## THREE AND A HALF MILLION TONS OF SHIPPING FROM GERMANY; 700 STEAMERS

ALL READY TO BE SHIPPED—PAYMENT TO BE MADE  
IN VARIOUS WAYS—GERMAN FISHING  
TO BE RESUMED IN THE  
NORTH SEA

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, March 17.—The Associated Press learns that the tonnage of German shipping to be surrendered is estimated at three and a half million tons. Italy already is in possession of the Austrian shipping and a very small proportion of German shipping will be entrusted to that country.

France will receive big ocean going steamers to the extent of 100 to 100,000 tons, and the balance will be divided equally between the United States and Great Britain.

### Supplies Ready.

Brussels, March 17.—There is available in England for movement to Germany approximately 30,000 tons of pork products, 100 tons of beans, 5,000 tons of rice and 15,000 tons of cereals. The United States has in Rotterdam approximately 75,000 tons of breadstuffs.

A summary of the agreement shows that in fulfilment of the treaty payment by Germany will be made by freight hire owing to the Germans for the use of the shipping and part in credits that Germany may continue to establish and maintain in neutral countries, part from German exports, part from the sale of German owned foreign securities, and part by the use of man gold.

The Germans agreed to place a deposit of gold in the National Bank of Belgium at Brussels for use as collateral.

### Blockade Modification.

A board of control for German exports will be established. Germans will be permitted to buy fish from Norway and resume their own fishing in the North Sea.

German representatives asked for a modification of the blockade. While no promises were given them, steps in that direction are already being taken.

The total ships made available under the agreement number more than 700, approximating 1,500,000 tons.

## ONE BIG UNION MOVEMENT WAS INAUGURATED

Reorganization of Labor Started  
at Calgary Convention; Union  
Men Asked to Assess Them-  
selves.

(By Mail.)

Calgary, March 14.—The most momentous event that has taken place in the annals of the labor movement in Canada was the action taken at the inter-provincial conference at the Paget hall, when every delegate present voted solidly for breaking away from international affiliation, subject to the approval of the general membership of the delegates' respective unions.

Not only this, but a new organization, subject to a referendum, was formed to embrace the whole of the workers. It will be known as "The One Big Union." In order to carry this into effect the conference adopted the following recommendations of the policy committee:

### Recommendations Are Made.

"We recommend the name of the proposed organization be 'The One Big Union.'"

"We recommend the conference elect a committee of five, irrespective of geographical location for the purpose of carrying out the necessary propaganda to make the referendum a success."

"We further recommend that delegates from each province meet and elect a committee of five to work in conjunction with the central committee; also receiving and publishing returns of the vote."

"In the opinion of the committee it will be necessary in establishing an industrial form of organization to work through the existing trades council and district board, and no definite plan of organization be submitted until the referendum has been taken."

"The committee further recommends that after the returns of the vote are received the central committee call a conference of representatives of trades councils and district boards to perfect the plans of organization; basis of referendum of affiliation membership of 5,000 or less to be one delegate; over 5,000, two delegates; over 10,000, three delegates."

"We recommend that an appeal be made to the trades councils and district boards for the payment of two cents per member affiliated to finance the educational campaign for the inauguration of 'The One Big Union.'"

### Other Resolutions Adopted.

Several other important resolutions were adopted, mostly without discussion. These include freedom of speech and the lifting of the ban on certain literature, and the release of political prisoners; the expression of an open conviction that the system of industrial service control by the selection of represen-

Three-Story Building to Accom-

Week.

The Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., Ltd., has decided to build a large three-story boarding house to accommodate one hundred men. Work on the plans is proceeding and will be pushed and it is possible that work on the buildings may commence this week. It will be erected adjoining the yards.

E. F. Schellenberg, superintendent of the shipbuilding operations, stated this morning that they found it necessary to provide for some of the men so that their work might not be hampered at the start. He hoped it would not be necessary to provide for more but that others would undertake the housing problem. He was of opinion that it would pay well to erect not only small cottages but some good houses.

## PEACE SETTLEMENT IS NOW WELL UNDER WAY; LEAGUE OF NATIONS IS IN TREATY

GERMANY IS TO GET 370,000 TONS OF FOODSTUFFS EVERY  
MONTH IN RETURN FOR MERCANTILE MARINE;  
WILSON CARRIES HIS POINT

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Paris, March 17.—One year ago today the world covered in anticipation of the launching of Germany's master offensive of the war. On March 21 the blow was struck. Today the final work of the peace settlement was well under way, the terms of which will bring Germany militarily to her knees.

