WITH PROSPECT OF CIVIL STRIFE, SAYS LLOYD GEORGE

TO GRANT DEMANDS OF MINERS WOULD CRIPPLE THE COUNTRY'S COAL EXPORT AND RAISE PRICE FROM EIGHT TO TEN SHILLINGS PER TON

London, February 25 .- The United Kingdom is faced with the prospect of civil strife and the House of Commons is doing everything in its power to avert it, Premier Lloyd George declared vesterday in introducing a bill to constitute an inquiry into conditions prevailing in the coal industry.

The Premer said he had been advised that to grant the demands of the miners without an inquiry might throw hundreds of thousands of persons out of employment and cripple the country's export of coal. Granting of the demands would increase the price of coal by from eight to ten shillings a ton.

London, Feb. 25 .- Officials of the local miners' unions show no disposition to agree to postpone action on the strike to await the inquiry proposed by Premier Lloyd George.





Government Ownership Is Being Discussed.

One of the subjects under discussion at the present time is the government ownership of railways. It is a big subject, so big |* that it is difficult for the average peanut vender to grasp, and yet * it is this same peanut vendor who is usually so sure that nothing |* but government ownership is the right thing.

The great difficulty is that the government is likely to appoint this same peanut vendor to run the railroad and the result is collapse. The question is being discussed in the United States, in Europe and in Canada. The story has been told recently of how the government tried to run the Union Pacific and then, having failed, sold it by auction and it was bought by the late E. H. Harriman, the price paid being \$12.50 a share.

Not being able to resell, Mr. Harriman decided that he would have to spend some money on it. New track was laid with the lot do better than mail their best rails obtainable for which the highest price was paid. The story of how the railway began to pay under the management of a strong man is a matter of history. The net earnings for the year 1917 was \$42,941,000 and at the same time the line was giving the best of service at reasonable rates.

Contrast with this the history of government ownership. There is no case on record of success having been achieved except where individual effort first paved the way.

It must not be assumed from this that The News is averse in a general way to the system of government ownership. In principle it seems all right, but there is a lot of experimenting provements, for the purpose of obtaining to be done in that direction and in the meantime the Government has enough to do with the railways it already controls. Let the Dominion make a success of the Canadian Northern and up will go both our hands for the addition of the G. T. P. to the system. This is, however, the growing time of the road and under government control and operation it would become just a branch line of the C. N. R. and Prince Rupert would be sidetracked in favor of Vancouver.

Council Votes Down Two Resolutions.

The proposal of Alderman Casey to extend the work of the city market to make it a direct competitor with the grocery stores was voted down by the City Council last night. Also the proposal of Alderman Perry to give the committees of the Council some say in the hiring and dismissing of employees was voted down, even the seconder of the motion voting against it. In refusing to entertain these proposals the Council showed that it was anxious to avoid future difficulties. It took the safe way and is to Improvements. be congratulated on its foresight.



PROPOSAL TO MINING HERE

Smithers Man Offers Solution of Problem How to Rouse Interest in Industry.

Local Sampling, Assay and Purchasing Office to Encourage Small Man Proposed.

The following letter which is of special interest to miners and to citizens of Prince Rupert who believe in the future of the mining industry in this district is given special prominence in the hope that it will lead to further discussion and that some solution of the present semi-stagnant condition of the mining industry may be found.

"The following paragraph taken from the editorial page of a local paper recently, will bear analysis and criticism which should be of interest to every thoughtful person with the general welfare of Northern B. C. at heart, and especially to the citizens of Prince Rupert as will be seen later on in this article:

Grubstaking. "A writer in an agricultural magazine estimates that there will be over a thousand prospectors returning to this province and suggests that the Government should grubstake them for the bills. Many less profitable moves could be undertaken.

"If the Government was to take action along the lines of the above paragraph, such action would prove profitable to certain interests that always eagerly welcome any disbursement of public money whether such expenditure is wise, and of permanent benefit or not, but it certainly would not be profitable to the returned soldier prospector, nor to the Government for the following reasons:
