LABOR AND CAPITAL MEET IN JOINT CONGRESS TODAY TO DISCUSS BIG QUESTIONS

MINIMUM WAGE, MAXIMUM WEEK, AND THE ESTABLISHMENT OF WORKERS' COMMITTEES TO ADJUST WAGE DISPUTES ARE AMONG SUBJECTS BEFORE GATHERING

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, February 27.—The first nation-wide joint congress of labor and capital, for the purpose of eradicating industrial disputes, opened this morning at the call of Premier David Lloyd George. Some of the men had been unwilling to take part in the congress but the powerful persuasion of the Premier was successful in getting them to attend.

Eight hundred delegates were present representing 2,000,000 workers.

The congress has set out to discuss the question of a legal minimum wage, a maximum working week, the desirability of the Government assisting regular unions against unaffiliated unions, and the establishment of Whitley Councils or workers' committees to adjust local disputes.

This is looked upon as the most important congress that has ever been held, as on its success or failure depends to a large extent whether there will be a revival of industry and the retaining of markets for the British or whether there will be industrial war leading to general industrial and political unrest.

MEN ORDERED BACK TO WORK

Officials of the Strikers Deny that they have Received Instruction from Officials.

San Francisco, Feb. 27.—That the boilermakers, and engineers strike in Seattle have been ordered back to work by the international officers was announced by Marshall, a member of the Federal Shipbuilding Labor Adjustment Board.

Seattle, Feb. 27.—Officials of the strikers' conference committee representing the 25,000 working shipyard workers, deny that the boilermakers and engineers have been ordered to return to work.

CANADIAN PERMANENT PEACE BASIS FORCE

Montreal, Feb. 27.—Orders have been received from Ottawa providing for reorganization of the Canadian permanent force on a peace basis, with five thousand men, rate of pay and subsistence allowance to be the same as for the Canadian Expeditionary force.

SOVIET REGULATES NUMBER OF BATHS PERSON MAY TAKE

Paris, Feb. 26.—The Soviet Government of Moscow is now regulating the number of baths each person is permitted to take in public and private bathing places and has divided the population into three categories. A person in the first category is allowed a bath twice a month, in the second once a month and in the third never.

NEW ATTORNEY-GENERAL FOR U.S. APPOINTED

Washington, Feb. 27.—The appointment has been announced today of A. Mitchell Palmer as United States Attorney General. He succeeds Thomas W. Gregory of Texas who resigned some little time ago giving as his reason that he could not afford to neglect his private business any longer.

AUSTRALIA TO GET DESTROYERS AND SUBS

London, Feb. 27.—Right Hon. Walter Long, First Lord of the British Admiralty stated in the House of Commons today that the Imperial Government had offered the Australian Government six modern destroyers and six modern submarines. No conditions were attached to the offer.

BOLSHEVIKI PLANS COMBINED OFFENSIVE

London, Feb. 27.—Captured documents near Archangel indicate a Bolshevik plan for a combined offensive against the Allies on all fronts. Reports from the Red Cross Mission say that the Bolsheviks are massacring hundreds.

MONARCHISTS ARE PLANNING A COUP

London, Feb. 27.—The London Daily Mail says that the Monarchists of Germany are planning a coup d'etat. The old officer classes are slowly gaining the ascendancy.

SATURN ASHORE NEAR DUNDAS

Battered in Storm for Four Hours—Started Leaking and Rudder Bent.

The fishing boat Saturn under Capt. Porter, which arrived last night, reported a very rough time while fishing off Dundas Island. She was struck by a heavy southeaster and driven against the shore, striking a rock which damaged her considerably. Her rudder was put out of commission by the heavy seas.

"After we struck the shore," said the captain when discussing the event, "we were obliged to leave the boat on account of the rough sea. We were clothed only in our night-shirts, and had to stay ashore for four hours before the storm showed signs of abating. The boat will be drydocked as soon as possible. The Nornen showed signs of meeting some bad weather also, as she was pretty well iced up on deck. It is the first boat to be frozen up this winter so far.

