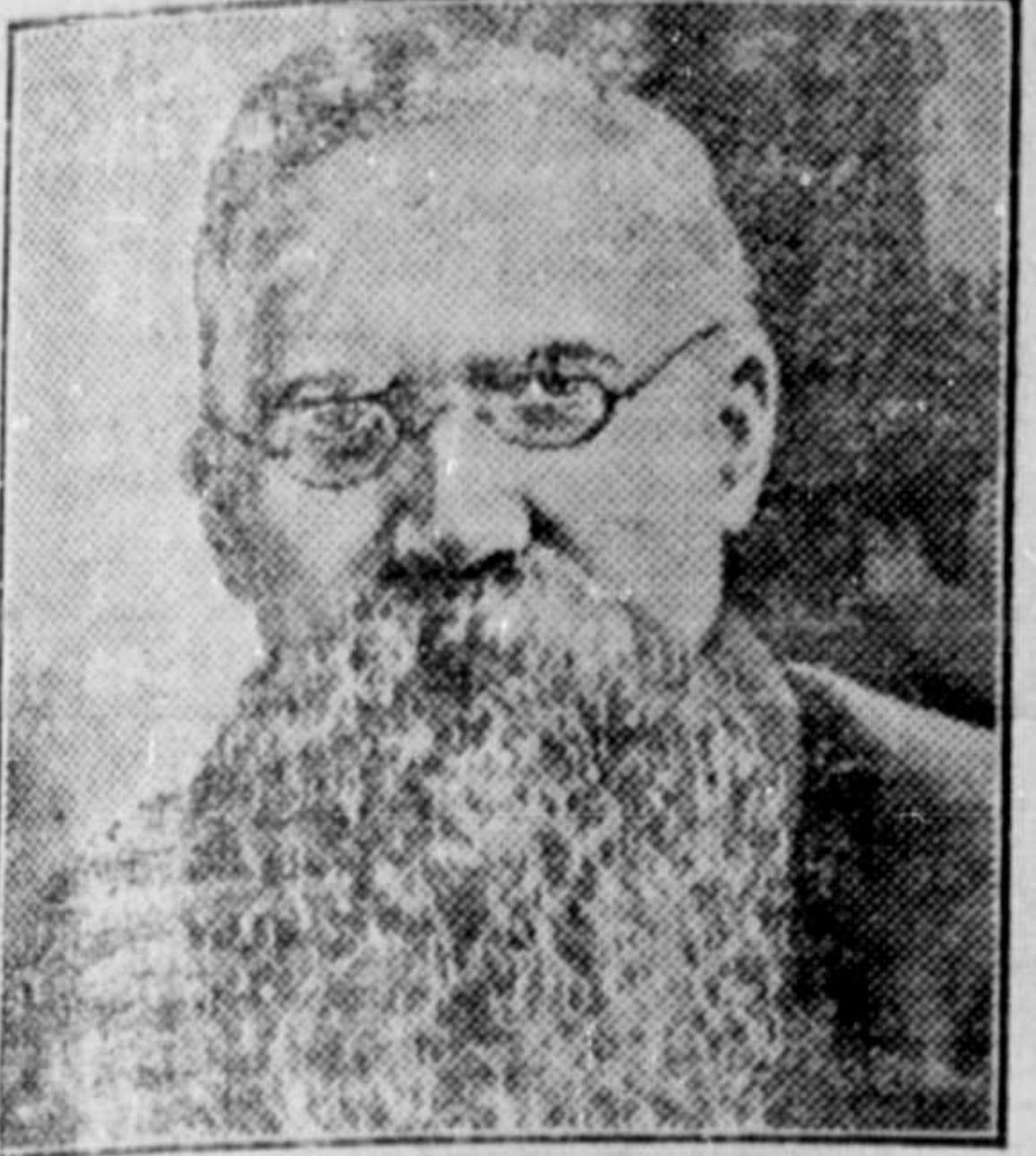

YUKON COUNCIL BEEN REDUCED

To Consist of Three Members Instead of Ten, Effective in Spring.

