GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC PROBLEM TO BE SETTLED WITHOUT RECOURSE TO FURTHER LIQUIDATION PROCEEDINGS

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, March 28.—Negotiations between the Dominion Government and the Grand Trunk Railway are expected to be completed shortly and a solution of the Grand Trunk Pacific problem obtained without the Government having recourse to liquidation proceedings. It is understood that the Grand Trunk officials have agreed to the legal stand that the placing of the G. T. P. in receiver without the Grand Trunk Company being in default has released the Grand Trunk of any obligations in respect to the Grand Trunk Pacific.

It is further stated that the Grand Trunk claims to be creditor in respect to \$24,000,000 advance to the G. T. P. and branch lines.

ICE HOCKEY GAME AT SEATTLE SET WORLD RECORD

Not Be Counted in Cup Series
Was Remarkable Effort,
Says Calder.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Vancouver, March 28.—A world's record for Stanley Cup games and professional hockey in any one city was established when the Vancouver team and Seattle battled for minutes in the fourth championship series at the city without a goal being scored. President Calder of the National Hockey Association of America announced. The game, he said, was the most remarkable in hockey annals.

Calder is of opinion that the game should have been played through with a goal was scored. Calder said the game was simply being ignored in the series as if it had never been played.

GERMAN TROOPS ARE NOW IN RAAB WITH THE CZECHO-SLOVAKS

London, March 28.—Italian troops have entered Raab 50 miles east of Pressburg, according to a Vienna despatch to the Central News. Seven thousand Italians are in Pressburg, apparently at the request of Czechoslovaks, at least after a previous understanding with them.

MORE DAYLIGHT IS NOT DESIRED

Resolution Favoring Re-Enactment of Last Year's Measure Defeated by 105 to 50.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)

Ottawa, March 28.—A resolution in favor of the re-enactment of the Daylight Saving Bill was defeated in the House of Commons by 105 to 50. The resolution was moved by Major Cooper (Vancouver South) Unionist, seconded by Rodolphe Lemieux. The debate occupied the entire sitting.

Rural representatives from Ontario and the prairie provinces were practically a unit in opposition while urban representatives of the east, along with a practically solid British Columbia and majority of Quebec members, both rural and urban, favored its re-enactment. The Maritime provinces vote was split. Only seven members from Ontario favored daylight saving. Both Sir Thomas White and D. D. McKenzie opposed the resolution. The vote was actually taken, not on the main resolution, but on an amendment to the effect that it be given a twelve months' trial.

NEW COMPANY IS FORMED TO HELP HOUSING

Will Make Loans to Those Wishing to Build and Will Bring in Material.

The committee which was appointed to look into the housing scheme has decided to form a building and loan society to be known as the Prince Rupert Housing Co., Ltd., with a capital of \$100,000 to encourage the building of houses in this city.

A number of contractors have offered to build if they can secure loans to the amount of half the value of the building. This the new company proposes to advance on first mortgages. They will also purchase material in large quantities if it is found necessary.

A further meeting is to be held this afternoon at 5 to appoint committees and further the business.

The city is also taking steps to bring in sand and gravel to Cow Bay and sell to builders at cost so that every encouragement may be given to those who wish to erect dwellings.

THE EXHIBITION IS TO BE BETTER THAN FORMERLY

Directors of Association Will Ask Co-operation of Farmers Throughout District.

Letters will be sent out to Farmers' Institutes, farmers and others throughout the district to the effect that this year the Prince Rupert exhibition directors will pay much more attention to the exhibits than in former years and that the intention is to make this year's a record show in all lines. This was decided on at the meeting of the exhibition directors last night.

In the matter of industrial or ladies' work exhibits, however, there must be no repetition of exhibits but all the work must be new and never shown before. A regulation to this effect will be included in the prize list.

Repairs Delayed.
Another meeting will be held next week when it is expected tenders will be called for the repairs and improvements to the exhibition building and a secretary chosen. There were several applications for the position of secretary received at the meeting last night, but no appointment was made.