INSTITUTING SYSTEM OF COMPULSORY WORK

London, Feb. 27.—The Russian Government, says a wireless despatch, is instituting a system of registration, preparatory to enforcing the principle of compulsory work for all. This is in line with the military system introduced throughout the British Empire during war time.

LIBERAL UNIONISTS STILL BELONG TO THE OLD PARTY, SAYS J. A. CALDER; FINANCIAL DIFFICULTIES ARE AHEAD

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, February 27.—Hon. J. A. Calder, Minister of Immigration and Chairman of the Repatriation Committee, in the House of Commons yesterday laid stress on the necessity of adequately meeting the reconstruction problem. Mr. Calder made passing reference too, to the position of the "separated brethren." He claimed he was still a Liberal and when old Liberals joined the Union Government on the conscription issue, they believed they had done the right thing.

Hon. Frank Carroll indicated that some financial difficulty was lying ahead. He estimated that the additional expenditures, directly due to the war would amount to \$175,000,000. The total receipts from customs, excise, business profits and income tax, would total \$195,000,000. Further ordinary administration of the country could not be carried on with less than \$125,000,000 a year.

It is rumored that the Government contemplates making an appeal to the opposition that Government legislation be passed by Easter and another session called in the fall.

SAFE ROBBERY AT BRYANT'S STORE

Man Broke Into Gent's Furnishing Establishment But Secured Only Three Dollars.

A safe robbery took place in Bryant and Co's. store last night. J. Greer when arriving this morning discovered that the safe had been robbed. The burglar had gained admittance through the back window by breaking the glass, and finding the safe unlocked, riddled it of about \$3.00 in silver, all that Mr. Greer had left in it the night before.

Being such a small amount the safe was left just fastened but not locked. Nothing else is reported missing.

MANY BOLSHEVIKS KILLED AND WOUNDED

London, Feb. 27.—The allied forces advanced twenty-six miles on the Murman front Sunday. The Bolsheviks lost heavily in killed and prisoners. Anarchists have started a counter revolution against the Spartacans and are spreading rapidly. The National Council at Weimar cut off the Soviet Governments being established in many cities.

Transportation and Power to be in Hands of Government in Great Britain.

The new ministry under the bill would take over the control of railways, tramways, canals, waterways, roads and finally power.

War Trophies Exhibit on Coast.

On Saturday the Dominion Government Great War Trophies Exhibit will be shown in Vancouver for the last time and next week will be taken to Victoria. From that city the exhibit will be sent to Ottawa, where certain trophies will be retained for the federal archives, while the remainder will be distributed to all parts of the Dominion.

War Over But Money is Needed.

Campbell Sweeny, Provincial Chairman of the British Columbia Division, National War Savings Committee, recently said: "The war is over, and it might be thought patriotic effort in the way of saving and lending to the Government is no longer necessary, but this is not the case for the following reasons: While actual fighting has stopped, an army of occupation will have to be kept in the enemy country for some time, and Canada must furnish its quota of the army."

Canada Must Now Finance Herself.

"Further, much money will be required for the development of our natural resources, by which means alone can we pay off the heavy national debt the war has imposed upon us, and for all these purposes we must finance ourselves, for the rest of the world wants what money it has for its own uses. The success of the Victory Loans has proved conclusively that Canada can finance herself if she determines to do so, and what is asked of her now is to supplement the magnificent bursts of patriotism which have produced over \$1,000,000,000 in two years by persistent economy and so steadily keep the country's coffers filled, and the country's soldiers fed, and the country's industries flourishing."

Oliver's Name is Mentioned at Ottawa.

Says the Vancouver Sun: "The despatch from Ottawa stating that the name of Hon. John Oliver is being canvassed for the party leadership will not be surprising news to the friends of the veteran premier of this province, though it appears to have been unthought of by Mr. Oliver himself, which, of course, is what might be expected from a man of Mr. Oliver's modesty."

"It must be admitted that for the national leadership Mr. Oliver possesses many qualifications of both a positive and negative character. He is sturdily devoted to the broad principles of Liberalism and his long public record in this province will furnish all the proof of that statement which may be called for. His sterling sense of duty and the singleness of purpose with which he pursues his course, inspire the confidence of his followers."

