Launching League of Nations

PROPOSED CONSTITUTION OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS READ BY PRESIDENT AT PEACE CONFERENCE THIS MORNING

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, February 14.—The constitution proposed for the League of Nations was read at the Peace Conference today by President Wilson. A synopsis follows:—
Article 1.—The action of the high contracting parties under the terms of this covenant shall be effected through the instrumentality of a meeting of the body of delegates representing the high contracting parties, of meetings at more frequent intervals of an executive council, and of a permanent international secretariat to be established at the seat of the league.
Article 2.—Meetings of the body of delegates shall be held at stated intervals and from time to time as occasion may require for the purpose of dealing with matters within the sphere of action of the league. Each of the high contracting parties shall have one vote, but may have not more than three representatives.
Article 3.—Meetings of the council shall be held from time to time as occasion may require and at least once a year at whatever place may be decided upon. Invitations shall be sent to any power to attend a meeting of the council at which matters directly affecting its interests are to be discussed and no decision taken at any meeting will be binding on such power unless so invited.
Article 4.—All matters of procedure at meetings of the body of delegates or executive council, including appointment of committees to investigate particular matters shall be regulated by the body of delegates or executive council and may be decided by a majority of the states represented at the meeting. The first meeting of the body of delegates and of the executive council shall be summoned by the President of the United States.
Article 5.—The permanent secretary of the league shall be established at which shall constitute the seat of the league. The expenses of the secretariat shall be borne by the states which are the members of the league in accordance with the apportionment of expenses of the International Bureau of Universal Postal Union. The executive council shall consist of representatives of the United States of America, the British Empire, France, Italy and Japan, together with representatives of four other states, members of the league. The selection of these four states shall be made by the body of delegates on such principles and in such manner as they think fit. Pending the appointment of these, representatives of the other states shall be members of the executive council.

STATION SITE DEPENDS UPON THE SHIPYARDS

Freight Sheds to be Erected at Point Convenient to New Works.
That the Grand Trunk Pacific terminal buildings, including the freight sheds and passenger offices, will not be commenced until it is known exactly what will be the requirements of the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Co., Ltd., for their shipyards, was the word brought last night from the east by H. McCall, general superintendent of the G. T. P. western division.
Mr. McCall said he expected the officials of the shipbuilding concern would be here about the middle of next week, but he was averse to saying much about it because of the delays which had already taken place but which were not their fault.
Probable Location.
Discussing the probable location of the new sheds and yards, Mr. McCall said that the proposal was to have them located as near as possible to the shipyard as a matter of convenience. They would be able to tell exactly where as soon as the shipyards were laid out and the amount of land required for that purpose defined.
Engineer Here.
With Mr. McCall coming westward was R. Beaumont, superintendent of steamships and Chief Engineer J. A. Heamen. The latter went south last night to Swanson Bay in connection with the new car slip which is being put in for connecting that place by ferry with Prince Rupert. He will also proceed to Vancouver but will return this way.
G. A. McNicholl, W. E. Duperron and General Freight Agent Rosevear have gone to Vancouver and Seattle and will be here soon.

PRINCE RUPERT HOLDS RECORD FOR HEALTH

School Records Show that Pupils Hardly Ever Ill and Attend Regularly.
At the meeting of the school board last night, Dr. Kergin presiding, Principal Macdonald of the public schools reported that the number of pupils attending the schools had gone up to 540 since the opening of the new room in the Hays Block.
For the month of January, before that room was opened the number attending was 499 and the average actual attendance was 469, an average of 94 per cent. Some of the classes showed almost one hundred per cent. of attendance. This was most satisfactory and was due to the general health conditions of the city where the children were seldom ill.
Principal Brady of the High School also reported on the splendid general health conditions here and its effect on the schools.

