## INDUSTRIAL CONFERENCE APPOINTS COMMITTEE OF SIXTY TO INVESTIGATE

THEY WILL REPORT APRIL 5 ON HOURS OF LABOR, WAGES, UNEMPLOYMENT AND ITS PREVENTION, WORKING CONDITIONS AND RELATIONS BETWEEN CAPITAL AND LABOR

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, February 28.—After an all-day session the Industrial Conference, called by the Government, in which Government ministers, labor leaders and representatives of the big employing interests participated, adopted a resolution for the appointment of a joint temporary committee of thirty laborites and thirty capitalists, to make a thorough investigation into the questions of hours, wages, general conditions of work, unemployment and its prevention, and the best means for promoting better relations between capital and labor. They will report back to the conference April 5.

London, February 28.—The conference of the National Federation of Miners decided to postpone the strike notices, which were to become effective March 15, for one week. It is understood the delay was granted on condition that the miners be allowed to negotiate with half the members of the coal commission.

## SECURE LAND FOR SOLDIERS

Committee Coming to British Columbia to Investigate Possibilities for Settling Men Here.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—The Government has named a committee consisting of three employees of the Land Settlement Board, with J. B. Paterson as chairman, to go to B. C. and ascertain the possibilities of the Soldier Settlement Act being able to secure land of good quality at reasonable prices for soldier settlement. The committee was given power to conduct a formal inquiry by inspection or examination of witnesses.

It is provided that homesteads shall be within twelve miles of a town in timbered countries and within 15 miles in other countries. Soldier settlers must be recommended by provincial legislation, or enter for homestead on such lands. The Provincial Government is expected to provide suitable school accommodation for settlers' children.

## INITIATIVE AND THE REFERENDUM

Bill Introduced at Victoria by Premier Oliver Yesterday Provides for Popular Votes.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Victoria, February 28.—An act providing for direct legislation by means of the initiative and referendum was introduced into the Provincial Legislature yesterday by Premier Oliver.

The bill provides that 25 per cent of the electors may by petition secure the passage of a measure which must be voted on by the whole electorate before it becomes law.

## SEAMEN ADOPT A MINIMUM WAGE SCALE

London, Feb. 28.—The International Seafarers Federation adopted fifteen pounds monthly as a standard wage for seamen and firemen with older ratings being paid in proportion. This is virtually the same as the United States minimum.

## THE NEW MINISTER OF TRANSPORTATION

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—A dispatch just received from London intimates that Sir Eric Geddes is slated for the position of Minister of Transportation. This follows the announcement yesterday that the Government would take over permanently the railways, canals, waterways, tramways, roads and power.

Sir Eric is looked upon as one of the strong men in the present Government and if anyone can make a success of the department it is thought he will be the man to do it.

## PROHIBITION LIVE QUESTION

Both Ottawa and Quebec to Submit Referendum Regarding Extent of Dry Legislation Desired.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, Feb. 28.—It is understood that when the question of prohibition is under consideration by the Government caucus it was suggested that when a plebiscite is taken, subsequent to the return of the fighting men, several questions should be submitted. They should be asked whether they desire bone dry prohibition or the sale of light wines and beers.

Quebec, Feb. 28.—While no official outline has been given yet of the Quebec license bill, it is expected that the measure provides for a referendum before May 1, to have people choose between absolute prohibition and beer and wines.

### Copper Market Not Encouraging.

Word comes from Anxox that commencing tomorrow morning there will be a general reduction of wages and with it there is a reduction in the price of board at the company's mess house.

While everyone regrets that a reduction of wages should have been found necessary it was inevitable that something would be done before long. The company might have carried on another month or two and lost some money, paying it out of their former profits, but that would not have helped much. Copper has dropped from around thirty cents a pound to sixteen cents and there is plenty on hand so that it is not improbable the commodity may go even lower.

The men will resent the drop in wages and many will leave, but just what the company could have done under the circumstances no one can suggest. The tendency is downwards and nothing is likely to stop it so far as can be seen. In Vancouver there are thousands of men walking the streets out of employment and everywhere there is a sufficiency of labor.

### Important Congress Sitting in London.

Great things are expected from the Congress now sitting in London for the purpose of having employers and employees discuss subjects which are of mutual interest. This is the first get-together gathering of any consequence that has been held and on its success or failure hangs the industrial fate of the United Kingdom. That it will at any rate be the beginning of a better understanding between employers and employees seems likely.

