## BRITISH COLUMBIA MEMBER DISCUSSES FISHERIES AND THE IMMIGRATION POLICY

FOREIGNERS HAVE CAPTURED THE FISHERIES, SAYS W. G. McQUARRIE OF NEW WESTMINSTER AND COMMISSIONS AND INVESTIGATIONS DO NO GOOD

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
In the House of Commons yesterday during the debate on the press in reply to the speech from the throne, W. G. McQuarrie New Westminster criticised the granting of the majority of British Columbia fishing licenses to citizens of foreign countries. Another British Columbia member, Dr. Bonnell of East Vancouver, strongly supported a department of public health as a means of helping in the fight against tuberculosis. Col. Peck, V. C., will continue the debate this afternoon.

**The Fisheries.**  
Mr. McQuarrie said that in British Columbia there was great dissatisfaction in regard to the fisheries and it would be a good thing for the Minister of Marine Fisheries to give this matter serious consideration. Royal commissions had been appointed investigations made, yet the situation did not seem to have cleared up.

**Less Production.**  
On the Fraser River there had been a falling off in production. The total last year was 206,003 fish below normal and he deplored the situation in regard to the fisheries. The majority of the fishing licenses in British Columbia were issued to foreigners and a great part of the catch was granted to other nations—Austrians, Greeks, the Hindus, the very worst type seemed to find their way into Canada, and if they made any money they did not spend it here, but sent it home.

Other classes of people Canada did not want as immigrants were Austrians, Germans, Turks and labor agitators.

**Immigration.**  
The immigration policy particularly in its relation to British Columbia was discussed at length by Mr. McQuarrie. Certain classes were not wanted, he said, and the ones that were consisted of races that could not be assimilated in Canada. The Chinese, of which there were so many, and the Japanese were two such races. Immigrants argued that Chinese were cheap labor, but such was not the case.

**Monopoly.**  
Mr. McQuarrie, continued Mr. McQuarrie, had now a practical monopoly of the fisheries of British Columbia and were entering lines of industry. As for

## PRELIMINARY WORK ON THE SHIPYARDS PROCEEDING APACE

Newman Erb of New York Is Expected to Visit City in Near Future.

J. L. Mullen, president of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., left last night for Vancouver and will probably be away for some days. In the meantime F. F. Schellenberg is in charge of the preliminary work at the shipyards and he reports that things are being pushed as fast as possible. There is nothing to tell yet in regard to the laying down of the ways and as the work on the plans is proceeding and the details have not yet been settled.

Newman Erb, president of the Board of Directors, is expected to leave New York within a few days for Prince Rupert but the time of the visit is somewhat uncertain and it will have nothing to do with hastening or retarding the work on the shipyards.

## FIVE FISH CATCHES SOLD THIS MORNING

Caygeon Brought in 8,500 Pounds Which Will Sell on Sunday.

Five fishing schooners arrived in port during the night and all the catches sold except one, the Caygeon.  
The catches were the Atli with 12,000 lbs.; Alton with 9,500 lbs.; Alliance, 4,500 lbs.; Siren with 2,000 lbs. of halibut and 300 lbs. of salmon, and the Caygeon with 8,500 lbs. of halibut which will sell on Sunday morning. The prices received by the other boats were 13.8c. and 10c. for the halibut, and 17c. and 11c. for the salmon.  
The fish were purchased by the Pacific Fisheries Co., Ltd.  
All the fishing boats reported very rough weather outside, with cold northerly winds and driving snow.

The Times' financial editor says the Canadian Government action created a bad impression in British financial circles.

## TROUBLE BETWEEN JAPANESE AND YANKS

Marines Force Way Into Nipponese Consulate and Assault Officers.

Peking, March 14.—United States marines raided the Japanese concession at Tien Tsin, forcing their way into the Japanese consulate and assaulting the consular officers, according to despatches received here. The trouble was caused by rough treatment given United States soldiers who became disorderly in the Japanese quarter.

## WASHINGTON TO TAKE HAND IN STRIKE OF SHIPPING WORKERS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
New York, March 14.—The commandeering by the Government of a fleet of harbor craft sufficient to restore traffic in New York's strike-bound harbor has been decided upon by officials of the army and navy and the United States Shipping Board.

If the boats are taken over by the Government agencies, they will be managed by union crews working eight hours a day on a wage scale recently agreed upon.

## LABOR TAKES GREAT STEP IN ORGANIZATION

Convention Recommends Cutting of International Affiliations and Replacing With Industrial Unions.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Calgary, March 13.—A resolution supporting the policy of industrial unionism, and separation from international organizations passed amid the greatest enthusiasm at the Western Canada Labor Conference. The following is the resolution:

"Resolved, that this convention recommend to the affiliated memberships the severance of their affiliation with international organizations and that steps be taken to form an industrial organization of all workers."

Be it further resolved that a circular letter outlining the probable plan of organization be sent out to the various organizations, and that the referendum on the question be taken at the same time, and that the question be submitted to the entire Canadian membership, ballot returns to be segregated from Port Arthur as the dividing line between east and west.

#### Renewal of Life In Sport Activities.

#### Swimming is Sport Above All Others.

Improvements will be needed in the way of clearing up debris and putting down sand for the children and doubtless the Swimming Club committee will have other recommendations to make.

To make the necessary improvements money is needed. A date has already been set for the annual meeting of the Swimming Club and at that time active steps will be taken to raise money for this worthy object. It is understood also that a Swimming Club ball is planned for the near future with the same object. A good deal of money could be spent with advantage and to help raise this there should be a large membership in the club.

### EFFECT OF SPRING ON MARKET PRICES

Eggs Likely to Become Cheaper and Tuberos Vegetables Dearer—Tangerines on Sale.