DEBATE ON ADDRESS WILL END TODAY WITH SPEECH BY THE PREMIER; BOWSER STALE

DESPATCH DESCRIBES MEMBER FOR FORT GEORGE AS "OFFICIAL JESTER"—NO CONSTRUCTIVE CRITICISM OR SUGGESTIONS FROM OPPOSITION MEMBERS
(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Victoria, February 14.—With very little to disturb the even tenor of its way, the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne will end this afternoon with the closing speech of Premier Oliver.
Speeches throughout have been of an interesting type, outstanding among which were those of Major R. J. Burde, M. C.; M. A. McDonald, K. C., while the "Official Jester," in the person of W. R. Ross, member for Fort George, supplied a brand of humor described by David Whiteside as "suspiciously genial," foretelling the brewing of an approaching storm.
If the storm was to be the speech of the leader of the opposition which was delivered yesterday afternoon it failed to materialize. Mr. Bowser merely repeated his 1918 peroration with little newer arithmetic and generally trimmed with a few 1919 details. He was followed by Hon. W. J. Sloan, who, without preparation, fairly riddled the trivialities indulged in by Mr. Bowser with the suggestion that after the desired affliction of the party criticism it was time the leader of a great party through its opposition gave some thought to constructive criticism.
The night sessions start next week.

GOVERNMENT TAKES ACTION

Alien Enemies are to be Dealt with through County Court Judges.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, Feb. 14.—The Government has taken decisive action in the matter of dealing with alien enemies. Special regulations have been enacted by the Governor in Council, under powers conferred by the War Measures Act 1914, and now have the force of law, whereby, with respect to localities to be designated by the Minister of Justice, power is conferred upon county and district court judges to direct imprisonment as prisoners of war of persons of alien enemy nationality residing or being within designated localities.
Local representatives committees will investigate and report to Judges of the District.

CANADA'S CLAIM IS VERY LARGE

Germany to be Asked to Pay \$740,000,000 to This Country as Indemnity.
(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, Feb. 14.—Canada's claim against Germany including war expenditure to date now totals over \$740,000,000. The expenditure alone from the beginning of the war to the end of last month \$1,122,000,000. This represents accounts which have passed through the books of the Finance Department. In addition claims for actual enemy damages against Canadians, claims for damages by submarines and in other ways, now total about \$19,000,000.
Since a month ago, claims have been coming in steadily to the extent of probably another two and a half million dollars. The figures are of public interest in view of Mr. Bonar Law's statement that British delegates at the Peace Conference intend to claim indemnity which will include the cost of the war.

GERMANY PLANS PEOPLE'S ARMY

Bernstorff Will Not Attend Conference—Complete Disarmament to be Carried Out.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Weimar, Feb. 14.—Count von Bernstorff will not go to the Peace Conference as a German delegate. Germany plans, for the time being at least, a people's army on the basis of general conscription.
Germany will announce within a few days her intention to carry out complete disarmament and demobilization, and a commission made up of Centre, Democratic and Socialist parties is now discussing details of the new governmental programme.

RAILWAY WORK FOR RETURNED SOLDIERS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, Feb. 14.—Assurance that the Government proposes to pursue a vigorous policy of railway construction in the prairie provinces with the double object of benefitting sections of the country which lack transportation facilities and giving employment to returned soldiers, was obtained today by delegates from the Inter-provincial conference of mayors of Alberta and Saskatchewan. Only returned soldiers will be employed.

LABOR MEN IN BRITISH HOUSE

William Brace Asks Nationalization of Land, Railways and Mines—Railwayman Speaks.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, Feb. 14.—In the debate in the House of Commons on the address in reply to the speech from the throne Wm. Brace, the miners' representative, moved an official labor amendment, regretting that the King's speech mentioned no definite proposals for securing better conditions for labor. He declared there would be serious industrial unrest as long as the land, railways and mines were not nationalized.
Mr. Thomas, the railwaymen's leader, laid down these propositions: first, the state was greater than trade unions, second, that trade unionists must accept the verdict of the electors. He would never lead a strike against the considered judgment of the whole nation. He urged the laboring classes to recognize their own responsibility. If a genuine aim was made to redress their grievances and employers displayed toleration, he was not apprehensive regarding the future as long as that spirit prevailed.

POSTMEN ARE DEMANDING A MINIMUM WAGE

Various Reforms Asked By Convention Meeting at Saskatoon; Want to be Consulted.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Saskatoon, Feb. 14.—The western Postal Men's Association in convention here have demanded a minimum weekly wage of \$25.00 for all employees of the Postal Department except special messengers for whom \$600 a year is asked; abolition of work in basements, and the age for taking examinations taken as at the date of employment. The same treatment is asked for members of the railway mail service. Free speech is also demanded.
The following resolution was also passed: "That the Post Office Department consult with the recognized organizations of the employees before instituting and putting into force any change in the rates of pay or in working conditions."

More Houses Must Be Built.

Within the last twenty-four hours three people have called at The News office and complained that it was absolutely impossible to get a house or a decent apartment in the city. The result in one case was that a family had to leave town and in another that two families were unable to come here. It was a distinct loss to the city.

People are coming this way. They realize that there is to be something doing here in the near future and they wish to be in the thick of it. To house them should be the work of those who are here now. It is imperative that a move be made at once.

Should Have Sufficient Confidence.

Now that it is assured that shipbuilding will be in progress in this city within a very short time, it is time for those who have interests here to see that they make the most of them by encouraging building. Many people who own lots might erect small houses on them and make them revenue producing. Others might build houses to sell. The time to do it is now, for every day that the doors are closed against outsiders the city is losing.

Of course there are some who yet are sceptical as to the future of the city. Surely they must be satisfied that from the fishing and lumbering alone, combined with the development of the terminal facilities we are bound to have a good city. The thing is quite safe. People will always live here and they must live in houses.

Different Plans Have Been Suggested.

For those who cannot do much yet have a few dollars and would like to own a home it may be suggested that they form a co-operative building society. The general plan is for each member to pay in a fixed sum per month and as soon as there is a thousand dollars or any sum set in the regulations, a drawing will take place and a loan of the amount made, the same to be secured by land or property to the amount of double its value. Some of the members will have to wait until the end, but all will eventually get a loan and in the meantime houses are being built and the people who are paying in get interest on their money.

There are other plans for building but this one always encourages the erection of homes and that is what is needed here just now. There is an element of gambling in the scheme but no one loses.

Kind of House That is Attractive.

Just what kind of house to build is a problem. The wretchedly small lots here make it different from any other place to deal with architecturally. The cottage is what most people like, but it is difficult to put a cottage on a 25-foot lot and at the same time allow for light and passing room between the buildings. It requires a good deal of architectural skill to build to advantage on a narrow lot in order to give good results. Plans for this sort of house are in order. Beauty and comfort must both be considered for both are essential.

TEACHERS' SALARIES ARE DISCUSSED BY CITY SCHOOL BOARD

Principals Speak on Behalf of the Staff and Ask for General Advance.

A general advance of salaries was asked by Principal Brady of the high school and Principal Macdonald of the King Edward school on behalf of the whole teaching staff of the city at the school board meeting last night. Mr. Brady handed in a schedule of the salaries paid in Vancouver and spoke of the value of the work of the teachers to the community. Mr. Macdonald said there was a general feeling among the teachers that salaries were not high enough. The cost of living held firm.

Dr. Kergin pointed out that many of the teachers were engaged only last autumn and they knew what salaries they were to get when they accepted the positions. Now they wanted an almost immediate advance. He was sure, however, the school board wanted to be fair. He asked the principals to write the board a specific recommendation in regard to the amount they expected and the teachers who were doing the best work and were, therefore, most deserving. They must remember, however, that it was the people's money they were spending.

 New York, Feb. 13. — Announcement that all central labor bodies of the country will be asked by the Central Federated Union here to vote on the question of nation-wide "no beer no work" strike on July 1, made here by Ernest Bohm, secretary of the New York Union, who asked all labor organizations in this state to pass on the question.

MEAT PACKERS ARE INCREASING CONTROL

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 Washington, Feb. 13 — Francis J. Henri, former counsel for the Federal Trade Committee, testifying before the Inter-state Commerce Commission, declared that within ten years and probably within five, five leading meat packers would control the entire food supply of the country and would be able to charge any price they desired.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same on maps, and agrees to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 50 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTOR'S FREE GRANTS ACT.
 The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.
 Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly, if it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

FREE SCHOOL BOOKS AND DENTAL SERVICE

Trustee Shaw Asks That Board of Trustees Go on Record Asking for Each From Department.

Two resolutions were brought before the school board at their meeting last night by Trustee Fred Shaw. One of these asked the trustees to go on record in favor of free text books and supplies for the pupils and the other to provide free dental service for the pupils. The resolutions were laid on the table to be taken up at a future meeting when there is a larger attendance of the members of the Board.

Not Evenly Distributed.

In support of his motions Trustee Shaw said that those with large families could ill afford the burden of educating the children. He considered the burdens were not evenly distributed. Some had no children, others had from four to eleven. The children were a benefit to the state and he did not think the parents should have to buy books for them.

