LOW TARIFF MOTION VOTED DOWN IN PARLIAMENT BY GOVERNMENT SUPPORTERS

Declared it Was Not Wise and Should Not Have Been Made—Statement That Opposition Playing Politics and are Trying to Embarrass the Administration.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, March 26.—By a vote of 115 to 61 the House rejected the low tariff motion. The debate on the tariff started immediately the House opened on an amendment by A. R. Master of a motion to go into committee of supply. The five points in the amendment were:

Repeal of the extra war duty of five per cent on goods from Great Britain, and of 7 1/2 per cent on goods from other countries.

Acceptance of a reciprocity agreement with the United States.

Elimination of duties on raw materials.

Elimination of duty on machinery needed on the farm, the fishing, fishery and lumber industries.

A general downward revision of the tariff made after careful investigation and with the object of relieving the consumer of bringing more revenue to the state.

Mr. McMaster said if the farmers of British Columbia wanted to get their machinery which was manufactured in Canada they would be free of duty from the United States, but if there was a manufacturer in Nova Scotia turning out an article he wished to purchase, the British Columbia farmer would have to pay a high duty.

The position taken generally was that the motion was not made merely and was intended to embarrass the Government. Mr. Moore declared the motion was not made and should not have been made. Dr. Clark of Red Deer, a free trader, held that the amendment was not intended to embarrass the mover was playing the party game. Hon. T. A. Anderson followed along similar lines. Were the amendments carried, he said, the country would be plunged into a general election.

Thomas White, acting Premier, declared the amendment, if carried, would constitute a vote of no confidence. Following the debate the House passed an interim supply bill for \$100,000 in five minutes.

MORE DAYLIGHT SAVING FOR CANADA

London, March 26.—Confidence prevails that the danger of stoppage of work by miners, railwaymen and transport workers has been avoided. A settlement of the main points is reported by the Government and the leaders of the unions.

AIRSHIP IN FLIGHT FOR NINETEEN HOURS

R-34 Flew From the Clyde to Dublin and Round Isle of Man.

London, March 26.—The British airship R-34 returned to the Clyde at noon today after a flight which kept her in the air continuously for 19 hours. The itinerary included a flight to Dublin, circling of the Isle of Man and home by way of Liverpool and the Midlands. The Evening Standard says the next flight will be over the ocean to make certain tests. An attempt will then be made to cross the Atlantic.

COMMUNITY SYSTEM OF LAND SETTLEMENT

EGYPT IS IN INSURRECTION

Government Had to Appeal to Men Being Demobilized to Return to Save Comrades.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

London, March 26.—Defending the Military Service Bill in the House of Commons, Winston Spencer Churchill, Secretary for War, yesterday declared that the whole of Egypt was in virtual state of insurrection. The position was so dangerous, that the Government had to appeal to men on the point of demobilization to return and save their comrades from being murdered.

Sawed Bars and Three Men Got Away, One Being an Indian.

AMENDMENT TO PROHIBITION

Slight Tightening of Provisions of the Act Introduced Into Legislature.

Victoria, March 26.—Premier Oliver announced that there would be no referendum on prohibition in British Columbia this year as requested by the Moderation League. There were no other promises as to the future. An amendment to the Prohibition Bill was introduced by the Government providing for the issuance of liquor prescriptions by doctors only on special forms provided by the Government. Advertisements of liquor for sale are prohibited.

VICTORIA MAN BLOWS HIS OWN HEAD OFF

Victoria, March 26.—Walter Palmer, aged 69, a poultry farmer in the Lake Hill district, was found with part of his head blown off in a shed on Reynolds St. It is believed that he committed suicide.

SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA MAKES HIT

The Prince Rupert Symphony Orchestra under the leadership of Professor Harvey made its first appearance last night at the Empress Theatre, and the performance was most creditable. It was the subject of appreciative remarks everywhere and Mr. Harvey must feel flattered at the results he has been able to attain in a comparatively short time from a group of players, many of whom have had little or no experience in orchestral work. The next entertainment in which they take part will be looked forward to with much interest.

The concert given last night was the concert given under the auspices of the Army and Navy Veterans, the proceeds of which went toward furnishing their new club rooms. Ben Self gave the theatre and advertising free of charge for the occasion and he was publicly thanked from the platform by Major McMullin on behalf of the society, as also were all those who took part.

Humorous Songs.

The program was a mixed one with plenty of variety. The singing of humorous and topical songs by Frank Moore were among the best numbers. Mr. Moore's stage presence was almost perfect and his enunciation and expression made him most interesting. His verse on the drydock brought down the house. Mr. Moore should be heard again in some of the newer songs and with more topical references.

BOLSHEVIKI ABOLISHING EVERYTHING

Take Over Homes, Businesses and Art Treasures in Hungary; Abolish All Titles.

