COLONEL PECK ARRIVES BACK AT HALIFAX

Says He Will Meet His Regiment
on Arrival and Accompany it
to Destination.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Halifax, March 1.—The steamship Lapland with 2,000 Canadian soldiers on board has arrived in port. Prominent among the passengers was Lieut.-Col. C. W. Peck, V. C., D. S. O., of Prince Rupert, who is on special leave to attend Parliament at Ottawa as the member for Skeena.

Col. Peck says that he expects to meet his regiment, the Sixteenth Canadian Scottish, on its arrival in Canada and accompany it to its destination, which it is understood will be Vancouver.

Colonel Peck was elected to Parliament while serving overseas and has not yet taken his seat in the House.

USK PROMISES GREAT FUTURE FOR MINING

Many Properties Being Worked
and Mill Expected There
Soon on Cordillera
Group.

Mining activity in the Usk district promises this coming summer to be very much greater than ever before. Considerable development work has been going on quietly but steadily for the last several seasons and several of the properties there are fast nearing the shipping stage. There are satisfactory quantities of ore on the dump at most of the properties and this summer should see a number of shipments to the smelter.

Lucky Loop.
The "Lucky Loop" property, owned by Moody and Lowrie, has been leased to Seeber, Roark and McMann, who have been working steadily all winter. They have put in 100 feet of tunnel and have a carload of hand picked ore ready for shipment now. The values run to \$10 in gold and \$50 in copper at present prices, and small quantities of silver are also apparent. Some of the samples taken have run to \$50 in gold.

Old Hickory.
On the "Old Hickory" property drifting will be continued this season by A. L. Kelch, who has been in California for the winter. He is expected to return within the next week or so. The tunnel here is in some 200 feet, with three feet of ore on the face. The ore is bornite and chalcopyrite.

Willow.
On the adjoining "Willow" property, there is a five-foot vein of chalcopyrite, carrying two feet of pay ore, the balance being low grade, only suitable for milling. They are some sixty feet in now. This property is owned by Seeber, Roark and McMann.

Bring in Mill.
Messrs. French and Thompson of the Kitselas Mountain Copper Company, which owns the "Cordillera" are at present in the south and it is expected that they will bring with them a mill, the installation of which will prove a great boon for the smaller properties in the district. The saving in freights between the weights of the ore and the concentrates will mean a big thing for the smaller miners.

Close to Rail.
Many of the properties in the Usk district are situated advantageously, being only two or three miles from transportation, and in most cases at a low elevation and good returns are confidently expected this coming season.

Vancouver, March 1. The Princess Sophia inquiry which has been adjourned at Juneau, will be resumed at either Victoria or Vancouver but no date has been set as yet.

AN INSULT TO FLANDERS DEAD

Great War Veterans Refuse to
Have Dealings With Some
Leaders in Labor
Council.

Vancouver, March 1.—Declaring it would be an insult to the dead on Flanders' fields, the Great War Veterans' Association on Thursday night decided they would not deal with certain men in the Trades and Labor Council who were prominently identified with the Goodwin twenty-four-strike last year and who at the last meeting of the Council were appointed on a committee to confer with the Veterans in conjunction with a committee from the Metal Trades Council. Goodwin was a draft evader shot by the military police.

MARTIAL LAW MAKES MADRID MOBS MAD

Stores Stormed and Merchandise
Looted—Sanguinary Street
Fighting Follows Clash
With Troops.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Madrid, March 1.—Owing to rioting which again broke out in several parts of the city martial law was proclaimed in Madrid yesterday. The presence of strong bodies of troops in certain portions of the city served to inflame the strikers still further, and stiff street fighting followed the first collision between the civilians and the soldiery. The troops have been unable to quell the riots, and in the main streets the large shops and stores were stormed, although carefully shuttered and boarded up, and their contents looted of all movable valuables.

FISH ARRIVALS IN PORT YESTERDAY

Four fishing boats entered port yesterday afternoon looking much the worse for bad weather. They were the Alameda, bringing 6,000 lbs.; the Tatoosh with 3,000 lbs.; the Myrtle with 3,000, and the Bravo beating the rest with 9,000 lbs. of halibut.

