

Hitler's Push For Power In Germany Stopped; Got Little More Than Third Sunday Vote

BERLIN, Aug. 1:-Adolf Hitler's push for complete power in Germany was stopped today. The question following yesterday's elections was whether the present government under the Junker soldier, General von Schleicher, would continue or whether Hitler could negotiate an alliance with Former Chancellor Heinrich Bruening.

Hitler and his Nazi followers doubled their strength in the Reichstag as compared with four years ago but fell short of a clear majority, receiving little more than one-third of the total vote.

The Southern B.C. press seems to hint that an effort will be made to form a coalition government with men who are not now in public life as more or less important factors in it, possibly dominating it, possibly two Conservatives, two Liberals and two nominees of the self-appointed Kidd group.

Who are these men? Why not let us take a look at them so that we may search their records and find out if they are people who would inspire us with confidence. If these men have not served their country in the past in any public office, why is it? What is there in the present situation that would warrant men who have thought of nothing but themselves and their own interests now trying their hand at larger administrative work?

We do not wish to place ourselves in the position of being opposed to any person or party or frame-up until we knw what it is, but we do object to all the manipulations which seem to be going on in the south and to some of the hints that have been given in regard to possibilities of big business control of the next cabinet.




