## MOTION ASKING RESIGNATION OF MR. DUNCAN

**Alderman Barrie Posts Notice at City Hall and Matter Will Come Up Monday.**

At the meeting of the Council last Monday Alderman Barrie complained that the superintendent had spoken most disrespectfully of him, quoting language which is not usually used in the press.

The matter will come up on Monday evening. There is also a motion promised by Alderman Perry in regard to the right of the Council in regard to appointments. As there is no notice of motion posted in regard to it, however, it may be dropped.

## MIGHT LEAD TO CIVIL WAR AND BLOODSHED

**Agitation to Have South Africa Declared Republic Condemned By Leader of Opposition.**

Capetown, South Africa, Feb. 15.—The decision of the Nationalist party to send a deputation to Europe to interview President Wilson with a view to getting South Africa declared a republic by the Peace Conference aroused an interesting debate in the Assembly.

Sir Thomas Smartt, leader of the opposition, moved that the House condemn the agitation now being carried on for dissolution of the union and severance of the connection now existing between South Africa and Great Britain. He further expressed the opinion that such agitation, if persisted in, would lead to civil war and bloodshed in South Africa.

## REPUBLIC RESTORED IN NORTH PORTUGAL

London, Feb. 15.—The people of Oporto, supported by republican forces, have restored the republic in northern Portugal. Pavia Couceira, royalist leader, has been arrested. Fighting at Oporto lasted 90 minutes. The news created enthusiasm at Lisbon. Part of the Government is proceeding to Oporto.

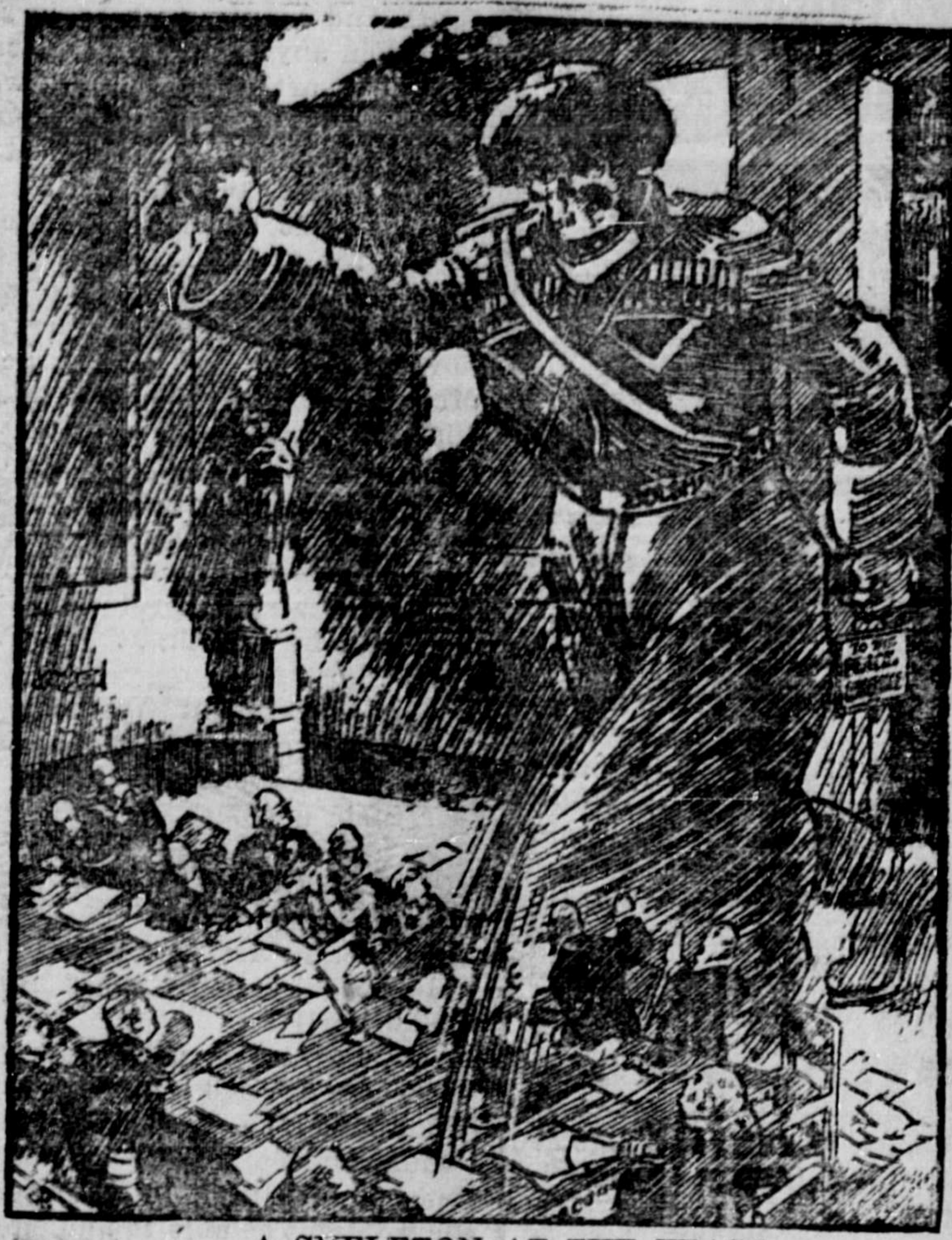
Ottawa, Feb. 15.—The output of Canadian factories in 1917 was over three billion dollars. During the war nearly seven hundred thousand workers were employed.

