UNITED KINGDOM IS FACED WITH PROSPECT OF CIVIL STRIFE, SAYS LLOYD GEORGE

TO GRANT DEMANDS OF MINERS WOULD CRIPPLE THE COUNTRY'S COAL EXPORT AND RAISE PRICE FROM EIGHT TO TEN SHILLINGS PER TON

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, February 25.—The United Kingdom is faced with the prospect of civil strife and the House of Commons is doing everything in its power to avert it, Premier Lloyd George declared yesterday in introducing a bill to constitute an inquiry into conditions prevailing in the coal industry.
The Premier said he had been advised that to grant the demands of the miners without an inquiry might throw hundreds of thousands of persons out of employment and cripple the country's export of coal. Granting of the demands would increase the price of coal by from eight to ten shillings a ton.
London, Feb. 25.—Officials of the local miners' unions show no disposition to agree to postpone action on the strike to await the inquiry proposed by Premier Lloyd George.

MCINTOSH ASKS STATE HEALTH INSURANCE BILL

Workmen's Compensation Having Proved Success Other Advance Measures Should Follow.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Victoria, Feb. 25.—A strong appeal for the inauguration of state health insurance in British Columbia was made in the Legislature yesterday when Major J. W. McIntosh of Vancouver presented a resolution asking the House to resolve itself into a committee of the whole on the question. The workmen's compensation measure, he understood, had proved a success, but there was no logical reason why the Legislature should stop at that.

VANCOUVER WOULD DEPORT ALL ALIENS

Vancouver, Feb. 25.—Hearty endorsement was given to a resolution recently passed by the City Council asking the Dominion Government to take immediate steps for deportation of all enemy aliens, by a large meeting of delegates from practically every public body.

MARKET RESOLUTION MEETS A SAD FATE

Proposal of Alderman Casey to Establish City Store Voted Down by City Council.

A rather lengthy resolution was brought before the Council last night by Alderman Casey, Alderman Barrie who was absent being the seconder. This resolution provided for the market clerk doing business on his own account as well as selling on commission.
In discussing it, Alderman Casey said that the resolution was in their hands and it explained itself. The market could not at present get supplies because merchants went up the line and bought up the stuff from the farmers and then charged what prices they thought fit. It was to the material interest of the merchants to oppose the market.
Alderman Currie did not believe the Council could give the market clerk power to sell on his own behalf. It would lead to trouble.
It was further pointed out that in Vancouver the city had rented the market to some fish concern in return for cheaper fish. In New Westminster was the only place where the market had been a success.
All the aldermen with the exception of Alderman Casey voted against the proposal.

SULZER IS ELECTED TO REPRESENT ALASKA

Juneau, Feb. 25.—Returns from every precinct in Alaska, complete last night, show the election of Charles A. Sulzer, Democrat, to succeed James Wickersham Republican. The final returns of only thirty-three votes reached here, nearly four months after the election.

DISPOSITION OF SPRUCE LOGS

Question Being Discussed With Government at Ottawa, Says Despatch From Vancouver.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, Feb. 25.—How to save sixty million feet of logs in the waters of northern British Columbia and as much more cut timber in the woods, the result of discontinuance of the spruce airplane stock campaign, is a problem being brought to the attention of the Dominion Government. The logs must be cut this year to save them from worms.

The above dispatch refers undoubtedly to the logs which are held at present by the Imperial Munitions Board in storage both at the Queen Charlotte Islands and at the different mills, and part of which are in Prince Rupert harbor. As a matter of fact the negotiations have been going on for some time past and it is hoped that contracts for the logs will be let to the different mills and that the local mill will get its share. In the meantime the lumber business of the whole of northern British Columbia is tied up awaiting the decision as to the disposition to be made of the spruce.

