Riots Among Canadian Troops

NUMBER OF CANADIAN SOLDIERS KILLED IN RIOTS AND MANY ARE WOUNDED AT RHYL MILITARY CAMP

Disturbances lasted Three Days as Result of Delay in Demobilization; Stores were Raided and Officers Threatened by men who had Seen Three Years Service Overseas.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, March 8.—There have been serious riots among Canadian troops in the old country resulting in many fatalities. It is estimated that from 5 to 27 men were killed and 75 wounded during the rioting during the last three days at Kimmel military camp, Rhyll, Wales. At that point 25,000 Canadians were waiting for demobilization and embarkation. The men have been serving three years in France and complain that embarkation had been postponed while others who had been less service were sent home. Stores were raided and officers threatened and assaulted. It is alleged that some thirty men of foreign extraction fomented the trouble. There was considerable shooting to put down the rioters, but no organized firing and no troops other than Canadians were used to suppress the disturbances. The men have been promised that sailings will be hurried as far as possible. A number of arrests have been made.

LARGE INCREASE IN NATIONAL REVENUE

Amount Received in 11 Months
Forty-three Million Over
Former Year.

Ottawa, March 8.—Heavy revenues continue. For eleven months concluding with the end of February the current revenues totalled \$72,756,984, an increase over the corresponding period of the previous fiscal year of \$12,990,356. The budget estimate of \$270,000,000 has already been exceeded.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH IN SURF INLET MINE

Alex. J. Donohue Caught Between
Skip and Bulk of
Timber.

The body of Alex. J. Donohue, a miner, was brought to town last evening from Surf Inlet by the launch Belmont.
The deceased was the victim of an accident at the mine, having been caught between a skip and a bulk of timber. Death was practically instantaneous, the unfortunate man's spine being broken. Belonging to Bay St. Lawrence, Nova Scotia, relatives have been communicated with, and the body may possibly be dispatched east for burial. The B. C. Undertakers have charge of the remains.

MAJ.-GEN. JACK STEWART BACK

Arrives in Canada After Overseas
Construction of 9,000
Miles of Railway
In France.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Montreal, March 8.—Major-General J. W. Stewart of the firm of Foley, Welch & Stewart has returned to Canada. Before his service in France the British had constructed 200 miles of railroad behind the lines. Since that time there has been constructed 3,000 miles of broad gauge and 6,000 miles of narrow gauge line, enabling them to move a quarter of a million tons of munitions a month.

MEMBER'S AMENDMENT TO THE FOREST ACT

Hon. T. D. Pattullo Has Bill Before
Legislature Designed to
Encourage Pulp Production.

Several important amendments to the Forest Act are contained in a bill introduced in the legislature by the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands.
Where a timber license covers timber that is considered more valuable for pulp purpose than for lumber this license may be converted into a pulp license, provided the holder complies with the statutory requirement of erecting a pulp plant at a value of not less than \$300,000.
Provision is made for the valuing of timber on any site wanted for industrial purposes where that site is on land covered by an existing timber license.
Where a license has expired owing to non-payment of current fees, the government is taking power to grant a further renewal for a period of one year with an extra penalty attached.
In order to insure a proper disposal of slash and thus to reduce the fire risk provision is being made that the cost of destroying the slash shall be borne one-half by the forest protection fund and one-half by the operator.

WEATHER WARM

The weather on the prairies is much warmer than has been for some time past. This morning special bulletins showed Winnipeg 25 above, Calgary 35 above, and Edmonton 25 above.
A letter from Capt. McCroskie to the Board of Trade was read at the meeting of the Board last night. It suggested the appointment of a pilotage board for this port independent of Vancouver. It was referred to the Port Committee for report.

G. T. P. RAILWAY ASKS AID FROM GOVERNMENT

Intimates that Operations Must
be Suspended Unless Such Assistance is Secured.

Ottawa, March 8.—In spite of the fact that the interest on the Grand Trunk Pacific bonds was paid in London when it came due last Saturday, it is learned that the Grand Trunk Pacific is coming to the Government for further assistance and that it has intimated that if such assistance is not secured suspension of operations must ensue.