## UNIQUE OCCUPATION DURING THE WAR

**W. J. Pitman who is Starting in Business Here Had Interesting Experience.**

"Listening in" on the German wireless messages as they were flashed from one point to another in Europe has been the favorite pastime with Sergeant W. J. Pitman, who has recently come to locate here.

Sergeant Pitman went overseas from Vancouver with the Royal Engineers and was attached to the signallers' section. Owing to his thorough knowledge of the German language, which he acquired during several years' residence in Germany while studying music, Sergeant Pitman found himself particularly useful in keeping tabs on what the Germans were saying.

Only a few weeks returned from overseas, he was at one of the large stations in Surrey when the armistice was signed, and he had distinct pleasure in reading the German instructions sent from Spa, the German headquarters, to the Eiffel Tower for transmission to Erzeburger and the other German armistice delegates at Gen. Foch's headquarters.

Previous to war time, Mr. Pitman was one of the teachers at the Toronto Conservatory of Music, and is a pianist of some note. He has come to locate in Prince Rupert in the interests of the Heintzman & Co. piano house.

## RESIGNS BECAUSE OF DISAGREEMENT

Ottawa, Feb. 15.—Major J. L. Todd of the Board of Pension Commissioners, has resigned and his resignation has been accepted by the Government. The vacancy created has been filled by the appointment of Major Stanley Coristine who has been acting as secretary of the board.

The resignation of Major Todd has resulted from a disagreement with the Government as to the method of administration of the pensions.

## \$900,000 FOR DOLLY VARDEN

**Temiskaming Mining Co. Purchases Mine and Railway from Former Owners of Property.**

**ANTICIPATED PROFITS \$900,000 IN TWO YEARS**

It has usually been the custom for Cobalt mining companies to secure properties in other Northern Ontario fields, but the Temiskaming Mining Co. has made a somewhat new departure in jumping to British Columbia for a fresh property on which to extend its operation, says the Financial Post. At the annual meeting of Temiskaming shareholders this week, which by the way was somewhat slimly attended, the management were authorized to take the necessary steps to acquire the Dolly Varden Mine, a developed silver property located at Alice Arm, 96 miles north of Vancouver.

## Rich in Silver.

Both J. P. Bickell, the President, and Engineer Kaeding, of Dome Mines, who have examined the Dolly Varden, gave unreserved support to the proposed purchase. The mine was described as having more than 88,000 tons of ore averaging 18 ounces, which at one dollar an ounce would give \$1,601,654, or a profit of \$900,000. This ore could be taken out in two years. The owners of the mine had run out of funds with which to complete the building of a necessary railway line, and the Temiskaming Company, in return for assuming their liabilities, would get a first mortgage on all the property. Already about \$600,000 had been spent on the railway, a little more than 16 miles having been built, and the half-mile remaining could be built at a cost of about \$50,000. **Spent \$700,000.**

In all, the Dolly Varden vendors had spent upwards of \$700,000, but confidence was expressed by the speakers that the Temiskaming could clear away all the obligations in two years and thereafter own the property in fee simple. The extension of the railway line to another promising property two miles farther was under consideration, but the whole deal was contingent upon the legislature of British Columbia granting a new charter for the railway, the old one having expired on December 31 last.

