General Strike Ends Abruptly

JAPAN DETERMINED TO HOLD ISLANDS

STRIKERS WENT TO WORK AT NOON TODAY IN SEATTLE; 12,000 MINERS IDLE IN CITY OF BUTTE, MONTANA

Wage Reduction of Dollar a day Precipitates Struggle in Mining Town; First Sympathy Strike in United States Fails with Return of Puget Sound Workers.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Seattle, February 11.—The efforts of the general strike committee to have all union men refrain from working under the Seattle general sympathy strike, the first of its kind in America, officially ends at 12 o'clock noon tomorrow. The executive committee of the street car men's union voted for the car men to remain at their posts and not obey the request.

Today at Noon.

Seattle's general strike ended officially at noon today. The decision to call off the strike was reached at one o'clock yesterday by the general strike committee, composed of delegates of 130 local unions, after a four-hour's session of the unions represented on the committee. One hundred and ten had voted to participate in the general strike.

Strike at Butte

Butte, Mont., February 11.—Twelve thousand miners are idle here either as a result of last week's strike of independent union organizations as a protest against the reduction of one dollar a day in wages, and the rustling card system, or through fear of intimidation by the striking element. The situation is under control of the military forces.

Wages were reduced on account of the drop in prices and the possible further slump.

MUNICIPAL CHAPTER OF I.O.D.E. FORMED

Important Joint Meeting Held
Yesterday of Local Daughters
of Empire to Organize.

An important meeting of the members of the three local chapters of the Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire was held yesterday afternoon, when another step in the development of the organization in this part of the Province was made. This was in the formation of a Municipal Chapter, which will act as the connecting link between the local chapters and the Provincial Chapter.

Hitherto the three primary chapters here have communicated directly with the Provincial, to whom all returns have been made. From now on, however, all local returns will be made to the Municipal Chapter, which will speak with the voice of all the chapters in Prince Rupert to the Provincial Chapter. Above the Provincial Chapter is the Dominion chapter; the highest of all, of course, being the Imperial Chapter in Britain.

RIGHT OF TRANSIT AT CONFERENCE COMPELLING GERMANY TO LINE UP JAPAN TO HOLD PACIFIC ISLANDS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, February 11.—The commission on ports, waterways and railways of the Peace Conference met today. England is supported by America in the proposed postponement of the principle of complete liberty of transit to every country on equal conditions to all. This proposition was opposed by Albert Claveille for France and Coromilas for Greece, who pointed out that England and America occupied special situations that made the question of commercial land transit insignificant for them.

Pressing Germany.

Paris, February 11.—The Peace Conference is still considering means to compel the Germans to live up to the armistice terms and also to prevent rearming. The French would do it by limiting the production of war weapons and taking strict account of the present stock. The French are convinced there is danger in Germany unless held with a firm hand.

Japan's Position.

Paris, February 11.—Japan reiterated her intention to hold the Marshall and Caroline Islands in the Pacific, which she took from Germany during the war, as well as to insist upon the execution of an agreement reached in September last with China regarding Shantung. Formal statement to this effect by Japanese representatives has been made public here.

Borden Returning.

Paris, February 11.—Premier Borden will return to Canada shortly for a few weeks.

APPOINTMENTS CONSIDERED BY CITY COUNCIL

Some Aldermen Would Like Power
of Selection — Tammany
Methods Feared by
Ald. Rochester.

The whole question of the method of making appointments came up for review at the meeting of the City Council last night when questions were asked regarding the appointment of telephone girls and also respecting the appointment of an outsider as wiring inspector in place of choosing a local man.

Telephone Girls.

In regard to the telephone girls Alderman Barrie said he would like to know why it was the telephone girls were not taken on in rotation, as their applications came in.

The acting mayor said the matter was in the hands of Mr. Duncan.

Alderman Perry expressed the opinion that they should reverse the policy. Returned soldiers and others were entitled to consideration in making appointments. Applications should be invited and should come before the committee.

Alderman Currie said he knew of applications which had been in for years and he thought they should be considered.

Wire Inspector.

