NEWMAN ERB IN ADDRESS TO CANADIAN CLUB TELLS OF THE CITY'S POSSIBILITIES

FAMOUS TRANSPORTATION MAN AND HEAD OF LOCAL SHIPBUILDING CONCERN HAS CONFIDENCE IN ESTABLISHMENT OF ORIENTAL STEAMSHIP LINE

At the luncheon given this afternoon in the Hotel Prince Rupert by the Canadian Club in honor of Mr. Newman Erb of the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Company in addressing the club, Mr. Erb said:

"I feel grateful for this opportunity to meet with you whom I have known and those associated with me expect to have more or less intimate personal and business relations which I hope may prove to be of benefit and service to the people of Prince Rupert and of your province."

In speaking to you here today I shall confine myself to a few points with which I have been personally identified for more than twenty years, because it is one I know more about than any other. Besides it intimately concerns the development in which we have now become interested—the development industrially and commercially not only of Prince Rupert but of the entire province of British Columbia as a whole. I refer to transportation."

"I believe you all appreciate the importance of that development in every phase of endeavor, commercial, industrial, agricultural and national, as its foundation, transportation."

Mr. Erb pointed out that the progress and growth of every commercial undertaking depended on the character and efficiency of transportation. He emphasized the difference between the railway industry and all other industries, inasmuch as the investment capital was not turned over in business in anything like the same ratio as in any other. With small margins to work upon it ought to be brought into a co-ordination with costs, so that any increase or decrease in costs would be promptly reflected in the rates."

"We want transportation at a reasonable return upon invested capital, with the ability to conduct non-revenue producing improvements. Where new territory is to be served a generous governmental policy to enable new undeveloped transportation to ride over the developing road should be encouraged, instead, demanded, but private initiative should be stimulated."

"I desire now to say a few words about your magnificent harbor and shipping possibilities. Whether you can build up a port here which will attract the argosies to

Former Deputy Minister of Public Works Distinguished Himself As a Soldier.

Hundreds of Stampeders Already Have Everything Staked for Miles Around This New-est Strike.

MANY QUESTIONS DISCUSSED IN THE CANADIAN COMMONS

Deportation of Aliens, Conscientious Objectors and Highway Building Proposals Are All Subjects of Debate—Emigration Is Before Peace Conference.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, March 25.—That Germany, Austria and Turkey be made pay as much indemnity as possible was the opinion expressed by Sir Thomas White, Acting Premier, in the House of Commons, in discussing a resolution to the effect that Premier Borden be instructed to claim an indemnity from Germany corresponding to the amount the war cost Canada.

Alien Deportations.
H. S. Clements had a motion calling for prompt action in regard to the deportation of alien enemies who have been interned.

GOVERNMENT OFFERS TO PAY THIRD OF COST

Bridge May Be Built Over Morse Creek to Section Two.

At the Council meeting last night a letter from Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Prince Rupert's representative in the Legislature, was read stating that the Government was prepared to pay one third of the cost of a bridge connecting Section Two with the rest of the city.

The application had come in late, after the estimates were printed, but the Minister had interested himself in the matter with good results.

The amount set down as the probable cost was \$18,000 the Government's share being \$6,000. Originally it was intended that the G. T. P. should pay one third of the cost, but at present it was doubtful if the company would pay any and under these conditions it was thought possible the Government might be induced to saddle itself with half the cost instead of one third.

D. C. McRae expressed the opinion that \$9,000 could better be spent on the streets than on a bridge.

The Mayor said that there would have to be a sale of bonds for water extensions and school purposes and this might be done at the same time. The cheapest at which the bridge could be built would be \$15,000.

Alderman McMeekin suggested that they should do the work. Then people who owned lots across the creek would build there.

Hon. Arthur Meighen and Hon. J. A. Calder promised that undesirable should be sent from the country as soon as possible.

A resolution by H. H. Stevens proposed that people of enemy origin be kept out of Canada for twenty years but he was told by Mr. Calder that the resolution involved the whole question of European Immigration which is engaging the attention of the Peace Conference. He agreed that anyone who had plotted against Canada would be excluded.

