THINGS LOOK VERY BAD IN SEATTLE AS RESULT OF THE STRIKE; MARTIAL LAW NOW

Seattle, Feb. 7. (p. m.)—Things look bad in Seattle. There is a great deal of unrest among the 60,000 strikers and martial law will be declared tomorrow.

Many of the strikers who have been earning immense wages are already without enough money to buy a meal and the result is that they are ready for anything. They are overawed, however, by the soldiers and by the large number of special police that have been sworn in and are on active service.

With the restaurants all closed the soup kitchens are doing an enormous business and many private houses are keeping open for friends who do not like to be in the lineup for food.

TELEPHONE SERVICE SHOWS BIG INCREASE

A new telephone directory will be ready soon. It shows that there is an increase in the number of services netting about eighty. There are 170 new services but 90 have been withdrawn so that the net result is a distinct gain.

Just what increase in population this telephone increase indicates it is difficult to conjecture. That it is something substantial, however, is clear. The population of the city has been steadily on the increase since the beginning of last year.

THE LUMBER MILLS

No Settlement Yet Made By the Imperial Munitions Board, But Is Expected Soon.

No settlements have yet been made by the Imperial Munitions board in connection with their contracts for aeroplane spruce. The result is that the mills have been tied up. It is expected that this obstacle will be removed soon as the work of the assessors is about completed. It is suggested that the commercial unrest and the high wages asked will act as a deterrent to the taking of contracts by the mills for some little time to come.

The report of the Standard Silver-Lead Mining company of Silverton, for October, just issued, showed a surplus of \$293,649 and a net profit of \$42,899 for the month. The surplus and the earnings are the largest in several months and are sufficient to defray expenses at the current rate for a long period.

WEATHER DELAYS WORK ON FLOATS

Owing to the bad weather there has been some delay in the construction of the new floats at Cow Bay for the Provincial Government. W. T. Meuse, who has the contract for the work, has the longer piles already on the ground and he will fetch the others from Rachael Island just as soon as the weather allows.

One source of delay in connection with the work has been that the Imperial Munitions Board were anxious to get the use of the pile driver for some work at Inverness in connection with the storing of logs. This was necessary work as the logs were spoiling in the salt water and the Government allowed it to take precedence over their contract.

Washington, Feb. 7th—Railroad labor interests today prophesied Government ownership and private operation by one large corporation, co-operatively organized and sharing profits with employees, as their solution of the railway problem.

DOLLY VARDEN READY TO SHIP

Moment Line is Completed Ore Will Begin to Roll to Smelters.

So much interest has been taken in the affairs of the famous Dolly Varden mine and railway and so many questions asked that official information in regard to it has been secured.

The railway is eighteen miles long running from the beach at Alice Arm to the Dolly Varden mine, and passes a number of very important mining properties many of which will ship ore just as soon as the railway commences operation.

The Dolly Varden Mines Company owns the Dolly Varden property, about eighteen miles from tide-water on the west bank of the Kitsault river, and the Wolf property, two miles farther up on the east bank of the Kitsault. The Dolly Varden has been extensively opened up by underground development, and is therefore in condition to start shipping at any time. The ore-bodies have been proven by thousands of feet of diamond-drilling. On the Wolf a tunnel 35 feet long has been driven in on the ore-body, from the face of which a crosscut to the north 50 feet and to the south 10 feet proves the ore-body for a width of 60 feet, with neither wall in sight. Several thousand feet of diamond-drilling has been done, proving the extent of the ore-body and showing it to be of a good milling grade.

GOOD BUSINESS IN SHIPPING AT THIS PORT

Pulp, Paper, Shingles, Canned Salmon and Frozen Fish Are Handled Here in Large Quantities.

100 CARS OF CANADIAN SALMON IN JANUARY

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway shipped east one hundred car loads of Canadian canned salmon during the month of January and forty car loads of American salmon is here all ready for shipment to Schenectady, New York. The United States inspector is expected here on Wednesday to finally pass on the fish before it is shipped and then it will be sent forward.

There has also been a lot of frozen fish sent east and fresh halibut in ice and shipped in refrigerator cars.

From Swanson Bay. Large shipments of pulp from Swanson Bay have been sent through this port bound to the east, and shingles in large quantities from the same place have been shipped here regularly and forwarded to the prairies where the demand for this product is always large.

Paper shipments have not been large, but the demand for coast paper is on the increase and large shipments should follow from the mill at Ocean Falls.

Raw Products.