In reply to a query from Alderman Barrie, Acting Mayor McRae said that a man from Edmonton had been appointed to the position.

Alderman Casey took exception to the way in which Mr. Duncan expressed himself in regard to himself. He thought it was about time there was a change in that department.

Alderman Casey suggested that they should go outside only when the position could not be filled at home. He had maintained that position consistently. He thought Mr. Duncan had transgressed again in this matter and should be brought to time.

Peculiar Light.

Alderman Kirkpatrick said it put them in a peculiar light when the aldermen knew nothing of the action taken by the mayor.

Alderman Perry again expressed his opinion that all appointments should be confirmed by the committee.

Alderman Rochester feared the introduction of Tammany methods.

Alderman Perry will move a resolution to give effect to his views at the meeting next week.

DELEGATE RETURNS FROM GALVESTON

J. H. Meagher Tells of His Visit
to Texas Where He At-
tended Convention.

J. H. Meagher who has just returned from the Seamen's convention at Galveston, Texas, reports a very large attendance, delegates coming from England, Ireland and also from Japan.

The Japanese representative told them that they now have 6,000 seamen organized and at the end of 1919 it would be safe to say that they would have at least 10,000 organized.

Mr. Meagher received a hearty welcome at Galveston. The first thing they showed him was their excellent harbor.

Where is England At Peace Conference?

The St. George's Society has discovered an interesting fact that in spite of the fact that the greater part of the fighting during the war was done by Englishmen, there is not a real Englishman sitting in the Peace Conference. Lord Milner is the only one who goes by that name and he is of German grandparentage on one side, was born in Germany, and his father lived most of his active life in Germany.

Right Man for The Right Job.

"There is no such thing as a second rate man. Every man is first rate in 'his own job.' To select the right man for the right job should be the aim of every employment bureau.

The above statement is issued from the Ottawa branch of the Ontario Government Employment Bureau, a department run along strictly business lines, one that is bent upon producing results. Superintendent Frank Crean is out to get the immediate and direct attention and co-operation of all employers.

"The kind of man we all want, when you come to think of it," he says, "is the one described by Harry Lauder:

- 'I like a man that is a man,
'A man that's straight and square,
'A sort of man who will and can
'At all times do his share.'

"We have such men on our list, lots of them, all trades, all callings. Have you any jobs to offer? When a man has a job he has a chance."

Fishermen Take Many Great Risks.

The fishermen who ply out of this port are a hardy people. They brave the rigors of the northern seas at a time when most people are working in pleasant offices or are safely tucked in their cosy beds. If they earn big money they deserve it.

The story of the troubles which the King and Winge underwent and which was published in this paper yesterday gives an insight into the hardships which these men endure. It is a story of pluck and endurance which is worthy of perusal by everyone.

Those who daintily pick over their halibut steak in the fashionable restaurants of New York and turn up their noses at it if it has not just the right flavor or is not cooked to a turn, little remember how it is caught or the dangers which the men undergo who catch it. The story of the halibut fisheries yet remains to be written. It has great possibilities, but it must be written by one who has had the actual experience.

City Council Would Revert.

Nearly all city councils move in circles. They decide to do things in a certain way in order to improve and then they find there are difficulties of which they did not know. The next council reverts to the old method and so the changes go.

The Prince Rupert council for some years past have placed the power of engaging subordinate employees with the heads of departments. That was to avoid any suspicion of Tammany rule. Now the present council wants to get back to the methods of appointment by the members of the Council.

The News knows nothing of the ability of the officials nor of the wisdom of their choice in recent appointments. We do know, however, that appointments are usually better made by the permanent officials than by members of the council and that the system is not liable to so many abuses. With eight or nine men all pulling to have their favorites appointed, usually the most incapable employee gets the job.

