G. T. P. Not to be Nationalized

LOCAL MEMBER DEFENDS MILITARY OFFICERS AGAINST CRITICISM

GOVERNMENT WILL NOT LIKELY TAKE THE GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC AS PART OF NATIONAL RAILWAY

Confiscation would probably be disallowed by British Government; Interest on Bonds has been promptly paid and New Loan was floated in Autumn.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, March 7.—The rumor that the Government contemplates the absorption of the Grand Trunk Pacific into the National Railway System fails to find confirmation here. D. B. Hanna, ways declared he knew nothing

As a matter of fact the question of the acquisition of the Grand Trunk Pacific is at present in doubt. The impression is being, and has been strengthened by the fact that the interest is promptly paid when due, that the British directorate of the Grand Trunk has decided to hold on to their system.

In September last the company raised \$15,000,000 on the London market. This could not have been done without the consent of the Chancellor of the Exchequer, without whose approval nobody could go into the London market.

There are 120,000 British shareholders in the company and it would appear that the future of Canada after the war appeals to them and to the directors as good reason for hanging on to property.

No Drastic Action.

It is doubtful whether any drastic action toward confiscation of the Grand Trunk Pacific could be carried out. If the Grand Trunk is not to be taken, and it is doubtful whether the Government will take the Grand Trunk Pacific without the Grand Trunk, there is grave danger that any legislation looking toward expropriation might be disallowed by the Imperial authorities. Expropriation might be claimed in connection with any move toward nationalization.

The Government has been notified that the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway had met the interest due in London last week on the Grand Trunk Pacific bonds guaranteed by the Grand Trunk Railway. The interest amounted in the neighborhood of a million dollars. Some time ago the Government notified the Grand Trunk directors that it would no longer pursue a policy of advancing interest on the Grand Trunk Pacific bonds.

There was much speculation as to whether the interest would be met and there were even rumors that the Grand Trunk had defaulted. The interest, however, has been fully met. This news shows that the Grand Trunk Railway proposes to carry on even the burden of the Grand Trunk Pacific on its shoulders. It is a new aspect on the railway situation as regards these two lines. The whole question will be discussed shortly in the House.

What the Government Wants.

The situation of the Government is clear. The Government is willing to round out its public ownership policy by acquiring the Grand Trunk Pacific and Grand Trunk, but it does not propose to acquire the G. T. P. without the Grand Trunk. The Grand Trunk directors have offered the Government the G. T. P. if it will relieve them of its obligations, but the Government has refused to accept this white elephant without the better paying Grand Trunk eastern connection.

Negotiations.

A year ago negotiations were opened with the Grand Trunk directors in London for the purchase of the two systems. Hon. Mr. Meighen went to England for the purpose. The Grand Trunk directors made a proposal which the Government regarded as high it was not worth presenting to Parliament. The cabinet (Continued on Page 6.)

B. C. TIMBER FOR BRITISH GOVERNMENT

Acting Prime Minister Receives Assurances From British Timber Controller Regarding Purchase.

Ottawa, March 7.—The Acting Prime Minister has received satisfactory assurances as to the progress of negotiations with the British Timber Controller for the purchase of British Columbia timber. For several weeks past Sir Thomas White has been actively and continuously pressing the matter by cable communication with Sir George Perley and Lloyd Harris, of the Canadian Trade Mission.

STARVATION KILLING OFF BOLSHEVIKI

Not Wood Enough for Coffins, Says London Despatch; Cats Sell at \$3 Each.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, March 7.—Starvation prevails throughout Bolshevik Russia and is killing off the population by thousands. Disease due to under nourishment is rampant. Food is scarce in Petrograd and Moscow and cats sell rapidly at \$3 each. Undertakers cannot cope with the conditions. There is not enough wood for coffins.

WASHINGTON SENATE KEEPS DIVORCE EASY

Defeats Bill to Make Annulment of Marriages More Difficult For Dissatisfied Married.