The growth of this port depends very largely on the manufacture of the raw products such as the timber into paper and lumber and the extension of the mining industry. So far as mining developments, the enlargement of the scope of the fisheries. That is the reason the people of this city are all interested in any developments which take place anywhere within one hundred miles of Prince Rupert.

NEW MEMBERS FOR BOARD OF TRADE ELECTED

Twenty-Four Applications Accepted Last Night—Protest to Ottawa Against Cannery Restrictions.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Trade held in the Council Chamber last night, Stanley Parker presiding, a protest was made against the action of the Dominion Government in restricting the number of canneries which may operate on the Skeena River. On motion of G. W. Nickerson it was decided to send a telegram to the Minister of Marine and to Hon. J. A. Calder and also to mail a copy of the resolution to Col. C. W. Peck with a view to having the ban lifted.

The whole question of the small amount of benefit this city obtained from the canneries was discussed at some length.

New Constitution.

A new set of bylaws for the Board was considered in detail and left over for final passing at the next general meeting. These included a changed method of electing members, setting of a quorum for a general meeting at 20 per cent of the whole membership, denying delinquent members the right to vote, and other minor changes.

The committee on membership consisting of Geo. Frizzell, G. W. Nickerson, M. P. McCaffery and F. G. Dawson was thanked for the excellent work it had done in bringing in new members. There were 24 elected at the meeting as follows: W. J. McCutcheon, Jas. McNulty, J. H. Thompson, L. M. Fuller, A. Spurr, G. A. Bryant, W. Harper, J. L. McLaren, E. F. Duby, H. F. Pullen, A. Ten other business men have intimated their intention to join but have not yet completed their applications.

In connection with the appeal against the decision in the Hilditch case under the Early Closing bylaw, C. H. Orme, president, and E. R. Tabrum, secretary of the Retail Merchants' Association wish it distinctly understood that the newly formed association which they represent has nothing to do with the matter.

BUSINESSMEN ARE OPPOSED TO INCREASES

Express Rates are Already High Enough Members of Board of Trade Think and Petition Against Increases.

The matter of express rates was discussed at the meeting of the Board of Trade last night and after some discussion the following resolution was moved by F. G. Dawson, seconded by G. W. Nickerson and carried:

"That the Board of Trade go on record as being opposed to the proposed new Express Rates Schedule which is being submitted by the Express Companies of Canada to the Board of Trade Commissioners for adoption, feeling that the greatly increased rates as proposed would very greatly injure and probably kill the fishing industry of this port, and as the fishing industry is the principal industry of this community would result in bankruptcy of the business houses of the district;

"And further, we are of opinion that the high point has been reached in the cost of transportation as in other industries and that the tendency from now on is towards a lowering of costs, hence, in our opinion the increased rates being asked are not necessary.

"That a copy of this resolution be presented to the Chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners at their sitting in Vancouver on the 15th inst."

Mutual trust is Best Antidote.

The farmer is the last person in the world that is expected to strike. Usually he grumbles but that is as far as it goes. The despatches brought word yesterday from the Argentine Republic that the farmers there were refusing to plow their fields or sow any more crops, neither will they pay their debts unless their products are quoted at their real value.

The cause of much of the unrest at present throughout the world is that many people feel they are not being treated justly. They mistrust everybody, and perhaps they have cause. There has in the past been too much exploiting of the laborer.

For several months the tables have been turned on the employer and the workingmen have been exploiting their employers. Mutual trust and a desire to treat each other fairly would remedy the ills of which everybody complains. If the workmen felt that they were getting a fair share of the proceeds of the industry they would not be so likely to complain, and if the employer felt that the workman was doing the best he possibly could in his interests he would not mind paying a good wage. Mutual trust and mutual help would be the best antidote to the strike bug.

Too High Rates Would Kill Business.

While it is right and proper that every industry shall get an equal share of profit from its undertakings and there should be no discrimination against big corporations as against little ones, all being treated alike, yet there is such a thing as spoiling business by making the charges too high.

We are all aware that the Express Companies have not been making much money, at any rate in this northern part of the country, but we are also aware that to double the express rates just now would have a most deleterious effect on business generally and result in killing most of the business which the companies now have. Nearly every business house that today is using the express companies would stop doing so if the rates were raised to any extent. It would, therefore, be against the interests of the companies to raise the rates. It would be killing the goose that laid the golden eggs.

