TUNNEL WILL JOIN FRANCE WITH ENGLAND

Daily Mail Claims to Have Information That the Work is Going Ahead.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, March 11.—The Daily Mail claims it has definite information that the British and French Governments have agreed upon the construction of a tunnel under the English Channel, and that the details are now being discussed by a special commission in Paris which is also considering building tunnels under the Bosphorus and Straits of Gibraltar.

The proposal to build a tunnel to join England and France has been mooted many times, but the English people have been afraid of interfering with the safety of their island home. With the advent of air and submarine warfare the channel is no longer much protection, hence the proposal becomes practicable.

MCCLYMONT PARK

Work Commenced on Cleaning up of the City Property at Corner of McBride and Eleventh.

At the City Council meeting last night Mayor McClymont announced that they had commenced to clean up the park property at McBride and Eleventh St. around Hays Creek to make it available for park purposes. Some people had been cutting down the trees there but this would have to stop. Notices would be posted forbidding damaging the trees. The work will be under the charge of S. Clements, city engineer, who has orders to spend about \$500 on the work.

This park will prove most picturesque and valuable and when properly cleaned up should be a good deal. It has been suggested that as the work on it is being commenced under the present mayor it should be named McClymont Park.

A resolution sent to the City Council by the Board of Trade asking for a subsidy for a boat landing in and out of this port was endorsed by the City Council last night.

REID ENTERS ON DUTIES AS RECEIVER

Officers of G. T. P. are Required to Facilitate Carrying out Provisions of Order.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, March 11.—Hon. J. D. Reid entered on his duties as official receiver for the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway yesterday. The operation of the road is being carried on as heretofore.

W. P. Hinton, general manager, is in charge of the management and has agreed to conform to the requirements of the order under which Dr. Reid was appointed. All other officers of the system are required to facilitate the carrying out of the powers and duties of the receiver.

Provision was made under its order that nothing done under its provisions "shall render the Government of Canada or the Government receiver or any one acting under the authority of the receiver liable to the Grand Trunk Railway Company or any creditor or holder of bonds for any claim by reason of the making of this order or of anything done under the authority of the Government receiver."

TWO FISH CATCHES SOLD THIS MORNING

There was only one fish arrival this morning, the Viking with 4,000 lbs. of halibut. The catch was sold along with that of the Constance a power vessel owned by the National Independent Fisheries which was in dock yesterday forenoon. The price obtained was 12.8 and 8c. from Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company Ltd.

The King and Winge, also an independent boat, is expected in with a large catch.

Delightful Affair Held Last Night Under Auspices of the Ladies' Auxiliary.

An invitation dance given by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the St. Andrew's Society last night proved to be a very delightful affair. Something like two hundred people tripped the light gymnastic until well on into the morning, and all expressed themselves as having enjoyed the event immensely.

Refreshments were served by the ladies and Harvey's orchestra provided the music. Howard Steen and W. R. Martin were the doorkeepers and Wm. Kerr as master of the ceremonies managed things in his inimitable manner.

MILITARY TERMS OF DISARMAMENT FOR THE GERMANS

Paris, March 11.—The Supreme War Council has finally adopted the military terms of the German disarmament. It provides, as before indicated, for an army of 100,000 men enlisted for twelve years.

SILVER CROSS FOR MOTHERS AND WIVES

Hon. H. C. Mewburn Tells of Siberian Force and of Decorations Won by Canadians.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, March 11.—Hon. H. C. Mewburn, Minister of Militia, on resuming the debate on the address in the House of Commons, described the Siberian expedition. At the present time there are 4,434 Canadian soldiers in Siberia. The balance of the force is still in Canada and is being demobilized as rapidly as possible. The men in Siberia will be brought home at an early date.

Mr. Mewburn presented a list of decorations won by the Canadian force in the field: Victoria Crosses, 61; Distinguished Service Order, 605; Military Crosses, 2,312; Distinguished Conduct Medals, 1,453; Military Medals, 7785.

The question of giving a medal to all members of the expeditionary force is under consideration. He recommended that the Government should issue to mothers and wives who had lost sons or husbands, a silver cross which might be known as the Cross of Service.

SOPHIA INQUIRY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Victoria, B. C., March 11.—The Princess Sophia wreck inquiry has been adjourned until Thursday. A man named W. L. Hamilton of a vessel called the Estabath, will be heard then.