### Civil Servants Express Opinions.

It is to be sincerely hoped that a wise and far-seeing vision will distinguish the attitude of the leaders in our Government in dealing with economic and social problems arising out of the war, says "The Civilian," the official organ of the civil servants of Canada. A seismic tremor is disturbing the atmosphere of all countries affected by the war and it will be but a dull politician who will misinterpret the signs of the impending earthquake. On account of our economic oligarchy, Canada is but ill-prepared to deal with events even now in course of development. At one Labor Bureau in the city of Toronto, 397 discharged soldiers enrolled for employment in two weeks and this no doubt means that a great many more are actually out of work. "Some of the men who applied were hungry and some have walked as far as twenty miles in one day to get work," says a report from Toronto. The Hon. Mr. Rowell appears to see the momentous problem arising and it is to be hoped he will convert the Hon. Mr. Maclean or any others of his colleagues who may be disposed to view lightly the economic enigma confronting us. The laboring class have made its sacrifices in the war, it is now becoming that the privileged politico-economic class do likewise. Idealistic expressions will not meet the situation. Action swift and sure and radical is called for on the part of those who at present control the destinies of Canada.

### Air Travel is Come to Stay.

There is now no doubt that air travel has come to stay. It was inevitable but war has proved a great stimulus to the development of the science of aeronautics.

The public will probably learn by future experience that aerial travel at no matter what high speed is really less dangerous than motor car travelling at the relatively low speed of 50 miles per hour. The slightest neglect or inattention on the part of a chauffeur may result in a terrible road collision, whereas a pilot of an avion has no such danger to fear. For him the really critical moment is the landing, but in the case of modern passenger avions this difficulty has been reduced to a minimum by the reduction of speed, extra strong landing chassis, and very powerful brakes. Even the large type of machine with a full load alights gently on the ground at the low speed of 37 miles per hour.

## SALVAGE CASE BEFORE COURTS

Witness Leaves for Vancouver to Give Evidence Before Marine Court—Kelly and Commodore Involved.

T. H. Johnson, manager of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company, accompanied by Capt. Hills, late of the "Kelly," and Chief Engineer Strombahl, left for Vancouver by the Prince Rupert last evening, in connection with an action pending in the Marine Court there.

It will be remembered that about November last the steam fishing boat Kelly picked up the tug Commodore with a barge of copper ore in tow off Yakutat, on the Alaskan coast. The Commodore was bringing the scow load of copper south for smelting and on the trip broke down.

The Kelly passed a line to the Commodore with her tow and proceeded to Yakutat. On account of the rough seas the hawsers parted several times and the barge of copper ore had to be cut adrift. This happened some 60 miles off Yakutat.

The Kelly brought the Commodore to Yakutat, whence another tugboat was despatched to salvage the barge. The barge was picked up all right, but was lost on the rocks on coming into Yakutat.

The point to be decided before the Marine Court is whether the Kelly is entitled to salvage for the Commodore or only for towage charges. It is held that the Commodore was in distress when picked up by the Kelly, while on the other hand the argument for the Commodore's owners is that the Kelly performed towage only.

## COPPER PRODUCTION MONTH OF JANUARY

New York Report Gives Interesting Figures Regarding Granby Output at Anyox and Grand Forks.

The Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Company produced 3,156,486 pounds of copper in January, according to a New York report. This may be compared with 2,955,450 produced in the previous month and is the largest since September, when the production was 3,371,535 pounds. The production in January, 1918, was 4,209,393, or over 1,000,000 pounds more than in January, 1919.

An estimate on the earnings in January is made difficult by declines in the metal market during that month, but some basis is provided by the report for February, 1918, when the price of the metal was high and the estimate of earnings was in the neighborhood of \$400,000 on 3,843,686 pounds.

The production in January, 1919, was made almost solely at the Anyox smelter, where the costs are 10 to 11 cents a pound. An intention of suspension at the Grand Forks smelter soon was announced several weeks ago. The production by pounds for the last 13 months at both smelters is contained in the table that follows:

### SYNOPSIS OF

## LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each must be granted improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, and improvements or record provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the last day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