Dr. Kergin pointed out that already the Provincial Government provided most of the books. The geographies, British histories, dictionaries and some supplies were not provided, however, and these would cost two dollars or more per pupil. He did not see why the Government should not provide all the books and supplies.

Dental Treatment.

In regard to the resolution for free dental treatment Trustee Shaw said that many of the pupil especially those arriving from other countries had very bad teeth which had been neglected because the parents could not afford to look after them.

PLENTY OF LAND IS BEING OFFERED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Edmonton, Feb. 13.—One hundred offers of land in different parts of the province have been received by the Alberta office of the Soldiers' Settlement Board from private owners who are willing to sell under the new land scheme now pending. They are for various sized parcels ranging from quarter sections to blocks of 2,100 acres and prices quoted run from \$5 to \$30 per acre.

INTERNATIONAL ARMY IS NOT APPROVED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, Feb. 13.—Lord Robert Cecil, British representative on the League of Nations Commission, emphatically denied tonight the report spread in Paris today that the League of Nations Commission had approved of the creation of an international army and that the United States and Great Britain had conceded the point to France. He said the story must have been spread by an enemy of the Conference.

HEIR TO \$3,000,000

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Chicago, Feb. 13.—Daniel H. Tolman, eighteen, apprentice seaman at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station, has been identified as the missing heir to the \$3,000,000 estate of his uncle, Daniel H. Tolman, millionaire loan agent, who died a year ago and who operated a chain of loan offices in Canada and the States.

Creating Opportunities for Employment

BESIDES helping to distribute employment through a chain of Employment Offices, the Government has developed plans to create opportunities for employment.

Briefly, these plans cover the following phases:—

1. Public Works

During the war, many important Public Works have been held up. The Minister of Public Works, has his plans and preparations made to proceed with the more necessary of these in the near future. This Committee has also been in touch with Provincial Governments and Municipalities, with a view to impressing upon them the necessity for similar action. The building and public works programme now in sight will provide employment for many returned soldiers and war-workers.

2. Railways

During the past four years, a great deal of work necessary to keep our railways up to standard has been postponed. Some millions of dollars must be expended on improving road-bed, constructing bridges, buildings and other improvements. Vast quantities of ties are being got out this winter. Equipment of various kinds must be secured. The Minister of Railways states that as soon as weather conditions will permit, some thousands of men will be absorbed in various railway undertakings. The supplies and materials required will also provide employment.

3. Shipbuilding

The shipbuilding programme arranged for by the Government will provide employment for many men during 1919. It is expected that arrangements will be completed to keep the shipbuilding yards in active operation throughout the year. The Government recognises that this ship construction is one of the best means of providing suitable employment for many skilled and other workers.

4. Export Trade

The Government has established a Canadian Trade Commission. This Commission has an office in Canada and a "trade mission" overseas. Through this trade mission it is anticipated that Canada will secure an important share in the business of providing materials and manufactured products required for reconstruction work in Europe. A short time may be required before final details are completed and definite results are announced. The business so secured will be distributed through the regular channels of trade and thus afford extra opportunities for employment.

5. Housing

The Government has set aside the large sum of \$25,000,000 to be loaned through the Provinces in order to encourage the building of workmen's houses. When the season for building arrives, this work should give employment to many hundreds of men both in construction work and in the supply of materials.

6. Land Settlement

The Government, as already explained in a former announcement, has developed plans to help soldiers to become farmers, providing land, granting loans and giving training and supervision where necessary. It is expected that a large number of returning soldiers will take advantage of these opportunities. The scheme will involve the expenditure of some millions of dollars, a good deal of which will find its way into building materials, supplies, machinery, etc., all of which will assist in providing employment.

7. Road Building

The Government now has under consideration the question of joining the provincial governments in financing the construction of public highways. Should a favorable decision be reached, a large field for employment opportunities will be opened up. Regardless of Federal action, provincial governments are preparing their own road-making programmes.

The Government is alive to the necessity for providing employment opportunities, and stands prepared to assist in every way possible. If corporations and private citizens will join in this feature of Repatriation Work, Canada should have little difficulty with the employment problem.

WHEN SHOULD CHILD BEGIN THE STUDY OF DOMESTIC SCIENCE

Question Discussed by School Board Last Night on Initiative of Miss Marcellus.

When should a girl start the study of domestic science and at what stage in his scholastic career should a boy commence manual training? Those were the profound questions which were brought before the Board of School Trustees last night at their regular meeting for solution.

