## SOME PROSPECT OF AVERTING MINERS' STRIKE

Bill Providing for a Commission of Inquiry Passes House of Commons.

London, Feb. 26.—The prospects of averting or postponing the miners' strike has improved. The House of Commons has passed the third reading of the bill providing for a commission of inquiry.  
Premier Lloyd George gave a provisional undertaking that provided the miners' representatives could consent to enter the commission, thus insuring the presence of the mine workers and owners, the work of the commission would be greatly facilitated.

## LADY LAURIER GETS HUSBAND'S ESTATE

## A Few Reasons Why I have Faith in Prince Rupert

By H. F. Pullen

So many people have asked why I am optimistic in regard to Prince Rupert that I take this opportunity of laying my views before them, not in a dogmatic manner but as a suggestion that there is no reason to be anything but hopeful in regard to the future.

Prince Rupert is bound to become a big city. There is everything to make her grow and there is nothing that can keep her back as long as her own people have faith in her.

### Position on Map is Very Advantageous.

Look at her position on the map. She is the terminal city of a great transcontinental railway. That in itself is enough to insure her growth. There never was a city so situated that did not grow and in time become of considerable importance.

The port is several hundred miles nearer the Orient than any other seaport on the coast, and is particularly suited as the entrepot of business from Siberia, a country which is about to be developed, and with Japan and China, the coming industrial nations of the world. This nearness to the trading ports across the ocean makes it possible to ship silks and other valuable cargoes much quicker than by any other route, and the low grade of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway gives a great advantage in handling heavy freights. As the city is surrounded by a country rich in many natural resources, she will be in a position, not only to handle through traffic to and from the Orient, but to provide a great deal of local cargo for steamers operating from the port.

### Market for Farmers of the Hinterland.

As the prairie country and the rich hinterland develop, grain will be shipped this way, beef will go out by this port, hides will come here, and all sorts of agricultural products will be shipped away instead of as at present being imported. Prince Rupert will be the shipping point and the market for the farmers between here and the Rocky Mountains.

As a port Prince Rupert has unequalled advantages. Her harbor is very large, is well protected, is easy of access and has no shoals or other dangers to navigation. In that respect she has every advantage over other large seaports and she is five hundred miles from any other.

But, someone will perhaps ask, what are the resources of which you speak and which will provide cargoes for ships sailing from here.

### Fish Provides Continual Harvest.

In the first place this is the fishing port of the Pacific. The harvest of the seas is a continuous one and while at present the fish are all shipped eastward, the time will come when some of it will go in the opposite direction. The halibut and salmon will be eaten by the people of the United States and Europe, but some of the flat fish, the herring, the dogfish and other varieties will find a market across the ocean.

Instead of shipping from twelve to fifteen million pounds of fish every year as at present, the output of fish from this port should be from twenty to thirty millions every year. The halibut may decrease in quantity but the other fish will increase and as the ships go farther afield for their catches new productive banks will be discovered and the continuous crop will be harvested with regularity and profit.

### Much Riches in Timber.

The war taught us that we had the finest spruce in the world. Peace will show that we have immense quantities of cedar and hemlock as well as other timber. As the supply in other countries is becoming depleted that around Prince Rupert will be required, not only for lumber and its manufactured products, but for making pulp and paper. Already a pulp mill is planned for Queen Charlotte Islands, the trade of which is subsidiary to Rupert, but a paper and pulp mill is bound to be built before long not far from the mouth of the Skeena River where there is water

## PROSPECTS FOR MINING ARE ENCOURAGING

Nicol Thompson Tells of Outlook For New Hazelton Gold-Cobalt Company.

"We got \$2,399.45 for one car lot of ore from the New Hazelton Gold-Cobalt Mine," remarked Nicol Thompson of Vancouver, who arrived in town this morning. "We sent this to the Dominion Government testing plant at Ottawa, and are quite pleased with the result. All the values were recovered from the ore, which were molybdenite, nickel, gold, cobalt and arsenic. So far as I am aware, this is the only mine producing ore containing both gold and cobalt together."

Work at this mine on the Rocher de Boule mountain is being pushed ahead steadily, and the same veins of copper which were worked during the past four years, by the Rocher de Boule Company pass through the property. The tunnel is being driven on the copper veins now, and shipping in quantities will in all likelihood take place soon.