Dawson, Y. T., Jan. 31. — George Mackenzie, Commissioner for the Yukon, brought word from Ottawa of a reduction in the membership of the Yukon Legislative Council from ten to three, making one member elective from Southern Yukon and two from Northern Yukon with a provision that Northern Yukon be redistributed.

The reduction is effective after the sitting of the old Council this spring.

In the Letter Box

Electrical Terms Explained.

To the Editor,

In going around the town I come in touch with so many people who have very vague ideas of the meaning of the most common terms of electrical measurements such as "volts, amperes and watts," in spite of the fact that electrical appliances are now universally used. These terms may easily be understood from the following:

Volts—The number of volts is the force that causes the flow of electricity through a wire, lamp or coil, just as the pressure of the water supply to your house causes the water to flow through the pipe.

Amperes—The number of amperes is the rate of the flow or current strength of electricity, which may be likened to the size of your water pipe.

Watts—The watt indicates the rate at which the electrical energy is consumed and is similar to gallons of water used. The watts are always equal to the number of volts multiplied by the number of amperes. Thus a six-pound flatiron using a current of 5½ amperes on a circuit of 100 volts pressure consumes 550 watts.

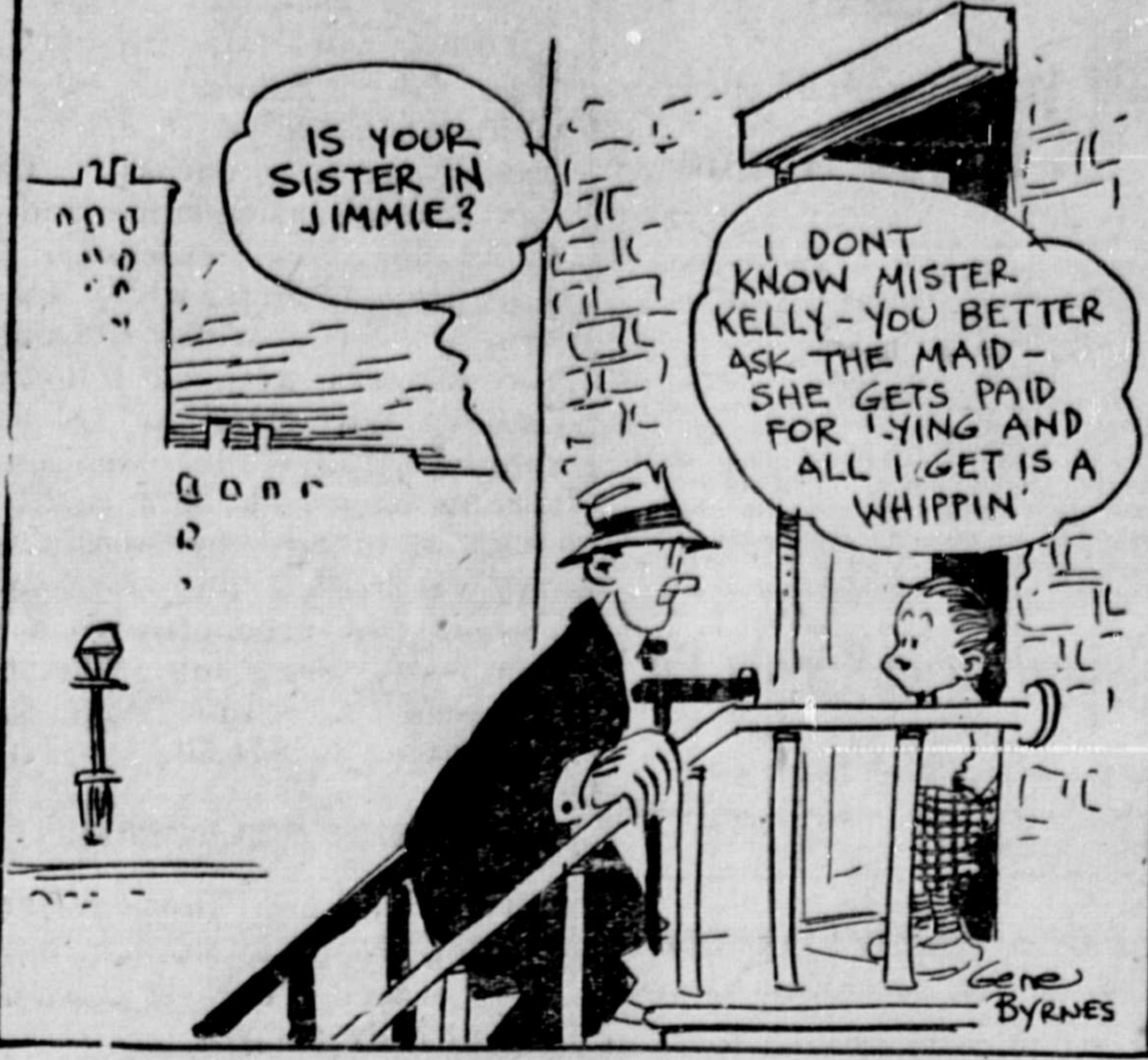
Kilowatt—A kilowatt is 1,000 watts, kilo being of Greek origin meaning "thousand."

