A visitor to the Daily News office yesterday stated that he could build a good four-roomed house with bath for \$1,400. That placed on a good lot would cost in all \$2,000 perhaps. That would have to rent for about \$18 a month in order to pay ten per cent interest on the investment. Many good lots can be purchased for less money than the sum mentioned. A few lots may be worth more, but that seems to be about the average price present in a fair locality. Yet there are some people who say that house building would not pay.





Not Represented.

Beyond all dispute the human factor and not the money factor should be the chief concern of our legislators. This is not socialism for it recognizes only a part of society, not each for all and all for each. This is not democracy, for there is no rule of the people only





SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, be-

fore receiving Crown Grant. Where 1 3-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proporof ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Fail-ure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT. The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agree-ments to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made w cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a propor-tionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchaser from the Crown has agreed to sell are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any applica-tion made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction. For information apply to any Provin-






