Shipbuilding is to Commence

PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT OF COMPANY ON THE JOB TODAY

SIX THOUSAND TONS OF STEEL ORDERED A WEEK AGO EXPECTED WITHIN THE NEXT THIRTY DAYS

Plans being Prepared for Ships near Drydock and Grading will be Done at Once; Mr. Mullen tells of Aims and Aspirations of the New Company.

The shipbuilders arrived last night and announce that they commence work right at once. The contracts have been signed and delivered, the orders for the steel placed and nothing remains but to get to work and build the ships.

In conversation with a Daily News representative last night, Mr. Mullen, president of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., which has a lease of the drydock here and the land adjoining, said that they would be starting on the plans for the ways of the F. F. Schellenberg, who came with him, will have charge of the actual shipbuilding operations and J. H. Pillsbury will continue to have charge of the drydock and repair plant.

6,000 Tons of Steel.
A week ago we placed orders through the Dominion Government for six thousand tons of steel," said Mr. Mullen. "This we expect to be delivered at once and there should be no delay in getting to work. We expect to spend at least \$200,000 in addition to the fine plant that is already here. We shall ever possible buy supplies right here in Prince Rupert and use Canadian machinery and plant wherever possible. We expect to make this a Canadian industry.

Housing the Men.
"We expect to employ from 500 to 600 men and I anticipate the housing of these will be a rather difficult matter. I much prefer that the owners of property here should undertake the matter, but if they do not do it the company will have to provide for the employees.

"I expect to remain here a month or more until things get settled but Mr. Schellenberg will be in charge of the work. Mr. Pillsbury, the chairman of the board, will also be here before long, probably within ten days.

More Contracts.
"Just now Mr. Erb is negotiating for some French contracts which we hope to get. They are for various types of vessels. As a matter of fact we are in the shipbuilding business here and expect to be able to build as cheaply here as anywhere. We are here just to build these two ships, but to establish a business. Repair work? Yes we expect to build up the repair business. We shall carry a large stock of repair materials so that we may be able to do a good business."

Excavate at Once.
Mr. Mullen says that he is not sure whether the excavating will be let by contract or whether it will be done by day work. Work will be done at once, however, and there will be no delay for any other officials to come. Mr. Mullen is fully engaged to go ahead and carry the work through.

In order that the best results may be obtained Mr. Mullen says that he is looking for the co-operation of labor here so that they may be able to make a success of the work. The whole of the excavating will be done on the ground at this place and that means an immense lot of work.

The Ships.
The two ships that are to be built should be completed, one in February of next year and the other by the following June. The plans are provided for in the contract. Each vessel has a 52-foot beam.

DAVID LOUGHNAN HAS IMPORTANT POSITION

Refuses to Accept \$300 a Month Salary But Turns It Over to Association.

David Loughnan, who worked for about two years at Hazelton on the staff of the Omineca Miner and who has recently been appointed on the advisory committee in connection with the soldiers' repatriation is well known in this part of the country. Speaking of his appointment the Vancouver Province says:

The salary is \$300 a month and Mr. Loughnan, while accepting this, is turning it over completely to the national secretary-treasurer of the Great War Veterans' Association to be used as the Dominion executive may deem advisable.

The reason for Mr. Loughnan's action in accepting the salary is that he feels that the government should pay for the services he is rendering, but does not desire to benefit personally by his activities on behalf of returning comrades and dependents. The dual position of editor of "The Veteran" and a member of the advisory committee is arduous and entails, often, a seven-day working week. Sometimes it means fifteen hours a day, but the work is interesting, and it is hoped by Mr. Loughnan, useful.

GERMANS ACTED LIKE WILD BEASTS

Fighting Going on in Berlin With Great Fury, Says a Copenhagen Despatch.

London, March 12.—Fighting is still going on in Berlin with great fury, according to undated reports received in Copenhagen. Witnesses of the fighting during the last few days say both the Spartacists and Government soldiers acted like wild beasts.

ANDREW KELLY WINS AGAINST COMMODORE

Salvage for \$4,000 Awarded to Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.

