Sir Wilfred Laurier Passes On

Honored Leader of the Great Liberal Party Died Today Following Paralytic Stroke

Sir Wilfrid was Preparing to Leave for Church when Seizure Came and He Failed to Rally; His Demise is Generally Regretted by Members of all Parties.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, February 17.—Right Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, C.M.G., died this afternoon at 2:15, following a stroke of paralysis which he was taken yesterday.

When the news came that he was ill there were general expressions of regret from members of all political parties and today prominent men and women were dumb with sorrow at the passing of the most picturesque national figure that has ever appeared in the political life of Canada.

Men who had differed with the "Great Chieftain" were keen in expressing their views that the loss was a national one and not in any sense a political one.

The nation is in mourning, for her greatest citizen is dead.

Paralytic Stroke.

Ottawa, Feb. 17.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier was seized with a stroke of paralysis yesterday morning and his condition critical. Seizure came shortly before 11 o'clock.

Sir Wilfrid when dressing for church suddenly became unconscious and fell to the floor in the adjoining room, making much noise. An assistant rushing to his aid and gave the alarm and Sir Wilfrid was carried to bed and shortly afterwards his medical adviser, Dr. R. Chevrier was in attendance.

It was a couple of hours later that Sir Wilfrid began to show signs of recovery. His condition gradually improved and he regained speech. However, a few hours afterwards he relapsed and is sinking gradually.

Attended Luncheon.

Sir Wilfrid attended the Canadian Club luncheon Saturday and in the afternoon was at his office

preparing for the session until five o'clock. So well did the opposition leader feel that he went home in a street car instead of his automobile, yet there is no doubt that the strain of the last few weeks have told on his strength.

There have been numerous interviews and discussions. Anxious to play his full part in the session which opens on Thursday Sir Wilfrid had not spared himself.

At Convention.

There had further been much work to be done in organizing the Ontario Liberal Convention where Sir Wilfrid made his last public appearance. The occasion was the Eastern Ontario convention of a month ago. Sir Wilfrid then addressed the delegates at the evening meeting in St. Patrick's Hall. He spoke for almost an hour and there was no sign of an imminent collapse.

His Career.

Wilfrid Laurier was a son of Carolus and Marcelle Laurier and was born at St. Lin, Quebec. He was educated at the public schools of his native province, and took courses at McGill and holds degrees from Oxford, Cambridge, Queen's University, Laval and Glasgow.

First elected to the Quebec Assembly as the member for Drummond and Athabaska and later to the Dominion House as member for a constituency of the same name, he has had a continuous and successful parliamentary career. He became premier in 1896 and continued as head of the Government until 1911, when he was defeated on the reciprocity issue. Since that time he has led the opposition.

MUCH FISH ARRIVES, SELLS AT GOOD PRICE

Fourteen Cents Paid for All Sold Yesterday and Saturday; Seven Get Clearance.

The fishing boat Helgoland which arrived yesterday with 26,000 lbs. of halibut had a hard time while she was out on her last trip. She was away a month and there was but one day's good fishing. On that day she took 15,000 lbs. and the other 10,000 lbs. was caught in two other days.

Other boats which sold their catches yesterday were: Elfin, 3,500 lbs.; Chimera, 9,000; Atlas, 17,000; Arctic, 18,000, all American. The Canadian boats were Wanderer, 11,000 lbs.; Nelly, 7,000, and Advance, 6,000 lbs., all the fish selling at 14c and 8c.

SHIPYARD MEN BACK TO WORK

To Return Wednesday at Same Rate of Pay After Being Out a Month.

Seattle, February 17.—Seattle's shipyards will resume operations next Wednesday after having been idle since the 25,000 metal trade workers walked out on January 21 on strike for higher wages. Announcement to this effect was formally issued last night by the shipyard workers. The workers will be employed at the yard gates at the same rate of pay as existed January 21.

GERMANS STOP NEGOTIATIONS WITH ALLIES

Alleged Conditions Imposed on them are too Severe; Want Blockade of Ports Re-moved.

Geneva, February 17.—The Swiss telegraphy agency has received a telegram from Berlin stating that the German armistice commission had suspended the negotiations with the Allies at Spa because it considered that the new allied conditions were much too severe. The Germans continue to complain against the British blockade and further controversies are predicted over the military occupation of the Rhine towns, the expulsion of undesirable Germans and the lack of railway transportation in Germany.