CITY COUNCIL WOULD EXPEL UNDESIRABLES

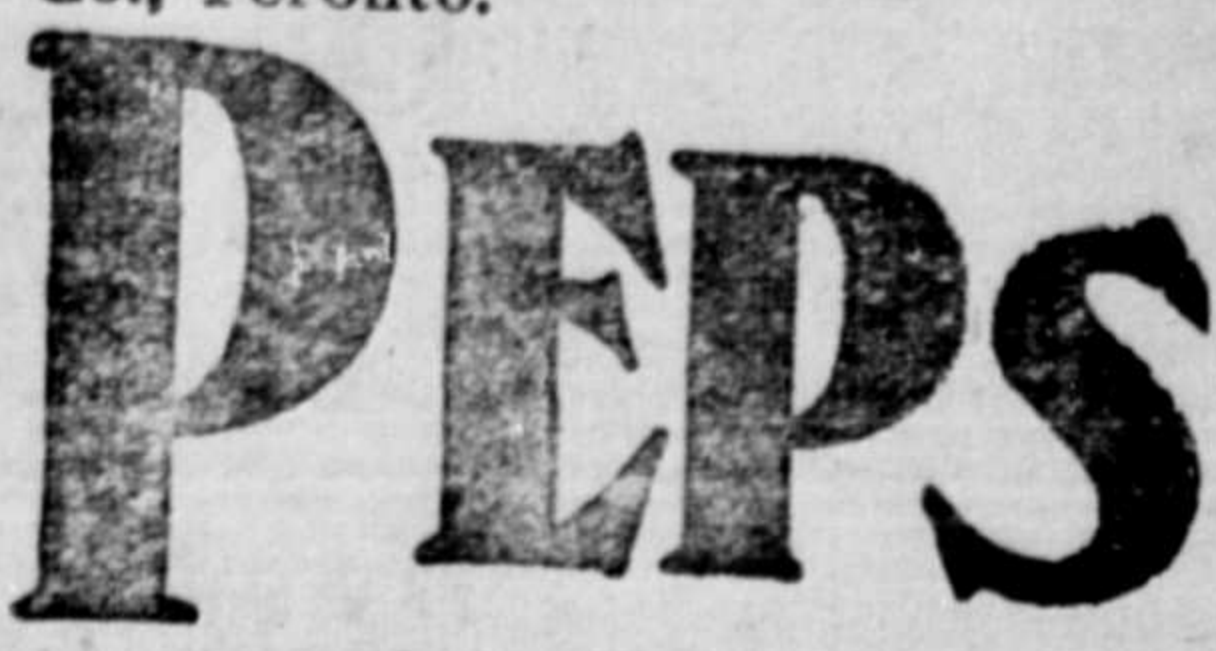
Vancouver Resolution is Endorsed After Considerable Debate and Strenuous Opposition.

A resolution regarding the expulsion of aliens from Canada was passed by the City Council last night on motion of Alderman McMeekin, seconded by Alderman Perry. The resolution was passed by the Vancouver City Council at a recent meeting and forwarded here for endorsement. Considerable debate ensued, but it was finally passed on the vote of Aldermen McMeekin, Perry, Rochester, Currie, Kirkpatrick and Barrie, with Alderman Casey opposing. The resolution was as follows:

The Resolution.
 "Whereas it is reported that the Minister of Finance of the Dominion of Canada has been directed by authority under the War Measures Act, to direct the expulsion, removal or deportation from Canada of all undesirable interned aliens, and
 "Whereas it is the firm opinion and belief of this City Council, representing the citizens of the city of Vancouver, that all alien enemies in the Dominion of Canada interned or otherwise, are 'undesirable' and detrimental to the best interests of the country, and
 "Whereas it is also our firm belief that in the best interests of this country economically and socially Canada's doors should be locked for some time at least to all subjects or citizens of Germany and her allies in the recent world struggle.
 "Be it, therefore, resolved that a memorial be prepared and forwarded to the Dominion Government urging upon said body the absolute necessity of enlarging upon the order directing the expulsion of aliens so that all enemy aliens in Canada shall be deported forthwith.
 "Be it further resolved that the various municipalities of this Province be requested to take similar action and the Provincial Government requested to assist in order that at least the Province of British Columbia may be freed of a menace that will sooner or later have a demoralizing effect upon the country and militate against the rehabilitation and repatriation of the thousands of men who have suffered and who have bled to make this country possible."
Alderman Casey.
 In opposing the resolution Alderman Casey said it would be wrong to take men who conduct themselves properly and to persecute them. Many had carried out all that was required of them and now to say to them that they were to be subject to a penalty would be unjust.
 The alderman instanced two neighbors of his. They had children who were born in this country. They were good citizens and had committed no offence. They worked honestly and paid their debts. He thought men should be dealt with individually. If a man was a menace or conducted himself in such a way as to merit it he should be punished.
Required Courage.
 Alderman Casey went on to speak of the fact that the diminishing of the means of life to a great many more than were here. It was easy to get up and assail Austrians, Germans or Bulgarians but it required a great deal more courage to defend them. Had the war been with Russia or the United States the feeling would have been different. In that case Austrians and Germans would have been "jake" and the others bad. This was a cosmopolitan country and he thought it should develop in a cosmopolitan way.
 Alderman Barrie did not see why they should endorse Vancouver's resolution. He favored drawing up one of their own, applicable to their own conditions.
Ald. Kirkpatrick.
 Alderman Kirkpatrick in favoring the motion said that many alien enemies had celebrated German victories here. It had been necessary to put guards on the railways and bridges and public buildings. The Germans and Austrians made fun of us when we were lenient. They had been laughing at us all the time. In

 After an amendment had been defeated the main resolution was put and carried.

C. P. R. EARNINGS
Increased Cost Results in Lessening of Twelve Million Dollars Compared With Previous Year.

While the final statement of earnings of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company for the year 1918 will not be available until some time in March, the figures deduced from the monthly accounts serve to give a fairly accurate idea of the relative position of profits for the shareholders for the two years.

So far do the increased rates compensate for the higher wages, costs of coal, etc., that an increase in the gross earnings for the year of over \$5,000,000 finds the net earnings actually over \$12,000,000 less than in 1917. Indeed, going over the lists for the last nine years, never were the net earnings so small as this past year. Back in 1910, when the gross earnings were only a little over \$100,000,000, the net earnings were over \$36,000,000, whereas last year, with gross 57 per cent. greater, \$157,000,000, the net earnings were only a little over \$34,000,000.

Creating Opportunities for Employment

BESIDES helping to distribute employment through a chain of Employment Offices, the Government has developed plans to create opportunities for employment.

Briefly, these plans cover the following phases:—

1. Public Works

During the war, many important Public Works have been held up. The Minister of Public Works, has his plans and preparations made to proceed with the more necessary of these in the near future. This Committee has also been in touch with Provincial Governments and Municipalities, with a view to impressing upon them the necessity for similar action. The building and public works programme now in sight will provide employment for many returned soldiers and war-workers.

2. Railways

During the past four years, a great deal of work necessary to keep our railways up to standard has been postponed. Some millions of dollars must be expended on improving road-bed, constructing bridges, buildings and other improvements. Vast quantities of ties are being got out this winter. Equipment of various kinds must be secured. The Minister of Railways states that as soon as weather conditions will permit, some thousands of men will be absorbed in various railway undertakings. The supplies and materials required will also provide employment.

3. Shipbuilding

The shipbuilding programme arranged for by the Government will provide employment for many men during 1919. It is expected that arrangements will be completed to keep the shipbuilding yards in active operation throughout the year. The Government recognises that this ship construction is one of the best means of providing suitable employment for many skilled and other workers.

4. Export Trade

The Government has established a Canadian Trade Commission. This Commission has an office in Canada and a "trade mission" overseas. Through this trade mission it is anticipated that Canada will secure an important share in the business of providing materials and manufactured products required for reconstruction work in Europe. A short time may be required before final details are completed and definite results are announced. The business so secured will be distributed through the regular channels of trade and thus afford extra opportunities for employment.

5. Housing

The Government has set aside the large sum of \$25,000,000 to be loaned through the Provinces in order to encourage the building of workmen's houses. When the season for building arrives, this work should give employment to many hundreds of men both in construction work and in the supply of materials.