Vancouver, March 12.—Mr. Justice Martin has handed down judgment in the two Admiralty cases heard before him here this week. The first was that of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., owners of the steamer Andrew Kelly, against the B. C. Timber Mills & Trading Co., owners of the tug Commodore. It was claimed by the captain of the Andrew Kelly that he had found the Commodore in distress in a storm off the coast of Alaska in October, 1917, and had towed both that vessel and the barge of copper attached to Yakutat Bay. Mr. Justice Martin decided that the Andrew Kelly was entitled to \$4,000 salvage, but did not express any further opinion. The question of division of the salvage was held over.

The action of the owners of the Jessie Mac against the owners of the Sea Lion was dismissed. It had been urged by the defence that the injuries to the Jessie Mac resulted, not from negligence in navigating the Sea Lion, but to the stormy condition of the sea. Furthermore, it was contended that the captain of the Jessie Mac incurred danger in tying to the shore and then allowing four other vessels to tie to her in turn.

CORONA COMES HERE FOR FRESH BAIT

Customs Officer Goes to Butler's Cove for Convenience of American Craft.

The Corona from Tacoma arrived in port last night with no fish. She is leaving for Stevens Island today to procure fresh bait. Captain P. Rorvik who has stationed his boat, the Rosepit at Butler's Cove or Canoe Pass, to catch herring, reports that he has about two hundred tons of live herring in captivity.

It has been arranged for a customs officer to be stationed at Butler's Cove to supply the American fishing boats as well as Canadian.

GERMAN OFFICERS MAY BE PUNISHED BY LAW

Rule Would Apply to Death of Capt. Fryatt, But Not Edith Cavell.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Paris, March 12.—It is now asserted that a majority of the Peace Commission committee on responsibility for war, hold that German officers can be punished for orders given for acts permitted by them in violation of the national laws of Germany or the rules of war. Such rule would apply to the officer who executed Captain Fryatt but not to Edith Cavell, who might have been technically guilty of espionage.

RUN ON JAPANESE BANK IN VANCOUVER

Vancouver, March 12.—A run started on a Japanese bank here owing to alarming rumors. The appearance of two automobiles with crisp bills served to quell the disturbance to some extent.

Shipbuilding Will Commence at Once.

It is an encouraging story that J. L. Mullen, president of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., has to tell in this paper in regard to the aims and intentions of the company here. The ships are to be commenced at once and already the two officials are on the ground laying out the work for the ways on which the vessels are to be built. It is a happy consummation of all our hopes and fears.

Mr. Mullen asks for the co-operation of all classes in the work which his company has taken in hand. He says it is his intention to establish a permanent business here and to do that it is necessary to compete with other places, not in these particular contracts but in future orders which it is hoped to obtain.

Repair Business To be Built Up.

The building up of the ship repair business should mean a great deal to the city alone. When vessels come here they bring their crews with them and all help to swell the receipts of the merchants who live here.

The News has before this urged the citizens to take in hand the housing question. Houses must be built and it would be much better to have the locally owned property built on by the owners than that the new company should have to provide for its own employees. Houses must be built and now there should surely be no hesitation in getting to work.

The timber merchants have been anticipating that some building would be in progress and have been importing lumber which cannot be produced here. Other orders will follow and there should be good business for everyone. It is to be hoped, however, that local merchants will rise to the occasion and try to fill the demand for all kinds of merchandise which is bound to follow the commencement of the shipbuilding activities.

Great Advertisement For the City.

Prince Rupert will now be advertised as never before. Already The News is getting queries from England and from many points in the United States. More of these will follow for we shall be known as a shipbuilding point and as a ship repair centre and our fame will spread all over the continent and beyond.

At present the company has only two contracts, the work on which will take about a year, but they are already negotiating for other ships for foreign interests and the more successful they are the better it will be for Prince Rupert. Doubtless the people here will feel that the interests of the city and of the new company are one. They will recognize that what makes for the permanency of the new enterprise makes for the permanent prosperity of this place. We expect the shipbuilding company to make profits. That is what they are coming here for. In doing it they will enable others to prosper. This will become an industrial centre, its population will increase, its influence will spread and Prince Rupert will be on the map as a place that does things.

