Leader to be buried Saturday

LATE PREMIER'S FUNERAL TO TAKE PLACE ON SATURDAY FROM CHURCH OF SACRED HEART TO NOTRE DAME

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, February 18.—According to arrangements made for the Laurier funeral it will proceed at 10 o'clock Saturday morning from the Victoria Museum building to Sacred Heart Church where mass will be celebrated. Archbishop Mathieu of Regina, an old personal friend of the late Liberal leader, who is at present in Montreal, has been asked to officiate at mass and though no definite word has been received from him it is expected that he will do so.

At Notre Dame.

After the celebration of mass in Sacred Heart Church the cortege will proceed to Notre Dame cemetery where interment will take place.

The Government has charge of all funeral arrangements. The death of Sir Wilfrid Laurier has made a profound impression in the capital and on every side may be heard expressions of regret at the passing of this great statesman.

As a mark of respect the city council postponed its regular meeting for the week. Hundreds of messages of condolence have been received by Lady Laurier from all parts of Canada and from abroad.

The End.

"It is the end"—thus laconically to his helpmate of fifty years Sir Wilfrid Laurier presage his rapid dissolution which followed upon the effusion of blood that clouded his brain on Sunday afternoon. He spoke but little thereafter though he regained consciousness and during the administration of the last rite of his church was in perfect possession of his mental faculties.

STRIKE WILL BE CONTINUED

Shipyards at Seattle Will Open Tomorrow for Those Who Wish Work.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Seattle, Feb. 18.—At the end of its meeting a committee of the Seattle Metal Trades Council announced that it had decided to continue the strike in the shipyards and contract shops here.
Seattle, Feb. 18.—Steel and wooden shipyards in Seattle and Tacoma will reopen their gates Wednesday morning, reemploying men who apply at the gates and paying the Macy scale of wages that prevailed prior to the strike of metal trades workers in the two cities on January 21. Approximately fifty contract shops also closed by strike officially announced they would resume work at the same time.

MANY VICTIMS BEING SHOT BY OPEN GRAVES

Atrocities by Bolsheviks Continue—Lot of Workmen Desperate; Executions With Band Playing.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, February 18.—It was learned from various reliable sources, says Reuters, that the situation in Petrograd and Moscow three weeks ago was worse than ever. Executions were being continued in prisons and often were carried out to the lively strains of a regimental band. Victims were being lined up at the edge of a long open grave and shot by Lettish soldiers. The lot of workmen, says Reuters, is desperate under the Bolshevik regime. The food situation in Petrograd has gone from bad to worse. Hundreds are dying weekly and the present population is little over five hundred thousand.

NO MORE WAR WITH POLAND

Signing of Armistice Averts Critical Situation and Allows Access to Baltic.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, Feb. 18.—Marshal Foch yesterday afternoon informed the Supreme Council of the acceptance by the Germans of the conditions for the renewal of the armistice.

Marshal Foch appeared in person before the Council of Great Powers today and announced the acceptance and signing by the Germans of the conditions of the armistice. The signing took place at 6 o'clock Sunday evening on board Marshal Foch's private car at Treves.

This averts what promised to be a rather critical situation as it had been reported that the Germans might persist in carrying out their intimations of refusal to sign. The new terms, while still withheld, are understood to restrict German operations against Poland within certain fixed lines, thus removing the danger of military clash and at the same time opening access between the interior of Poland and the Baltic Sea.

MANY MINERS OUT OF WORK

Proposal to Reduce Length of Working Day to Six, Five, or Four Hours.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Calgary, Feb. 18.—District 18, United Mine Workers of America, may have a six-hour day or even five or four hour day. Two thousand are out of work now and three thousand others only work part time and the idle season of the year is approaching. These were matters discussed at a session of the district convention here.

International delegate Levitt reported with regret that there had been 60 local strikes in Alberta during the past year, many of which could have been avoided.

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MAYOR McCLYMONT TAKES UP MANY LOCAL MATTERS WHEN VISITING CAPITAL

REPORTS THAT SHIPBUILDING COMPANY WANTS TO LEASE COW BAY PROPERTY RECENTLY ACQUIRED BY GOVERNMENT FROM G. T. P.—CLUBS TO BE DEALT WITH

At the regular meeting of the City Council last night Mayor McClymont reported what he had done in Victoria during his recent visit as follows:

Social Clubs.

