## DOMINION FRANCHISE FOR WOMEN AND DEPT. OF PUBLIC HEALTH ARE SURPRISES IN SPEECH FROM THRONE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, February 21.—Parliament opened yesterday afternoon "in the shadow of the great loss." Over the building the flag was flying at half mast, the corridors and galleries of the House were hung with crepe, and on Sir Wilfrid's desk there were, as Sir Thomas White expressed it, "the floral tokens of affection."

The usual social character of the opening ceremony was lacking. No invitations had been issued.

The gathering in the Senate Chamber to hear the Governor-General's speech from the throne was confined practically to members.

In the Commons Dr. Beland took his seat for the first time after four years' imprisonment in Germany. Speeches from the throne promised reconstruction measures mainly along expected lines. There will be provision for soldiers' settlement on the land, for promoting immigration and farm settlement, for promotion of vocational education and better housing conditions.

The promise of a Franchise Bill, with provisions to give to women the right to sit in Parliament, awakened more than usual interest. There is also to be a bill to create a Department of Public Health.

## ANTER-ALLIED ARMY PROPOSED

French Paper Says Will Keep Field Until Financial Settlement is Made.

Paris, Feb. 21.—L'Intransigeant announced that it hears an inter-allied army soon will be formed to keep the field until Germany makes a complete financial settlement. The army according to the newspaper would include 650,000 French, 450,000 Americans, 350,000 British and 100,000 Belgians.

## TROUBLE IN BERLIN.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Berlin, Feb. 21.—Sailors and government troops clashed in Munich, when sixty sailors armed with hand grenades attacked a building in which the Bavarian Council was sitting. The sailors retreated after two of them were wounded.

## MINERS AT CALGARY MAKE SOME DEMANDS

Charge that Government Promised to Provide Market for Coal and Failed.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Calgary, Alta., Feb. 21.—District 18 miners at a convention here demanded that the Canadian Government provide the Canadian market for Canadian coal and they also demanded free press and free speech. They alleged that their members in Southern Alberta were hounded and persecuted by the police.

In respect to coal they charged that the government had promised to provide sufficient market and had failed to do so and had immediately the armistice was signed encouraged the importation of American coal which was shipped right into the mine fields of District 18.

It was further charged that the C. P. R. rates on Alberta coal to Winnipeg were 125 per cent. of the cost of coal placed on cars.

## MINING INSTRUCTION BY CORRESPONDENCE

B. C. Government Preparing to Establish Course for Benefit of Those Unable to Attend Classes.

Arrangements have been made by Hon. Wm. Sloan, Minister of Mines, and Hon. Dr. MacLean, Minister of Education, for the establishment of a system of instruction by means of correspondence which will give all miners who are British subjects and resident in British Columbia an opportunity to qualify for positions of trust and responsibility in connection with their chosen vocation.

In making this announcement it is pointed out that for some years the Department of Education has been conducting night schools for the benefit of men engaged in the mining industry with a view to providing that instruction which is necessary for thorough preparation for the examinations set by the Department of Mines for those aspiring to important charges in connection with the operation of mines.

**Visit of Inspectors.**  
The conditions of the shift system under which miners work heretofore has mitigated against that pronounced success which is so much desired by both the Mines and Education Departments and, in order to overcome this difficulty and to bring the opportunities of study within reach of a greater number of men the decision has been reached to conduct the classes and disseminate the required knowledge through the medium of correspondence. It is considered as probable, although no definite statement has been authorized as yet, that the correspondence will be augmented by personal visits on the part of instructors to the various sections of the province for the purpose of giving at intervals such guidance and assistance to students as, perhaps, may not readily be obtained through the mail.

## CHEAP RAILWAY FARES FOR SOLDIERS

Ottawa, Feb. 21.—Arrangements have been made by the information and service branch of the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment by which men securing employment who have to go to some other place than where they live in order to start work, will get cheap railway fare to any part of the country.

## LOYD GEORGE WILL ATTEND CONFERENCE WITH LABOR LEADERS

London, February 21.—Premier Lloyd George has postponed his visit to Paris owing to pressure of business here, especially in connection with the labor unrest. He desires to attend the labor conference which the Government has called for February 27, hence it is unlikely he will start for Paris until the 28th.

## SEND FEW THOUSAND ALIENS TO EUROPE

(Special via Government Telegraphs.)

Toronto, Feb. 21.—If the aliens now in Canada will be admitted to their home countries and if shipping facilities can be placed at their disposal it is the intention of the Minister of Labor to arrange transportation for a few thousand aliens in southern Ontario who are waiting and are anxious to obtain transportation home.

## WOULD DESTROY ALL GERMAN WARSHIPS

Paris, Feb. 21.—J. W. Dafeo cables that the British view is believed to favor the destruction of the German ships now at Scapa Flow, but the proposal that they be divided pro rata among the belligerent powers also has its advocates.

## BAIT STATION AT QUEEN CHARLOTTE

C. P. Riel who left for Vancouver last night has been successful in establishing a bait station on Queen Charlotte Islands at Queen Charlotte City. He says that within a few days he expects to have fresh bait for the halibut men. The herring are to be kept alive in wire net enclosures and bailed out as required.

C. J. Parker, who is well known among the fishermen, is in charge of the operations on the islands and he can be reached by wire from here.

The Queen Charlotte Island herring are said to be unusually good bait because of their large size and bright color.

## FASTENED DOOR AGAINST POLICE

Evidence in Adjudged Opium Case Indicates Methods Used To Prevent Detection.

Chun Fook and Joe Why charged with having opium in their possession and Chin Took, Ah Loo, Mah Laia, Lee Suey and Lem charged with being frequenters of an opium resort, were again brought before Magistrate Carss this morning in the police court and after hearing the evidence for the prosecution the case was adjourned further.