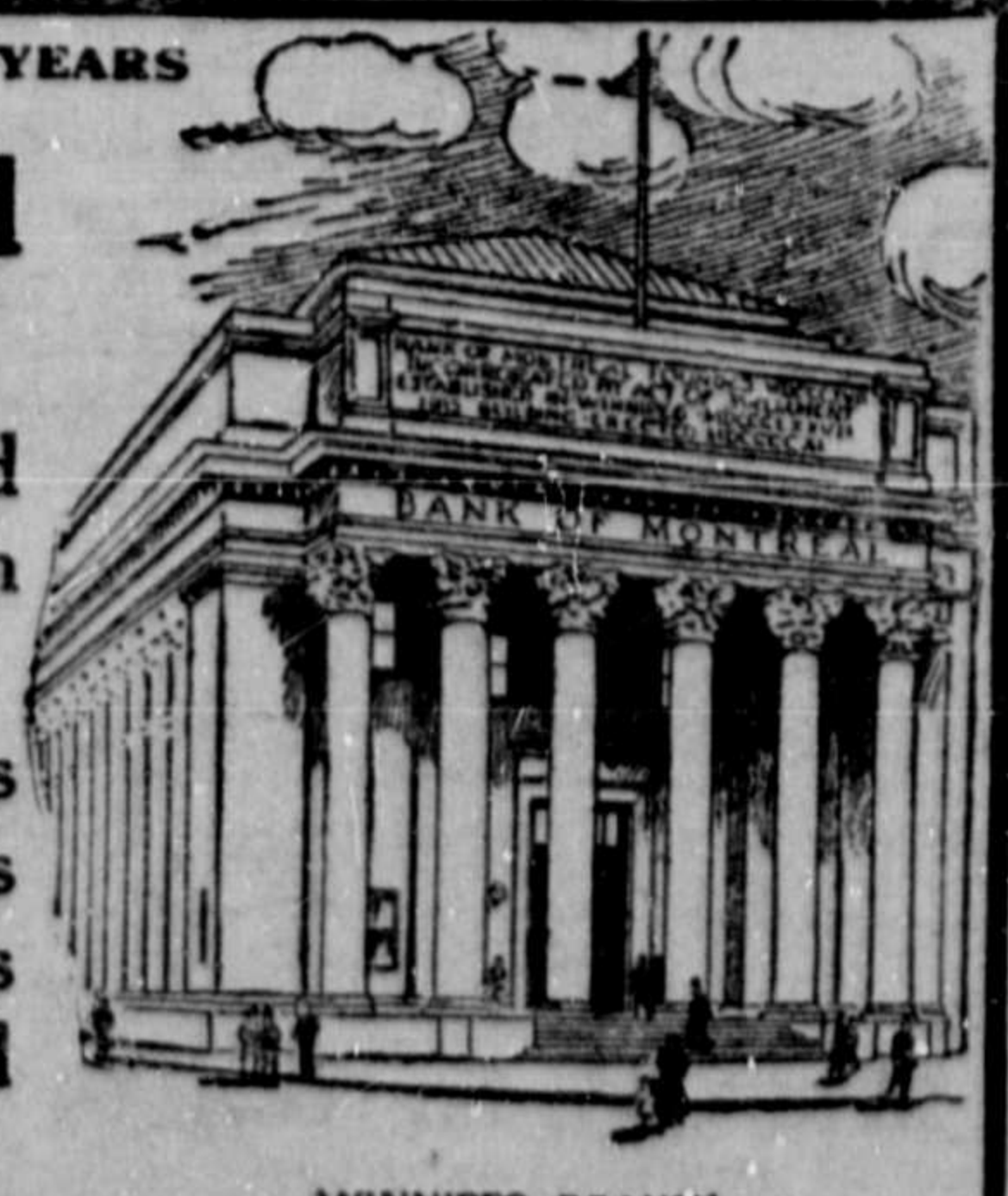

## UNITED STATES IS SPENDING MUCH MONEY

Great preparations for the construction of public works and for general building activities in the spring are being made in the United States. In addition to the survey being conducted by the field men of the Division of Public Works and Construction of the United States Department of Labor, the Kelly and Kenyon Bills have been introduced in Congress to provide heavy appropriations for national constructive activities. Each measure calls for an appropriation of \$100,000,000.

The Kenyon Bill, in addition, empowers the War Finance Corporation to make advances, within one year from the passage of the Act, to an aggregate amount not exceeding \$300,000,000, at not less than 5 per cent per annum to any state for financing public works whenever unusual unemployment is actual or threatened.