FOOD SHORTAGE IN GERMANY

Preliminary Peace Must Be Con-
cluded at Once or Blockade
Lifted by Allies.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, March 1.—The Daily News' Paris correspondent says the new economic council in a report to the Supreme War Council, after a survey of Germany, reports the situation of the Central Powers so serious as to food that a preliminary peace must be concluded at once or the blockade lifted.

RECLASSIFICATION OF COASTWISE VESSELS

Commission Places G. T. P. and
C. P. R. Steamers on Same
Basis.

Reclassification of G. T. P. boats on the same basis as the C. P. R. coasting vessels is the unanimous recommendation of the majority report of the commissioners investigating the differences between masters and mates and the shipowners. The report does not allow reclassification of the steamers Princess May, Princess Patricia and Charmer.

The majority finding of the second report confirms the findings and recommendations of the first report, except in relation to the appended reclassifications:

(a) "Class I of vessels owned by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company should be changed to Class I. A., and Class I. B. formed, comprising the vessels of I. if and when they run to Alaskan ports. This action is taken to conform with the vessels owned by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company of the same class.

(b) "Your commissioners do not see the necessity of ownership. The existing classifications are sufficiently definite to admit of additions to fleets being classified in conformance therewith.

(c) "Princess May, Princess Patricia, and Charmer. Your Commissioners feel that the evidence subsequently received as to these vessels does not justify reclassification in any case.

Classification of all vessels is difficult owing to comparative differences, and in the case of some vessels will possibly cause some ground of complaint when regarded from one viewpoint or another. Your commissioners cannot do more than exercise their best judgment in establishing definite classes and appropriate rates of pay. In this connection it might be observed that the rates of pay established in every class is to be regarded as the minimum payable at the present time."

COPPER MINE IS DISCOVERED IN LILLOOET

Richer Than Hidden Creek at
Anyox and Just as Large
a Deposit.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, March 1.—There are important developments of copper in the Lilloet district at the head of Gun creek on Copper Mountain in the Mackinnon range. The ore body is 800 feet wide, 2,500 feet long and 200 feet deep, containing 30,000,000 tons now in sight. The ore is higher grade than the average big ore bodies of the province. Sale of the property is now pending, the biggest since the establishment of the Granby Company at Anyox.

GOLDEN CROWN MINE AT KLEANZA CREEK

John Willman Arranging for Use
of Water Power Formerly
Supplied by Cassiar
Hydraulic.

A great deal of interest seems to be taken in the opening up of the Golden Crown mines at Kleanza Creek near Usk. John Willman and an American Syndicate are now in negotiations with the Government with a view to securing the right to use the water power of Kleanza Creek formerly known as Gold Creek, about one mile from Kitselas Canyon where an old time Hudson's Bay post used to be stationed.

Further up the creek there is the old plant of the Cassiar S. S. Hydraulic Company, who leased the water power there. They have not been operating for over two years now, so arrangements will probably be made to transfer the lease to the Golden Crown people.

Gold and Copper.

The ore there contains gold, copper and silver. The idea of constructing a bridge across the Skeena river is quite feasible as there are three natural islands across the river just the thing to make the foundations of a good bridge. Operations are expected to start in about two months from now.

Mr. Willman and party were in the city yesterday, leaving for the mine this morning on the train.

Demand for Houses Becomes Imperative.

The demand for houses is such that if the city of Prince Rupert is to grow steps must be taken to erect some at once. Men bring their families here and then send them away because there is nowhere to put them. Others are rooming here and leaving their families in the south whereas they would like to send for them at once.

The mayor has promised that in case private enterprise fails to supply the need the city will consider the question of erecting houses on city lots and selling them to those who are willing to purchase on time.

Cold in Rupert, But Oh You Prairies!

It is cold in Prince Rupert but the returns received daily from the prairies indicate that it is very much colder everywhere east of this point. While the thermometer here registered well above zero for the past few days, all prairie points showed degrees of cold ranging from ten below to over forty below.

If we had a few days of thirty below with a breeze we should all freeze and there would not be a waterpipe left sound in the town.

Fishermen Refuse To Sign Agreement.

The fishermen who operate the trawlers are taking a holiday while the big boats are being overhauled. The holiday has already lasted a month and there seems to be no sign of the boats going out. The weather certainly is not propitious as yet but there is no income for the men or the boats while the operations are stopped.