"Under the head of 'Peace, Order and Good Government of the City,' I had an audience with the Attorney-General and went fully into the matter of the social club evil, which clubs are conducted under the 'Company Act,' and owing to this the city has difficulty in dealing with them. The Attorney-General stated that by writing him and showing fuel depots if deemed necessary.

Bar-tenders' License.

"Since prohibition the bar-tenders' license has been abolished and I pressed that this be re-established in some form, so that municipalities have the power to issue licenses to all those who may retail liquid refreshments. This I pointed out was not so much as a means of revenue, but principally by way of good government. Clause 115 of the new act, I believe will cover this.

The Authority.

"The clause is as follows: i. e. 115 'Subject to the reservations and restrictions in this or any other act of the Legislature contained, there is hereby delegated and transferred to the council of each municipality the full power, right and authority to legislate for and on behalf of the health, safety, benefit, and advantage of the area comprised within the territorial limits of each municipality and the inhabitants (continued on Page Four.)

Pool Table Tax.

"Another matter touched upon was the grading of business licenses, also the right to tax pool and billiard tables in clubs. Though the new Municipal Act had not been introduced in the house, I was able to get a copy beforehand, so that I might go through it, and this I did along with Mr. McDiarmid, the solicitor of the Union of Municipalities, who I understood has in some measure been responsible for the drafting of this new act. "I found that provisions had been made for grading of business licenses, but no special mention of taxing of pool tables in clubs, and while Mr. McDiarmid was of the opinion that this would be done under clause 115, I suggested that the words be added as a new clause.

Fuel Depots.

"In section 28 of clause 115 municipalities are given the right to establish public markets, but I could find no mention of civic fuel depots, and as Mr. McDiarmid will be in attendance during committee stage of the bill, I asked him to see about having this inserted, so that the municipalities may have the power to establish.

MILITARY TREATY TO BE IMPOSED ON GERMANY IN PLACE OF ARMISTICE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, February 18.—The terms of the new military treaty to be imposed on Germany in lieu of a monthly armistice and as part of the final peace conditions will, according to the Daily Mail's Paris correspondent, include in addition to destruction of the fortifications of Heligoland and Kiel Canal and the opening of the canal to traffic, the immediate surrender of certain warships which have not yet been given up, as required, and the conversion of the status of the German fleet from that of internment to surrender.

Disarmament.

Treves, February 18.—Although the disarmament question was not raised at the last armistice conference, Mathies Arzberger, one of the German Commissioners, volunteered the statement that the German army consisted of only 200,000 men, forty per cent. of whom were of doubtful value. He said that the German army had been demobilized too quickly and that it was inadequate to maintain order in the country.

NO LEADER YET FOR LIBERALS

Convention Will Not Be Held for Some Time But Committee Will Do Work.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, Feb. 18.—Pending the holding of a Dominion convention for which Sir Wilfrid Laurier, before death took him, planned, there will be an interregnum so far as the opposition is concerned, and no leader will be appointed. In the meantime it is suggested that a committee of management, on which will be the oldest of parliamentarians, be created to organize and supervise the work of opposition and the survey of legislation. Any talk regarding a leader now is premature.

SITUATION UNCHANGED

Archangel, Feb. 17.—The situation in all sectors of the front in northern Russia is unchanged.

Fisherman Brings in 500 Pounds of Fine Springs and Causes Flurry of Excitement.

A local fisherman who had gone out a short while ago to trap, arrived home yesterday afternoon with about five hundred pounds of excellent red spring salmon.

The Great Chieflain At Last "Goes West."

The Right Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, greatest of all Canadians, who yesterday stepped forward into the unknown, was born in Quebec in 1841 and early in life showed a liking for the study of public questions. As the leader of the opposition he showed great ability by his pungent but not destructive criticism.

When in 1896 Sir Wilfrid carried the country with him on the question of tariff reform, he at once showed that not only was he strong in opposition, but that he had great executive ability, and was an even more outstanding figure as premier than he was as leader of the opposition.

Absolute Ruler.

During the fifteen years of his administration Sir Wilfrid was absolute ruler in his own cabinet and many strong men left but never affected its stability. He was the Government. He always retained the confidence of his party until the time of the last election when the party was split up, some following the Union Government and some following the old leader.