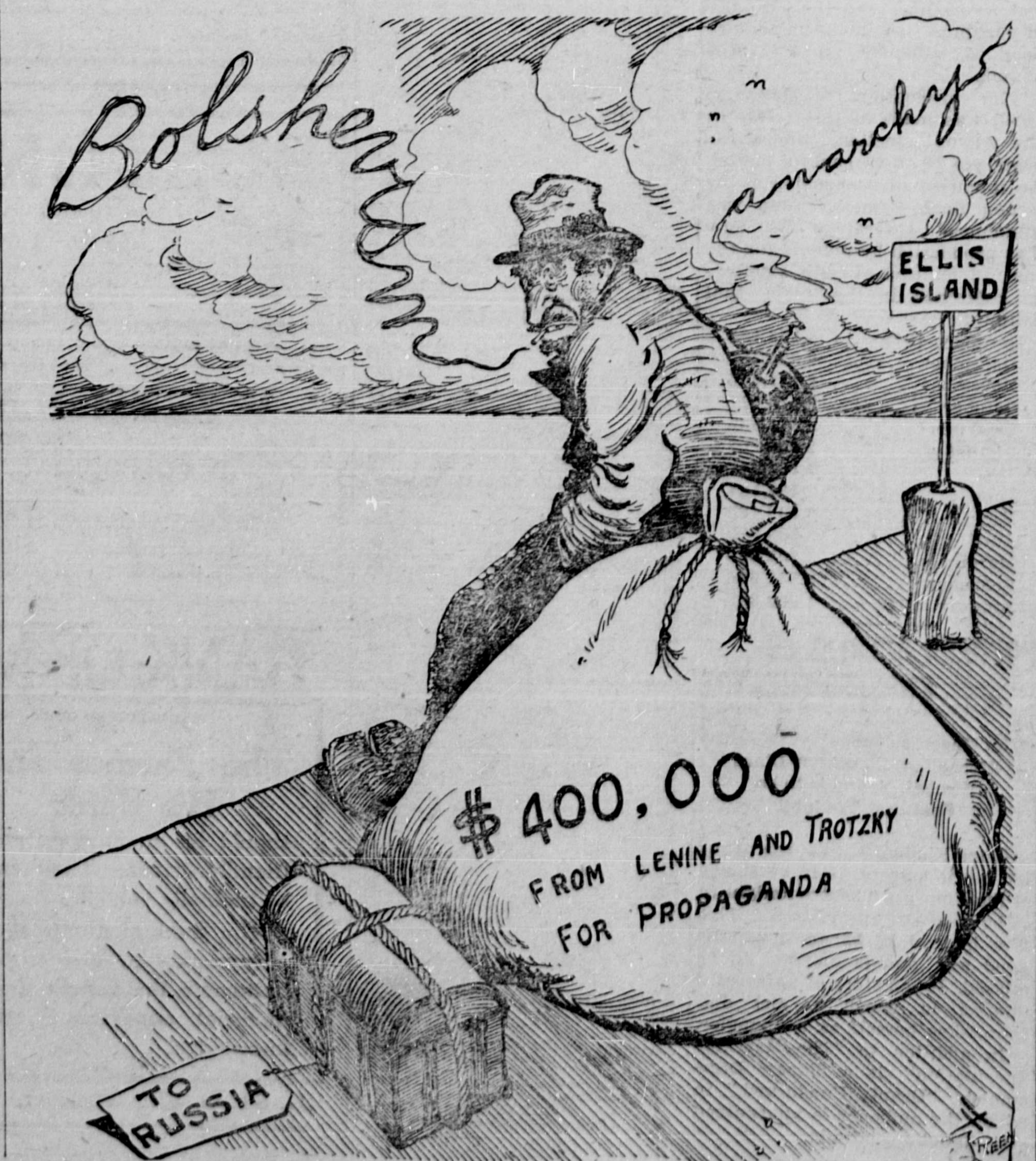

## FARMANS PREPARE FOR AERIAL SERVICE

Build Avions and Provide Landing Places for Franco-British Regular Runs.

In anticipation of the sanction of both the British and French Governments of an aerial service between Paris and London, the Farman firm has already built avions, and provided landing places in France and England, with the intention of creating a regular aerial transport service between the French and British capitals.

In order to demonstrate practically the possibility of making the voyage in all weathers, Dick Farman, accompanied by a mechanic, who is also an experienced pilot, started from Buc Aerodrome on a small private touring avion, and landed at Hendon, when the atmosphere was most perturbed and rainy. On the outward-bound voyage there was a thick fog over the Channel, on their return the aviators flew over the sea without once getting a glimpse of the water, enveloped as they were in a cloud of snow.

### Two Types.

The Farman firm has constructed two types of machines for the Paris-London service. Both are propelled by two motors of 250 and 275 h. p. respectively, and both can fly with only one motor working. To provide against the almost impossible case of both motors breaking down simultaneously, arrangements are being made for landing places all along the route. In fact this was one of the principal objects of the recent voyage.

### Speed and Comfort.

It may be mentioned that both these types of aeroplanes have undergone the French Government's tests with perfect success, since they were both invented for bombing—that is to say, for weight-carrying purposes. The officially certified speed of the two machines is practically identical the speed of the smaller being 98 miles per hour and that of the larger 99 miles per hour. It is therefore estimated that the Paris-London voyage will be easily done in less than three hours.