Miss Marcellus took exception to the breaking of the regulations in order to take in pupils from the Junior Third classes, claiming that not only did it break up the work to have them come in at this time of year, but that the pupils were not old enough to study such questions as the method of doing laundry work and housekeeping which was the work set for the first year. She had been teaching sewing instead, but she found the three-hour session much too long for the children to sit at close sewing. She asked for a ruling from the board as to whether the regulations were to be enforced.

Congestion.

After a long discussion in which Principal Macdonald showed the difficulties which they had to contend with on account of the congestion in the schools. Pupils had to be promoted in order to make room below for the pressure in the junior grades.

Mr. Shockley explained that the tools in his department were not suited to the very young boys. It was a physical impossibility for some of them to use the planes, and they had not received the groundwork in drawing which was necessary before they commenced the work with him.

The Decision.

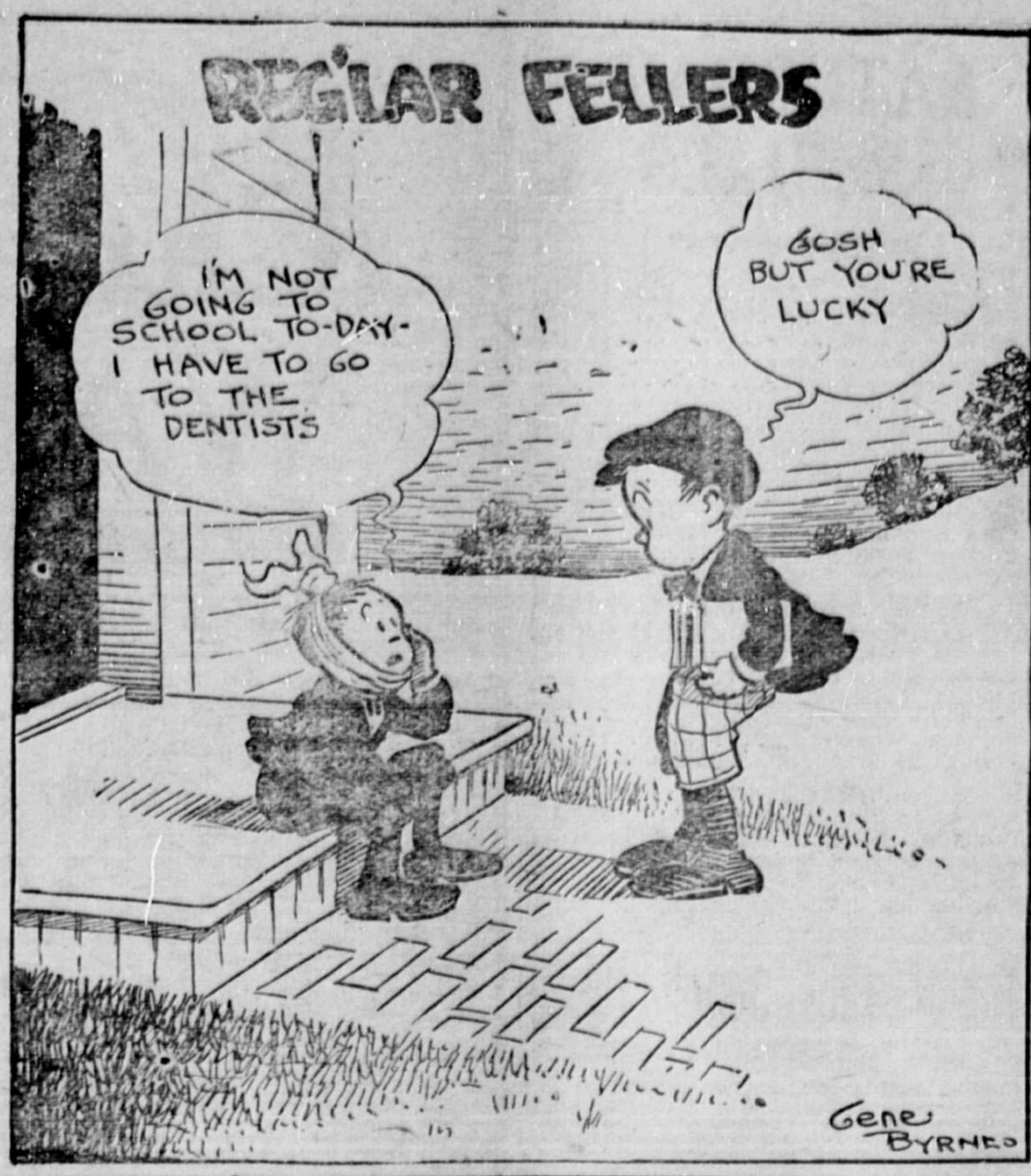
On motion of Trustee Shaw it was decided to allow no new classes to start manual training or domestic science this year and to refer the general question to a larger meeting of the board.