Those Liberals who voted against Sir Wilfrid at the last election were all ready to accept him still as leader, once the war was won. Had the old chief been able to go back to the House and rally his forces he would undoubtedly have carried the country with him again at the next election.

Mutual Confidence.

When about eight years ago he came to this province and visited Prince Rupert, he was received by Sir Richard McBride and entertained by him at the capital as if he had been a visiting monarch. The Irish Canadian Premier of this Province always took as a model the French Canadian Premier of the Dominion and the two were much alike in temperament.

Sir Wilfrid died in harness, just as he would have wished. He was a man who had faith in his country and his country had faith in him. Many people voted for him rather than for the party, for he inspired them with confidence. For all time to come his life will be an inspiration to young men going into political life and his example of playing the game fairly and carrying on the business of the country in a manner beyond reproach will have a lasting effect on future governments.



THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS AGAINST PROHIBITION

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per acre and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, but to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 20 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The privilege which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSHIP PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel.

Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

thereof, and the peace, order and good government of the same."

Municipal Act.
"Regarding the new Municipal Act from a casual reading of it, I believe it to be on the whole an improvement over the old act. It confers greater powers on the municipalities and will do away to a large extent with having to write or visit the seat of government when various things are being sought for."

"There are certain clauses that would be better left out or altered so far as this city is concerned, and I understand the Union of municipalities are to meet about the end of the month to discuss the new bill fully, before it finally goes to the House."

Council's Delay.
"It appears to me that such an important matter as a new municipal act should not be hurriedly passed, and that the wisest course would be to lay over until next session, so that in the meantime all municipalities would have the opportunity of going through it and finding out any weak spots, so that when finally passed it would be as complete as possible, and not require to be continually amended. I would, therefore, recommend to council the passing of a motion to this effect, to be forwarded to our member at Victoria."

Housing Scheme.
"Regarding the better housing scheme now about to be launched, I pointed out to our member and under whose department this housing scheme comes, that there was not a house to be had at the present moment, and that fifty thousand dollars would be little enough for our immediate requirements."

Need 25 Now.
"The distribution had to be made on basis of population, but as many places do not require their quotas, a new plan on the basis of requirements will be adopted and in the meantime, I am trying to get data on our requirements to forward to Victoria. I believe that 25 houses could be filled right now, but if certain industries were in action this figure would be low."

Wish to Lease.
"In the matter of waterfront, I have no new developments to report, the situation being as formerly, except that the shipbuilding company wish to lease the waterfront at Cow Bay, recently acquired by the government from the G. T. P. Company."

SIX-HOUR DAY

Creating Opportunities for Employment

BESIDES helping to distribute employment through a chain of Employment Offices, the Government has developed plans to create opportunities for employment.

Briefly, these plans cover the following phases:—

1. Public Works

During the war, many important Public Works have been held up. The Minister of Public Works, has his plans and preparations made to proceed with the more necessary of these in the near future. This Committee has also been in touch with Provincial Governments and Municipalities, with a view to impressing upon them the necessity for similar action. The building and public works programme now in sight will provide employment for many returned soldiers and war-workers.

2. Railways

During the past four years, a great deal of work necessary to keep our railways up to standard has been postponed. Some millions of dollars must be expended on improving road-bed, constructing bridges, buildings and other improvements. Vast quantities of ties are being got out this winter. Equipment of various kinds must be secured. The Minister of Railways states that as soon as weather conditions will permit, some thousands of men will be absorbed in various railway undertakings. The supplies and materials required will also provide employment.

3. Shipbuilding

The shipbuilding programme arranged for by the Government will provide employment for many men during 1919. It is expected that arrangements will be completed to keep the shipbuilding yards in active operation throughout the year. The Government recognises that this ship construction is one of the best means of providing suitable employment for many skilled and other workers.

4. Export Trade

The Government has established a Canadian Trade Commission. This Commission has an office in Canada and a "trade mission" overseas. Through this trade mission it is anticipated that Canada will secure an important share in the business of providing materials and manufactured products required for reconstruction work in Europe. A short time may be required before final details are completed and definite results are announced. The business so secured will be distributed through the regular channels of trade and thus afford extra opportunities for employment.

