HUNGARY IS REPORTED TO BE DECLARING WAR AGAINST THE ALLIES; GOVERNMENT RESIGNS

Nearly All Country With Exception of Budapest Now Occupied by Allied Troops for Purpose of Suppressing Bolshevik Gangs and Restoring Order; Karolyi Resigns and Alexander Corbai President.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Budapest, March 24.—The Hungarian cabinet headed by Count Karolyi has resigned, leaving the government to the proletariat. This action was taken after Count Karolyi had communicated to the cabinet the Entente note outlining the new boundary between Hungary and Rumania.

State of War.

London, March 24.—The new Budapest Government is reported signing a proclamation acknowledging a state of war between Hungary and the Entente, says a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Vienna. The Czecho Slovak Government is preparing to issue mobilization orders.

New President.

Copenhagen, March 24.—Alexander Gorbai has assumed the presidency of the revolutionary government of workers, peasants and soldiers' councils, according to a despatch from Budapest Saturday. Bela Kun becomes Foreign Commissary and Joseph Pogany War Commissary. It is reported that Kun has fled to Lenine for armed resistance.

Country Occupied.

London, March 24.—Allied troops in the past few days have occupied the greater part of Hungary with the exception of Budapest and surrounding districts for the purpose of suppressing disorder by Bolshevik gangs and restoring order, according to a despatch from Vienna.

Copenhagen, March 24.—The Berlin Lokal Anzeiger's Budapest correspondent says an army of 70,000 men has been formed under the command of Major Georgey, of non-Socialists, those from the rural population supporting the new Government. It is reported that the extreme Socialists intend to proclaim a soviet republic. Red Russian troops are reported to have moved at Tarnopol.

Allied With Bolsheviks.

Copenhagen, March 24.—The new Hungarian Government proclaimed a solidarity with the Russian Soviet Government and an armed alliance with the proletariat of Russia.

Paris, March 24.—Hungary's alliance with the Bolsheviks facilitates the occupation of strategic centres in Europe, is the opinion of the peace delegates today. Allied monitors moved up the Danube river from Belgrade today in an attempt to reach Budapest to restore order and protect the Allied representatives.

NEWMAN ERB ASKS PRINCE RUPERT TO BACK HIM GETTING TEN SHIPS TO PLY FROM HERE TO ORIENT

Says Great Railway Back of Us and Foundation of Great Shipyard But Need Oriental Traffic As a Vitalizer; Housing Must Be Attended to by Municipality.

JEWS WERE MASSACRED

Bolshevik Invasion of Ukraine is Disastrous to Members of Semite Race.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

New York, March 24.—In the Bolshevik invasion of the Ukraine resulting in a program in which thousands of Jews were massacred, 5,000 were killed or wounded in Proskurov. Hundreds of Jews were killed in Berdichev, Zhitomir and other places. They were instigated by Polish anti-Semites.

CONDITION IN EGYPT IS MUCH IMPROVED

Bedouins Attacked British Troops But Were Repulsed With Losses.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, March 24.—Reuter's Agency says telegrams received Sunday evening show continued improvement in the situation in Egypt but the Delta region is still disturbed.

Bedouins attacked British troops in the province of Fayum, Middle Egypt, but were repulsed with losses.

SKILLED AND UNSKILLED LABOR IS TO BE EXCLUDED FROM ENTRY INTO CANADA

CHINESE NOT TO BE ALLOWED TO COME INTO COUNTRY AND THOSE HERE MAY LEAVE—ORDER PASSED AT THE REQUEST OF B. C. MEMBERS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, March 24.—Hon. J. A. Calder, Minister of Immigration, following representations of British Columbia members, has decided to put regulations in effect to enforce the order prohibiting the entry into Canada of skilled and unskilled labor.

Shipping companies are to be instructed not to carry new Chinese immigrants. The head tax of 120 Chinese now in China awaiting transportation will be returned and entry refused.