Kill the Goose That Lays Golden Eggs.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Trade held last night this matter of express rates was discussed and it was shown that the tendency of prices today was downward rather than up and that it would be very unwise to take any step which would tend to keep prices high.

The fishing business would be very severely hit if the rates were to go higher. As fish is the stable product of this port it is easy to see what an effect it would have were the express tax doubled or even increased half that much. It is difficult to realize just now that the prices have reached the limit in the upward trend and that the course must from this on be downward. It is true, however, that very soon there must be a general tumbling of prices and that will enable the express companies to pay dividends, even if they are not paying today.

Coasting Trade is Very Important Here.

There should be a number of small boats running in and out of this port to serve the people in the outlying districts and to act as feeders to the larger transportation company. That seems to be the general opinion of those who attended the Board of Trade meeting last night and it is true. A boat running to the canneries, to Stewart, Alice Arm, Surf Inlet and other points would undoubtedly bring business here which at present is getting away.

The railway runs up the Fraser river, it

The railway runs up the Skeena River, but the trains do not stop at all the canneries and some of the large canneries are not on the railway. The owners of these say they would do more business here if they could secure adequate transportation facilities.

There is a difference of opinion as to what kind of boat should be placed on the run. Some advocate a river boat and securing a subsidy for it, others think that a moderately small gas boat would serve the purpose. At any rate business could be brought this way if the canneries and mines were linked up with this point and that would mean increased business for everyone. It is a question that is worth investigating. It does not pay to run a big boat to these points, but a small boat would probably pay.

ALICE ARM

The following is from the report of the District Mining Engineer just published:

The United Metals Mining Co. has a number of claims up the Illiance river, fourteen miles from tide-water. Considerable surface work has been done, exposing several small high-grade silver-lead veins, from which probably 50 tons of ore has been sorted ready for shipment. The selected ore should run 120 oz., or better, in silver.

Silver Bell.

The Silver Gell group adjoins the United Metals further up the river, and also shows a number of small high-grade veins on which little surface work has been done. The country is rather flat and a suitable tunnel-site hard to obtain. It is hard to size up the possibilities from an ore-producing standpoint because of the detached croppings and the fact that no sinking has been done on any of them; however, the number of the showings and the grade of the ore would lead one to think that sufficient tonnage could be obtained to make operating profitable.

Farther up—in fact, over the summit on the Naas River slope—the Bromley claims have a little work done on a small vein showing from 8 to 12 inches of the characteristic high-grade silver ore of this section. The extension of this vein is located across the creek on the Ingraham-Bone claims, which, unfortunately, I did not know of while in that neighborhood.

Monarch.

The Monarch group of four claims lies just on the summit, on the south bank of the Illiance. Extensive surface work has been done, exposing the vein for several hundred feet along the surface, in which there is some fine ore. A tunnel was driven to tap this showing a distance of 162 feet, but failed to get it. Further work is fully warranted.

Silver Star.

The Silver Star group, just across the creek from and adjoining the United Metals property, has a tunnel driven in from the bottom of a deep gulch to cross-cut the vein, which was then drifted on for 14 feet. The vein in the tunnel is 8 inches wide, but pinches in the face of the drift, where the country-rock is intensely twisted and displaced. The vein crops about 40 feet farther down the gulch from the tunnel, and better judgment would have been shown had the vein been drifted on for 42 feet instead of cross-cutting that distance to get it. The surface shows 6 inches of ore assaying 170 ozs. silver and 25 per cent. lead.

Farther up the hill from the Silver Star the Silver Cliff group shows some croppings of ore, but no work has been done.

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant. Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim. Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years. Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land. Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 50 acres may be leased by one person or company. PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive. TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction. MEAT PRICES TAKE A DROP

Mutton Chops and Fresh Eggs Will Soon Be Within Reach of All.

There is a downward tendency in the price of mutton which is most encouraging in view of the tendency for a drop in wages. Mutton has gone down ten cents a pound and is now selling at 35c instead of 45c. Pork and other meats have also responded to the bearish movement which is affecting many lines of produce.

Fresh eggs are coming in in large quantities and will be lower very soon, so that the staple of bacon and eggs for breakfast will again be within the reach of those whose incomes are but moderate. Some of the grocers have dropped the prices, but others are holding them up.

Sweet potatoes are now off the market.

Apparently the much discussed question of whether the Independent Liberals or the Laborites were to be the official opposition has been settled by a compromise, as both William Adamson, Labor leader, and Donald McLean, the newly-elected chairman of the Asquithian Liberals, sat on the front opposition benches with their chief lieutenants.