A communication from Walter Shaw relative to the disposal of city garbage in such a way as to allow of the ashes and manure being taken to Porecher Island for fertilizer was referred to the Health Committee by the City Council last night.

FINAL SCENE IN THE TRAGEDY OF KISPIOX

Body of Captain Jack is Found in Ice Near Hazelton.

With the finding of the body of Captain Jack near the Hevenor ranch on Sunday, there was enacted the last scene in a tragedy of the Kispiox of a year ago, in which three Indians perished, says the Interior News.

Captain Jack had been working at the Silver Standard mine, and with his wife and brother-in-law started for their home, to reach which it was necessary to cross the Kispiox river. At that time the stream was swollen by spring freshets, and when the party set out to cross, the frail canoe capsized, spilling the occupants into the raging waters. Some time later the bodies of his wife and brother-in-law were picked up at Terrace and Pacific respectively, having drifted down the Kispiox and into the Skeena, but the river guarded the secret of the whereabouts of Captain Jack's body.

Last Sunday some people at the Hevenor ranch were down to the river's bank and one of them noticed a dark object in a cake of ice. Closer examination proved it to be a human body and the police were notified. Constable Cline went out and brought the body to town in its ice coffin, and at the hospital the ice was melted when for the first time identification was possible, which proved it to be that of the missing Captain Jack.

IMPROVEMENTS TO THE CEMETERY ROAD

The road to the cemetery is to be improved at a cost of \$3,500. This was decided on at the meeting of the City Council last night. Part of it will be replanked at a cost of \$2,805 and the remainder graded.

It was decided to purchase a quantity of lumber from the Prince Rupert mill at \$20.75 a thousand feet and the work will be commenced at once.

WAGES REDUCED CENT PER HOUR

Lowering of Cost of Living at Vancouver Brings First cut At Shipyards.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, March 11.—Effective March 1 a reduction in wages of one cent an hour in all local shipyards and contract shops will take place, resulting from an award by Adjustor W. L. Macdonald based on the cost of living clause in Senator Robertson's agreement under which the shops are operating. The base rate of pay at local yards and contract shops to February 8 was \$6.24 per day. This will be reduced under the new award to \$6.16 a day.

PRIZES AWARDED FOR ESSAYS ON THE FLAG

Son and Daughters of Local Clergyman Are Winners in Navy League Competition

Some weeks ago the Navy League offered prizes to the students of the High School for the three best essays written on "The Flag." The essays were written at the school and afterwards handed over to J. H. McMullin, representative of the Navy League. Judges in the persons of F. McB. Young, Judge of the County Court and A. H. Lord, Inspector of Public Schools examined the essays, and selected the following as prize winners: Catherine Collison, 1st prize; Ruth Rix, 2nd prize; Archie Grant, 3rd prize.

It is a curious coincidence that the three prize winners are the children of three resident clergymen.

SHIPYARDS NOT YET WORKING FULL TIME

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Seattle, March 11.—Although today is the time set for reopening the shipyards at Tacoma, Aberdeen and Seattle following the calling off of the strike of the metal trades workers, the shipyard owners estimated it would be several weeks before the yards again are in full swing.

The electric light plant was ordered reinsured by the City Council last night, the amount carried being \$20,700.

FUEL BOARD IS OFFERED CHEAP COAL

City Council Refuses to Purchase Because of Lack of Facilities to Handle.

The Fuel Control Board last night recommended the City Council to purchase 1800 tons of coal from the Coastwise Barge & Steamship Co., at Vancouver, the same to be delivered alongside the dock here at \$7.00 a ton. The quality of the coal was to be run of the mine similar to that sold to the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., Ltd. recently. Ten days were to be allowed for discharging from the barges after which a fee of \$50 a day would be charged for demurrage. The report was signed by S. M. Newton, chairman, and G. B. Casey. The third Commissioner John Currie refused to sign the recommendation.

Mr. Newton was present in person in connection with the matter and he explained that requests had been sent to the mines for prices and he assumed that was the reason they had obtained this quotation. The Fuel Board had no means of undertaking the unloading of the coal or the handling so they made the recommendation to the Council.

Mayor McClymont explained that the matter had been before the Finance Committee and they had decided that it would not be wise to tie up fifteen thousand dollars, especially when they did not know what the exact cost would be. The simplest part of the coal business was obtaining prices from the mine and the towing companies.

There was considerable discussion on the matter but no supporters of the proposal which was by resolution unanimously turned down. It was shown that the city had no facilities for handling and no place to store the coal.