The difficulty is that the old agreement between the fishermen and the boat owners has expired and the men refuse to sign up again on the same terms.

According to report the men averaged last year something like four hundred dollars a month. How much the owners of the boats made we do not know. It is a pity that arrangements cannot be made for the work to proceed as the season is advancing and the whole community is losing money which might be brought here if the boats were operated.

Important Bill Is Introduced.

Premier Oliver has introduced a bill to provide for the initiative and referendum in the matter of securing legislation and for testing public opinion on important measures. This is the most modern method of legislation that obtains anywhere and will make the Government of this province the most democratic there is.

To make the government thoroughly democratic is the only way to prevent social upheavals. There is now a constitutional way of obtaining any kind of redress that may be needed. There is no license for small numbers of agitators to try to upset the social fabric, but what the majority of the people want can easily be obtained. There is hardly any limit to the possibilities.

Premier Oliver and his cabinet are to be congratulated on their determination to carry out pre-election pledges. It will make them stronger when they again are ready to go to the people for a verdict on their record.

DEPLETION OF SALMON IN THE UNITED STATES

Attempt to Be Made to Preserve Fish From Extinction—Alien Enemy Fishermen.

Seattle, Feb. 21.—L. H. Darwin, state fish commissioner and state game warden, is leading a fight to have aliens prohibited from fishing in the waters under his control, pointing out that the free hand allowed these men has resulted in very un-American practices springing up. In regard to this fight, Darwin says:

"The abnormal demands of more than four years of world war on the fisheries of this state has already accomplished the practical destruction of the Sockeye salmon run, the greatest of any of our salmon runs. Indications are that it has very greatly depleted our next greatest run, which is that of Humpback salmon, while all of the salmon runs have been greatly reduced. The extraordinary circumstances are the only possible justification for this. But, now that peace has come, nothing can justify our permitting this destruction to continue.

Sockeye Destruction.

One of the most regrettable circumstances is the fact that in the destruction of our great Sockeye run, the chief beneficiaries were the Austrian alien enemies of this country. The records of this office show that practically two-thirds of the fish taken in the Puget Sound (were the Sockeyes and Humpbacks run), were secured by seine fishermen. And of the purse seines in operation, at least two-thirds of these were operated by Austrians, and not over 15 per cent by American citizens. As a result they were absolutely able to dictate the price of their product, and in this is found one of the reasons for the high prices of the last few years.

Made Money.

The Austrians remained here and conducted their fishing operations, making enormous profits by the depletion of our fisheries, while our own American citizens were forced to leave the fishing industry and go into the army to fight the battles of this country and of civilization itself against the brothers of these same Austrians. It is a fact that in 1917, while our American boys were getting \$30 a month risking and losing their lives for this country, these same Austrian purse seine fishermen were, during certain weeks of the year, making as high as seven and eight hundred dollars each, and the dependents of our soldiers were being forced to pay the most exorbitant price for the fish caught by these Austrians. And many of these Austrians were sending the money which they were earning here to Austria to aid their brethren to fight and kill our soldiers.

Fisheries Code.

In an attempt to rehabilitate the fisheries of this state, which have been in part destroyed, and largely as a result of the efforts of these Austrians, I have prepared a new Fisheries Code, Senate Bill No. 127, which provides among other things:

1. That hereafter licenses shall only be issued to American citizens or to corporations, the majority of whose stock is held by American citizens.
2. To increase the fish taxes so that the Fisheries Department will be entirely supported by the fishing industry and no part of the expenses be borne by the general taxpayer.
3. To establish sufficiently long closed seasons to permit of a sufficient number of fish reaching to the hatcheries and to the natural spawning grounds, so that the supply may be increased and, if possible, restored to its former dimensions.
4. To prevent the issuance of any more fish trap or purse seine licenses in this state than were in existence on January 1, 1919. This provision will restrict the operations of large fishing appliances, but in no wise will interfere with the activities of the small fishermen.

FATHER OF SOPHIA VICTIM WAS HERE

Herbert Davies Was at Juneau Watching the Inquiry Into Cause of Wreck.

Herbert W. Davies of Victoria, whose son Herbert was drowned on the Princess Sophia came south on the Princess Mary this morning and went south. He went to Juneau to watch the inquiry. He says that the American captains did everything in their power to help and he thinks the people on the Sophia should have all been saved.

