## GENERAL ALLENBY APPOINTED HIGH COMMISSIONER TO EGYPT OWING TO GRAVE SITUATION IN THAT COUNTRY

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
London, March 22.—Owing to the grave situation in Egypt, General Allenby, commander of the Allied forces in Palestine, has been appointed special High Commissioner for Egypt and the Sudan. He will have supreme authority in all military and civil matters and will take expedient measures to restore order and maintain the protectorate over Egypt.  
Unofficial advices show that disorders have spread through the whole valley of the Nile from Cairo to Assuan.  
General Allenby reached Cairo on Tuesday and has already placed the country under military control. The large number of troops already in Egypt are being reinforced, and active and immediate steps are being taken to cope with the situation.  
A large number of armed Bedouins have entered Beherira, a province of lower Egypt, robbing towns and villages.

## COMMISSIONER WILL ORGANIZE SCHEME LAND SETTLEMENT

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, March 22.—F. B. Stacey, M. P., of Chilliwack, B. C., leaves for British Columbia tomorrow, as the special representative of W. J. Black, Chairman Soldiers Settlement Board. The special mission is to direct the organizing of the soldier settlement scheme with arrangements made with representatives of the Empress of Asia soldiers co-operative community scheme. He will reach Vancouver on April 1. The community scheme was set down by the Dominion Government and later adopted under pressure had been brought forward through the British Columbia members of Parliament and the endorsement of the scheme by the Provincial Government.  
Ottawa, March 22.—The deputy representing the soldiers of the Empress of Asia proposed colonization scheme is returning in complete accord with the Soldiers Settlement Board for the settlement of land under the co-operative system.

Steamer Will Load at Prince Rupert Dock in April for United Kingdom.

## LOGS BEING PULPED AT SOUTHERN MILLS

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Vancouver, March 22.—The British Ministry of Shipping has arranged to clean up the spruce lumber which was collected and stored at Prince Rupert. The steamer Zamora will load two million feet for the United Kingdom, going on berth about the middle of April at Prince Rupert dock.  
The Zamora cleared for this port recently from Callao in Peru. After loading she will go to Great Britain by way of the Panama Canal.  
Twenty million feet of spruce logs, which are in storage on the booming grounds, are being turned into pulp at Swanson Bay and paper at Ocean Falls.

Two articles were raffled; that presented by Mrs. A. Nicholson being won by Mrs. D. Scott and the one from Mrs. Hale won by Mrs. Walker. Several members of the Symphony Orchestra were present and five instruments supplied delightful music for dancing which was kept up until the early hours.  
The receipts were about \$40, which will go to the funds of the Red Cross Society.

## BUILDING QUESTION

Board of Trade proposes to Call Meeting to Discuss it Next Week.

There has been much discussion over the question what is to be done to meet the situation which is serious.  
Full announcement in regard to the matter will be made at the beginning of the week.

## NEWMAN ERB PASSED THROUGH WINNIPEG

Newman Erb, executive member of the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Co., with headquarters in New York, passed through Winnipeg Thursday on his way to Prince Rupert. He is expected to reach the coast Sunday evening.

The trout fishing season opens on Tuesday next, March 25, and is free to all residents. Non-residents, however, must pay a license fee of a dollar a day for each day they fish or a fee of five dollars for the season. This is a Dominion Government license and in the west has not hitherto been enforced strictly.

## SHIPYARD MEN STRIKE WHEN WAGES REDUCED

Object to Carrying Out of Robertson Award Reducing Wage Cent and Quarter an Hour.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Port Coquitlam, March 22.—Shipyard workers numbering 250 have gone on strike here because their wages have been reduced under the Robertson award by a cent and a quarter an hour. The reduction was on the sliding scale adopted at the time of the former strike and was based on the cost of living which has been slightly reduced.  
The men were working on ships which are being built to the order of the French Government.

## DOMINION WILL SPEND MONEY IN PROVINCE FOR ROAD BUILDING

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, March 22.—In the House of Commons yesterday Hon. J. D. Reid, moved a resolution providing for the payment within the next five years of the sum of \$20,000,000 to the various provinces for the encouragement of the construction of good roads.

## CANADA'S CLAIM FOR DAMAGES FROM ENEMY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Ottawa, March 22.—Canadian claims against persons of enemy countries and against enemy Governments, were so far reported to total \$31,525,000. They comprise debts owing by individuals and corporations in Germany, Austria and lands allied with them to Canadians to amount of \$775,000; claims for property of Canadians in enemy countries aggregating \$750,000 and demands for compensation for damages due to illegal warfare \$30,000,000.

## STRIKE IN ENGLAND HAS BEEN DELAYED

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
London, March 22.—A triple alliance of railwaymen, miners and transport workers at a conference reviewed the whole position and passed a resolution recommending railwaymen to continue at work pending further negotiations with the Government. This action is interpreted to mean that there will be no strike before Wednesday.