Amsterdam, March 26.—The new Hungarian Government at its first meeting Saturday, says a despatch from Budapest, decided to abolish all titles and rank, to separate church and state, and to dismiss all commissioners of the Karolyi Government, while inviting the workmen's councils to select directorates of four members each to replace them. The formation of revolutionary courts was decided upon and the council ordered the people's commissioners to take over all homes, businesses and art treasures in private hands.

Canadian Club Lunch Was Most Encouraging.

The lunch given by the Canadian Club and which was addressed by Newman Erb yesterday afternoon was most encouraging. It was a heart to heart talk by one businessman to others and it was appreciated. There was much that could not be published but which was of intense interest to those who attended. There was no mincing of words. It was clearly shown that Prince Rupert people must look very largely to themselves if the city is to be built up on sound foundations. Outsiders can help but the people are the real factors in the life of the community. Their own efforts are the efforts that tell.

There was a large attendance at the luncheon and everyone was impressed. They felt that the man who was talking to them was a man who knew.

Housing Schemes Being Considered.

This afternoon there is a meeting of the Board of Trade in the city hall to consider the question of housing. It is the one important question of the day. It has to be tackled and that with courage. Every man should do his part and do it as quickly as possible.

A visitor to the Daily News office yesterday stated that he could build a good four-roomed house with bath for \$1,400. That placed on a good lot would cost in all \$2,000 perhaps. That would have to rent for about \$18 a month in order to pay ten per cent interest on the investment. Many good lots can be purchased for less money than the sum mentioned. A few lots may be worth more, but that seems to be about the average price at present in a fair locality. Yet there are some people who say that house building would not pay.

Situation in Austria

Might Have Been Serious.

The situation in Austria looked serious for a short time. The Bolsheviks were in control at Budapest and there was danger of a quick uprising which it might have been difficult to stem. The scheme seems to have been engineered from Russia with Lenin at the head.

There is no objection to Austria being ruled by Soviets or in any other way. There is objection, however, to that country escaping the retribution which it tried to bring on the rest of the world. They overran part of Italy and Austrian troops were in France with the Germans when part of the destruction took place. It was they who were the chief instigators in the war and they must pay the price. What justice would there be in allowing them to escape and go scot free after perpetrating such untold horrors on the rest of the civilized world. They will have to help rebuild France and Belgium and they will have to submit to disarmament and be under direction for years to come.

Co-operative Plan Is Suitable Here.

The co-operative building society, particulars of which were published yesterday, might with some modifications be applicable for this city. Many favor a short life society, especially for a new place where so many people are moving in and out. Those who would like to build or who propose building in the not too far distant future, might well consider the advisability of organizing. It needs one or two public spirited men to take the lead.

This suggestion has nothing to do with the main building proposals which will be handled in a larger way. It is only for those who wish to save from their earnings enough money to erect a house for themselves.

Fish Harvest Is Increasing.

Now that everyone is talking shipbuilding and thinking of that as the chief reason for house building here, it might not be forgotten that the fishing business is on the increase and that in the near future there will have to be houses built to accommodate the increase in that industry. Those who follow the fish arrivals as published in the Daily News cannot fail to have noticed the regularity of shipments and the immense quantity of fish that is shipped from this port.

Within a few days the company boats should be fishing. At present they are being overhauled in readiness for the season's work and when these boats are added to those already operating, the catch coming to this port will exceed anything heretofore known.



MARTIAL LAW IN HUNGARY PROCLAIMED

British Monitors at Budapest; Frontiers Closed—Death Penalty for Armed Resistance.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
 Paris, March 25.—Agents of the peace conference say that reports indicate allied troops must be rushed into Hungary immediately to save the situation.
 Two British monitors arrived at Budapest after being fired on en route to the Danube from Belgrade to Vienna. The Hungarian frontier is closed and martial law has been proclaimed in Hungary and the death penalty declared for plundering or armed resistance. The sale of liquor is prohibited.

FISH CATCHES WERE SOLD YESTERDAY

Also 1,325 Pounds of Salmon Sold For 18.2c. and 5c.

Ten fishing boats sold their catches yesterday, three of which were salmon catches. The Omany and the Speculator with 65,000 and 5,000 lbs. respectively; the Johanna, with 9,000; the Volunteer, 10,000; the Alameda, 7,000; the Swiftsure, 7,000, and the Agnes B. with 10,000 lbs. completed the halibut catch.

The salmon catches were the Tina arriving with 250 pounds of reds and 150 of whites, total 400 lbs.; the Ida with 150 of reds and 75 lbs. of whites, total 325 lbs., and the Robbie with 500 lbs. of reds and 100 of whites, totalling 600 lbs. The grand total of spring salmon was 1,325 lbs.

The average price received for the halibut was 12c. and 8c. For the salmon, 18.2c. for the reds, and 5c. per pound for the whites.

In the Letter Box

TRUE DEMOCRACY

While many nations are struggling towards the ideal no nation has yet secured true democracy. No term more clearly defines itself than this. A knowledge of Greek is not necessary to discover the two words embodied in it "people" and "rule."