VANCOUVER BEATS VICTORIA AT HOCKEY

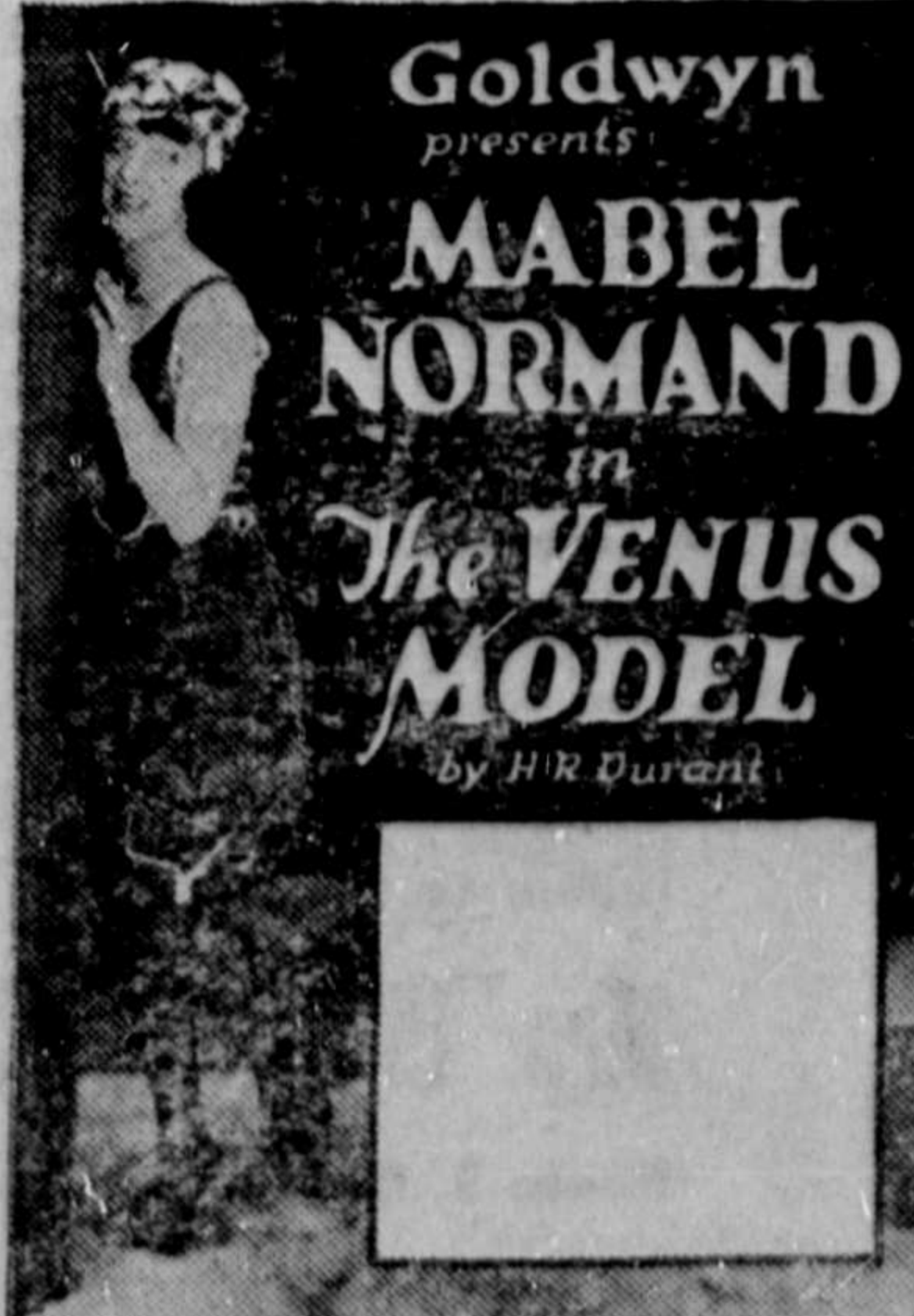

PROPOSAL TO GIVE FILIP TO MINING HERE

Smithers Man Offers Solution of Problem How to Rouse Interest in Industry.

SMELTER AT RUPERT ONE OF SUGGESTIONS

Local Sampling, Assay and Purchasing Office to Encourage Small Man Proposed.

The following letter which is of special interest to miners and to citizens of Prince Rupert who believe in the future of the mining industry in this district is given special prominence in the hope that it will lead to further discussion and that some solution of the present semi-stagnant condition of the mining industry may be found.

"The following paragraph taken from the editorial page of a local paper recently, will bear analysis and criticism which should be of interest to every thoughtful person with the general welfare of Northern B. C. at heart, and especially to the citizens of Prince Rupert as will be seen later on in this article:

"A writer in an agricultural magazine estimates that there will be over a thousand prospectors returning to this province and suggests that the Government should grubstake them for the bills. Many less profitable moves could be undertaken.

"If the Government was to take action along the lines of the above paragraph, such action would prove profitable to certain interests that always eagerly welcome any disbursement of public money whether such expenditure is wise, and of permanent benefit or not, but it certainly would not be profitable to the returned soldier prospector, nor to the Government for the following reasons:

Plenty of Prospects.
"What ails the mining industry in this district, (and conditions here are not so very different from those prevailing elsewhere), is most emphatically not lack of prospects, but of producing mines. The hills are already full of prospects and a goodly proportion of those in this district that have had a little development done on them show reasonable probability of eventually making producing mines. Some have already produced a lot of ore, and others are producing in a small way through the efforts of the individual discoverers and owners without the assistance of outside capital.