Land and Loans—to Help Soldiers Become Farmers

IT is anticipated that a great many soldiers who have served with the Canadian, British or Allied forces may want to become farmers in Canada. The vital need to-day is to increase production and the acreage under cultivation. It is thus in Canada's best interests to give these soldiers every assistance. The Government has therefore been developing a programme that includes the providing of land, the granting of loans and the training and supervision of those inexperienced in farming.

The Present Plan.

Under the Soldier Settlement Act, 1917, an eligible returned soldier is entitled, in addition to his ordinary homestead right, to a free grant of one quarter-section of Dominion Lands on homestead conditions.

For this purpose the Government has suspended homestead entry by others than soldiers on all remaining homestead lands in the Western provinces within fifteen miles of railway transportation, pending enquiry into their suitability.

As soon as a soldier goes on the land, the Board has power to grant him a loan up to the maximum of \$2,500.

This loan is granted to settlers to help them acquire land for farming, discharge incumbrances, undertake improvements, erect buildings and secure necessary livestock, machinery and equipment.

It is not given as an actual advance of cash, but in the form of payment for expenditures. In this way the settlers' transactions are carefully supervised.

The loan is made at the low interest rate of five per cent. It is to be repaid in twenty annual instalments. The first two payments may be deferred by the Board when desirable.

The New Proposal.

The Government have found it necessary to broaden these original plans for the following reasons:

- (a) It has been found that only a limited amount of suitable homestead land is available for soldier settlement. (b) Some Crown lands are held by the Provinces. (c) Homesteading may not suit all the returned soldiers.

It is now proposed that the Provincial Governments co-operate with the Soldier Settlement Board in acquiring suitable lands at present held uncultivated by private owners. The Dominion Government has announced its intention of introducing necessary legislation along these lines at the opening of the next Session.

The lands so bought will be re-sold to the soldier at cost price. It is suggested that the purchaser be required to make a cash payment of one-tenth of the purchase price. The balance will be payable in equal annual instalments extended over twenty years or longer.

The amount of the land purchased by this plan, if it is approved by Parliament, will be limited in value to \$5,000. Interest will be charged at a low rate of five per cent.

When these new proposals for land purchase become effective the Board will be able to loan the soldier settler up to a total of \$1,500 for the purchase of livestock and equipment in addition to the loan for the purchase of his land. It will be granted on practically the same terms as the loans now allowed.

As the soldier improves his farm the Board may advance him a further \$1,000.

Who May Apply

The Act applies to any one who has served with an honourable record in the Canadian or Imperial forces in the present war, or to any Canadian who was on active service with the Allied forces, or the widow of any such person who died on active service.

The Board will loan money only to those who have had sufficient experience or training in farming. Each applicant may be required to appear in person before the Qualification Committee in his district.

Training

Those soldiers who have had insufficient experience in farming will be helped by the Board to secure the necessary training to qualify them for the loans.

Special instructional courses are being arranged with the agricultural schools and experimental farms.

Farmers will be asked to co-operate in giving the soldier practical training and knowledge.

Expert Assistance

The work of the Soldier Settlement Board is carried out by Supervisors in each of the provinces.

These supervisors have under them a staff of land appraisers to value the land, and farming advisors or practical farmers in the community to advise the soldier after he has definitely settled on his farm.

Qualification Committees are being appointed in each Province to advise the Board as to the qualifications of each applicant.

Results

Loans, amounting to over 1 1/2 million dollars, have already been granted to over one thousand returned soldiers.

Since the regulations were completed last July, over eight hundred soldiers have made entries on Dominion Crown Lands under the Soldier Settlement Act.

In New Brunswick the Board is temporarily represented by the Secretary of the Provincial Farm Settlement Board, St. John; in Nova Scotia, by the Secretary of the Soldiers' Aid Commission, Halifax, N.S.; and in Prince Edward Island by the Minister of Agriculture, Charlottetown.

BOAT UP RIVER BADLY NEEDED

Board of Trade Favors Idea of Mosquito Fleet Connecting Prince Rupert With Outside Points.

The question of river transportation came up at the meeting of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade last night, when a letter was read from Hoopes K. Freeman asking that the Board do not put any obstacle in the way of his running a tri-weekly service up the river to the canneries. Mr. Freeman said that he had offered to carry the mail from April 1.

The general opinion was expressed by the members that a service of this kind should be encouraged, but that it would be necessary to carry freight in order to make the business a profitable one.

Badly Needed.

