DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH IN GOVERNMENT OF THE COUNTRY IS LATEST MOVE OF ADMINISTRATION

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Ottawa, March 27.—Hon. N. W. Rowell introduced into the House of Commons yesterday a bill to create a Federal Department of Public Health. It is to be presided over by a minister and usual provisions are made for the appointment of a deputy minister and necessary officers and staff.
The powers of the minister will extend to and include all matters and questions relating to the promotion and preservation of health and social welfare.
It was stated in the House that the amount of property held in Canada by alien enemies as reported to the State Department was estimated at a value of \$38,000,000. Investigations are still proceeding and reports of all stated property are being asked for. The Minister of Militia said there was no information as to whether or not Canadian soldiers had been made use of in police work in Ireland with a view to preventing the Sinn Feiners' insurrection, but a cable had been sent for the desired information.

SOLDIERS WERE MURDERED BY THE EGYPTIANS

...ing in Cairo District Caused
Many Deaths—Houses and
Trains pillaged and
Sacked.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Cairo, March 27.—The official reports of the rioting which broke out in many parts of Egypt within the last few days with surprising suddenness show that two thousand houses have been sacked by mobs. The railway station at Helwan was wrecked. British soldiers were murdered and the stations at El Rekah and El Helwan, to the south of Cairo. At Wasta, which is the junction of a branch line, the express train was pillaged and several other trains sacked.
Medinet on the branch line was pillaged by the mob at the camp. The prisoners held there were released. They also attacked the railway station and the military camp was obliged to fire on the rioters. Thirty natives were killed and nineteen wounded. Several thousand natives also attacked the station tank, which was guarded by police and military. They were obliged to shoot, killing twenty-two natives and wounding fifty others. Altogether sixty-nine natives have been killed and eighty wounded in Cairo.

FAMOUS RACEHORSE "INFIERNO" IS DEAD

Winner of Many Trophies Will
Be Preserved at Veterinary
College in Ontario.
(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Toronto, March 27.—Inferno, probably the greatest racehorse ever foaled in Canada, was put to death yesterday at the Ontario Veterinary College where sections of his skeleton will be preserved. Inferno was foaled on Joseph Seagram's farm at Waterloo in 1902. In subsequent years he won the King Edward Hotel Cup three years in succession, Toronto cup, Queens Hotel cup, Stanley Handicap stakes, Dominion Autumn Produce and Durham cup twice.

SCORELESS DRAW IN HOCKEY GAME IN WORLD SERIES

Seattle, March 27.—Seattle's Metropolitan and the Montreal Canadiens fought a scoreless draw in the fourth game for the World championship series and Stanley Cup last night. Twenty minutes overtime was played.
The game was under eastern rules. Next Saturday night a game will be played under western rules.

MANY DISEASES IN NORTH LABRADOR

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
St. John, Newfoundland, March 27.—Shocking conditions are reported to obtain in northern Labrador as a result of influenza, small pox and measles, which also swept the southern section of the coast. Over 25 per cent. of the natives have succumbed.

BUILDING IS CONSIDERED BY BIG MEETING

Board of Trade Brings Together
Many Citizens Who Discuss
Problem and Appoint
Committee.

At the meeting of the Board of Trade in the city hall yesterday, called for the purpose of considering the building situation in the city in view of the immediate need of several hundred houses within the next few months, a committee of five was appointed to go into the question thoroughly and formulate a definite plan. This committee was named as follows: M. P. McCaffery, Thomas McClymont, Dan Morrison, J. H. Thompson and W. E. Williams.
There was a large attendance and much interest was taken in the proceedings and a lively discussion took place.

Civic Plan.
Mr. Miller, who is here representing the receiver of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, outlined a proposal for civic building under which Newman Erb had offered to provide the money. Under this scheme a number of houses would be built on city or Government lots and sold or rented to people who needed them. There would be no difficulty over the financing as the money would be available at once.

There were a number of proposals made in regard to formation of building societies and clubs, but it seemed to be the general opinion of the meeting that none of those plans would meet the present pressing need. Something more would have to be done and either the new company or the city would have to undertake it.

Company's Attitude.
Mr. Schellenberg, on behalf of the Prince Rupert Drydock & Engineering Co., said that they were here to build ships and would prefer to have nothing to do with the housing plan. If the people did not undertake it, however, they would have to take steps to look after their own employees.

William Bruce suggested the four apartment house instead of individual cottage and preferably a brick or concrete building instead of wood.
W. J. Alder told of some of his experiences with loan and mortgage companies and thought there might be a great many lots on the sewers which might be obtained for the purpose in hand.

The discussion was continued by Messrs. Fisher, Nickerson, Albert, McClymont and McLennan.

All Do Part.
Mr. McCaffery, who presided, urged that everyone should do as much as possible in helping to tide over the difficulty. He pointed out that owing to the present low price of lots it was cheaper to build here today than it was in 1913. He referred to what had been done in Seattle and other places and urged that the citizens unite on a general scheme which would be of benefit to the community.

JUNIOR ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION NOW

New Organization Decides to Re-
strict Activities to Younger
Portion of Community.