CONFERENCE IS MAKING VERY SLOW PROGRESS

Much Dissatisfaction That Peace is Not Concluded, Allowing Unrest to Continue.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, Feb. 17.—John A. Dafoe cables that there are increasing evidences of dissatisfaction among delegates over the leisurely progress made by the Peace Conference towards the accomplishing of the preliminary purpose for which the conference was called, the conclusion of peace, thus permitting the world to set itself to the problems of peace. A situation of neither war or peace, with resumption of hostilities a possibility, even though a remote one, encourages industrial and political unrest, which is becoming more manifest in European countries with each passing week. It is felt that the organization of the conference does not expedite proceedings.

CAPITAL AND LABOR MEET TO DISCUSS MUTUAL PROBLEMS

London, February 17.—The Government has decided to convene, probably within the present month, a national conference composed of the representatives of both capital and labor in order to seek a settlement of the present industrial unrest. Premier Lloyd George is devoting himself actively to the promotion of this conference, which will be the most important ever yet assembled to deal with the many labor problems.

Monday Preachment On the City's Needs.

The News has on several occasions drawn attention to two important needs in this town. One is some means of securing proper exercise, and the other is the lack of mental stimuli in the form of books. To overcome the first there should be some form of physical classes, especially designed for men in business or working in offices. For the second a public library is necessary.

Physical Exercise Comes First.

The first need of every man is to see that he has a sound body and to keep it sound. Young people do that naturally through their games and sports. It is difficult to stop children from playing and it is wicked to do it. Play is as necessary as feed, but like food, of course, it must be taken at proper seasons.

With older people who become engrossed in their work often the recreation feature is missed. Dancing to some extent fills the need, but there is not sufficient regularity about that pastime. As a rule the dances are held at irregular intervals and many of them are continued too long. Two hours of dancing does a man or woman good; four or five hours of the same thing must be harmful. More Cinderella dances would be an advantage.

Good Opportunity To Fill the Need.

For those who do not dance or who look on dancing with more or less suspicion there is skating. Prince Rupert has a fine rink and all the conveniences for the best possible form of exercise. To some extent the sport has fallen into disuse, but it seems likely to revive, in fact, according to report, is already reviving. Nothing could be better for physical development than an hour in the evening on rollers.

As there is no Y. M. C. A. or other institution here designed especially for the purpose of providing men and women with physical training it has been suggested that an organization should be formed to put on physical classes in some convenient hall such as the roller rink. Doubtless that place could be secured for the purpose at hours when it is not in use for skating, and there could be nothing more suitable. The hall is big enough for basket ball, hockey or indoor baseball, and those who wish could then take a turn on the rollers when the eight o'clock gong sounds. It is worth considering by those who have at heart the welfare of the people generally.

Too Much Loafing And Nothing to Do.

There is too much loafing in town. People hang around street corners and in stores and other places in a way that would not be tolerated elsewhere. There is no need for that if there was something else to do. One or two men who were really interested in the welfare of the city and who had a few hours to spare could rectify it to a large extent. There is plenty of scope for religious exercises. There are half a dozen almost empty churches, but the physical well being, which should be the first care of the community, seems to be almost wholly neglected.

Initiative and Leadership.

The News has been asked why, as it is so keen on suggesting all these things, it does not start an organization. It is a foolish suggestion. The province of a newspaper is to suggest things. Many of the suggestions may never be carried out, but to bring them to the attention of the people is a duty.