Conscientious Objectors.
A resolution by Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux favoring amnesty to conscientious objectors, was debated at the evening sitting. Hon. Hugh Guthrie, Solicitor General, said that the authorities had dealt with 152 cases. It was probable that conscientious objectors would not have to serve more than six months terms which had been substituted for the former ten year term.

Highways Resolution.
Consideration of the Highways resolution was resumed in committee. T. M. Tweedie of Calgary objected to the manner of division of grants as unfair to western provinces. It was wrong to give Prince Edward Island as large an initial grant as the large western provinces and the subsequent per capita division would be equally unfair to the west. He thought the west would be better pleased with tariff reductions than road grants.

BOLSHEVIKI ARMY OF 70,000 MEN CROSS DNEISTER SOUTH OF LEMBERG ENTENTE TROOPS BEING DISARMED

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, March 25.—A Bolsheviki army of 70,000 men has crossed the River Dniester to the south of Lemberg, according to a Zurich despatch. It is composed mainly of Hungarians and Bulgarians who were prisoners of war in Russia.

Berlin, March 25.—A despatch to the Freiheit announces the disarmament of Entente troops at Budapest.

Copenhagen, March 25.—At the first meeting of the new Hungarian Government a Soldiers' and Workmen's Council for the whole of Hungary was appointed, according to plans entered into with agents of Lenin.

The Council immediately started preparation of a bill for the socialization of all industrial activities. The communists of Vienna held a meeting of sympathy with the proletarian dictatorship in Hungary Sunday morning. The demonstration developed into a manifestation against the Entente.

VANCOUVER MAYOR APPEALS TO OTTAWA

Asks Government to Find Work For Returned Soldiers Who Flood City.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Vancouver, March 25.—Declaring a serious labor situation had arisen as a result of the large number of returned soldiers, domiciled before the war in other provinces, having come to Vancouver, Mayor Gale today sent letters to the Acting Premier, Minister of Marine and Fisheries and Minister of Public Works calling upon them to take steps to furnish employment.

11 PER CENT DIED.

It was a happy thing for the children that this arrangement was made for the United States immigration authorities refused to allow them to cross the border and for a month the children were kept by the Salvation Army in Montreal.

Word was received by the City Council at their meeting last night that the children had now arrived at their destination. The fare of the children had to be refunded by their American relatives before they could be admitted as the United States does not allow assisted immigrants or wards of charity to enter the country. The relatives also had to put up bonds.

Prince Rupert Welcomes Any Man Who Does Things.

Newman Erb, railway builder, is here today. He is visiting the scene of one of his industrial activities. Prince Rupert welcomes him because he is a man who does things and it is just such men that are needed here. While his stay may be short it is the general hope that he will so enthuse us with his own spirit of doing things that we may all get busy and build here a city that is worth while.

In conversation yesterday Mr. Erb spoke of the desirability of building permanently and well. This is the growing time of the city and it is very necessary that the structure may be sound and solid.

Mr. Erb is particularly interested in the transportation problems. He sees visions of liners leaving this port for the Orient bearing the machinery and other manufactured products of this country and the United States and returning laden with silk and rice and other Oriental goods. When Mr. Erb sees a vision, the vision is apt to materialize. It is to be hoped that the vision of activity here may become a reality and that the ninety per cent. possibility of which he speaks may become at least eighty per cent reality.

Co-Partnership House Building.

The assistant chief health inspector of Winnipeg, in a recent issue of the Manitoba Free Press, discusses co-partnership building at some length. Apparently the scheme is to form a building society with a large capital provided by the Government on which five per cent. interest is paid. With this money a tract of land is purchased and houses erected.

Tenants are taken on the co-partnership plan by which they pay only sufficient rent to pay for the dividend mentioned together with upkeep and expenses, and a sum sufficient to repay the original loan. Anything paid in over and above that is returned to the tenants in dividends.

