Seattle now an Armed Camp

SOLDIERS AND MACHINE GUNS ARE READY IN SEATTLE TO KEEP ORDER DURING GENERAL STRIKE

**Hungry People are being fed from Eighteen Big Soup Kitchens
Manned by Strikers, and Charges Moderate; Lighting
of Streets kept going by Volunteed Workers**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Seattle, February 7.—The morning of the second day of Seattle's general strike saw the city almost completely paralyzed. Its only normal function during the night was the lighting of streets and homes and this was done by volunteer workers. The strikers themselves, through their culinary trades, fed the strikers and those who depend upon restaurants. Eighteen big soup kitchens catered to long lines of hungry persons, hovering strikers for 25 cents and others for 35 cents.

No disorders have marred the strike thus far. On one hand there are sixty thousand idle strikers with a liberal sprinkling of the radical element; on the other are United States regular troops armed with machine guns and, it was reported, with hand grenades.

The police have mounted machine guns on trucks ready for instant service. The regular police and 1,000 deputies are heavily armed.

SOLDIERS WHO LIE IN FRANCE WILL REMAIN

**Comrades in Life Will Remain
Comrades in Death, Facing
Lines They Held.**

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Feb. 7.—Canadian soldiers who gave up their lives for their country on the battlefields of France and Flanders will lie as they fought—together, facing the lines they died to hold. Comrades in life, they will be comrades in death. The Imperial War Graves Commission, of which Sir George Perley, representing Canada, was a member, has issued its report to the various governments of the Empire, recommending this and that no bodies be returned to their native countries, as had been suggested.

Special cemeteries are to be prepared and isolated bodies gathered and interred therein, the cemeteries to be maintained at national expense.

MACHINISTS STRIKE

San Francisco, Feb. 7.—More than 4,500 machinists employed in eighty-five so-called "outside shops" went on strike here today.

INCOME TAX MAY BE AMENDED SOON

Ottawa, Feb. 7.—Amendments of the Federal income tax is likely to be suggested during the next session of parliament. Inspectors from all parts of Canada have been in session in the capital for several days, exchanging experiences and suggesting particulars in which the acts might be amended. The results of their conference will be communicated to the Minister of Finance.

WAGES HIGH IN BRITISH COLUMBIA AS OUTPUT MUCH HIGHER THAN IN SCOTLAND

**YARROWS DISCONTINUING SHIPBUILDING ON THE CLYDE
AND INCREASING BUSINESS IN THIS PROVINCE
AS INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS BETTER
HERE THAN SCOTLAND**

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, February 7.—Discussing the decision of Messrs Yarrows to gradually discontinue their shipbuilding on the Clyde and increase their work at Esquimalt, Vancouver Island, one of the directors of the company freely admitted that their action in transferring business was due to the better industrial prospects of British Columbia and the discouraging labor outlook in Scotland.

The wisdom of the action of Yarrows is supported by Lynden Macassey, in the London Times, who, after stating that at Esquimalt, owing to the output per man being anything up to 250 per cent. greater than on the Clyde, wages are normally much higher.

CALDER COMES OUT IN DEFENCE OF GOVERNMENT

**Mentions Land Settlement Scheme
and Urges All to Help in
Repatriation of
Soldiers.**

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Montreal, Feb. 7.—In an address here Ron. J. A. Calder gave a straight refutation of the impression current in some quarters that the Government has in some measure fallen down in their task. The Minister of Immigration and Colonization made some important statements as to new developments, especially in the direction of the land settlement scheme to the effect that it is the intention of the Government to purchase land for the purpose, since there is a shortage of crown and other lands in districts where settlements are needed. Land settlements give an impetus to other industries.

Mr. Calder also strongly emphasized the fact that the problem of satisfactory repatriation can only be achieved by ready co-operation of the people in this great task, and he uttered a solemn warning that if the whole country did not bend its energies to that end, disaster would ensue within the course of a few months.