All the Chinese who were in Canada three months before the armistice was signed and who wish to return to China will be deported and the head tax returned. All Chinese now in the country who have paid the head tax as students and cannot show definitely that they are bona fide students will be deported. Further admission of Chinese disguised as students, merchants, or otherwise will be effectively prohibited.

The period of return of Chinese having the right to return to Canada from China will be extended so that they will remain in China during the period of reconstruction.

TAXATION IS REPORTED ON

Board Headed by Robert Haig of Columbia University Makes Many Recommendations.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Victoria, March 24.—After two years the Taxation Board, headed by Prof. Robert Haig of Columbia University, brought in a report. It commends that a permanent board of taxation be appointed and that the property tax be abolished and the income tax extended as the most equitable means of provincial taxation. The banks, salmon canneries and such institutions should be placed under the income tax. Farm taxation is said to be too high, but the report favors continuance of the mineral tax.

The report agrees with Vancouver's proposal regarding the business tax in addition to a tax on land values, but opposes the collection of an amusement tax.

BELGIANS ASKING AMERICAN MONEY

Bank Acceptances Becoming Again Popular as Instruments of Credit.

New York, March 22.—The movement to increase the use of bank acceptances as instruments of credit is reported as growing very fast, particularly in the west, where it is expected that a number of new discount companies will be in operation by the time the fall crops begin to move.

The action recently taken by the New York Clearing House Association in ruling that charges shall be optional on the collection of acceptances, for which credit is available at the New York Federal Reserve Bank on the day of maturity, is expected to facilitate greatly the movement to popularize the acceptance business.

Following the recent arrangement for the establishment here of heavy credit in favor of Belgian merchants to facilitate trade with this country, came the news this week that the Belgian Government is negotiating with American bankers for a loan of \$100,000,000 to take the form of a bond issue to be offered to the American investing public.

Two fishing schooners arrived late this morning, they were the Omaney with 65,000 lbs. of halibut, and the Speculator with 5,000 lbs. The sales of the catches of these two boats will take place tomorrow morning in the fish exchange.

"I have been in the transportation business for the past forty years and am one of the oldest transportation businessmen in the United States. Based on my experience during that time I consider the possibilities of transportation here are first rate. There is a great railway back of Prince Rupert, but the business consists so far of ninety per cent possibilities and ten per cent reality." This was the way in which Newman Erb, chairman of the Board of Directors of the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Co., opened a conversation with a Daily News representative at noon today.

Shipbuilding Plant.

Continuing Mr. Erb said that they had the foundation of a great shipyard here, but it too consisted of ninety per cent possibilities and ten per cent reality. The whole project needed a vitalizer in the way of Oriental traffic.

Discussing this further Mr. Erb said that he wanted the people of Prince Rupert to stand back of him to get the Dominion Government to assign ten of the ships which they are building to operate between this port and the Orient. He wanted to enlist the best efforts of the community with this end in view. If the Government would not operate the boats then they might let them acquire the vessels on reasonable terms.

Housing Necessary.

Turning to the matter of housing, Mr. Erb said he wanted the people here to help in the matter. The company could undertake to do only part of the work, the municipality should do the rest. As the News representative entered the private car Toledo Mr. Erb and Messrs. Mullen and Schellenberg were looking up some data on housing schemes at Portsmouth, New Hampshire, where the Government had spent from three to four million dollars on it.

Built Many Miles.

Mr. Erb would not talk about himself except to say that he had built more miles of railway than any living man, with one exception. Transportation is his line and that is what he is interested in.

At the Canadian Club.

Mr. Erb will address the Canadian Club tomorrow at one o'clock in the Prince Rupert Hotel when he will further elaborate his schemes and suggestions. He is full of energy, says what he has to say and then stops.

As a railway man Mr. Erb has been connected with a great many, and he has made them successful. He has also had to do with other business concerns, but he likes transportation best. He was at the shipyards early this morning, having arrived in his private car shortly before midnight last night.

This morning Mr. Erb was waited on by J. D. McAuley, secretary of the Canadian Club who made arrangements for him to attend the luncheon.