The Juniors Athletic Association was the title chosen for the new organization which was recently formed and at the meeting in the Council Chamber last night it was decided to restrict its activities very largely to work among the children of school age. The following executive was chosen to co-operate with the officers who were previously elected: W. D. Vance, E. D. Johnson, George Tite, T. Duncan, W. G. Humble, Geo. Frizzell, W. H. Vickers, Canon Rix, Dr. Grant and W. E. Fisher.

Messrs. Brady, Duncan and Vickers were appointed a committee to prepare a constitution and bylaws.
The members of the association are to meet at the Market Square on Saturday at 2.30 and from there will visit the school grounds with a view to making recommendations. It was also decided that the School Board be urged to provide cover for the pupils in the grounds and gymnastic equipment.

The executive will make arrangements to meet the City Council on Monday night and parents of the children are invited to attend on that occasion. Arrangements will also be made to meet the school board at an early date in order to confer on the proposed improvements.
The secretary was appointed to meet the Agricultural Association today and lay before that body the plans of the new organization.

Remarks on the advantages of the cinderella over the late dances were general, and it was good news to hear the regent of the Chapter, Mrs. Riley, say that the intention was to hold a number of similar events in the near future.

PEACE CONFERENCE PLANS PRELIMINARY PEACE TERMS TO SETTLE GRAVE QUESTIONS

PROPOSALS ARE UNDER CONSIDERATION OF INNER COUN-
CIL OF FOUR AND WILL BE DRASTIC AND
ELASTIC SAYS THE PALL
MALL GAZETTE

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, March 27.—The Paris correspondent of the Pall Mall Gazette says on high authority that "In order to avoid the perils which will unavoidably arise if preliminary peace terms are not drafted until such time as the various commissions shall have presented their respective reports, representatives of the Great Powers have drawn up certain proposals which seem ample to constitute the basis of the first treaty, or one analogous to that signed at Versailles in 1871."

These proposals are under consideration of the "Inner Council of Four, Lloyd George, Clemenceau, Orlando and Wilson, which has temporarily superseded the council of ten and that this arrangement will greatly expedite the decisions.
"A final settlement will not be aimed at, but terms will be sufficiently firm, drastic and definite to provide for an enduring peace, to justify early demobilization.

"This should simplify the grave international food problem, and pave the way for speedy industrial reconstruction and financial reorganization."

CANADIAN SOLDIERS RETURNING QUICKLY

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, March 27. — Upwards of 100,000 Canadian soldiers have now left the British Isles for home since the signing of the armistice. The Third Division is now entirely cleared and the major portion of the First Division is now here. Only 56,000 Canadians now remain in France. Since March 1, 15,000 Canadians have been cleared from Kimmel Camp.

NEW LUMBER CONCERN IS TAKING MILL

Over Sixteen Million Feet of Logs
Are To Be Cut This
Summer.

A. A. Ewart, one of the members of the firm which has just leased the Prince Rupert saw mill arrived in the city yesterday and today he announced that the mill will be taken over and operations commenced on May 1.

The new firm consists of A. E. Munn, of Munn & Kerr; N. S. Lougheed, G. G. Abernethy and A. A. Ewart of Dempsey & Ewart. They have leased the mill for a year with an option to purchase and they expect to make the business permanent and take up their option.

Mr. Ewart said that they had secured 15,000,000 feet of best quality spruce logs from the Munitions Board besides a million and three quarters that are stored at the mill and this would keep them busy all summer.

Mr. Emerson is giving up the business on account of ill health.

Better Counsels
Have Prevailed.

It looks as if there would be no general strike in Great Britain. The people there are no Bolsheviks. They believe in law and order, and as long as they can secure what they consider their rights, they are satisfied. In view of the fact that we so often take our cue from that country and that the example of Great Britain has a great influence throughout the world, it is interesting to know they are settling their affairs in an amicable way.

Many people have been afraid of Lloyd George since he allied himself with the conservative element in the community, but those some conservatives are now about as liberal as Lloyd George once was. Great Britain has for many years been noted for its good government. Now that practically every person in the country, man or woman, has a right to vote, there is no need for anything but peaceable settlements of all questions. The majority is now able to do as it likes. The workmen are in the majority so they can rule the country by constitutional means.

What applies to Great Britain also applies here. Every man and woman except a tramp has a vote and all reforms can be obtained constitutionally. The possibilities are almost unbounded. What cannot be done through the Provincial Parliament can be done through the Dominion, and if there is any difficulty there, the democracy in Great Britain will set it right. This is the safety valve to the constitution and should insure that no serious troubles will occur. Add to this the great works of development which it will take years to undertake, and the people of the Dominion should be too busy to be worried over internal troubles such as those which are coming to the countries of Europe.

City Building Seems
Probable Solution.

It seems probable that some civic housing project is the only solution of the present pressing problem. So far as can be seen no other project will be sufficiently comprehensive to meet the present situation. The difficulty of selling bonds has been overcome by Mr. Erb offering to take them.