Olympia, Wash., March 7.—Washington's State Senate today defeated a bill to make the obtaining of divorce difficult, except for recognized aggravated cases. This bill would have eliminated the principal cause of action upon which more than two thirds of the suits filed in this state are based namely, "personal indignities, rendering life burdensome."

CATCHES OF MANY BOATS SOLD TODAY

Total Amount Marketed Was 112,500 lbs. of Halibut and 3,000 lbs. of Salmon.

This was a big morning at the Fish Exchange as the catches of fifteen boats were disposed of. The total amount of fish marketed was 112,500 lbs. of halibut and 3,000 lbs. of salmon and the result is that the packing houses will be very busy today.

Up till noon, sales had not been completed, and the following are the particulars of the fish offered:

Tramp with 5,500 lbs. halibut; Eagle 6,000 lbs. halibut and 2,000 lbs. black cod; Atlas 18,000 lbs. halibut and 3,000 lbs. black cod; Fisher with 9,000 lbs. halibut and 1,000 lbs. black cod; the Norma with 5,000 lbs. of halibut; the Gilford 3,000 lbs.; the Advance 7,000 lbs.; the Hoff H. 9,000 lbs.; the Nellie brought in 5,000 lbs.; the Adalæ with 5,000 lbs.; the Renel had 9,000 lbs. the Neilson 12,000 lbs.; the Nidaros 2,000 lbs.; the Anna J. 11,000 lbs. halibut; and the Eagle brought in 3,000 lbs. of spring salmon, 2,000 lbs. of whites and 1,000 lbs. of reds.

The Rolf H. Adaline, Fisher, Gilford and the Renel were all fishing on the west coast where rough weather was prevalent.

GRANBY SHUT DOWN TIGHT

Nothing Doing at Anyox Since the Recent Fire in Converter; Many Men Leave.

Word was brought from Anyox last night to the effect that everything was shut down tight following the fire in the converter at the smelter. The building was constructed of steel but there was wood interior work and this was fanned by a breeze. As a result considerable damage was done.

About two hundred men came down from the smelter town last night on the Prince Rupert and some of them remained here, others going south. That pretty well clears out the single men from the place and some of the married men are reported to be leaving.

When the Prince Rupert arrived yesterday morning there were no men to handle the cargo. Everything was tied up tight. It is expected to start up again as soon as repairs to the smelter building have been completed.

COLONEL PECK AT ISSUE WITH GENERAL SIR SAM HUGHES OVER CRITICISMS

SAYS CANADIAN FIGHTING WAS PART OF VAST ACTION ORDERED BY GENERAL HEADQUARTERS—NO WANTON LOSS OF LIFE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, March 7.—Col. C. W. Peck, V. C., M. P., who has just returned from overseas, does not agree with Sir Sam Hughes in his criticism of the Canadian Command.

Col. Peck stated: "I certainly cannot agree with what General Hughes says about the wanton loss of life. I was very much pained to see such a matter brought up at a time when so many people are in distress over the loss of dear ones. The battle of Cambrai, which General Hughes alluded to critically, was simply a part of a vast action over the whole front under orders from General Headquarters, and, as a matter of fact, other corps besides ours were engaged. I was there.

"As to the action at Mons," said the Colonel, "I never heard of any wanton loss of life and understand that the total casualties were very small."

ANOTHER COXEY ARMY TO MARCH ON WASHINGTON

This One Will Travel Luxuriously in Motor Cars as Prohibition Protest.

New York, March 7.—"General" Jacob Coxey will lead another "army" to Washington as a protest against national prohibition. It will not go on foot, but will travel in a touring car and motor transportation will be provided, he said, for all followers. Coxey said he had discussed the project with many business men and most of them volunteered to enlist in his army.

GOVERNMENT HELP MUST BE EFFICIENT

Halibut Catch Increase Interesting.

The increase in the amount of halibut landed at this port is interesting, and especially so to those who are in business here and who benefit by the arrival of the fishermen and the boats and who sell supplies to the vessels. It is a clear indication that this is the market that is bound to win out. The sale of 824,800 lbs. of halibut at this port is a record for February.