The tramway constructed by the Rocher de Boule Company passes close to the property and may be utilized by the Gold-Cobalt Company for transporting their ore to the railway. Another car of ore was also shipped to Anyox recently, and from it returns were got as high as \$53.60 to the ton in gold.

Mr. Thompson is enthusiastic regarding Central British Columbia. He is well acquainted with the real wealth of the districts surrounding this city and is full of optimism regarding the immediate future of the mining industry.

## THIRD REVOLUTION NOW IN PORTUGAL

The Bolsheviks are in Control in Madrid, Streets Barricaded and Much Fighting.

London, Feb. 26.—The Bolsheviks are reported to be in control in Lisbon which they have held for the last four days. The electric service is cut off and the streets are barricaded. Up to Sunday there was a good deal of fighting.

The rebels demanded the dissolution of parliament, decentralization of government in the form of soviets and the abolition of the police and the banks.

This is the third revolution in Portugal within a few weeks.

## CHINESE ARE DEPORTING ALL ENEMY ALIENS

Two Shiploads of Germans Sent to Australia and Four More To Go to Europe.

ARMISTICE DELEGATES ARE ENTERING PROTEST

Paris, Feb. 26.—The German armistice delegates have protested against the deportation of Germans from China, which country expelled two shiploads of Germans and sent them to Australia in January and is preparing to send others to the Central Powers direct.

London, Feb. 26.—Four ships have been chartered for the voyage from China to Europe for the repatriation of all Germans in China, excepting a few missionaries. The first ship sails early in March. Two thousand, five hundred Germans including 1200 women and children are involved.

## MUST EVENTUALLY STOP WHEAT EXPORT

Senator Bennett Talks of Establishment of Aids to Mixed Farming.

power going to waste and where the supply of logs is illimitable. Wood products then will be among the exports from this port. Already there is one of the finest and largest mills on the coast located right in the heart of the city, another at Georgetown and others up the river and on the islands. There is a great future for this business.

Metaliferous Mines All Around City.

Of the mines it is difficult to speak without having one's word doubted. The mine and smelter at Anyox and the few shipping mines of the district are but the first fruits of the riches that will come. Stewart district alone, where the Bush mine has just commenced to ship some of the richest ore that has ever gone from here, will yield immense wealth of silver, gold and copper. The Alice Arm district, of which the Dolly Varden mine is the best known, will be productive of an immense wealth of ore. Near the mouth of the Skeena River there are mountains of copper ore that will be sufficient themselves to keep a smelter going, and they are but a few miles away. Farther up the Skeena Valley there are properties being found that will all add to the industrial wealth of the district, and across on the islands there will be plenty of duplications of the rich mine which is shipping concentrates from Surf Inlet.

Coal Fields Will Be Developed Soon.

Probably the greatest export trade, however, will be done in coal. Back from this city and not very far away are the Telkwa coal deposits and the Groundhog coal fields. So far as they have been explored and tested they have been shown to be of immense value. When they have been opened up the coal will be shipped this way and carried to all parts of the world. Prince Rupert will become a second Cardiff or Newcastle and ships will come here because they can get the one essential—fuel.

Manufactures Will Follow Population.

There is yet one more source of wealth for Prince Rupert. That is to be obtained from the development of local manufacturing industries. Not only will there be woodworking plants, shipbuilding plants, plants for building the fishing boats which are needed here and for manufacturing material needed in those lines of business, but there are bound to be other industries start up just as they do in every other centre of population. As the city grows people will locate here just because there are people here. Already the city is growing. This growth should continue with steadily accelerated speed until within a very few years fifteen and twenty thousand people and then twenty-five and thirty thousand will be reached.

Harbor Open All Year Round.

The fact that there is an open winter here the year through, that the climate is always equable and that the waters are always open for navigation are important factors in the development of the port.

Here then is a message to the world: Prince Rupert is the coming city, the city where there will be big things doing, the centre of Central British Columbia, the shipping port of one of the greatest of the great transcontinental lines, the fishing, woodworking, mining, and manufacturing centre which is to be. Great things are in store for her.

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### SLOAN WRITES COMMISSION ON EXPRESS RATES

**Tells How Proposed Raise Would Affect Fishing Business of Prince Rupert.**

At the sitting of the Board of Railway Commissioners at Victoria recently a letter from Hon. William Sloan, Commissioner of Fisheries, was filed protesting against the request of the Express Traffic Association for an increase in rates.

