## COMMUNAL LAND SCHEME DISCUSSED WITH MINISTER OF INTERIOR AT OTTAWA

REPRESENTATIVES OF EMPRESS OF ASIA COLONY PARTY  
GETS CONDITIONAL SUPPORT FROM HON.  
ARTHUR MEIGHEN AND SOLDIER  
SETTLEMENT BOARD

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, March 19.—Representatives of the party of 300 re-  
tired soldiers, who arrived some time ago on the steamer Em-  
press of Asia via the Panama Canal and who en route concocted  
a scheme for communistic land settlement, today waited on Hon.  
Arthur Meighen and the members of the Land Settlement Board  
in connection with their scheme.  
Previously they had laid their proposals before the British  
Columbia Government and received their endorsement. The  
delegation consisted of Lieut. A. J. Walker and Lieut. W. H. H.  
Baker and the British Colum-  
bians of Parliament.

## 70,000,000 FT. LUMBER ORDER BEEN PLACED

British Columbia Mills Will Be  
Kept Busy for Short Time  
as Result.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Victoria, March 19.—As a re-  
sult of the efforts made by Hon.  
T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands  
and representative of Prince Rup-  
ert in the Legislature, an order  
for 70,000,000 feet of lumber has  
been placed with British Colum-  
bia mills by the British Timber  
Controller.  
Mr. Pattullo has been working  
with this end in view ever since  
the signing of the armistice. The  
appointment of a provincial rep-  
resentative in London was done  
for this purpose. Direct com-  
munications have been passing  
regularly and frequently and the  
result is a happy consummation  
of the determined effort.  
It is understood that some of  
the lumber will be cut at Prince  
Rupert, but there is no definite  
information in this regard.

Indian Lands.  
The Minister of the Interior  
has been making an en-  
quiry as to the possibility of an  
arrangement being made to have  
some of the British Columbia  
Indian lands which would be placed  
at the disposal of the soldiers.

## OR CONVICTION UPHELD BY JUDGE

Liquor Co. Must Pay  
\$1,000 Set by Magistrate  
in Vancouver.

## NINE MILLION DEATHS RESULT OF GREAT WAR

Cost in Money Alone Much as  
Total Property Value of North  
America.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
San Francisco, March 19.—The  
cost of the war in money alone  
was \$197,000,000,000 or \$11,000,-  
000,000 more than the total prop-  
erty value of all North America,  
Secretary of War Baker told a  
gathering at the Commercial Club  
in honor of General March, Chief  
of Staff. Deaths from wounds in  
battle numbered 7,300,000 and to-  
tal deaths in all armies reached  
9,000,000.

## LIQUOR SALES HAVE INCREASED LARGELY

Prohibition Commissioner Before  
Public Accounts Committee  
at Victoria Tells of  
Change.

Victoria, March 19.—The sales  
of liquor from government stores  
on doctors' prescriptions have  
jumped from \$6,000 a year ago  
to \$50,000 in February of this  
year, in Vancouver, and from  
\$1,500 to \$12,000 in Victoria.  
This information was given the  
public accounts committee of the  
Legislature yesterday.

gratuities have been received at

partment of Militia from mem-  
bers of the Canadian Expedition-  
ary Force who were discharged  
prior to the signing of the armis-  
tice, November 11, 1918. Al-  
ready 26,000 first payments have  
been issued.

## JAPAN INSISTS RACE CLAUSE BE INSERTED

On Principles of Equity and Jus-  
tice Objects to Discrimination  
Against Any.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, March 19.—Hon. S.  
Fuyara, Japanese Consul General  
in Canada, says there are ten  
thousand Japanese in Canada, of  
which seven thousand are in  
British Columbia. Immigration  
into this country is restricted by  
an agreement, Japan not allowing  
more to come as the people are  
needed in their own country.  
Japan is insisting on an inser-  
tion in the League of Nations'  
constitution of a clause abolishing  
race discrimination in future  
on principles of equity and jus-  
tice.

## JEWISH NATIONAL HOME IN PALESTINE

Hebrew National Congress Would  
Have British Control in  
Native Land.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Montreal, March 19.—The He-  
brew Congress here adopted a  
resolution advocating the open  
door policy in regard to immigra-  
tion in order to facilitate the in-  
flux of central Europeans.  
The Congress further went on  
record as favoring the establish-  
ment of a Jewish national home  
in Palestine under Great Britain.

## NEW LABOR TREATY BETWEEN ITALY AND FRENCH REPUBLIC

Rome, March 18.—It is learn-  
ed authoritatively from a minis-  
terial source that the labor treaty  
between France and Italy will be  
signed soon. The treaty estab-  
lishes equality of treatment  
among national workmen and im-  
migrants in wages, in assistance,  
in social protection, while the  
benefits of the labor laws are ex-  
tended to the workmen of the op-  
posite country. Thus Italian  
workmen in France are ad-  
mitted to participation in pen-  
sions for laborers on the same  
footing as the French without  
exception or restriction, and the  
same thing applies to French  
workers in Italy.