Chief Vickers, Constable Bailey, Constable McGlinchy and Constable Duff made a raid on the premises of Wah Lee on 2nd Ave. between 7 and 8:30 last night, and found Mrs. Wong Gum, Kwon Sing, and Lee Gong smoking opium. They were brought up in the police court this morning before Magistrate Carss, but by the request of W. O. Fulton the case was adjourned till February 10. The police captured 7 pipes, a bottle of spirits, a lamp and some opium.

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INTERNATIONAL LEGISLATION IN THE INTERESTS OF LABOR TO BE SECURED THROUGH THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, Feb. 7.—The Society of Nations Commission of the Peace Conference has virtually covered one-third of its task.

The Commission issued an official statement last evening saying it had decided that representatives of Czechoslovakia, Greece, Poland and Roumania would be associated in its deliberations. This is in keeping with the decision to give four additional places on the Commission to smaller boards. The committee on labor legislation under the chairmanship of Mr. Gompers also met. The Commission commenced a detailed examination of a draft of a convention which provides for the creation of a general organization with a view to securing the progress of international labor legislation. Small states members of the League of Nations would necessarily be members of this organization.

FINDLAY KNEW NOTHING ABOUT FIVE CARLOADS

**All Attempts to Connect Witness

Differences Tie Up Number of Boats.

A number of fishing boats are tied up here because there is a difference of opinion as to the share the fishermen shall get during the coming year. Both sides are obdurate and there seems no hope of a settlement.

It is not for an outsider to say who is at fault or even if there is a fault. Doubtless each side thinks the other wrong. The result of the difficulty is that the harvest of the sea is not at present being gathered, the fishermen are running behind as they have no insurance against unemployment, and the Cold Storage Co. has a plant lying idle and is discharging men.

The flatfish industry is a new one and is being encouraged by the Dominion Government, which pays two-thirds of the freight to the prairie market. A demand for the fish has already been created, but it would scarcely be wise to raise the price yet or the industry would be nipped in the bud. It is to be hoped that a settlement will be reached in the near future and that the industry will continue and flourish in order that those connected with it and the city in general may benefit.

Navy League's Demand Is Not Necessary.

The British Columbia Navy League asks for the construction of a big drydock on this coast that will take care of cruisers of H. M. Navy. It does this because of the need to dock a vessel of that class and says it should be located somewhere on the coast. Prince Rupert has a dock of that kind. It is large enough to dock cruisers, but it is not in use at the present time. There is no need of another dock of the same type at present because if the shops here are supplied and there is a proper gang of workmen here the repairs can be made just as easily as at Victoria or Vancouver.

Col. J. A. Currie Hits Foul Blow.

The action of Lieut.-Col. J. A. Currie in slating free traders as disloyal is just the sort of action that the men of this country went to Germany to fight against. It is glaringly false and is certainly unworthy of a soldier.

Colonel Currie is working on behalf of those manufacturers who are enabled to make big profits through the protection that is afforded them by the tariff. Naturally they are jealous of any interference with their income. They will be wise, however, if they insist that their advocates keep to facts in the fight which they are putting up, for hitting below the belt always brings trouble to those who do it.

Mining Revival Beginning to Show.

The opening up of the Ladysmith smelter which was prophesied in despatches from Victoria is an indication of increased interest in mining on the coast. There are but two smelters at present in the province to which coast mines can ship. Those are at Granby and Ladysmith. The former has been working regularly but the smelter at Ladysmith has been shut down for some time.

The owners of the smelter must see business ahead or they would not think of blowing in the smelter. Many mines will be shipping soon, and if the smelter is run on a business basis and prompt payments made for the product it will soon get ore enough. In the past the financial arrangements have not been good and shippers have found difficulty in collecting after the ore has been treated.

THE ESSENTIALS OF RELIGION

To the Editor.—The new era upon which we have entered is clamoring for a restatement of religious truth. There is nothing alarming about this. It is the inevitable readjustment to changing conditions, which is quietly going on wherever there is life and progress.

