He will have supreme authority in all military and civil atters and will take expedient measures to restore order and aintain the protectorate over Egypt.

Unofficial advices show that disorders have spread through whole valley of the Nile from Cairo to Assuan.

General Allenby reached Cairo on Tuesday and has already ced the country under military control. The large number of ops already in Egypt are being reinforced, and active and imdiate steps are being taken to cope with the situation.



Army Appropriations.

The army appropriations asked for by Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary of state for war, were designed to cover all possible contingencies and are susceptible of a great saving, but the ordinary man fails to take that fact into account.

Another cause of dissatisfaction is the continuance of conscription in a limited measure and the general impatience to get the country to a peace footing.