Every person who in 1918 resided or ordinarily resided in Canada or was employed in Canada or carried on business in Canada, including corporations and joint stock companies.

WHO SHOULD FILE RETURNS.

1. Every unmarried person or widow or widower, without dependent children under twenty-one years of age, who during calendar year 1918 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during calendar year 1918 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$3,000, during the fiscal year ended in 1918.

FORMS TO BE FILLED IN AND FILED.

- FORM T1. By individuals, other than farmers and ranchers.
- FORM T1A. By farmers and ranchers.
- FORM T2. By corporations and joint stock companies.
- FORM T3. By trustees, executors, administrators of estates and assignees.
- FORM T4. By employers to make return of the names of all directors, officials, agents or other employees to whom was paid \$1,000 or more in salaries, bonuses, commission or other remuneration during the calendar year 1918.
- FORM T5. By corporations, joint stock companies, associations and syndicates to make return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1918.

Individuals comprising partnerships must file returns in their individual capacity.
All returns must be filed IN DUPLICATE.
Forms may be obtained from the Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.
Returns should be filed immediately.
Postage must be prepaid on letters and other documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

LABOR'S WORK **AT CONFERENCE**

Draft Proposals Made at Paris;
Radical Proposals But Weak
on Immigration.

The main proposals of the British draft, adopted with minor alterations by the International Labor leaders at Paris as the new charter of labor, are given in a special dispatch.

The provisions of this draft preclude the employment of children under 15 years of age in industrial occupations and of children between 15 and 18 for more than six hours daily. At least two hours each day must be devoted by these young workers to technical or regular education and they won't be permitted to work at night, or on Sundays and holidays.

Saturday Holiday.
A Saturday half-holiday will be introduced into all countries and workers shall be allowed a continuous weekly rest of at least 36 hours while the hours of work shall not exceed eight daily or 48 weekly, and even less than this in dangerous trades.

Women shall not be employed at night, and employers shall not give women work to do at home after their regular day's work. Women shall not be employed in especially dangerous trades, which it is impossible to make healthy, or in mines, or below ground. Women shall not be allowed to work for ten weeks altogether before and after child birth, six weeks to be taken after confinement.

Maternity Insurance.
In every country a system of maternity insurance shall be introduced, providing for compensation at least equal to sickness insurance benefit payable in the country concerned.

Women shall receive the same pay as men for the same jobs. The use of poisonous materials shall be prohibited in all cases where it is possible to secure substitutes for them.

Workers shall have the right of free combination and association in all countries.

Unemployment.
A system of unemployment insurance shall be set up in every country. All workers shall be insured by the state against industrial accidents.

A special code of laws for the protection of seamen shall be established.

Regarding immigration, which shall not be prohibited, in a general way, the charter, according to the correspondent, recognizes the right of any state to restrict immigration temporarily in a period of economic depression or for the protection of public health and recognizes the right of a state to require a certain standard of education from immigrants.

REV. FATHER M'GRATH TO SEE HIS BROTHER CONSECRATED BISHOP

Goes to Seattle Where Ceremony Will Take Place at St. James Cathedral.

Rev. Father McGrath left yesterday for Seattle by the S. S. Princess Mary to attend the consecration of his brother, Right Rev. Joseph McGrath, formerly pastor of St. Patrick's church, to the Bishopric of Baker City, Ore. The ceremony will take place in St. James' Cathedral, Seattle, the consecrating prelates being Rt. Rev. Bishop O'Dea of Seattle, and Rt. Rev. Bishop Carroll, of Helena, Montana. The Most Rev. Archbishop Christie of Portland, will preach for the occasion.