HELP LUMBER INDUSTRY HERE

Board of Trade Passes Resolution
Drawing Attention of Representative at Ottawa
To Condition.

"Prince Rupert enjoyed last year the greatest prosperity it has seen in its history, due almost entirely to the activity of logging and lumber operations, which have now terminated. In order to encourage this industry many of our local residents became financially interested in these projects and unless something is done to bring to life the lumber industry on this northern coast, many of these ventures will become ruined.
"We believe that the combined energies of this Board and the City Council and citizens of Prince Rupert cannot do anything better than bring such condition of affairs to the notice of our distinguished member, whose cooperation and assistance we feel will assist us in obtaining for this district our rightful share of a business which we feel we are entitled to.
"Therefore, let it be resolved that we, the Board of Trade of the city of Prince Rupert, wire Lieut.-Col. Peck, V. C., D. S. O., M. P., asking for his assistance and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to him direct to Ottawa."

ALLIES TO FEED THE GERMANS WHEN SHIPS ARE DELIVERED

PAYMENT WILL BE MADE FOR THE FOOD IN PRODUCTS WHICH THE ALLIES NEED — WARSHIPS TO BE DISTRIBUTED AMONG THE ALLIED NATIONS

Paris, March 8.—The Council of the Great Powers took action today toward relieving the acute situation brought about by the interruption in negotiations at Spa concerning the taking over of German ships and supplying Germany with food.
It is now provided that on delivery of the ships the Allies shall undertake to revictual the Germans until the next harvest, payment for the same being made in coal, potatoes, nitrates and other products which Germany has and which the Allies want.
The Powers have agreed to distribute the surrendered German warships among themselves, but the United States and Great Britain are in accord regarding the necessity for sinking their respective shares.

VANCOUVER CINCHES HOCKEY CHAMPIONSHIP

Eleven Minutes Overtime Played
Before Vancouver Sends Puck
into Net for Sixth Time.

Victoria, B. C., March 8.—Vancouver is the winner of the hockey championship for the season. She cannot now be beaten. Last night the professional team from that city defeated Victoria at the rink at the Willows in the capital with an immense crowd present.
The match was the closest of the season. At the call of time the score was five all and eleven minutes overtime had to be played before the Vancouvers finally put the puck through for the sixth goal.

MOTOR BOATS

Disabilities Under Which They
Are Operated Discussed by
Board of Trade.

The question of the use of motor boats in carrying passengers and freight out of this port and of the lifeboat and license requirements were discussed by the Board of Trade at its meeting last night.
Capt. Hoopes K. Freeman told of some of the disabilities under which motor boats labored and promised that all members of the Board should be supplied with copies of the United States regulations which were found perfectly satisfactory.
The matter was discussed by Walter Harper, Capt. Babington, O. H. Nelson and others and was left over for further discussion at a future time.

IMMIGRATION IS NOT WANTED

War Veterans at Ottawa Ask
Change in Naturalization Laws;
Doherty Appointed.

Two Sites Suggested For Fishing Centre.

A suggestion has been made in regard to the location of the fish packing houses and the fishermen's boats in this city, with a view to getting them all together and of having improvements made for the benefit especially of the fishermen.

The proposal is that either one of two sites be chosen. The most ideal of these is located in Shawatlans Passage just beyond Seal Cove near the end of Eleventh Ave. It is said that at this point there is plenty of room, that the railway passes it, that it is perfectly protected from all gales and that with Eleventh Ave. extended for a short distance there would be an easy approach. The only objection is that it is too far from the centre of the city to be convenient.

The other site is closer in but not so convenient in the matter of approach nor so well protected. It is on the Dominion Government land on the northeast side of the garbage wharf at the mouth of Morse Creek. There the Government owns 1,500 feet of land which it is said would be very suitable for the fish packing houses and for the fishermen's boats.

Value of Work To This Port.

The construction of fishermen's floats is purely a Dominion Government concern. The Provincial Government is doing a little at Cow Bay simply because the Dominion has not done it and some accommodation is necessary for the boats. Much more room is needed, however, and if there was a suitable approach built the location at Morse Creek would be convenient.