It is not only necessary to know how much electric energy is used but also how long it is used. The city and other power companies sell electricity by the kilowatt hour, which indicates that one kilowatt is used for one hour. The kilowatt hours are obtained by multiplying the number of kilowatts by the number of hours that it is used.

Knowing the number of kilowatt hours and the cost of electricity per kilowatt hour, the operating expense of any device may easily be determined. For example, a six pound flatiron with 5.5 amperes and 100 volts stamped on the name plate will consume 550 watts or .55 kilowatts. If the iron is used continuously for one hour and electricity is sold at five cents per kilowatt hour, the cost of operation would be .55 x 1 x .05 = 2½ cents. This does not represent the actual cost of one hour's use of the iron which is less than the figure given due to the fact that the current is not turned on all the time.

The above prices and ratings are not in use in Prince Rupert, but are shown to simplify the reading.—G. W.

U. S. WILL WORK OUT RECONSTRUCTION PROBLEM

DIRECTORS ARE APPOINTED FOR THE HOSPITAL

Annual Meeting of Association Held Last Night—Committee Appointed to Report on Municipal Operation.

Officers were elected and reports received at the regular meeting of the Prince Rupert Hospital Association held in the Council Chamber at the City Hall last night with D. G. Stewart presiding. The directors for the year are, D. G. Stewart, E. C. Gibbons, J. D. McAuley, W. E. Williams and J. C. McLennan with Hon. T. D. Pattullo Hon. president.

A committee consisting of M. M. Stephens, J. C. McLennan and D. G. Stewart, was appointed to report on the feasibility of the municipality taking over the hospital and running it in conjunction with the Provincial Government, and to report at a future meeting.

Was Discussed.

Prior to the appointment of the committee there was some discussion. Mr. Stephens suggested that in the final analysis the city footed the bills; Mr. Gibbons thought that if a change was made the special grant might be more difficult to get; Mr. Nelson doubted if more interest would be taken if the change were made; Judge Young suggested the appointment of the committee; D. G. Stewart remarked that the G. T. P. had an interest in the hospital and their permission would have to be obtained to any change Mr. McLennan had always heard the work of the board well spoken of and doubted if it could be done better under any other management.

Directors' Report.

The secretary read the report of the board of directors for the past year which showed that there had been 796 patients during the year which was 237 more than the previous year. The death percentage had been 8.16, which was much higher than usual owing to the influenza. The report also expressed appreciation of the work of the nurses during the time of the flu epidemic and thanked the ladies' auxiliary for their good work.

Finances.

The financial statement showed the association to have a bank overdraft of \$1160.07 and sundry creditors to whom they owe \$9,946.62, making a total current indebtedness of over eleven thousand dollars. Against this there are outstanding amounts due by patients amounting to over ten thousand dollars, most of which, it is to be assumed, will not be collected. There is also about ten thousand dollars due the hospital from the Provincial Government and the city. Among the other assets are the real estate, building and equipment.

Votes of thanks were passed to the staff, including the nurses and secretary and to the retiring directors.

Those present at the meeting were Judge Young and Messrs. Stewart, Albert, McLennan, Clapp, Stuart, Gibbons, McAuley, McIntosh, Broderick, Nelson, Stephens and Wright.

D. C. Stuart was appointed auditor for the year at the annual salary of \$100.