Brussels, March 17.—German delegates to the conference regarding the taking over by the Allies of the German mercantile fleet and the provisioning of Germany, have definitely accepted the conditions imposed by the Allies. The monthly ration for Germany of 370,000 tons of foodstuffs has been fixed by the Allied commission.

New York, March 17.—Joseph Tumulty, secretary to President Wilson, announced the receipt of a cable from President Wilson stating the Plenary Council at Paris had decided that the League of Nations is to be a part of the Peace Treaty.

## AUSTRALIA PROPOSES COMPEL EMPLOYERS TO REINSTATE SOLDIERS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Sydney, Australia, March 17.—Premier Holman said the Government intended to find employment for 80,000 soldiers in New South Wales, first, by legislation compelling employers to reinstate returned soldiers, second, by settling 8,000 soldiers on the land, third, by employing the remainder on public works.

## MANY GERMANS WERE KILLED BY BOMBS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Copenhagen, March 17.—Seven hundred and twenty-nine persons were killed and 1,754 injured in aerial attacks by Allied forces on German territory up to November 6, 1918, according to official figures made public in Berlin.

## Construct Road To Port Edward.

Premier Oliver recently announced that a large sum of money would be used during the coming year in road construction. In view of the fact that Prince Rupert is absolutely shut in and that a road leading out is needed badly, The News has been asked to draw attention to the desirability of part of the money being spent in constructing a road between this city and Port Edward.

Much of the townsite of Port Edward is owned by the Provincial Government, following the tax sale of last year. To build the road would mean making the lots in that townsite saleable. It would mean the beginning of the road which eventually will connect the canneries on the Skeena with the city. It would prove an invaluable outlet for the people of this city who today are totally shut in as far as motor transportation is concerned.

The road would also be the beginning of a scenic drive around the island, which would pass the natural tidal rapids and prove a most important asset to the city.

## Heartless Appeal Of Railway Company.

The Workmen's Compensation Board, a Provincial Government institution, following the Princess Sophia tragedy, commenced paying out compensation, according to the usual scale, to the dependents of those whose lives were lost on that vessel. The C. P. R. objected to this procedure for the apparent reason that next year they would have a higher assessment to pay.

The action of the C. P. R. seems to have been most ill-advised. There was not the slightest consideration for the people who have suffered as a result of the accident. It is the policy which has been followed by many corporations. They would haggle over a few dollars to a bereaved widow or mother and at the same time pay huge dividends to shareholders and set aside large sums for reserve.

The Workmen's Compensation Act was framed to meet such cases. Unhappily in this particular instance the accident happened outside Canada and on that technicality the company is disputing the claim. The Compensation Board under the advice of the Provincial Government at once appealed the case and it will go to the higher court.

## Celebrating St. Patrick's Day.

This is St. Patrick's Day, the day which all Irishmen celebrate as their national holiday. It is the anniversary of the birthday of the patron Saint of the Emerald Isle.

St. Patrick is said to have been born in France, which was then a part of the Roman empire. In his youth he was taken captive and sent as a prisoner to Ireland, where his task was to herd sheep and swine in the hills of County Down. Here he learned to speak the Gaelic (Irish) language and grew to love the simple people among whom his lot was cast. After some years he escaped and found his way back to France and to his family. He then entered into training for the life of a missionary, and after many years' study was ordained bishop, and sent by Pope Celestine to convert the Irish people to the Christian faith.

## Shamrock Chosen As National Emblem.

Many beautiful stories, some no doubt of a legendary nature, are told of his hardships and difficulties, as well as of his great and miraculous successes during this period of the good man's life. The origin of the shamrock as Ireland's national emblem may here be related. It is said that the saint had great difficulty in convincing his converts as to the mystery of the Trinity. To help his hearers he plucked a trefoil from the ground and showing how the three leaves grew from one stem, yet the leaves and stem formed only one plant, he initiated them into the mystic principles of the Three Divine Persons in One God.

It was in the year 432 that Patrick was sent to Ireland, and we read in well authenticated histories that so successful was he in his mission, and so enthusiastically did the Irish people embrace the two-fold blessings of Christianity and of learning of all sorts that from that period on for many centuries Ireland was known all over Europe as the "Island of Saints and Scholars."