Evidence was given by Constables Duff, Bailey and McGlinchey who told of having visited the premises of Lamb, the Chinese labor contractor on Second Ave., during the earlier part of the week. On their attempt to gain admission they found both the outer and inner doors fastened. On the outer door being forced, the Chinamen attempted to hold the inside door shut, but were unable to maintain themselves against the superior weight of the police officers.

On gaining entrance the constables found the seven Chinamen under the influence of the drug. Two pipes, still hot, were seized along with the necessary outfit for smoking, consisting of lamps, etc. A quantity of opium was also found on the persons of Chun Fook and Joe Why.

After cross examination of the Constables by W. O. Fulton, counsel for the defence, and W. E. Williams for the prosecution, the case was further adjourned until tomorrow on account of the accused's ignorance of English and to permit of an interpreter being secured.

## MANY OPPOSE REPUBLIC FOR SOUTH AFRICA

First of Series of Meetings of Protest Held Last Night At Cape Town.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Cape Town, Feb. 21.—Opposition to the republican movement is gathering in strength and citizens of Cape Town last night held the first of a series of meetings of protest. Throughout the country resolutions are being adopted emphatically condemning the agitation for disruption of the Union of South Africa and severance of its connection with Great Britain.

Minister of Railways Burton, who was the principal speaker, described the Nationalist mission to England as a foolish, childish and mad enterprise.

Sir N. F. Desaal, administrator of Cape Province, emphasized the fact that loyal duties were in determined accord with the British element in maintaining the union.

## FIRST ALIENS LEFT VERNON CAMP TODAY

Vernon, Feb. 21.—The first contingent of interned aliens to be deported from Vernon camp left today. There were 100 prisoners, principally Germans and Austrians of the laboring class, who went out this afternoon under charge of an officer and guard of twenty men.

### JOHN M'GREGOR, V. C. IS RUPERT SOLDIER

Claimed by Vancouver, Says B. C. Veterans' Weekly, But Really Belongs Here.

Says the B. C. Veterans' Weekly:—

"Vancouver, not content with trying to claim the waters contiguous to Prince Rupert for Vancouver pilots, now is trying to lay claim to another of the north country's Victoria Cross heroes. It may be news to some of the northmen that Captain John McGregor, V. C., M. C., D. C. M., is from the north. He enlisted in Prince Rupert in 1916 with the 11th Canadian Mounted Rifles. Was in the ranks first, and was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal, which is the second highest decoration that can be won by one of the rank and file. "After winning his commission he was awarded the Military Cross for one of his daring exploits, and now has crowned his deeds of valor by winning the Victoria Cross. He arrived in England early in July, 1916, and crossed to France soon after, being transferred to the 2nd Canadian Mounted Rifles, with which regiment he has since been associated. Before enlistment John McGregor was working at Terrace, where he has a ten-acre plot, and has worked and lived in the northern portion of the province for the last seven or eight years. Was born in Scotland, and we don't see where Vancouver gets its idea that he is a Vancouver boy."

### The Man in the Moon

# War to Peace



## Creating Opportunities for Employment

BESIDES helping to distribute employment through a chain of Employment Offices, the Government has developed plans to create opportunities for employment.

Briefly, these plans cover the following phases:—

### 1. Public Works

During the war, many important Public Works have been held up. The Minister of Public Works, has his plans and preparations made to proceed with the more necessary of these in the near future. This Committee has also been in touch with Provincial Governments and Municipalities, with a view to impressing upon them the necessity for similar action. The building and public works programme now in sight will provide employment for many returned soldiers and war-workers.

### 2. Railways

During the past four years, a great deal of work necessary to keep our railways up to standard has been postponed. Some millions of dollars must be expended on improving road-bed, constructing bridges, buildings and other improvements. Vast quantities of ties are being got out this winter. Equipment of various kinds must be secured. The Minister of Railways states that as soon as weather conditions will permit, some thousands of men will be absorbed in various railway undertakings. The supplies and materials required will also provide employment.

### 3. Shipbuilding

The shipbuilding programme arranged for by the Government will provide employment for many men during 1919. It is expected that arrangements will be completed to keep the shipbuilding yards in active operation throughout the year. The Government recognises that this ship construction is one of the best means of providing suitable employment for many skilled and other workers.

### 4. Export Trade

The Government has established a Canadian Trade Commission. This Commission has an office in Canada and a "trade mission" overseas. Through this trade mission it is anticipated that Canada will secure an important share in the business of providing materials and manufactured products required for reconstruction work in Europe. A short time may be required before final details are completed and definite results are announced. The business so secured will be distributed through the regular channels of trade and thus afford extra opportunities for employment.

### 5. Housing

The Government has set aside the large sum of \$25,000,000 to be loaned through the Provinces in order to encourage the building of workmen's houses. When the season for building arrives, this work should give employment to many hundreds of men both in construction work and in the supply of materials.

### 6. Land Settlement

The Government, as already explained in a former announcement, has developed plans to help soldiers to become farmers, providing land, granting loans and giving training and supervision where necessary. It is expected that a large number of returning soldiers will take advantage of these opportunities. The scheme will involve the expenditure of some millions of dollars, a good deal of which will find its way into building materials, supplies, machinery, etc., all of which will assist in providing employment.

### 7. Road Building

The Government now has under consideration the question of joining the provincial governments in financing the construction of public highways. Should a favorable decision be reached, a large field for employment opportunities will be opened up. Regardless of Federal action, provincial governments are preparing their own road-making programmes.

The Government is alive to the necessity for providing employment opportunities, and stands prepared to assist in every way possible. If corporations and private citizens will join in this feature of Repatriation Work, Canada should have little difficulty with the employment problem.