Better Accommodation For Visiting Indians.

Now that the Agricultural Association is coming to life and commencing to get ready for the work of the coming season, it might be time to begin to consider the question of providing some better accommodation for the thousand visiting natives that come from all parts of the north at the time of the fair.

Last year the conditions were a disgrace, and yet there were buildings in the city which were not being used. It has been suggested that each of the churches might make arrangements to look after its own people. Practically all the Indians are Christians and belong to the denominations which are represented here. If the use of some of the church buildings were given for that week the service would be a favorable one. If no one else provides for these visitors the city should certainly take some steps to look after them.

Some of the missionaries and others who felt themselves more or less responsible for the well being of the natives when here last year, stated that if nothing was done to prepare for these visitors before next fair they would use their influence to keep them away from this place.

Prince Rupert merchants profit very largely from the visit of the Indians at fair time and they cannot afford to allow anything to keep them away. For that reason alone, if for no other, they should insist that preparations be made to care for the visitors. It is a shame and a disgrace that young men and women should have to stay in the cabarets all night or walk the streets simply because there is no other place in town where they can be accommodated.

Building Might be Used Much More.

The Exhibition Building is a dead loss to the community. It has so far proved to be a poor investment. It is used for one week during the year for the exhibition and then on one or two other occasions. During the remainder of the year it is idle.

It is a much worse waste than to keep church buildings idle six days in the week and to use them only on Sundays, yet there are so many uses to which the building might be put. Perhaps when it is finished some arrangements might be made that this really valuable edifice may be used by the community on regular occasions, perhaps every day.

Valuable Library in Hut on Third Ave.

There are a good many people who are not aware that there is a really good collection of excellent books at the Red Cross Hut which can be borrowed for a small consideration. Practically all day Friday the hut is open and on Tuesday evenings Mrs. Backus is there in charge. Those who do not know what volumes to choose will get valuable help from the librarian who has read them all.

Some day we shall have a free public library. In the meantime there is the nucleus of a good collection at the Red Cross Hut. Those who have books which they do not want would do well to hand them over to the library, and those who wish to borrow books will find a good choice there.

Alaska for The Alaskans.

A report received from Southern Alaska says that the canners there have agreed to employ so far as possible Alaska people in their business this year. The matter was taken up by their publicity bureau with excellent results.

This suggests to Prince Rupert people that the northern British Columbia canners might take a hint from the Alaska canners. This should be the centre of supply both for labor and goods to the canneries of the Skeena and the Naas, as well as the Queen Charlottes and if sufficient pressure is brought to bear it will be found that we shall get the business. We must keep after it if we are to succeed.

NEW ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION FORMED HERE

Officers Elected at Meeting Saturday Night and Another to be Held Wednesday.

AIM TO ENCOURAGE
ALL KINDS OF SPORTS

Improvement of Playgrounds and
Establishment of Gymnasium
Among Objects.

A preliminary meeting with the object of forming an athletic association was held on Saturday night when officers were elected and plans discussed. A further meeting is to be held on Wednesday night in the council chamber, provided permission can be secured, at which a complete executive will be chosen and further arrangements made.

The officers chosen were: Hon. president, the chairman of the school board; president, J. C. McLennan; first vice-president, D. G. Stewart; second vice-president, J. C. Brady; sec.-treas., D. McD. Hunter.

General Plan.

The general plan of the new association is to approach the Agricultural Association with a view to securing the use of the exhibition building to be used as a gymnasium.

That this gymnasium will be in charge of a competent gymnast who will be paid to give his whole time to the work of instructing classes, supervising the building and encouraging sports and games in the city.

That the athletic grounds be improved so that it may be used for all kinds of games and sports.

School Grounds.

That the influence of the association be used to secure the improvement of the school playgrounds so that the children may have plenty of opportunity to play both in dry weather and wet.

That the association co-operate with any other association with a view to encouraging healthful sports and games throughout the city.

The meeting was called by J. C. McLennan who has been interesting himself in the scheme for some time and it is hoped that the co-operation of the whole city may be secured in a work which is so badly needed.