On closer examination we find that it is not so much a restatement that is needed as a change of emphasis. The new era rightly insists that we draw the line clearly between the essentials of religion and the refinements of theology. The refinements of theology are exceedingly numerous and most bewildering. The essentials of religion are very few and grandly simple.

Not Religion.

Theology is not religion. Religion is the life of God in the soul of man. Theology is the intellectual expression of this religion. It is quite possible to have the life of God in our soul without our being able to give this an adequate expression in language.

It is, no doubt, very important that there should be an intellectual expression of our religion for otherwise we cannot, as intelligent beings, properly appreciate it ourselves, or effectively teach it to others. But an adequate expression of the life of God in the soul of man is one thing and the refinements of theology are quite another thing.

Fresh Zeal.

As soon as the early Church began to lose its fresh zeal for genuine religion it endeavored to make up for its declining spiritual life by its greater emphasis upon the refinements of theology. Bitter controversy, shifting from point to point with each succeeding century, has been the result until the cry of those who really long for the simple religion of Christ ascends to heaven: "They have taken away my Lord and I know not where they have laid Him."

All refinements of theology should be subjected to the test of practical value. Do they tend to make men less selfish in spirit and more Christlike in character? Do they help to bind together in mutual service all classes in the community? If not, they may be a detriment to true religion, helping to choke the life of God in the soul of man.

Split the Church.

It is an historical fact that it has been the refinements of theology which have split the Church of Christ into so many conflicting sects and shorn it of its spiritual power, and it will only be by shifting the emphasis back to the few grand essentials of religion that there will be a drawing together of the different denominations in one great comprehensive church, the leading characteristic of which will be that it puts the Christ-spirit first.

More Complicated.

While it may truly be said that the theology of St. Paul is more complicated than the teaching of Christ, it must be remembered that it was St. Paul who gave us this supreme test which we should ever be applying both to ourselves and to our theological disputations: "If any man have not the spirit of Christ, he is none of His."

Let there be such a general uprising in all our churches in response to the trumpet call of the new era that the refinements of theology, which have been the cause of so much division in the past, will be swept into a corner and the few grand essentials of the Christian religion put in the very forefront of our reconstructed society, so that the spirit of Christ in the souls of men may have the opportunity to bind together in brotherly love and mutual service all individuals in the family, all classes in the community and all nations in the world.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements of value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 540 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of the deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSHIP PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly if it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