The houses when built may be rented, sold on easy terms extending over twenty or thirty years, or may be held under the co-partnership plan. The last mentioned is the one recommended by the health inspector. Under that scheme the tenants are invited to invest their money in the general scheme at five per cent. so that they may in time become the co-operative owners, but not the owners of individual houses. They would be shareholders in the general scheme.

It is claimed that by building a large number of houses a considerable saving could be made in the cost, and that the results all round would be beneficial.

Anyone interested in the scheme may see a copy of the outline as set out in the Manitoba Free Press for March 20 at the Daily News office.

Splendid Site for Fish Docks and Floats.

Yesterday afternoon a party of Prince Rupert men visited the Shawatlans Passage to look over the site to see whether it might be feasible to erect the fish packing houses there and also accommodate the fishing boats. After going carefully over the ground the opinion was expressed that it was by far the best site available.

The land is owned by the provincial government and could undoubtedly be leased for anything which was to benefit the city. The place is perfectly sheltered at all times and there would be no possibility of damage to boats moored there.

The depth of water is such as to allow plenty of clear for fishing boats without being so deep as to make it difficult to drive piles.

The site is right on the railway, only a small piece of track being necessary and a short trestle in order to enable the trains to back right in there.

It would be easy for the city to construct a road leading right down to the waterfront from Eleventh Avenue with an easy grade.

The power lines, electric light and city water supply are already within a short distance of the place and could be continued without any great expense.

While the site is some little distance from the centre of the city it is near enough to allow of a good bus service to and from the place on a good road and would be scarcely any further away than Seal Cove.

Boats going to and from the site would pass the oil dock and the cold storage plant where they would be able to call for their oil and bait.

The expense of building there would be less than at any other point along the coast as it lends itself so well to the construction of wharves and floats.

In addition to the above reasons it was pointed out that there were any number of little beaches and crevices which would make ideal spots for beaching fishing boats or for building. The place seemed to be especially designed for the purpose and if it is not used for a fishing centre now, will eventually be turned to that use.

The News is not particularly advocating the use of Shawatlans Passage, but lays before those interested the arguments in its favor in order that it may be well considered and the best place chosen.

PATTULLO RAPS OPPOSITION FOR INSINUATIONS

Defends Policy of the Provincial
Government and Tells of
Co-operation Regarding
Soldier Settlement.

Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of
Lands, in the legislature last
week gave the opposition some
sharp raps over the knuckles in
connection with what he termed
their unreasonable and ground-
less insinuations that the Liberal
Government was not doing its
duty.

Very briefly and concisely he
reviewed some of the transac-
tions and legislation carried out
and left it to the common sense
of his hearers to say whether or
not there was anything the Gov-
ernment should be ashamed of.
On the other hand they had every
reason to be proud of the progress
made.

Mr. Pattullo had just been pre-
ceded in the debate by W. R. Ross,
member for Fort George, whose
interesting wanderings in search
of something with which to criti-
cize the administration had re-
sulted in taking up almost the
entire evening. Mr. Pattullo con-
sidered that the speech by Mr.
Ross was a very high tribute to
the administration of the Land
Department, for the only item in
regard to which Mr. Ross had
raised any question was one re-
lating to a sum of \$30. Consider-
ing the thousands upon thousands
that had been handled Mr. Pat-
tullo thought this a pretty good
record.

In Chaotic State.

When the present Government
took office it was common know-
ledge that the administration of
the Land Department was in a
pitiful state of chaos and it was
next to impossible for a settler
to locate on a suitable piece of
land. Very gross complaints were
made throughout the country as
to the manner in which the late
Government had handled the
situation. Within one month of
taking office the present Govern-
ment took steps to remedy this
and land was brought back under
Government control along the
lines of transportation so that
they could be made available for
the bona fide settler. The Gov-
ernment's land settlement policy
was generally recognized as an
excellent one by those who were
sufficiently interested to look into
it and render judgment on it with-
out political prejudice.

Agreed With Dominion.