Mention was made of the criticism of the amount to be paid the secretary, but it was decided that the amount was sufficient for the work required. It was during two months only that the full time of the secretary was needed. Some of the critics knew this well.

At the next meeting a delegation is expected from the Juniors Athletic Association in regard to securing the use of the building and grounds and to having them fitted up in such a way as to be of use for the purpose required.

Mr. Perry thought they could not do too much to encourage the young people.

Co-operation Invited.
Mr. Kerr suggested that it would be well to have a committee of the new association discuss the matter with the board and that they would find the board ready to meet them more than half way. This was decided upon.

LENINE OFFERS \$20,000,000 TO FINANCE WAR

Urges Hungarian Soviet by Wireless to Send Army Against Vienna.

Berlin, March 28.—Premier Lenine has wirelessed the Hungarian Soviet Government urging it to send a Bolshevik army against Vienna, according to a despatch from Budapest. He is said to have promised to finance the Hungarian expedition against Austria to the extent of \$20,000,000.

FREE HOMESTEADS MAY HAVE TO GO

Ottawa, March 28.—The Citizen says the system of free homesteads may be done away with and the lands put up at auction. There is to be a bill on the subject this session. The change is favored because it is likely to retard settlement in isolated areas far from railways and induce a better class of settler and produce more revenue.

Athletic Club For the Seniors.

Now that the Junior Athletic Association has been formed it is in order for the seniors to bestir themselves and prepare for the coming season. There is plenty of scope for their activities and as people come in for the shipyard work there will be more need of the organization. It would be wise to begin soon, however, in order to get the preparations under way for the spring activities.

The Tennis Club is advertising a meeting, the Swimming Club met last night, but there has been so far no meeting of those interested in baseball, football, and athletic sports generally. The time to take action is now while everybody is looking forward to getting out in the sun and enjoying the long evenings.

Health Department Being Established.

The establishment of a Public Health Department in connection with the Dominion Government is something that has been strongly advocated for many years by people who had the welfare of the country at heart. The great thing will be for the Government to see that it becomes effective. To establish the department is a small matter; to get it to work and have it perform the duties expected of it is quite another matter.

For years past the charge has been made against both the Provincial and Dominion Governments that the Governments paid more attention to the breeding of cattle and caring for their health than they did for the health of the people. Often there was truth in the allegation. If the Dominion Government really mean making a change in policy in that regard they will be deserving of credit.

Convert to Northern British Columbia.

The Minister of Agriculture has become converted to a firm belief in the potentialities of the northern half of the province, and to the writer today stated he expected within a few days to be able to announce a working plan which will be followed this year, says the Victoria correspondent of the Vancouver World. The land settlement areas are to be enlarged, clearing is to be proceeded with in certain districts, and every encouragement given to all prospective settlers. Veterans are to have preference and he hopes the returned men will awaken to a realization of the vast agricultural empire lying along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific—a farming district second to none in Canada and peculiarly fitted to the needs of the farmer soldiers who served in France.

It is a great advantage to this part of the country to have two live representatives in the Legislature who are right in touch with the affairs of the north and central sections of the community. Messrs. Manson and Pattullo are apparently doing good missionary work, which is already leading to action.

PLAGUE TAKES MANY ON CANADIAN COAST

Whole Population Wiped Out At Some Points in the Labrador.

St. John's March 28. — More details of the plague ravages of Labrador have been received.

From Gross Water Bay to Nain the epidemic raged for four months, carrying off 50 per cent of the inhabitants. At Nain, 40 Newfoundlanders who wintered for the purpose of trade, succumbed and 40 Esquimaux died, practically the whole population of that settlement.

Okala with a population of over 200 was entirely wiped out. At Hebron 200 died, leaving a remnant of residents to dispose of the bodies.

BESSARABIA PROCLAIMED INDEPENDENT

Army of New Soviet Republic
Commences Operations Against
Roumanian Army of
Occupation.