Apparatus Presented.

Already a set of gymnastic apparatus has been presented to the new association by Mr. Foster, and if permission is secured to use the exhibition building, these will be installed at once and further apparatus purchased.

A committee of one was appointed to try to make arrangements for the association to meet the school board and to lay before them the desirability of improving and enlarging the school playgrounds, this being a necessity for the healthful development of the young people of the city. The movement was chiefly directed to providing for the young people, particularly those attending school or who have not long since been at school.

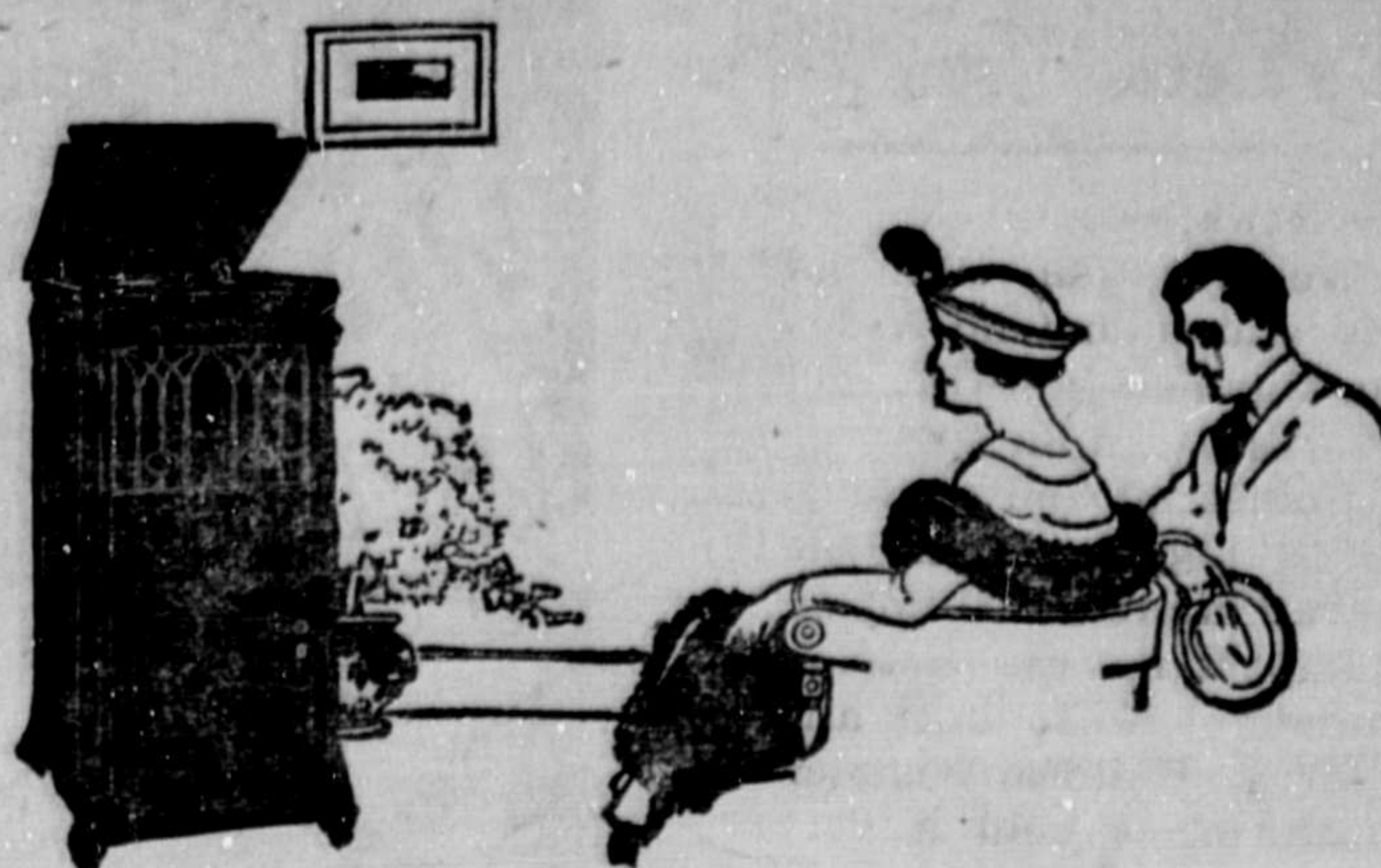

In the Letter Box

Editor The News:—

The Northern British Columbia Agricultural and Industrial Association was founded in 1914, and its charter was based on the promotion of industrial and agricultural objects, together with the holding of an annual exhibition at Prince Rupert for the district.

In the hands of its founder and secretary, Mr. L. Bullock-Webster now in uniform, it held a very creditable affair in 1914, more so seeing that it was held after the outbreak of the war, and his efforts were ably supported by the local and district business men, both as to time and money.

In my hands as secretary in 1915 and 1916, his work was carried on along the same lines still further and the work was again ably supported by the business men of the community and others interested.

Salaries Paid.

In 1914 the secretary was paid \$1,000 for his time. In 1915 the work was done by myself in conjunction with the publicity work of the Board of Trade, for which the Board of Trade received \$33.33 per month from the Agricultural Association. In 1916 I was paid \$600 with permission to do any other work I wished. I found I had very little time for other work if I was to do justice to the Association's work. In 1917 and 1918 the same rate prevailed.

Policy Changed.

This Association is a public institution and is supported by public funds and I take it that criticism in the interests of the community is in order. I have no intention of casting any reflection on the work of the Association, provided it keeps to the lines of its foundation and charter. Both in 1917 and 1918 it was turned into a commercial affair, what with "beauty competitions and potlatches." The exhibits were a byword and the re-

sult is presumably another change in the secretaryship.