The treaty also establishes the  
principle of transferring individ-  
ual accounts from one savings  
bank to another. The details  
and methods for procedure are  
determined by a special regula-  
tion which establishes the right  
of the Italian or Frenchman who  
returns to his native land before  
attaining the maximum limit of  
restriction demanded by the banks  
to enable him to enjoy the bene-  
fits of the law to share them  
whether in Italy or France.

Equal treatment is guaranteed  
also in rights and civic and pro-  
fessional privileges from which  
French laws until now has ex-  
cluded them. The provisions  
which prescribe conditions, grant-  
ing little favor to foreign labor-  
ers, especially in regard to giving  
them work, will not be applied to  
Italians in France and vice versa.

The provisions finally admit  
Italians to the schools of every  
grade, and provides for them  
and for their children schools  
where they can be educated in  
their mother tongue. Disputes  
will be arbitrated.

The treaty will remain in force  
for five years, and can be renew-  
ed. It will continue in force for  
a year from the time at which it  
is denounced.

## FREE TRADE IS AGAIN DISCUSSED IN COMMONS BY PROMINENT MEMBERS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, March 19.—Tariff matters were again to the front  
in the debate on the address which terminated in the Commons  
last night. The Prohibitionist side of the tariff argument was set  
forth by Col. J. A. Currie, while Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux stood  
by the Liberal platform as outlined by the Western Ontario Lib-  
erals in convention and J. F. Reid (MacKenzie) supported the  
views of the western farmers.

Col. Currie referred to the free trade talk as babble, and de-  
clared that unless the manufacturers receive a fair measure of  
protection, there will be no jobs in the factories for returned  
soldiers. Col. Currie accused President Woods of the United  
Farmers of Alberta, with being an "avowed annexationist" and  
produced a storm of protest from members of the prairie prov-  
inces when he asserted that grain growers of the west cannot  
compete with those of the United States.

## ALGERINE BOUGHT BY B. C. SALVAGE CO. TO REPLACE "TEES"

Well Known Sloop of War to be  
Put Into Useful Service.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Victoria, B. C., March 19.—The  
steamer Tees which took the place  
of the Salvor as a salvage vessel  
will now be replaced by H. M. C. S.  
Algerine.

The Algerine has been pur-  
chased by the B. C. Salvage Com-  
pany and will be converted into  
a salvage vessel. She is a sloop  
of war and for many years was  
stationed at Esquimalt. Later she  
was handed over to the Navy  
League to be used as a training  
ship but this was not a success  
and the plan came to nothing.

The Algerine is twenty years  
old. She served in China at the  
time of the Boxer rebellion, when  
she went up the Peiho River.  
During the time she made Esqui-  
malt her home port, her com-  
mander often brought her into  
Esquimalt Harbor with all sails  
set, her steam power alone not  
giving her very great speed.  
Probably she was the last of the  
war vessels to use sails. She  
will be re-equipped by her new  
owners and as soon as she is  
ready will be put into service.

## RAILWAY BILL IS HELD BY COMMITTEE

ed future company deposit of a  
sum of money as a guarantee of  
construction.

police commissioner for North

liquor was there illegally.  
Martinson who is head of the  
prohibition movement in North  
Vancouver, declared he had been  
the victim of a plant.

Arthur Davies, Chief of Police,  
who has been under suspension  
some days.

Ideal of Unity Very Appropriate.

"To make Prince Rupert a great city the people must be united and stand together, for without unity you cannot hope to accomplish anything successfully."

The paragraph quoted above was written by George Hudson, a pupil of the High School, in an essay on Prince Rupert. The essay was not a prize winner, but this concluding sentence was so good and so appropriate to the occasion that it is quoted for the benefit of all the people of the city. It is an epigram that might well be committed to memory.

It has been said in a book which is not read as much as it might be, that "a little child shall lead them." The pupils of the High School are not little children, but they are young and full of enthusiasm and many of them have high ideals. If they carry those ideals with them into life the next generation will be much better than the present. They will make the men of the present take a back seat and in a good many cases it will be for the good of the community for them to do so.

It is of course quite a different thing to hold ideals from trying to carry them out. It is easy to acquire ideals but it is difficult to put into practice the things which we believe to be right.

Another Opinion on Railway Situation.

Under the heading "A National Danger" the Montreal Star of March 4 had the following leading article:

"The Star has repeatedly expressed the opinion that the nationalization of the Canadian railways or of either one of the Canadian railways now privately operated, would be a very serious blunder for which the country would be called to pay heavily in the future.