Mr. Pattullo explained the
agreement whereby the Dominion
Government undertook full re-
sponsibility for laying down a
policy for the returned soldier and
at the meeting of the Provincial
Premiers with the Federal au-
thorities the Provinces had un-
dertaken to co-operate to the
limit of their capacity. The Fed-
eral Government distinctly stated
that it did not wish any over-
lapping or any interference on the
part of the Provinces.

Doing Its Utmost.

British Columbia was doing its
utmost in behalf of the returned
man and it was a fact that the
Soldiers' Settlement Policy laid
down by this Government was
only now, after two years, being
adopted by the Federal authori-
ties. The Province, said Mr. Pat-
tullo, was prepared to transfer
lands to the Dominion Soldier
Settlement Board to help carry
out its plans, to link up roads,
furnish schools and supply any
other government assistance.

The Government was ready to
go even further than the delegates
of the Empress of Asia community
scheme, Kirchner and Walker had
suggested, and in view of the ap-
proval of the Government's propo-
sals he was rather surprised at
the reports in the newspapers re-
specting the alleged utterances of
those returned officers.

Shipbuilding.

Mr. Pattullo reviewed the tim-
ber situation of the province and
as a result of the Government's
activities large orders were now
being received, an order for sev-
enty million feet having been
negotiated just recently. He re-
ferred to the wonderful shipbuild-
ing policy trotted out by the op-
position just prior to the last
election and asked where the fleet
of ships were now that was sup-
posed to carry British Columbia
produce to the world's markets.
They were all down in United
States ports loading lumber for

CO-OPERATIVE BUILDING AS IN VICTORIA

Plan Adopted by Greater Victoria Society Provides for Loans Without Interest.

Yesterday the Daily News telegraphed to William Marchant of Victoria asking for particulars regarding building societies in which he is interested. The reply came back at once as follows:

"The Greater Victoria Building Society is a typical terminating building society. It has issued 1200 shares of \$400 each payable \$2.50 monthly and issues loans of \$1,000 each per share repayable \$7.50 monthly, without interest.

"The priority of loans is decided by drawings, and four shares is the maximum number any one person may take. A small charge is made quarterly to defray management expenses.

"The society is incorporated under the Investment and Loan Society's Act and is truly co-operative. There are no promotion shares or profits nor any but ordinary members.

"The officers are composed of five directors, a secretary, treasurer, a solicitor and a valuator.

"After the last loan is issued the society begins to repay the share capital to the members. The life of the society is about 25 years and this class of society should be very suitable to meet the conditions in Prince Rupert."

Dear Editor:
It's the small things in life that generally affect the outcome of large matters. We are all looking forward to a bright future for this young terminal city now that the shipbuilding project is assured and the lumber industry has been given a new impetus. We hope that in a few years it will be favorably spoken of throughout this continent as the "Metropolis of Central B. C."
One of the factors in its future success must be satisfactory living conditions for the skilled mechanic and all classes of labor. He must be well paid, but no matter how high the scale, he will not be satisfied to settle here and make his home here if living conditions are too costly as compared with cities to the south.

To make this an industrial city of importance it behoves the merchants and professional men to limit their range of prices for goods or services to what the laboring man is accustomed to, not a scale suited to a northern mining camp.

Having lived in every important city on the coast, I would like to know where, outside of Alaska (and Prince Rupert) are the tonsorial artists charging 75c for a haircut? Three-quarters of a dollar for the simple operation of shortening your hair. Speaking for the rest of the Samsons in this city, we would not object to 35c. and in war times even 50c. could be extracted by our tonsorial friend without much pain, but when you arrive in Rupert and he says 75c. it gives you a first impression which is not a good one.

I trust that you will accord this letter space in your worthy journal and mayhap it will help to eradicate one of the holdups not at present down on the statute books as a crime, but nevertheless a holdup.

SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' HOME

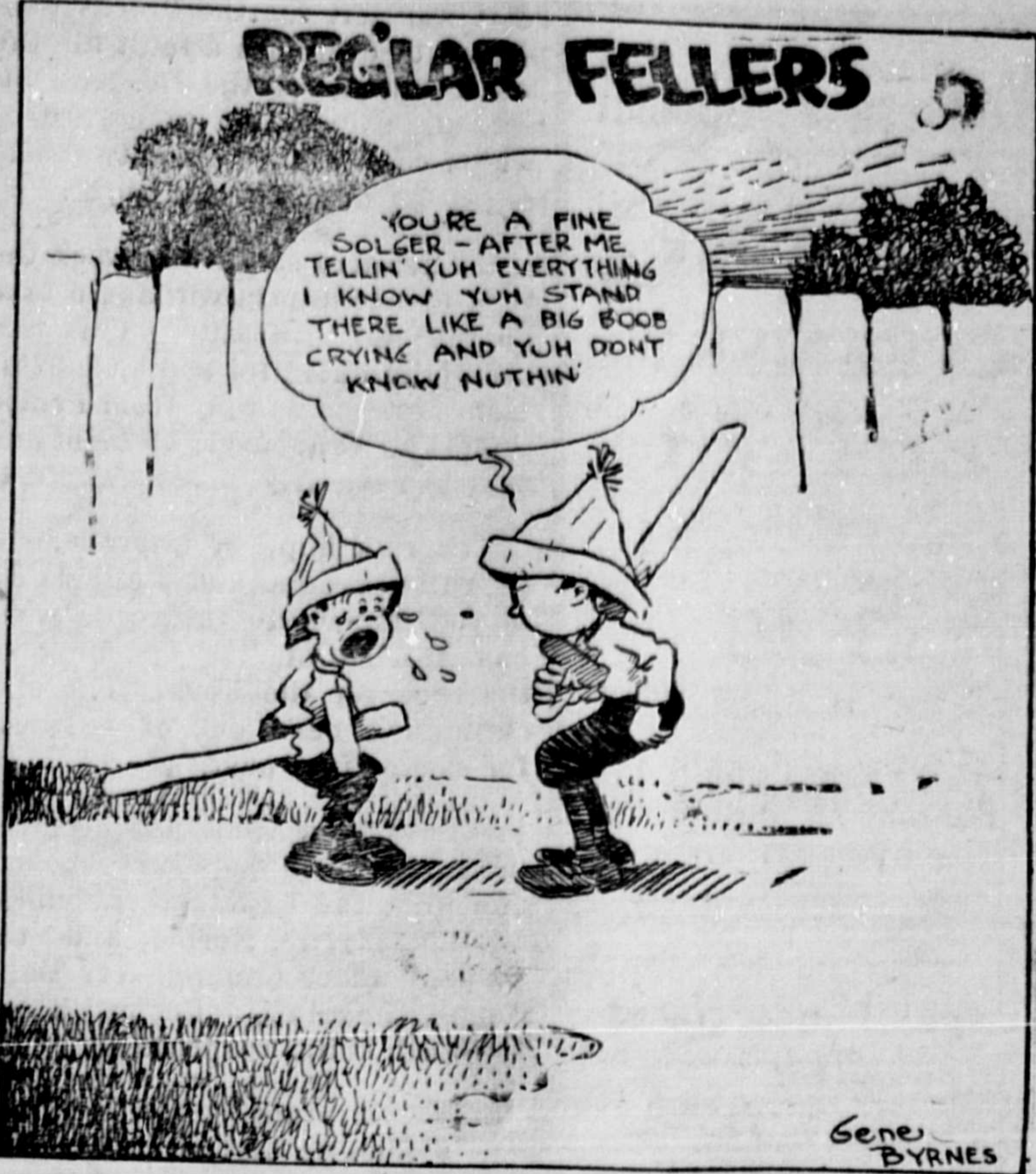

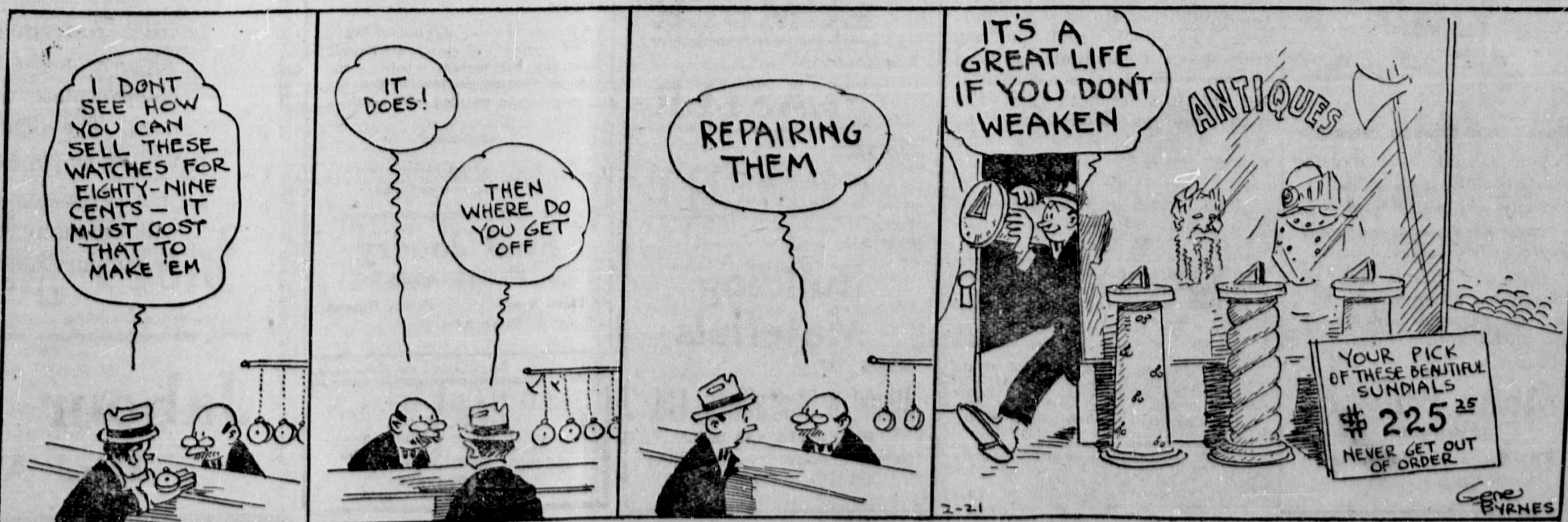

PRINCE RUPERT POWER SCHEME IS IN THE AIR

Inquiry at Council Meeting Indicates Interest in Possibilities of New Hydro-Electric.

That some capitalists are seeing the possibilities of Prince Rupert and are considering the possibility of investing money in a water power scheme with a view to supplying the city with power, was made evident from an inquiry read at the meeting of the City Council last night. The letter was read from Fisher & Warton asking if the city intended to proceed with the development of power for its own purposes from Falls River or Khtada.

The mayor explained that they were awaiting a report on the Wark Channel investigations. Speaking for himself and not for the council the mayor said that if any company wanted to develop power and bring it into the city he was in favor of allowing them to do so, as the city had sufficient to do at present to build up the city and provide roads and sewers. He did not think they could spend a million or a million and a half dollars just now.

The letter was referred to the Utilities Committee for a report.

EASTERN HOCKEY MEN ARE BEATEN ON COAST

Seattle Again Proves to Have World's Champion Team; Vancouver Also Wins.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, March 25. — The western hockey players have beaten the easterners at their own game. Vancouver last night played rings around the Ottawa bunch at the big skating arena here and beat them in a game played under the Eastern rules. It was a surprise to the visitors who expected to turn the tables on the western teams. The score was 4 goals to 3.

Seattle, March 25. — Again Seattle has proved that she has the best hockey team in the world by making the visiting Canadians of Montreal look like ten cents when playing under their own rules against the western men. The score of 7 goals to 2 in favor of Seattle is a good indication of the way the game went.