Mr. Davies had a family of a dozen before the war. Four of them went overseas, the oldest not 22 years of age and the youngest just over sixteen. One was killed.

Herbert and his wife were drowned on the ill fated vessel and naturally Mr. Davies is keen on watching the inquiry.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

When in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the amount of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

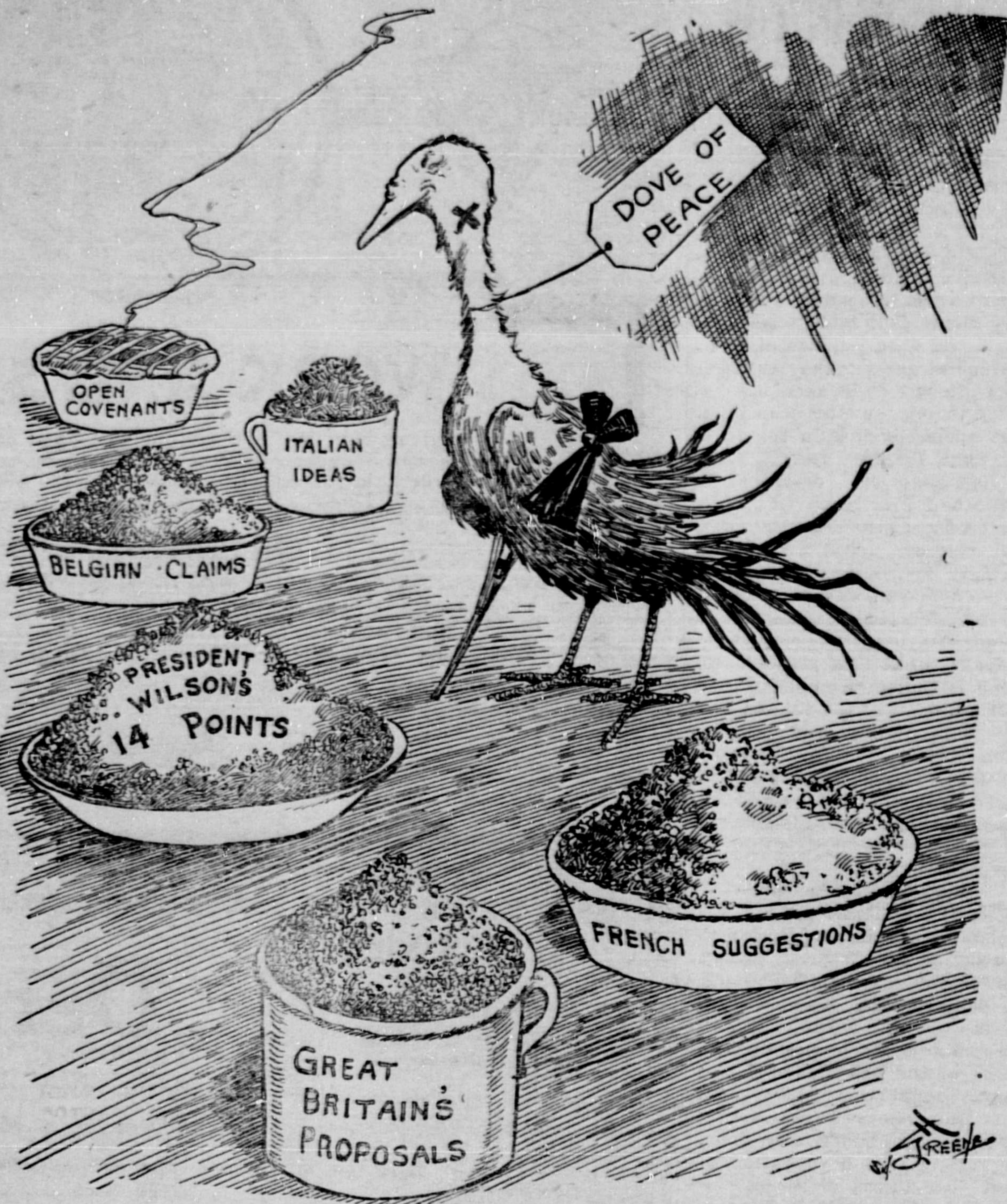

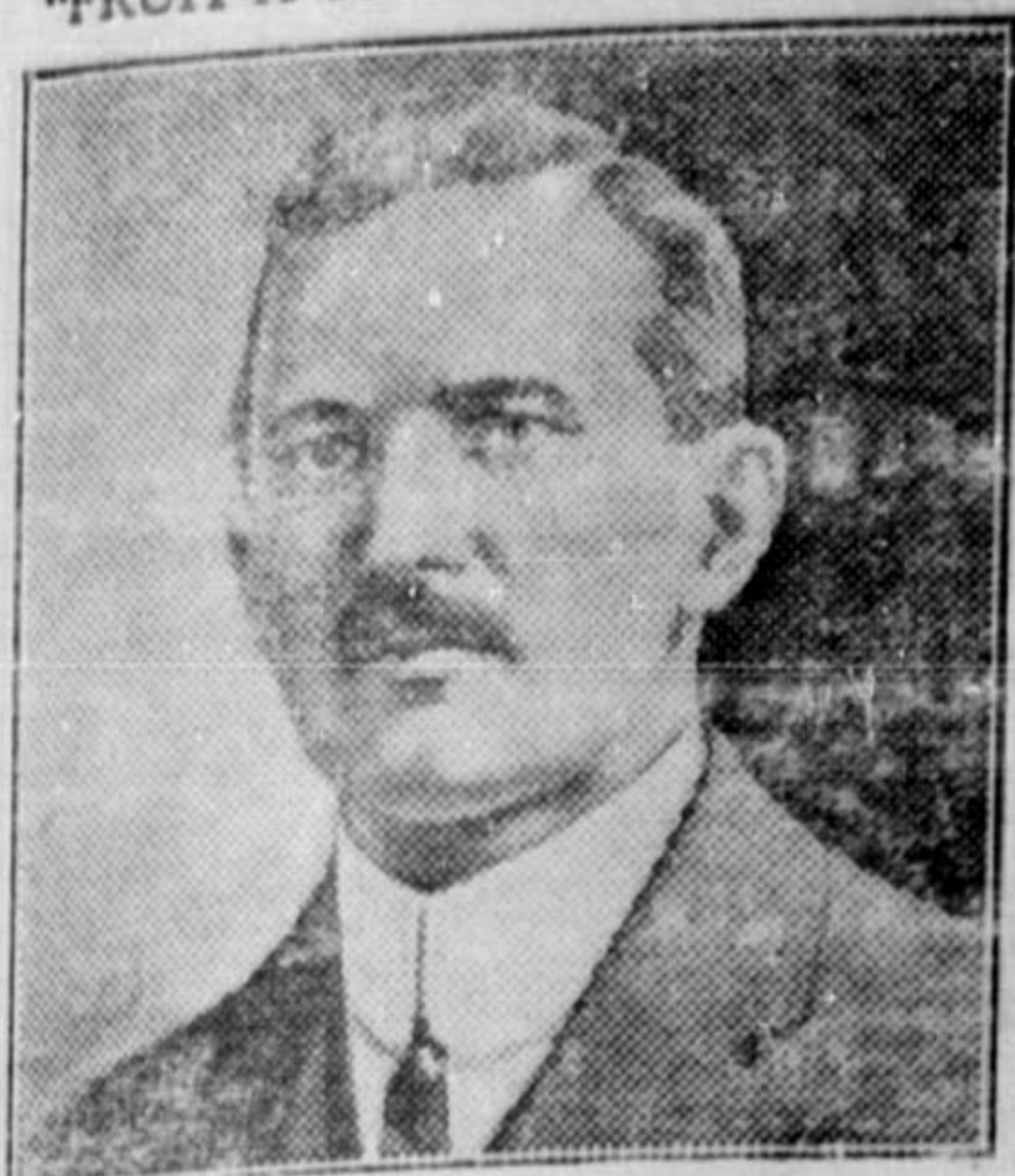

MAGNIFICENT BOUNTY

Order in Council Orders Payment to Fishermen and Builders of Fishing Boats.