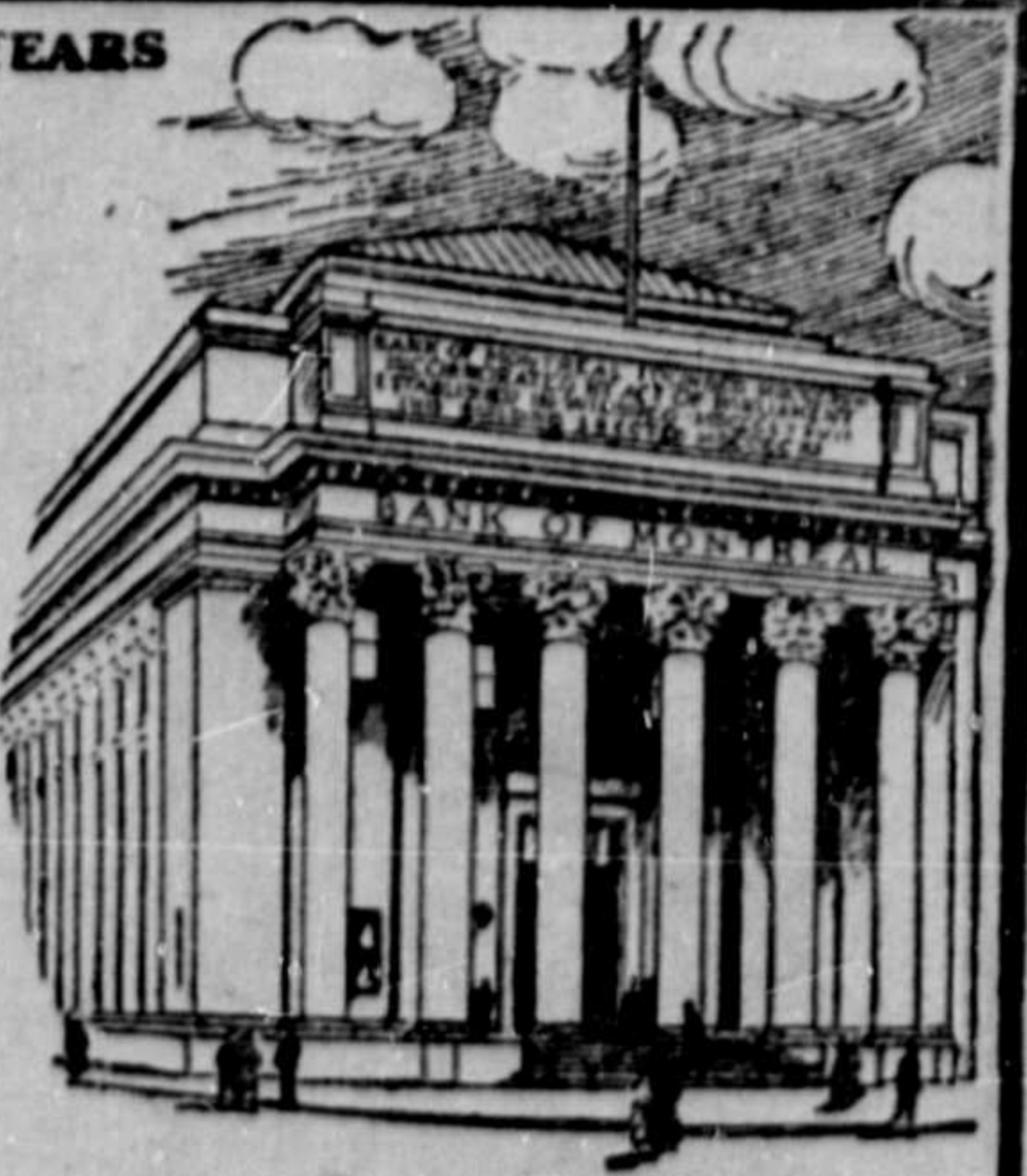

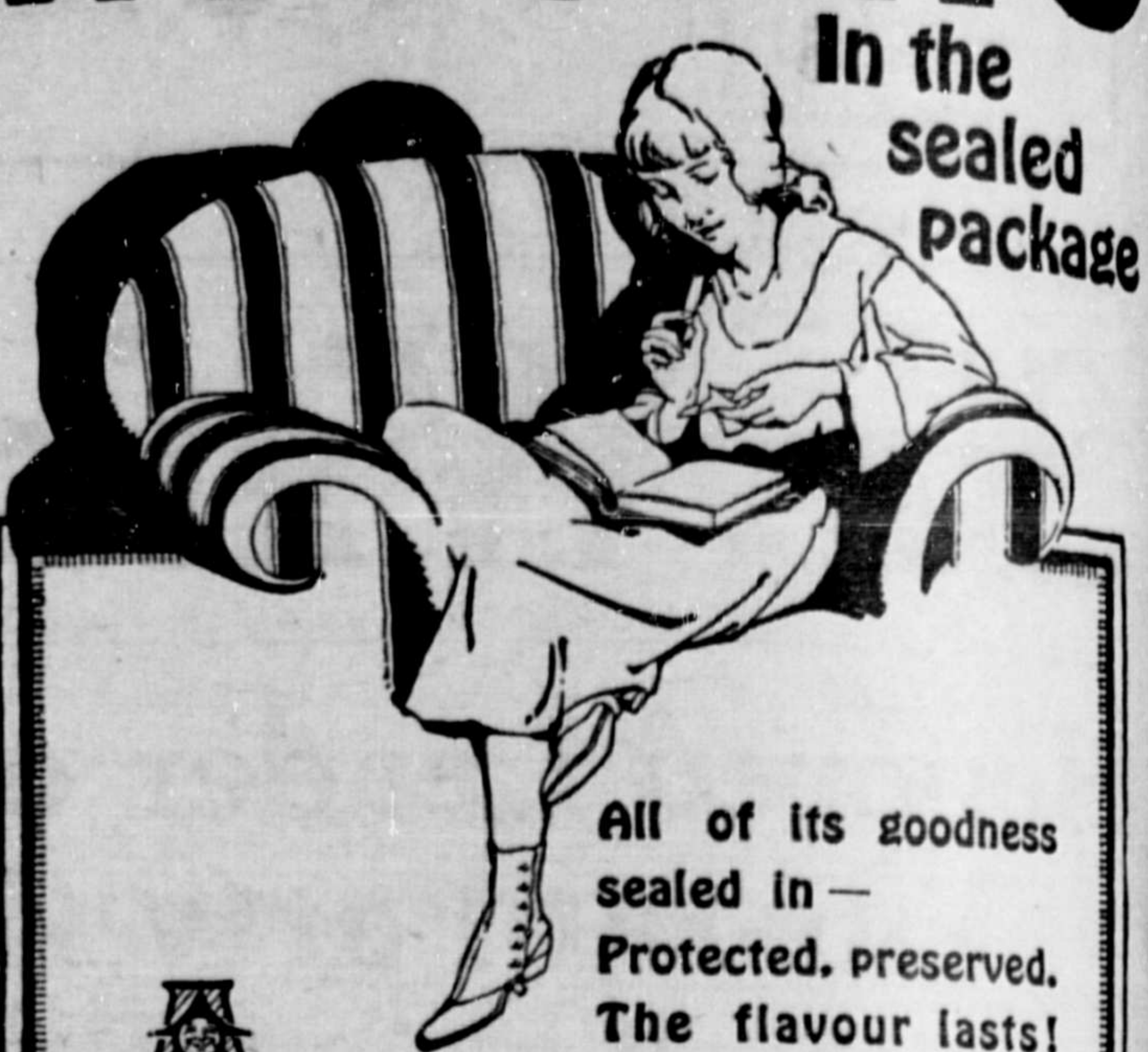

With 250 tons of the richest ore that has been shipped from British Columbia in her hold the S.S. Prince John arrived from Stewart yesterday and later in the evening continued to Tacoma smelter.

Road Bad.

The ore came from the famous Bush mine, it having been brought down from the mine on sleighs. Owing to the bad state of the road it has been difficult to get ore out this winter. The horses were 150 getting in, the snow being about ten feet deep when they arrived. As a result it was almost impossible to get a good road. The method usually adopted is to break the road directly the snow begins to fall and keep it broken all winter. It is probable that no ore would have been shipped this winter except that the owners felt that they owed it to the district to show that they had the ore and that it was very rich.

Large Influx.

It is expected that as a result of the operations of the Bush mine and of the other developments and tests which have taken place in the district, there will be a large influx of mining men into the Stewart district this coming summer. Many of the mines are preparing to ship and it is expected that the Dominion Government will build a wharf there as soon as the weather is ready for work.

Cobblestones.

The Prince John loaded 28 tons of cobblestones here which came right through from Denmark for use in the crusher of the concentrator at Surf Inlet. The boat will go from there to Seattle and Tacoma and then call at Vancouver on the return trip.

The Prince Albert will be here before Thursday to take the regular run to the Islands.