D. G. Stewart said this was a service that was badly needed and he thought Mr. Freeman would do it well. It must, however, be a freight service or it would not pay, neither would it properly serve the purpose required.

After some discussion it was decided that the committee on trade and commerce should take the matter up with Mr. Freeman.

Mosquito Fleet.

This communication precipitated a general transportation discussion in which opinions were freely expressed that there should be a mosquito fleet running in and out of this port to keep the place in touch with the canneries and camps. A boat up the river that would carry freight and passengers, a service to Surf Inlet, proper connection with Stewart and other points were discussed and it was decided to refer this whole matter to the transportation committee for report.

LIQUOR MEN HAVE \$2,000,000 TO SPEND AGAINST PROHIBITION

Rev. Hugh Dobson of Regina, speaking Sunday evening in the Highlands Methodist Church, Edmonton, stated that the Dominion vote on national prohibition would not be taken till all the soldiers had returned and that he was confident they would be largely in favor of putting Canada dry.

A liquor deputation is now overseas, he said, representing to the soldiers that the slackers at home had put prohibition over while they were away fighting, whereas the fact was prohibition had been enforced to save food to send to the soldiers. Mr. Dobson informed his hearers that with the signing of the armistice, a determined effort had been made to discredit prohibition throughout the country and that a fund of \$2,000,000 had been set apart by the big liquor interests for this purpose. Of this, \$200,000 is for newspaper propaganda under an expert agent.

Referring to child welfare, the speaker said while the war had cost Canada 60,000 lives, we had lost in Canada 120,000 children from preventable causes.

SHIPPING RELEASED FOR AUSTRALIAN USE

Belbourne, Feb. 7.—A telegram received from the Colonial Secretary has informed the Commonwealth Government that the British Government that the British Shipping Controller has allocated to Australia for February, March and April 599,000 tons of shipping for general loading and 41,000 tons for refrigerated loading.

FISHING ON THE EAST COAST OF CANADA

Ground Fish and Smelt Show Good Catches—Total Shows Increased Value Over Previous Year.

On the Atlantic coast, to the eastward of Halifax, weather conditions during the month of December were favorable, and fishing results were better than for December last year; but to the westward of Halifax, however, occasional rough weather interfered with operations, and results were not so good, states a report from the Department of Naval Service.

The total catch of cod, haddock, hake and pollock all over was greater, however, and amounted to 84,900 cwts., against 82,000 cwts., December of 1917.

The smelt fishery along the Gulf shores yielded 2,000 cwts. more than in December last year, notwithstanding that the rivers and bays were insufficiently frozen over to permit of easy and successful fishing operations.

Lobster fishing has been in progress since the 15th of November in the counties of Charlotte and St. John, New Brunswick, and the total quantity landed up to the end of December was 2,689 cwts., against 2,335 cwts. during the same period last year. The whole catch was consumed fresh.

From the scallop beds in Chester Bay, N. S., were taken 3,435 barrels of scallops, against 500 barrels last year. The greatly increased catch of this year was, no doubt, due to more favorable weather conditions.

On the Pacific coast, stormy weather prevailed during most of the month. This seems to have affected the offshore halibut fishery only, which returned 2,000 cwts. less. Fishing in the sheltered waters resulted in increased catches. The total quantity of herring landed was 128,000 cwts. against 68,000; of salmon, 15,300 cwts. against 6,900 cwts.; of black cod, 6,500 cwts. against 6,300 cwts., and of flatfish 900 cwts. against 430 cwts. in December of last year.

The value of the total catch of sea fish on both coasts for the month, amounted to \$1,173,648, at the point of landing. For the same month last year, the value was \$1,023,553.

Sheriff Peters has returned from Edmonton where for the past two weeks he has been in constant attention at the bedside of his daughter, Mrs. S. F. Campbell, who has been undergoing treatment at the Royal Alexandra hospital. Mrs. Campbell's condition is extremely critical, a conference of Alberta doctors diagnosing her ailment as tumor on the brain, which has brought on almost complete paralysis.

About eighty-five people attended the bridge and "500" party given by Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Herne last Saturday evening in aid of the Returned Soldiers' Club. A splendid time was enjoyed by all present and the sum of \$50 was realized.

Acting Police Chief Vibbard headed another raid into the Chinese section last Monday night and brought in 22 Orientals who were discovered in gambling games. A large quantity of gambling paraphernalia, also considerable coin of the realm which was on the table when the police made an unexpected entrance, was taken as evidence.