5. Housing

The Government has set aside the large sum of \$25,000,000 to be loaned through the Provinces in order to encourage the building of workmen's houses. When the season for building arrives, this work should give employment to many hundreds of men both in construction work and in the supply of materials.

6. Land Settlement

The Government, as already explained in a former announcement, has developed plans to help soldiers to become farmers, providing land, granting loans and giving training and supervision where necessary. It is expected that a large number of returning soldiers will take advantage of these opportunities. The scheme will involve the expenditure of some millions of dollars, a good deal of which will find its way into building materials, supplies, machinery, etc., all of which will assist in providing employment.

7. Road Building

The Government now has under consideration the question of joining the provincial governments in financing the construction of public highways. Should a favorable decision be reached, a large field for employment opportunities will be opened up. Regardless of Federal action, provincial governments are preparing their own road-making programmes.

The Government is alive to the necessity for providing employment opportunities, and stands prepared to assist in every way possible. If corporations and private citizens will join in this feature of Repatriation Work, Canada should have little difficulty with the employment problem.

Canada will have her own representatives in the body of delegates, as all other British dominions will have, but in the event of a vote arising, which can only be upon matters of procedure, all British delegates will be a unit.

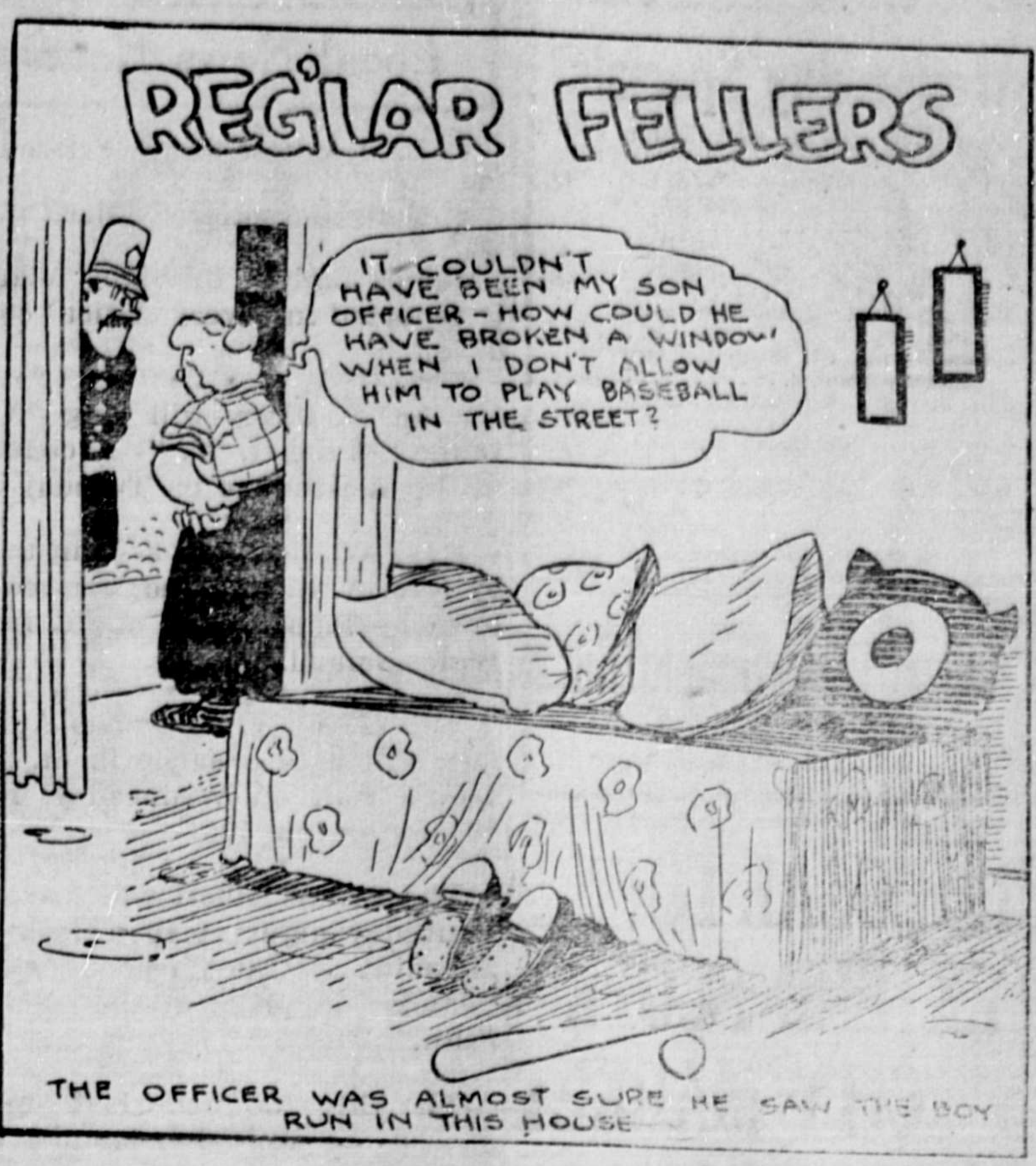
WOULD LIMIT ALL PROFITS ON FOODS

PROPOSAL TO EXTEND SCOPE CITY MARKET

Aldermen Casey and Barrie Move Resolution at Council Meeting; Tabled for Further Consideration.

A resolution moved last night by Alderman Casey and seconded by Alderman Barrie in regard to granting enlarged powers to the City Market was laid over to the next meeting for further consideration. The text of the resolution with the exception of the preamble follows:

The Resolution.
Be it therefore resolved: that in addition to the powers given in the existing bylaw No. 267; that after taking out a trade licence, the City Market clerk shall be allowed to buy or sell on his own behalf any produce, wares or merchandise, for the use or consumption of household requirements, under the following conditions:

1. That any produce, wares or merchandise so purchased and sold, there shall be added to cost, freight, cartage, or other charges an amount of not more than ten per cent. (10%).
2. That an amount equivalent to three per cent. (3%) of gross sales to be paid into the city revenue, by said market clerk, to be applied against the cost of operation.