Warsaw, March 28.—Bessarabia has proclaimed her independence, established a Soviet republic and begun an offensive against the Roumanian army of occupation, a dispatch from Chotin announced today. Bessarabia is a former province of Russia, bordering Roumania on the north east. It is claimed and occupied by Roumania.

The Bessarabian army has captured Sadagora and is pushing the Roumanians across the Pruth River toward Larga. The belief is expressed here that the Russian Bolsheviks are engineering the Bessarabian campaign for the purpose of establishing direct communication between Moscow and Budapest.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENT

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land. Partnership agreements abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions, with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims. Pre-emptors must occupy claims for less than 5 years, with improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where a pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained on these claims in less than 5 years, with improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without the Crown's consent, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions. For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

TOWNSITE PROPERTY ALLOTMENT ACT.

Provision is made for the grant to persons holding uncompleted Agreements to Purchase from the Crown of such proportion of the land, if divisible, as the payments already made will cover in proportion to the sale price of the whole parcel. Two or more persons holding such Agreements may group their interests and apply for a proportionate allotment jointly. If it is not considered advisable to divide the land covered by an application for a proportionate allotment, an allotment of land of equal value selected from available Crown lands in the locality may be made. These allotments are conditional upon payment of all taxes due the Crown or to any municipality. The rights of persons to whom the purchase money has been paid, and who are also protected. The decision of the Minister of Lands in respect to the adjustment of a proportionate allotment is final. The time for making application for these allotments is limited to the 1st day of May, 1919. Any application made after this date will not be considered. These allotments apply to town lots and lands of the Crown sold at public auction.

HOW MACKENSEN WAS ARRESTED

How Interned at Nersatzujvidek in a Castle Where He is Under Military Guard.

The "Petit Parisien" publishes the following particulars in regard to the circumstances which led to the arrest of Field Marshal von Mackensen:—The interned Field Marshal had given his word of honor not to make his escape, but information was obtained to the effect that he was preparing for flight on December 31, and that his baggage had already been sent off the day before. Colonel Vix, head of the Allied Military Mission at Budapest, having fruitlessly called upon the Hungarian Government to provide guarantees for the Field-Marshal's internment, determined to take action himself. At 3 a. m., a body of Moroccan Spahis arrived at Budapest, and by 8 a. m. Foth Castle was surrounded by them. Mackensen burst into a violent rage, and refused to receive Colonel Vix, but the latter maintained a firm attitude, and the Field-Marshal had him admitted.

Colonel Vix, addressing the Field-Marshal, said:—I have been given orders to ascertain the fact of your presence. My Mission has been accomplished. I shall withdraw.

General Protest.

Mackensen replied:—I protest against this arrest. I placed myself in the hands of the Hungarian Government, not of the Allies. Continuing, he asked—Would you use force to prevent me from leaving?

The Colonel replied that he had orders to guard him, and that all the men on guard were there for that purpose.

In the course of the day the Field-Marshal despatched a vehement protest to the Hungarian Government, which in turn addressed a protest to the Allies, who, however, pointed out that the Field-Marshal had not fulfilled a single clause of his act of surrender.

After some hesitation the Hungarian Government agreed to the transference of the Field-Marshal to Nersatzujvidek under a guard provided by the Franco-Serbian Army.

Ten Minutes.

At 7 p. m., Colonel Vix notified the Field-Marshal of this decision, and on his attempting to dispute the validity of the order, gave him ten minutes in which to get ready. At the Field-Marshal's request this time limit was, however, extended to half an hour. Eventually at 7.30 the Field-Marshal and his orderly officers took their seats in motor cars under the guard of the French officers in command of the Spahis, and proceeded to Goedele Railway Station. Arrived there Field-Marshal von Mackensen, having ceremoniously saluted the French officers, entered the train which awaited him, and in which dinner was at once served to him in the restaurant car placed exclusively at the disposal of himself and his companions. The Field-Marshal expressed his appreciation of the consideration shown to him, saying that it was an example of real French courtesy. He arrived at Nersatzujvidek at 9 a. m. next day, and was interned in a castle in the neighborhood of the town, where he is under military guard.