## TERRACE MAN DIES AT GENERAL HOSPITAL

The death took place at the General Hospital yesterday of Thomas Smith, aged 19 years, from tuberculosis. The deceased was brought down from Terrace on Thursday night's train very ill, and was immediately taken to the hospital, where in spite of every attention, he was unable to rally. He was accompanied to town by his sister.  
Mr. Smith was born in Colorado and is the son of C. A. Smith, of Terrace. The funeral arrangements are in the hands of Hayner Brothers.

## REGIMENTS REFUSED TO SHOOT BOLSHEVIKI

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Paris, March 22.—It is reported that two regiments in the Odessa region mutinied when ordered to attack the Bolsheviks. They said they would not shoot their brothers.

Wong Kim, Leo Hong and Chow Hing charged with breaking into the Palace Cafe on 6th Street, were brought up for election this morning and chose speedy trial. They will be tried on Monday at 10 a.m. before Judge Young. They pleaded not guilty.

## GRAND TRUNK MADE OFFER TO DOMINION GOVERNMENT OF FIVE MILLIONS A YEAR

FOR THAT SUM ANNUALLY IT WOULD TURN OVER ALL HOLDINGS—CONTRA OFFER WAS MUCH LESS—IMPASSE SUBJECT OF DISCUSSION

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
London, March 22.—At the annual general meeting of the shareholders of the Grand Trunk Railway, Chairman Smithers of the Board of Directors said that the Canadian Government had offered the company an annuity of £740,000 at the end of eight years, over and above fixed charges.  
The company's offer to the Government, the chairman added, was to accept an annuity of £997,000 immediately in addition to what an arbitrator might give over and above that amount, or an immediate annual payment of £1,063,000 without arbitration. This would be approximately \$5,000,000.

The meeting unanimously passed a resolution which was cabled to the Dominion Government stating that the amount offered by the Canadian Government was inadequate.

**Generally Discussed.**  
Ottawa, March 22.—The Grand Trunk Railway impasse is the subject of general discussion at the capital. The railway has 3,555 miles of line in addition to the 1,963 miles of the Grand Trunk Pacific. The capital of the Grand Trunk is half a billion dollars and it was aided by the Dominion Government to the extent of about twelve millions. The earnings of the road are about forty millions and the operating expenses well over thirty millions.

**Will Fight.**  
That the railway will put up a fight for life is the general opinion in well informed circles, but on the other hand the Government seems equally determined to take it over.

## LAND SPECULATOR IS GOING TO VICTORIA TO MAKE A PROTEST

Objects to His Land Being Taken by the Government at \$5.00 an Acre When It Cost \$11.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)  
Winnipeg, March 22.—Lysle Abbott of Omaha, Nebraska, who represents a syndicate of American capitalists with large investments in British Columbia lands and who has 25,000 acres along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway is proceeding to Victoria to protest against the Land Settlement Board taking over at their appraised valuation their unencultivated farm lands.  
The Board has valued the lands at five dollars an acre when the owners claim that they represent an investment of eleven dollars an acre.

### Just as Good as In the Big Cities.

There is rather a tendency in the city to make light of local institutions. It is not uncommon, especially among young people, to hear disparaging remarks of the picture houses and the films which are shown. As a matter of fact the movie houses here are well up to the average, both in the accommodation and also in the class of picture shown.

All the pictures that are worth seeing are early or late shown in this city. There has not been a really big feature which has passed by without the people here getting a chance to see it. Sometimes they are slow getting here. It must not be expected that they will come as soon as they do in the cities that are in the circuits. They generally get here about the time they are taking their second runs in Vancouver.

They are just as good here, however, as they are in Vancouver or Victoria. Sometimes they are a little old but they are the same pictures. The quality is the same. On account of there being but two shows here as against a large number in the big cities it is possible to pick fairly high class showings all the time so that if anything the average here is better than in any house in the big centres.

### Business Integrity Is Great Asset.

The whole fabric of modern business and industry is based on confidence, says the Financial Post. Anyone, be he retailer, wholesaler, or manufacturer, who breaks faith with another, takes a slash at business in general. There are those who break their contracts when prices decline, and feel safe in the knowledge that it would cost too much to litigate, and the judgment would not cover all the loss of money, and none of the loss of time. Sometimes a real business man does get disgusted, and in spite of his loss, he gives the offender a lesson on the ethics of business for the benefit of the country in general. There are, however, large numbers of the small calibre business man who manage to stay in business, sit tight while markets rise, and welsh when prices decline—usually escaping the penalty, probably because the game is not worth the ammunition.