Speaking of the appointment of Father McGrath, the Seattle P.I. says:

"As the climax of twenty-three years of successful church work Rev. Joseph F. McGrath received unofficial notice yesterday that he had been appointed by Pope Benedict bishop of the diocese of Eastern Oregon, with the bishopric see at Baker City. Father McGrath is priest of the St. Patrick's parish, of which he has been the head for twelve years. His appointment to the diocese of 55,000 square miles in a rapidly developing district is a recognition by the church authorities of his unusual capacity for executive and financial work.

"The notification came as a complete surprise to Father McGrath and not an inkling as to the probability of such an appointment had previously been given him."

"TARZAN OF THE APES" IS A WONDERFUL STORY

"Tarzan of the Apes" is bully adventure. 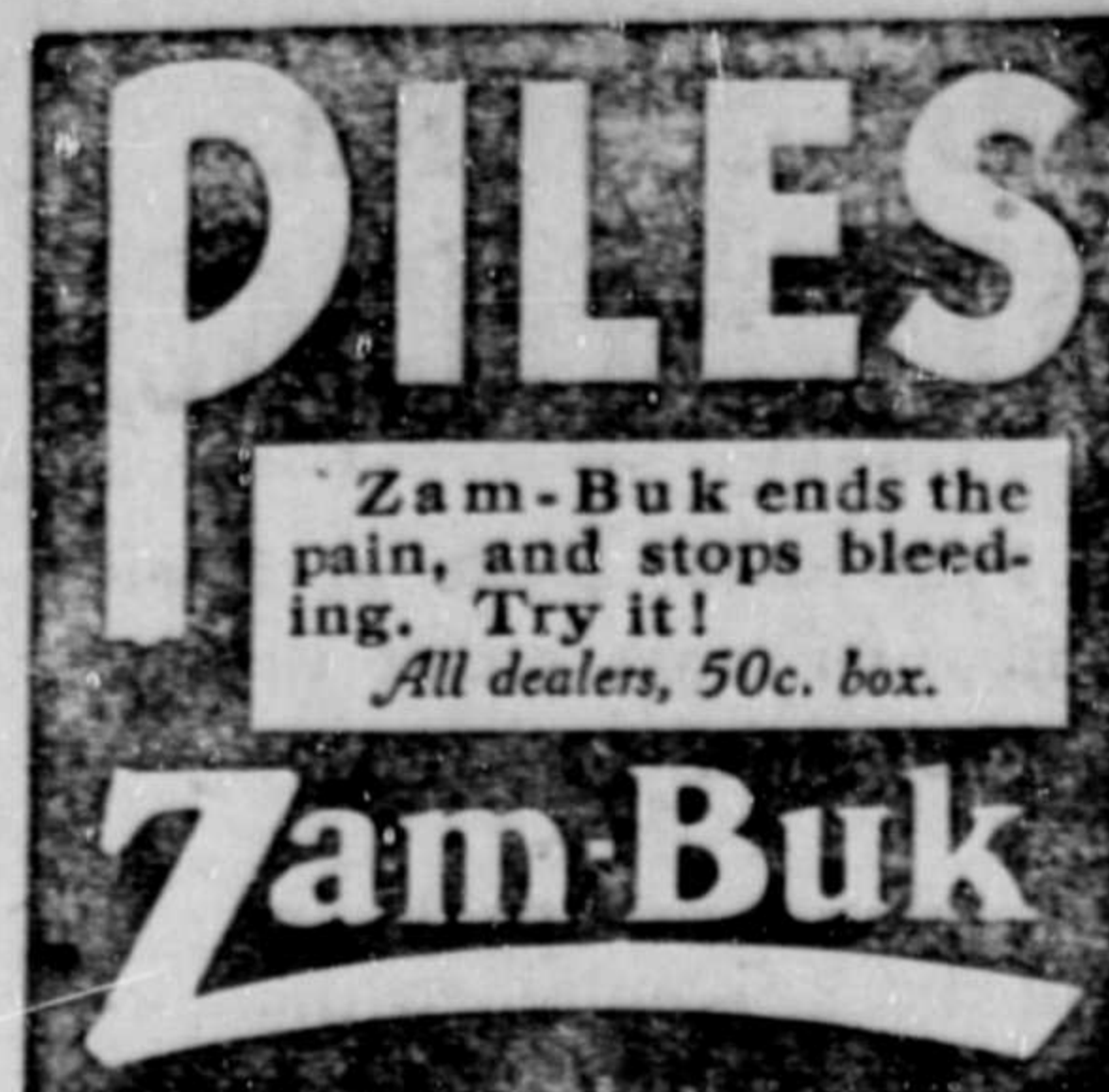