## The Purchase Price.

While the Dolly Varden will cost \$900,000, which is approximately the amount of the Temiskaming surplus, it will not be necessary to use any of the surplus for the purpose. As explained by Mr. Bickell, no payment is to be made to the vendors of the Dolly Varden other than from the revenue to be derived from ore shipments from the mine itself.

**Money in Fishing  
 For Returned Soldiers.**

R. H. Pooley, the member for Esquimalt in the local legislature expressed the opinion on the floor of the House a few days ago that returned soldiers would find fishing an even more lucrative occupation than going on the land. That is probably true. If the Government would make a grant sufficiently large to cover the cost of a boat and tackle and provide instruction to the men, just as they do in farming, there might be a good many take it up as a permanent occupation.

To expect however that a soldier who has never fished is to make a good living from fishing without having had any instruction in the art, would be just as foolish as to expect him to go on a farm and make a living under similar circumstances.

There is nothing easy about fishing nor is it an occupation that anyone can follow without learning. Instruction and experience are necessary. New men by sharing with an experienced man, one finding the money and the other the experience, some times makes good, but it is not a game to be learned in a day. Fishing is a distinct craft and if returned men are to take it up, as they will may, they must be taught. There is an element of excitement about it that is not found on the farm and which would very likely appeal to the men who have been overseas.

**Look to Teachers  
 In Educational Matters.**

At the school board meeting this week Dr. Kergin, chairman of the Board, stated that they looked to the members of the teaching staff to make suggestions in matters pertaining to their work. The trustees wanted to do the best they possibly could for the pupils, but the members of the board were not trained in matters educational and therefore they expected to receive advice from those who were in a position to give it.

The trustees, Dr. Kergin said, were elected from year to year and knew nothing about schools. He believed in leaving the technical work to the teachers.

The doctor might have gone on to say that almost every person believes himself to be an expert in matters educational because every person has been to school at some time or other, and the system then in vogue is looked upon by many as the one which should obtain now. They do not remember that there is progress in every walk of life and that there must have been progress in teaching since the days when most of us went to school.

Before taking a school every teacher has to take a course of training in pedagogy which is supposed to fit him for the work in hand. Almost a year is spent in the training school after he has received a certificate of competence educationally. During that time he studies methods of teaching, psychology, logic, and some of the arts and refinements which go with the profession. This puts him in a position to advise on matters educational as well as to teach.