### Clever Tricks But Dishonest.

It has been known for a carload of canned fish from the Pacific coast, packed and labelled to the order of an Atlantic house, to be cancelled by wire a few days before date of shipment because the market has declined, and the shipper, with a carload of canned fish on his hands, was told, "He could use his own judgment about shipping, but the stock would be refused on inspection." What powers of clairvoyance! It has been known that a carload of eastern jams has been accepted en route only on greatly modified terms, by the consignee in the west, which simply meant that goods were received under terms and at prices which, had the shipper known, the goods would never have been shipped. It has been known that cars of fresh fruit from the fertile valley of the Fraser have been refused on arrival on the Prairie—except they were delivered to the "Buyer" on consignment only, and the wily shipper, instead of "falling," took the night train, and reached the Prairie point to find the cars well iced, and unopened.

There is a serious lack of the fundamental basic principles of honesty evident among some engaged in business, and it is the duty of every business man to stamp out the unprincipled, unethical member wherever his presence is discovered. Make it unprofitable to be morally as well as legally dishonest.

### Trout Fishing Opens During Coming Week.

The trout fishing season opens next week. While it is yet a little early for good results it will not be long before local anglers will be away to the streams and will be seen returning with strings of speckled beauties.

Fishing is good in this neighborhood. For those who can get that far the Khtada Lake and river offer great opportunities, but there are plenty of points nearer home where the dolly varden or the brook trout can be lured from their haunts by fly or bait.

Already there are a number of ardent Waltonites who are overhauling their tackle and will be out to test out the best pools just as soon as the season opens.

## REV. W. E. COLLISON TELLS OF HISTORY OF FIRST VOYAGEURS

Captain Vancouver Who Surveyed  
Coast in 1793 Missed Columbia,  
Fraser, Skeena and  
Naas Rivers.

One of the most interesting addresses delivered before the St. Andrew's Society was given last evening by the Rev. W. E. Collison, when he spoke of the North American coast, and gave a most interesting history of its geographic nomenclature. Mr. Collison told of the first known facts concerning this coast, and of the visit of Captain Cook, that intrepid explorer, and later of Captain Vancouver, who continued the survey work for the British Government.

### Coast Names.

The story of the derivation of the names given by Captain Vancouver to the physical features he found on the coast was particularly interesting. The full name of Vancouver Island as it was christened by Captain Vancouver was the Island of Vancouver and Quadra, Quadra being in consideration of the Spanish captain who endeavored uselessly to maintain the sovereign rights of his Spanish Majesty to the whole coast from Mexico north.

### Local Points.

Dean Channel, Brown Passage, Stephen Island, Dundas Island, Observatory Inlet, Chatham Strait and Lynn Canal were some of the names given to these respective places by Captain Vancouver during his voyage in 1793. Salmon Cove, near Anyox, was where the captain anchored for a whole month, and there he built his small observatory for the correction of his instruments, and hence came the name.

### Captain Mears.

Captain Mears, who founded the first trading post on the coast at Nootka Sound, came across the Pacific from China, some two years previous to Captain Vancouver's excursion. He was the first man to put on record the fact of the economy of Chinese labor.

Mr. Collison had several incidents to tell from the Indian legends which have come down from the period contemporary with the first white men's visit, which rounded off a very delightful and interesting address.

### Musical.

The evening was the more pleasurable by means of a fine musical program, and supper was served about 11 o'clock. There was a large number of the members of the society present, with their wives and friends and there was not a vacant seat.