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but in place of them four many arrangements for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 1 year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.
Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will entitle them to, in proportion to the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

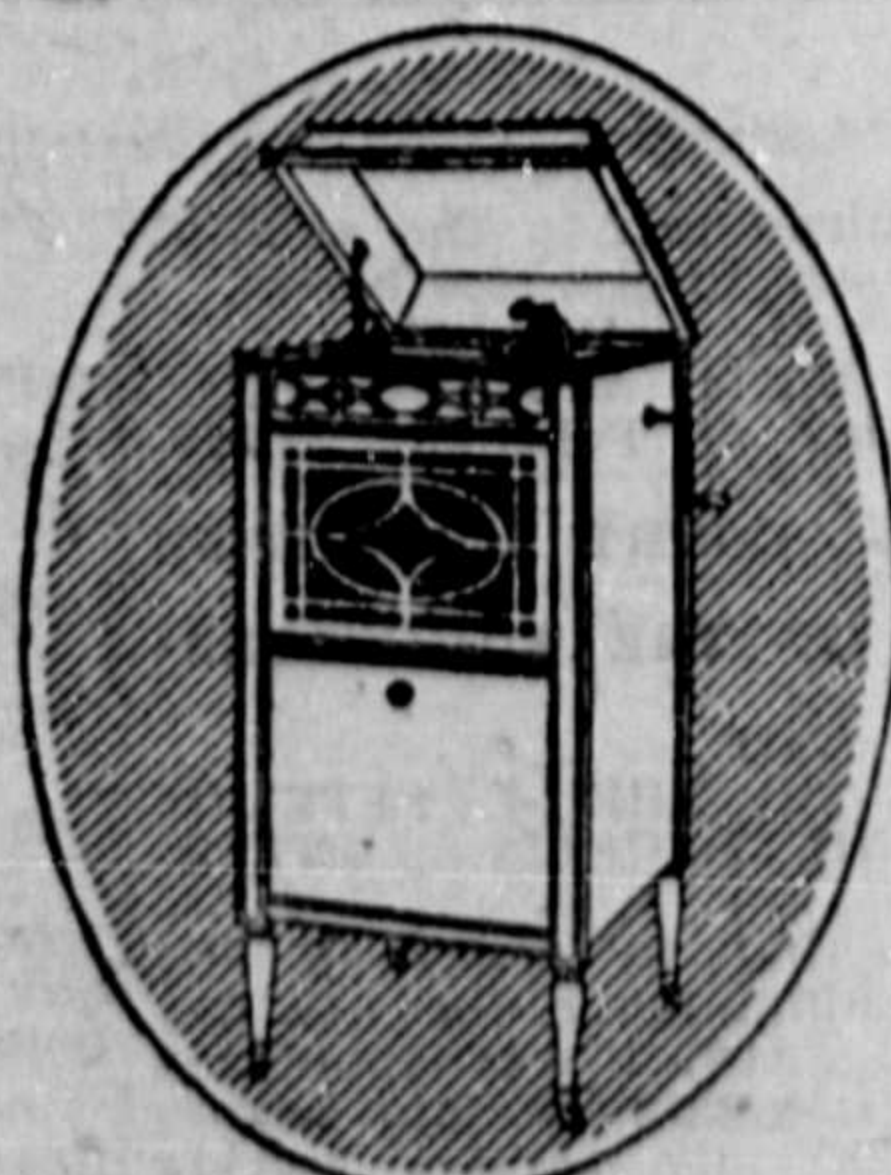

War to Peace



Creating Opportunities for Employment

BESIDES helping to distribute employment through a chain of Employment Offices, the Government has developed plans to create opportunities for employment.

Briefly, these plans cover the following phases:—

1. Public Works

During the war, many important Public Works have been held up. The Minister of Public Works, has his plans and preparations made to proceed with the more necessary of these in the near future. This Committee has also been in touch with Provincial Governments and Municipalities, with a view to impressing upon them the necessity for similar action. The building and public works programme now in sight will provide employment for many returned soldiers and war-workers.

2. Railways

During the past four years, a great deal of work necessary to keep our railways up to standard has been postponed. Some millions of dollars must be expended on improving road-bed, constructing bridges, buildings and other improvements. Vast quantities of ties are being got out this winter. Equipment of various kinds must be secured. The Minister of Railways states that as soon as weather conditions will permit, some thousands of men will be absorbed in various railway undertakings. The supplies and materials required will also provide employment.

3. Shipbuilding

The shipbuilding programme arranged for by the Government will provide employment for many men during 1919. It is expected that arrangements will be completed to keep the shipbuilding yards in active operation throughout the year. The Government recognises that this ship construction is one of the best means of providing suitable employment for many skilled and other workers.

4. Export Trade

The Government has established a Canadian Trade Commission. This Commission has an office in Canada and a "trade mission" overseas. Through this trade mission it is anticipated that Canada will secure an important share in the business of providing materials and manufactured products required for reconstruction work in Europe. A short time may be required before final details are completed and definite results are announced. The business so secured will be distributed through the regular channels of trade and thus afford extra opportunities for employment.