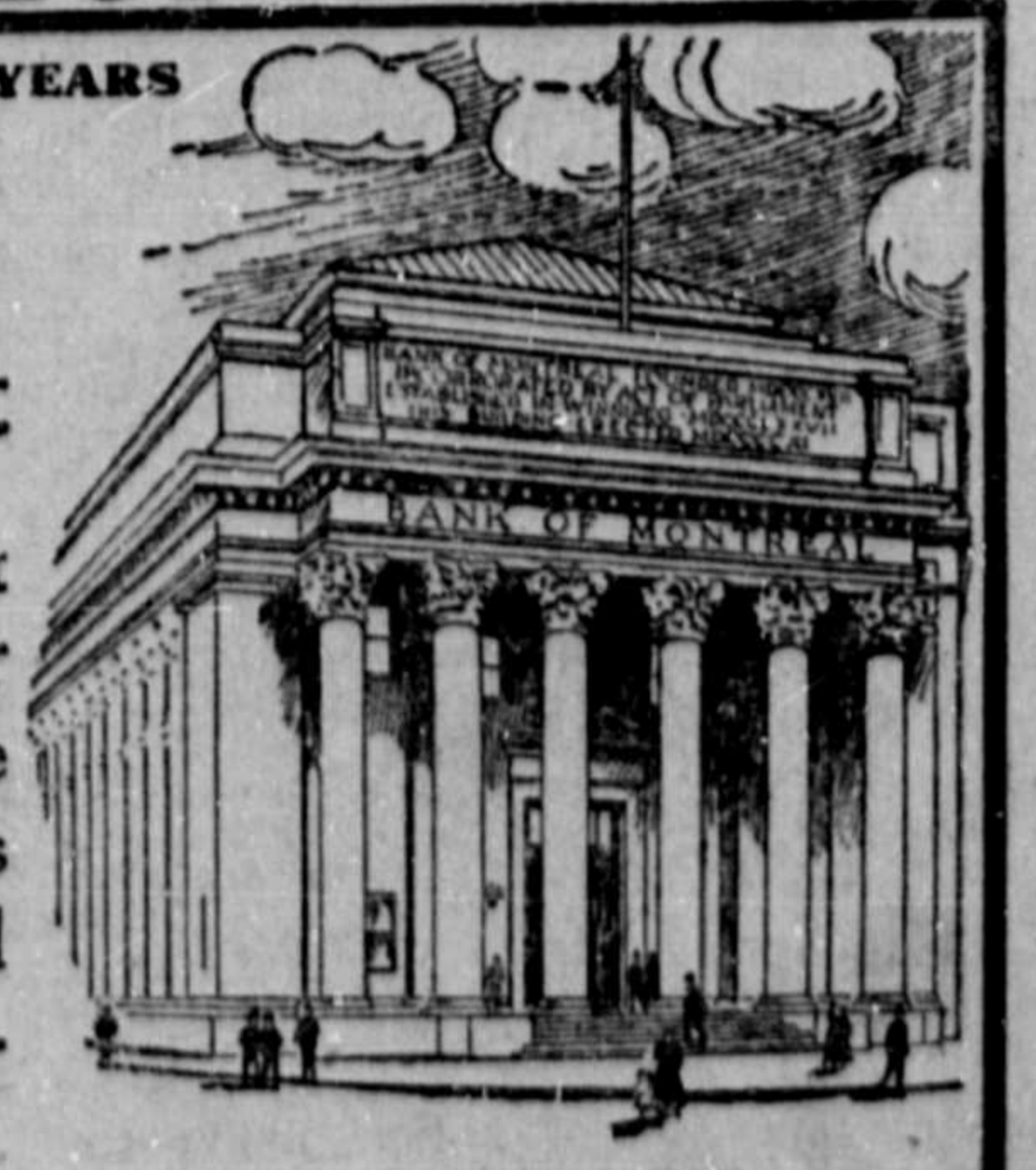

AIRPLANE SERVICE FOR ALASKA TOWNS

Proposal to Carry Mails From Seattle North if Contract Secured.

A hydroplane service between Seattle and Juneau is contemplated, according to Lieut. T. J. Finnegan, of the United States aviation service, and brother of Capt. J. J. Finnegan, head of the military branch of the Governor's office in Alaska.

W. E. Boeing, of the Boeing Airplane Company of Seattle, is making arrangements to furnish the capital necessary, should the hydroplane service be able to secure the mail contract, between Seattle and Juneau, according to Lieut. Finnegan. A representative of Mr. Boeing has been in Washington working with Gov. Thomas Riggs, Jr., with the Post-office Department in the interest of the hydroplane service.

"It is feared that a hydroplane would encounter difficulty in the fog along the coast," said Lieut. Finnegan, and the service could hardly be a success until it was determined whether or not this hindrance could be overcome.

Lieut. "Tom" Finnegan is an old timer in Alaska, having been in Seward and residing at different times in other Westward towns. He joined the United States Aviation service a year ago, and went into training in California. He won a commission as Lieutenant several months before the end of the war, and was engaged as a trainer at the aviation fields.

Tolman to Remain in Service.

Lieut. Crit. C. Tolman, also of Seward and a friend of Lieut. Finnegan, whom he trained for the service, well known throughout Alaska, who joined the aviation service shortly after America entered the war, expects to remain in the service, according to the latter. Lieut. Tolman has made a great record as a trainer.

Lieut. Finnegan is in Juneau on business for his brother. He will remain there about ten days.