The season has not yet arrived for very much variation in market prices. Eggs are holding at a good price owing largely to the cool weather. They are, however, likely to take a drop at any time. The stocks of packed eggs are becoming small and very soon this season's laying will be the only available for cooking purposes.

This is the season when tubers begin to deteriorate in quality, especially if not kept quite dry. Onions are shooting and good ones are consequently going up in price.

# LIBERALS LOOK FOR A LEADER

Mackenzie King Seems to Be the Favorite Just Now With the House Leader as Second Choice.

Ottawa, March 13.—The question of permanent leadership of the Liberal party is still being discussed here. D. D. Mackenzie, the temporary House leader, is favored by many, but there are probably more than a majority of the Liberal members who would like to see Mackenzie King at the head of the party. Unfortunately King is not in the House and that is against him. He seems to be the one man who can unite all sections of the party and at the same time inspire them with hope for the future.

There is nothing spectacular about Mackenzie, whereas King, who is the direct descendant of the great rebel, William Lyon Mackenzie, is an able speaker and had much in common with the late leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

## F. S. GADSBY WRITES OF LIBERAL LEADER

D. D. Mackenzie Was Choice of Quebec Men; May be Permanent Leader.

The empty chair has had this much influence—it has made the man who sat next, Sir Wilfrid's deskmate, Daniel Donald Mackenzie, of Cape Breton, Nova Scotia, leader for the session. Mackenzie, a granite-ribbed Grit, a Presbyterian, a pawky Scot, well seasoned with Biblical humor, holds the place for the time being and enjoys the emoluments of the old chief, says F. S. Gadsby in the Saturday Night. It was his through-thick-and-thin loyalty to Laurier that landed him the job. The young lions from Quebec gave him the casting vote because he had never hurled a stone at Sir Wilfrid. D. D. is what the "Globe" calls a bonny fighter, but as canny fighting is needed this session he has an advisory committee to bid him be cautious when he would pursue the Philistines too far. It is not off the cards that Mackenzie may become permanent leader—he is just as well equipped for the job, for example, as that other distinguished Nova Scotian, Sir Robert Borden, was when he took over the Conservative party.

The empty chair, I am told, squinted for a while at Mr. Fielding as temporary leader, and might probably have been happy with the Liberal-Unionist charmer if the clear Grit D. D. Mackenzie had been away. If Mr. Fielding had walked across it would have been the signal for other strayed sheep to follow, and to some it is a matter of regret that the choice did not turn that way. Fielding had almost swung back to Laurier when the Old Chief passed away—he had never wandered except on conscription—but that was not the sore spot. What Quebec remembered was his attitude on the autonomy bills in 1905 when the Laurier Government trembled on the brink of ruin while the Finance Minister made up his mind. Mr. Fielding will have other chances later on. The national convention may be inclined to make him permanent leader as a link between the East and the West, a tariff-for-revenue champion, who was thoroughly sound on reciprocity.

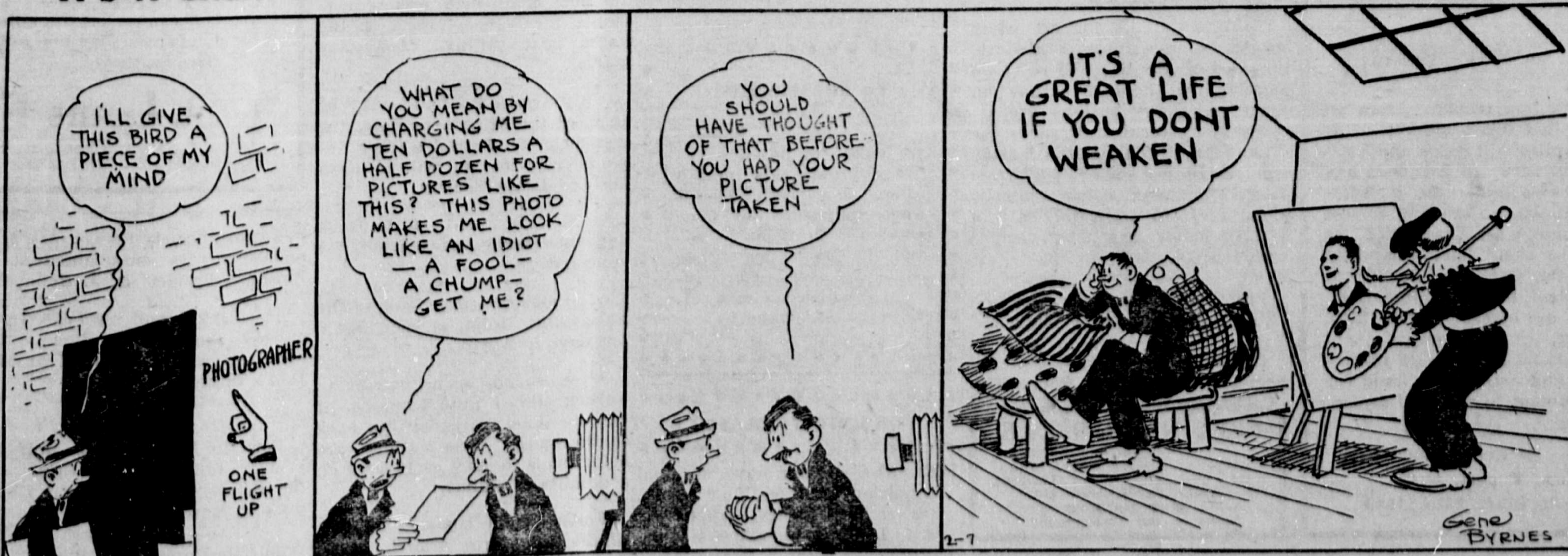