For the month of January it will be remembered the catch landed here was 374,500 lbs. During that same month the halibut landed at Seattle amounted to 352,910 lbs. There was no halibut landed during that month either at Ketchikan or Vancouver.

From the above it is clear that Prince Rupert is getting the business and that she will get more as it develops. This year there are a number of new local boats both in the salmon and halibut business and these will all go to swell the total catch. As long as the men get plenty of ice and bait the fish will come here.

Should Provide Facilities for Boats.

In view of the fact that the fishing business is increasing and that it is the main staple industry of the town it seems reasonable to expect that something more should be done to improve the accommodation for fishing boats in the port. The Dominion Government recently made an agreement with the Provincial Government to provide everything necessary on this coast in the way of wharves. Now the Dominion Government has a piece of waterfront on the city side of the garbage wharf where excellent accommodation could be provided for boats of that type. A substantial breakwater and floats might be built there, or at some other convenient nearby point, so that there would be plenty of shelter for some time to come.

Great Expectations Has An Effect.

The great expectations of the coming weeks are making somewhat of a stir in a small way here already. A number of small businesses have changed hands within the last day or two and some residential property has been sold. Cash has been paid for houses and lots and a few cheap lots have changed hands. All this indicates that the people here are beginning to share the optimism of The News and are showing their faith in the town.

It is not expected that there will be any flurry in real estate as a result of industrial activity. Those who have cheap lots will be able to sell them but there is no reason for high prices. Any very great increase in prices or rents would only tend to drive business away. There is a limit to the price a workman can pay for a house and lot. The wages are limited and so must be the expenses. What is needed just now is cheap lots on which small houses may be built to accommodate those who are in need of them.

Reports From Stewart Most Encouraging.

The Daily News has made frequent reference to the prospects at Stewart and to the certainty that there would be a good deal of activity there this coming summer. Everything that is heard of the camp tends to confirm the opinion. Not only is the Bush mine reported to be almost fabulously rich, but other mines are expected to be developed there which look like shipping mines. It is certain that Stewart will prove one of the paying camps of the province in the very near future. It is understood that work will be commenced very soon on the Little Missouri, which was recently bonded by Sir Donald Mann and that the probability is the mine will be purchased by him.

COMPANY TOWNS TO BE OPENED TO THE PUBLIC

Bill Introduced by Hon. T. D. Pattullo Provides that Streets and Wharves May Become Public.

In conformation with a promise made to the electors during the last provincial election campaign Hon. T. D. Pattullo has introduced a bill into the Legislature providing for the opening of the company towns on the coast to the public and the giving right of access to the public by way of a wharf to be constructed by the company. The following are the chief provisions of the bill:—

Where any one hundred or more persons employed by any company in or about any industrial operation or business carried on by the company are living or sojourning on lands owned, occupied, or controlled, either directly or indirectly, by the company, the Lieutenant-Governor in Council may, by order published in one issue of the Gazette, declare those lands, together with any adjoining lands within an area to be described in the order, to be a "company town" within the meaning of this Act; and may in like manner from time to time alter or revoke that order and make others.

Right of Use.
 Where, in any company town, any roads, streets, or ways are opened, maintained, or used by the company or by its employees, and are by any order of the Lieutenant-Governor in Council pursuant to section 6 declared to be roads, streets, or ways for the purposes of this Act, His Majesty, his agents and servants, and every member of the general public shall have the right at all times, without further licence than the provisions in this Act contained, to use and enjoy all those roads, streets, and ways as free and uninterrupted rights-of-way, ingress, egress, and regress for persons, animals and vehicles loaded and unloaded, for all purposes, through, along, and over the area comprised in the company town.

File Plan.
 (2.) Upon the written request of the Minister of Lands, the company shall within two months from the receipt of the request file in the office of the Minister of Lands at Victoria a plan showing all roads, streets and ways opened, maintained, or used by the company in the company town referred to in the request.