"There is, however, another danger to Canada even more serious than this mad plan for nationalization and that is the danger of an amalgamation of the two privately owned existing roads under one management.

"The Star is informed from London that strenuous efforts are being made by C. P. R. representatives in England to secure control of the Grand Trunk Railway. There is an interest payment in Grand Trunk Pacific securities falling due this week and the obvious inability of the Grand Trunk to provide for this interest gives an opening to force the Grand Trunk to sell out.

"The Star believes that such an amalgamation or absorption would be nothing short of a national calamity. The future development of this sparsely-settled and widely extended country depends largely on the maintenance of efficient transportation and this in turn depends to a very great extent upon the continuance of genuine competition among existing railway systems. This country cannot afford to see its principal railway facilities swallowed up by any monopoly which could thereby assume virtual control of transportation in the most thickly populated and highly developed industrial areas of Canada.

"The scheme must not be allowed to bear fruit. It would be disastrous to Canada if it did."

# SOLDIERS MAY LEARN TRAWL FISHING HERE

### Dominion Government Urged to Establish School for Teaching Returned Men the Work.

Recommendations that Ottawa develop the fishing industry of the Pacific Coast were made in the Legislature at the week end in a report by Chairman G. G. McGeer of the soldier rehabilitation committee. The report proposes that the Dominion Government establish a trawling school for deep sea fishing, operated in connection with the naval training school at Esquimalt. There should also be fish curing, packing and marketing schools at Vancouver, Prince Rupert and Victoria, says the report.

If the Government of the Dominion does not see its way clear to undertake this work, then the entire fisheries of this province should be turned over to the Provincial Government by way of leasing the fishing grounds to the province.

### Conservation Urged.

The report suggests that fishing of the Fraser River does not offer advantages to the returned soldier in view of the great depletion since 1914. In support of this it is mentioned that the 1918 catch was 75,000 cases and in 1914, the brood year for 1918, the catch was 553,000 cases. Similar depletions, says the report, are being made in the northern rivers. A policy of conservation on the rivers of the province is held to be imperative.

Depletion in the halibut catch is also deplored and is one reason for the committee's recommendation that the Dominion take protective measures.

### Establish Facts.

"Your committee," says the report, "also found that a considerable amount of training is necessary before a man should engage in this particular occupation and that more vessels of a suitable type would be necessary."

"In the light of the above facts your committee humbly recommends that the Government of the Province of British Columbia urge upon the Dominion Government the establishment on the Pacific coast of a trawling school for the training of men to engage in deepsea trawl fishing, by providing a number of suitable vessels equipped for deepsea fishing, officered by experienced navigators, engineers and fishermen, who would act in the capacity of instructors, and to whom returned men could be apprenticed for instruction in navigation, operation of engines, care, casting and hauling of trawling nets, and the dressing, storing, curing, packing and shipment of fish, the men during their apprenticeship to be paid a proper living wage, and to be given a bonus from the ship's earnings after capital expenditure has been provided for."

# BANK INCREASES ITS CAPITAL STOCK

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Montreal, March 19.—The Bank of Montreal announces that owing to the issuance of 3,500 shares to shareholders of the Bank of British North America in fulfillment of the agreement to purchase the latter, the bank has to raise its capital stock to \$20,000,000.

### MACHINISTS AT WORK

Victoria, March 19.—Four hundred striking machinists have accepted the terms of the employers and have gone back to work. Under the Macdonald award they have been granted an extra two and a half cents.

# FREE TRADER YET SAYS COLONEL PECK

In the much quoted speech in the House of Commons Col. Peck said it was a great help to them at the front to know that they had behind them in Canada a strong, generous and chivalrous people. He mentioned especially the "fair women of our dear Canada who met day after day to organize those comforts and to prepare those parcels which cheered them in their warfare."

He criticized the Canadian Press Association for sending a statement to Canada that soldiers in riots had broken into girls' rooms. He said that it was officially stated that the soldiers had never gone into the nurses' quarters, but had behaved with absolute chivalry. He thought the authorities should look into this matter.

He had been four years overseas fighting for the principles of Liberalism and if the Liberal party had not come up to scratch it was no fault of his. He had had no belief in the Liberals getting on with the war, but the Unionist government had offered them a definite policy, while the Liberals' policy was of shifting sand. When the Liberal party could show him they had a more progressive policy and when they could convince him that they were in earnest and meant to pursue it, he would follow it.

### Free Trader.

"I am a free-trader," he said, amid loud cheers from the opposition, to which he retorted that he only wished they had had the same enthusiasm for free trade in this country during the last ten or twenty years. He said he had been a supporter of the Liberal party for a long time, but like Dr. Michael Clark, had found little difference between the two parties.