It has been suggested that the Fisheries Committee of the Board of Trade and the Fisheries Committee of the City Council should both busy themselves with this matter. It is the most important concern we have in the city. We are living off the fishermen and it is our duty to provide properly for them. Not only that but we should do everything possible to encourage others to come here. Nothing can help us permanently as a port like building up the fishing industry.

Businessmen Are Interested in Town.

The meeting of businessmen at the Board of Trade rooms yesterday was an indication of the revival of interest generally in the city and district. When the different interests get together and talk things over grievances are smoothed away and there is a unity of purpose engendered that can be obtained in no other manner.

DIGBY MARINE STATION SHOULD BE EQUIPPED

Board of Trade Asks for Separation From Victoria, Making This Independent Branch.

A resolution asking that the Digby Island Marine Station be made, as originally intended, a branch station instead of a sub-station of Victoria, was passed by the Board of Trade last night.

In introducing it G. W. Nicker-son said:

"In the original plans of the Dominion Government in improving the port of Prince Rupert a quarantine station was built, as well as a marine station, it is my understanding that the marine station was built with the object of establishing a branch of that service on Digby Island. It seems this station was never used for the purpose for which it was intended, it being used merely as a branch of the station at Victoria. There seems to me to be no good reason why this work should not be divided up and a proper use made of the station at Digby Island. The boats engaged by the light-house service could be to much better advantage handled from that point instead of as now exists at Victoria.

Infrequent Calls.

"I understand that these boats merely call at Digby Island at very infrequent periods during the year, chiefly bringing most or perhaps all of their supplies and stores for the light-houses from Victoria. The station at Digby should be the headquarters for at least one of the light tenders, being more convenient to the light-houses and making proper use of the station there. The same reasoning applies to the Fishery Protection Service.

New Boats.

"Since the loss of the Galiano, I understand the Government has arranged for three new boats for this service. Certainly we should expect and demand that at least two of these boats have their headquarters and home port at the Digby Island station. As it now exists the Fishery Protection boats are very seldom seen in the northern part of the province, where it would seem to me that they are most needed.

Equipped in Victoria.

"Like the light-house tenders these boats are supplied and equipped from Victoria and since the establishment of the station at Digby, Victoria and southern influences have managed to keep this service centred in the south, when half of it at least properly belongs to the north, and I think that a vigorous effort should be made to get the Digby Island station established as a branch station and not merely as a sub-station of the Victoria office, and a move as follows:

The Resolution.

"That a telegram be sent to Lieut.-Col. Peck, V.C., D.S.O., M.P., urging upon him to use every effort to see that at least two Fishery Protection steamers are made to have their headquarters at Digby Island, and that one light-house tender be likewise maintained there and that the coast of British Columbia be divided into two sections, the headquarters of one remaining at Victoria, the headquarters for the other at Digby Island, thus carrying out the original intention of the Dominion Government, towards this port and the station at Digby Island."

SOCIETY DRAMA IS SHOWN AT WESTHOLME

Norma Talmadge in "De Luxe Annie" is Feature at the Big Theatre.

"De Luxe Annie" is the name of a first rate society drama that is to be shown at the Westholme Theatre. Norma Talmadge is the heroine of the play and being a constant film favorite there is no doubt but she will prove a great attraction. The play is one written originally for the stage by Edward Clark, a big seven-reel super-feature.

A travelogue added makes this a ten-reel show.

SWANSON BAY HAS RECORD FOR PROVINCE

Surf Inlet Runs close Second in Matter of Rainfall—Rupert Very Low.

The wettest place in British Columbia during 1918 was Swanson Bay, where 295.70 inches of rain fell. The biggest contrast is found at Alkali Lake where the precipitation was only 4.14 ins.

The foregoing are among the interesting figures to be found in the annual report of the B. C. Division, Dominion Meteorological Service, just completed by Superintendent F. Napier Denison at Victoria.

Next to Swanson Bay the dampest place was Surf Inlet, where the rainfall was 203.25 inches. Many districts registered over a hundred inches, but the Okanagan did not need umbrellas on many occasions as the rainfall was 10.95 inches at Vernon, 9.16 inches at Penticton and 6.54 inches at Summerland. The question as to whether more rain falls in Vancouver than Victoria is settled, for while only 28.83 ins. fell at the capital, Vancouver received 58.51 inches. However, New Westminster was even damper, for 60.49 inches descended. Prince Rupert had slightly over 86 inches.