3. That such produce, wares, or merchandise, so purchased, shall be kept entirely separate and distinct from produce shipped on consignment for sale and shall be solely and wholly at the risk of the market clerk; the city to be in no way interested or liable.
4. That it be clearly understood such transactions to be a thing apart from the direct operation of the City Market. Purchases so made to be personally and in the name of the custodian of the market, who alone shall assume any or all responsibility for loss or damage, also payment of goods so purchased.
5. That the market clerk shall not purchase any produce, wares or merchandise on his own behalf, so long as the supply from producers on consignment is sufficient to meet the demand of the citizens.
6. That there shall be provided for the use of any ratepayer or producer, upon the payment to the market clerk of twenty-five cents (25c) per diem per stall. Three stalls for the sale of any produce, wares or merchandise, such stall shall be vacated day by day and applications to be taken in priority in which they are received.

Commissioner Sowton of the Salvation Army, who arrived in the city on Sunday evening, sailed for Anox yesterday morning by the Chelohsin. The commissioner will return to town on Thursday evening, and will remain in the district for several days longer. Brigadier McLean, who has been in Alaska for some time past, also arrived in town yesterday.

A preliminary report of the Fisheries Committee of the City council made last night indicated that there would be plenty of ice and bait for the coming season. Alderman Casey said his information was directly the opposite. He thought everything pointed to a shortage. The committee will complete its investigation and report again later.

DAWSON PEOPLE ARE WORRIED OVER FLU

Oppose Any Lifting of Quarantine Restrictions Against People Going Into That Territory.

(Special via Government Telegraphs.)
Dawson, Y. T., Feb. 18.—Vehement opposition prevails here against relaxation of the quarantine guarding influenza in the Yukon Territory. The proposal wired from Skagway today to Governor MacKenzie at Dawson that a party of Yukoners now at Skagway and others to follow be allowed to hurry through without the customary quarantine is strenuously opposed by Dawson citizens and the Dawson Daily news. It would not only expose this part of the Yukon, but the entire Yukon valley, American as well as Canadian, as soon as the river opens and the country is poorly prepared to fight the epidemic. The natives are particularly unprepared.

A few years ago smallpox entered the country unexpectedly, and cost the Government \$40,000 to wipe it out. Many lives also were lost.

The News declares editorially it is better a few people be delayed a few days in quarantine than that the entire country be swept with a scourge. It opposes any rash act lifting the quarantine.