"On the negative side, he has no past party sins to answer for. He has not been identified with any of the dissensions which have shaken the party in the east. He has been too far on the outside to be saddled with the onus of any mistakes which have been made."

"The Liberal party of Canada might do worse than to select the war horse of Delta for their national leader."

Work to Do in British Columbia.

John Oliver is needed just now in British Columbia worse than at Ottawa. He is the strong man of British Columbia and is well known and appreciated here. There are plenty of men who can be chosen to lead the Federal party, but few who could carry the provincial Government over the shoals which have beset its course since its inception. A good many people would like to see Mr. Oliver change the sphere of his activities, but we feel sure that the Premier is listening to no siren voices just now.

DELEGATES WILL ATTEND THE VANCOUVER MINING CONVENTION

NICOL THOMPSON TELLS OF INTEREST TAKEN IN MINES OF THIS DISTRICT AND POSSIBILITY OF A SMELTER BEING ERECTED HERE SOON

That a delegation be sent from here to attend the mining convention at Vancouver and that it be left to the Mining Committee of the Board of Trade to organize the forces and arrange for sending them. That was the resolution which was passed by the meeting held yesterday afternoon in the council chamber with M. P. McCaffery, president of the Board of Trade, in the chair. The passing of the resolution followed a general discussion on the question.

Nicol Thompson who came from Vancouver for the purpose of interesting the people here in the convention explained its scope. He showed that it was held at this time because the usual convention at Spokane was omitted. It would cost about eight thousand dollars, but they had arranged to finance it.

Richer Than South.

The speaker told of the value of the convention to the province and the desirability of sending a strong delegation from here to interest the mining people in the district, which he believed was richer in mines than the southern part of the province. It was proposed to make the convention an annual one and to hold it at different points in British Columbia from year to year.

Smelter Here.

Mr. Thompson said that he was personally more interested in the north than the south. He had shipped ore out of Atlin ten years ago and he was interested in the mines of Hazelton. He had taken a lively interest in the complex ores of Hazelton because molybdenite and cobalt entered into the manufacture of steel more than ever before. They had the ores here and he thought they should have a smelter close at hand. He had a personal friend coming from the east to look into the zinc and silver-lead ores with a view to smelting them here. If this could be done it would be to the advantage of the district.

Natural Centre.

A. C. Garde, chairman of the Mining Committee of the Board of Trade, said that he was beginning to think they were not altogether neglected by the people of the south. They had a greater field here both as to quantity and to quality. He was optimistic more than ever before. This was the natural centre for those mining activities. Vancouver and Victoria were just on the fringe of the province and very narrowly escaped being in the state of Washington. Here there was everything that was required for mining. There was splendid waterpower and the matter of wages which was so often used as an argument against the district he thought would not obtain long after the Peace Conference had dealt with it.

Coming Into Its Own.

L. W. Patmore suggested anything that would help mining would help us, as we are in the centre of a rich mining district. The Portland Canal was coming into its own and Salmon River was busy. He thought we should send a delegation.

W. E. Williams thought it desirable to go on record as favoring sending delegates to the convention. Messrs. Mobley and Manson were in Victoria and they might represent us. There doubtless would be others who could attend.

W. E. Fisher suggested that the Government had got an expert to examine the iron ores to the south and he had reported that electric smelting would be too expensive because of lack of water power and of suitable fluxes. This part of the country had been side-tracked. He suggested sending Mr. Garde as a delegate because he was an authority on these matters and could give expert information.

Representations.

After some further discussion the resolution was passed as above with the suggestion that A. C. Garde should be sent directly and that credentials be sent to A. M. Manson, M. P. P., F. H. Mobley, M. P. P., L. W. Patmore, Geo. Frizzell, Norrie-Lowenthal and any other suitable local men who might be in the south at that time.

The meeting then closed after President McCaffery had thanked Mr. Thompson for coming here and showing so much interest in the district.