The snowfall shows an even more striking variation. At Esquimalt, for instance, "only a trace" was observed during 1918, but at Glacier 556.60 inches of "the beautiful" mantled the landscape. Victoria was sprinkled with 1.80 inches, Vancouver with 42 inches and New Westminster with 40.50 inches. Anyox received 268 inches. Atlin received 4.16 of rain and 69 inches of snow.

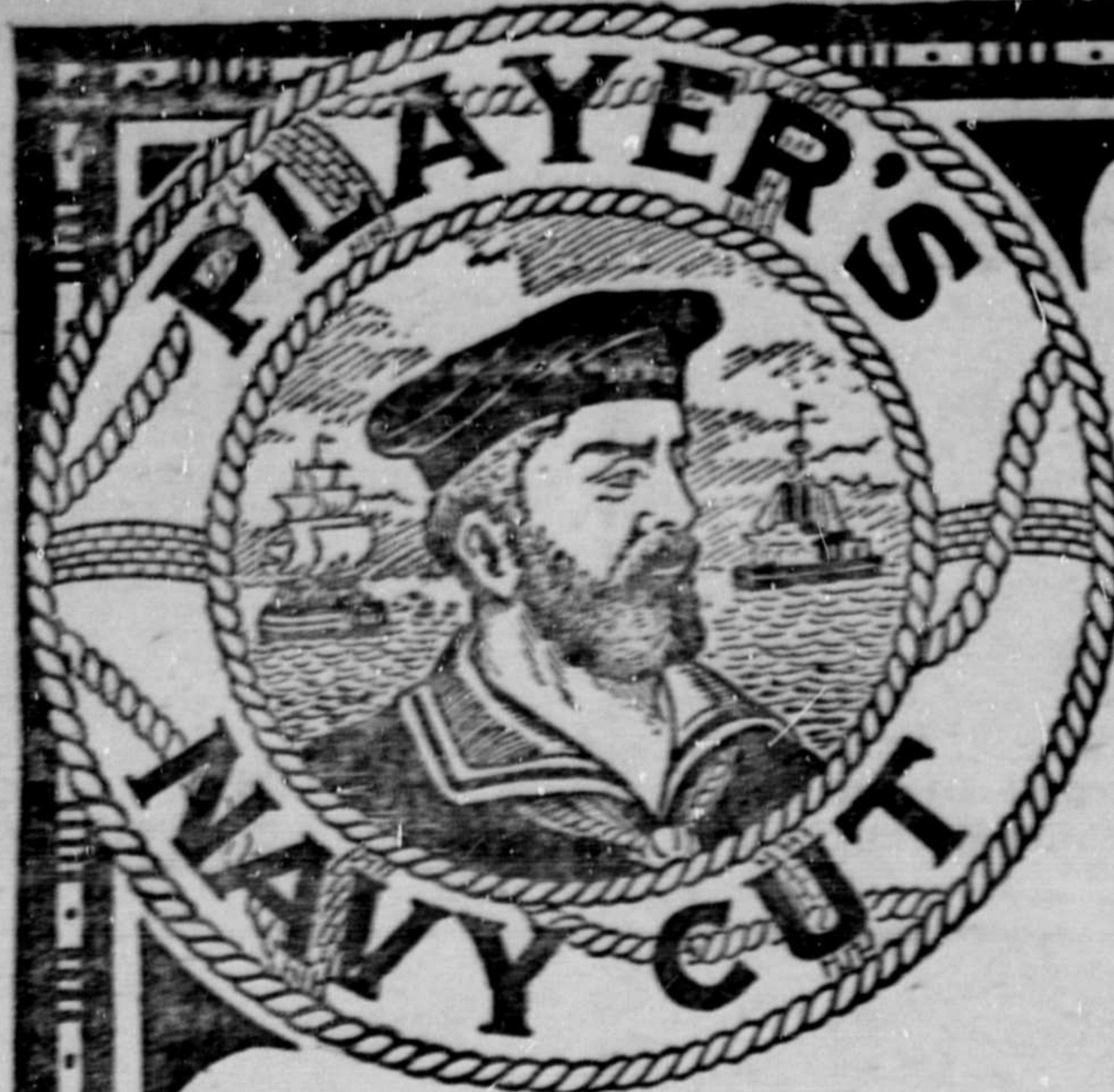
The comedy-drama, "Elizabeth's Young Man," disclosed hitherto unsuspected local talent and was uproariously funny.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only. Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-forestry land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$200 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 500 acres may be leased by one person or company. PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT. Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel.

