#### Better Accommodation For Visiting Indians.

Now that the Agricultural Association is coming to life and commencing to get ready for the work of the coming season, it might be time to begin to consider the question of providing some better accommodation for the thousand visiting natives that come from all parts of the north at the time of the fair.

Last year the conditions were a disgrace, and yet there were buildings in the city which were not being used. It has been | suggested that each of the churches might make arrangements to look after its own people. Practically all the Indians are Christians and belong to the denominations which are represented here. If the use of some of the church buildings were given for that week the service would be a favorable one. If no one else | provides for these visitors the city should certainly take some steps to look after them.

Some of the missionaries and others who felt themselves |\* more or less responsible for the well being of the natives when |\* here last year, stated that if nothing was done to prepare for these visitors before next fair they would use their influence to

keep them away from this place. Prince Rupert merchants profit very largely from the visit of the Indians at fair time and they cannot afford to allow anything to keep them away. For that reason alone, if for no other, they should insist that preparations be made to care for the visitors. It is a shame and a disgrace that young men and women should have to stay in the cabarets all night or walk the streets simply because there is no other place in town where they can be accommodated.

#### Building Wight be Used Wuch Wore.

The Exhibition Building is a dead loss to the community. I has so far proved to be a poor investment. It is used for one week during the year for the exhibition and then on one or two other improvements.





Editor The News:-

The Northern British Columbia Agricultural and Industrial Association was founded in 1914, and its charter was based on the promotion of industrial and agricultural objects, together with the holding of an annual exhibition at Prince Rupert for the district.

In the hands of its founder and secretary, Mr. L. Bullock-Webster now in uniform, it held a very creditable affair in 1914, more so seeing that it was held after the outbreak of the war, and his efforts were ably supported by the local and district business men, both as to time and money.

In my hands as secretary in 1915 and 1916, his work was carried on along the same lines still further and the work was again ably supported by the business men of the community and others interested.

#### Salaries Paid.

In 1914 the secretary was paid \$1,000 for his time. In 1915 the work was done by myself in conjunction with the publicity work of the Board of Trade, for which the Board of Trade received \$33.33 per month from the Agricultural Association. In 1916 I was paid \$600 with permission to do any other work I wished. I found I had very little time for other work if I was to do justice to the Association's work. In 1917 and 1918 the same rate prevailed.

#### Policy Changed.

This Association is a public institution and is supported by public funds and I take it that criticism in the interests of the community is in order. I have no intention of casting any reflection on the work of the Association, provided it keeps to the lines of its foundation and charter. Both in 1917 and 1918 was turned into a commercial affair, what with "beauty competitions and potlatches." The exhibits were a byword and the re-





Every person who in 1918 resided or ordinarily resided in Canada or was employed in Canada or carried on business in Canada, including corporations and joint stock companies.

### WHO SHOULD FILE RETURNS.

Every unmarried person or widow or widower, without dependent children under twenty-one years of age, who during calendar year 1918 received or earned \$1,000 or more.

All other individuals who during calendar year 1918 received or earned \$2,000 or more.

Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$3,000, during the fiscal year ended in 1918.

### FORMS TO BE FILLED IN AND FILED.

FORM T1. By individuals, other than farmers and ranchers. FORM T1A. By farmers and ranchers.

FORM T2. By corporations and joint stock companies. FORM T3. By trustees, executors, administrators of estates and assignees.

FORM T4. By employers to make return of the names of all directors, officials, agents or other employees to whom was paid \$1,000 or more in salaries, bonuses, commission or other remuneration during the calendar year 1918.

FORM T5. By corporations, joint stock companies, associations and syndicates to make return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1918. Individuals comprising partnerships must file returns in their

#### individual capacity. GENERAL INFORMATION

All returns must be filed IN DUPLICATE.

Forms may be obtained from the Inspectors and Assistant Inspector of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres. Returns should be filed immediately.