5. Housing

The Government has set aside the large sum of \$25,000,000 to be loaned through the Provinces in order to encourage the building of workmen's houses. When the season for building arrives, this work should give employment to many hundreds of men both in construction work and in the supply of materials.

6. Land Settlement

The Government, as already explained in a former announcement, has developed plans to help soldiers to become farmers, providing land, granting loans and giving training and supervision where necessary. It is expected that a large number of returning soldiers will take advantage of these opportunities. The scheme will involve the expenditure of some millions of dollars, a good deal of which will find its way into building materials, supplies, machinery, etc., all of which will assist in providing employment.

7. Road Building

The Government now has under consideration the question of joining the provincial governments in financing the construction of public highways. Should a favorable decision be reached, a large field for employment opportunities will be opened up. Regardless of Federal action, provincial governments are preparing their own road-making programmes.

The Government is alive to the necessity for providing employment opportunities, and stands prepared to assist in every way possible. If corporations and private citizens will join in this feature of Repatriation Work, Canada should have little difficulty with the employment problem.

FISHING LICENSES FOR SALE, SAYS SUN

The Vancouver Sun has an editorial article under the heading "Sale of Fishing Licenses" as follows:

"It hardly seems right that fishing licenses in British Columbia should be regular articles of merchandise, placed on sale in real estate offices and eagerly sought at prices ranging up to several thousand dollars. If these things are valuable property, why shouldn't their whole value go into the coffers of the province instead of into the pockets of private citizens?"

"Before any timber limits or coal areas are sold or leased by the Crown the law requires them to be advertised and they must go to the highest bidder. Publicity is thus used to safeguard the interests of the province and to ensure the obtaining of a fair price."

"No such safeguard has hitherto been considered necessary with respect to fishing licenses. They are issued to applicants privately and at nominal cost."

"No blame can be said to attach to anybody for this system. It has developed gradually through the years, and the clashing of federal and provincial jurisdictions is largely responsible for it. But surely the time has come for a change. Why should they not be advertised and in fact treated strictly in every way as the commercial article which they are?"

FARMERS ORGANIZE

Preliminary Steps Taken to Form Smithers Farmers' Institute.

There was a good representative attendance at the meeting held Saturday afternoon for the purpose of taking the necessary steps preliminary to the organization of a farmers' institute at this end of the district, says the Interior News. About two dozen of the farmers from the territory tributary to Smithers were present. George Oulton was in the chair, and L. L. DeVoin acted as secretary, and it was decided to apply to the deputy minister of agriculture for the necessary permission to organize an institute to be known as the Smithers Farmers' Institute.

R. E. Williams, the new secretary of the Telkwa institute, and Mr. Caldwell, sales and purchasing agent of the same society, were present and addressed the meeting. Both gave much appreciated information on the organization work, and extended the right hand of fellowship to the new institute.