This department also supplies free "orthopaedic" appliances to correct as far as possible injuries to the feet, legs and arms; also special boots, splints, braces, etc. To those who need them, it also gives free surgical appliances such as trusses, spectacles, spinal supports, glass eyes, abdominal supports.

A Government factory has been established at Toronto to make artificial limbs. Here standard patterns, embodying the best ideas known, are manufactured.

In this work expert advice is given by surgeons who have seen overseas service, and who are in constant touch with similar work in other countries.

An experimental department is maintained for developing practical applications of new ideas, and for testing out all new appliances that become available in Canada or foreign countries.

Repair parts for standard patterns are kept in stock at fitting depots in the following centres: Halifax, Fredericton, St. John, Montreal, Ottawa, Kingston, Hamilton, Toronto, Winnipeg, Regina, Moose Jaw, Saskatoon, Calgary, Edmonton, Vancouver, Victoria.

At these depots there are experienced fitters who make repairs and adjustments under the supervision of surgeons. They also fit to individual patients appliances received in the rough from the factory.

These depots are so located that those requiring renewals, repairs or adjustments can get them free without travelling long distances. If there is no fitting depot in the patient's town, he is instructed by the Department's Medical Officer to travel to the nearest depot. He is furnished with free first class railway tickets, an allowance to cover meals and other expense, and an allowance to apply against loss of time from his work. If he must remain there for longer than a week he is maintained at the Department's expense, and he and his dependents receive the same allowances as if he were in hospital.

Artificial limbs, orthopaedic and surgical appliances are furnished free only when their issue is authorized by a Medical Officer of the Department. These representatives are listed alongside.

WAGES AT GRANBY ARE BEING CUT TO MEET CUT IN COPPER

The price of copper is going down and the cost of living is beginning to drop. Wages must also go down wherever copper is made or the smelters and mines must cease to operate. That seems to be the position of the Granby Consolidated Co. Word brought from the smelter, town last night says that the company is making a cut in the rate of wages and that the action is resented by the men, who threaten to strike. When it is seen, however, that the general trend of wages is downward and that the company cannot operate on the low-grade ore at the present cost, better counsels may prevail and the men may decide to continue.

Word has been received here that the Granby people have given notice of a reduction of wages at Grand Forks to correspond with the cut here.

EDMONTON TRADES COUNCIL EXPRESSES VIEWS ON TAXATION

Edmonton, Feb. 6.—The Trades and Labor Council of this city, at a meeting in the Labor hall went on record as being definitely opposed to the city improvement tax. The recommendation of the special committee appointed to deal with charter amendments, read as follows: "Re the question of improvement tax, we recommend that this council ask for the repeal of assessments for improvements, and, further, that we draw to the attention of the plebiscite granting power to the city council to impose this tax was not endorsed by the electorate."

Other matters in connection with charter amendments that were dealt with included, the proposed tax on personal property, of which the council expressed disapproval. The taxing of incomes over \$3,000 will also be opposed. In connection with plural voting, the committee will make a further report, "with a view to bringing in a recommendation to change the whole powers of voting in municipal elections."