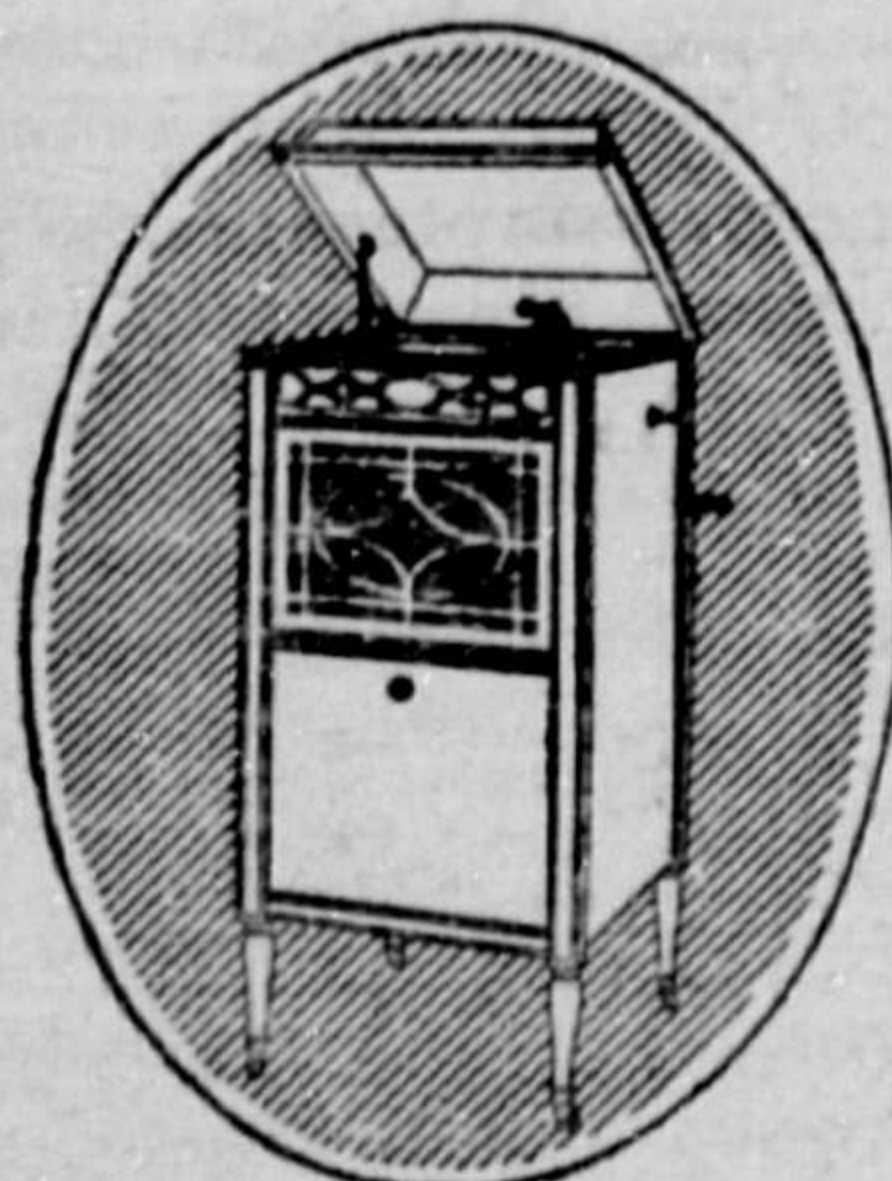

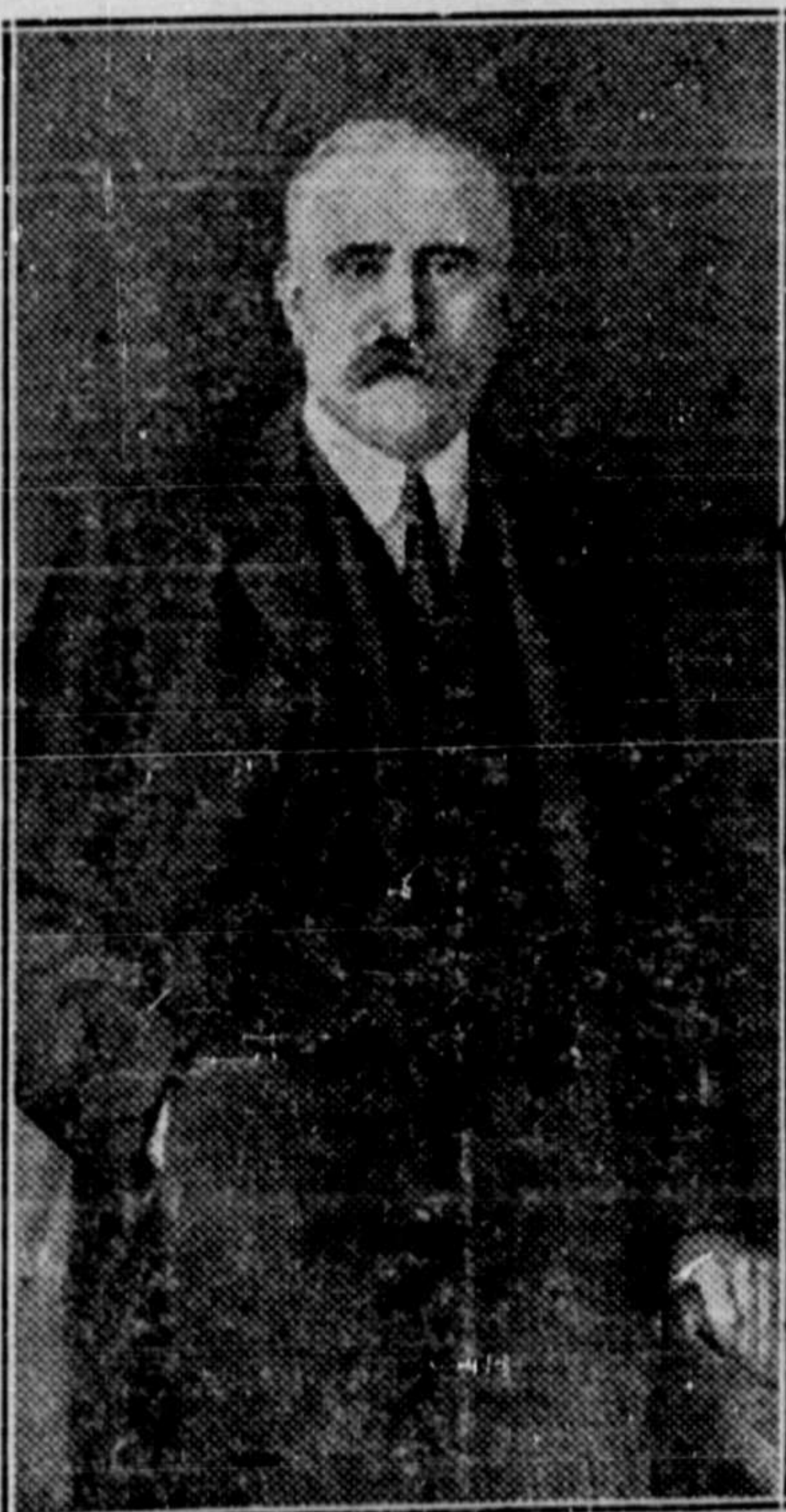
It is safe to say that with such an attractive lot of films the theatre will be well filled again tonight for the repeat performance.

SUGGESTION IS COMMITTEE TO MEET SOLDIERS

Mayor Receives Letter Asking for Its Formation to Welcome Men Home.

The following circular letter has been sent to all mayors of cities and reeves of municipalities throughout the country, including Mayor McClymont, in regard to the formation of local welcome committees:

"The urgent problems in connection with the demobilization of our army and the re-establishment of industry on a peace basis have led to the formation of the Repatriation Committee, in connection with which I am now acting as the representative of the Municipal organizations of Canada.

"The urban and rural municipalities can play a great and important part in the problems of the demobilization period, in giving a 'Welcome Home' to the returning soldier, and his family, in helping the soldier to secure employment and generally in assisting him to re-establish himself in civil life.

Men and Women.

"In every municipality that has sent soldiers overseas there should be an Honorary Committee of citizens, composed of both men and women who will assume a measure of responsibility in this important work. There may possibly be such a committee already in existence in your municipality, if so we would like to know; if not, I would respectfully urge, on behalf of this Committee, that one should be formed at once. The functions of a 'Welcome Home' Committee should be as follows:"

Functions.

- (1) To welcome all returned soldiers and their dependents on their arrival in your locality. (2) To receive any complaints from returned soldiers and to forward them to the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, Ottawa, for investigation. (3) To help the returned soldiers to find employment. (3) If at any time employment cannot be found in your locality for a returned soldier, to report particulars to the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment. (5) If positions exist in your locality for which returned soldiers are not available, to notify the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, so that men can be sent from the nearest demobilization centre to occupy them. (6) To co-operate with voluntary organizations. (7) To keep a general oversight over the interests of returned soldiers and their families.

Questions.

Enclosed is a postcard on which are printed seven important questions. I shall be glad if you will be kind enough to have this card filled out and returned at your earliest convenience. I need not say that the Repatriation Committee will be only too glad to answer any inquiries which you may make with regard to those problems which come within its scope. All communications can be sent post free.