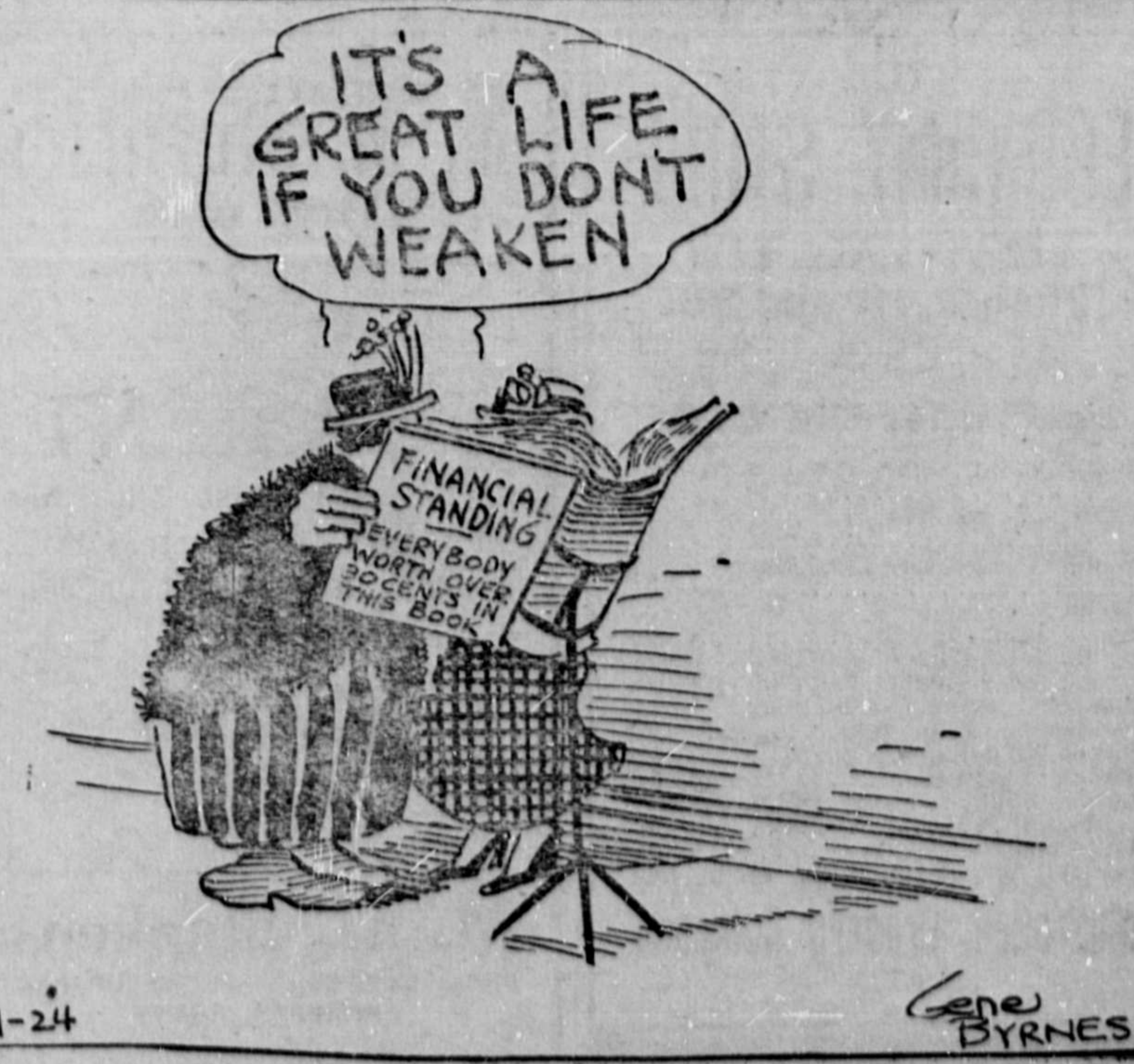
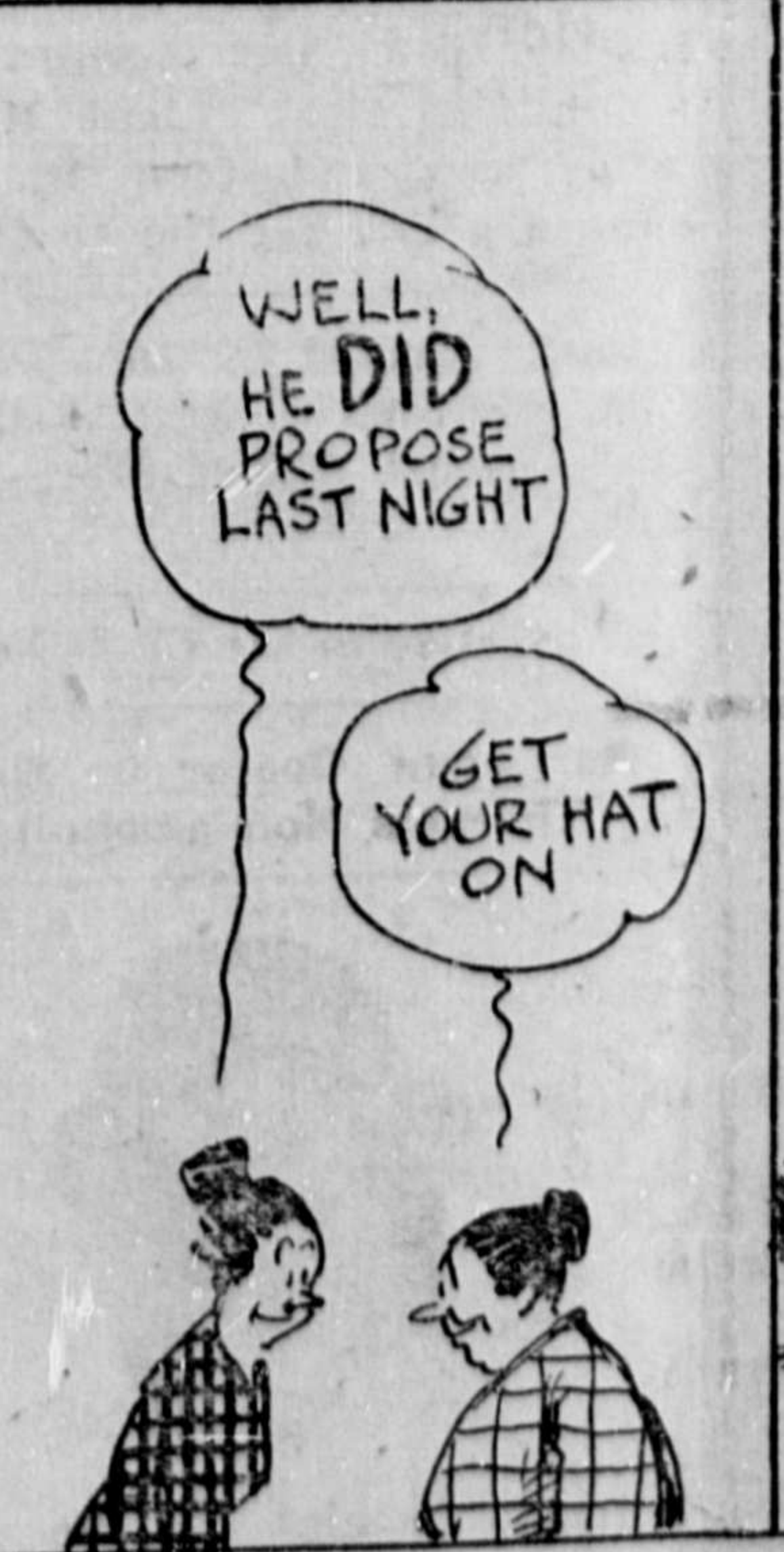