Sign of Activity In the City.

Improvements are being made to the streets and the first step is being taken in clearing up the city park at the junction of McBride St. and Eleventh Ave.

With the arrival of the shipbuilders here tonight and the consequent activity at the shipyards it is expected that there will be a great deal of building and the City Council will be kept busy getting civic affairs into shape to correspond with the general movement.

Must Watch Railway In Interests of City.

The G. T. P. is in the hands of a receiver and no one knows what is to become of the road. One thing is certain, however, that it will be operated as before and as soon as some settlement is made there should be an improved service.

It was the hope of many here that the company under the new management would have been able to carry on and make good. They were working under too great a handicap, however, it seems and now the Dominion Government, through one of its ministers, has charge of the road.

Buying Coal for City at Wholesale.

At the meeting of the City Council last night the Board of Fuel Control recommended to the City Council that they purchase 1,800 tons of Granby run-of-the-mine coal for \$12,500 delivered on scows alongside the wharf at Prince Rupert.

The Board had made no inquiries as to the cost of discharging the coal, of storing it or of moving it to a possible storage yard. It had only a vague idea of the quality of the fuel based on a telegram received from the Coastwise Steamship & Barge Company, Ltd.

Naturally the City Council turned down the recommendation. It was not feasible.

It looks attractive to be able to purchase coal at seven dollars a ton, but it was clearly shown at the discussion which took place last night that the coal which had been coming from that mine was mostly slack, that it burned with a large amount of ash and that it was not favored by the people who had used it at Anxox.

When the city undertakes to purchase coal at wholesale it must have its own wharf with a proper derrick for handling coal from barges, it must have someone who understands the business to buy and handle the coal, and it must not purchase for four years ahead or the coal will spoil from weathering even if it is of good quality when purchased.

Prince Rupert

As It Is and As It Might Be

First Prize Essay in Senior Grade of Prince Rupert Public Schools
won by Annie Kelly, 14 years of age

In about 1906 a party of Grand Trunk Pacific officials were looking for a western terminus for their railroad. Our landlocked harbor attracted their attention and thus the townsite of Prince Rupert on the small island of Kaien, just a mere landslide from the mainland, became the western terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway.

Prince Rupert is situated about five hundred and fifty miles north of Vancouver and forty miles south of the Alaskan boundary and is in the same latitude as the British Isles. The city was named after the first governor of the Hudson's Bay Company.

People.

Ever since the incorporation of the city in the year 1910, when Mr. Stork had the pleasure of being the first mayor, the building up of the city has been marked with hard work and optimism, a quality necessary in such a task.

However, the city today shows with what energy they worked.

The population of Prince Rupert is about two-thirds of that of six years ago, but nevertheless this does not incline to show any backward tendency for the city, but just force under extreme conditions. In this population it would be undoubtedly hard to find today in any part of Canada a more cosmopolitan gathering than we have represented from all parts of the world, but this is nearly always to be expected in a young city.

Climate.

Generally the climate is very good, though sometimes very changeable, with a temperature varying from 20 to 80 degrees above zero, but perhaps our rainfall is a shade higher than in the lower mainland, averaging from 70 to 80 inches a year, but there are many times when the rain stops and the wind quiets down and with the sky quite clear that nowhere would you like to live under better climatic conditions.

Today, Prince Rupert is the centre of the fishing industry and it must be gratifying to old timers who can remember the time when all the fish caught were caught with a line from the wharf, where today we have fine boats coming from the fishing grounds with thousands of pounds of halibut, cod and flat fish, and special trains leaving with supplies of fish for the eastern market.

There are many fisheries here run by Canadian and American firms; we have one of the finest cold storages on the coast run by the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company.

Canning salmon is very important. It is caught largely in the Skeena River and canned at canneries outside of Prince Rupert and is shipped to all parts of the world.

Lumber and Mining.

Then we have the lumber industry and this in the last year has been of no small account, for with the finest aeroplane spruce in abundance in the Queen Charlotte Islands the demand has been enormous, and so the mill at Prince Rupert manufactured a great deal of this spruce.

The places just outside of Prince Rupert are very rich in minerals. Alice Arm, Hazelton and Stewart districts abound in very rich mineral deposits, while at Telkwa and Groundhog Mountain the very best grade of coal is to be found.

Along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway fertile valleys are to be found and so agriculture is carried on successfully in certain parts.

