The proposal is a radical change of policy and smacks too much of a reversion to the policy which landed British Columbia in difficulties. One of the chief arguments against the Dominion |\* handing its lands over to the provinces was that they were getting \* no revenue from their sale and that they were better able to \* settle them than the provinces could be. If, however, the Do- \* minion is to make capital of its lands, then the province may have |\* a right to demand that they get the proceeds.

## What is Better **Class of Settler?**

The despatch sspeaks of inducing a better class of settler by selling the lands than by giving them away. That is a matter of \* opinion. Just what is meant by a better class of settler has to be defined. It possibly means that rich men will buy, whereas only poor men would take the free lands under the restrictions that are imposed. And yet the history of prairie settlement has shown that in a majority of cases the poor men make better settlers than the rich and that the permanent prosperity of the country depends on getting men who are industrious rather than men who have money.

To bring in rich people to settle the lands means the establishment of large farms, something which they are trying to get rid of in England. The scheme on the face of it does not seem democratic. Possibly there may be restrictions, which will make the new scheme workable, but those who believe in developing the democratic spirit in this country will look on a measure of that kind with suspicion until they can be shown that it is all right.

## Pattullo Deals With Fisheries Regulations.

Mr. Pattullo has been taking up the cudgels in the Legisla- Improvements. ture on behalf of the people of Prince Rupert. He made an 1919. appeal for consideration for the returned soldiers in the fisheries business and especially in connection with salmon fishing. He suggests that the soldiers have first claim to the licenses, that the Indians and residents of the district get second chance.

A select committee of the Legislature under the chairmanship of G. G. McGeer had reported against the employment of returned men in the salmon fisheries, saying that the fish must trict. be conserved for the purpose of making the industry profitable to those engaged therein. ## Select Committee's Report in Part.

Your Select Committee was attended by Deputy Commission- aining a Crown Grant of the above claim. er of Fisheries Babcock, and upon hearing Mr. Babcock and upon making further investigation, your Select Committee is of the improvements. opinion that in formulating measures for the rehabilitation of soldiers full consideration should be given to the fisheries, for two main reasons, the first being that your Committee believes that the fishing industry, if properly developed, would provide employment for a large number of returned men, and the second was that by the proper development of that industry the high cost of living problem would be solved in a measure in at least one of its many phases. While your Committee made some investigation into the possibilities of the returned soldier engaging in what is known as the "salmon-fishing industry" in such places as the Fraser River and elsewhere, your Committee is not of the opinion, in view of the condition of that industry, that it presents the best Certificate No. 14,157-C, intends, sixty possibilities for the successful employment of returned men, the reason for such conclusion being that it is the opinion of your committee that a policy of conservation is at once necessary to re-establish that industry so that it may be made one of profitable possibilities for those engaging in it. For instance, your Com- Improvements. mittee ascertained the fact that in 1918 the total catch of sockeye 1919. salmon in the Fraser River was 75,000 cases, as compared with NAVIGABLE WATERS PROTEC-553,000 cases which were captured in 1914, the brood-year of the 1918 run. It is the opinion of your Committee that similar depletions are being made on the Naas River, Rivers Inlet, and most of the minor sockeye waters.

## **Duties of** Dominion.

Your Committee also ascertained that in connection with the halibut-fishing carried on on this coast the 1918 catch shows a docking and mooring of cannery and fish decrease of 14,000,000 lbs. Your Committee, in view of the