He said he was elected as a soldier candidate to support the Union Government and, he added, "I will do so until I see something better."

### SYNOPSIS OF

### LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims for less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

### PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

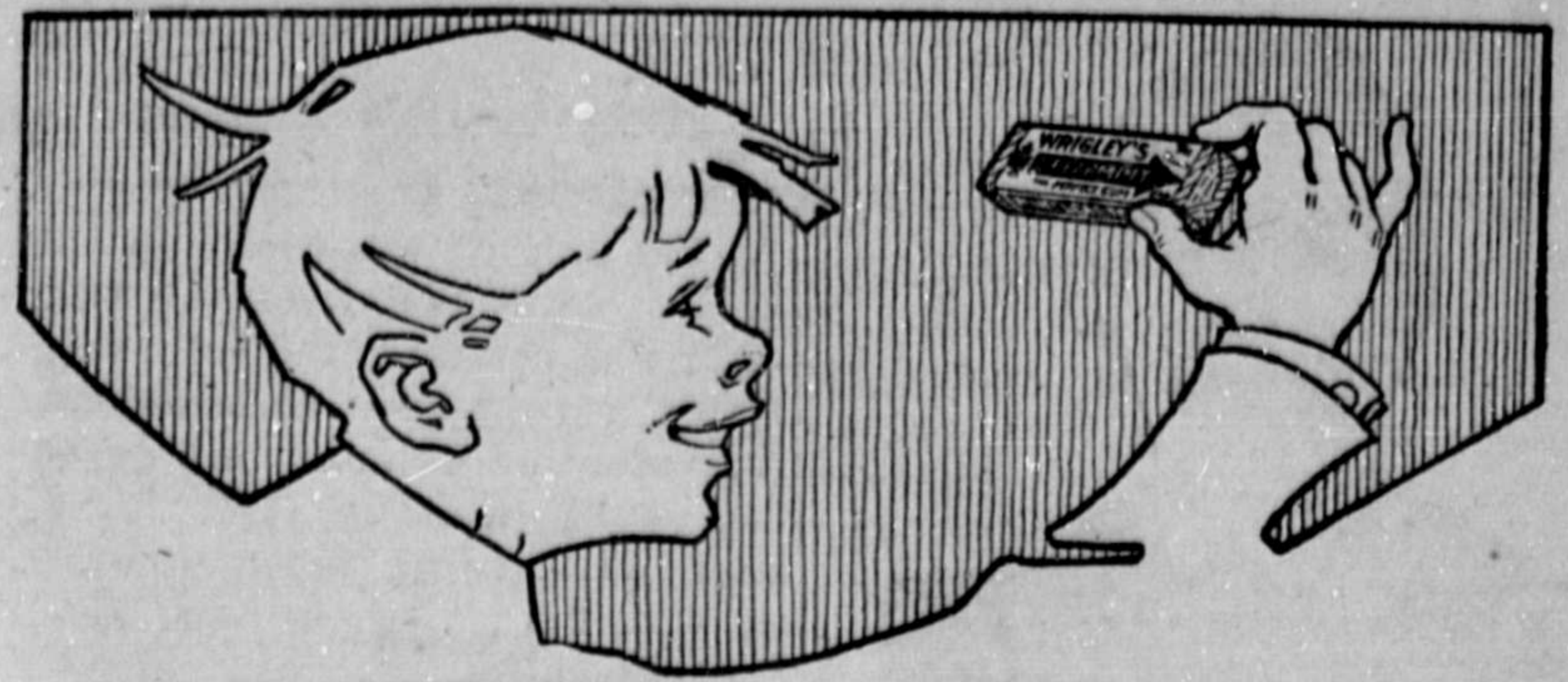
The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

### TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the land is sold are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

BIG RECEPTION BEING PLANNED FOR COL. PECK

Many Organizations Anxious to Do Him Honor When he Returns to His Home Town.

A joint meeting of the committees appointed by the City Council, the Great War Veterans and the Prince Rupert Unionist Association was held yesterday afternoon to make preliminary arrangements for a proper reception to Lieut.-Col. Determined to take a share in the harvest of the sea three Victorians, all at various dates employees in different departments of the Empress Hotel, have started a partnership in the halibut and associate fisheries off the West Coast banks, says the Victoria Times of recent date.

The leader of the party is Captain T. Exton, who operated his craft out of Grimsby, England, for more than thirty years before coming to this country some six years ago. Smith, a well known local fisherman, who has just relinquished his work at the hotel in order to join the enterprise. Mr. Smith will, however, have a new experience with this class of fishing in deep waters.

The third member, B. Senior, is an engineer, and will perform that work on the boat, sharing in the proceeds of the catch.

The boat began its work today, the trial trips having been carried out successfully.