BRITAIN PAID A BIG PRICE IN SHIPPING

Lost Ten Times As Much Tonnage as Either France or Italy.

In urging that immediate steps be taken to rebuild the British merchant marine, Archibald S. Hurd, the naval writer, in an article in the Daily Telegraph, said that although the United Kingdom was not invaded, Great Britain had paid for victory in the loss of more than 9,000,000 tons of shipping, ten times as much as that lost by either France or Italy. The British losses were 17 times as much as the United States.

No Small Price.

"Little has been said of the injuries inflicted on this country in the war," Mr. Hurd says. "There is an impression in allied and neutral countries, that we paid a relatively small price for victory. It is true that we were not invaded, but that was due, not to good fortune, for the sea is the easiest and quickest medium for an invader, but to good policy. It is also true that we were not starved, but that was the result of good judgment and organization. It is very necessary that some importance should be attached to the injury inflicted upon us as a people who follow the sea, because there is a temptation to exaggerate the damage sustained by the allies on the land and to ignore the results of enemy action by sea.

Half Destroyed.

"It is certain that if it had not been for the British merchant navy, France and Italy would have been driven out of the war and America would never have been able to intervene. When the war came, the vast volume of British merchant ships was placed in the service and became the principal target of the enemy's naval forces. The result was that approximately half the tonnage under the British flag was destroyed.

Down to Figures.

"The following figures show the total losses in gross tonnage of merchant losses sustained by this and other countries during the war:—

"The British tonnage sunk, therefore, was more than ten times as much as that lost by either France or Italy and 17 times as much as that lost by America.

Shipping Vital.

"We depend on shipping for almost all that we require. Very nearly all of our remaining ships need to be overhauled, which means that they are handicapped in trading and it is doubtful if some are worth the expense of restoration. In effect, we have to build the whole of our merchant marine as soon as we can.

"That is one item in the war bill due to us as a maritime nation, and our case is separated from that of other countries which are not islands and are not pivotal points of maritime empires. Moreover, the above figures do not exhibit the value of the cargoes sunk, the number of lives destroyed, or the inestimable injury caused by our withdrawal of ships from distant trade routes in order that we might help our allies and transport over the Atlantic a majority of the American troops which turned the scale on the western front."