Creating Opportunities for Employment

BESIDES helping to distribute employment through a chain of Employment Offices, the Government has developed plans to create opportunities for employment.

Briefly, these plans cover the following phases:—

1. Public Works

During the war, many important Public Works have been held up. The Minister of Public Works, has his plans and preparations made to proceed with the more necessary of these in the near future. This Committee has also been in touch with Provincial Governments and Municipalities, with a view to impressing upon them the necessity for similar action. The building and public works programme now in sight will provide employment for many returned soldiers and war-workers.

2. Railways

During the past four years, a great deal of work necessary to keep our railways up to standard has been postponed. Some millions of dollars must be expended on improving road-bed, constructing bridges, buildings and other improvements. Vast quantities of ties are being got out this winter. Equipment of various kinds must be secured. The Minister of Railways states that as soon as weather conditions will permit, some thousands of men will be absorbed in various railway undertakings. The supplies and materials required will also provide employment.

3. Shipbuilding

The shipbuilding programme arranged for by the Government will provide employment for many men during 1919. It is expected that arrangements will be completed to keep the shipbuilding yards in active operation throughout the year. The Government recognises that this ship construction is one of the best means of providing suitable employment for many skilled and other workers.

4. Export Trade

The Government has established a Canadian Trade Commission. This Commission has an office in Canada and a "trade mission" overseas. Through this trade mission it is anticipated that Canada will secure an important share in the business of providing materials and manufactured products required for reconstruction work in Europe. A short time may be required before final details are completed and definite results are announced. The business so secured will be distributed through the regular channels of trade and thus afford extra opportunities for employment.

5. Housing

The Government has set aside the large sum of \$25,000,000 to be loaned through the Provinces in order to encourage the building of workmen's houses. When the season for building arrives, this work should give employment to many hundreds of men both in construction work and in the supply of materials.

6. Land Settlement

The Government, as already explained in a former announcement, has developed plans to help soldiers to become farmers, providing land, granting loans and giving training and supervision where necessary. It is expected that a large number of returning soldiers will take advantage of these opportunities. The scheme will involve the expenditure of some millions of dollars, a good deal of which will find its way into building materials, supplies, machinery, etc., all of which will assist in providing employment.

7. Road Building

The Government now has under consideration the question of joining the provincial governments in financing the construction of public highways. Should a favorable decision be reached, a large field for employment opportunities will be opened up. Regardless of Federal action, provincial governments are preparing their own road-making programmes.

The Government is alive to the necessity for providing employment opportunities, and stands prepared to assist in every way possible. If corporations and private citizens will join in this feature of Repatriation Work, Canada should have little difficulty with the employment problem.