The award of bounties to be paid to "encourage the development of sea fisheries and the building of fishing vessels," under the Act of 1906, has been authorized and the basis on which the bounties are to be paid fixed by an Order in Council passed on January 30, on the recommendation of the Acting Minister of the Naval Service, as follows:—

His Excellency the Governor General in Council, on the recommendation of the Acting Minister of the Naval Service, is pleased to order and doth hereby order and direct that the sum of one hundred and sixty thousand dollars, payable under the provisions of Chapter 46 of the Revised Statutes, 1906, intitled "An Act to encourage the development of the sea fisheries and the building of fishing vessels," shall be distributed for the year 1918-19 upon the following basis, viz:—

Vessels.—The owners of the vessels entitled to receive bounty shall be paid one dollar (\$1) per registered ton, provided, however, that the payment to the owner of any one vessel shall not exceed the sum of eighty dollars (\$80), and all vessel fishermen entitled to receive bounty shall be paid the sum of six dollars and twenty-five cents (\$6.25) each.

Boats.—Fishermen engaged in fishing boats, who shall also have complied with the regulations entitling them to receive bounty, shall be paid the sum of three dollars and eighty cents (\$3.80) each, and the owners of fishing boats shall be paid the sum of one dollar (\$1) per boat.

WAR SAVINGS STAMPS COMMENCE SELLING

The returns for the first month of the National Savings Committee, British Columbia Division, were about \$25,000, with no returns from 271 units out of 587. The quota which has been set for British Columbia is \$5,000,000 for the year 1919. This means that the returns will have to run to at least \$450,000 a month for the rest of the year, in order to reach the quota. The committee, however, point out that very few committees had been formed; that most of the divisional organizers were waiting for the conference which took place on February 4th and 5th; that practically no advertising was done in the newspapers and that, therefore, under the circumstances, the returns are nothing to despair of.

PRINCE GEORGE

A committee of the City Council composed of Mayor Carney and Aldermen Harper and Ogilvie, has been appointed to report on a proposal to erect a memorial to those who have fallen in the war.

The Board of Trade here is alive to the situation and is preparing a booklet dealing with the land and resources of the district.

A report made to the City Council shows that the result of a census gives in Prince George the population as 1581.

The Council is about to notify the property owners of the proposal made by the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Co. to accept an additional 25 per cent. payment on property sold by them as payment in full, and to issue to those who make such payment and clear up the taxes. Ex-Mayor Perry is acting as the agent of the Company at Prince George.

PARTING WORD FROM GERMANY

Prisoners of War Receive Printed Message Before Leaving Land of Their Captivity.

The prisoners of war who are returning to this country from Germany are bringing with them a pamphlet handed to them before they left the scene of their terrible sufferings and headed "A Parting Word."

"Gentlemen," it begins, "the war is over! A little while and you will see your native land again, your homes, your loved ones, your friends. When you are already united to your families thousands of our countrymen will still be pining in far-off prison camps with hearts as hungry for home as yours.

Have Suffered.

"You have suffered in confinement—as who would not? There were many discomforts irritations, and misunderstandings. Your situation has been a difficult one. Our own has been desperate. Our country blockaded, our civil population and army suffering from want of proper and sufficient food and materials, the enormous demands made upon our harassed land from every side—these and many other afflictions made it impossible to do all that we should have liked to do. Under the circumstances we did our best to lessen the hardships of your lot, to ensure your comfort, to provide you with pastime, employment, mental and bodily recreation. It is not likely that you will ever know how difficult our circumstances have been.

Errors Committed.

"We know that errors have been committed, and that there have been hardships for which the former system was to blame. There have been wrongs and evils on both sides. We hope that you will always think of that—and be just.

"You entered the old Empire of Germany; you leave the new Republic—the newest and, as we hope to make it, the freest land in the world.

"Once the barriers of artificial hatred and misunderstanding have fallen we hope that you will learn to know in happier times these grander features of the land whose unwilling guests you have been. A barbed wire enclosure is not the proper point of view from which to survey or judge a great nation.

Blinded All.

"The war has blinded all nations. But if a true and just peace will result in opening the eyes of the peoples to the fact that their interests are common this war will not have been fought in vain. If the peoples at last realize that it is not each other who are their enemies, but the ruthless forces of Imperialism and capitalism, of militarism, of all sorts of Jingo journalism that sows falsehood, hatred, and suspicion, then peace will not be established in vain. We hope that every one of you will go home carrying a message of goodwill, of conciliation, of enlightenment."