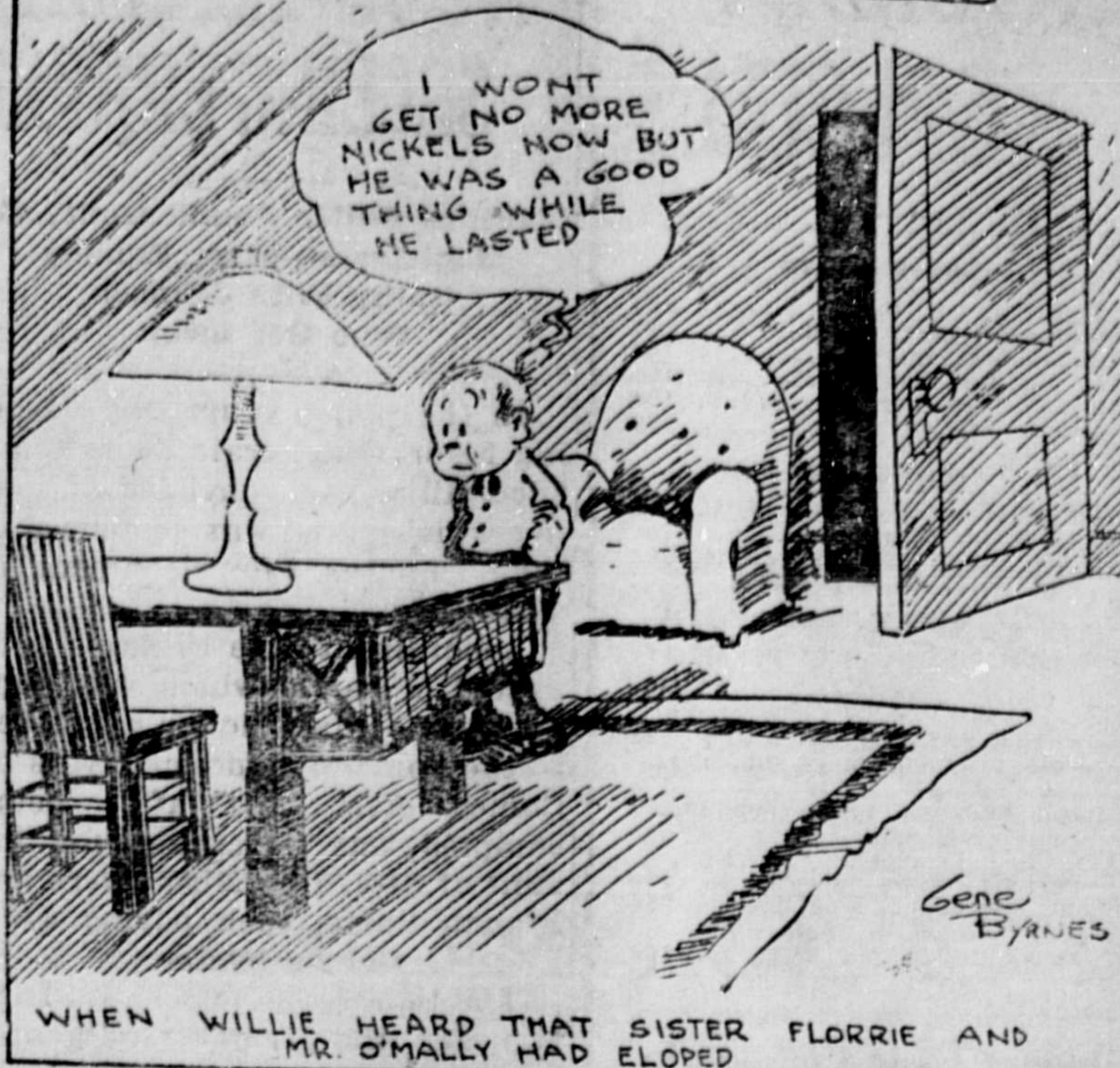
PRINCE GEORGE

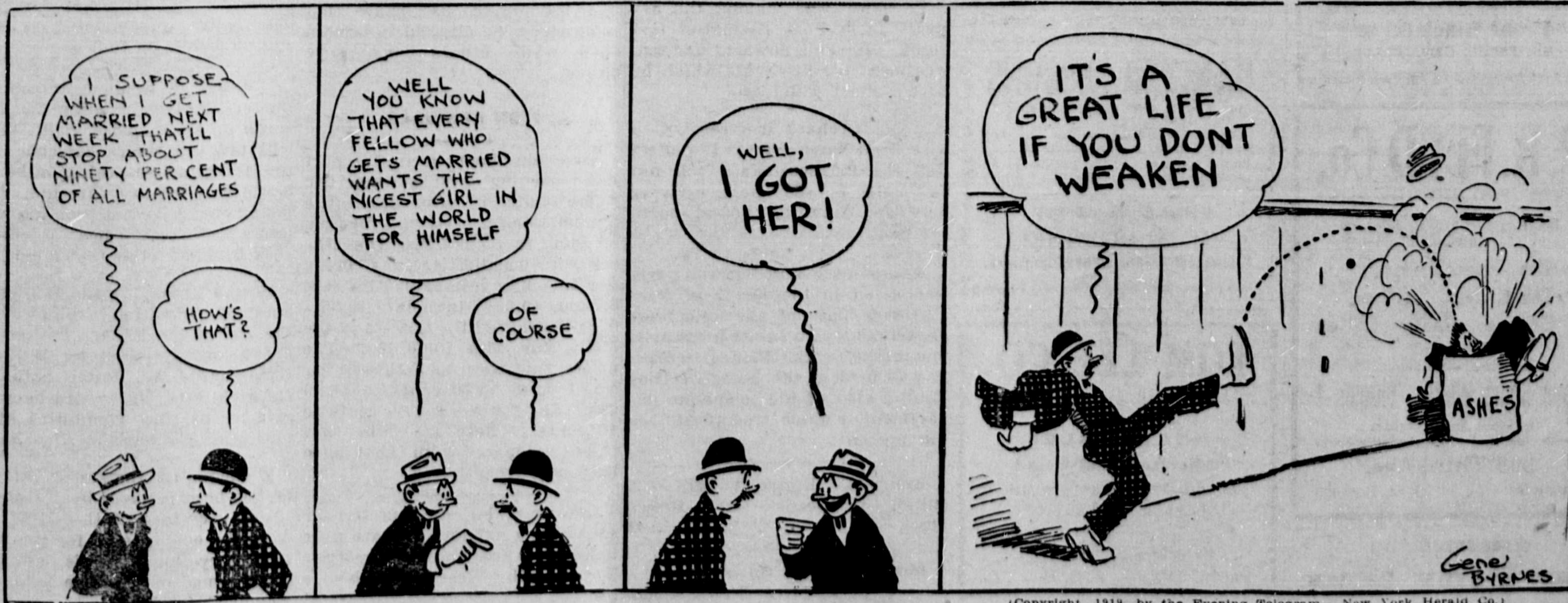

NINE MONTHS AT OKALLA FOR SELLING LIQUOR

Clarence Miller Found Guilty By Magistrate—Was Equally Guilty With Johnson Who Got Away.

In the police court this morning before Magistrate Carss Clarence Miller was convicted of selling whiskey and was sentenced to nine months' imprisonment at Okalla Prison Farm.

According to the evidence submitted, a barrel which was supposed to contain liquor was taken to the home of Madeline Myers on Comox Ave., and after being sampled was purchased for the sum of \$1,470 by Miss Myers and Blanch Harte, each paying \$735. Chiefly Water.

The liquor was purchased from two men, the prisoner and another man named Johnson, but the sale was arranged by Miller. After the whiskey had been delivered and the men gone it was found that the barrel contained mostly water, the whiskey having been contained in a small tin beneath the bung-hole.

SOUNDINGS COMPLETE FOR BIG SLIP TO BE BUILT AT THIS PORT

Cars of Paper and Pulp Will Then Be Loaded at Factory and Transferred to Rails Here.

Soundings in preparation for the building of the marine slip on the waterfront have been completed and the work will be commenced very soon.

The slip is to be used for landing cars of pulp and paper for shipment east to do away with the expensive double handling at this port and to protect the product which is always more or less damaged every time it is moved.

The proposal is to load the paper on the cars right at the factory at Ocean Falls on the pulp at Swanson Bay and to tow the cars north on barges and transfer them to the rails here.

The prices paid were as follows: For No. 1 from 13.70 cents to 14.10 cents and for No. 2 9.60 cents to 10 cents. These are rather low prices compared with what have been paid recently.