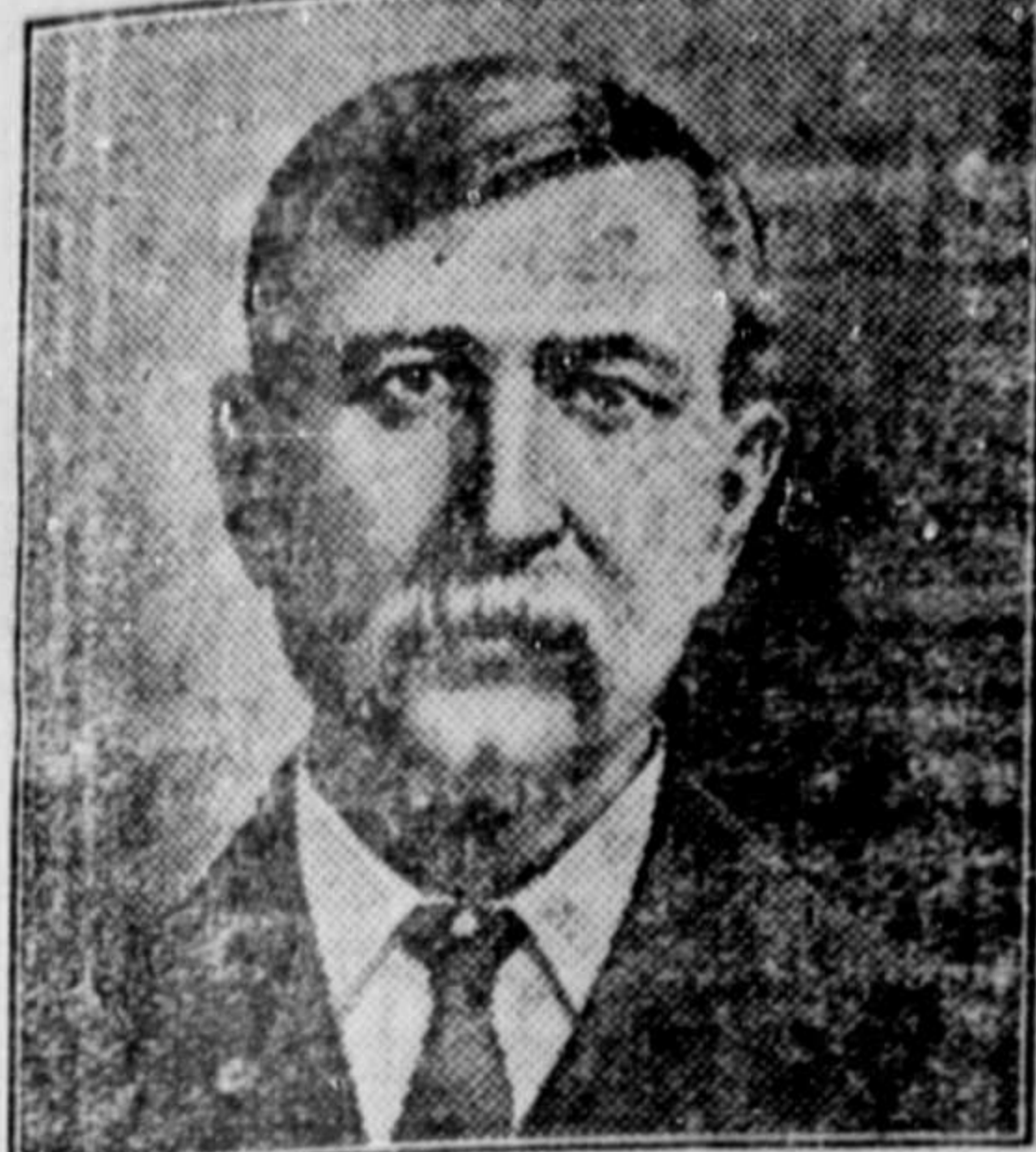

Theatre and Film Donated by Westholme Management for Tuesday Evening Next.