Scenery.

Everyone who comes to Prince Rupert remarks about its scenery and indeed they might, as there certainly is some wonderful scenery. Prince Rupert is surrounded by mountains, some of which are snow-capped the whole year round, and the sunset here in summer cannot be beaten. There are a number of little islands across the bay which make the harbor very picturesque.

The land of Prince Rupert is damp and swampy, although there are some beautiful lawns and gardens here in summer. Lots of wild flowers and berries are to be found here in summer.

Social Life.

Prince Rupert has many societies and clubs, mostly all formed during the war, so that shows what a large part we took to help win the war. There are quite a number of clubs for men where they can go in the evenings; they have tournaments in billiards and cards with other clubs and thus spend many happy hours.

The women have quite a number of societies. In pre-war days the women's clubs were similar to the men's with whist drives and social evenings, but during the war they gave all this up to help the soldiers and have not resumed it yet.

There are only two theatres here but they are very nice, with high-class pictures. There is quite often a dance or concert and many pool rooms for the men, so Prince Rupert has quite a number of things to amuse her people.

Sports.

There is a large recreation ground here, where in summer football, baseball and cricket is played; tennis is also very popular. On any holiday a baseball team from another town comes in and plays against Prince Rupert.

Swimming is also very popular, one of the finest lakes for swimming is found across the bay. This lake in winter is very good for skating on.

The religion of Prince Rupert is very mixed owing to the different nationalities. The churches are of a fair size in proportion to the size of the city. They have

(Continued from Page Three)

all got good sized congregations. As It Might Be.

One of the first things strangers look at when they come off the boat is the station. Prince Rupert's is very good for the size of town, but when the city begins to grow it will be extended and a large commodious waiting station will be built.

Prince Rupert's situation as the terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway gives every prospect that it will some day be a large and important city as alike with all other terminal cities.

Fine Harbor.

Prince Rupert has one of the finest harbors on the Pacific coast - it is large, land-locked, good depth of water and has no shoals or obstacles to hinder navigation.

The wharfrage at present is perhaps limited, but with the due increase of business this can easily be remedied. With the development of trade with the Orient, and recognizing that Prince Rupert is over a day's sailing nearer than any other port on the Pacific coast, this will become the connecting link and the day will not be far away when we will have large ocean liners plying between here and Japan, China and Russia, bringing with them the exports of these countries and returning with cargoes of fish, lumber, etc.

Shipbuilding.

Shipbuilding will be a very important industry in the near future, as here in Prince Rupert there is one of the finest drydocks on the coast.

There is also a large sawmill and when the aeroplanes for mail service have to be built, Rupert will manufacture the spruce. With the lumber industry, paper will follow.

The hinterland is very rich in minerals, all these minerals are shipped through Rupert. Prince Rupert will also be the centre for Groundhog Mountain coal.

Better Houses.

In the residential part of town great improvements will be made. People came here, but not to stay so they did not take much trouble in building nice houses, but just built cabins and houses to do for the time; these will be taken down and replaced by large stone ones.

Grading will be necessary, as Prince Rupert is very hilly and it wouldn't do if its going to be a large city to have to climb steps to go from one avenue to another, the roads will have to be wider and made of cement instead of wood.

Then our recreation grounds will have to be larger, public gymnasiums will be built, and the Salt Lakes made into a summer resort, with instructors to teach the children to swim.

Better Playgrounds.

Another improvement might be made on the schools; as the playgrounds are in a very bad shape, holes and large rocks are scattered over, and cause the little children to get hurt.

The churches for some time past have been talking about combining and making one large church. All these things will improve the general appearance of the city and tourists will visit here.

After viewing the bright prospects ahead, who can but see a great future for Prince Rupert.

HOME WORK.
With reference to "home work" it is suggested in the report of Minister of Education, that the demands on public school pupils be confined to the language subjects, memorization of stanzas of poetry and preparation of spellings, review work in history and geography, collecting nature study material and getting information on topics to be taken up for the study in the classroom. Problems in arithmetic and exercises in analysis and parsing as well as map drawing can, it is stated, be conducted profitably only under the direction of the teacher, and should not, therefore, form a part of the work assigned for home preparation. It is advised that Junior grade pupils be not given lessons for home study, and that Intermediate Grade pupils be not required to devote more than one hour and Senior Grade pupils not more than one hour and a half to the preparation of such tasks each day.