The Minister pointed out that he, as Fisheries Commissioner, had done everything he could to assist the work of the Food Board and alluded to the trawling industry of British Columbia, which demonstrated that an abundance of flounders, sole, witch, brill and cod could be produced, provided a market could be created.

**Develop Market.**

The communication continued: "To develop a market for these fish," he said, "they had to be advertised and offered at an attractive price. To create a demand, both in this province and in the Northwest, the Canada Food Board passed its Order No. 18, which limited the price to be paid fishermen and also the spread allowed wholesalers and retailers, and in addition conducted a publicity campaign, and the Fisheries Department of the Dominion Government assumed two-thirds of the transport charges on all fresh and frozen fish, other than salmon, halibut and sable fish. As a result of these efforts, flat fish and cod were retailed in the Northwest during 1918 for 9% c. to 10c. per pound. One company from Prince Rupert shipped not less than 1,600,000 pounds. It is estimated that the total shipments from B. C. ports to the Northwest exceeded 3,000,000 pounds.

**Some Did Not.**

"Every interest concerned in these efforts, except the transfer companies, contributed its quota to the end that the prime fish might be sold at a low price. The fishermen received a quarter of a cent less per pound in 1918 than was paid them in 1917, and the spread allowed the wholesaler and the retailer was proportionately reduced. The rates charged by the transport companies remained the same. They contributed nothing towards the effort to create a market, though they were equally interested.

"During the year 1919, the Canada Food Board and the Dominion Fisheries Department will continue their efforts to create a stable market. Order No. 18 will be enforced, and two-thirds of the transport charges be paid, because it is recognized that the high limit in the retail price for such fish has been reached. The present retail price of trawl caught fish cannot be maintained if the transfer companies are permitted to increase their tariffs. Any increase granted them must be added to the retail price. "As the transport companies have as great a prospective interest in the development of a permanent market for these fish as any other one of the parties concerned, they should assume some proportion of the effort to that end.

**To Help Labor.**

"Furthermore, there is in this Province at this time need of increased demand for the management of labor. The decline of 14,000,000 pounds in the catch of halibut fleets of Canada and the United States for the year 1918, when compared with their catch in 1917, indicates how rapidly the catch is declining, and how necessary it is that other fishery products be produced to take the place of halibut. Our fishing fleet should not be reduced. For manifest reasons it should be enlarged. It must be reduced if the men engaged in catching halibut cannot turn to the production of some other fishes for which a market can be found. No other field as productive as trawling is afforded them. But, that field cannot be developed without creating a stable market for flat fish and cod in the Northwest. The development of such a market cannot be established at this time unless we can offer these little known, but exceedingly valuable food fishes to the people at a moderate price. From every point of view no effort should be spared to that end."

### LUDENDORFF GONE BACK TO GERMANY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, Feb. 25. — General Ludendorff, former Quartermaster General of the German armies left Sweden for Germany, the Swedish Foreign Office having refused a request for an extension of the permit to stay in that country.

Mr. and Mrs. N. Bedard who have been staying at the home of Mr. and Mrs. P. Doiron lately, will be leaving for Selkirk, Manitoba, via Vancouver on the Princess Mary as soon as she gets back from the north. Mr. Bedard who worked here as an electrician for the G. T. P. war formerly employed by the Manitoba Steel Foundries at Selkirk and received word the other day from his former employers to return and install a generating set at the plant. Mr. and Mrs. Bedard have been residing here the last year and will be greatly missed by all their friends.

The steamer Gray is taking a cargo of coal to Rose Harbor, Queen Charlotte Islands, in readiness for the opening of the whaling season. While she was lying at the whaling company's dock at Victoria two days after the coal had been loaded on her an explosion of coal gas occurred which burned rather badly three longshoremen who were working on her. The hatch covers were blown off and some of the coal hurled into the air. The cargo was taken on at Coal Harbor, the shipping port of the Jinglepot mine.