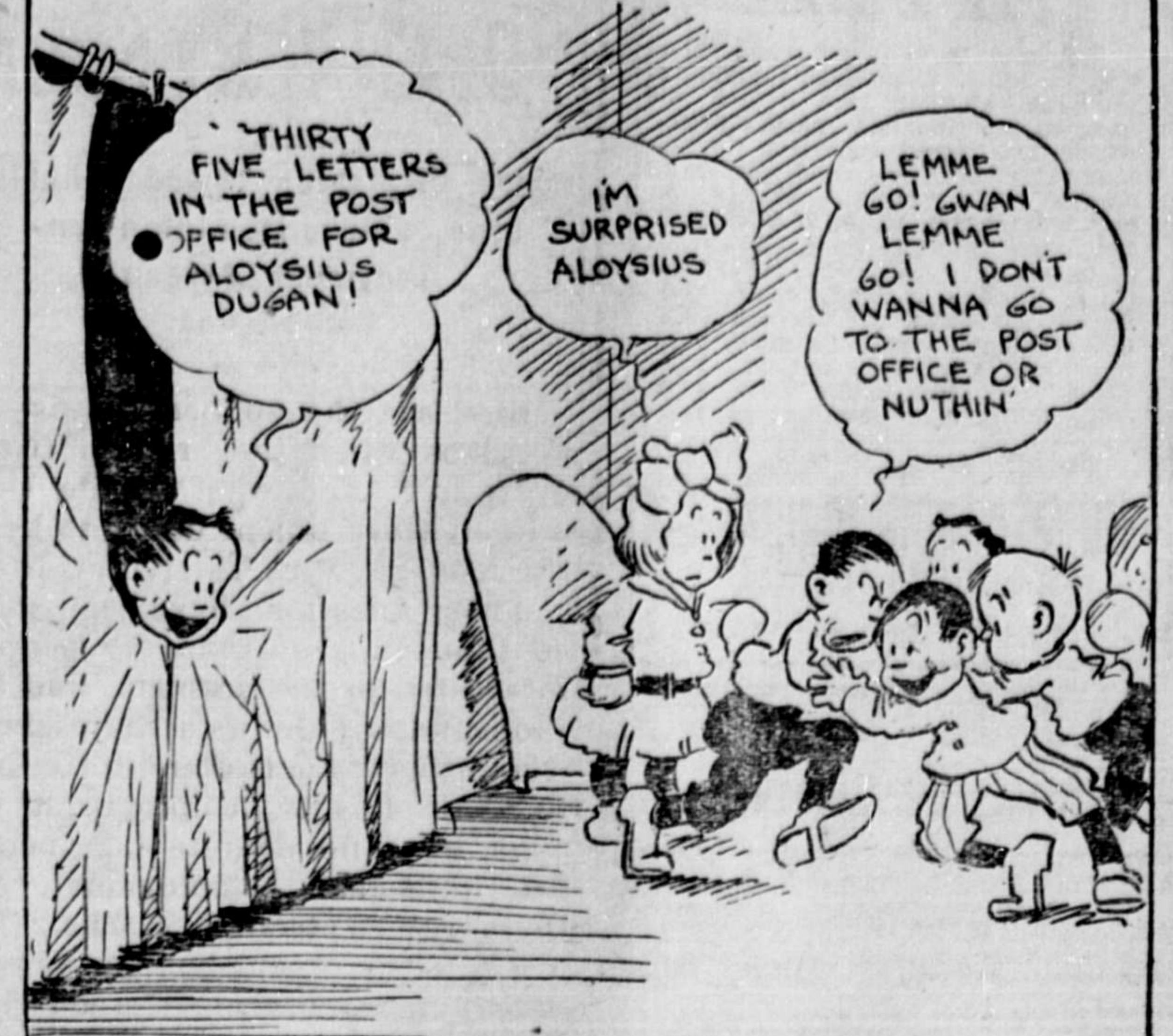

**WELL KNOWN LOCAL LADY PASSES ON**

Madame Besner was an old country French woman, being born near Paris. She has a son and daughter there now, both married and with children. She expected to leave here next week on a trip to France to see her family after our years of war. She had endeavored to get across to France about a year ago, but was not permitted.

Having spent several years in the Yukon, from 1897 onwards, Madame Besner has been on the Pacific coast since that time and a very wide circle of friends and acquaintances will mourn her loss.

**64 EMPLOYMENT OFFICES WILL OPEN VERY SOON**

Every City Over 10,000 Inhabitants to Have Dominion Employment Bureau Established.

How are the soldiers going to get jobs when they return from overseas? And what is the Dominion Government doing to help the men get back to civilian life? These questions have been asked thousands of times by people interested in the problem, and by thousands of the men themselves who either do not intend to return to their former employment or who have no definite prospects for immediate employment, on their return from overseas.

The Government has decided to distribute employment and with this end in view has decided to establish employment offices in every centre of Canada where the population is 10,000 or over. There will be 64 offices established to start with.

The Government has decided that no effort will be spared and no opportunity missed to help the returned men and any other man or woman seeking employment, to get a job. Employers of labor can secure help through the same source—the Government Employment Office.

**The Method.**

A superintendent will be in charge of each office, with a staff whose duty it will be to bring the job-seeker and the job-giver together. The local offices are under the direction of a provincial clearing house, with three Dominion Clearing Houses at Halifax, Ottawa and Winnipeg. To the provincial headquarters reports are sent daily on the employment situation collated and sent in to the Dominion Clearing Houses, so that the Government will be accurately informed every day as to labor conditions in Canada. Weekly reports sent in by manufacturers and by trades unions amplify the information. In addition to distributing employment the Government has plans by which more work will be made available.