(1.) Where the usual means of transportation to and from any company town consists wholly or in part of transportation by water the company carrying on any industrial operation or business therein shall provide and maintain a safe and convenient public wharf and proper wharf facilities in the company town adequate for the purpose of landing, embarking and shipping passengers and freight, together with convenient and proper approaches and ways connecting the wharf with the roads, streets, and ways to which this Act applies within the company town.

Public Wharf.
 (2.) Subject to the provisions of subsection (3), His Majesty, his agents and servants, and every member of the general public shall have at all times, without further licence than the provisions in this Act contained, free access to and the use of the wharf, wharf facilities, approaches, and ways for the purpose mentioned in subsection (1).

(3.) The rights conferred upon the general public under the provisions of this section shall be subject to the payment of wharfage and warehousing charges at such rates as may be approved by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council from time to time, and shall also be subject to the industrial and business necessities of the company, but so that the rights of ingress, egress, and regress conferred by this Act shall not be obstructed.

The Lieutenant-Governor in Council may from time to time, by order published in one issue of the Gazette:—

- (a) Declare any roads, streets, or ways in any company town to be roads, streets, or ways for the purpose of this Act;
- (b) Declare whether or not any company town is one to

which the provisions of section 5 apply; and may annul either in whole or in part any declaration so made.

Industrial Requirements.
 Nothing in this Act shall prevent any company from exercising from time to time its right to utilize for building sites or for any bona-fide business or industrial purpose of the company any road, street, or way to which this Act applies.

Without in any way limiting the rights conferred by the provisions of this Act, nothing in this Act or in any order made thereunder shall be construed to constitute a dedication of or to establish any road, street, or way as a highway within the meaning of the "Highways Act."

Every company which obstructs or interferes with His Majesty or any person in the exercise of any right conferred by or under this Act in respect of the use and enjoyment of any road, street, way, wharf, wharf facility, or approach shall be guilty of an offence against this Act.

Penalty for Offence.
 Every company failing to refusing to provide or maintain any wharf, wharf facility, approach, or way which by this Act the company is required to provide or maintain, or failing or refusing to file any plan which by this Act the company is required to file, shall be guilty of an offence against this Act.

Every company guilty of an offence against this Act shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding five hundred dollars for each day during which the offence continues.

BUSH MINE AT STEWART IS VERY RICH

Spokane Paper Gives Some Particulars of Work Done and Value of Ore.

GREATEST BONANZA IN WESTERN MINING

As confirmation of what has already been said in these columns regarding the Bush mine at Stewart, the following is from Resources, the interesting monthly published here by Weston Coyney:

R. K. Neill, the well known mining engineer who is developing the Bush property near Stewart, is on a trip to Spokane, and while he chanced to be in that city the Spokane Truth published the following interesting statement regarding the Bush mine:

According to Oas Jeldness, the well known pioneer mining man, who spoke upon the subject at a recent meeting of the North West Mining Association, the Bush mine on Portland Canal near Stewart, B. C., is among the most valuable ever discovered, and may even rank with the famous Comstock.

Average \$100.

The property is owned by Wilson, Trites and Wood, of Fernie, B. C., and R. K. Neill, of Spokane. The vein or mineralized zone is approximately 140 feet wide, in green stone formation, and is crossed by dikes of grano-diorite which appear to mark the points of greatest mineralization. The main tunnel workings reach a total vertical depth of 250 feet from the surface and in one place a cross-cut has been run 84 feet across the vein, with average values of \$100 in gold, and silver, \$800 a ton.

At another point a 12-ft. cross-cut shows values of from \$700 to \$800 per ton. A wagon road 14 miles in length has been built to tidewater and it is expected that the output will be heavy this winter.

Mr. Jeldness says that estimates of ore in-sight run into fabulous figures. He spent several weeks in the vicinity last summer and says that in his opinion the property is one of the greatest bonanzas in the history of western mining.

Former Owners Missed.

The property was at one time under development by Thompson interests of New York, but the great values appear to have been missed by a few feet. The same interests ran a cross-cut tunnel 600 feet vertically below the level upon which the values have been developed, but cut the vein at a

SYNOPSIS OF

LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For granting industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. It is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made upon payment of any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase price of a proportionate allotment is also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.