A Statement by the People's Prohibition Association of British Columbia

Fact and Policy and A Convention Call--

Recent developments in connection with the administration of the Prohibition Act in the Province of British Columbia, have made it desirable that the People's Prohibition Association should reaffirm its attitude in regard thereto, and should take such steps for the amendment of the Prohibition Act as experience has indicated are necessary for its most effective enforcement.

- Some of the Facts—**
1. On October 1st, 1917, the British Columbia Prohibition Act came into force.
 2. For eight months the Prohibition Act was reasonably well enforced, and notwithstanding the handicap of large stocks of liquor privately stored before the law came into effect, splendid results were evident, among them the following:
 - (a) A marked decrease in crime, especially of those offences associated with the drink habit, resulting in the closing of jails.
 - (b) A great improvement in social conditions.
 - (c) A notable stimulation to business. This was shown in an increased Christmas trade. It was also indicated by the remarkable financial support to the Red Cross, Victory Loan and other worthy and patriotic movements.
 - (d) A notable increase in efficiency in industrial lines.
 - (e) The law was also of the utmost value to the military authorities in their arduous and responsible work of recruiting and training reinforcements for our armies overseas, as repeatedly affirmed by those in charge of this great duty.
 3. After this period there followed an interval of growing laxity in enforcement, culminating in the scandal of the Commissioner himself being convicted as a party to this illicit traffic in intoxicating liquors.
 4. This again was followed by a period of two months when there was no Prohibition Commissioner, and no adequate enforcement of the Act. The office of Prohibition Commissioner has recently been filled by the appointment of Colonel Slater, a gallant and distinguished soldier, and a highly respected citizen of the province.
 5. On three occasions in recent years the principle of Prohibition has been submitted to the people, and each time has been endorsed by a majority of the electors of British Columbia.
 6. The present Prohibition Act was endorsed by a majority vote of the Electors (men only voting), and afterwards enacted by an all but unanimous vote of the Members of the Legislature.

Recent Developments—
The enemies of Prohibition are alert and active. Simultaneously with similar developments in other Canadian Provinces, a so-called Moderation Party is being organized in British Columbia. This movement is deceptive in name and character, and seeks to enlist fair and temperate citizens in a programme in which they have little voice and which has motives and ends not fully disclosed. The movement is taking different form in different provinces, according to local conditions, but there is everywhere an evident purpose to undermine and ultimately destroy the various Canadian laws which restrict the liquor traffic. In British Columbia the avowed purpose of the promoters is to impair the Prohibition Act, or to secure its repeal, thus placing themselves squarely in opposition to the thrice expressed desire of the electors of the Province.

Nor dare we minimize the possibilities of great injury to the temperance cause. They are endeavoring—with plausibility—to transmute public indignation at the failure to enforce the law, and public resentment because of dereliction of duty on the part of the late Commissioner, into a demand for the repeal of the law itself!

We do not share Stephen Leacock's view, which is so highly approved and so generally circulated by the enemies of Prohibition, that the working man is "better off with loose motor muscles, a soggy aesophagus, and a mug of ale beside him," because thereby he is "put on an equality with kings and plutocrats;" or that employers are guilty of "sheer shortsightedness" in favoring prohibition, because to the "drinkless workman the glaring inequalities of society will stand revealed," and he will "turn into a Bolshevik."

As to Policy—

- (a) We insist upon the fair, fearless, and intelligent enforcement of the present Prohibition Act.
- (b) We oppose its repeal, or the impairment of its essential principles until demobilization is complete and our citizen soldiers are re-established in their homes, and normal conditions are otherwise restored.
- (c) At the end of such period (assuming proper enforcement has been maintained), we are willing to accept the verdict of the people of the province, confident that the experience under this Act, and the results of Prohibition elsewhere will vindicate the wisdom of the measure.