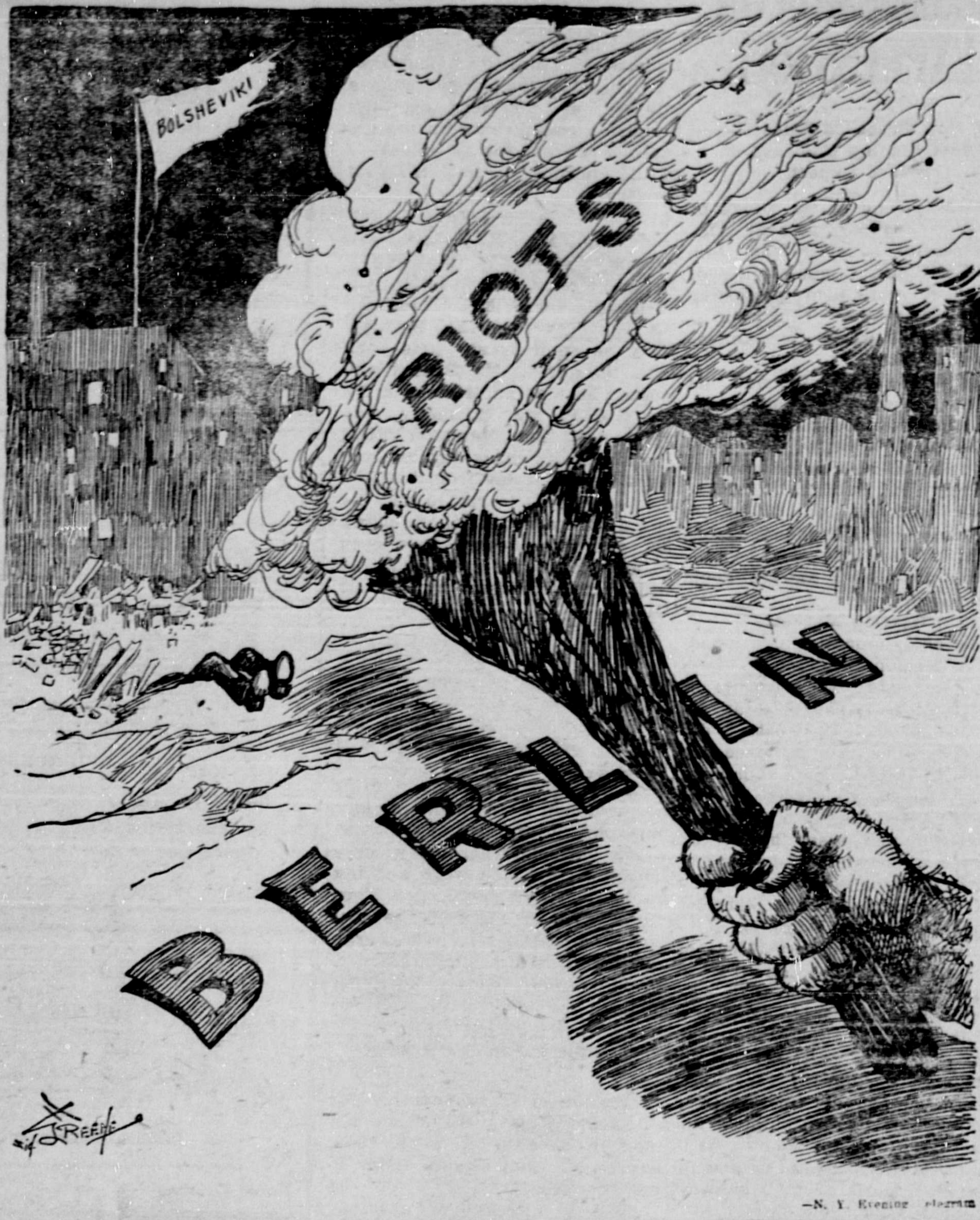

**PATTULLO IS URGING ACTION**

Asks Federal Members to Proclaim Dominion Government With View to Lumber Revival.

A strong plea for intervention by British Columbia Federal members in connection with much needed lumber orders for this province is made by the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, in the following wire dispatch at the week end.

"Our London representative advised us some time ago that only the securing of necessary tonnage was holding up a very large order for lumber for the mills of this province. We took up the matter with the Marine Department, Ottawa, urging action on their part. Also we have sent wires and cables relative to available tonnage offering here. It is absolutely essential to secure this order as the lumber market will have to shut down.

"The milling interests in this Province and our own Department carried out complete reorganization to supply aeroplane spruce to the British Government. With the sudden shutdown on signing of armistice it is necessary to again look for new field of activity. Am sending two or three similar telegrams to this to other British Columbia members, and would ask you to call British Columbia members together who will request the Ottawa Government to make the most strenuous efforts to furnish the British authorities with all tonnage that can possibly be secured on this side, and to insist that orders shall come to British Columbia.