The rule of the people means the whole people, not just a party trying to rule the whole and calling this self-government.

Even in Athens where democracy was born two thousand five hundred years ago, the Greeks failed to do justice to this principle, because the slaves who formed a large portion of the people had no voice in the government of the country.

Not Represented.

Our system of representation based upon territorial areas rather than upon classes in the community renders it almost impossible to have true democracy. While we have so many lawyers and so few farmers, so many employers and so few employees acting as members of parliament we cannot as a people be truly represented.

Beyond all dispute the human factor and not the money factor should be the chief concern of our legislators. The time is rapidly coming when those who cannot adjust themselves to the modern conception that the welfare of human lives must be put before large dividends will have to step down from the position of leaders of the people.

Balance Turning.

And yet just at the critical moment when the balance of power is turning in favor of labor, and all classes are beginning to realize that concern for the common welfare must be the dominating principle of true democracy, there is sweeping over the world the strange delusion that the government of the whole community of mankind, irrespective of nationality, can be in the hands of one class in the interests of this class alone.

This is not socialism for it recognizes only a part of society, not each for all and all for each.

This is not democracy, for there is no rule of the people only the despotism of a class.

FREIGHTS TO PRINCE RUPERT

Similar to Those to Vancouver; Reduction From Eastern Points Proposed.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Washington, March 25.—The Railway Board decided on a marked reduction on freights originating in the eastern States destined to the Orient and Australia for the purpose of aiding manufacturers who are cut off from European markets and handicapped by the small consumption of the home markets.
Ottawa, March 25.—Canadian railways hauling freight to Vancouver and Prince Rupert originating in the eastern States will have the benefit of similar rates simultaneously with the introduction of rate reductions on the American railways to Pacific States ports. There may be a lowering of Canadian rates on the same commodities and classifications originating in eastern Canada.

ALASKA RELATIVES OF SOPHIA VICTIMS TO BE PROTECTED

The joint resolution introduced by Senator Roman and adopted by the Senate, and passed by the House, in each instance under suspension of the rules is as follows:

Whereas, it is currently reported and charged by people claiming to be acquainted with the administration of the estates of the victims of the wreck of the steamship Princess Sophia, that the administration of the aforesaid estates has, and is being proceeded with in a manner which will result in unnecessary expense and delay; and

Whereas, that unfortunate disaster was accompanied by loss of life in such a manner as to cause the sympathy of all people to be depended to the friends and relatives of the unfortunate victims, and demanded from every humane person all aid and assistance that could possibly be rendered; and

Whereas, any act on the part of any person to commercialize or to profit unduly in any matter connected with the affairs of the unfortunate sufferers of this disaster should from the standpoint of humanity meet with severe condemnation.

Therefore, be it resolved by the Senate, the House concurring, that a committee of three members from each body be appointed to form a joint committee, and that said committee be, and is, hereby instructed to make as full an investigation of such charges as they may deem necessary, and report their findings back to the Senate and House of Representatives.

WILL HAVE A POPULATION OF 2,000 VERY SOON

So Says R. W. Martin of Portland Canal in Interview at Victoria.

"Two million dollars' worth of ore will be shipped out of the Portland Canal country next summer, and the district will have a population of 2,000," predicts R. W. Martin, of Seattle, one of the owners of the Mineral Hill partnership group of claims on Salmon River, three miles above the sensational Bush mine, which every mining man who has examined says appears to be fabulously rich. The interview appeared in a Victoria paper.

By next season Mr. Martin looks for the completion of the wagon road so as to finish transportation to his and other properties in the district, thus giving them an opportunity to ship some of the high-grade ore now being mined. The Bush property has been producing this winter. Test shipments from the Mineral Hill are to be made shortly.

Regular Shipments.

News that fifty thousand dollars' worth of ore per month is being shipped out of the Salmon River mining district in northern British Columbia is given out by O. B. Bush, of Vancouver. The amount will be steadily increased. The shipments are from the old Salmon-Bear River Mining Company's property, now being developed by R. K. Neill, of Spokane. The ore body was discovered by Mr. Bush in 1910, but very little work was done on it till 1917.

Becoming Famous.

"The Salmon River Valley is becoming famous as one of the great mining districts of British Columbia owing to the development of the old Salmon-Bear River Mining Company's property," says Mr. Bush. "A large mineralized zone 400 feet wide has been traced for more than 8,000 feet in length and ore has been found on six different claims. These claims are owned by the Premier Gold Mines, Limited, and the Bush Mines, Limited, of Vancouver. Several ore shoots have been discovered in this zone, one of them being 110 feet wide and 1,200 feet long. Under the direction of R. K. Neill a tunnel more than 400 feet in length has been driven on this ore body, also several crosscuts, one of them 90 feet long, without encountering the footwall. This ore assays over \$1,000 per ton in gold and silver."