Remove Disabilities.
"There should be and would be a great many more of the latter, especially in high grade gold, silver and lead camps, if the disadvantages under which we labor were removed, as they must be before it will be very profitable for the owners, whether returned soldiers or not, to attempt to do much more than the annual assessment work on their claim required by law.

"Of course those disadvantages also deter the mining capitalist, (although in a lesser degree), from attempting to do much here at the present time, unless he is financially strong enough to secure a number of mining properties, develop them successfully and build his own smelting and refining plant somewhere reasonably near his mines."

"Therefore since the prospector cannot profitably work his claims himself and has little chance at present of selling or bonding them, no matter how good they are, it does not sound like honest common sense to advise him or anyone else to prospect for mines.

Smelters Remote.
"Our greatest disadvantage is remoteness from smelters. At the present time it costs about \$40 per ton (in carload lots) to transport and treat silver-lead ore from an easily accessible mine to the nearest silver-lead smelter, and as the average individual miner, having to laboriously hand-sort for shipment only the richest of his ore in order to make his operations profitable to himself, cannot usually in a single season secure a minimum car-

load of 25 tons, he must ship in smaller quantities at ruinously higher rates.

COUNCIL WILL NOT INTERFERE WITH BUSINESS

Motion of Alderman Perry to Have Committees Consulted Regarding Appointments Is Defeated.

The resolution of Alderman Perry's which was designed to give the members of the committees a more direct interest in the matter of hiring or dismissing employees and increases of salary was voted down at the meeting of the City Council last night, the proposal not getting a single supporter.

Definite Rules. For the purpose of getting it before the Council, Alderman Casey seconded it but later voted against it. He explained that he

thought the committees should lay down rules for the heads of departments to follow. One example of this was in regard to the employment of returned soldiers. It would be easy to lay down general regulations and it must always be understood that the work of the heads of departments was subject to the committees because the heads were liable to go wrong. He would have nothing to do with hiring and firing, but he was always ready to take up the grievances of any workmen. He thought the amendment would put too much detail on the committee.

In Support. In support of his motion Alderman Perry when moving it said it was introduced to avoid the criticism which had been made regarding dismissals, appointments and increases in salary. He thought they should be made aware of what was going on by way of reports.

No Club. Alderman McTae saw no reason for an addition to the present by-laws. The excuse for it was that the work was now done by a general committee instead of by separate committees for each department. The heads of departments would have a club held over their heads. He did not believe in tying the hands of the heads of departments in any such manner. The superintendent of utilities had practically always taken the committee into his confidence and advised with them. He saw no occasion for a change.

The Mayor explained that the heads did the hiring and firing but the Council set the salaries. He found that this same plan obtained in Vancouver, only there it was arranged by bylaw.

Foreign System. Alderman Rochester expressed the opinion that the present by-law covered the cases. The proposed system was foreign to this Council and was not used in any commercial business. It would have a tendency to bring about a patronage system under which the Aldermen would be pestered by applicants. The heads of the departments must be the heads. If a man was unjustly dealt with

he had the right of appeal to the Council. The vote was then taken only Alderman Perry voting for the motion.

"A sampling plant and assay office would not cost a great deal, certainly not nearly so much as an experimental farm, for instance, and considering the proportion of the revenues of the province contributed by the mining industry such an expenditure for the benefit of mining would only be just.

"For all the good the Minister of Mines' annual report seems to do the mining industry, it might as well be abolished, except merely as a record of production in the various districts. The money thus saved could be used in the construction of such plants and good roads to mining properties, and other practical means of assisting the miner.

Prince Rupert's Interest. "As Prince Rupert on account of its geographical position would be the logical place for the location of such a plant and future smelter, the project should interest the citizens of Prince Rupert especially.

Davies watching the case on behalf of some of those whose relatives were lost in the disaster.