MAIL SUBSIDY IS ASKED FOR BOAT SERVICE

Resolution Passed by Board of Trade Points Out Necessity For Such Aid.

At the regular meeting of the Board of Trade held last night in the rooms on Second Ave., the following resolution asking for a subsidy for a small boat service out of this port was passed by the Board:

Whereas, there are a number of coastal points contiguous to the port of Prince Rupert, B. C., within a radius of about one hundred miles, at some of which points considerable activity takes place at certain seasons of the year, and all the year round at others, and which must of necessity be buyers of merchandise and supplies to a considerable extent,

Drives Trade Away.

And Whereas, at the present time no direct service to a number of these points is available from the port of Prince Rupert, B. C., thereby driving a considerable volume of trade to other and rival commercial centres, besides causing considerable criticism from the travelling public doing business with these points and with the interests at these points themselves; on account of the delay in getting supplies and equipment, owing to the inadequate service,

And Whereas it is a well known fact that other centres such as Vancouver, B. C., and southern ports have been greatly benefited and largely built up by the trade supplied through small coasting vessels.

Not Profitable.

And Whereas it is quite improbable that such an undertaking either on the part of a private individual or a corporation would in itself be profitable in its initial stages without some assistance,

Therefore be it Resolved: That this Board go on record, and hereby advocates, that if possible, a suitable small steamer should be sought, with limited passenger and freight accommodation, to trade between these points and Prince Rupert, B. C. It is felt by this Board that such equipment should be secured and such services performed by the Grand Trunk Pacific, owing to their interests being centred in this port and its development.

Special Subsidy.

It is Further Resolved: That this Board petition the Government for a special subsidy to assist such a service; either in the form of a trade and commerce subsidy, or a direct mail subsidy, and that copies of this resolution be forwarded to W. P. Hinton, vice-president and general manager of the Grand Trunk Pacific; Captain C. H. Nicholson of the Grand Trunk Steamships; the City Council, and the Federal member for the district.

In speaking to the motion, R. Braumont, the mover, said that his company had been well aware of the importance of the service. They had for some time past been trying to get a suitable boat, but so far had failed. The service would not be profitable from the outset. He thought Prince Rupert should be the distributing