### Bodies Closed.

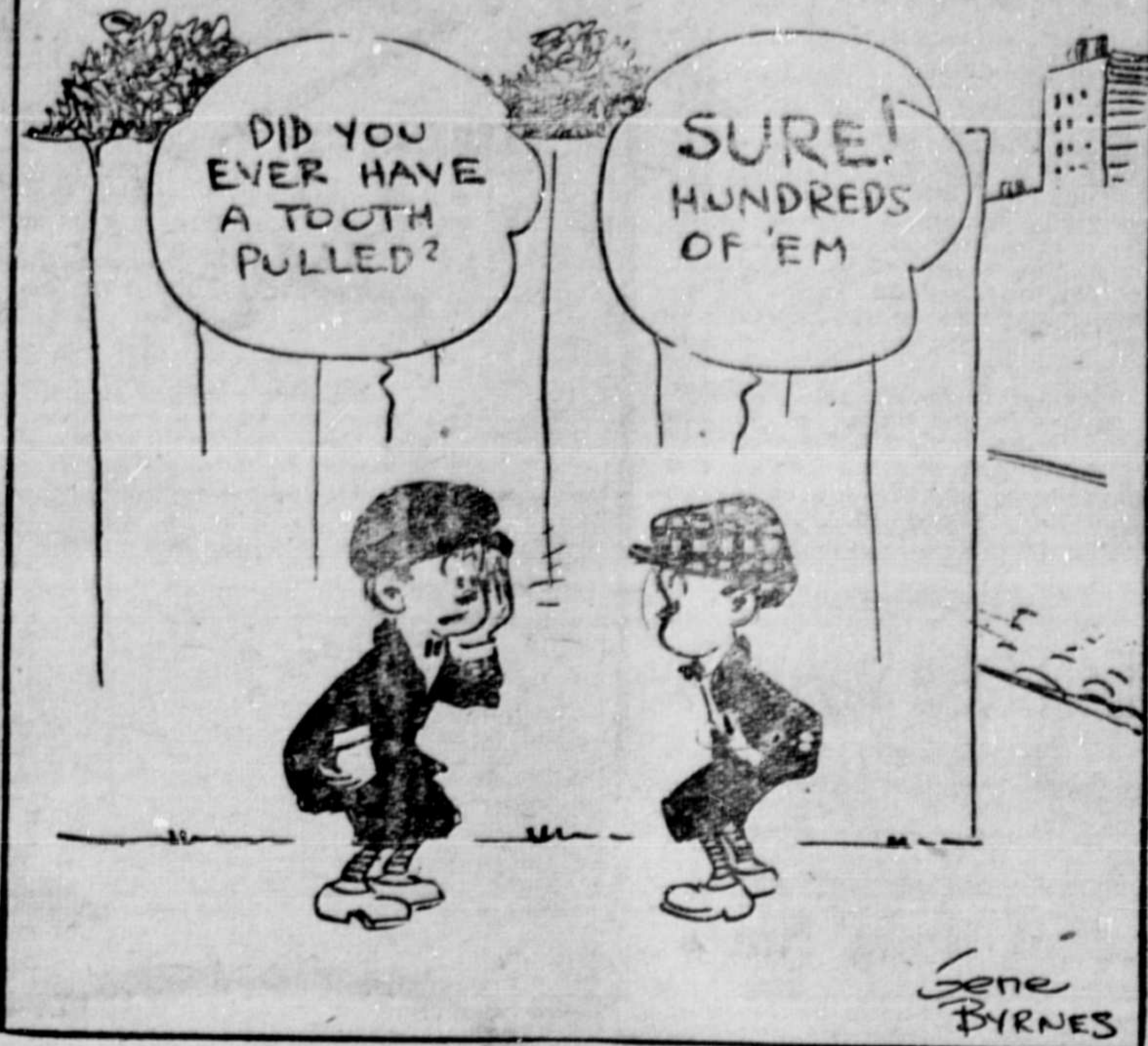
The bodies of both types of machines are as completely closed and air-tight as the body of the most comfortable private automobile, and like the chauffeur of an automobile the pilot with his assistant are seated outside in front, but protected by a screen from the wind. The passengers are seated in couples, with strong glass windows, through which they can contemplate the panorama of land or sea over which they may be travelling.

At the hind extremity there is also space for light luggage or mail bags. The floor is carpeted and the arm-chairs at the disposal of passengers are commodious in every respect. The height of the closed body, best described as a small railway saloon car, is greater than that of a closed automobile. Thus passengers can walk from one end to the other without inconvenience.