"American brokers fighting for the business. In view of the fact that no fault is found with prices quoted, and in view of all other circumstances we look to you to see that Ottawa insists with British authorities that orders shall not be placed across the line—in preference to Canada."

**LAND ACT AMENDMENT**

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. For granting and industrial purposes, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with Joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where an applicant in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided the improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as temporary title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

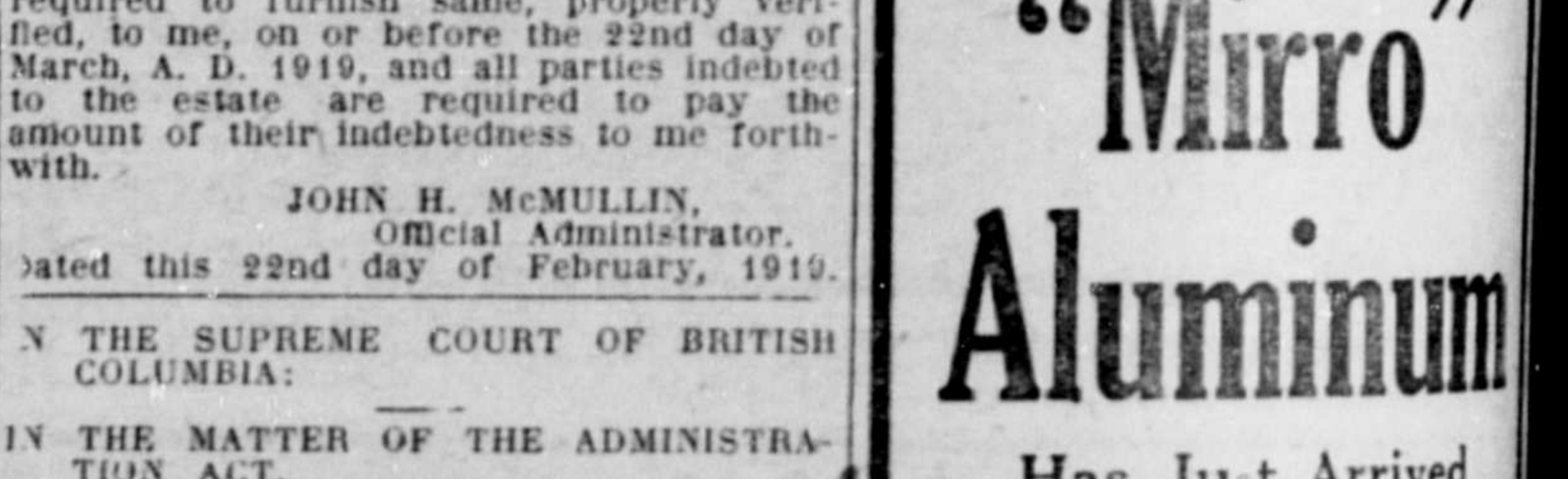

**IS ARRANGING A DELEGATION**  
Representative of Mining Convention Here Today to Raise Interest in the Event; Meeting at 5.

In the interests of the mining industry of the province of British Columbia generally and of the International Mining Convention to be held in Vancouver on March 17, 18 and 19 in particular, Nicol Thompson, until recently the provincial fuel controller, arrived in the city this morning. Mr. Thompson, who knows this portion of the province intimately, and is interested in the New Hazelton Gold-Cobalt Mines, Ltd., one of the richest of the developed properties in the Hazelton district, will address a meeting in the city hall this afternoon under the auspices of the Board of Trade Mining Committee, and will tell of the forthcoming mining convention.

**Strong Delegation.**  
Keeping in mind the fact that the central portion of the province is the richest, both in quantity and quality of its ores, and that the great proportion of its mineral deposits although proven, are yet undeveloped, it is the intention to organize a strong delegation from this district to attend the convention. Spokane will hold no convention this spring, and there will be many visitors there from across the line, as well as from the east.

**Opened by Sloan.**  
The Convention will be opened by the Hon. W. J. Sloan, Provincial Minister of Mines, and during the three days' session, papers will be read on important subjects by the Government mining engineers from the various districts. Such subjects as gold mining, the better utilization of B. C. coal, the establishment of an iron smelter, and the reduction of ores within the province are among those to be discussed, as well as others pertinent to the industry.

**FISH ARRIVALS.**  
There were only two fishing boat arrivals this morning the catches of which will be sold tomorrow. They were the Director with 8,000 lbs. and the Swiftsure, a larger boat, with only 7,000 lbs.