6. Land Settlement

The Government, as already explained in a former announcement, has developed plans to help soldiers to become farmers, providing land, granting loans and giving training and supervision where necessary. It is expected that a large number of returning soldiers will take advantage of these opportunities. The scheme will involve the expenditure of some millions of dollars, a good deal of which will find its way into building materials, supplies, machinery, etc., all of which will assist in providing employment.

7. Road Building

The Government now has under consideration the question of joining the provincial governments in financing the construction of public highways. Should a favorable decision be reached, a large field for employment opportunities will be opened up. Regardless of Federal action, provincial governments are preparing their own road-making programmes.

The Government is alive to the necessity for providing employment opportunities, and stands prepared to assist in every way possible. If corporations and private citizens will join in this feature of Repatriation Work, Canada should have little difficulty with the employment problem.

WOULD FORM A PROVINCIAL POLICE FORCE

G. G. McGreer, M. P. P., Sends Suggestion to City for Force of Military Character.

A proposal forwarded to the City Council by G. G. McGreer, member of the Provincial Legislature for Richmond suggesting a plan for the establishment of a provincial police force to take the place of the municipal police throughout the province somewhat along the lines of the North-West Mounted Police, was set over for discussion in private before the committee of the whole council.

Strong Protest.

Before this was done, however, Alderman Casey took strong exception to the action of the Council because of the character of the proposal. He suggested that it was a proposal to take the power from the hands of the many and place it with the few, forming a military autocracy, particularly for the doing away with strikes. The resources of the country were already in the hands of the capitalist class and the dispossessed class were often compelled to go on strike. The purpose of this military constabulary was to remove control of the police from the people. They had just received the power of electing police commissioners, but this would put the people under martial law subject to military rule. He objected to the consideration of such a subject anywhere except in open council. The war had been fought to make the world safe for democracy. This was opposed to the blood that had been spilt was in the cause of democracy this was the absolute reverse.

The matter was then referred to the committee, only Alderman Casey opposing.

PRIVATE STILLS

Alberta Police Active in Unearthing Illicit Traffic in Liquor.

The active campaign being carried on by the Alberta Provincial Police against liquor importation and illicit stills has met with very substantial results recently. Several consignments of liquor being brought in over the railways as dry goods and in other clever disguises have been seized and the contents turned over to official caretakers. One of these seizures consisted of 24 bottles, another of 3 large crates, containing 40 cases of whisky, a third of 10 cases, while a fourth supply rescued from a mission of devilry was just a plain, ordinary every-day 10-gallon keg. Along with this work goes the unearthing of three private stills, two of these being located at St. Albert and the other at Morinville. In one of these cases a fine of \$500 was imposed upon one of the principals.

Supt. W. C. Bryan says the majority of these illicit stills are conducted by foreigners, and in most of the cases the appliances are of the crudest nature. Milk

WINE AND ITS WORK

To the Editor:
The ablest scientific men of Europe are practically a unit in their statements that wine drinking in all the wine-making parts of Europe has become a curse and should be stopped.
This is especially true of France, where physicians, lifelong residents of that country, declare with practical unanimity that much the greater part of sickness requiring their attention is the result of the use of alcohol. Children at school have their "blue Monday" because of drink. "The anti-alcohol movement in Europe," states that a teacher asked a pupil on a certain Monday, "What did you do yesterday, child?" and received the reply, "I was drunk with my mother and grandmother."

Before the war, a German scientist recorded this terrible fact: "that one can scarcely pick up a German newspaper without reading of a woman assaulted or beaten to death by a drunken person." And another scientist declared about the same time: "The carnal attacks on children, which have frantically increased, are generally committed in an alcoholic state, and even if the criminal is not actually drunk, alcohol has prepared the ground for the deed."

Why do men drink wine? Simply because of the alcohol that is in it. Does any sane person actually believe, as some assert, that wine drinking can promote social order when its effect in wine-drinking countries are of the character described?

Vance Thompson, not an extremist, says: "Let there be no doubt about it; the wine way to drunkenness is like any other. You say it is cleaner, with gayer prospects and brighter skies? Nine-tenths of that is cant and the cheap apologies of second-rate, brandy-loosened poets. It is not a clean way if you have followed the trail of the wine-drunkard home-faring."