COLONEL PECK
DEFENDS CURRIE

Canadians Too Wise to be Caught in "Booby Traps," He Says.

A special dispatch to the Vancouver Province from Ottawa signed by Roland Hill, says: "Sir Sam Hughes's sensational charge of unnecessary losses among the Canadian troops at Cambrai and Mons, which is regarded here as aimed at Lieut. General Currie, the corps commander, has caused great indignation among the soldier members of the Commons and will not go unchallenged. Lieut. Colonel Peck, V. C., D. S. O., will be among the early speakers who will refute this charge and point out how deplorable it is, especially at the present time.

"General Currie needs no defence either as to his military ability or the care he took in all engagements to conserve the lives of the soldiers," said Colonel Peck, "but such wild charges as Sir Sam Hughes made in the Commons must be answered. I was aghast when the former Minister of Militia made his sensational statements," he added.

"It is deplorable that such unfounded allegations should be made when there are thousands of mothers and wives with sorrowing hearts still far from healing, whose wounds will be opened again by the ill-considered words of Sir Sam.

A Fine Leader.

"General Currie, in my opinion and in the opinion of most of the soldiers I have come in contact with, is one of the finest leaders in the war, and the care and safety of his men always took first place in his mind.

"As for Cambrai, sometimes perhaps it is better to 'go around the burning place,' and it was done there. Canadian troops were two miles beyond Cambrai on the night before the first Canadians entered the streets of the town. It was friendly rivalry between Imperial troops and the Canadians that caused the rush through the streets. There were more prisoners alone taken than casualties occurring to us in the fighting.

"As to 'booby traps,' I believe not one Canadian soldier was caught by these. The Canadian in fighting is far too wise a bird to be trapped and any prisoners we had gathered in were quickly used to clear them up.

Higher Direction.

"The attack on Mons, I am sure, was at the direction of the higher command and was well carried out. Our casualties were light and had the Germans not carried out the armistice terms, we had gained a fine strategic position by its capture.

"Colonel Peck probably will be one of the speakers on the Address this week. It is his intention to meet the 16th Battalion he commanded and to accompany it to Winnipeg, where it will be demobilized. It is possible, if the first division's return is delayed, that he will return to England to rejoin it.

"On Tuesday Colonel Peck was one of the dinner guests of the Duke of Devonshire at Government House."

HOUSING IN PRINCE RUPERT

To the Editor:—

Owing to the area of the city there is a risk of overcrowding that may in the future lead to slums of a dangerous nature; but at the present time the citizens have a splendid opportunity to make this the model city of Canada.

On a frontage of 75 feet, a well arranged plan will give accommodation for four families and each suite will contain two public rooms, two bedrooms, a bath room, kitchen and private balcony, also four small gardens at the back and front, with separate gates, walks and separate entrance to each suite. One furnace or boiler will heat the building in place of four, one to each family.

On a frontage of one hundred feet, a terrace apartment can be built of eight suites, each containing two public rooms, three bedrooms, kitchen, bath room, private balcony and a store-room in the basement. The ground floor suites to have their own separate entrance with gardens in front.

The writer believes that the citizens of Prince Rupert will take full advantage of the most modern plans and designs to make the place a model and beautiful city.

Lumber buildings can be erected as "slow burning" and made sound-proof in walls and floors. The three-story terrace, or higher apartments should have walls of solid brick or concrete, with "slow burning" floors and the partition walls made sound proof. In a terrace apartment, as described, the rooms would all be large and well lighted.