Local Irishmen are celebrating the day by a concert in the Westholme Theatre and a dance in the St. Andrew's Hall.

## SOLDIER MEMBER THROWS MORE BOMBS INTO HOUSE OF COMMONS AT OTTAWA

**DECLARES THERE WAS A REBELLION OF 40,000 BRITISH TROOPS AND 4,000 CANADIANS DID DUTY—SOME MEN WILL CURSE THE DAY THEY WERE BORN IF THEY DO NOT LET UP**

(Special to The News via G.T.P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, March 17.—In his defence of the Canadian troops in the House of Commons at the week end Lieut.-Col. C. W. Peck, V. C., the member for Skeena, continued his arraignment of the speech of Sir Sam Hughes which criticised Sir Arthur Currie and the Canadian command.

Sir Sam Hughes, said Col. Peck, mentioned Col. John A. Currie remarking that Col. Currie should not be confused with another man who had acted discredibly on the field of battle. There was only one other man in the Canadian army with this name but if Sir Sam had another man than the leader of the Canadian corps in mind, he should come out like a man and tell who it was.

Sir Sam Hughes: "I mean Arthur Currie and will take the first opportunity of saying so in this House."

Col. Peck declared that if the campaign against Sir Arthur Currie continued, he would tell some things he knew and certain gentlemen would curse the day they were born.

Regarding Sir Charles Ferguson who had reflected on the honor of Canadians, he commanded the 17th corps at Arras when it went out of the town. Canadians had been rushed down on that account.

Sir Charles Ferguson gave up Monchy Le Preux. Who took Monchy? The Canadian corps.

Lots of things happened in the British army about which nothing was known. In 1917 he went into a town in which 40,000 British troops were in open insurrection, and 4,000 Canadian troops were taken to guard the railways and bridges.

## GOSDEN CAUSES EXCITEMENT AT LABOR MEETING

**Accused of Being Spy—Industrial Unionism Means Declaration of War on Capital.**

(By mail).

Calgary, March 13.—A resolution supporting the policy of industrial unionism and separation from the international organization was passed amid the greatest enthusiasm at the Western Canada Labor conference this afternoon, and every delegate supported it earnestly on behalf of the several branches of labor represented.

### Declaration of War.

That the passing of the above resolution is an automatic declaration of war on the part of labor people against the capitalistic classes of the world was the opinion of a majority of the delegates and when Delegate J. Taylor of Vancouver asked if that was what the resolution amounted to he was soon set at rest by the roar of approval which surged through the hall.

Another delegate was afraid that their efforts would be nullified by the class of labor men who would like it, but did not want it if there was any work attached to the getting of it. Now that the die was cast it was up to every one to roll up his sleeves and fight.

### Opinions Expressed.

For three hours delegate after delegate took the floor and said why they should support the resolution and there was hardly a dissenting voice in the whole gathering. What feeble resistance there was was beaten down by the majority after the different points had been debated on.

Man after man approved of the resolution and scorned the idea of being afraid of the international trades and labor and when the vote was taken and carried the roof rang with the cheers and roars of the delegates.

Some excitement was caused during the afternoon when David Rees, secretary of the United Mine Workers of Alberta, took the floor and declared that there was a number of police spotters and secret service men in the hall, and that one man, William Gosden, alias Smith, alias Brown, well known in Calgary labor circles, and an "enemy" was in the balcony of the hall.

### The Accusing Finger.

Every head turned in the direction of Mr. Rees' finger as he pointed to the figure of a man who sat in the balcony.

"That man," Mr. Rees said, "was known to the labor men as Smith. He went to Fernie, B.C., and tried to make strife there. (continued on Page Four.)"

## GOSDEN CAUSES EXCITEMENT AT LABOR MEETING

Some time later he made a visit to Hillcrest, thinking that it would be better for his plans if he changed his name to Brown, and succeeded in getting in on the miners' committee. He secured credentials to come to the convention as a miners' delegate. On the night he was to have left Hillcrest he was put under arrest by the police and the miners, thinking it was an innocent labor man that was in custody, nearly stoned the policemen who made the arrest.

**Sabotage.**  
After making some other accusations Mr. Rees sat down and the floor was taken by a Vancouver delegate who stated that Gosden came to Vancouver at the Island strike and tried to institute sabotage.

It was alleged that Gosden was distributing formulas among the younger members of the laboring class of a certain fluid, which if spread on the floor of a new building would set it on fire with in a very few minutes.