Notwithstanding the fact that apparently the Association only got what it paid for, namely \$600 worth of organization work in the last two years, and reckless of the fact that it takes time, brains, experience and initiative worthy of more remuneration, to get the result the Association set itself out in the first place to attain, they are again advertising for \$600 worth.

Cheap Show.

No doubt the Association as in past years will appeal for public subscriptions to stage the 1919 exhibition. If supported as in previous years they will roughly handle about \$10,000 of public monies, and is it not up to the people of the district and city to see that the Agricultural and Industrial features are not neglected as in the two past years. Now this is where the secretary comes in. On him everything depends. Cheaply paid he puts on a cheap show. Cheap shows are the easiest line of effort but mean neglect of the most important objects.

The directors are again advertising for a secretary for nine months' work for \$600. Will they get one? Surely they will. If he is unsophisticated he will give them \$2,000 worth of time and experience for \$600. If he is not; well he gets \$600 anyhow so why should he worry.

Cheapest Possible Price.

What is the matter with the board of directors. Do they believe the business men of Prince Rupert believe in staging affairs of this description with sweated labor. Do they believe the trade unions agree to their policy of paying the cheapest possible price and getting cheap results. Do they not understand that public opinion these days consider every man worthy of his hire. Do they not realize how damaging it is to the self respect of every community to have other communities read an advertisement in which an association of this description advertises for a secretary who has the skilled work of staging a successful exhibition each year in his hands, and is only willing to pay a pittance of \$66 a month for his labors.

Fair Play.

Mr. Editor, this letter is no selfseeking effort for publicity, but is written with the object of fair play. Fair play to the Association and its members, fair play to the man who works for them, and even fair play to the directors themselves, above all fair play to Prince Rupert as a community.

The Ingred sold 4,000 lbs. of halibut to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Company, for 14 and 7.2c. per pound.

The salmon boat Leish arrived in with 900 lbs. of salmon this morning and sold to the Atlin Fisheries, Ltd., for 18½c. for the reds, and 10c. for the whites per pound.

An Indian boat came in shortly afterwards with about a ton of Oolachans from the Naas river, and sold for 6c. per pound.
