Sign of Activity In the City.

Improvements are being made to the streets and the first step is being taken in clearing up the city park at the junction of McBride St. and Eleventh Ave. This is the first sign of life in keeping with the renewed activity which is coming to the city.

With the arrival of the shipbuilders here tonight and the consequent activity at the shipyards it is expected that there will be a great deal of building and the City Council will be kept busy getting civic affairs into shape to correspond with the general movement.

Must Watch Railway In Interests of City.

The G. T. P. is in the handsof a receiver and no one knows what is to become of the road. One thing is certain, however, * that it will be operated as before and as soon as some settlement is made there should be an improved service. Prince Rupert people will have to be on the watch and assert themselves so that they may be heard at Ottawa and their interests be protected.

It was the hope of many here that the company under the new management would have been able to carry on and make good. They were working under too great a handicap, however, it seems and now the Dominion Government, through one of its ministers, has charge of the road. Prince Rupert people are intensely interested in the possibilities and they will watch with keen interest the outcome.

Buying Coal for City at Wholesale.

At the meeting of the City Council last night the Board of Fuel Control recommended to the City Council that they purchase provements, for the purpose of obtaining 1,800 tons of Granby run-of-the-mine coal for \$12,500 delivered on scows alongside the wharf at Prince Rupert. This would be sufficient coal to last the city for four years at the present rate of consumption.

The Board had made no inquiries as to the cost of discharging the coal, of storing it or of moving it toa possible storage yard. It had only a vague idea of the quality of the fuel based on a telegram received from the Coastwise Steamship & Barge Company, Ltd.

Naturally the City Council turned down the recommendation. It was not feasible.

That would bring the cost of a poor quality coal to ten dollars undelivered and probably the cost would be more when everything was figured.

When the city undertakes to purchase coal at wholesale it n the Naas River Mining Division of Casmust have its own wharf with a proper derrick for handling coal ! from barges, it must have someone who understands the business to buy and handle the coal, and it must not purchase for four years ahead or the coal will spol from weathering even if it is of good quality when purchased. Today, Prince Rupert is the centre of the fishing industry and it must be gratifying to old timers who can remember the time when all the fish caught were caught with a line from the wharf, where today we have fine boats coming from the fishing grounds with thousands of pounds of halibut, cod and flat fish, and special trains leaving with supplies of fish for the eastern market.

There are many fisheries here run by Canadian and American firms; we have one of the finest cold storages on the coast run by the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company.

Canning salmon is very important. It is caught largely in the Skeena River and canned at canneries outside of Prince Rupert and is shipped to all parts of the world.

Lumber and Mining.

JABOUR BROTHERS LOSE THEIR MOTHER

Sad News From Syria Just Received-A Brother is Just Released by Turks.

James Jabour has just received the welcome news of the safe return of his brother Salloun to his family at Zahalah, in Syria, after more than two years' captivity in the hands of the unspeakable Turk. Jabour Salloun was Presbyterian ntissionary and school superintendent at Zahalah in Lebanon, and in 1916 he and the doctor were both separated from their families and compelled to work behind the Turkish lines in Mesopotamia. When Bagdad was captured by the British forces the village doctor fell into the hands of the British, but Jabour Salloun had not any such fortune and has only now regained his personal liberty.

His letter also bears the sad news of the death of his mother and sister at their home in Carroun, a little town in Anti-Lebanon, some twenty-five miles inland from Beyrout. Few details are given, as the mail is still subject to the censor. Sympathy, however, will be extended to Jas. and Dan Jabour in their loss.



SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Fre-emption now confined to surveyed Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished. but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$18 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, be-

fore receiving Crown Grant. Where | -emptor in occupation not less than a lears, and has made proporof ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20

acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company. PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive. TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.



HOME WORK.

With reference to "home work" it is suggested in the report of Minister of Education, that the demands on public school pupils be confined to the language subjects, memorization of stanzas of poetry and preparation of spellings, review work in history and geography, collecting nature study material and getting information on topics to be taken up for the study in the classroom. Promblems in arithmetic and exercises in analysis and parsing as well as map drawing can, it is stated, be conducted profitably only under the direction of the teacher, and should not, therefore, form a part of the work assigned for home preparation. It is advised that Junior grade pupils be not given lessons for home study, and that Intermediate Grade pupils be not required to devote more than one hour and Senior Grade pupils not more than one hour and a half to the preparation of such tasks each