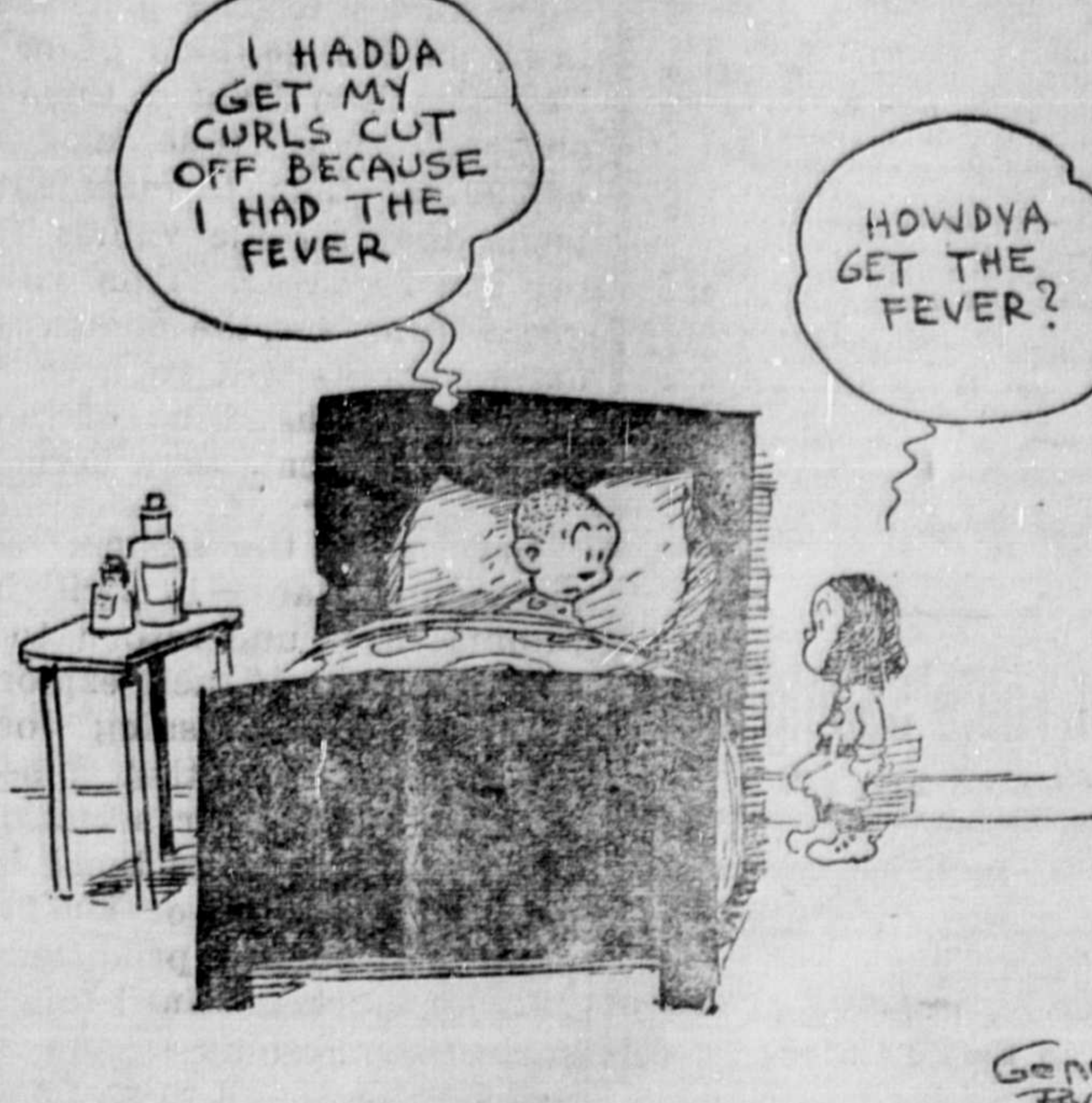
The "Venus Model" to be Shown at Empress Theatre Deals With Bathing Suits.

News of the Mines

The returns from the Dominion Government testing plant at Ottawa on the 26 tons of ore the New Hazelton Gold & Cobalt Co. shipped some time ago, were \$2,399.45. The Government reports that all the values in the ore can be saved. This will be a great thing for the company and arrangements will soon be under way for the handling of this ore on a larger scale than heretofore.

Several of the largest copper producing plants in British Columbia are understood to have dropped most of their exploratory and other non-pressing work for the present, awaiting a settling down of the copper situation. In the world's markets there is now on hand a stock of 800,000,000 pounds of copper, produced for a 26-cent market. Until this is absorbed, conditions in the copper market are bound to be unsettled. The Anaconda Company's mine in Montana has reduced output recently by 25 per cent.

The plant formerly used at the Daly West property, Alaska, has been sold to the Pohlman Investment Co. of Spokane. The plant is being shipped from Ketchikan to Telkwa where it will be used on the new development work at the Cassiar Crown property on Grouse mountain.

John Willman who recently conducted the negotiations for the bonding of the Golden Crown properties on Kitselas mountain in the Kitselas-Usk district is undertaking the management of the development work which is about to take place. The Keanza water power is to be utilized and a crusher, stamp and concentrator installed.

Slightly over 35,000 tons of ore was shipped to the Trail Smelter during the month of January.

The Ruth Mine, Limited, has gone into voluntary liquidation.

The Prince Rupert Music House will open next month with a full line of music and supplies of all kinds, with Will Edmunds in charge.