ALEX MANSON, M. P. P., WOULD EXCLUDE ALL UNDESIRABLE PEOPLE

Word comes from Victoria that A. M. Manson of this city, has moved two resolutions recently. The Vancouver World of recent date says:

"In explanation of his resolution calling for a recommendation to Ottawa excluding all immigrants refusing to accept the full responsibilities of citizenship, A. M. Manson said that apparently the people of Canada were laboring under a delusion, and that the full danger from the immigration of undesirables was not grasped.

"If Ottawa has been remiss in the safeguarding of our national makeup, it would not be going too far to tell Ottawa that these people have been coming into this province against our will," he said.

Mr. Manson did not think that because certain settlers were of German origin they were pro-German, but said that many of these had been making contributions to war charities, and that the chief aim of his resolution was to provide for the careful "combing" of immigrants, so that the objectionables would be barred. He was glad to see that the government of British Columbia had taken the matter in hand.

J. H. Hawthornthwaite asked, "What about Orientals?"

The reply was that resolution aimed to exclude all undesirables.

C. F. Nelson, of Slocan, thought that the resolution should go even further and provide for the deportation of aliens.

Mr. Jones moved the adjournment of the debate.

Another resolution of Mr. Manson's, that dealing with the cancellation of the agreement between Canada and the United States, which provided that no citizens of either country should be naturalized, was passed.

ACTIVITY AT LUMBER MILLS NEAR FUTURE

Kelly Company and Ocean Falls Divide Logs on South Islands; Other Activities.

The Kelly Logging Co., whose headquarters are at Atli Inlet, Moresby Island, have bought the logs in the woods south of Skidegate, amounting to something like 35,000,000 feet in all and will at once commence getting them into the water. T. A. Kelley went to the islands last night. The remainder of the logs south of Skidegate, about 40,000,000 feet, have been sold to the Ocean Falls paper mill and will be ground into newsprint and craft paper. That disposes of the logs on Moresby Island.

A number of men went across to Masset last night to commence getting the mills in shape for opening before long. There is a rumor that the Buckley mills have made a deal for most of the logs at Masset Inlet, but this is not confirmed and there is a general opinion that the logs will be distributed among the mills on the Inlet.

There is no definite news yet in regard to the starting up of the Prince Rupert mill, but it is hoped that arrangements will be made for a supply of logs so that work may commence very soon.

GOVERNMENT WILL NOT LIKELY TAKE THE G. T. P.

(Continued From Page One.)

had previously made what they thought was a fair offer and stood by this offer. The Government then notified the Grand Trunk that it could not advance any further loans and that the Grand Trunk would have to shoulder the responsibility for the G. T. P. Doubt has been expressed as to the ability of the parent company to meet these obligations, but the money has been found and the company apparently does not propose to accept the Government's offer.

Expropriation Only Course.

The Government and the company being unable to agree to term of sale the only alternative is expropriation which has been advocated in certain quarters. The difficulty with expropriation is that a large section of the Grand Trunk lies in the United States and Canada has no authority to expropriate property outside of the Dominion. If the lines in Canada were expropriated alone, the country would be acquiring a road without head or tail, as the terminals of the Grand Trunk are respectively in Chicago and Portland. The road would be of minor value without these connections and terminals. This is the situation and under the circumstances the hands of the Government are apparently tied until the Grand Trunk directors are prepared to negotiate on a basis which the Government thinks fair or the company gets tired of footing the bills of the Grand Trunk Pacific.

EXPECT SHIPYARDERS RETURN TO WORK

Seattle Owners Preparing Yards for Resumption of Construction. May Reopen Next Week

(Special via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

Seattle, March 7. — Anticipating a favorable vote by the Metal Workers on the proposition of returning to work, the shipyard owners yesterday began active preparation for reopening next week. More than twenty-five thousand men have been on strike for higher pay since Jan. 21.