By this time the hall was in an uproar. "Throw him out," and "Show him the door" were heard on all sides. Someone suggested that Gosden be given a chance to explain, but this was overruled by the chairman who said that Gosden was only a visitor and he could not be permitted to speak.

**Rights as Visitor.**  
Another delegate stood up and asserted that Gosden could not be put out for the simple reason that the committee had set aside the balcony for visitors and Gosden was merely a visitor and within his rights in being present.

Mr. Kavanagh, the president of the conference, declared that as a labor body they were not afraid of police spotters, as everything that is being said and done is above board.

Another delegate stated that Gosden should be hauled to the front of the hall so that all could get a look at him. This suggestion was greeted with shouts of laughter.

The uproar died down, however, and Gosden was allowed to remain.  
Resolutions for a half holiday for postal workers; reimbursement for flu sufferers; May day to be considered a public holiday, were referred to the resolutions committee who will study the resolutions and report to the conference in the next day or two. A resolution on daylight saving and prohibition was thrown out. The "War" resolution was then passed and the convention adjourned.

LAND FOR SOLDIERS  
IS WANTED BY THE  
SETTLEMENT BOARD

Voluntary Co-operation of All is  
Desired in Order That Re-  
sults May be Obtained.

Ottawa, March 17.—In connection with its plans for the purchase of lands for the soldiers the Soldier Settlement Board desires to pay very strict attention in each case to the relation between the capital investment and the estimated productivity of the land, in order that the settler should not be over-burdened by undue capital debt. Land which is very high-priced because of being exceptionally well situated, or because located near some large centre, may be quite unsuitable for soldiers with limited capital, when equally productive land can be secured at very much less cost and located convenient to railways in more moderately priced districts. In the first case a settler might pay twice as much for land which would produce only the same as in the second case, while also in the first instance the settler might be assuming a capital burden beyond the productive capacity of the land.

Local Co-operation.

The plans for the ascertainment of suitable land in British Columbia will be supervised by the Board, with the active participation of Municipal or Local Authorities, local G.W.V.A. or committees of representative farmers qualified to advise the Board and the returned soldiers as to the merits of each agricultural proposition which is tendered to the Board in their immediate neighborhood.

Millions of Acres.

The voluntary co-operation of all is asked in the patriotic purpose of Soldier Land Settlement, land-owners as well as other private or public bodies. The war is not over until the reconstruction period is over. It is the duty of everyone to assist in reconstruction just as much as it was his duty to assist in the prosecution of the war. One of the many problems of reconstruction is the settlement on land of returned soldiers. There are millions of acres of fertile lands in Canada lying idle. There are men willing and anxious to cultivate them. It is desired that the returned soldiers should be able to secure the best and most competent advice in the matter of land selection.



## IMMENSE SUM FROM BUSINESS PROFITS

\$59,000,000 Collected to Date From Those Having Incomes Over \$2,000.

An official statement from the Department of Finance gives the following information respecting the administration of the Business Profits War Tax and of the Income War Tax of 1917. The returns from both these measures will exceed the estimate.

Under the Business War Tax Act assessments have been made aggregating sixty-five million dollars of which about fifty-nine million has been collected. The balance probably will be received within the next two months.

The returns to date from the Income War Tax Act of 1917, which applies only to incomes in excess of three thousand dollars in the case of married persons and two thousand in the case of unmarried persons, show that about thirty thousand assessments have been made, of which nineteen thousand are paid. The total amount of assessments made by the Department and approved to date aggregates five and a half million dollars. Three and a half million have been collected. The difference is represented mainly by assessments made last month. In connection with the income tax it is pointed out that firms and corporations subject to the Business Profits War Tax are not liable to income taxation provided that taxation under the Business Profits Act is equal or greater. The result is that a large portion of income taxation which would be otherwise collected if not assessable because of assessment under the Business Profits War Tax Act. If the Business Profits War Tax Act had not been in effect the collections under the Income War Tax Act would have been increased for the present year by eight million dollars. The assessments still to be made under the Income War Tax Act for the current year is estimated at about four million dollars. These figures indicate that the annual return from the income tax would be about eighteen million dollars. Branch offices for the administration of the income tax have been established at thirty of the chief centres of Canada. Great difficulty has been experienced in obtaining returns in various parts of the country, and recently a conference was held in Ottawa for the purpose of discussing effectual means of dealing with delinquents.