In going into this business the city would be simply developing property which it already has. The houses may be sold or rented, preferably sold. That would solve the difficulty and then there would be plenty for others to do in providing for the large number of people who will be here, attracted by the developments which are going on.

Portland Canal
A Great Asset.

Last summer and autumn the people here secured a great advantage and much good business from the activities of the Imperial Munitions Board in getting out spruce lumber. This year we shall have a considerable amount of lumber business and in addition there will be the mining developments, especially of the Portland Canal. The rush to that district will come through this port and Prince Rupert should be the main distributing point for the mines.

This is simply to point out that in addition to the shipbuilding on which we are counting and of which so much has been said, there will be good business here, all of which will accentuate the housing problem.

ARCHITECTURE IS SUBJECT CHOSEN FOR FORTNIGHTLY CLUB

William Bruce Talks on Subject of His Own Profession at Presbyterian Church Hall.

William Bruce, architect, gave a very interesting address last night in the Presbyterian Church hall on architecture from the middle ages down to the present time. He outlined the methods used in the construction period of the prehistoric ages in Scotland, long before Scottish history commenced.

He also touched upon the subject of how buildings were provided by the British, the United States, and New Zealand governments for residential purposes, and how easy it was made for the new comer in New Zealand to step into a post office and borrow money for the construction of a dwelling for his family.

Co-Operation.
 Co-operation was his strong point, however. "I am a great believer in co-operation," said Mr. Bruce, "in fact I don't see how a young town like this can amount to anything without this method of procedure. And another thing," went on the speaker, "the foundation of co-operation is honesty, it will never make a success if any grafters are permitted to take part in it. It is not the capitalists who start co-operation, it is the middle class."

Great Future.
 Mr. Bruce said he was very much impressed with Prince Rupert when first landing here, and thought that a great future was in store for the town. He thought that a stop should be put to the building of flimsy wooden houses—that in the long run brick was just as cheap if not cheaper than lumber and would make a permanent job, thereby laying the foundation of a large city.

The Rev. Dr. Grant added a few words to what Mr. Bruce had said remarking that he hoped Prince Rupert was now making a start to success.

BILL TO SUPPRESS SOCIAL DISEASES

A bill for the suppression of venereal diseases has been introduced in the legislature by the provincial secretary. It provides for the keeping of records and the making of reports to the medical health officer by every medical practitioner and by the heads of public institutions, within two days after the existence of the disease has been ascertained. The doctors will be provided with serial numbers to be used when patients object to their names appearing on the record.

Persons refusing or neglecting treatment, or acting in such a way as to conduce to spreading the disease, may be confined in a hospital or jail until the danger is over. Persons committed to prison for any offense and found infected may be detained until cured. All hospitals receiving aid from the provincial treasury are required to make adequate provision for treatment. Advertising of drugs, medicine, or instruments will be prohibited. None but legally qualified practitioners will be allowed to prescribe.

SLOVAKS TAKE CITY OF RAAB

Place is Midway Between Vienna and Budapest and Cannon Foundry is There.

(Special by G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Berlin, March 26.—It is reported from Vienna that a communication between Vienna and Budapest has been interrupted through the capture by Czech Slovaks of Raab on the Danube midway between the cities. Large Hungarian cannon foundries are situated at Raab.

TOO MUCH CAPITAL INVESTED IN MILLS

Lumber Mills of Pacific Coast Have a Capacity More Than Double the Actual Cut

The saw-mills of British Columbia were estimated in 1914 to have an annual capacity of 2,555 million board feet. As the cut for the highest year, 1913, was only 1,157 million feet, the present saw-mill capacity of the province is more than double the amount of the actual cut. A similar situation prevails south of the international boundary, so far as the excess of mill capacity over annual cut is concerned. For the year 1914, the mills of the United States, including Northern Idaho, Eastern Washington and Eastern Oregon, had an estimated annual capacity of more than 13.6 billion feet, while the annual cut is only 6.8 billion feet. Thus, half the saws in the region in question must remain idle, for lack of a sufficient market for the product.

This locking up of capital in mills and machinery was due partly to the over-confidence of the lumbermen in the ability of the markets to absorb lumber, and partly to the efforts of the millmen to realize quickly on their timber investments. In many cases, these efforts were forced by the pressure of economic conditions. From "Forest Resources of British Columbia," shortly to be published by the Commission of Conservation.

TRYING TO MAKE LIQUOR RESPECTABLE

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
London, March 27.—A bill has been introduced into the House of Lords with the object of converting public bar-rooms into social halls. The author of the measure, Lord Lamington, proposes to transform a saloon into a house of refreshment and recreation where music and dancing might be permitted and children allowed to be present with their parents. Brewers are giving the bill their support. "It is calculated," commented an official of the Brewers' Society, "to alleviate the tone of public houses. I think the general view of the trade will be that it is a step in the right direction."

BRITISH TO OCCUPY THE GREAT BIG DAM

London, March 26.—British troops from the Sudan have been sent to occupy Assouan where the great Nile dam is located, advices from Egypt state. Troops are now widely distributed throughout the province.