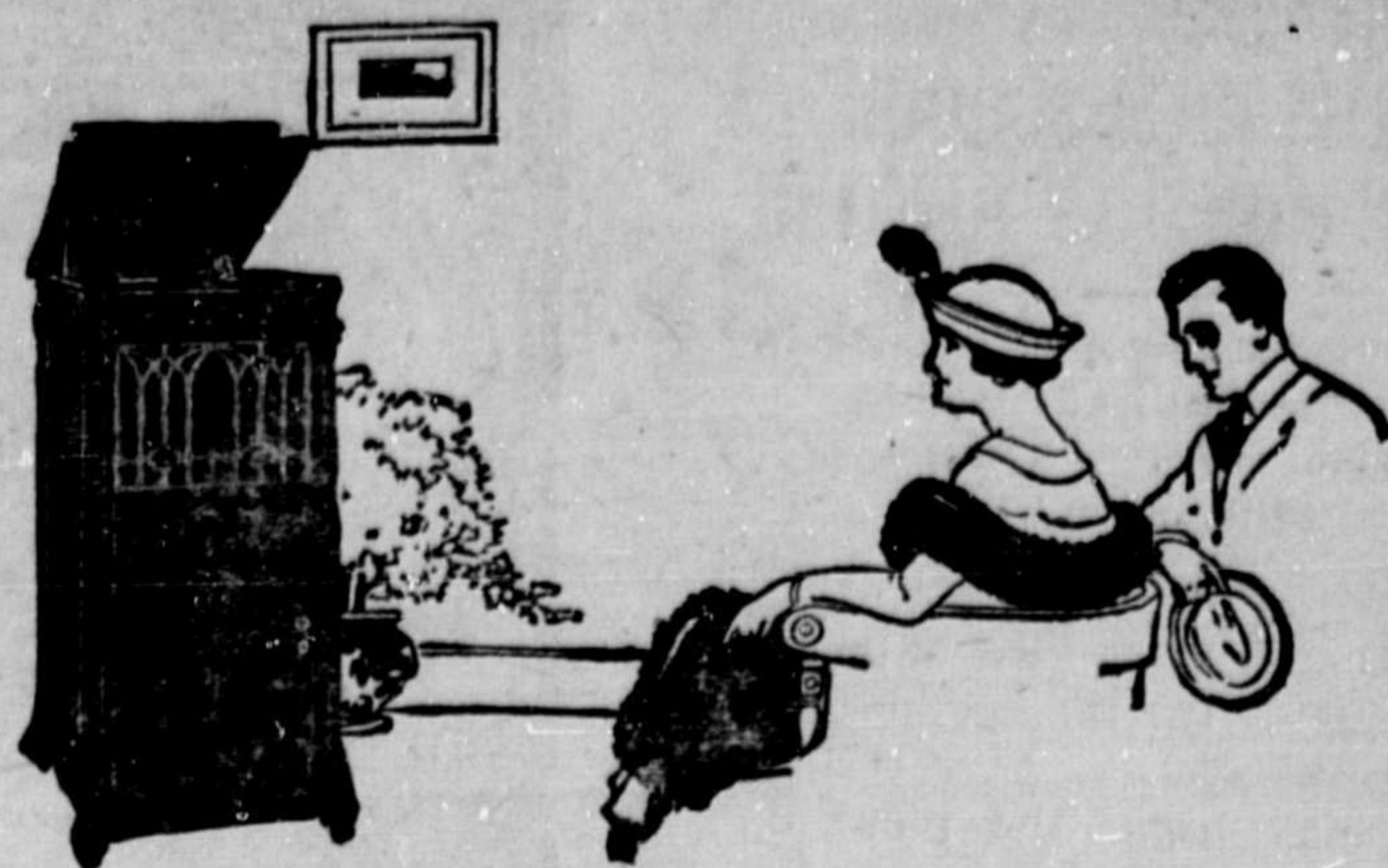

## BY-ELECTIONS GOING AGAINST GOVERNMENT IN GREAT BRITAIN

London, March 22. — Politicians look upon the result in the parliamentary election in the West Leyton division as a sharp reminder to the coalition government of Premier Lloyd George of popular discontent. The division returned A. E. Newbould, an Independent Liberal, who was defeated in December, by a majority of 2,000 over K. F. Mason, Coalition Unionist. In the general election in December, the Coalition Unionist, Colonel Wrightson, whose death made today's election necessary, polled 11,000 votes to Newbould's 2,000.

This result, with the fact that Rear Admiral Sir W. R. Hall, Coalition Unionist, was returned for the West Derby division of Liverpool recently by a greatly decreased majority is taken to show that the political tide is turning.

### Approved by Premier.

In the case of Admiral Hall, the Coalitionists were able to argue that the result meant merely that his predecessor, Sir W. E. Smith, since appointed Lord High Chancellor, enjoyed unusual prestige and personal popularity. The Newbould case is different. Premier Lloyd George wrote a letter approving the candidacy of Mr. Mason as a supporter of the coalition government. Mr. Newbould then sent a letter to the Premier pointing out that Mason consistently voted against the Liberal policy of Lloyd George and against his social measures, whereas Newbould had always supported the policy of Lloyd George. The Premier failed to reply to the letter, and the Liberals made great capital of the fact.

### Financial Policy.

Politicians credit this change in sentiment to the government's financial policy, of which C. F. G. Masterman, financial secretary to the treasury in the Asquith cabinet, calls the "Road to Ruin."

coming fiscal year which the government has introduced in the House of Commons in the last few days, included £440,000,000 for the army, which is more than ten times the scale before the war; £149,000,000 for the navy, which is roughly five times the rate before the war; £65,000,000 for the service budget and £495,000,000 for the civil service, the appropriation for the civil service being nearly two and a half times the government's annual expense before the war.

### Army Appropriations.

The army appropriations asked for by Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary of state for war, were designed to cover all possible contingencies and are susceptible of a great saving, but the ordinary man fails to take that fact into account.

Another cause of dissatisfaction is the continuance of conscription in a limited measure and the general impatience to get the country to a peace footing.