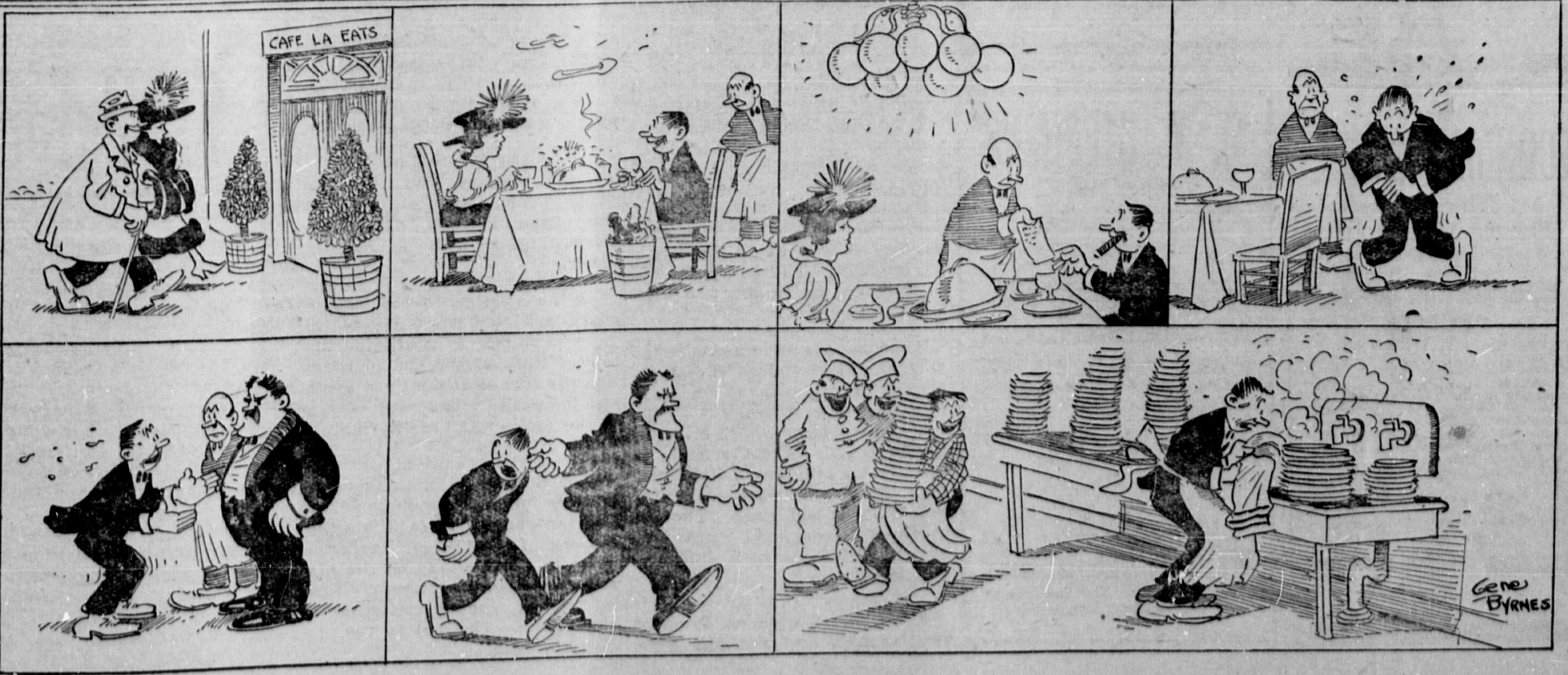

It seemed to be the general opinion of the members present last night that if possible a large public auditorium and a swimming tank for the use of the public should be included in the structure, as well as a clubhouse for returned men.

The committee will meet again soon to receive the report of the building committee.