A Call for Service—
The Executive Committee of the People's Prohibition Association of British Columbia hereby call a Convention of all electors and representatives of organizations who desire the enforcement of the Prohibition Act, which Act, let it be repeated, expresses the will of the majority of the electors and their representatives in Parliament assembled; such Convention to meet in Vancouver on Wednesday, the Fifth Day of March, 1919, for the purpose of counselling as to ways and means for the better enforcement of the Prohibition Act. The Executive Committee ask that all local and district organizations meet at once to appoint Delegates to this Convention, and in those sections where there is at present no local organization, it is earnestly desired that all sub-units of this Association, and Societies, Associations, Churches, and other organizations which are in sympathy with the policy herein advocated, take steps at once to see that delegates are appointed from their district so that there may be a full representation at the Convention from all sections of the province.

WAR VETERANS ARE OPPOSED TO FREAKS

Pass Resolution at Victoria Indicating Stand Taken by the Association Generally.

"That we as ex-service men go on record as opposed to unconstitutional methods, and that while seeking to develop a high standard of political morality and equitable treatment for all it has no sympathy with agitators of British or of alien nationality who are opposed to British institutions and to constitutional methods; and it is furthermore considered that all persons professing sympathies which are not in accord with British institutions and with organized government be dealt with speedily by the Dominion Government; if of alien nationality be deported at once; if of British nationality prosecuted to the full extent of the law."

"And be it further resolved that we go on record as opposed to any flag being displayed in public other than those flags properly authorized by the Government, and are also opposed to any flag other than those authorized being displayed in any hall or building except when in company with a British or Canadian flag."

JUNEAU GETS PLENTY OF CHEAP HERRING

Juneau has been enjoying a feast of fresh herring at the unheard-of price of 25 cents a water bucketful. The gasboat Albatross, Capt. W. R. Hanlon, arrived in port recently with 150 barrels of fresh herring which Capt. Hanlon expected to sell to the Juneau Cold Storage Company. The latter company could not use the herring. On account of the strike at Seattle and the fact that it had a supply of frozen herring on hand sufficient to supply the boats in port with bait, the Juneau Cold Storage Company had wired to Capt. Hanlon at Sitka that it could handle no more herring. Capt. Hanlon, however, did not get the cablegram, and he arrived at Juneau with a cargo of fresh fish that he could not dispose of. He proceeded at once to sell the fresh fish to people about town at 25 cents a water bucketful.

DRASTIC MEASURES FOR PROTECTION OF SOCKEYE SALMON

Drastic measures for the protection and preservation of the sockeye salmon of Puget Sound are outlined in suggested regulations received recently from Washington, D. C., by Mr. Henry O'Malley Field, Assistant U. S. Bureau of Fisheries, with offices in the L. C. Smith building, for submission to the State legislature now in session at Olympia. Similar regulations have been forwarded to the British Columbia executive bodies, and if both the State of Washington and British Columbia act favorably, a fish treaty governing the sockeye salmon industry on Puget Sound and in British Columbia waters will be ratified by the United States and Canada.

Conference.
The regulations were drawn up by the American-Canadian Fisheries conference which met in Seattle last April and have just been made public. The American representatives at the conference included Mr. Redfield, United States Secretary of Commerce, E. F. Sweet, Assistant Secretary of Commerce, and Dr. H. M. Smith, United States Commissioner of Fisheries.

The Canadian representatives included W. A. Found, Superintendent of Fisheries, G. J. Desbarats, Deputy Minister of Naval Service, and Chief Justice J. D. Hazen, of New Brunswick. E. D. Quigley was secretary of the conference.

The Proposals.
The suggested regulations provide that fishing for sockeye salmon shall not be permissible except under licence; number of licences shall be limited in state of Washington to licences issued in 1918, and in British Columbia not to exceed 1,800 gill nets; only American citizens shall be allowed to fish in American waters and British subjects in Canadian waters. Technical restrictions in regard to net fishing are made; a closed season each year of half the sockeye salmon run and weekly closed periods are provided; crowding of fish traps so as to prevent the free passage of salmon between them is prohibited and the size of nets is fixed. Regulations in regard to the use of purse seine nets are made. Regulations applicable only to British Columbia waters include the prohibition of fishing in certain parts of the Fraser River except with hook and line.