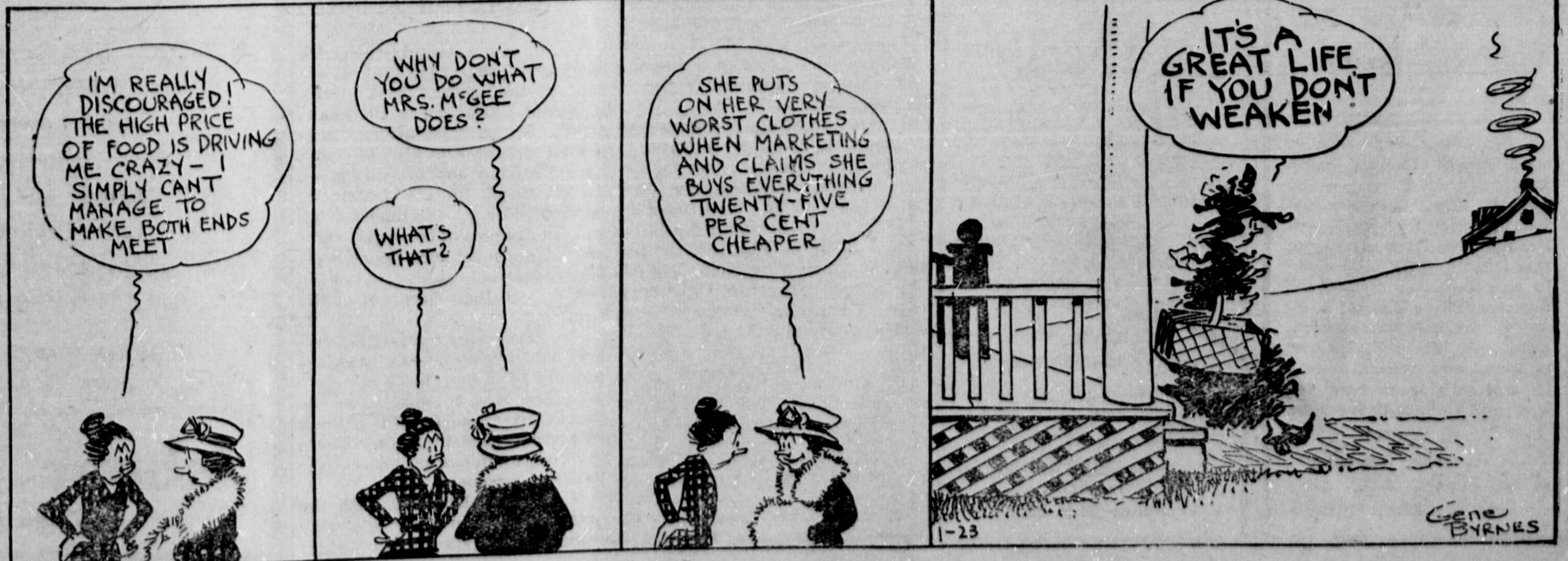

INTERESTING VISIT OF JAPANESE FISH BOAT TO SEATTLE

Schooner Houzan Maru Brought Cargo of Stockfish—Description of Vessel and Cargo.

The arrival of the Japanese auxiliary schooner Houzan Maru at Seattle on Jan. 27 from Yokohama direct with a full cargo of Japanese stockfish for the American market is of exceptional interest as the first full cargo of this commodity to reach an American port from Japan, and probably the largest single shipment that has been brought from that country, says the Pacific Fisherman. In conjunction with the recent arrival of several cargoes of salt codfish, together with considerable stockfish, in Japanese schooners, at San Francisco, it gives reason for serious thought among the American producers of codfish as to how they are to meet Oriental competition, which in the absence of a tariff on stockfish and codfish is likely to grow rapidly in the near future.

Size and Design.
The Houzan Maru herself is an interesting boat. She is an auxiliary 3-masted wooden schooner of modern type, of 485 gross tons; 135 ft. long, 35 ft. wide, with a draft of 17 feet, and powered with a 120 h. p. 2-cylinder hot-bulb engine, which runs on kerosene at considerable expense, but looks as if it were designed to use fuel oil. The hull is copper sheathed. The vessel was built last year at Shinagawa, Japan, for the Japan Fishery company, but is a freighter rather than a fishing vessel. Her first voyage was to Kamchatka for salt salmon, the Seattle trip being her second. She is under charter to Mitsui & Co.

Engine.
The engine is the product of the Ikegai Iron Works, Shiba, Tokyo. In use it is found too small to be of much service except in docking or to maintain headway in a calm, being capable of driving the vessel at a speed of about 4 knots. Her cargo on this trip consisted of 5,000 bales of stockfish, of about 110 lbs. each. Yosuke Igarashi, director, and Taichi Takesawa, councillor.

of the Japan Fishery company, the owners, reached Seattle just after her arrival, having come by steamer via San Francisco, and are making a study of methods used in the codfish industry of the Pacific coast. A second cargo of stockfish, imported by the same interests, arrived at Seattle Feb. 6 on the auxiliary schooner Kashimi Maru.

New Markets.
The catching of codfish and the production of stockfish in Japan is an old and well established industry, but until recent years no market was sought except in the Orient. Japan, however, is very favorably located with regard to the prolific cod fisheries of the Okhotsk Sea, and with the introduction of modern fishing methods, largely as a result of investigations made in the United States, production has so expanded as to demand new markets. Within the last few years a business of some importance has been built up with South America, the West Indies and other countries, and a start has been made in the exploitation of the United States markets.
